LETTER FROM LAVACA.

The Lavaca "Commercial"—Admiration
for the "Nigger" not Recipro-
cated—"Praise God Bare Bones"
Changed to "Praise God Bare
Benches"—Conservative Love (?)
Sends Six Innocent Men to the Peni-
tentiary—A Plea in Their Behalf,
&c., &c.

LAVACA, Texas, March 6, 1868.
Editors of the San Antonio Express:

DEAR SIR:—You will notice by re-
ferring to the Lavaca Commercial of yester-
day, that you have excited the re-
ligious ire of the Methodist Parson that
edits that sheet.
What is singular, with all the Parson's
good deeds done the poor negro through-
out his eventful life, they do not seem to
appreciate it, for candidly he has not one
friend among all the freedmen here.
He says he marries them and charges
them nothing for it; he preaches and
prays, &c., for their benefit. There's
not one colored person in this place that
has any faith in his religion; they
won't go to hear him preach. He has
lately attempted to preach to them (un-
invited) at their own church; they all
left the church, leaving the bare benches
for him to preach to. He has not tried
it since.

This happened some three weeks
since, immediately after those men were
sent or sentenced to the Penitentiary for
committing no crime whatever. This
Parson, it is said by the persons who
left the church, attempted to justify the
decision of the Court against those men.
They considered (very correctly) that it
was prejudice against them on account
of color and their freedom; that was the
cause of it. His slaves (that were) say
the Parson was a very hard master.

At the time of the fuss that sent six
men to the Penitentiary, another little
trouble occurred here. An assault and
battery with intent to kill, was committed
on a negro boy by a young man here
(white); the criminal was the brother-in-
law of the Justice of the Peace (so-
called) here, who was so active in the
way of having the colored men arrested
and punished; he seemed entirely ig-
norant of the offence committed by his
brother-in-law. The attention of the
Commander of the Post was called to the
fact, however, who had the young gent
arrested; he was tried before the un-
worthy Justice (his brother-in-law), and
the decision was that he be fined \$20,
greenbacks. The officer of the Post
ordered him to "change his base," and
required that the criminal give security
to the amount of \$500 for his appear-
ance at the next District Court for trial.

The fellow died of yellow fever here in
August last, and the place was rid of one
more scamp. Query:—Would he have
went to the Penitentiary had he lived?
I think not; and he had committed a
serious offence—he had cut the colored
boy very severely in the arm, and had
cut his clothes in various places, without
any provocation whatever.

With regard to the six men so unjustly
sent to the Penitentiary, I give you their
names, and, for the sake of justice and
humanity, do what you can for their re-
lease: Edward Magraw, Charles Clark,
Jerry Anderson, David Johnson, Leo
Blanchett, Antonio Booth. The above men
were condemned to two years confine-
ment at the recent sitting of the District
Court of Calhoun county, for an offence
that would have been considered of no
moment had they been white men, and
no notice would have been taken of it by
said Court. This is the conviction of
every honest and honorable man in this
community.

THE SOUTHERN HEART.

We give the following article from
the Indiana Bulletin, as being the mildest,
most dispassionate, and really most
dignified article ever brought to our
notice coming from a "Southern" stand-
point, upon one of the loved martyrs
whose memory is cherished in fond
hearts at the North. We leave the
nation to judge what the feeling of the
other Southern rebel people is:—

"SAINT ABRAHAM.—The fanatical rad-
icals believe their idol, Lincoln, will be
worshipped by future ages as a Saint—
as a man whose (party) acts will be cano-
nized. The radical demagogues look
on him as a tool of their own cunning,
through whose instrumentality they have
attained unopposed power; but they
will all find themselves awfully mistaken.
Has Wiltverforce become entitled to the
prefix? As ages roll on, his memory
more and more becomes classified with
fanaticism. Has his efforts added to the
happiness and peace of the blacks? We
have only to look towards the West In-
dian Islands to witness the result of his
false philanthropy. We have only to
look into the present condition of the
negroes of the Southern States for an
answer. Future ages will place them in
the same list as Peter the hermit—one
as the exponent of British folly, the other
as the culmination of puritan fanaticism.
As the world becomes more enlightened
the descendants of the people of the
Great Republic of America will look
back with shame and humiliation on the
imbecility of their ancestors in being
governed by fanatic and mad men. Old
Abe Lincoln will be rightly placed, not
among the Saints, but among those
whom the Gods first make mad that they
may destroy. He will be classed among
the martyrs of fanaticism, whose folly
brought about his own destruction—
whose followers came high ruining the
great experiment of a people's govern-
ment. May they profit by the past—the
second edition of the middle ages—and
so govern themselves as to avoid the
dangers which the present generation
have experienced."

Truths for Wives.

In domestic happiness, the wife's in-
fluence is much greater than the hus-
band's for the one, the mutual love and
confidence—being greater, the whole
comfort of the household depends upon
trifles more immediately under her ju-
risdiction. By her management of small
sums, husband's respectability and cred-
it are created or destroyed. No for-
tune can stand the constant leakages of
extravagance and mismanagement and
more is spent in trifles than women
would easily believe. The one great
expense, whatever it may be, is turned
over and carefully reflected on, and the
income is prepared to meet it; but it is
pennies imperceptibly sliding away which
do mischief; and this the wife alone
can stop, for it does not come within the
man's province. There is often an un-
suspected trifle to be saved in every
household.

Depend upon it, there is a great deal
of domestic happiness about a well dress-
ed mutton chop, or a tidy breakfast ta-
ble. Men grow tired of beauty, tired of
music, are often too wearied for conver-
sation, however intellectual; but they
can always appreciate a well kept hearth
and smiling comfort.

A woman may love her husband de-
votely—may sacrifice fortune, family,
country for him; she may have the gen-
ius of Sappho, the exalted beauties of
an Arncliffe; but—melancholy fact! with
these she fails to make his home com-
fortable, his heart will inevitably escape
her. And women live so entirely in the
affection that without love their exist-
ence is void. Better, submit, then, to
household tasks, however repugnant
they may be to your tastes, than doom
yourself to a loveless home. Women of
a higher order of mind will not run this
risk; they know that their domestic are
their first duties.

Senator Morton's great speech on the

lated and published in German and
French. It is now being translated in
Spanish and Italian by societies in
Washington, to be sent abroad for the
purpose of promoting immigration.
The Senator has received over six hun-
dred letters from all parts of the United

The "IRONCLAD" AND "PRINCE."—For reasons that he has never explained to the public, General Hancock has appointed to responsible official positions gentlemen of known hostility to the Republican party, some of whom were notoriously disloyal to the government of the United States. In several instances such gentlemen have declined to accept the appointment tendered by the commanding general, unhesitatingly declaring that they could not subscribe to the oath required. This course has been honorable, and the parties who have for the reason alleged declined the honors and emoluments of office, are entitled to the commendation of an approving conscience. Yesterday Mr. Paris Childress, second justice of the peace for this city, was arrested for perjury, on an affidavit made before United States Commissioner Shannon. That magistrate will investigate the matter on Monday next, and in the disposition of the case he will be governed by his oath of office as a commissioner. —N. O. Republican.

The New Treaty with North Germany.

WASHINGTON, March 1.—Yesterday the Secretary of State sent a telegram to Minister Bismarck to which the following answer was received this morning:

BERLIN, March 1.—The treaty was signed and mailed on the 24th of February, via England. It provides that emigration shall be free, and that naturalization changes nationality. Hasten the ratification. —(Signed) BISMARCK.

A few days since a most prominent member of the Diplomatic corps expressed his disbelief in the despatches on this subject, but today a member of the committee on Foreign Affairs says they have no doubt of the truth that a treaty has been negotiated with the North German Confederation securing the object above stated, and they and other gentlemen occupying high positions in our national administration believe this treaty will soon be followed by others of a similar character between the United States and other foreign governments, thus recognizing American principles.

Heroism of the Cretans.—Turks in Retreat.

WASHINGTON, March 1.—Accounts from Crete are to February 8. They describe the heroism of Corroka and his troops, summing, according to the Grand Vizier's own estimate, upward of two thousand, who attacked the Turks near a fortified cemetery outside the town, Corroka forcing the Turks to fall back into the citadel. A number were drowned during the retreat, fifty killed by the Cretan troops, one hundred wounded and forty taken prisoners.

The Turks, as usual, attacked non-combatants, slaying fifty after having robbed them of all the valuables in their possession. Their irregular Turkish troops have also been guilty of similar atrocities in the vicinity of Rethymno. The provisional government has issued another circular addressed to the representative Christian powers, declaring that the Cretan people are determined to remain faithful to their vow of union with Greece.

The Whisky Insurrection in Tennessee.

It was heretofore stated that Collector Abernethy and his deputies had seized sundry whisky stills in East Tennessee, but were afterwards mobbed by persons concerned in the illicit trade, and secured their freedom by paying ransom.

These Government officers promptly communicated with the Internal Revenue bureau, asking for troops to enforce the law. The bureau has obtained from the military authorities a favorable response to the application, and accordingly a company of cavalry has been despatched to support the revenue officers in the Knoxville district, the scene of the whisky insurrection.

Admiral Farragut arrived at Genoa on the 27th February, and was received as the guest of the city. The corporation gave a grand banquet in honor of the Admiral. Over the principal table was the motto, "America at the cradle of Osiris." Besides the officers and members of the city government, many of the nobility, the naval officers, in a body, and all the principal citizens of Genoa were present.

John Quincy Adams was in Russia at the time of the invasion of Bonaparte, but he once declared that he never could discover precisely who was the cause of the burning of Moscow. The Governor of Moscow denied it, and the Emperor denied having ordered it. Mr. Adams' theory was that if the Russian Government had acknowledged that they caused the fire, they would have been obliged to indemnify the sufferers.

OFFICE OF ARMY ADJUTANT TO BE ABOLISHED.—It is believed by many Congressmen that the Senate bill to abolish the office of adjutant of the army will become a law.

APPROPRIATION FOR THE LIFE OF MAJOR ANDERSON.—In the House of Representatives yesterday the substitute for the Senate bill appropriating \$10,000 for the life of Major General Robert Anderson, was passed.
