Rivercrest Downed By Cooper 21-0

The Cooper Bulldogs kept up their tradition of scoring early in the ballgame against their opponents when they hosted the Rivercrest Rebels last Friday night, scoring on their first possession and winning the game 21-0.

The Rebels provided the Bulldogs with a little more competition than had the Prairiland Patriots the week before, who lost to Cooper 30-0. The Rebels were able to

move the ball against the Bulldogs on several occasions, and marched 37 yards on their first possession to the Cooper 30 yard line before the ball went over on downs.

The Bulldogs controlled the ball during most of the second quarter, and scored again on an 11 play drive. A Kip Stansell pass that was intercepted early in the second quarter ended another drive.

Chris Potter gave hope to the Rebels when he returned a

Cooper punt 28 yards to the Cooper 38 yard line. Milton Scales was given the ball for gains of six and 23 yards, then Jimmy Via carried to the nine yard line. On the next play Scales extended the ball and most of his body over the goal line, but his knee failed to cross the line, and the clock ended the half.

The Rebels moved the ball again in the third quarter, sustaining a 13 play struggle

against the solid Cooper team, and earning three first downs in the drive. The Bulldogs were held scoreless in the third quarter.

It was early in the fourth quarter before Cooper scored for the last time, and although the Rebs were able to contain the Bulldogs, they gained very little yardage offensively against them in the last quarter.

Rebel Terry Williams was a strong defensive player, with several tackles to his credit and one sack which cost the Bulldogs 16 yards. Eugene Norman was credited with four tackles in a row as the Rebels tried to contain Cooper's fast J. C. Morris and Denny Hagen. Joe Lynn Rhodes, Jimmy Via, Nicky Brown and Roger Galloway were also credited with tackles.

The Bulldogs gained 264 yards rushing to 176 yards for the Rebels. Cooper made 14 first downs as opposed to eight by the Rebels.

The Rebels have an open date this week and will play at Paul Pewitt Sept. 23.

ACT Test To Be Administered

Students at Rivercrest High School who are considering attending college after graduation will have five opportunities during the 1977-78 school year to use the American College Testing Program, a guidance-oriented service that is used each year by students throughout the nation as part of their college and career planning.

The first of five national test dates on which the ACT Assessment tests will be offered is Saturday morning, Oct. 8, 1977. Junior or senior students planning to take exams on that date must have registered by Sept. 12, it was announced by Bonnie Hudleston, counselor at Rivercrest.

She said the full 1977-78 schedule of national test dates (with registration periods in parentheses) is Oct. 8, 1977 (Aug. 8-Sept. 12); Nov. 19, 1977 (Sept. 26-Oct. 21); Feb. 11, 1978 (Nov. 14-Jan. 13); April 1, 1978 (Feb. 6-March 3); June 17, 1978 (March 27-May 19). Registration forms are available in the counselor's office.

At area test centers on those dates it takes students about three hours to complete four standardized exams (covering subject areas of English, math, social studies, and natural sciences) that make up the Test Section. The ACT Assessment's other important section is a two-part questionnaire that is completed by students at home as part of the registration process.

The test scores provide an assessment of general educational development and the questionnaire section information focuses on academic and nonacademic accomplishments and interests, anticipated needs, as well as educational and career plans. The resulting test scores and

McFatrige Is Candidate

Charles L. McFatrige, a native of Lamar County presently living in Mt. Pleasant, announced his candidacy for the Democratic Party's nomination for the post of Texas State Senator from the First Senatorial District. The announcement by McFatrige came following a noon luncheon held Saturday, September 10, in the Titus County Civic Center for members of the news media, friends and members of his campaign staff.

McFatrige's announcement of his bid for the post marks him as the first opponent to face Senator A. M. Aikin, who has held the office since 1932, in some 30 years.

Stating his admiration and respect for Senator Aikin, McFatrige noted that his disagreement with the senator on priorities of state and government did not lessen his esteem for the proven office

holder. "In fact," stated McFatrige, "Senator Aikin is living proof that an honest man can serve in politics for nearly half a century and remain totally honest."

"The days of the big three in East Texas politics (Sam Rayburn, Wright Patman, and A. M. Aikin) are fast drawing to a close," declared McFatrige. He called for a renewal of leadership that is fresh, strong and adaptable, and stated that he believed that the day of the specialist in the legislature had passed.

McFatrige paraphrased Aikin as saying in a recent speech that he (Aikin) had often been accused of going off the deep end for education. Pointing out that 46 percent of Texas' \$8 billion per year budget was spent on education, McFatrige noted that despite the expense "statistics reveal that the Scholastic Aptitude Test scores of students have gone steadily downward for almost 14 years."

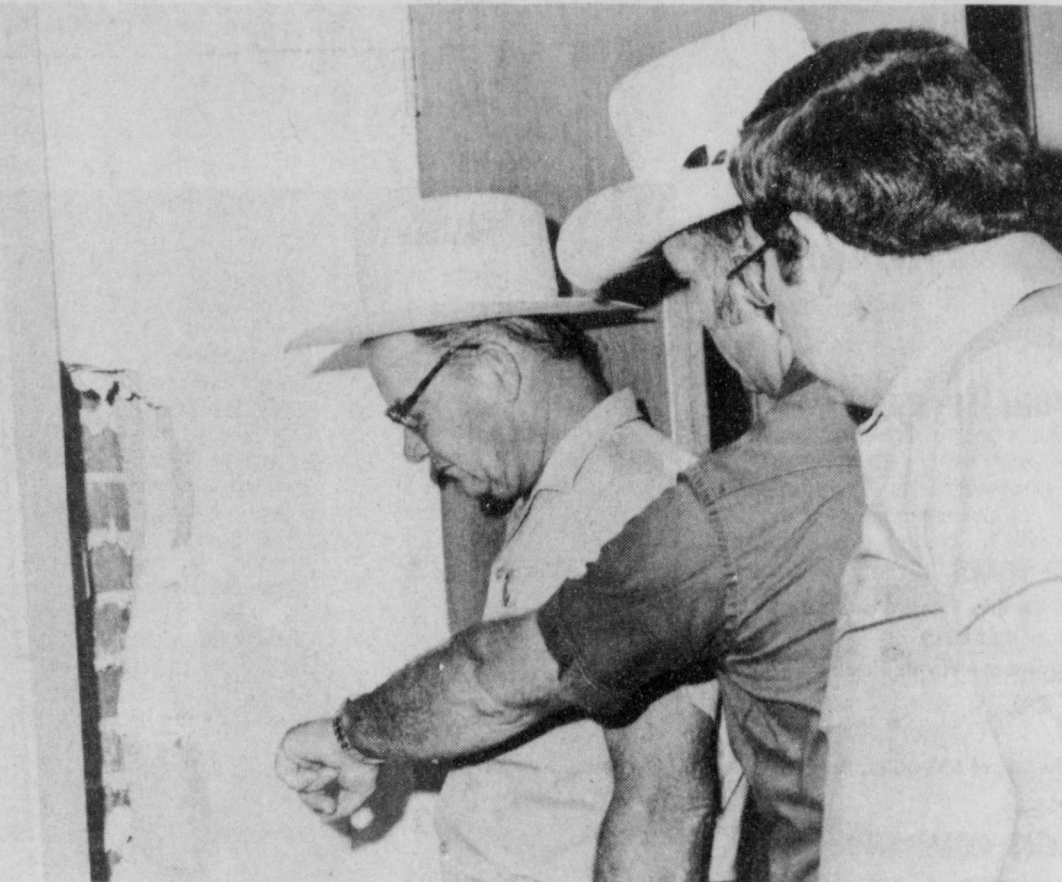
He called for a readjustment of priorities in Texas education,

and a return to the basics of sound education. In other issues, he pledged increased interests in the state's nursing homes; tax reform exempting Texans from taxes on personal and intangible property; simplify the rules and easing the financial burden of inheritance taxes; and to stand up to federal decisions that effect the lives and purse strings of Texans.

The First Senatorial District of Texas has too many people, farm and business problems to permit its state senator to specialize in only one area, stated McFatrige.

He closed by saying, "I believe I can provide the leadership in the Texas State Senate that will give quality and equal representation to all people, and to all sectors of the business and professional communities."

Born September 21, 1932, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry R. McFatrige, he spent his childhood in Mt. Maxey, located 12 miles west of Paris. Following his graduation from Central High School in 1951, he and his parents moved to Paris, where his parents still reside on Northwest Street.

Enrollment Down By 38 In Talco-Bogata Schools

Principals Mike Vinyard, B. A. Holbrook, and Robert Giddens gave brief progress reports on the beginning of

school on each campus at the Talco-Bogata School Board meeting Tuesday night and

reported that school was off to a good start with no major problems. Superintendent Talmadge Morgan stated that the first day enrollment in the school district was 773 as compared to 811 on the first day of the prior year.

Action taken by the Board was as follows:

1. Firm of McClanahan & Holmes of Paris approved as school auditors.
2. Substitute teachers approved for 1977-78 school year.
3. Approval given to sell surplus, manual typewriters at Rivercrest for \$25.00 each on a first come basis with Ann Roberts authorized to dispose of the typewriters.

4. Authorization was given to employ personnel that may be approved by the Ark-Tex Council of Governments with Federal funds.
5. Contract entered into with the firm of McCreary & Huey for the collection of delinquent school taxes.

6. Authorization given to the school administration to furnish information for the best method and cost for air conditioning the Talco cafeteria.
7. School administration authorized to set up and administer an acceptable procedure for the accounting of school funds on each campus.
8. Approval given to the various financial reports as presented.

The next regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools will be on Tuesday, October 4, 1977 at 7:30 p.m. at Rivercrest with the public cordially invited to attend.

Slow Pitch Tourney Set In Blossom

There will be a men's slow pitch softball tournament in Blossom Oct. 6, 7, 8 and 9, with proceeds going toward the purchase of new bases for the Pony League and Little League fields for next year.

Troyal Barker, organizer of the tournament, said they would like to have as many teams as possible to enter, and have cut the entry fee to \$25 per team. Four team trophies and four individual place trophies will be given, and each team will furnish their own balls.

The entry fee should be sent to Barker at Box 96, Blossom, Texas 75416, by Oct. 3, 1977, in order to get the brackets drawn and for each coach to be contacted for the time to play. Barker said that late entries would not be accepted.

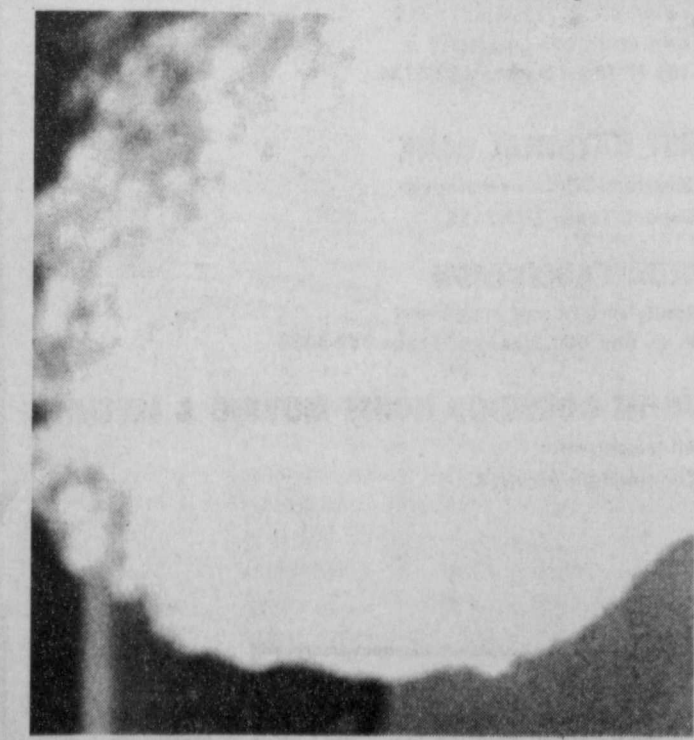
Arts, Crafts Show Set In Mount Vernon

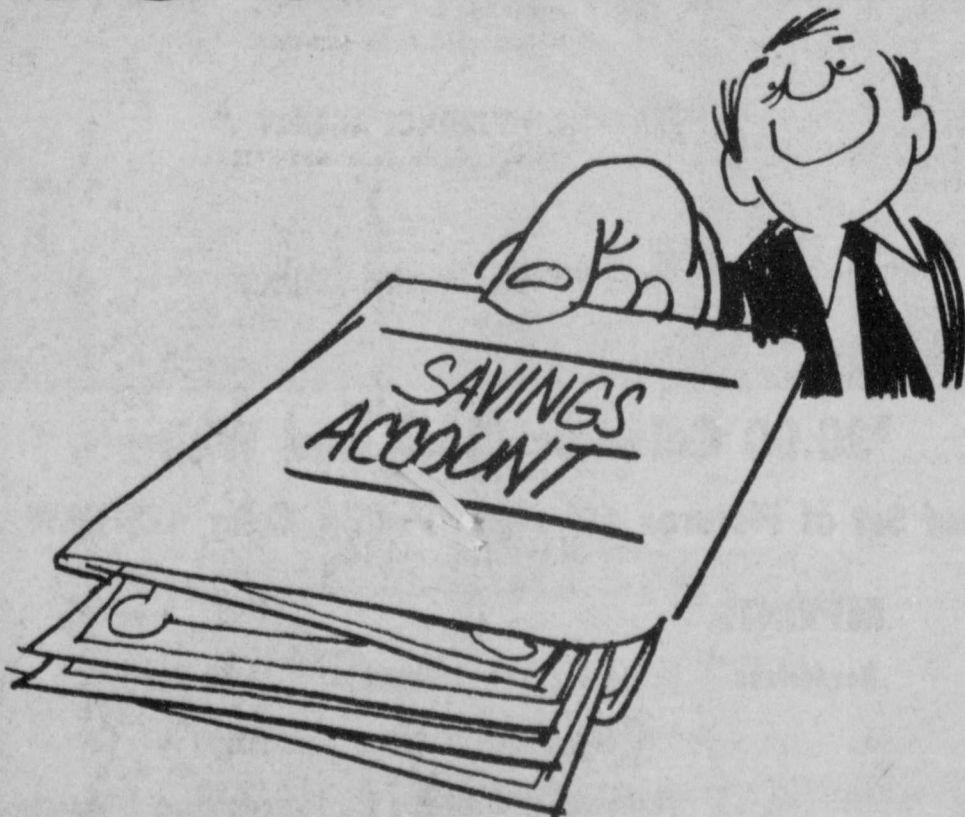

Pasture Decisions Difficult

Good management is a must if winter pastures are to be profitable this year, says Wayne Taylor and Dr. James Long, area economists-managing for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Winter pastures of small grain-ryegrass combinations will cost approximately \$100.00 per acre or about the same as last year," the Texas A&M University economists predict. "Last year was tough on all winter pastures in East Texas, especially yuchi clover and ryegrass."

"Basically, winter pastures in East Texas are best utilized by dairy cows, lactating beef cows or stocker calves," Taylor explained. "Small grain-ryegrass pastures are not good investment if used with dry cows." Dr. Dwight Vines, Extension area dairy specialist, agrees that dairyman could save considerable money by substituting winter pasture for some expensive concentrate or hay. "As much as \$40.00 per dairy cow could be saved during a 165 day fall and winter grazing season," Vines points out.

Winter pasture can be successfully utilized by the cow-calf operator on a fall calving program. "With short hay supplies, one-third or one-fourth acre of small grain-ryegrass pasture per cow will provide about one-half of the dry matter and TDN needed by the cow and calf," Taylor says. "Cows should be grazed on the winter pasture about two to three hours per day. We cannot afford continuous grazing of winter pasture by the cow herd. Only those cows suckling a calf should have access to the winter pasture pasture."

"It is difficult to project at this time what the exact situation will be for stocker calf operations this winter," Taylor cautions. "rainfall within the

next few weeks is a critical consideration in the fall price of cattle. Also, there is some indication that midwest corn farmers may market more of their grain through steers, thus increasing the demand for this type of animal."

"Several factors are critical for successful winter pasture production in East Texas," according to Long. "The first rule is don't skimp on fertilizer. Rotation of grazing is necessary for top forage production. Research and demonstrations in the area have shown that winter forage planted in a prepared seedbed usually gives more yield per acre."

"Winter pastures at current costs carry more risks than in previous years," Taylor concludes. "Even with the best production practices, adverse growing weather can play havoc with returns. Proper utilization is most important. Stocking the winter pasture with good quality calves at a rate to produce gains in excess of 500 pounds per acre will help the profit possibility. In short, careful planning is necessary. Producers should know their financial position and cash flow needs, plus keeping a good set of records if profitability of the enterprise is to be determined."

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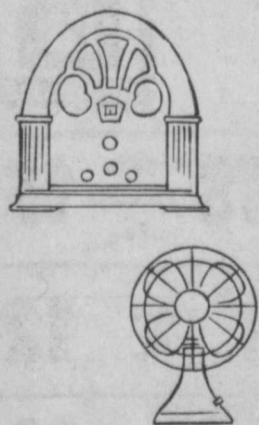

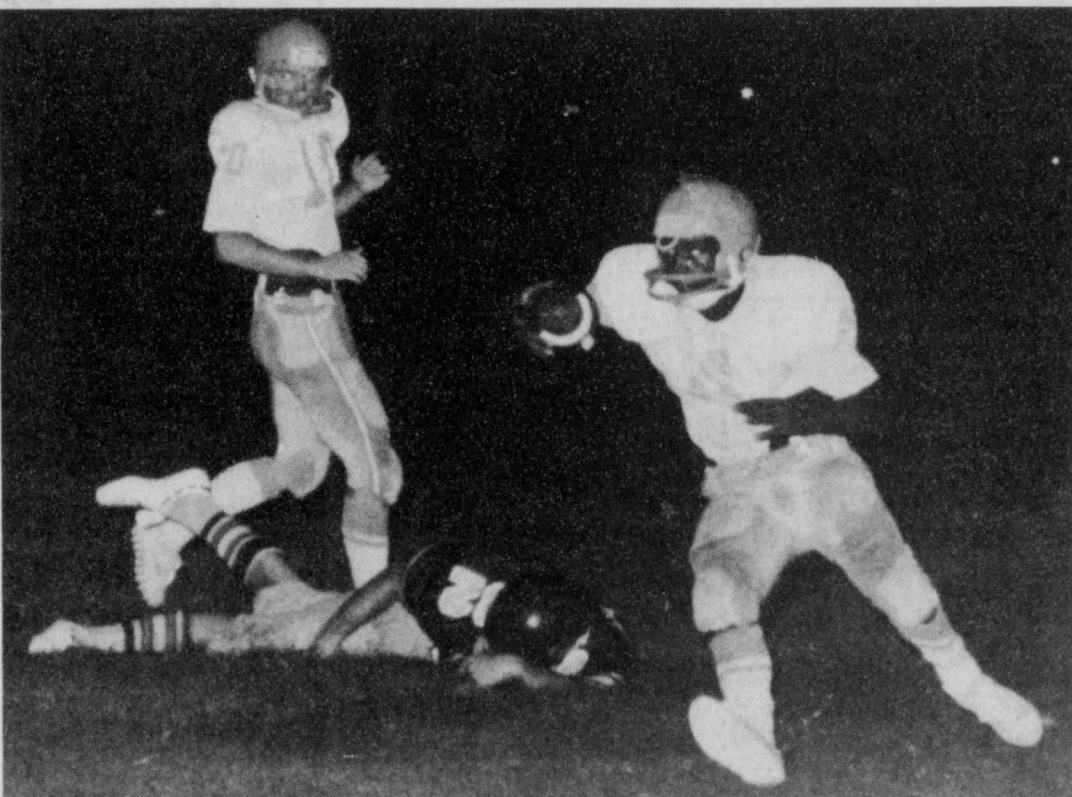

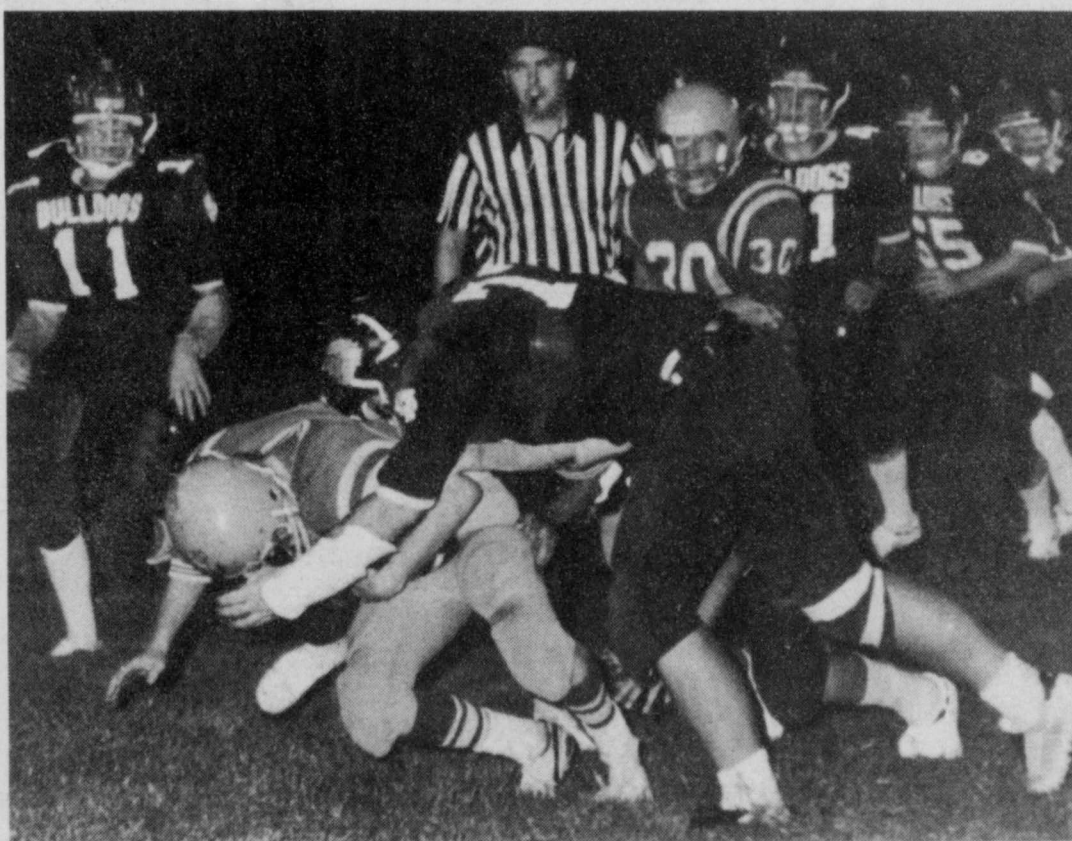

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 8, 1977

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 18)

S.J.R. 18 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for expanding the Court of Criminal Appeals from its current membership of five judges to nine judges and to permit the court to sit in panels of three judges.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment increasing the size of the Court of Criminal Appeals to nine judges, and permitting the court to sit in panels of three judges."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

S.J.R. 13 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances."

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 3)

Under current Texas law a person charged with a felony offense who has previously been convicted of two felony offenses may be denied bail. S.J.R. 3 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would also result in the denial of bail, for a limited time and subject to appeal, to a person accused of committing a felony while on bail for a prior felony for which the person has been indicted, or accused of a felony involving the use of

a deadly weapon after being convicted of a prior felony.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting denial of bail to a person charged with a felony offense who has been previously convicted of a felony offense, or charged with a felony offense committed while that person was admitted to bail on a prior felony indictment, or charged with a crime involving the use of a deadly weapon where there is evidence such person has been convicted of a prior felony offense; providing for a 60-day limit to that person's incarceration without trial; and providing for that person's right of appeal."

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 5)

S.J.R. 5 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the legislature to grant exemptions or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property designated for the preservation of cultural, historical or natural history resources.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 19)

S.J.R. 19 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the formation of associations authorized to collect certain refundable assessments from producers of poultry, livestock, and other raw agricultural or marine products and validating the 1967 law regarding the formation of such associations.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the formation of agricultural or marine associations which may mandate the collection of refundable assessments for improvement of production, marketing, or use of their products."

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

S.J.R. 49 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit the legislature to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking privileges by use of electronic devices or machines located at such places as may be provided by law and authorizes the sharing of such electronic devices or machines among banks on a reasonable, non-discriminatory basis.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking and discounting privileges by use of electronic devices or machines."

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 30)

S.J.R. 30 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and making several changes in its powers and procedures. The most significant change would authorize the Commission to suspend from office judges and justices under indictment.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct, and relating to the powers and proceedings of the commission, a master, and the supreme court, or court of civil appeals justices serving in place of the supreme court, for the suspension, censure, removal, or involuntary retirement of a justice, judge, or justice of the peace under certain circumstances."

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
