Girls' athletic coordinator hired

Eddie Wayne Alexander of Robert Lee was named girl's athletic coordinator by the Colorado Independent School District Board of Trustees Monday night. Alexander has eight years of teaching and coaching experience with the past four years at Robert Lee. Alexander's appointment came following an executive session which lasted nearly an hour and a half and in which both head coach Tom Ramsey and Alexander were present. Supt. Charlie Useton said Alexander will be employed 230 days a year and paid \$4,946

yearly extra for his coaching duties and \$360 a year in local increment. Useton said Alexander will be paid the same as Ramsey and high school band director David Sims. Alexander has a Bachelor of Science degree from McMurry College in Abilene with a major in physical education and a minor in English and history. He completed an 18-hour deficiency plan in history in the summer of 1986. He is a 1975 graduate of Bronte High School and a 1979 graduate of McMurry. The board took no action on the athletic program, specifically volleyball and golf, after Ramsey and Useton both recommended that the programs be continued.

Useton said that Merkel has dropped volleyball from its athletic program and Clyde was considering dropping the sport but has since decided to continue the program. "It is our recommendation that we approve these same sports next year," said Useton. The board accepted the resignations of two long-time CISD employees. Billie Margaret Harrison, secretary at Kelley Elementary, submitted her resignation effective June 12. She has been with the school system 21 years. Hutchinson Elementary principal Dell Riley submitted his resignation effective June 12, also. Riley has been with the school system 23 years, the last

Officials pleased with tests

CISD officials Monday night said they are pleased, but not satisfied, with the results of the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) tests given to students this past year. Principals were on hand at Monday's school board meeting to give results of the TEAMS and Comprehensive Tests of Basic Skills (CTBS) tests. "Overall, we're pleased with the results," said Asst. Supt. Don Nimmo. "However, we're certainly not satisfied with the scores." Nimmo said the test scores will provide defined areas to work on for the coming school year and said he anticipates even better

13 as Hutchinson principal. A bid of \$82,000 for the house built by the building trades class at Colorado High School was accepted by the board. L. M. Dawson, superintendent at Westbrook, was the lone bidder. Useton said there have been two appraisals on the house—one for \$60,000 and one for \$65,000.

City OKs ordinances

The Colorado City Council Tuesday night adopted two ordinances, one designed to increase tax revenue for the city and one designed to lower tax rates for property owners. Ordinance No. 87-05 calls for an election to be held Aug. 8 at which time voters will decide whether or not to increase the local sales tax by one-half of one percent and to decrease property taxes by the same amount. "Property owners have been hit tremendously the past few years," said Mayor Jim Baum. "This will give us a break." Council member Dee Hearn agreed, adding that "this will shift some of the tax burden from the property owner to the consumer."

City Manager Brenda Tarter said the cost to the city of holding the election will be about \$1,000. If approved, the sales tax increase and property tax decrease will take effect Jan. 1. Tarter said there will be about a 25 percent decrease in property tax revenue if the election is approved by voters.

The other ordinance, number 07-04, amends the "taxation" chapter of the city code relating to the taxation of telecommunications services. Tarter said that the city has a franchise ordinance with Southwestern Bell Telephone dating back to the 1940s whereby the company pays a one percent tax on street and alley usage. The city had been receiving about \$12,000 in tax from Southwestern Bell before its diversification. Since its diversification, other companies such as AT&T, have been exempt from the franchise tax on long distance calls and the city tax revenues

Galey appointed county sanitarian

Mitchell County Commissioners' Court appointed a new County Sanitarian and approved purchase of a new rotary shredder for Precinct 1, as the main action taken on an abbreviated agenda for its regular meeting held at 1 p.m. Monday. The Court approved the appointment to J. L. Galey, who was present for the meeting, as County Sanitary Officer to replace Jerry Hammond, who resigned effective June 1. Renumeration allowed for the job was set at \$8.00 per hour. Three bids were submitted for the rotary shredder. Costin Implement Co. of Colorado City, offering a Mohawk brand model; and Godsey Equipment Co.

of Abilene, offering a Terrain King, both had a matching low bid of \$5,595. Precinct 1 Commissioner Ed Roach recommended acceptance of Costin's bid because of the availability of local service and locally available parts, and the Court approved. The third bid was submitted by Key Brothers Implement of Snyder and Colorado City in the amount of \$5,632.01 for a Rino model. Representatives of Key Brothers and Godsey were present for the bid opening. County Judge Bill Carter read a letter from the Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce, requesting cancellation of a 10-year lease contract, due to expire in October 1989, on the

Rodeo Grounds. The Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, had agreed that the rodeo would not be sponsored by the Chamber in the future. The letter stated, "the directors feel that the benefits derived from the annual AJRA Rodeo, event do not offset the hard work, time consumed, and the liability that is presented to the Chamber." And adding, "we feel that this event does not improve the quality of life, or enhance the economic well-being of the Colorado City area." The letter was signed by Ben Lancaster, president; and other officers and directors Robert Alford, David Hoover, Woody Anderson, Phil Anderson, Maggie Compton, Ta-

ndy Curlee, Becky Manning and Bob Reilly. The Court tabled action on the request until arrangements might be made with the B&PW Club of Colorado City which is presently planning to sponsor the AJRA Rodeo in July, or possibly other groups that might be interested. Liability requirements were the main concern of the Court, which will again consider the lease cancellation at its June 16 meeting. C. C. Burt, Chief Appraiser, submitted a preliminary budget for 1988 that recommended expenditures of \$156,937.62, which is \$34,542.49 lower than the

Rains slow planting

Showers which dotted the area Tuesday are the last thing local farmers needed, Mitchell County Extension Agent Mike Mauldin said. Mauldin said that dry and warm weather is needed in order for cotton producers to get their fields planted. "There was some cotton planted before the heavy rains hit," said Mauldin. "Some of that cotton came up, but some of it is going to have to be replanted. Besides the wet weather, it's also been unseasonably cool which doesn't help the germination," he said. Planting resumed last Thursday, said Mauldin, and predicted a "lot of cotton will be going into the ground within the next few days" if the weather continues. See RAIN, Page 2

Located at 111 East 21st Street, the three bedroom brick house is the last to be built by the building trades program which has been discontinued for the coming school year.

Following public hearing on Federal Chapter II Funds for the 1987-88 school year, the board voted to continue to earmark the funds for teacher salary for the gifted and talented program at Hutchinson Elementary. Geneva Findley, business manager, said that \$11,944 in federal funds will be received and that there is a carry-over balance of \$788.

Four school board policies were amended and a new one adopted. The amended policies concern more detailed definitions in various accounts and changing dates for the 1987-88 school year on insurance and salary checks. The new policy concerns additional training required of new employees.

The board authorized Useton to advertise for bids for a depository for 1987-88. The board asked Useton to meet with representatives of both local banks, City National and First National, to ask that both financial institutions submit the same kinds of bids.

Board president Billy Bruce Bridgford said that trying to compare depository bids sometimes is like trying to compare "apples and oranges - you just can't do it."

Board member Dwayne Harris was named a delegate and Eddie Gregory an alternate to the Texas Association of School Boards Delegate Assembly in San Antonio Sept. 19.

The board also gave permission to advertise for bids for renovation of the high school library. Useton said there is \$12,000 budgeted for the project which includes closing in the library from the hallway.

Amendments to the 1986-87 official budget were approved with no changes in the amount of revenues or expenditures, said Mrs. Findley. Mrs. Findley said that interest earned in May totaled over \$30,000 and that the tax collection rate for 1986 stands at 92 percent with about \$112,000 still to be collected.

High school Principal Jerry Reynolds and Counselor Al Sheldon spoke to the board about scheduling problems for the coming school year at CHS.

"We hear a lot of complaints of kids who can't get the courses they want," said Bridgford.

"There is no way we can accommodate every student," said Reynolds. "We have a master schedule aimed at seniors so they can get the subjects they need to graduate."

Reynolds explained that there are 36 classes that are only offered one period a day and that contributes to the scheduling problem.

"I'm sure there are some students who don't get everything they want," said Reynolds, adding that students select alternate courses if they can't get their first choice.

Board member Ronnie Aston said the biggest problem is with seventh period when students who aren't in athletics don't have much of a course selection from which to choose.

Beside the weather, the farmers are going to have to contend with an insect problem this year.

"The number of over-wintered boll weevils that are being caught in traps are significantly higher than in the past years because we've had two mild winters in a row," said Mauldin.

"In fact, those numbers are excessively high. "At this point, I don't see much grasshopper activity," he said. "But it will be a flea hopper and boll worm year for certain. It's more important than ever for producers to scout their fields."

"Some fields may be another week away from planting," he said. "A lot of fields drained well enough to go ahead and get started on now."

"It should be emphasized that certain fields are going to be pretty late being planted," he said. "The poorly drained fields are in trouble right now."

scores next year.

"The scores this year show that a lot of progress has been made," said Nimmo.

Kelley Elementary Principal Bobby Lemons said TEAMS results have not been received but that CTBS results show marked improvement in the reading program.

"We are real proud of our reading program," said Lemons, explaining that the school went from block reading to homeroom reading this past school year. Reading scores in the second grade went up 12 points from the previous year while math went down one point. Both reading and math are well above the national average, he said.

Dell Riley, principal at Hutchinson Elementary, said this year the third grade students in TEAMS testing scored 84 percent in math, 76 percent in reading and 63 percent in writing. Fifth graders scored 74 percent in math, 78 percent in reading and 58 percent in writing.

Jim McLean, principal at Colorado Middle School, said that TEAMS results show that overall, his students scored 89 percent in math, 80 percent in reading and 56 percent in writing.

McLean said he and Supt. Charlie Useton are considering mandatory tutoring this next school year during the school day for any student who is failing.

CHS counselor Al Sheldon said that 91 percent of the ninth graders showed a mastery level in math, 77 percent in reading and 48 percent in writing. In the 11th grade, 92 percent showed mastery level in math and 91 percent in language arts.

have dropped to about \$6,000 a year.

By adopting the ordinance, which takes effect Oct. 1, the city hopes to regain the lost tax dollars, said Tarter.

In other business, Baum appointed a committee of himself and councilmen Tom Carlock and Robert Hoback to work with the Little League in building another Little League baseball field west of the present one in Ruddick Park.

Gary Chaney, representing the Little League, said there is a need now for another field and that there will be even more Little League teams next year which will require an extra field. Chaney said there is an unused softball field on the south side of town which could be moved to the Ruddick Park site and in operation by next summer. Chaney asked that the city do the necessary dirt work for a new field and to provide financial assistance from the hotel-motel occupancy tax for a regional tournament to be hosted here next year.

Chaney said that presently, there are 227 youngsters in the Little League program with 17 teams playing on one field.

"We've flat run out of room," said Chaney, adding that next year there will be even more youngsters in the program.

"We'll have to turn kids away if we can't build another field," he said.

The council took no action on a proposed maintenance mechanic contract on city vehicles until contracts from cities can be studied.

Phil Hall, a local mechanic and auto parts dealer, and David Myers, another auto parts dealer, were at the meeting to discuss the proposed contract and asked whether or not the city plans a parts contract.

The council approved a proposed budget from the Mitchell County Appraisal District for the coming year. Baum said the budget is some \$40,000 lower than the previous budget and that the city's cost will be \$9,999.84.

Lemons receives recognition

Mrs. Lemons, who has been a leader for 22 years, received the "Salute to Excellence" Award along with numerous other 4-H award honors.

Mrs. Lemons first volunteered as a 4-H leader when her oldest daughter, Dawn, now 29, was nine years old. Her sons, Robert, 19, and Blaine, 18, also have been active in 4-H.

Mrs. Lemons was accompanied to College Station by her husband, Bobby, to receive the award one of only three which were given to 4-H leaders in this district.

Mrs. Lemons has assisted in such 4-H projects as sewing, leadership, foods, arts and crafts, livestock, demonstrations and record books.

Graduation marks milestone for twin

EDITOR'S NOTE: The recent graduation exercises at Wolf Stadium for Colorado High School senior John Patrick Garza prompted the following article to appear in the Sweetwater Reporter.

Among the hundreds of high school seniors in West Texas who got their diplomas over the weekend were 202 from Nolan County and one from Colorado City who deserves special mention.

The aforementioned Colorado High School graduate, John Patrick Garza, is the cousin of a Sweetwater senior, Manuel Garza, but much more important is the fact that he is here at all.

John and his twin sister Janie Priscilla Garza created quite a sensation in Sweetwater on Feb.

16, 1968, when they were born at Simmons Memorial Hospital to Juan Gedes and Minnie Garza, then of Sweetwater.

The twins were three months premature, and small. They were so small that the late Dr. S. F. Supowit, who delivered them, had to look hard for signs of life. They were so small that no one weighed them. They were so small that they were not expected to live. But they did.

Twenty-six days later, when the babies were strong enough to be put on the scales, John Patrick weighed 1 pound, 14 ounces, and was 14 inches long. Janie Priscilla was even smaller, at 1 pound, 12 1/2 ounces, and 12 inches.

The twins might be the smallest on record who survived, said Mrs. Garza. "I have looked in a

lot of books and magazines," she said, "and I haven't heard of any twins that small."

On May 23, when the babies were just a little more than three months old, they were weighed again and John tipped the scales at 5 pounds, even and Priscilla at 5 pounds, 1 ounce—big enough to go home, to 804 W. Arkansas St.

Mrs. Garza, who was 25 at the time, says she had had all the necessary prenatal care, especially since she had miscarried four times previously and had a thyroid condition. That was the only explanation she has for the twins' prematurity.

"All the time they were in the hospital," she said, "it was excruciating to me that I could not touch them. The nurses, Annis Chapman and Lila

Bell and a Miss Soles, took care of them, and I couldn't touch them."

But all that's over with now. John Patrick, who stands 5-8 and weighs 145 pounds, has joined his 5-2, 117-pound sister in the ranks of college students.

Priscilla graduated a year ago and has just finished a year at Western Texas College in Snyder, where she is a criminal-justice major. John fell a year behind when, in his freshman year in high school, "he discovered girls," his mother said. He will study building trades, per-

haps at Odessa College, she said.

And as for Manuel Garza, the Sweetwater grad, well, he is also a twin. 

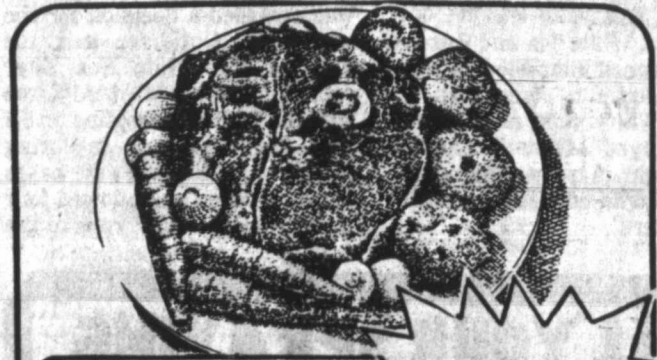
