A crowd of stockholders of the Oklahoma Panhandle Fair were at the annual meeting for the election of officers at the City Hall Tuesday evening. The old spirit prevailed at the meeting and everyone present expressed themselves as well pleased with the success of the fair last fall. Ways were discussed for a bigger and better fair next year. The stockholders were unanimous in voting to erect a permanent building to house the Women's Department beginning at once. The board of directors was instructed to ask for bids for the painting of the fair buildings to be done at once. The following officers and directors were elected: President, Geo. M. Perry; Vice-President, D. Shanks; Secretary, Leon Roemer; Treasurer, Board of Directors, J. M. Shanks, Chairman, Chas. W. Stewart and Van W. Stewart.

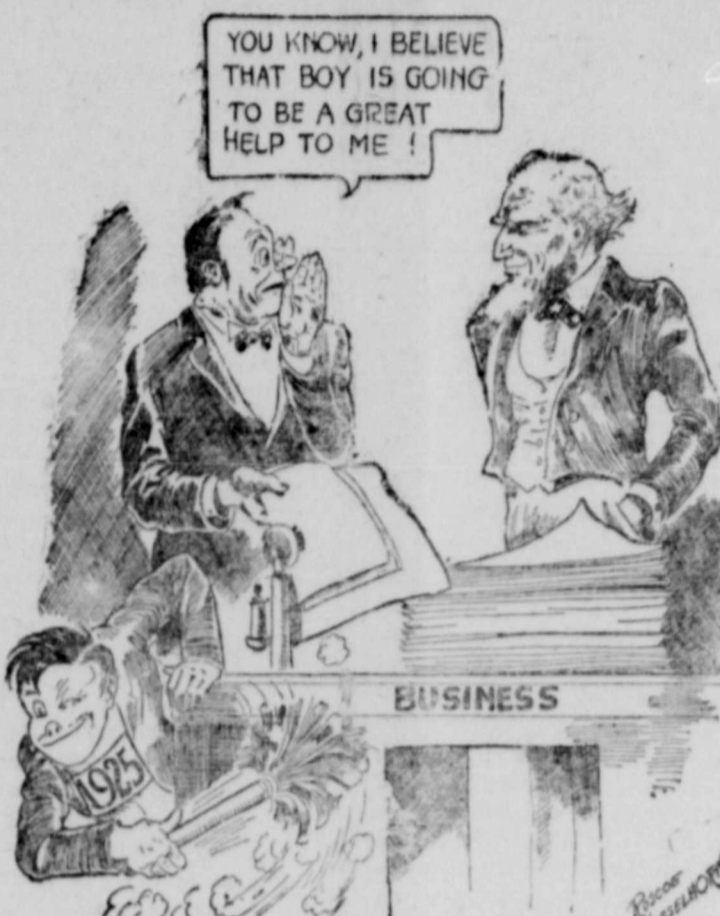

FORMER OCHILTREE CITIZEN PASSES AWAY

Mrs. L. L. Lance returned last Tuesday from Rotan, Texas where she has been for the past ten days at the bedside of her father, L. C. Lyons, who died on Friday, January 2nd. Mr. Lyons was a former resident of Ochiltree, coming to this county in 1905 and living here until 1920 when he moved to Rotan. Lance of this city. At the time of death, Mr. Lyons was seventy-five years of age.

DISTRICT JUDGES OPPOSE GRAND JURY SYSTEM

AUSTIN, Dec. 30.—Drastic changes in civil and criminal procedure in the courts of Texas are recommended by the Texas district judges association, which adjourned here this afternoon after a two day session.

The new association went on record as favoring elimination of grand jury indictments, substituting therefor the presentation of felonies by complaint or information. This was considered the most summary change suggested.

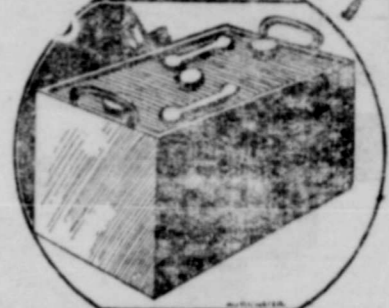

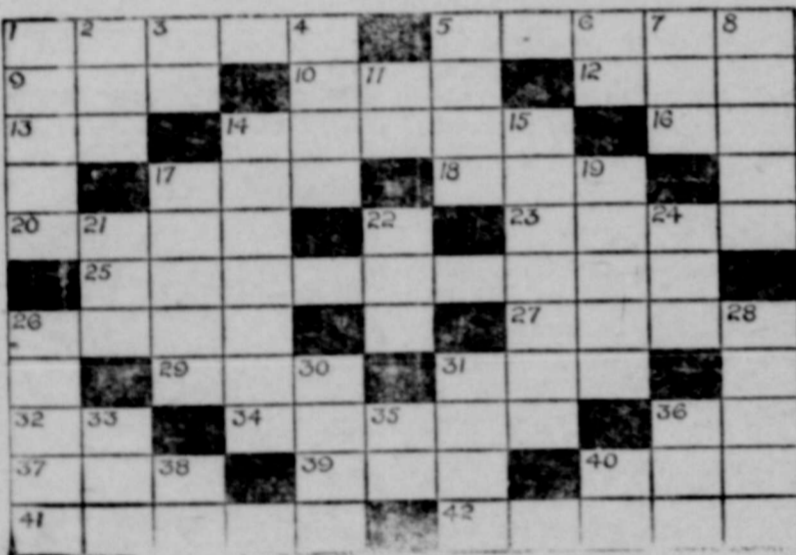

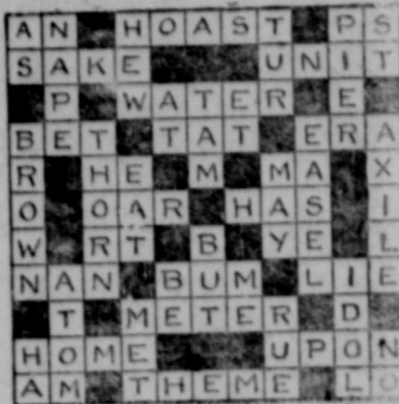

Within a short time, says C. D. Burney, aviation expert, and member of the British Parliament, the farthest point of the British Empire will be within twenty-four hours of London by flying machine.

Uncle Sam, please take notice. This also is an empire. Is it as far from the south end of Florida to the north end of Alaska, and from Bar Harbor, Maine, to San Diego?
The country is gradually waking up to our flying machine situation, and it NEEDED to wake up.

Secretary Wilbur gives this information. Five hundred airplanes of the navy are useless. And even the remaining 224 that can fly, more or less, are all out of date.

Do you keep chickens? Keep them away from other chickens if you can. Europe has sent here a poultry plague for which there is no known cure. Congress voted \$100,000 to fight it. Rigid quarantine will help the situation.

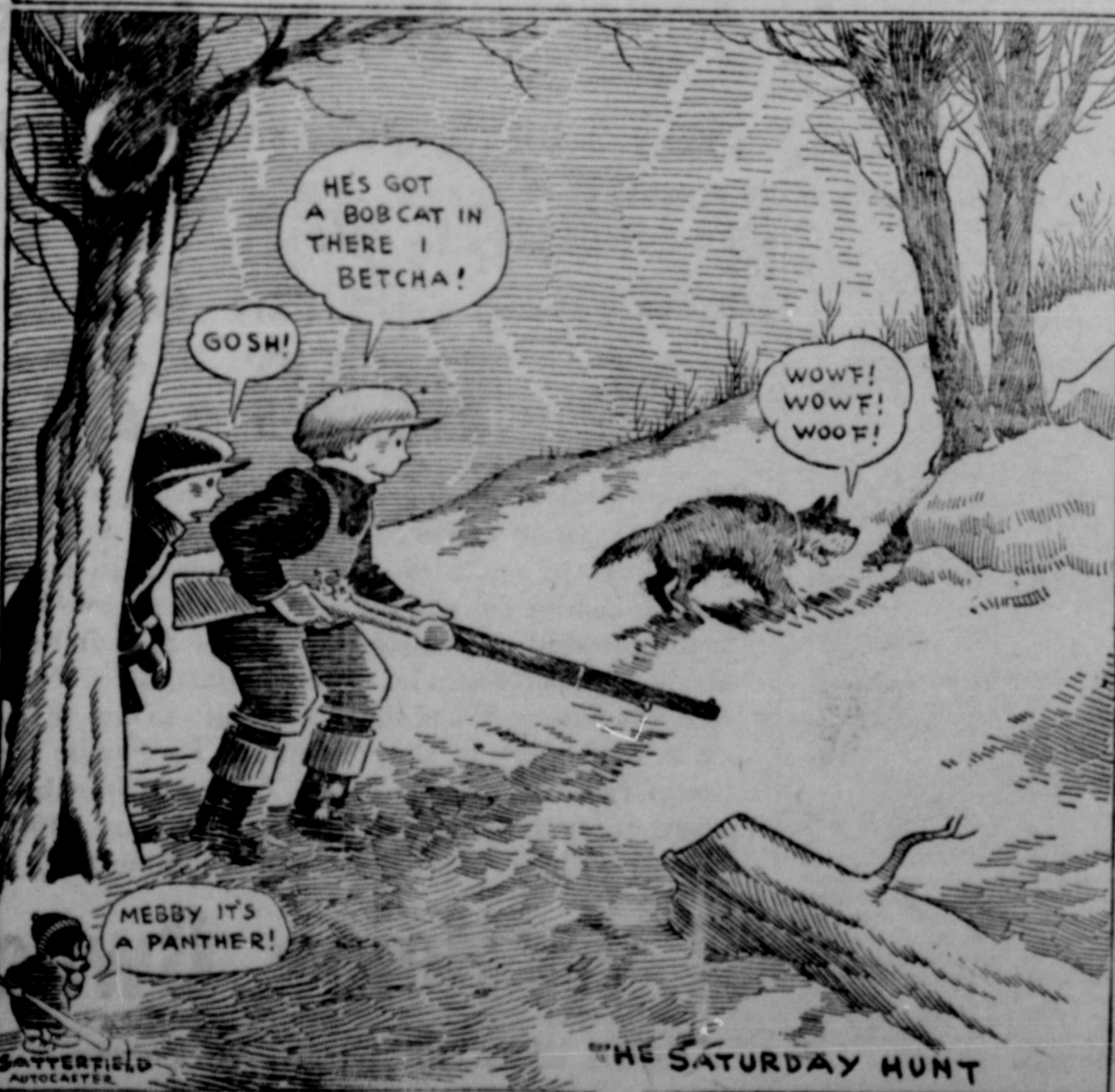

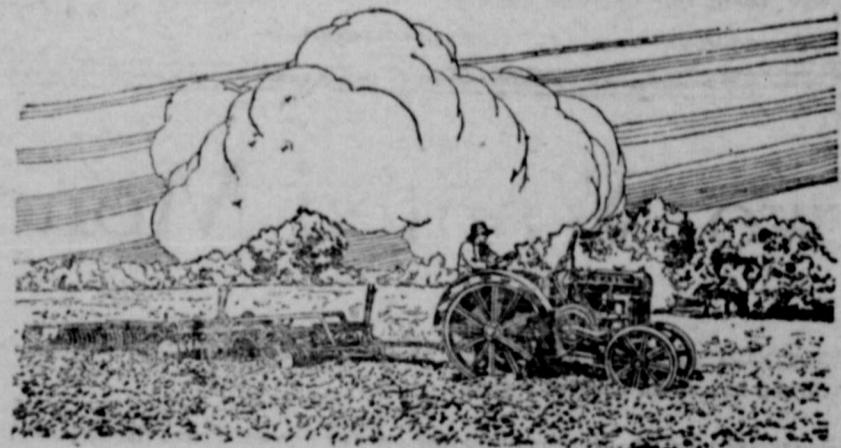

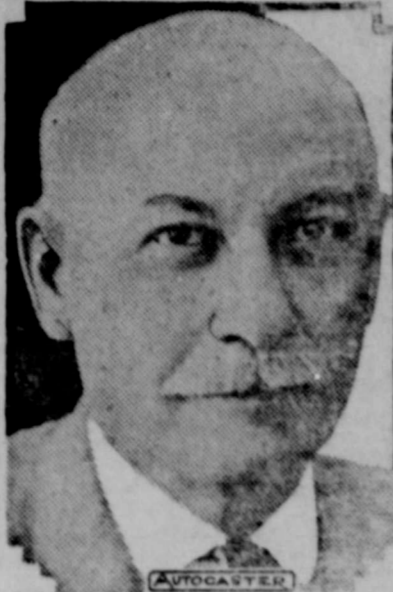

FOOD FOR THE FAMILY

A most tasty and delicate dish may be prepared from calf's brains. Wash the brains and cook in simmering water to which a tablespoonful of vinegar has been added with salt and a slice each of onion and carrot to add flavor. Drain and chill. When cold cut into cubes and pour over the brains a half cupful of sweet cider or any unsweetened fruit juice; let stand one hour. Peel one-fourth of a pound of mushroom caps, slice and saute in butter. Melt three tablespoonfuls of butter, add three tablespoonfuls of flour and when well-blended one cupful of thin cream and one-half cupful of whipped cream. Bring the cream, except the whipped cream, to the boiling point, add the brains and mushrooms, season well with cayenne and salt and add the whipped cream just before serving. This is a delicious dish to serve in cream puffs or timbale cases.

Escalloped Apples.—Cut a small loaf of bread into halves, remove the soft part and rub through the hands to crumb well, melt one-fourth of a cupful of butter and stir lightly with a fork. Cover the bottom of a buttered baking dish with buttered crumbs and cover with two cupfuls of thinly-sliced apples; sprinkle with sugar, nutmeg, one tablespoonful of lemon juice and the grated rind of half a lemon; repeat, cover with the remaining crumbs and bake forty minutes or until the apples are well done. Serve with sugar and cream.

Baked Haddock With Oyster Stuffing.—Remove skin, head and tail from a four-pound haddock. Bone and keep the fillets in shape. Sprinkle with salt and brush with lemon juice. Lay a fillet in a dripping pan, cover with oysters dipped into seasoned cracker crumbs, cover the oysters with another fillet, brush with egg, cover with buttered crumbs, and bake fifty minutes or until the fish is well cooked. Serve with hollandaise sauce. Any other meaty fish may be used in place of haddock.

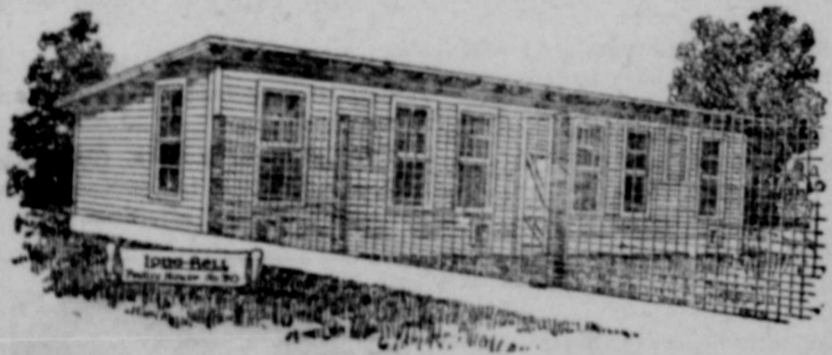
