City Arrests 11 For Unlawful Assembly

Eleven Littlefield Negroes were jailed Saturday night for unlawful assembly, according to F. A. Fitzgerald, chief of police. The arrests came after the men refused to leave the police station and return home. Each was fined \$50 on guilty pleas when arraigned before Corporation Court Judge, Robert Barton.

The incident began when two policemen broke up a fight in the flats and hauled one of the fighters to jail, the second fled on foot and was not captured. A short time later the group of Negroes surged on the police station and said they were going to get the man in jail out "one way or another." The crowd was asked to disperse and leave the area at least three times, the chief stated, "and then one of them hit a policeman." The man was filed on for aggravated assault. "When they refused to break up and leave, they were booked for unlawful assembly," the chief concluded.

Cotton, Grain Varieties Discussed

Cotton and grain sorghum varieties were discussed by two Lubbock Experiment Station specialists Monday night at the Littlefield Young Farmers Association.

Jack King spoke to the group on grain sorghum varieties pointing out the important factors leading to a successful crop. He said that last year was the first for the grain sorghum midge to do extensive damage. King warned of the probability of its presence again this year and said it could be controlled from one to four days after 50 per cent of the heads have emerged with four pounds of toxophene per acre. "Always buy your seed from a reliable dealer," King said. (See Cotton on Page 8)

\$900,000 Worth Of Milo In 1962

Davidson Tells Lions Club Of Sudan Livestock Feeding

"The Sudan livestock feeding operation will use approximately \$900,000 worth of grain sorghum in 1962," reported Jim Davidson, of the Sudan Livestock Feeders at the noon luncheon of the Littlefield Lions club Wednesday.

Davidson told how the cattle are trucked to the feed yards from a radius of 300 to 600 miles, they are given preventative shots, branded, given vitamins and hormones, then put into the feed lots.

He explained that the feeding

company did not feed out hybrid types of cattle, but more of a medium quality was desired for this market area and concentration of feeding was to produce a "light" type of beef, below 700 pounds.

In the interest of using Lamb County farm products, Davidson said that the feeding operation used in the last six months of operation required approximately \$95,000 worth of milo, \$49,000 worth of cottonseed hulls, \$102,000 worth of cottonseed meal, \$109,000 worth of cottonseed oil and \$74,000 worth of alfalfa.

"The company has an average 16,000 head on feed for the

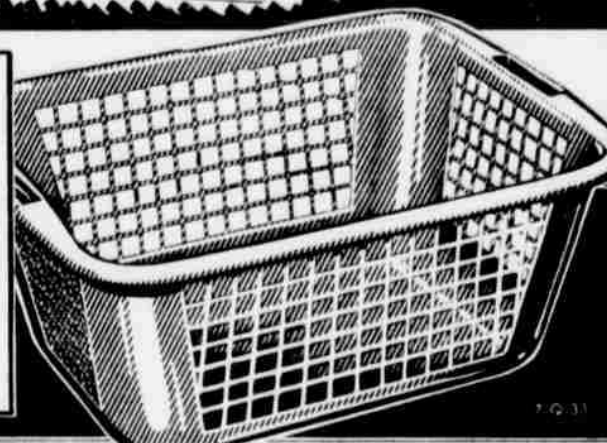

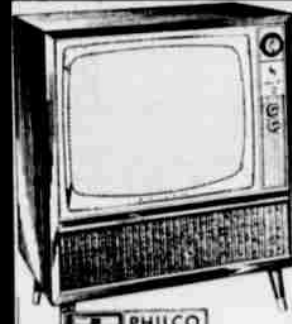

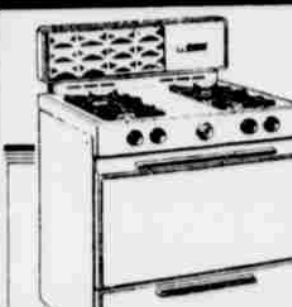

Blue Cross Initiates New Insurance

A completely new and comprehensive health care prepayment plan for Texans 65 and over, which includes not only hospital and doctor services but nursing home care as well, was announced today by Blue Cross-Blue Shield of Texas.

L. H. Allen, Houston, president, and W. R. McBee, executive director, Texas Blue Cross - Blue Shield, announced this new coverage which is called SENIOR TEXAN SERVICE.

Much interest has been focused on the matter of health care for the aged and it is often erroneously stated that those persons over age 65 cannot obtain prepaid health benefit protection. President Allen stated, "We want it to be known by all people that we in Texas are vitally interested in this problem and we strongly feel that it can and should be solved at a local and state level and not through federal legislation and control." He further stated that this plan with its liberal benefits may be obtained by any Texan in reasonably good health whether age 65 or 105.

The plan provides extremely broad benefits, not only for hospital and doctors' services, but recognizes the need and makes available services in qualified and approved nursing homes for medically required care. McBee commented, "We in Texas have always tried to make available prepayment plans to fit the needs of Texans. In recent months, the American Medical Association, the American Hospital Association as well as the National Organizations of Blue Cross and Blue Shield have, after thorough study and exploration, indicated there should be developed national programs providing uniform benefits at uniform rates for all aged persons."

"We of Texas Blue Cross - Blue Shield strongly encourage the use of the tried and proven voluntary prepaid health system in providing protection for the aged, in developing this coverage - SENIOR TEXAN SERVICE - we have provided benefits similar to the uniform programs which have been recommended and at rates equal to or lower than those suggested. It should also be noted that this coverage is being offered at the state level and has been 'tailored' especially to fit the needs of the Texas aged."

McBee further stated, "Recent census figures indicate there are some 745,000 persons age 65 and over in Texas. On January 1, 1962, 220,000 of them became covered by Blue Cross through the old age assistance vendor payment program - an additional 80 to 100,000 have protection through Blue Cross group and non-group contracts. Many of the aged have good protection through commercial insurance companies. With this new plan, virtually all those not now protected can now obtain coverage."

Dr. Harvey Kenger, president, Texas Medical Association, commended Blue Cross - Blue Shield of Texas for developing a comprehensive program especially tailored to meet the needs of the aged. He said, "Prepaid health insurance is an effective mechanism for financing health care costs, and the coverage should be extended to as many as practical and possible. It is particularly encouraging to note that the number of persons age 65 and over with voluntary health insurance has more than doubled since 1952, and that in our own State, more than 400,000 aged persons have this coverage."

Albert H. Scheidt, president of the Texas Hospital Association, said, "Blue Cross - Blue Shield of Texas certainly has our hearty commendation for embarking on this most important and far-reaching program. This is the voluntary way of doing things and demonstrates the initiative and resourcefulness of our local and state leadership."

The SENIOR TEXAN SERVICE PLAN became available on March 18, 1962, and president Allen stated, "This is no doubt a red letter day for those Texans, who, because of age, have been unable to obtain adequate prepaid health care protection."

Penn Point

I read in the paper the other day that they had a "free election" in Russia and yep, you guessed it... Niki won in a landslide as did all the other Communist Party candidates. It was a free election but there was only "one" party on the ballot... the Communist.

Most of Russia's 140,000,000 people eligible to vote turned out for the Sunday holiday election. In most polling stations, the large majority of voters did not bother to use the curtained booths. They simply dropped their ballots... signifying "yes" into the voting urns.

One thing you will have to say about the Russian elections, there isn't any question about the outcome. All I can say is that I am glad I live in a country where the elections really are "free" and the outcome isn't known until the last vote is counted.

Congress is considering raising the postal rate. It is going to cost \$4 to mail a letter that used to cost 3¢ to mail. The new bill will also raise postal rates on newspapers and magazines which use the U. S. Mails to get their publications into the hands of subscribers.

On the surface the bill ap-

pears to be a method to help the Postal Department operate in the black for a change. However, there is one serious side effect which certainly needs to be brought up to the general public.

Many of our serious periodicals will be hurt if not completely destroyed by this additional postage, while magazines dealing with sex, crime and joke books and comic books sold on newsstands continue on their trashy ways.

Our Congressmen dream up all these ways to increase the till of the Federal Government without seeking ways to decrease the amount required to operate the government. In Tuesday's mail I received six postage free letters from one Congressman. They contained the very same mimeographed piece of literature.

If it is the desire of the Senate to strangle the press of the nation, it need only rubber stamp the House bill. It should be no news to the Senators that the fate of the press, and especially the newspapers, is the fate of Freedom.

The proposed rate hike in postal rates will tag an additional \$1.04 yearly in postage to our subscribers. So it isn't hard to imagine what the addition will be to larger magazines and newspapers across the country.

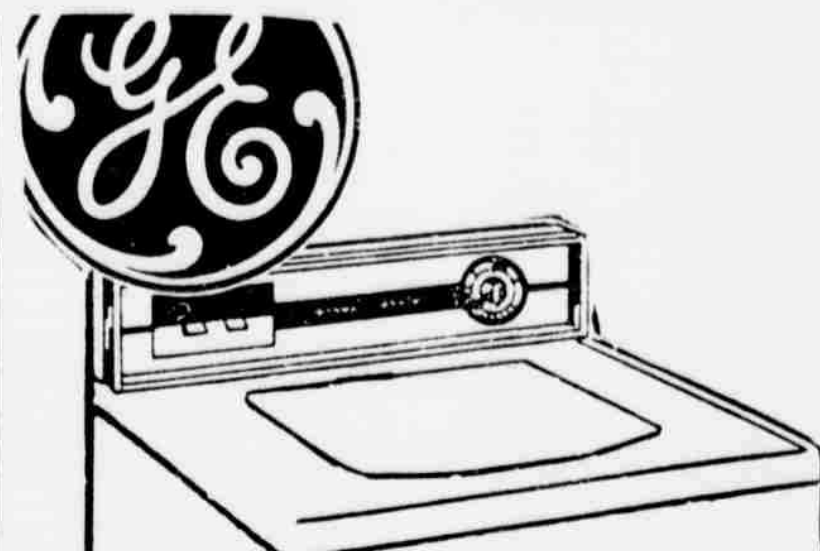

This is a broad definition of a local chamber of commerce.

The first chamber of commerce was formed in Marseilles, France, in the year 1599. It was designed to protect and foster the trade interests of the merchant guilds which developed during the feudal times.

These discussions stimulate a greater interest in controversial matters, and it is in this way that compromises are reached and solutions are found. And remember -- the people taking part in these discussions and taking action on the matters are community builders, like you.

Study groups are organized to do research on issues, and these groups report recommendations. The fact that issues are brought to the fore and action is taken on them builds community support.

IMPORTANT LINK

These recommendations are then submitted to Congress. The local chamber of commerce Congressional Action Committee is a strong link between the community and Congress.

Up to this point we have given you a brief history of the chamber of commerce and have cited some of the functions of the organization. And now we're going to talk about you, as an individual, and what you're doing to support your chamber of commerce.

A survey among several thousand organizations affiliated with the Chamber of Commerce of the United States disclosed that many chambers are literally being choked off because of a lack of funds. In one instance, in a metropolitan center of a half million people, the annual dues minimum is ten dollars. Not much to work with.

An organization needs money if it is to function properly. Maybe you're asking yourself why your chamber isn't doing many of the things you'd like to have it do. You might also ask yourself what you're doing to support your chamber of commerce.

ORGANIZED TALENT

The local chamber of commerce is an organization of many talents -- talents employed as a tool to create and maintain a more profitable atmosphere for business and improve the welfare of the community as a whole.

How effective is your chamber of commerce? The effectiveness can be measured by its annual budget, the number of active members, the effectiveness of its volunteer workers, the skill of its administrative staff and most important, its program.

You and your fellow businessmen are your chamber of commerce. Your coordinated talents can make the chamber a forceful instrument.

Look at it this way -- other groups are organized. All of us are aware of the power of many organizations. We know that they'll go all out to back the individual. And why is this so? Because the individual goes all out to back the organization.

We are not stating that chambers of commerce should necessarily pattern themselves after these groups; we're merely using them as an example of what an organization can do if it sets its mind and money to it.

INADEQUATE FUNDS

An enormous percentage of our nation's local chambers are trying, vainly, to operate on inadequate budgets. However, many of the smaller communities have compromised and have achieved outstanding results with volunteer manpower.

If you're demanding results from your chamber of commerce, you'd better be justified in making your demands. In other words, you'd better be doing something, either in the form of money or volunteering your services.

The organization is what you make it, because you are the organization. You can get out of it what you put into it. Your local chamber can do much to build your community into a comfortable, profitable community -- and you should be one of the supporting timbers in the building program. (Retail in Review)

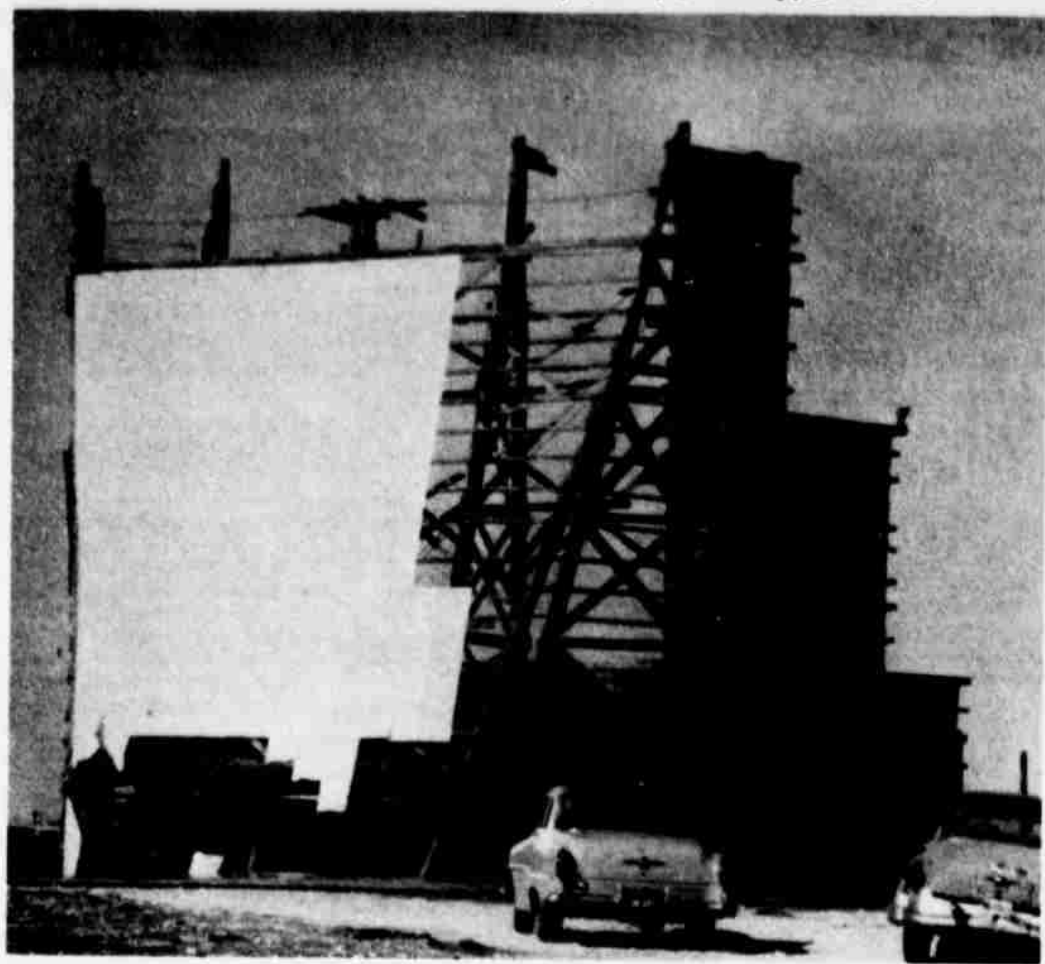
