Deaf Group Leader Hits Jester View

AUSTIN, Nov. 6. (AP)—Louis B. Orrill, Dallas, president of the Texas Association of the Deaf, today took sharp issue with Gov. Beauford H. Jester's conclusions after the Governor's recent first-hand inspection of the Texas School for the Deaf.

Orrill, who for years has been critical of the administration of the institution, made public a letter written Nov. 3 to the Governor, saying:

"It is with mingled feeling of pity and despair that I read the last Saturday's announcement that you had 'investigated' the Texas School for the Deaf and that you had found all charges leveled at the school baseless. I read it with pity because apparently it ends all further efforts to bring you to see the real viewpoint of the deaf; and with despair in the face of the difficulty of going over the ground again."

Calling Jester's visit to the school "a breezy investigation—two hours covering 90 acres of buildings, 600 pupils and a large faculty," Orrill said he had "expected a report highly colored in its premises and conclusions favoring the present set-up."

Jester, accompanied by News-men, spent nearly three hours on an unannounced visit to the deaf school last Friday. After the visit, he said he saw nothing wrong with the school that could not be cured by a little more money, a little more improvement on the part of the management, and a little less outside interference.

Orrill's letter to Jester said that the association's chief request is for an investigation of the school conducted by a group of educators of the deaf.

Reds Wrest Czech Controls

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, Nov. 6. (AP)—A communist-engineered government crisis put communist Premier Klement Gottwald, a former blacksmith, at the top of the heap today as Czechoslovakia's political strong man.

He wrested from the nation's coalition cabinet last night complete authority to rebuild the government of semi-autonomous Slovakia, where the crisis was born and where the predominantly conservative, anti-communist Slovak Democrats are the majority party.

The cabinet decision was interpreted as a major victory in the communists' open drive to gain complete control over the whole nation. An eight-party coalition now governs.

Informants close to the cabinet said Gottwald won by a vote of 12 to 10, with three social democrat ministers casting the deciding votes. They joined with six Czech communists and three Slovak communists against four Czech national socialists, three Slovak Democrats and three Catholic people's party ministers.

West Texas Gets Taste Of Grit

West Texas got a taste of March today, and it was gritty.

Stirred by a turbulent squall line, which went in advance of a cold front descending from the north, dust and sand cut visibility here to as little as half a mile around noon.

By 1 p. m. the swirling soil was settling over the area, with visibility up to two and a half miles here, and one mile at Lubbock. Winds ranged from 20 to 26 miles, with stranger gusts, the U. S. weather bureau reported.

Lubbock reported 49 degrees at 1 p. m., contrasting to a comparatively balmy 75 in Big Spring and foretelling a sharp drop of the mercury here. By Friday morning it was not improbable that the temperature may be flirting with frost.

Blankenship Will Attend Austin Meet

W. C. Blankenship, superintendent of schools, will be in Austin Friday and Saturday at an Inter-scholastic League policy meeting. He is representative from Region No. 2, which embraces the area inclusive of Breckenridge and Odessa. Although no definite points for discussion have been announced, Blankenship sent out survey blanks to schools in his region, but to date has received only one reply, and that from Stephenville.

Hughes Man Declares He Fired Meyer

Executive Says Publicity Agent Uncontrollable

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6. (AP)—A former general manager of Howard Hughes' aircraft company told a Senate committee today he fired publicity man John W. Meyer "because I had no control over him."

Charles W. Perelle, who was hired by Hughes at \$75,000 a year to take over management of the Hughes Aircraft Co., said he discharged Meyer because he could not find out what the publicity man was doing.

He said he does not know under what terms Meyer remained in Hughes' employ, but that he was cut off the Hughes Aircraft payroll in the fall of 1945.

Perelle, now president of the Gar Wood Industries at Wayne, Mich., appeared before a Senate war investigating subcommittee which is inquiring into \$40,000,000 worth of wartime plane contracts awarded Hughes.

Meyer told the committee last summer that he spent nearly \$164,000 entertaining high government and Army officials before the contracts were awarded Hughes. The publicity man is reported ready to testify again if he is wanted.

Perelle said he never saw any of the expense accounts referred to by Meyer.

"I wanted to know what he was doing and why he was doing it," Perelle said, adding that Meyer, although listed as a publicity man, "didn't work at it in the terms I had been accustomed to."

Thereafter he wrote Meyer a letter on Sept. 25, 1945, saying: "I have discussed your status with Mr. Hughes, and it is by mutual agreement with him that you have no further connection of any kind with any activities of the Hughes Aircraft company."

Perelle said he found the Hughes plant at Culver City, Calif., was referred to as the "Hughes country club" when he went there in 1944. He attributed this to "laxness from the standpoint of management."

At the capitol, Senator Ball (R-Minn.) said the aid program should be tailored to give the bulk of help to those countries which do most to help themselves.

Ball, a member of the appropriations committee which will pass on funds to pay for the Administration's proposed European recovery program proposed that economic rebuilding materials be furnished on an "incentive quota" basis.

As he explained the plan, countries which could show increases in their home production in semi-annual surveys would continue to draw full American aid while those who indicated less inclination to help themselves would be penalized.

TOMATOES ARRIVE
FOR SCHOOL LUNCHES
Some 1,530 cases of canned tomatoes arrived here this morning via rail from San Jose, Calif., and were being distributed to school lunch rooms throughout West Texas.

A total of 504 cases remain here and will eventually be dispatched to school cafeterias in Howard, Martin, Midland, Glasscock, Dawson, Ward, Winkler and Andrews counties.

The Lubbock district will claim another 224 cases while 622 cases go to Sweetwater for distribution there.

The tomatoes are distributed free of charge by the USDA Production and Marketing administration under the School Lunch program. Previously, shipments of oranges and potatoes have been received here.

IN U. N.

Policy Of No Co-Operation Seen For Reds

LAKE SUCCESS, Nov. 6. (AP)—Russia apparently was committed today to a policy of non-cooperation with major American proposals she has failed to block by votes in the United Nations assembly.

The Soviet bloc already has invoked these tactics on two of Secretary of State Marshall's key proposals and has indicated the same course will be followed on a third American move for creation of a year-around "little assembly" of the 57 member nations.

After the assembly voted to establish a U. N. watch in the Balkans, Russia and Poland announced they would not serve on the investigating group. A similar attitude was taken yesterday when the Soviet Ukraine refused to participate in a U. N. Commission for Korea.

Now, with the "little assembly" plan approaching a vote in the 57-nation political committee, Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky again has argued that the plan is "illegal" and thus Russia can have no part of it.

The Russian maneuvers have exposed the question of what effect the boycott policy will have on the future of the U. N.

Most serious consideration is given to the effect of a Soviet boycott of the 57-nation interim assembly. Russian non-cooperation would amount to a new version of the veto, which applies now only in the 11 nation security council.

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Cites 'Illusion Of Might' In America

LONDON, Nov. 6. (AP)—Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov of Russia asserted today that secret of the atom bomb "has long ceased to exist."

Molotov, speaking on the eve of the 30th anniversary of the Russian revolution, told the Russian people in a speech broadcast from Moscow:

"It is interesting that in the expansionist circles of the United States a new, peculiar sort of illusion has been formed about their internal strength—a belief in the secret of the atom bomb, although this secret has long ceased to exist."

A Moscow radio commentator said cheers greeted this remark.

"Evidently the imperialists need this faith in the atom bomb, which as is known, is not a means of defense but a weapon of aggression," Molotov said. "Many are indignant that the U.S.A. and Great Britain hamper the United Nations from adopting a final decision on the prohibition of atomic weapons."

Molotov declared that during the year British scientists twice had protested against the action of the United States in keeping the atom bomb "secret."

"Twice," he said, "they have published statements to this effect," expressing dissatisfaction that Britain can only say "yes" to the United States in this business."

Molotov's was the first major statement marking tomorrow's celebration of the revolution anniversary, but whether it would be the only one by a top government leader was not clear immediately.

The fact—announced last night—that Marshal Nikolai Bulganin will review tomorrow's parade of workers and soldiers in Red square apparently indicated that Prime

MINISTER STALIN would not return from his Black Sea vacation villa for the occasion.

Stalin was absent from the last two anniversary celebrations. Molotov made the principal address in 1945 and Andrei A. Zhdanov, member of the politburo, was last year's speaker.

The foreign minister declared Russia now "is just beginning" to reach her power and was opening a new phase of her history since the revolution.

Russia's "industrial output has reached pre-war levels," Molotov said.

"Had there been no war, there would today have been unheard-of advances in our cities and towns. But for the war, which destroyed many important agricultural centers, we would be better supplied today than any other country in Europe or elsewhere."

Molotov said the 30 years of Russia's history since the revolution could be divided into three periods:

"The first, between 1917 and the firm establishment of Soviet power, up to the first five-year period. The second, the period of the Second World War—the great patriotic war."

"The third, the new period which is just beginning."

Commons Approves Freedom For Burma

LONDON, Nov. 6. (AP)—The House of Commons approved last night on its decisive second reading a government-sponsored bill granting Burma full independence on Jan. 6, 1948. The vote was 288 to 114.

The bill still must pass a third reading, but this is generally little more than a formality.

IN POLAND

Inquiry Pressed On Mikolajczyk Flight

WARSAW, Nov. 6. (AP)—The Moscow-backed Polish government intensified today its inquiry into the flight of Stanislaw Mikolajczyk, which it asserted was "actively aided" by an unnamed embassy, and indicated new arrests would be made shortly of persons suspected of helping the opposition leader escape.

Three of the group who fled with the Polish peasant party leader Oct. 20 were declared officially to have been arrested after crossing the Czechoslovak frontier.

They were Wincenty Bryja, treasurer of the party; Mrs. Maria Hulewicz, private secretary to Mikolajczyk; and Mieczyslaw Darbowski, who the government said was a

PEACE DEMANDS

Showdown May Be Forced On Big Four

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6. (AP)—Mounting American demands for an early peace settlement in Europe seem certain today to force a United States - Russian showdown in the Big Four foreign ministers' meeting at London later this month.

Some authorities believe that if the London conference fails to make definite progress on a German peace treaty and to complete an Austrian settlement, the last vestige of great power unity as symbolized in the conferences of the foreign ministers may be destroyed.

Formal American policy for the London meeting remains to be disclosed. But it appears certain that Secretary of State Marshall will give serious weight to proposals by former Secretary James F. Byrnes, and Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.), that Russia's veto in the foreign ministers' council no longer be allowed to stand in the way of at least a partial European settlement.

Byrnes in a speech at Winston-Salem, N. C., last night, predicted in effect that the foreign minister system of peace making would fail to produce an early German settlement and proposed that the United States take the lead in calling a formal peace conference for early next year.

If the Russians refuse to join in calling the conference and to abide by its decisions, Byrnes declared, "then the other allied nations should go ahead without them."

"This would not be making a separate peace," he added. "It would simply be saying that no one nation can veto peace on earth."

The deputies, charged with doing the spadework for a meeting of the council of foreign ministers here on Nov. 25, converged amid reports that Britain, France, Russia and the United States were as badly split as ever on the major issues in the two treaties.

Some informants, unofficial but usually reliable, said the rift had developed so far that the United States already had drafted a plan which would amount to a peace pact with that portion of Germany outside the Russian-occupied eastern region.

Britain was pictured as ready to adopt the role of moderator between Russia and the United States and as being more hopeful than confident that accord could be reached.

Poultry Market Reported Glutted

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6. (AP)—The agriculture department reported today on the fifth poultryless Thursday of the food conservation program—that the nation's markets are being glutted with poultry.

Prices are going down, it added, and city dealers are urging country shippers to hold their chickens back for lack of a market.

Cold storage stocks of frozen poultry, which on Oct. 1 were at record levels for that date, continued to increase last month to such an extent that the industry was said to be running out of space to store dressed poultry.

The report was issued as representatives of the poultry industry renewed their efforts to get the citizens food conservation committee headed by Charles Luckman to do away with the poultryless part of its program.

Byrnes Demands Reds Release Prisoners

WINSTON-SALEM, N. C. Nov. 6. (AP)—Former Secretary of State James F. Byrnes called on the United States to demand the immediate return of an estimated 83,000 Japanese prisoners which he said Russia is holding in violation of the Potsdam agreement.

In an address last night before the House of Bishops of the Protestant Episcopal church, Byrnes also was strongly critical of the time France, Belgium and Britain are taking in repatriating prisoners held by them.

Deaths Apparently Caused By Gas

SANDERSON, Nov. 6. (AP)—Justice of the Peace V. T. Gargile was to return a coroner's verdict today in the deaths of three persons found yesterday in a Sanderson tourist cabin—apparently victims of carbon monoxide poisoning.

Terrell County Sheriff J. S. Nance identified the dead as Mr. and Mrs. Johnnie Wagner and Johnnie Luxton, all residents of this county.

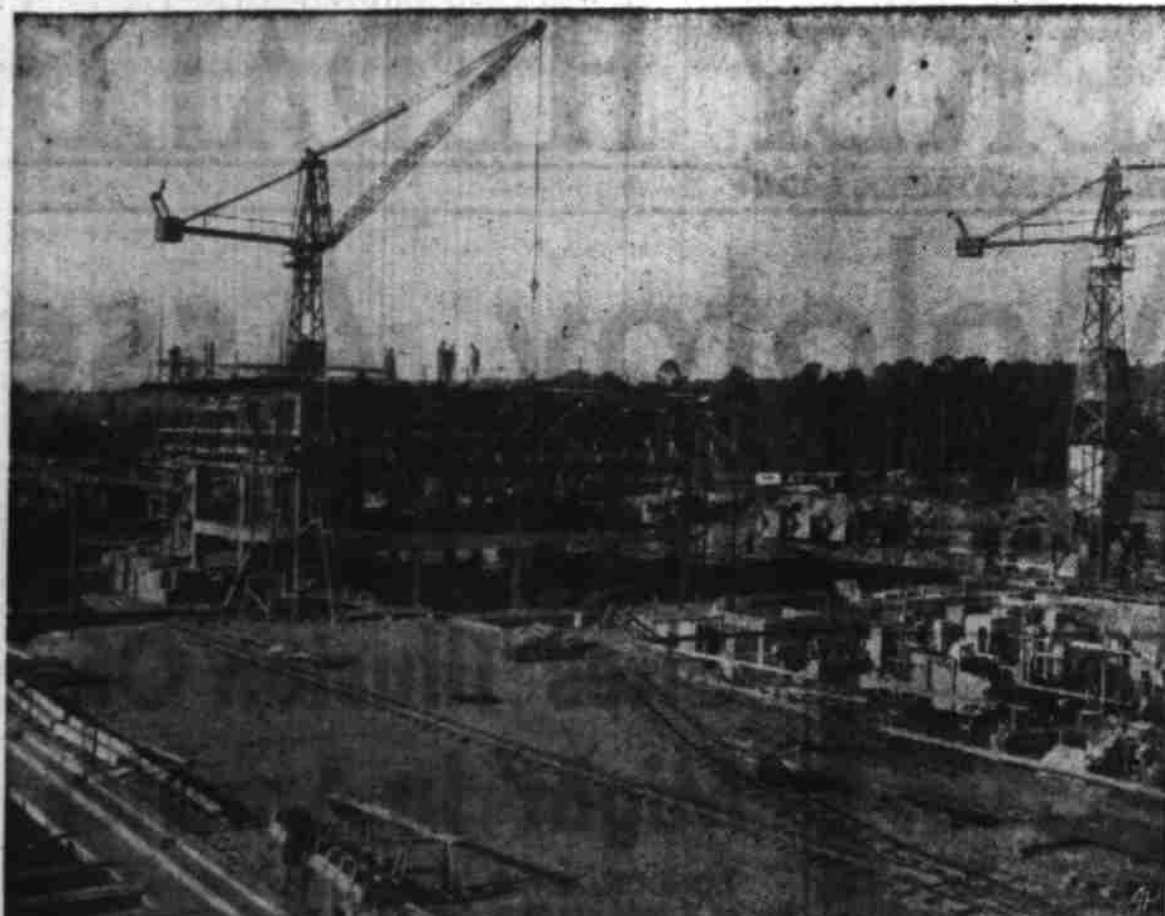


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GERMAN BRICK FACTORY—This plant at Frankfurt on Main, Germany, is being erected for manufacture of bricks from great piles of rubble in that area.

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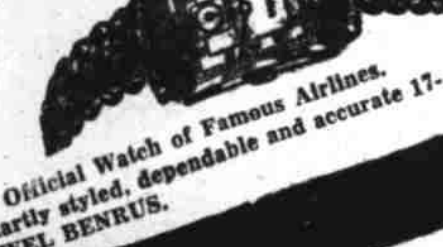

Progress Made In B' Spring Drive On Rats

The rat population in Big Spring has been reduced effectively in most sections of the city, especially in the business district, Harold Plum, director of typhus control, reported today.

A total of 189 business establishments have been rat-proofed inside the city limits, and several others have been rat-proofed by owners, according to the latest progress report on the program.

In addition, rat-proof construction has been used in all buildings erected in the city since the typhus control ordinance was passed. The central business district has been completely rat-proofed, with exception of two or three buildings where future plans made it practical to delay the work for a few months, Plum said.

Workers in the department also have made considerable headway on buildings on the north side of town and many owners there have rat-proofed their own buildings.

Plum said that with continued co-operation of property owners, the health department hopes to eliminate the rodents completely.

The department is still offering a program for home owners, which consists of eradication of mice and rats where needed and spraying of homes with 10 percent DDT powder for insects.

Considerable rat proofing work has been completed in neighborhood business establishments in the south part of town, and the department hopes to complete those remaining in the near future.

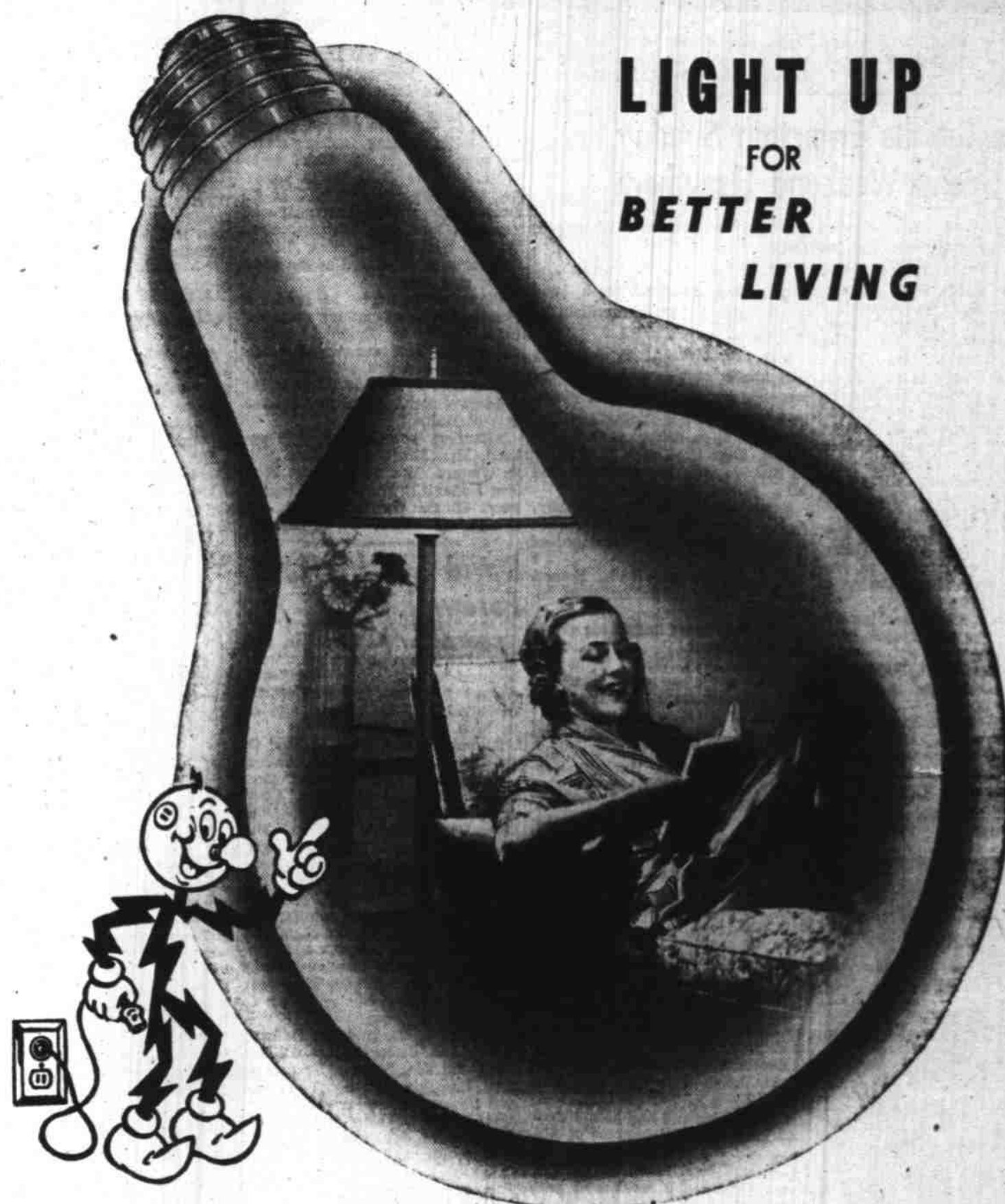

Agreement On A Political Matter

At last there is one political matter on which most everyone is in agreement, namely that no particular significance is attached to returns in Tuesday voting.

The nearest thing to a straw in the wind was in Kentucky where the democrats regained control, but the development fit into a pattern for the state is normally democratic and never have the Republicans succeeded themselves in power. In the congressional races, Republicans won in traditionally Republican areas, and the Democrats were successful in their own strongholds. Mayoralty contests were about evenly divided in honors, and some of the most heated races were fought on a non-partisan basis.

In Mississippi the election of John C.

Stennis to fill the unexpired term of the late Sen. Theodore Bilbo was not regarded as an upset, although the tail-end response for Rep. John E. Rankin, who had promised to "out-Bilbo Bilbo" was surprising.

Whether this has any particular significance as concerns the internal affairs of Mississippi we do not know, but it is doubtful. More likely, it is a repetition of the political lesson that strength acquired by one personality cannot be bequeathed to or assumed by another as a matter of natural consequence. Although employing much of the same stock-in-trade, Bilbo simply had more on the ball than Rankin when it came to selling his bill of goods to the people of his state. We've seen the same thing happen in Texas.

Post-War Problem Of 'Grave' Import

Now this has nothing to do with the State of the Nation, nothing to do with the weather or any other all-important matter, but purely with a post-war beef.

Most of us don't worry about the slowness in swinging to new and sleeker lines in automobiles, being able to understand that a resort to basic pre-war models was the fastest way to production. Anyhow, only those who thrived or who were far thrifter than the common horde are in the market for that popular goal of a new machine.

Whether the steel industry should expand; whether some concession ought to be made in price on this basic commodity is purely academic as far as we are concerned. Astronomical figures in quoting

corn, wheat and cotton production and demand almost befuddle us. Nor are we qualified, as most any woman is, to argue the merits of the sheer grades of nylon versus silk.

But this much we do know. The quality of matches and toothpicks is absolutely deplorable. It's all in the wood, and perhaps the wild rush for housing, paper, etc. has made such humble commodities as these two essentials (well, matches anyhow) seem unimportant. But if we are to have any peace of mind at all in these confusing days, certainly we cannot tolerate the vexations of matches and toothpicks that snap at a mere glance. The heads of the nation ought to be put on notice that tempers and patience can be tried only so far.

Tax Cut Will Offer Problems

WASHINGTON, D.C.—This hits you.

A special committee of civilians, almost all businessmen, thinks taxes can be cut next year.

(A word of caution: What they think and what will happen are two different things. So don't build false hopes.)

But what they say will be argued in Congress. And the Republican-controlled Congress seems certain to pass a tax-cut bill of some kind.

(Then it will be up to President Truman to decide whether he'll kill such a bill with a veto in 1946 as he did with two such bills in 1947.)

The special committee reported yesterday after months of work. In brief, it said:

The government's whole tax set-up needs overhauling but income taxes should be cut right away.

Proof Of Peace In Our Time

There is peace in our time. Fort Worth proved it yesterday. Texas-born General Dwight D. Eisenhower came to Cowtown, but the man of the hour was Will Rogers, a humorist.

The man who led allied armies to victory in the world's greatest war got second billing to a civilian, dead a decade.

The event was designed to honor the humorist-philosopher, of course. His good friend, Amon Carter, Fort Worth publisher, took the occasion of what would have been Rogers' 68th birthday to unveil both a life-sized statue and a life-sized painting of the humorist.

The ceremonies were held before the mammoth auditorium and coliseum named in Rogers' honor.

Yes, the show was designed for and dedicated to Will Rogers. But what would have happened two years ago—even one year

ago—if five-star General Dwight D. Eisenhower had appeared in Fort Worth? On any occasion or event or anniversary?

It would have been his show. Streets would have been packed. Flags and bunting would have been whipping in the crisp November air.

Bands would have marched. State officials would have been on hand to honor the grinning, victorious hero of World War II. Yesterday, General Eisenhower, still in uniform, still a five-star general, still a hero, was just the featured speaker honoring Will Rogers.

Streets were not decorated. There was no parade. Instead of a crowd of half a million jubilant Texans, 9,000 gathered to hear him talk, and see him unveil the statue and the picture.

Eisenhower himself asked that he be treated as a "private citizen," and there wasn't even a press conference.

Yes, there is peace in our time—for a time, anyway. The heroes of World War II are not forgotten, nor will they ever be. But Texas, and the country, is looking for new heroes remembering old memories.

Some of the war's leaders are out of uniform. Some have entered public service, some have entered politics, some private business.

Others have voluntarily slipped into the limbo of legend. Eisenhower, himself, is still in uniform, still head of the U. S. Army, and is frequently mentioned as a possible presidential candidate.

But this new era of peace yesterday made him just another American honoring a man who fought his way to fame with a pen, not a sword.

Affairs Of The World—DeWitt MacKenzie

Final Clue In East-West Battle

The council of Big Four foreign ministers, due to meet in London this month to frame a long overdue German treaty, will give us what may be the final clue we need to determine whether there is any possibility of collaboration between the warring Russian bloc and the democracies.

The disposition of Germany's tangled affairs is the crux of continental Europe's political and economic rehabilitation. If the Big Four ministers—Marshall of the U. S. A., Bidault of France, Bevin of Britain and Molotov of Russia—can't agree on a pact now, then prospect of further collaboration on any line is very thin indeed.

Here it may be said that the cup of hope for success in the London parley isn't overflowing. Apropos of this situation in any circle.

The United States has made a new foreign policy statement accusing Russia of failing to co-operate in efforts to establish peace. The document blames the Soviet Union for failure of the United Nations "to grasp the fruits of peace and victory." It says the Soviets have failed to make good on wartime commitments for demilitarization and reconstruction of Germany, and are mainly interested in getting maximum reparations from Germany and in setting up a German political regime friendly to Russia.

"The United States," says the

policy statement, "desires that Germany shall occupy a position among the powers which would give her freedom to co-operate in a broad program of European economic construction rather than to be linked economically and politically with any orbit. The impasse between the great powers in this matter has resulted temporarily at least in the virtual partition of Germany. The situation in Austria is somewhat similar."

The Russian answer to all this is that America and Britain are attempting to use Germany as a pawn in imperialistic schemes.

Well, if the foreign ministers' council is unable to agree on a peace treaty, what then? We may find one answer to that in a statement by General Lucius D. Clay, U. S. military governor in Germany. The general declares it is absolutely essential that as large a part of Germany as possible be politically and economically integrated at an early date.

We interpret this as meaning that if the Russians won't collaborate in politico-economic rehabilitation, then the other allies—America, Britain and France—should integrate their three zones as best possible. And quickly.

IMPROVING BREED
CHAMPAIGN, Ill. (UP)—About 100,000 cows will be bred artificially in Illinois during 1947 according to the University of Illinois college of agriculture. Breeding associations have been formed in 63 countries so farmers can have their cows bred to better stock, improving milk production and sales value.

Vinson Made Inflation Mistake

WASHINGTON, — Hindsight is always easier than foresight, but in view of the zooming high cost of living and current proposals to reimpose the excess-profits tax, it's important to look back and see who was right and who was wrong in the days when the seeds of inflation first were planted.

Chief responsibility for abolishing the excess-profits tax must rest at the feet of much-loved Chief Justice Fred Vinson, then secretary of the treasury. Various experts argued with him that throwing this tax out the window so soon after the war was bound to head the country into inflation. Vinson, however, was adamant.

Among those who argued with Vinson were Postmaster General Bob Hannagan, who, as commissioner of internal revenue, knew a lot about taxes, and Marriner Eccles, chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, who has kept his feet on the ground economically better than anyone else around the White House.

Three senators also opposed removal of the excess-profits tax—Connally of Texas, Fulbright of Arkansas and O'Mahoney of Wyoming—all Democrats. In fact, they were the only senators to make speeches against the lush tax reward being tossed into the lap of big business. No Republicans spoke up.

What Hannagan, Eccles and the senators told Vinson was that the minute big business had an incentive for making big profits, the clamor for higher prices would begin. Price controls would then come off and we would find ourselves right in the middle of post-war inflation. But as long as profits and price were kept low, they also told Vinson, labor could not successfully demand higher wages.

With 80 per cent of business profits being paid into the U. S. treasury, Vinson was also urged, corporations were willing to keep prices down. There was no percentage in raising them.

Secretary Vinson, however, turned a deaf ear. He even became a little irked when Senator Fulbright of Arkansas tried to convince him. And since the popular, likable Vinson at that time was the man closest to Truman, a presidential message was sent to Congress just two brief months after the end of the war, recommending that the profit bars be lowered to big business.

Since then all the predictions made by Hannagan, Eccles, and the three Democratic senators have more than come true. Corporate profits have soared as never before in history. U. S. Steel has just cut the juiciest dividend since the lush days on the eve of the Hoover depression. Bethlehem Steel has done likewise.

During the first six months of this year, the profits of 402 major companies listed on the New York stock exchange zoomed for an increase of 97.9 per cent over their profits for the same period last year.

Yet last year, profits were high. In fact, the commerce department reported that after paying all taxes, corporate profits for 1946 were \$12,500,000,000—an all-time record in American history.

On top of this tremendous profit record for 1946 it now looks as if profits for 1947 would be just about double.

That is why labor looks at the dividend announcements of the steel, oil and machinery companies and asks for more wages. And that, in the opinion of many government economists—who sometimes don't have much to say around the White House—is the basic reason why the cost of living continues to soar.

Note—Many people have wondered about the change of economic viewpoint so obvious in Chief Justice Fred Vinson in the last two years. Once a fighter for liberal ideals, Vinson, both as secretary of the treasury and on the Supreme Court, has veered steadily to the right.

Close friends say the reasons are: 1. The death of Franklin Roosevelt, whose strong leadership Vinson followed; 2. The retirement of Vinson's chief assistant, Ed Pritchard, who for many years kept Vinson in the liberal groove.

OIL MERRY-GO-ROUND
Speaking of corporate profits, the Associated Press made a slight, but vitally important, error in reporting the profits of the American oil companies in Arabia. AP reported that they made a profit of \$91,000,000 on an investment of \$100,000,000. Real fact is the investment was only \$100,000. An incredulous AP rewrite man, not believing anyone could make \$91,000,000 out of only \$100,000 simply added three additional zeros. . . . The way U. S. oil companies made this lush gravy was by not paying

taxes in the United States, and at the same time using U. S. government money to keep King Ibn Saud happy, thus protecting their oil concessions. Even when the King wanted a useless railroad built through the desert to nowhere, the oil companies, to humor him, got the export-import bank to vote him \$25,000,000. At first conscientious export-import bank directors refused, but they were over-ruled by the state department. . . . The state department, incidentally, had American-Arabian Oil Company executives strategically placed on its payroll. So did the Navy department. . . . last March 23, well before the current Senate oil expose, this column told in detail how the Navy paid exorbitant prices for Arabian oil, despite protests from younger naval officers. One Admiral on the Army-Navy Petroleum Board Adm. Andrew F. Carter, is now with a subsidiary of the American-Arabian Oil company.

His brother, Adm. William J. Carter was in charge of Navy purchases. . . . The oil companies escaped paying taxes by incorporating in the Bahamas islands. In other words, while other U. S. taxpayers paid out several millions to keep King Ibn Saud happy and to buy high-priced Arabian oil, the oil companies paid no taxes whatsoever. The two oil companies operating the American-Arabian Oil company are: Standard of California and Texaco. . . . Incidentally, Texaco fired its president, Torikild Rieber, when he was discovered entertaining Gerhard Westrick, a Nazi businessman, before Pearl Harbor. . . . Wonder which was worse—entertaining Westrick or profiting in Arabia?

UNDER THE DOME

Senator Harry Cain, the irrepressible Republican from Washington, mysteriously disappeared while traveling through Germany with the senate judiciary committee. Worried colleagues notified the military government which spread a zone-wide alarm. Two days later the missing Senator turned up, safe and snug. He had borrowed a jeep and taken a ride on his own. . . . Naval shake-ups; Adm. Duke Ramsay is slated to be the new commander of the Pacific fleet. . . . Vice Adm. Donald B. Duncan will become assistant chief of naval operations, the No. 2 man in the Navy department in Washington.

Ground Broken For Paving In Stanton

STANTON, Nov. 4 (SpL)—Dirt was broken here Monday on a \$16,000 street improvement program, to be effected here as a cooperative effort between property owners, the city and school board.

Machinery of Cooper & Woodruff, general road contractors of Dallas and currently engaged in construction of the Lomah-Andrews highway, broke ground on old US 80 in the block between the Eiland Motor Co. and the Martin County Memorial hospital.

The program calls for seal coating from curb to curb on one block of Main from the present US 80 to the First National bank corner, for patching and seal-coating the old US 80 through the city from points of intersection with the new highway. In addition, approximately nine other blocks are included as new construction.

Streets on the north, west and south sides of the courthouse will be tapered, closing the circle since the Lamesa highway on the east side is already paved. Two blocks from the southwest corner of the courthouse square to the highway will be paved, as will a block from the old highway to the new, west along the Berry Lumber company; one from the old highway south to intersection of the new highway at the Magnolia station plus a street connecting with the old highway and running by the John Pinkston home; a portion of a block in front of the W. Y. Houston home; and a segment on the curve of the Lamesa highway leading from the Tait Lindsay property.

The project is estimated to require 60 days for completion, barring any weather hindrances. In the meantime, efforts are being made to sign up new cooperative paving ventures while the contractor has machinery on hand and can quote low cost figures.

Fill for the first block of the program is being made with dirt excavated from the Bob Whitaker lot, where he plans to construct a modern motion picture house. The excavation is being made in order to install sloping floor for the show house.

C-C Empowers WTCC Directors

Directors of the chamber of commerce waded into the West Texas Chamber of Commerce referendum planks Monday, debated at length over the second and third ones submitted, and then left up to re-elected WTCC Directors—W. L. Mead and G. H. Hayward the casting of ballots for Big Spring.

The two directors are to represent local interests at the WTCC referendum in Abilene on Nov. 11. Reports on possibility of expediting telephone extensions were made by R. W. Currie, member of a special committee, which was left intact for further contacts with Southwestern Bell Telephone company. At the same time, directors adopted a resolution asking for speedier local service.

An appropriation for an independent pig show was adopted by the board upon request from the Jaycees.

Board members adopted a resolution of condolence to R. L. Cook, also a board member, upon the death of his mother.

Out-Of-County Maize Moving

Approximately 1,500 tons of maize had moved to market from here through Saturday, possibly less than 1,000 tons of it Howard county production.

Although the market broke in the wake of a decline in corn prices, the picture had stabilized and was pegged at \$3.10 cwt. at the end of the week.

Early in the season, half of the volume put through the Tucker Elevator here was estimated to be out of Dawson, Martin and other counties, but E. T. Tucker, operator, said Saturday that two-thirds of the movement now was from Howard county fields.

The crop will be short and it is difficult to estimate the per cent harvested. Shortage of the crop may cause some producers to hold for their own feeding needs.

Currently, receipts are sufficient for three to four cars a week.



PLASTIC SURGERY

Practices On White Farm Reclaim Erosive Gully

Plastic surgery—that's what George White did to Mother Earth in his operation of his farm west of the Hartwells area and 16 miles northwest of Big Spring.

When an erosive gully showed up in his field, he did something about it instead of watching it gnaw away while he was looking for another piece of land.

White enlisted aid of the Soil Conservation Service as a cooperator in the Martin-Howard Soil Conser-

vation district. Together they worked out a complete program of soil management and mechanical needs. White terraced the field and plowed the gullies in so that the field, deeply marked as shown in the top photograph, could be farmed economically without undue loss of water and soil.

As a result, the scars of erosion were scarcely evident when the second picture was taken from practically the same perspective.

Although the land had not settled quite enough to give uniform stands, as shown in the third picture, cotton now grows in the area which formerly was a young gulch. Conservationists look upon it as a "stitch in time," for in a few years the gully might have deteriorated beyond economical recovery. Not only did the practices employed reclaim the cultivated area, but they constituted a bulwark against a recurrence of serious erosion.

CONSTABLE ATTACKED

Big Spring Man Slain When Caught In Stanton Robbery

STANTON, Nov. 4 (SpL)—Lorenzo Pineda, 38, Big Spring, was shot and killed here at 1:45 a. m. today when surprised in the act of rifling the prescription department of the City Drug Store.

Constable Bill Pinkston fired one shot, which struck Pineda above the heart, when he said Pineda lunged at him with a tire tool, according to Martin County Sheriff Morris Zimmerman.

Pinkston and a companion were walking down the street when, more on intuition than anything else, he turned in the middle of the block and walked by the City Drug store, said Zimmerman. At first Pinkston thought someone was admitting a man to the drug store but then a broken glass door was discovered.

As he eased inside and made his way to the prescription department, Pineda noticed the constable approaching. Pinkston cried "Halt!" Then as the figure kept coming at him, he fired. Pineda dropped at his feet and the tire tool rattled to the floor, Sheriff Zimmerman said.

A screw driver was found in the prescription department, and Zimmerman expressed the belief that an attempt was being made to obtain narcotics. The dead man had gloves, 83 cents, a handkerchief and a match on his person.

Another Latin-American from Big Spring, Eleno Barrera, was picked up for questioning, said Sheriff Zimmerman after he had driven by the store slowly and turned back on the highway a couple of times shortly after the incident.

Pineda's body was brought to the Eberly Funeral home in Big Spring.

Identification of Pineda was made at Big Spring early Tuesday by Pete Green, police chief. The shooting victim had been booked here once six years ago for child desertion and was released under bond in 1946 on a narcotics count.

Rites for Lorenzo Pineda were pending here Tuesday. Survivors include his widow, five sons, one daughter and seven brothers. The body was at Eberly Funeral home pending arrangements.

Rites Set For Mrs. Chaney

Valley Will Have State TB Hospital

AUSTIN, Nov. 4 (UP)—The state board of control yesterday signed an agreement by which the state will receive title to 460 acres at Moore field in the lower Rio Grande valley for use in the establishment of a state tubercular hospital.

Announcement of the agreement, by Chairman Hall Logan of the involving the cities of McAllen, Edinburg and Mission, was made state board of control.

Logan said the city of Mission had authorized Mayor Logan Duncan to accept the legal instrument and the city councils of Edinburg and McAllen are expected to meet by tomorrow to pass formal resolutions allowing similar action.

Approval by the War Assets Administration of transfer of the buildings and service utilities to the state is necessary before the state takes over the land, but this transaction is considered only a formality.

Logan said a sufficient appropriation is on hand to provide for upkeep of 250 patients for the present fiscal year ending Aug. 31, 1948, but he indicated a scarcity of doctors and nurses will delay opening of the hospital.

Funds will be available for the care of 500 patients the following fiscal year, and the full anticipated capacity of the hospital will be approximately 2,000 beds.

Schools Using Audio-Visual Aids More

AP Newsfeatures NEW YORK — More and more schoolmarm teaching the three Rs are using special appeals to the two eyes and the ears.

The National Education Association (NEA), reporting on a survey of more than a thousand city school systems, says the success achieved by the armed services during the war in use of "audio-visual" aids has spurred their use in the classroom.

However, these "audio-visual" aids, which usually take the form of motion pictures and radio programs, are being neglected by many schools and used only ineffectively in many others, the survey shows.

For example, only one city in four could report that a majority of teachers made "frequent" use of educational motion pictures and only 30 per cent found a majority of teachers using educational films "occasionally." Less than 10,000 classroom radios were reported available for students' use. More than a million glass slides were available in 737 of the systems, but 80 per cent of them were found in 33 of the largest cities.

The curriculum fields named most often as those in which audio-visual aids were used most effectively were, social science and science in elementary and high schools, and practical arts in high school.

Teachers are pretty much agreed, says Prof. William H. Hartley in the Seventeenth Yearbook of the National Council for the Social Studies, that "no teacher can bring to his pupils the best possible background... unless his school is equipped to make use of modern materials. Too many teachers are handicapped by trying to teach without the proper tools."

For the social studies, Prof. Hartley recommends the use of pictures, maps and graphs; projectors to enlarge pictures from textbooks, magazines, etc.; slide, filmstrip and motion picture projectors; a radio and a record player and recorder.

Teachers of vocational subjects have also come to realize that visuals can speed up training as much as 75 per cent. Research has shown that facts learned from visuals are retained or remembered 58 per cent better than when learned in other ways.

Rapidly growing in popularity among speech and foreign language instructors are various types of recording machines. Teaching is made simpler and more effective, teachers declare, because they permit the student to hear and repeat drill material easily and accurately as often as required.

Almost every subject-matter field can benefit from the use of audio-visual equipment and materials, asserts NEA.

Mahon Leaves For Capital

COLORADO CITY, Nov. 4. — Rep. George Mahon left here this morning for Dallas where he will board an American Airlines plane early Wednesday for Washington, D. C.

After spending three weeks in the 19th district, which he represents, Mahon was returning to Washington to participate in the sessions of the special House committee under Rep. Christian Herter.

As a member of this committee, charged to report to Congress its findings on European conditions, Mahon visited in England, Germany, France, Italy, Trieste and Greece during September.

The committee is to formulate its recommendations in advance of the opening of the congressional session on Nov. 17, called by the President for the purpose of dealing with the European aid program, plus the price situation.

October Is One Of Driest Months

October went down in the books as one of the driest on record for the month, the summary of Gardner A. McGahan, meteorologist for the U. S. weather bureau, showed today.

Total precipitation was .50 of an inch, 29 of the amount occurring in a light shower on Oct. 25. It was the driest October since 1943 when an all time low for the month was established with .11 of an inch. This brought total for the year to 10.01 inches, or 6.16 inches below normal for the first 10 months. The deficit for October was 1.54.

Along with the drought, heat mounted, for the mean for October was 70.6, a new all-time record and exceeding the 70.2 of 1934, the only other time the average ever crawled to 70 degrees. Maximum was 91 degrees, minimum 50. The high was the most intense since 100 degrees was reached in 1918. The minimum was way above the 28 in 1913. Another phenomenon was stillness, for only on three days did the wind maintain velocity of 10 miles per hour.

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SLIGHT VARIATION

Cotton Ginning Figures Are 2,000 Bales Below Estimate

Actual cotton ginning figures in Howard county through Oct. 31 varied slightly from unofficial estimates of last week, according to a report from D. H. Yates, U. S. Census Bureau reporter. Yates said his end of the month survey, which included accurate figures from all gins in the county, showed that 19,667 bales had been processed by the end of October. This figure is short of estimates made last Saturday by approxi-

mately 2,000 bales, indicating that gins in Big Spring are handling more than half of the crop. Last week's estimates were based on a ratio of 45 to 48 per cent for Big Spring gins, which has been the general pattern for several years. Yates estimated that 65 to 70 per cent of the county's 1947 cotton crop has been accounted for in ginnings reported to date. However, there were still some who felt that 40 per cent of the crop remained in the fields. These estimates indicate a total yield for the year of between 28,000 and 32,000 bales, which is in line with some early season forecasts.

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Turnesa Leads At Pinehurst

PINEHURST, N. C. Nov. 6. (AP)—What shaped up as a free-for-all scramble for North and South Open golf top honors after a tight first round, threatened today to become a one-man show, thanks to Jimmy Turnesa.

Jimmy, an unattached professional from Ulmford N. Y., scorched the 6,879-yard No. 2 course with a 32-34 second round yesterday to gain the 36-hole lead at 137 in this 17,500 event with a top price of \$1,500.

His 66, six under par, equaled the record last duplicated in 1945 by Denny Shute and Ben Hogan. As the 51 survivors who scored 153 and under moved into today's final 36 holes, Turnesa held a four-stroke advantage over runner-up George Schoux of Mamaroneck, N. Y.

Jack Grout of Harrisburg, Pa., came through with his second 71 for third place at 142. Four players were in contention at 143—Ed Furgol of Detroit, Tommy Wright of Knoxville, Tenn., PGA Champion Jim Ferrier of San Francisco and Henry Williams, Jr., of Sunbury, Pa.

Still possibilities at 144 were Denny Shute of Akron, O.; Cary Middlecott of Memphis, Tenn.; Pete Cooper of Ponte Vedra, Fla.; and Johnny Weitzel of Reading, Pa.

ARM OF U. S. LAW

Two Texans Are Leaders Of Huge Department Of Justice

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6. (AP)—The department of justice, the legal and law enforcement arm of the government, is located in a downtown building which occupies an entire block between Pennsylvania and Constitution avenues.

Attorney General Tom C. Clark of Dallas is the big boss of the D. O. J. His right hand man, with the title of "The Assistant to the Attorney General," is Douglas W. McGregor, former federal district attorney in Houston.

There are some 600 to 700 lawyers working in the department. Contrary to belief in some quarters the place isn't overrun with Texans. This little story is told by McGregor:

At a recent private gathering some one poked a good-natured jibe at Clark, telling him "I sup-

pose your place is full of fellow Texans."

The cabinet member smilingly denied the accusation, saying he actually didn't know just how many there were, but that he would check up. The result was he found only 11 other Texas lawyers in the department, not counting Federal Bureau of Investigation agents. McGregor was the only Texas lawyer who had joined the department since Clark became attorney general.

The others are: Rhodes S. Baker, Jr., of Dallas, a tax division expert; Ben Brooks, Forney; Albert Boggs, Waco; Frank Cunningham, Dallas; Joe S. Davies, Fort Worth; C. Maxley Featherston Peterburg; Edward L. Fulton, Wichita Falls; Robert M. McKee, Crosbyton; David V. Swann, Odessa, and James Kilday, former federal district attorney in Houston.

The senior Texan from standpoint of service in the department is Swann, who is head of the veterans division, handling such matters as insurance and other claims. A veteran of World War One, he came to the department 16 years ago.

Kilday, a brother of San Antonio's Congressman Paul Kilday, is probably the department's most authoritative legal expert on matters of interstate commerce. He sits in on 100 rail and bus rate hearings to see that the law is complied with by all parties.

As head of the department, the attorney general is the chief law officer of the federal government. He represents the United States in legal matters generally and gives advice and opinions when requested by the President or by the

heads of the other executive departments. He also appears in the Supreme Court in cases of exceptional importance and gravity.

FBI officials said there are 22 Texans who are special agents assigned on duty in that division of the justice department here. They would identify only two by name, however, explaining that to disclose the identity of the others might be detrimental to their operations.

The pair who were identified are Henry L. Sloan of Whitesboro, who is in charge of the firearms training center at Quantico, Va., and J. R. Carlson, former dean of Baylor University law school.
