Exxon sues locals

Exxon Corporation recently filed a suit in Abilene Federal Court against Dan L. Barber, J. Dell Barber, Patrick D. Barber and City National Bank, among others, in the amount of \$2.1 million in damages.

The corporation claims that the defendants have sold oil and gas that rightfully belonged to Exxon.

Dan Barber said that

he and Dell Barber own the land: "Dell and I have owned the surface since 1972. Uninterrupted possession, with people coming to us trying to lease these minerals from us. That's no excuse, but that's one of the reasons we thought we owned it."

"This is a complicated situation," Barber said. "In 1944, Exxon took a lease on this and

two other pieces of property from the Womacks, an old ranching family here. Approximately two years later, they farmed out, that is sub-leased, two pieces of property to somebody else. Production was gotten on one of these other pieces of property in the late 1940's."

Barber continued, "The status of Texas law is this: if that pro-

duction was continuous and paying for this 37 years, then that well on this other property, half a mile away, holds our lease for Exxon."

Barber is optimistic about the case, though. He said, "It is our contention that Exxon abandoned our piece of property in 1944. All they ever did was get this lease. These other farm-out agreements

never showed up in our chain of title. They just walked away from it."

Barber also stated, "In 1981 I heard a rumor in the oil field about this lease and I checked it out. Sure enough, we had missed it when we did our title examination. So I went to Exxon and told them the situation and asked them for a fair farm-out agreement. This happens

more often in the oil field than you might imagine. They led me to believe that they would accept a fair farm-out agreement. About May, they started talking about standing on their presumed rights."

"After we told them about it, after we put it all together, now they want it all," Barber added.

More rattlesnakes spotted this year

Rattlesnakes are on the move this time of year, due to the slightly cooler weather, and this year they are particularly bad, according to local snake experts. Even cotton farmers

have noticed the difference. Perry Mitchell, whose farm is about two miles east of Lake Champion, said that he had killed "more rattlesnakes in the last three weeks

than in the last 10 years put together."

Mitchell attributes the unusually large number of snakes in his fields to the fact that the creeks have been so high for so long.

Most of the ones he has seen have been small ones, 12 to 15 inches long. "It's the little ones that are scary," he says, "because you can't hear them like you can the big ones with rattles."

Ira Hardin, who has been catching and selling snakes for 46 years, says that their quietness is not the only dangerous thing about baby rattlesnakes; the poison in the younger ones is much stronger.

Rick Perkin explained the large number of rat-

Statement clarified by local game warden

Ronnie Aston, game warden for Mitchell County, wants to clarify a statement that was made at the last County Commissioners' meeting and reported in the RECORD.

"The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department did not request

that Mitchell County pass regulations to buy off Morgan Creek and Cherry Creek as no wake, no skiing areas," Aston explained.

According to Aston, the request was made by residents in these areas because of the large number of jet

boats that used to be on the lake.

The only part that he or the Parks and Wildlife Department played, he said, was to advise the Commissioners that he could enforce the regulation if it were passed and registered with the State.

Aston noted that he had asked the Commissioners to either provide him with help or rescind the regulation because there were only two people to work all of Mitchell County and the other man had to come from another county.

He added that he had given 250 citations this year alone for water safety and fishing violations.

Aston wanted to assure the public that they would not suffer if this regulation were to be rescinded: first, very few jet boats come to Colorado City Lake anymore because of the large number of regular boats; second, the state's Water Safety Act provides protection from dangerous boaters or skiers.

He noted that "Oklahoma, New Mexico and Louisiana say you can't hold this that long, that is abandoning it. The Texas law, as it stands right now, will let them win. I suggest to you that times have changed in the last 37 years. I suggest to you that if ever I have a chance to change Texas law in this one area, this is the case to do it on."

Barber continued, "All of these people (those named in the suit) are either Barbers or bank presidents or other lawyers. These are my family and friends. We're not a bunch of folks out sticking up Exxon service stations."

Further, Barber stated, "I cheerfully and freely and with much chagrin admit that we overlooked this old lease. But even so, they (Exxon) don't own the

land; not morally, legally or in fact."

"And," he added, "They'll get it back after the fight...if they win."

Barber also explained the role of the City National Bank in the suit: "The banks are in the lawsuit simply because my investors borrowed money to go out there and develop the property. The banks are not liable in any form or fashion. Should we lose the lawsuit, the banks will have to remove the clouds on title and look to us for the money, not to the land."

The position of Mesa Pipe Line Co. is different, Barber said, "The reason Mesa is in there is because they bought oil from us. If we should lose, Mesa would have to pay anything we don't pay. They're jointly and severally liable with us."

Perkin prefers containing the snake in the cage, so "the dogs won't ever find out that they can kill them."

Perkin has a high opinion of Hardin's knowledge of snakes and their habits.

He says that Hardin, who has caught 21,528 since 1938, can "see them, sense them, smell them."

Hardin started catching snakes in 1938 when they sold for 10 cents per pound and now gets as high as \$5.

Hardin said that he had never been bitten, nor had anybody that has gone with him. He stresses caution above all else and refuses to take anyone who has been drinking beer or any other kind of alcohol on a snake hunt because they get careless.

Perkin points out that almost every part of the snake is useful; not only for the things that can be made from the skin, such as hat bands, belts and vests, but the venom is used to make the serum to treat rattlesnake bites and several organs are used in medical research.

Perkin, who has often accompanied Hardin in many snake hunts, offers advice to hunters with dogs.

He urges hunters not to take their dogs out unless they have been "snake-proofed." The way to make him snake-proof is to get a snake and put it in a hail-green cage or suture its mouth shut and then "hit" the dog with a shocking collar whenever it gets close to the snake. In this manner, the dog learns to stay away if he sees, hears or smells a rattlesnake.

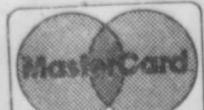

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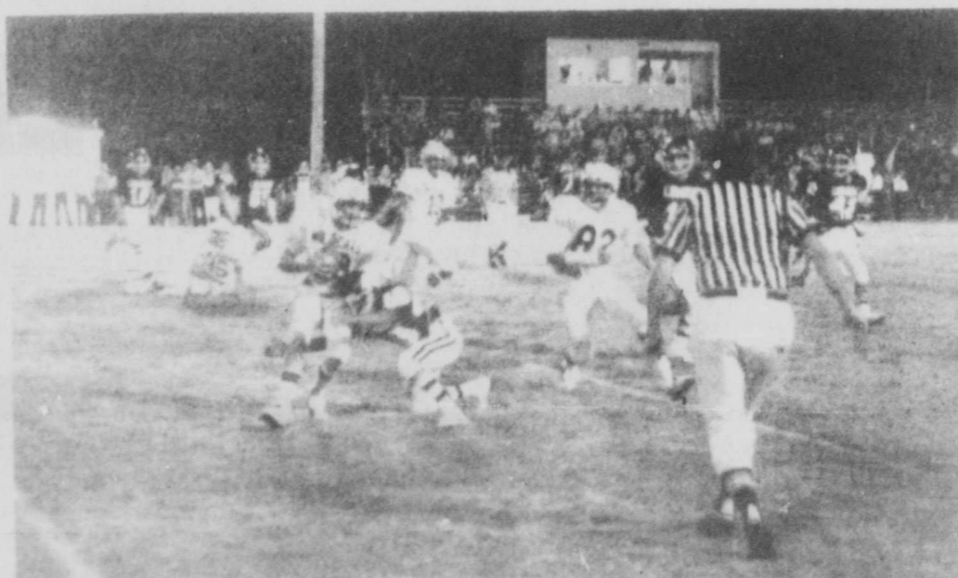
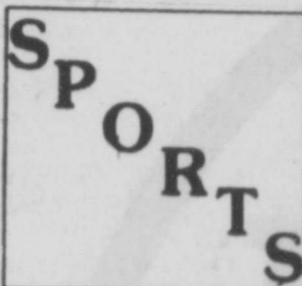
Meeting set for landowner, hunter

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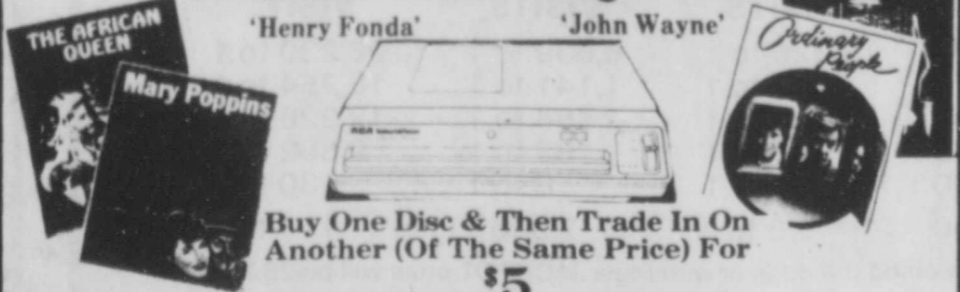
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Wolf Freshmen lose to Post

Cook's Corner Nurse's recipes don't require time

Inez Howell is a working wife who doesn't mind admitting, "I don't really enjoy cooking. I don't like to spend the whole day in the kitchen."

That doesn't mean she neglects her cooking duties, however. Although she is a nurse and has to work different shifts, she makes sure that she and her husband, Holly, have "at least one good meal at home a day."

She chose these three recipes for RECORD readers simply because "they're so good."

CARROT SALAD

2 lbs. carrots, sliced thin
2 bell peppers, chopped
2 medium onions, chopped
1 can tomato soup
2 t. Worcestershire sauce
3/4 c. sugar
1/4 c. wine or cider vinegar
1 t. salt
1/4 t. poppy seed, optional
1/4 t. celery seed, optional
1/4 t. dill seed, optional

Cook carrots 3-5 minutes, drain and let cool. Add peppers and onions. Add the rest of the ingredients, mix well and let set in refrigerator at

least overnight.

CHICKEN SPAGHETTI
1 hen or large chicken
1 onion, grated
1 c. celery, chopped
1/4 t. black pepper
1 can pimentos, chopped
1 can mushroom soup
1 pkg. Italian spaghetti
1 or 2 buttons, garlic, grated
1/4 t. red pepper
1 t. salt
1 can tomato soup
3/4 lb. cheese

Cook chicken until tender. Mix other ingredients together and let stand until chicken is done.

Tear chicken from bone in large pieces. Cook spaghetti in chicken broth. Combine all ingredients and put into baking dish. Grate cheese over top and bake in slow oven (300 degrees) for 45 minutes.

3 DAY

COCONUT CAKE
1 Duncan Hines white cake mix—Mix according to package directions and cook in 2 layers. Let it get cold and then split layers for 4-layer cake.

ICING

2 c. granulated sugar
2 small cartons sour cream
1 large bowl cool whip
14 oz. Bakers Flake Coconut

Mix together well and ice cake. 1 c. chopped nuts, optional. (This is a lot of icing) Use half the coconut in the icing and the rest to sprinkle on last. Also, use the nuts to decorate the icing instead of in the cake.

Let this cake set in the refrigerator for three days.
