

A Letter From Home To Boys In Service

(Editor's note: An Abernathy Mother, Mrs. C. B. Reeder, writes the letter to our boys in service this week. She has a son, Charles, with the 11th Medical Regiment at Camp Blanding, Fla.)

Dear Boys,

This letter is to you personally where ever you may be. You have had letters from each of your parents and now the editor has asked me to write to you. I sincerely thank him for this opportunity for as I write I feel that I am saying some of the things your mothers would say.

Certainly we miss you, as each one has told you, from our schools, churches, places of business, and our streets. But, most of all, we mothers miss you from the home. We miss that hustle, bustle, hurry, as you got off to school or work invariably yelling, "Moms, where did you put my hat?" We miss you in the evening, when, with a dash and a "Hi, Moms," you rushed into the house through the bath room, splashing water, then strewing towels and articles of clothing as you went through every room, all the time whistling or singing in a not too melodious tone. And, again, "Moms, where's a clean white shirt—I'm going places." After you were gone, we went through the entire house putting things where they belonged, mopping the bath room floor and cleaning the ring from around the tub.

Did we scold or complain? Well, we really didn't mean it and want you back where we can do all those things again.

But most of all we miss those quiet evenings at home when we sat around and just talked, read or played games.

But I haven't meant to make you home-sick, for we want you to be happy and contented, knowing down deep in your hearts that our cause is just and right. That we must fight to preserve and keep that which is ours. May there never be in any of your hearts a hatred for any people or a desire for revenge against that people, but a deep contempt for the things for which they stand and a determination that justice shall prevail.

Over at the Baptist church we have placed a large placard on the wall and we have asked for the pictures of all our boys so that we can put them there. Somehow it makes us feel that you are a little nearer to us. So, if you have sent your Mother a picture, do so soon and I am sure she will bring it to be with those of the other boys.

The farmers are really busy now. Early and late we hear the sound of tractors all over the country. We're trying to do our part as you do yours.

When we meet any of the boys just younger than you and talk with them, we find that the one thing uppermost in their minds is, "When and where will I be called?" Many are not waiting for that call but are enlisting and preparing for places where they think they can do the greatest good and will soon be joining you.

You boys are experiencing new thrills, making new friends, and seeing places so far different from home that you can hardly believe they are real. But, don't let them win all your love. Remember that the truest friends and the prettiest girls are the home-town folks, and the Plains of Texas is the best place on earth.

We pray constantly for your safe and certain return. May God bless and keep you until the world is at peace and we can have you at home again.

300 Tons of Hopper Poison Bait Mixed Here

Frank Tannehill, manager of Cop Grain Co., said about 600,000 pounds, 300 tons, of grasshopper poison bait has been mixed and distributed during the past week at the poison mixing station set up at the elevator here.

Farmers report they are making progress in their war to kill the hoppers. Some, who have spread the poison bait once stopped to plant row crops and plan to resume the poisoning activities after planting is completed.

Two mixing machines are being used to prepare the bait and WPA labor is being used to supplement a crew employed by the elevator.

Blacksmith shops and garages are still busy making machines, trailer and tractor attachment types, for spreading the bait.

"Hello, Annapolis" Is Free Show Saturday

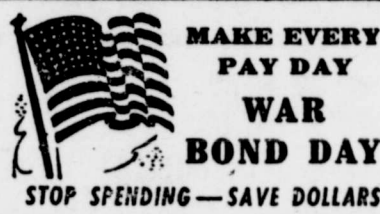

Frank Nix, Baptist pastor. Burial, under direction of Sanders Funeral home, Lubbock, was in Strip cemetery, northeast of here. Abernathy Odd Fellow lodge, of which Maupin was a member, and visitors from neighboring lodges, had charge of graveside rites.

Was Pioneer of Plains

Early Tillman Maupin was born May 25, 1879, in Calloway county, Missouri. He moved with his parents to this section in 1891, and with other rugged pioneers converted the South Plains from a prairie to the rich agricultural country it is today. He roared the section which is now the site of Abernathy, long before the town was started. As a well driller, Maupin helped early settlers improve the Plains area, and as an operator of a feed mill and store, the business in which he was engaged at the time of his death, he was continuing his service to the people of this area.

On Oct. 7, 1900, he married Miss Margarette Tedford, who passed away in 1916. To this union three children were born: Ella Virginia, who died in 1921, Lonnie Earl and Edna Alice. Maupin married Mrs. Flora Weagly Dec. 25, 1928. He joined the Methodist church at Lakeview in 1900.

He is survived by his wife; two daughters, Mrs. O. G. Wheelless of Longview and Miss Inez Weagly of Lubbock; one son, L. E. (Tom) Maupin of Monterey, Calif.; four grandchildren, Billy Dansfield of Lubbock, Bobbie and Janet Wheelless of Noland, Calif.; two sisters, Mrs. J. B. Earhart of Lubbock and Mrs. Ed Winn of San Diego, Calif.; a sister-in-law, Mrs. Fannie Maupin, Post; three nephews, five nieces and 12 great nephews and nieces.

CROWELL RED CROSS OFFICIAL THANKS ABERNATHY FOR AID

(Editor's note: In the following letter to Mayor Fritz W. Struve, G. D. Self, chairman of Foard County's Red Cross chapter, extended thanks of residents of storm-stricken Crowell to Abernathy for aid they received from people of this community.)

Crowell, Texas,
May 14, 1942.

Dear sir:

This acknowledges receipt of your donations and commodities to our tornado sufferers. It will help our people rebuild their homes and re-establish themselves.

We had 150 homes destroyed completely, about 250 badly damaged and around 100 with minor damage. Less than 25 homes escaped damage. Not a person in Crowell escaped being affected in some way. There were 1,500 people homeless, without clothes and food when your people came to our rescue and assistance. Each of our residents would like, if possible, to shake hands with all of yours. And tell you just how much we do appreciate what you have done for us.

As a matter of information, your local Red Cross chapter will be given credit in the National Red Cross office for the aid you have given us. This will be handled in the St. Louis office. We want you to know every penny will be spent in Crowell. At present our situation is well in hand as to food, clothes and bed clothing, but the housing problem is acute. The National Red Cross is starting to repair, build and furnish homes. They are a "Rock of Gibraltar" in a time of need. We never could have made the progress we have without its aid.

It is impossible for us to acknowledge all the people who contributed to our relief and we will appreciate it if you will have this letter printed in your paper.

Uncle Sam's New Delivery Regulations FOR RETAIL FIRMS —

Every Business Firm in the Nation is Required to Reduce Delivery Service To Save Tires, Fuels & Trucks. Below Is the Official Ruling We Must Follow. Please Help Us Observe It —

"Effective May 15 you cannot make special deliveries to any customer nor may you deliver to any one customer more than once per day. Effective June 1 you must reduce mileage driven by your delivery equipment 25% in addition to the elimination of special deliveries and more than one a day to customers. You are required to keep records showing you have accomplished this. If you do not have records showing mileage driven in the corresponding month of 1941, you must use your May, 1942, figure to go by, and reduce this figure by 25%. 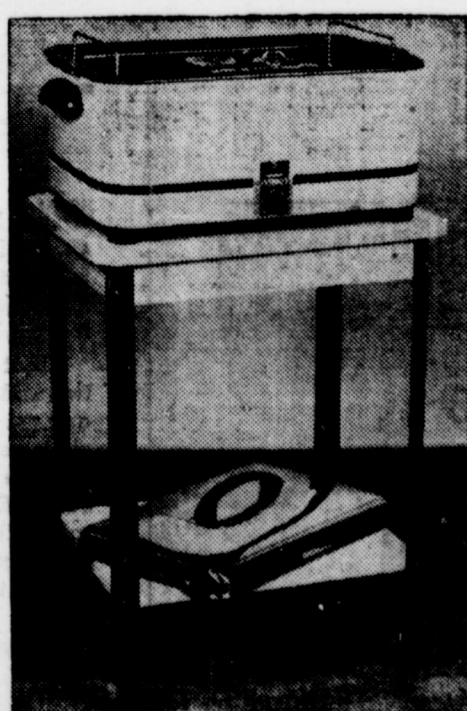
