Notice To Users Of Public Waters

The Board of Water Engineers for the State of Texas desires to call the attention of all interested persons to some portions of the Irrigation Law of 1913 which created the Board and defined its duties, and also to an amendment to this law passed by the Thirty-fourth Legislature. (Chapter 140, Regular Session.)

Secs. 12, 13, 14 of Act of 1913 provides that any one, who, prior to July 1, 1913, had constructed or partially constructed, any works intended for any purposes named in the Act, and who makes use of public waters of the State, may protect his interest and avoid the penalties prescribed by Sections 35 and 40 of the Act, by making certain specified filings with the clerk of the county in which his works are situated, and with the Board of Water Engineers at Austin.

If a declaration of a water appropriation has been filed with the County Clerk prior to July 1, 1913, the provisions of Section 14 only need be followed. This Section provides that a certified copy of the declaration, including a map of the area served together with a sworn statement showing the use which has been made of the works, must be filed in the office of the Board of Water Engineers before July 1, 1914. In case no declaration has been made with the County Clerk, Section 12 provides that a record of appropriation may be filed with the County Clerk at any time prior to July 1, 1914, while Section 13 sets out the manner in which the County Clerk shall record same. A certified copy of the filing with the County Clerk, together with map and sworn statement of use, must then be filed with Board of Water Engineers the same as in the case where the filing was made with the County Clerk prior to July 1, 1913.

The Thirty-fourth Legislature amended Section 12 so as to permit those who had not already complied with the 1913 Act to make filings with the County Clerk at any time PRIOR TO MARCH 31, 1916. All who have not done so should make the required filings BEFORE THAT DATE.

Section 39 of the 1913 Act makes the taking and use of public water without compliance with the provisions of this Act a misdemeanor, each day of such unlawful use to constitute a separate offense. Section 40 provides also that the State may, by suit, recover the sum of \$100 per day for failure to comply with the provisions of this Act.

A filing by a canal company will cover the use by all who pay rental for water from the canal, or who hold water rights under same.

No filing for use of water from wells is required by the Act, unless the wells derive their supply from the underflow adjacent to a water course, or from other definite known underflow.

For the convenience of all who desire to make the filings required by the Act, forms have been prepared, and also printed instructions, which contain the full text of Sections 12, 13, and 14 of the 1913 Act, and the essence of the 1915 amendment, which will be furnished, free of charge, upon request addressed to the Secretary of the Board of Water Engineers, Austin, Texas.

The time in which these certified filings may yet be made is growing short and for this reason the Board urges prompt compliance with the law. More over the fees are small, whereas, the cost of making an appropriation under provisions of other sections of the Law is much greater.

Those who have already made the filings with the Board of Water Engineers are not required to make any additional filings.

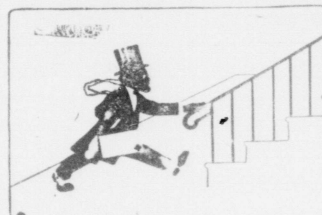

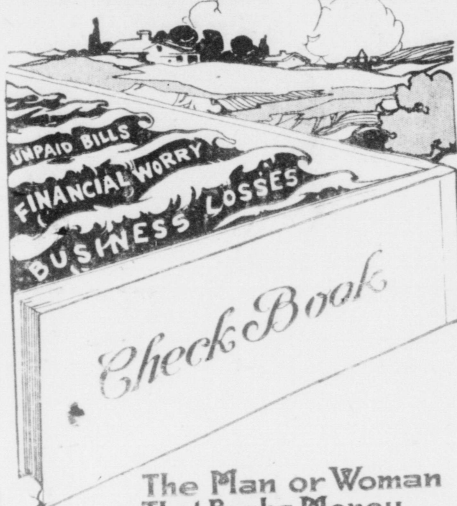

WINTER QUARTERS FOR RAM

Mile of Flock: Needs Sunlight, Fresh
Air and Place to Exercise.
Same as the Ewes.

There are not many farmers who
would purchase a \$2,000 automobile
and let it stand out in the rain in a
mudhole all winter, but there are many
who pay a high price for a well-bred
ram and treat him almost as badly as
that.

How often it is that you go into a
man's barn and find in a dark, stuffy,
narrow pen, way back in one corner,
the head of the flock, says Homestead.
The male of the herd, of course, should
be kept by himself, but he needs sun-
shine, fresh air and a place to exercise
just as much as the ewes.

The winter quarters of a ram should
be such that he can keep dry, both
overhead and under foot. At the same
time, the more fresh air the better.
Even an open shed will serve if it is
satisfactorily dry. A pen should certainly
not be used that is less than 15 feet
square, and if it is larger so much the
better. This will give the ram an op-
portunity to exercise and will keep him
in good, vigorous condition.

During the summer months, when
the ram is allowed to run on pasture,
he does not need grain, but in the win-
ter, if you expect to keep him in good,
vigorous condition, he must be sup-
plied with grain at least a month be-
fore the breeding season.

A mixture of two parts oats and one
part bran has given unusually good re-
sults in some of the larger flocks of
the West. This ration does not pro-
duce fat, but does keep up the vigor of
the ram.

It is impossible to suggest the exact
amount to be fed, for this can only be
determined by watching the animal
and studying his condition.

DEVICE FOR LIFTING SACKS

Slight Pressure Is Sufficient to Raise
Filled Bag to Any Height De-
sired for Loading.

A German inventor has devised a
contrivance for lifting heavy sacks. A
wooden framework, substantially built,
forms with its cross support a letter
A. Balanced at the top is a hinged

lever, with clips which may be fast-
ened about the sack, holding it firmly.
Upon grasping the end of the lever,
which forms the handle, a slight pres-
sure is sufficient to raise the filled
sack to such height that it may be
readily loaded into a wagon or truck
