C. R. Boucher, A Burk Cowboy, To Bulldog In Rodeo June 13-15



Home town cowboy, C. R. Boucher, heads the entry roster for Burkburnett's 17th annual Boontown rodeo which explodes into high-kicking action Wednesday night June 13.

Boucher, 29, and runner-up for the world championship title in steer wrestling last year will be among other top rodeo cowboys bidding for a share of the \$4,200 estimated prize money total at stake in five contest events.

With rodeo stock furnished by Elra and Jiggs Beutler of Elk City, Oklahoma, the rodeo winds up Friday night, June 15.

Although Boucher missed winning the 1961 steer wrestling crown by \$1,200 he did win the National Finals event average downing eight steers over 26 seconds faster than his nearest rival there. His win shaved his seasonal total to \$14,312.

Calf roping may turn out to be the most hotly contested event here with former five-time world champion Don McLaughlin, Glen Franklin, Bobby Seals and Clifton Smith all planning to be on hand.

McLaughlin is running second in the current national roping picture, with New Mexico's Franklin in third spot. Seals, from Justin, and Smith from Tell, have yet to hit the top fifteen winners so far this season.

Cowboys to watch in riding events include Duane Hennigh of LaVerne, Oklahoma, and Bill George of Canadian.

Hennigh, 32, enters bareback bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping and steer wrestling, and is one of the game's few contestants equally adept in all four events.

There were 114 contestant entries here last year. Prize money payoff was \$4,265.

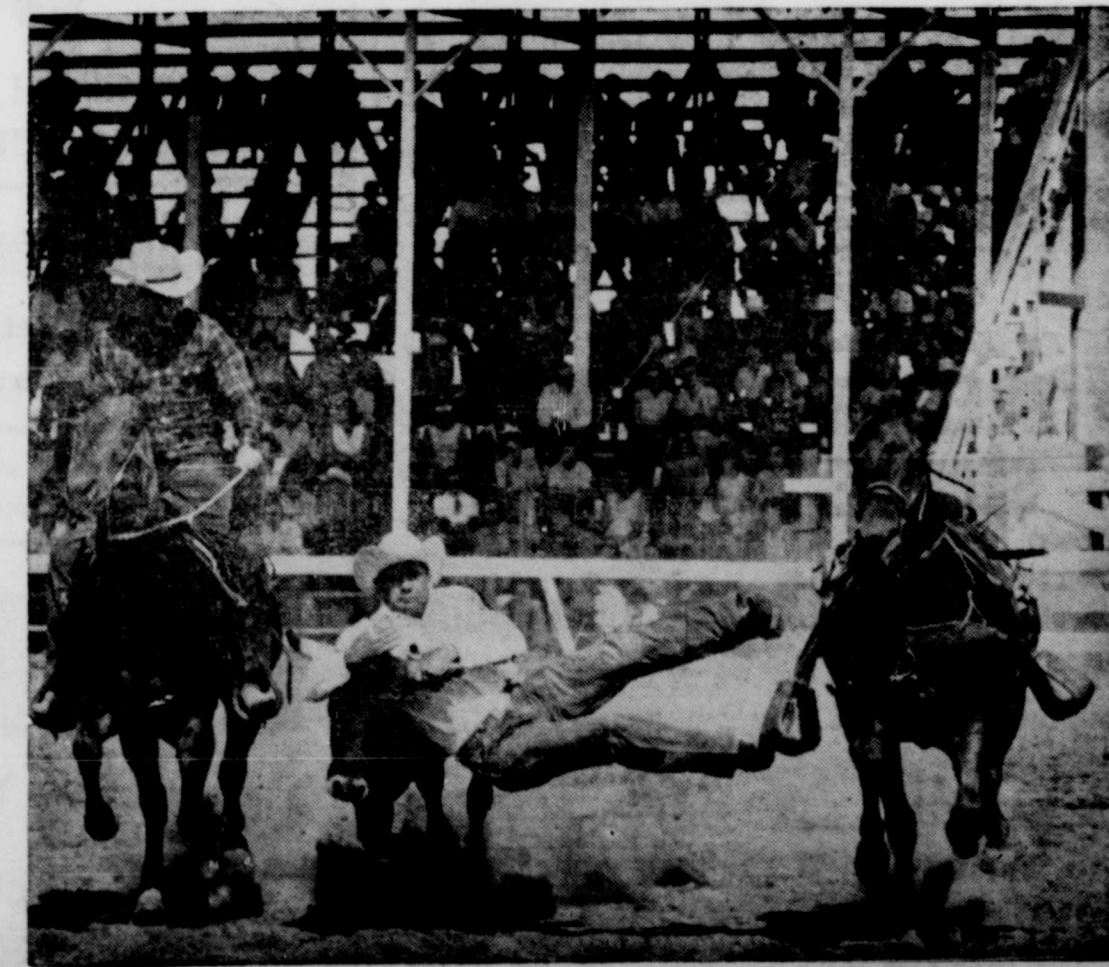

FRUITS OF HIGHWAY ROBBERY

One of Fidel Castro's first acts when he came to power in Cuba was to confiscate the refineries of United States oil companies and establish a government monopoly of the oil business. That happened in 1960. It's interesting to see what has happened.

Since the 1960 take-over, Cuba has been able to drill only 15 wells. None of these have found oil in commercial quantities.

The confiscated U. S. refineries, which handled the bulk of Cuba's capacity, are experiencing frequent shutdowns. These are due to a shortage of spare parts and replacement equipment, and a lack of competent engineers and technicians.

Large percentages of Cuba's tractors, trucks, buses and automobiles are out of service. One reason is a scarcity of lubricants and gasoline of irregular quality. Last fall the government ordered service stations not to change lubricants in vehicles, but only to add a sufficient amount to keep motors running.

It is one thing for a country to confiscate a business—which is a form of pure highway robbery, in that the owners have small chance indeed of payment for their property—but it is a very different thing to keep it going. And security is a hallmark of totalitarian regimes. Cuba, after all, had oil agency when American enterprise was providing it.

BEDFORD, IND., DAILY TIMES-MAIL: "The first symptom of inflation is a series of unbalanced national budgets. That has been the U. S. history ever since the end of the war, and the end is not in sight. President Kennedy forecast a surplus of \$500 million for 1961. Eight now it looks more like a deficit of several billion. This must be made up by government loans. That means more money must be pumped into circulation."

An Edison Electric Institute spokesman, in a report delivered to the Joint Committee on Atomic Energy, says that seven investor-owned nuclear electric power plants will begin operation this year. That will bring to twelve the number of such projects in which the investor-owned utilities are participating.

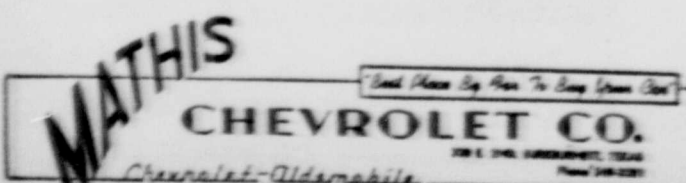

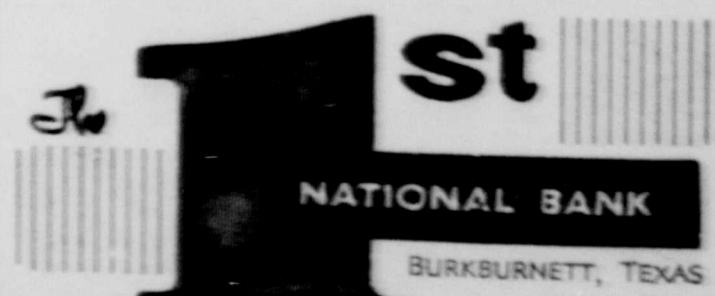

REPORT FROM CONGRESS

BY GRAHAM PURCELL,
Representative, 13th District

Dear Friends:

It seems to me that there is more misunderstanding and more misinformation about the pending farm legislation than about any piece of legislation now pending before Congress.

The bill was passed by the Senate last week. It has been reported to the House by the House Agriculture Committee, of which I am a member, and is now pending before Congress.

There are a large number of farms in our 13th District (14,267 according to a 1959 count), and agricultural economy is very important to Northern Texas. Therefore, I feel that we should set the record straight about the aims, purposes and provisions of the proposed farm bill, particularly those parts which seem to be most misunderstood.

First, it is not the purpose of the farm bill to put the small farmer out of business. Rather, the purpose is to protect the family farm which is so vital to our American way of rural life.

Secondly, it is not the purpose of the farm bill to get the Federal Government into the livestock business.

With those two basic thoughts in mind, let us examine very briefly those provisions which opponents of the measure have twisted to try and make it appear to some that the bill would

drive out the small farmer and control the livestock producers and feeders.

The big problem in the overall agricultural field is surpluses. For too many years, our farm programs have led to gigantic stockpiles of surplus commodities which must be stored at government expense. This currently costs you, the taxpayer, about one billion dollars a year. This money goes not to a farmer, but to those people who have built huge storage facilities for surplus grain which the government rents to store the surplus crops it has purchased over the years.

It is my feeling, and I believe most members of Congress agree with me, that any new farm legislation must be aimed at reducing the excessive stockpiles of commodities that are not needed.

Effect On the Cattle Industry

Concerning the fear of livestock producers and feeders in connection with the possible effect on their business as a result of this bill, I feel that the fears are unjustified and unfounded. It is not the intention or desire of me or any other member of the Agriculture Committee, to my knowledge, to pass any bill which would result in control of the livestock industry. The bill contemplates that feed grain prices would remain about as they are now. This means that costs of feeding cattle would not be changed. If I felt that any bill would lead to an adverse effect on the livestock industry, or control of it, I would vote against it. If the production and prices of feed grains were not supported or

controlled to some degree, the prices would fall to a disastrously low level. In addition to running thousands of farmers out of business, this would result in very low feed grain prices and very low prices for cattle. Cheap feed means cheap meat. The result would be chaotic to the industry.

The Purposes of the Bill

If adopted by the voting producers, the program calls for production to be reduced on wheat and feed grains to a level that would allow gradual reduction of the surpluses now on hand. In a period of a very few years, the stocks would be reduced to the point that acreage allotments could be increased without adding to the surplus stocks. The program is designed to bring production and demand closer together over a period of a few years in order to bring the agricultural markets to a level where they can exist without controls.

In exchange for cutting back production to desired levels, the farmers would receive support payments for the wheat and feed grains grown under the program.

The General Effects of the Program

There are two important aspects of this program that should be of interest to all of us. One is that the farmer will realize enough income from the higher support prices to enable him to maintain his standard of living. At the same time the surpluses will be reduced, which will mean a lower cost to the taxpayer for the overall program and assurance that this cost will go even lower as storage costs are reduced. Under this program, it is the farmer who benefits from the government expenditures rather

than the businessman who stores the grain.

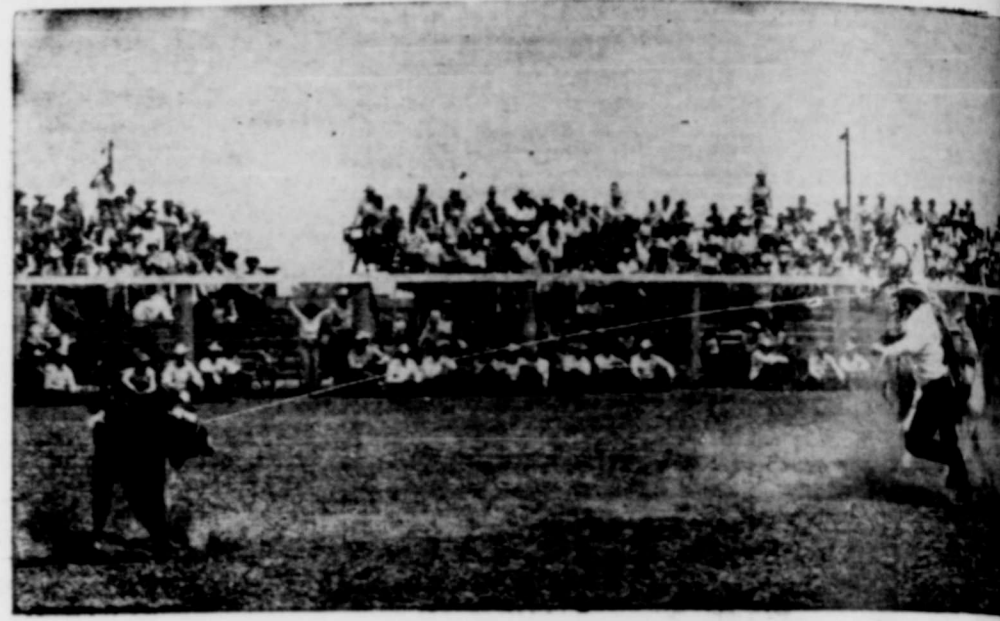
This seems to me to be a reasonable approach to the problem. It is, I believe, the quickest way to the ultimate goal of eliminating controls on the farm industry, a goal which all of us desire.

This, very briefly, is why I have supported the proposed farm program up to the present time, and why I plan to continue my support of the bill.

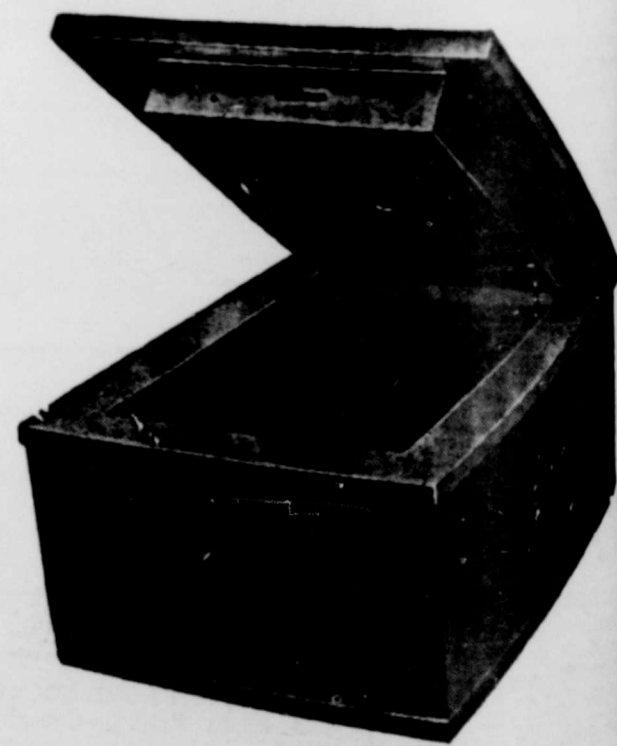

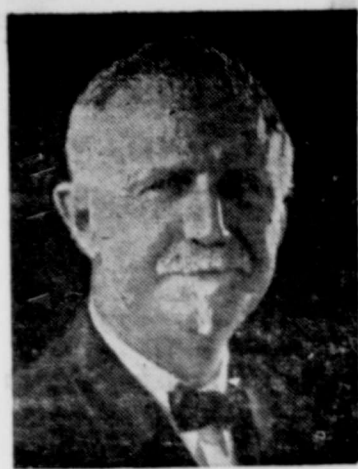

Roger W. Babson Weekly Report

BABSON DISCUSSES THE
STOCK MARKET

During the past week, almost everyone has been asking what has happened to the stock market. The newspapers have said "nothing like it since 1929."

Yet the Dow-Jones Industrial Average is off only about 20% from its all-time high which occurred at the start of 1962. The industrials have suffered the most; the utilities have suffered less; while the railroads have suffered the least. On the other hand, almost everything has suffered somewhat.

Real Estate, Automobiles, and Commodities

The newspapers, television, and radios have made so much of the big break that people are getting it into their heads that everything should go down in price. Therefore, whether they are looking for houses, automobiles, or even orange groves, they expect bargains, and they pay no attention to the price of a month ago. This especially applies to used cars of which there is a surplus and the dealers are trying hard to convert them into cash.

The banks are getting frightened and have begun to ask their customers to reduce loans. They really have no reason for being frightened; but bankers are easily scared because it is not their money which they are loaning, but rather the money of their customers. They do not know when their customers will

want to use their money to buy bargains themselves, and hence the bankers must be prepared to take care of them. Most bankers were much disturbed by President Kennedy's actions when he lost his temper over the price of steel. They feel that President Kennedy is against business and profits and, perhaps, is too favorable to the labor leaders. Even the brokers are beginning to feel this way, owing to the SEC investigations. Some brokers are even unjustly saying that the past week will go down in history as the "Kennedy Break."

Mutual Funds

There has been a great sale of mutual funds during the past two years. It is reported that over 75,000 salesmen are selling mutual funds today. Most of the stock exchange firms are indulging in the sale of mutual funds. They are allowed a commission of one-eighth of one percent on listed stocks, and cannot afford to have their salesmen go out and solicit small investors for this fee; but they get about 5% on the sale of mutual funds which commission they can divide with the salesmen.

When a salesman sells a thou-

sand dollars worth of mutual funds, the operators of the Fund must enter the stock market and buy a certain amount of listed stock. This has bolstered the stock market during the past two years. It will be more difficult to sell mutual funds and redemptions will increase until the news of the recent stock market break is forgotten. When a mutual fund holder turns in his shares to be redeemed, the Fund operators must sell some of their listed stocks. I believe these mutual funds are perfectly safe; but they must go down in price when a break such as we have had occurs. Therefore,

the selling by mutual fund operators has been one cause of the decline in the stock market. The dividends on mutual funds may not be reduced, excepting the so-called bonus dividends which result from capital gains which the Funds may not get for a while.

What Will the Stock Market Do Next?

It is evident that there have been many bargain hunters who have bought stocks the past week. This has caused some rallies. I, however, do not believe that all is well. There are many more sore spots to be cleaned up by foolish investors, although

general business is continuing good.

As I have mentioned many times before in this column, there is too wide a gulf between the high prices that stocks have been selling at and their dividends. These low yields are unnatural and must be corrected by a gradual and orderly decline. Readers, however, should give much more attention to what stocks are yielding. Recent low yields cannot continue indefinitely; without a great improvement in business and dividends, the situation can be corrected only by

reducing the price of the stock against selling. The question whether the stock market, I say this, is standing that the market is rallied and is acting normally.

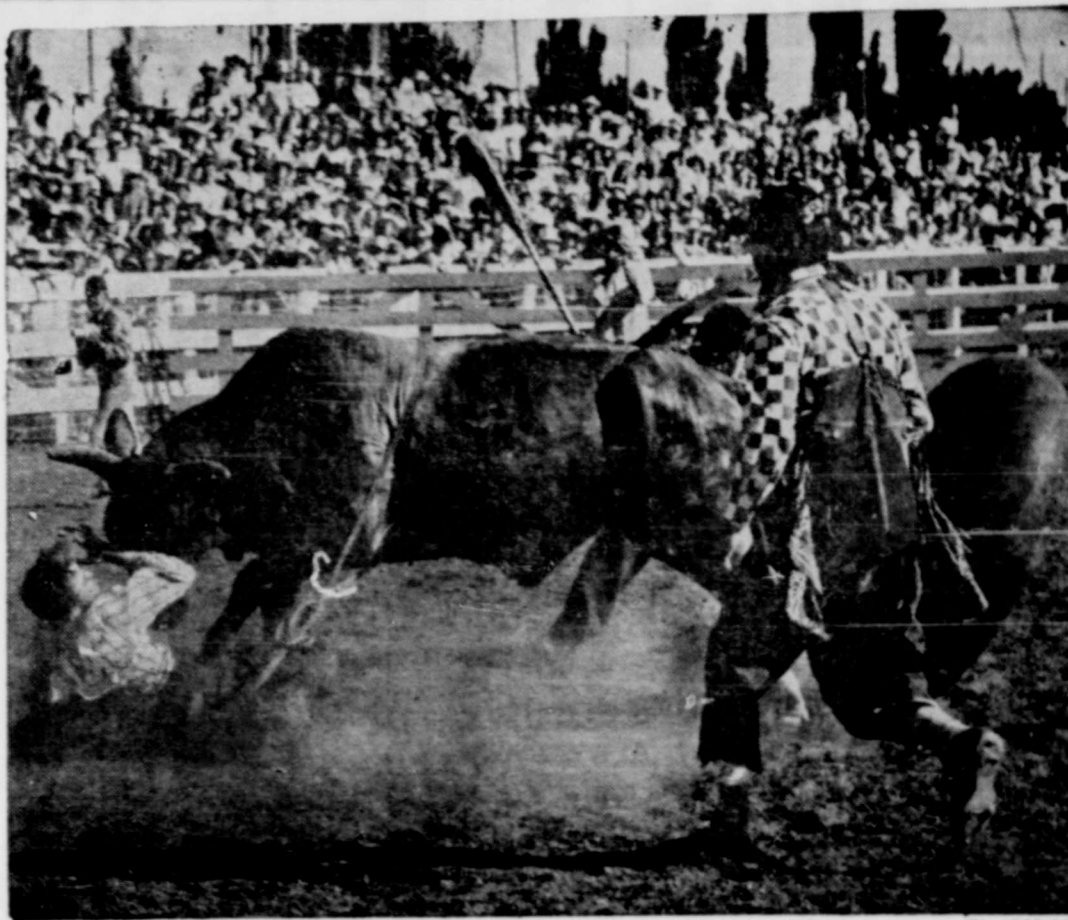
