Industrial Team Fund Drive Tops \$30,000

Colorado City Industrial Team's fund drive has reached \$30,612.50 toward the goal of \$50,000 including all pledges and cash that have been received as of Friday.

The drive officially began some three weeks ago. Now that the drive is past the halfway mark in reaching the goal, Industrial Team officials stressed the importance of all businesses and individuals giving as much as possible to help put the drive over the top of the goal.

The Industrial Team has been working with several industrial prospects during the past few weeks as well as attempting to secure new housing for Colorado City. The lack of adequate housing is said by many civic leaders to be Colorado City's main obstacle in the march for progress.

A contractor from Fort Worth has told local officials that he will start construction of homes here if there are 10 people who say they will buy the first 10 houses. Anyone wanting to be among those 10 is asked to contact the Chamber of Commerce, members of the Industrial Team or Colorado City Savings & Loan.

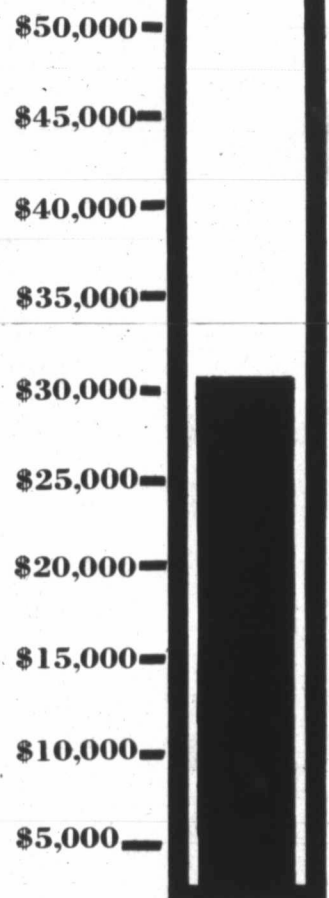

PCA To Celebrate 40th Anniversary

More than 650 members and guests are expected to attend observance of the 40th anniversary of the Sweetwater Production Credit Association when the stockholders have a meeting at 10:30 a.m. Friday, March 29 in the Scurry County Coliseum in Snyder.

"We are extremely pleased that the services offered to people engaged in agriculture in our territory have enabled the Association to show this sound growth over the years, declared R. B. Baker, field office manager for Mitchell County, Starting from scratch in 1934,

with no stockholders and no borrowers, as one slim pipeline to adequate financial aid for the drought and depression-stricken farmers and ranchers of a seven county area, the Association has reflected strong and steady growth to their present position as a major source of agricultural credit, loaning up to 41 million dollars in 1973.

"Much of this growth is due to the fact that the Association provides a highly specialized system of credit to meet exact requirements of farmers, ranchers and Frank Sanchez."

Mothers of Little Leaguers will hold an organizational meeting for the 1974 Little League season next Monday, March 25.

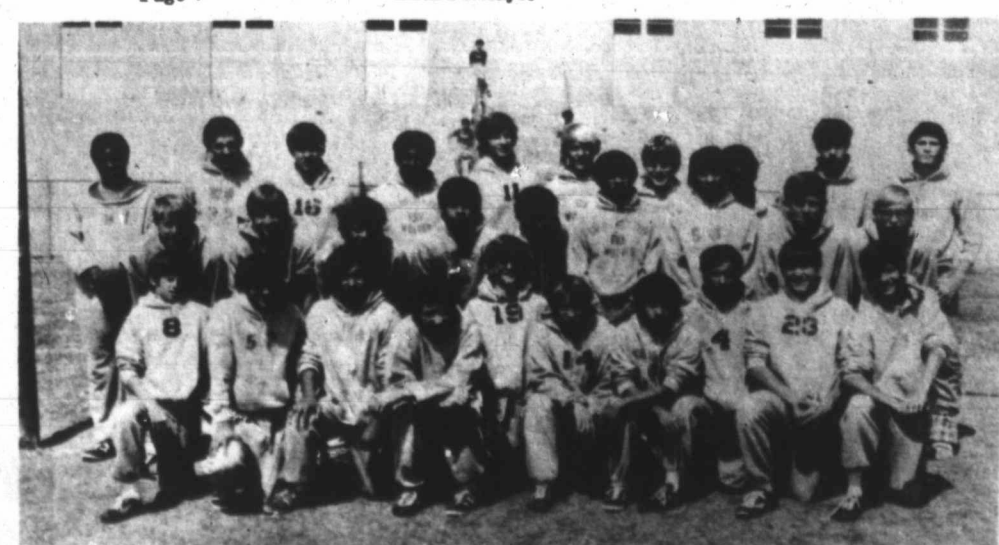
The meeting will be at 7 p.m. in the home of Mrs. Hortense Neff, 979 E. 15th St.

Mrs. Neff explained that the Women's Auxiliary will elect officers and make plans for money making projects for the season.

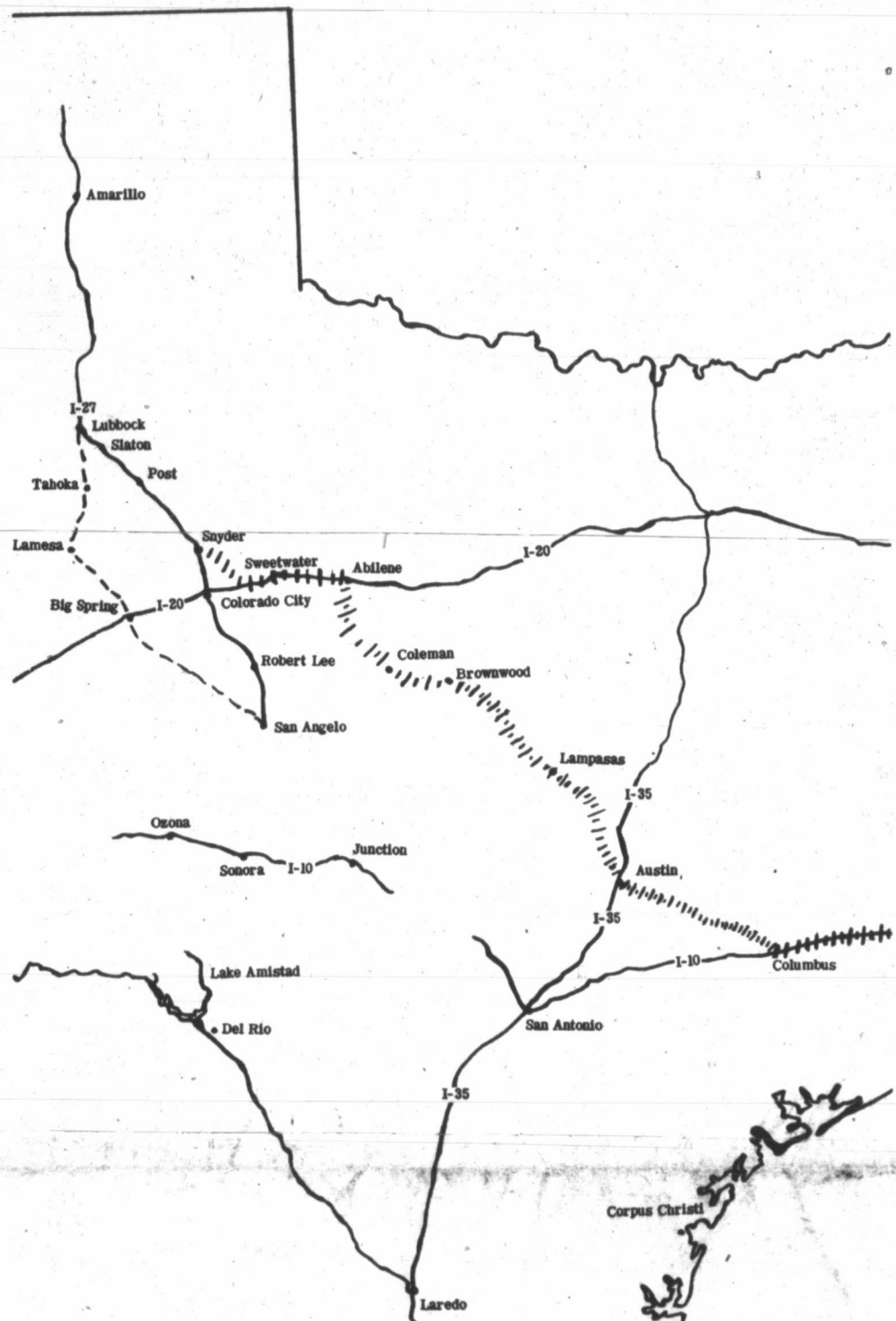


Faithful Fan

Interstate Highway Proposals

Part of the Texas interstate highway system is shown on the above map. Interstate 27 has reached Lubbock from Amarillo, Lamesa, Snyder, Big Spring and Abilene, with one more set for Wednesday at 7 p.m. in San Angelo's City Auditorium. Three main routes which have been suggested for the extension of Interstate 27 southward are shown on the map. The shortest route is from Lubbock through Slaton, Post, Snyder, Colorado City, Robert Lee and San Angelo, connecting with Interstate 20 at Colorado City, and with Interstate 10 at Junction. The Abilene route is shown with a tracked line and the Lamesa-Big Spring proposal is shown by a broken line.

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Town Talk

Colorado City is one of the few cities that has been represented and made a proposal thus far at all five of the hearings on the need, location and feasibility of the extension of Interstate 27 from Lubbock south to intersect with Interstate 20 and on to intersect with Interstate 10.

The Colorado City delegation has expressed its opinion at each meeting, outlining the many advantages of extending I-27 through Slaton, Post, Snyder, Colorado City, Robert Lee, San Angelo and on to intersect with I-10 at Junction.

At the Lubbock hearing, the Colorado City delegation had 14 persons in attendance; 5 from here were in Lamesa; 22 attended the Snyder hearing; 5 attended the Big Spring hearing and four attended the Abilene hearing. In addition Colorado City will have representatives in San Angelo Wednesday for the last hearing.

However, despite our tenacity and the many features of the Colorado City route, there has been little publicity in area newspapers about our proposal. The Record is the only newspaper in West Texas that has given complete details on all the routes proposed. Area newspapers have not given their readers all the details on the proposed route. For instance, Colorado City's proposal has not even been mentioned in the Snyder Daily News although we had 22 persons at the Snyder meeting. Colorado City's proposal was not mentioned in the Abilene paper until focal officials contacted that paper and asked

RECP Sign-up At ASCS Office

Sign-up for the 1974 RECP program is being held until Friday, March 29 at the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office.

The RECP (Rural Environmental Conservation Practices) is for a number of conservation programs sponsored by the Department of Agriculture in the past.

Mitchell County received only \$11,271 for the program and the county committee will have to approve operators for participation.

Mitchell County executive director of ASCS, Don Stewart,

pointed out that applications will not be approved on a first come, first served basis, but rather on a high priority judgement of the committee.

County committeemen are Curtis Latimer, chairman; Warren Anderson and Tommy Fuller.

Practices chosen by the development group follow:

- Establish permanent cover for farm land.
- Improve permanent cover (includes brush control).
- Constructing earthen dams.

The public is invited to attend.

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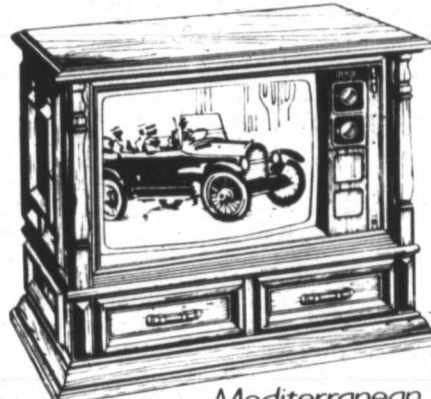

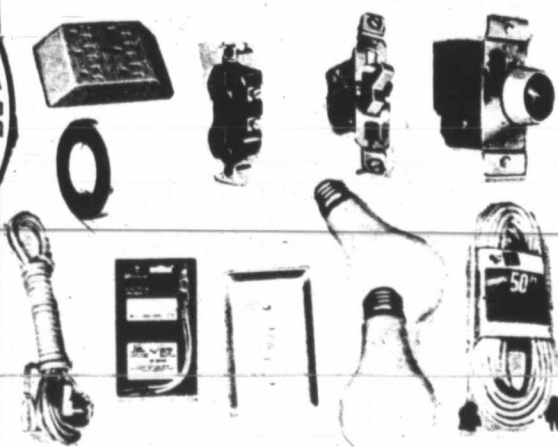

Horsemanship Clinic In Lubbock Planned

Horsemen of all ages and experience will get a rare opportunity to develop their skills in a horsemanship clinic in Lubbock March 29 and 30.

A three-man team of horse specialists, noted for their teaching skills and horsemanship abilities, will demonstrate everything from grooming and discipline to performance maneuvers and basic horsemanship, says County Extension Agent Bob Benson.

The men are B. F. Yeates, Gary Potter, and Doug Householder, all Extension specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at College Station.

The event gets underway in the Fair Park Coliseum at the Panhandle South Plains Fairgrounds at 4:30 p.m., Friday, March 29, and will continue through the evening until about 9:30. Convening again on Saturday at 9

a.m., the clinic will last most of the day, adjourning at 4:30.

Registration for adults (18 and over) is \$7.50. For youths from ages 9 to 17, the fee is \$4.50, and for children under 8 years, \$2.75. These registration fees include a barbecue luncheon.

The event, Benson emphasizes, is open to people of all ages. People living in or outside a residential area who have horses will especially be interested in improving their horsemanship abilities, he adds.

Specific skills to be taught include grooming and discipline, basic western horsemanship such as control of feet, hands and legs and proper posture, performance maneuvers such as driving, stopping, turnabout and leading, and skills in barrels, poles, reining and hunt seat.

The South Plains Development Program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is sponsoring the clinic. The Lubbock Chamber of Commerce is co-sponsor.

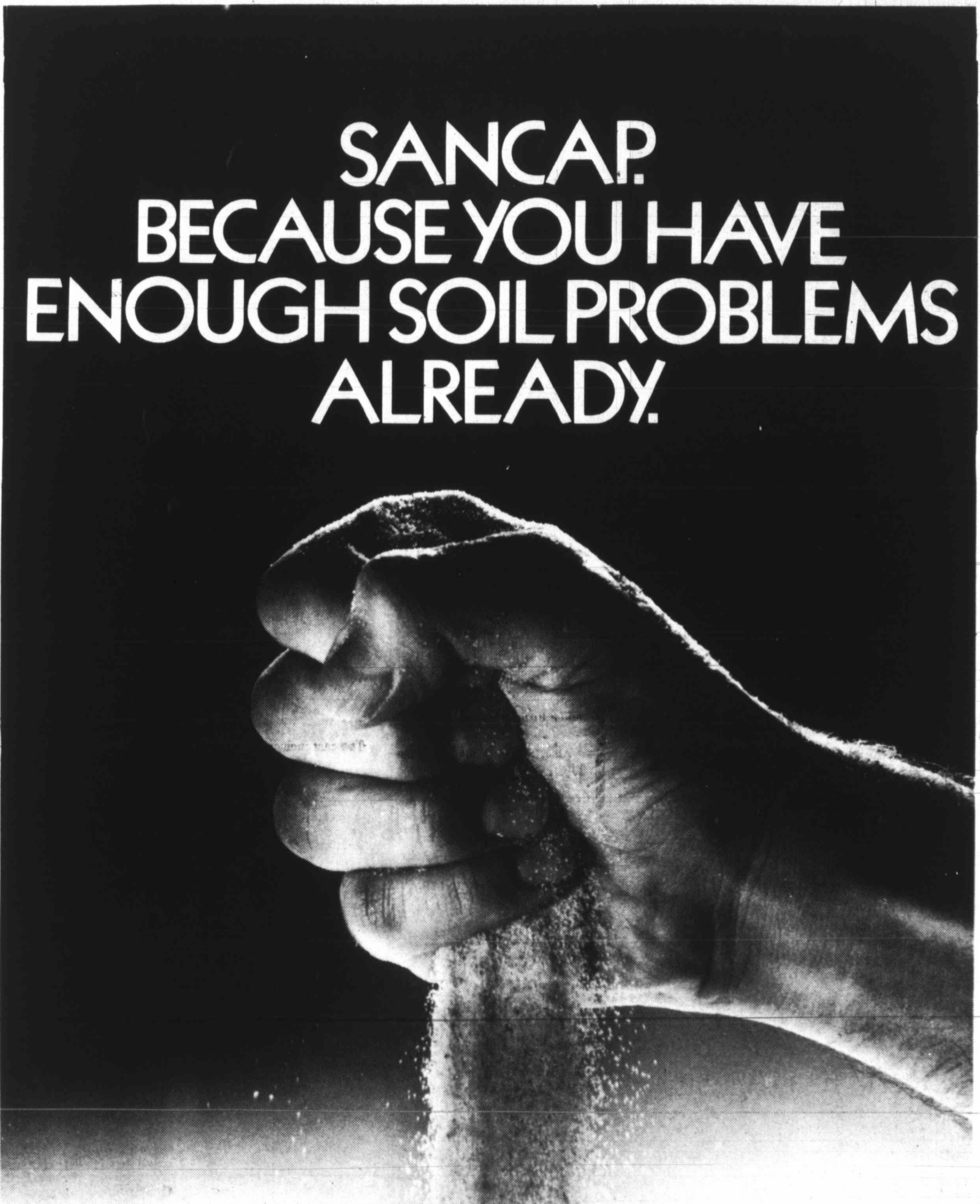

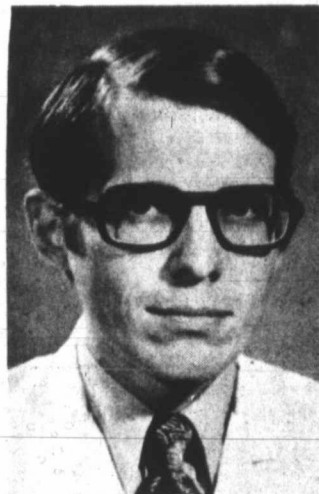
Weathermen are saying warmer weather is due to come back, perhaps by Sunday (today) or even sooner.

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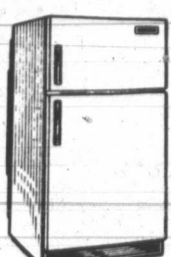
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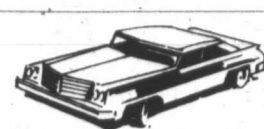

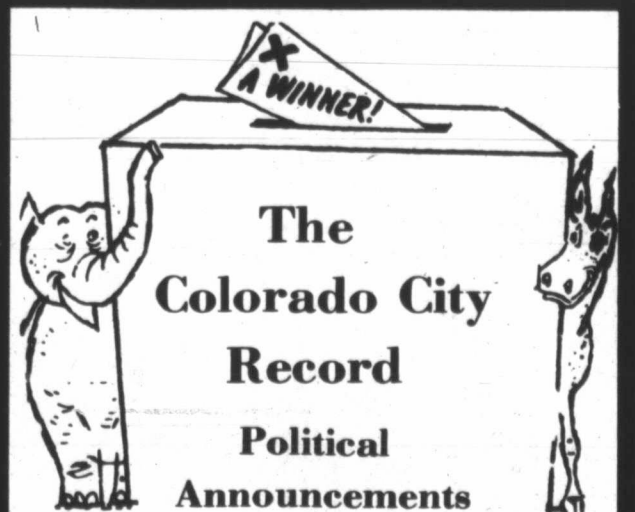

--Constructing terrace sys-
tems.

--Constructing diversion or
spreader terraces.

meeting of the board. Dunn was elected superintendent of Loraine schools after the resignation of Tom Harkey. Harkey's resignation will become effective July 1.

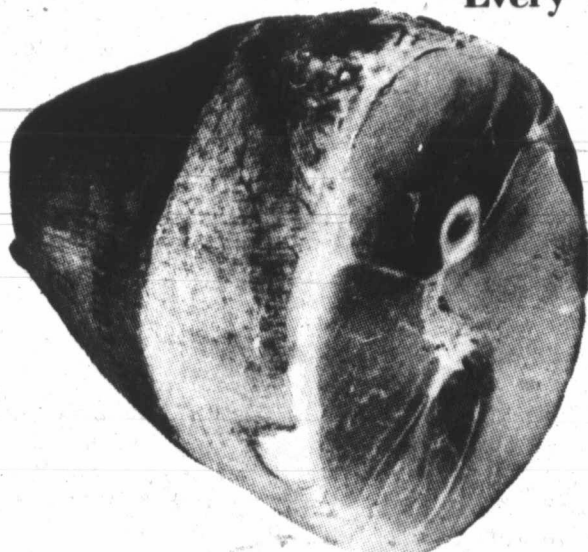
