## Church Ground Breaking

Ground breaking ceremonies for the new St. Ann's Catholic Church will be held at 4:30 p.m. Thursday in the 1900 block of Walnut.

The new church facilities, including a 333-seat building and a rectory for Father Joseph Kennedy are expected to be completed within six months.

On hand for the ground breaking will be Bishop Steven A. Leven of San Angelo along with officials of Mitchell County and Colorado City.

Everyone is invited to attend the ceremonies.

The new church building, modern in design, will have double brick walls, with a drop roof over the front doors and tinted glass just above the drop roof and tinted glass panes on the front of the building.

The new buildings, cost of which has been estimated at \$95,450, will replace the present 45-year old structure at 1715 Peach.

General contractor for the new structures is Virgil Stone.

The new church and rectory will be located on a 3.5 acre lot on Walnut. Father Joseph Kennedy, who has been at St. Ann's slightly more than two years, said future construction will include a parish hall and educational buildings.

The new church has some 3,400 square feet and the new rectory building with 1,400 square feet, will serve as living quarters and offices for Father Kennedy.

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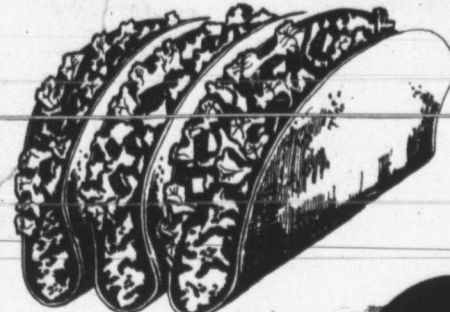

She offered an illustrated lecture on the effect of light on colors and showed seven displays which were covered before showing with red and white striped covers centered with red hearts.

She began by showing an arrangement emphasizing the effect of incandescent light on a collage of contrived tree limbs and leaves.

Other arrangements were an arrangement of Dutch Iris done in a silver compote with incandescent light to bring out the colors; one with dried material and a warm light; a red and blue background with blue container containing white straw like material shaped in swirls; an abstract design with black and white background done in black seed pods centered with red lotus seed pods.

The kinetic effect was achieved by a small motor which produced movement by air.

Mrs. Johnson concluded the program by showing a Valentine arrangement of pink carnations and Gladioli with red roses in a white container. She said the arrangement was dedicated to all lovers as a special Valentine and then read a poem by Elizabeth Barrett Browning.

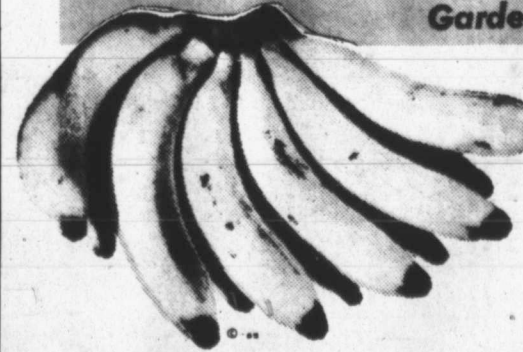

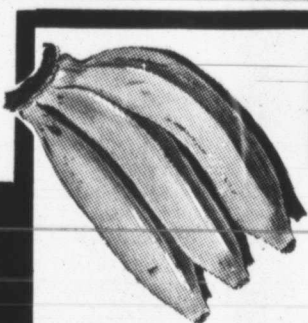
