Rivercrest Rebels Trample Mt. Vernon

The Rivercrest Rebels finished their preseason play Friday night by trampling the Mt. Vernon Tigers with a score of 23-14. Next week the Rebels will travel to Ore City to open their district play with the game starting at 7:30 p.m.

The first half of the Rivercrest-Mt. Vernon game was controlled by fumbles which were mainly due to the rainy weather. These fumbles gave both teams good field position and enabled them to score during the first half.

The Rebels scored first with four minutes left in the first quarter after gaining possession on their own ten yard line from a Tiger fumble. Previously the Rebels had punted the ball to the Tiger 24, but the Tigers could not hold onto the punt and Stan Wood came up with the football for the Rebels. On the next play Bubba Edge went eighteen yards to the Tiger eight yard line but the ball was fumbled again and Mt. Vernon recovered. On the next play however, the Tigers lost the ball and Jimmy Smith recovered for the Rebs who then set up their offense on the ten yard line. On the second consecutive carry Billy Froelich went in for the score and his brother, Paul, kicked the point, putting the Rebels on top seven to nothing.

The second quarter belonged mainly to the Tigers as they controlled the ball most of the time. A Rebel fumble at their own ten yard line gave the Tigers excellent field position, but the Rebels defense went to work and held Mt. Vernon, making them finally attempt a field goal to no avail. On receiving the ball at the twenty the Rebs again fumbled and Mt. Vernon recovered. The Rebel defense once more held the Tigers and forced them to try another field goal with no better luck. The Rebels managed to go through one possession without possession they lost the ball at their own 26. The Tiger

quarterback, Scotty Benton, was determined to pass, and after a personal foul by the Rebels giving the Tigers half the distance from the goal line, Benton found a receiver open in the end zone to put the Tigers on the board. The point after was good and the half ended with a 7-7 tie.

To begin the second half the Tigers accepted the kickoff and scored on their first drive with 7:59 left in the 3rd quarter. Their extra point was good and the Tigers led 14-7. The Rebels in turn accepted Mt. Vernon's kickoff and drove 61 yards for a score. Billy Froelich went around the left side on six carries to get 25 yards and an 11 yard pass from James Strickland to Brian Harville put the Rebels on the Mt. Vernon 25. Paul Forelich went 17 yards on the next carry before brother Billy went from the one to score. Trying for a two point conversion, Paul

Froelich went around the right side and across the goal line to put the Rebs on top 15-14.

Billy Froelich intercepted a Tiger pass at the Mt. Vernon 22 late in the third quarter to set the Rebels up for their next score. Each of the backs, the two Froelichs and Billy Stewart took turns carrying the ball and the Rebels found themselves with a first down on the one yard line. On the first call Paul Forelich got the ball, but was pushed back for a loss of a yard. Strickland kept the ball on the next play to gain the yard back, and then took the ball in on a quarterback sneak to score. Billy Froelich went around the left side to score the extra points and the Rebs led 23-14 with nine and a half minutes left to play.

The Tigers, finding themselves running out of time, tried desperately to pass their way down the field, but the Rebel secondary was too

much for them. Bradley Moore did an outstanding job as he was responsible for keeping the Tigers from completing three passes while intercepting two more

of the attempts. One of the interceptions was a long pass and Mt. Vernon would have had the ball at the Rebel 17, but Moore grabbed it and the Rebels let the clock run out, taking a 23-14 victory over the Tigers.

Talco Without Water Since Thursday

"You never miss the water till the well runs dry". Talco water well didn't run dry however when residents turned on their faucets on Thursday morning only a small trickle came forth.

Mayor Joe Morse said that the pump on the City's only well had locked up. The firm of Layne Western was called and a crew and a water well servicing unit arrived here on Friday to begin work on the well. The casing was pulled and the pump sent to Dallas for repairs.

Mayor Morse and Talco City employees have been working long hours so residents could have needed

water. Tanks were leased from a firm in Sulphur Springs and the Dorchester Pipeline Co. donated two trucks and two drivers for round the clock hauling of water from Bogata to fill Talco's storage tanks.

All four Beauty shops and the Hometown Laundry were closed and residents were asked to limit their unnecessary water use.

With the City depending on the one water well that had not been serviced in 29 years, City officials were worried that something like this would happen and were planning to drill a new water well. Mayor Morse said he

had an appointment at 5:00, Friday with the Layne Western Co. to discuss drilling a new well, when we can.

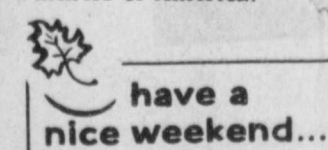

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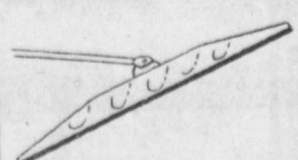

Turkey Tips

Pears are ripening golden across our area, making pear pies and cobblers popular desserts. As Rena Nobles has one of the prettiest and most productive old pear trees around, I asked her if she had a pear pie recipe. "I have two," she said, "One is creamy pear pie that I have used for a long time. The other is a

grated pear pie that Aubrey Hignight gave to me last year. Both are real good." Rena shares the pie recipes with East Texas Eating readers.

CREAMY PEAR PIE

2 cups of pears
3/4 cup sugar
1/2 cup evaporated milk (undiluted)
1/4 tsp. cinnamon
1/8 tsp. nutmeg

1 Tbsp. cornstarch
2 Tbsp. lemon juice
Mix and pour over pears in 9 inch pie crust. A banana may be added in place of the spices.
Bake at 400 or 375 degrees for 35 minutes.

GRATED PEAR PIE

2 1/2 cups grated pears
1 egg
1 cup sugar
1 Tbls. flour
3/4 stick margerine
Cinnamon as desired.
Pour egg over pears in pie crust. Mix sugar, flour and cinnamon and sprinkle over pears. Melt margerine and pour over mixture. Bake at 375 dgrees for 30 to 35 minutes.

Sign Language

Course Scheduled

Judith L. Lutz, social worker for the deaf with the Department of Human Resources, Paris office will teach a beginning course in sign language at Paris Junior College this fall, said June Jones, director of continuing education at PJC. Classes will be held from 7 to 9 p.m. on Mondays starting Oct. 6 in Room 109 of the Alford Center for Lifelong Learning at PJC. If enrollment justifies forming another class, it will be taught on Tuesday evenings.

The fee for 10 weekly lessons will be \$15 with a sign language book costing \$5 as optional. Reservations should be made by paying the fee in the PJC continuing education office, Alford Center, (214) 785-7661 ext. 145, or by mailing a check payable to PJC to the office.

In the PJC course, she will teach ameslan--the basic signs used today by most deaf adults; fingerspelling--basic sign language alphabet; signed English--basic signs taught by school for the deaf in Texas; and oral communication--hints on improving communication with the hard of hearing.

The instructor, who has been a social worker for the deaf with the Department of Human Resources since 1977, was transferred to Paris in 1979. She has completed sign language courses at Tyler Junior College and has attended two ameslan workshops conducted by Ralph White, chairman of the Texas Commission for the Deaf, and Dr. Rolfe Wylie,

chairman of the fine arts department at Texarkana College and second vice-president of the Texas Society of Interpreters for the Deaf.

Studying was done by a kerosene lamp, and an early bedtime.

Whether they were really good old days or not depends on whether they were looked at from now or then, but one thing for sure, times have changed a lot.



Make Your Own Peanut Butter

If you're a peanut fan, you may be surprised how easy it is to make your own peanut butter.

You will need fresh roasted peanuts, bland oil and salt, according to specialists with the North Carolina Agricultural Extension Service.

Start with one and one-half pounds of unshelled nuts or one pound of shelled kernels.

Use a meat grinder or blender to crush peanuts, adding 1/3 to 1/2 tablespoon of oil to one cup of peanuts. If nuts are unsalted, use 1/2 to 1/2 teaspoon salt per cup. Mix or blend well.

Stir before using, because the oil tends to separate. Store the homemade peanut butter in the refrigerator.

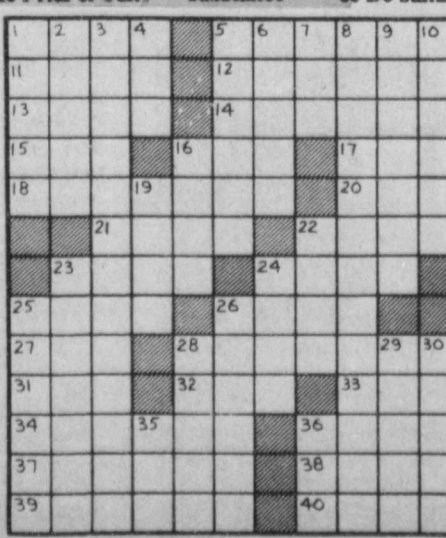
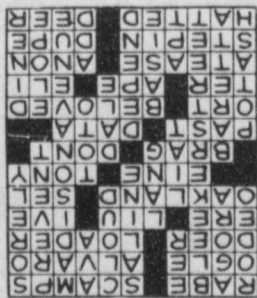

Lawn Care Should Be Done

Fertilizing Lawns now will boost fall growth and get them in shape for next spring.

A fall application of fertilizer not only prolongs green color in lawns but also stimulates root growth, reduces winter injury and promotes early spring recovery. Fall fertilization also increases turf density and reduces weeds.

Warm fall days and cool nights provide conditions favorable for grass to accumulate carbohydrates that promote root growth and help the grass survive winter months. Leaf growth is also less during the shorter fall days.

Apply a fertilizer high in nitrogen and potassium and low in phosphorus. Both nitrogen and potassium are important to leaf growth and color and root growth. Potassium is also important to winter survival, disease resistance and drought tolerance. While phosphorus is essential, it is required in much lesser amounts than the other nutrients.

Use a fertilizer with a 15-5-

10, 12-4-8 or similar analysis for the fall application.

Base the rate of applications on the nitrogen content, the first number in the fertilizer analysis. Apply 1 to 2 pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of lawn. So, with a 12-4-8 fertilizer, use 10 pounds to 15 pounds per 1,000 square feet, depending on when the last fertilizer application was made. If the lawn has not been fertilized for the past six weeks or longer, use the higher rate.

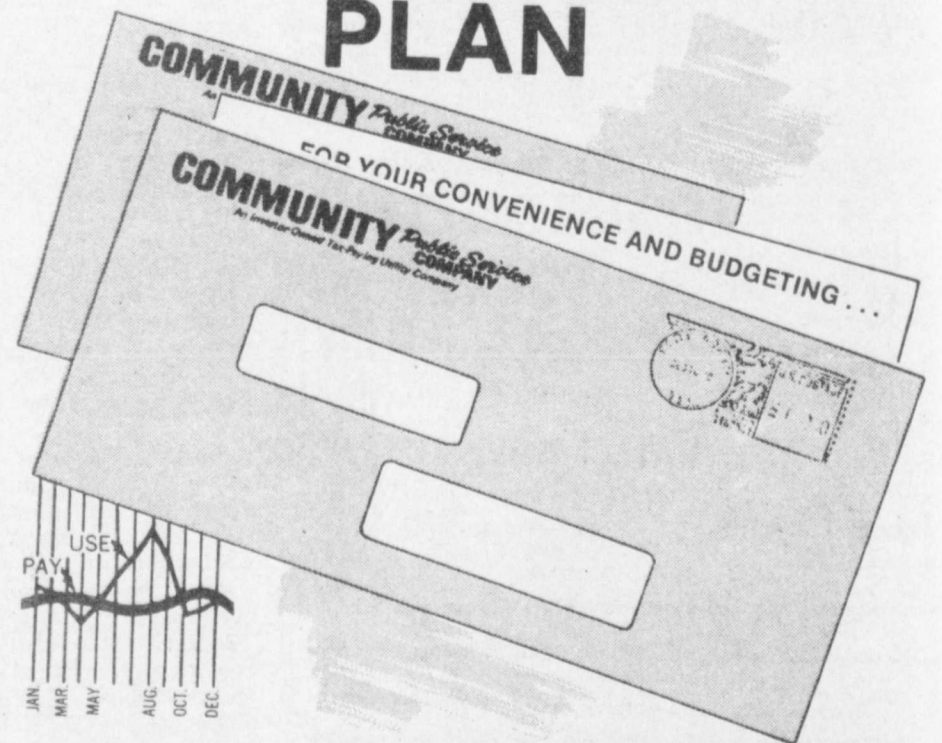

A candidate for the Republican nomination for President of the United States this year, Connally has been a senior partner in the law firm of Vinson and Elkins in Houston since 1973. He served three terms as Governor of Texas from 1963 to 1969 and was secretary of the U.S. Treasury in 1971-72.

A native of Floresville, Texas, he received his L.L.B. degree from the University of Texas at Austin. He served as secretary to U.S. Rep. Lyndon B. Johnson from 1939 to 1941, and Secretary of the U.S. Navy in 1961.

Barnes, who will introduce Connally, served as lieutenant governor from 1969 to 1973 and as a member

of the Texas House of Representatives from 1969 to 1978. He was Speaker of the Texas House, chairman of the Texas Legislative Budget Board and chairman of the Rules Committee during his service. A graduate of UT in Austin, Barnes attended the UT Law School. He now is a resident of Brownwood and a partner with H.A. Bennett in real estate development, construction and investments.

As director of the Texas Legislative Council from 1963 to 1980, Johnson directed the staff of 17 attorneys in the drafting of legislation, supervised staff attorneys in recodification of laws, initiated the Legislative Information System of Texas and supervised its implementation. 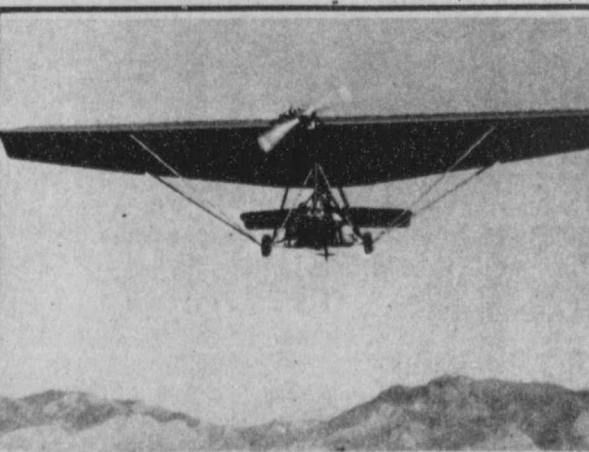

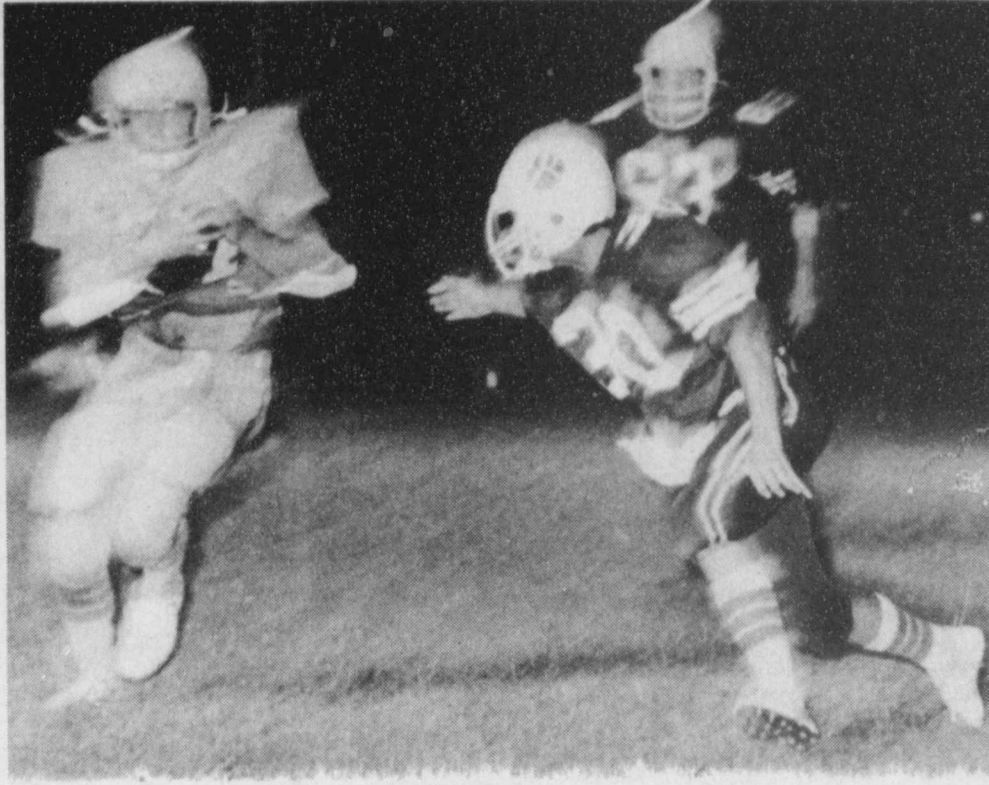

1/4 teaspoon salt

Brown bacon slowly on both sides in frying pan. Remove bacon. Brown pineapple slices in the bacon drippings. Simmer raisins and pineapple juice and water for 10 minutes.
