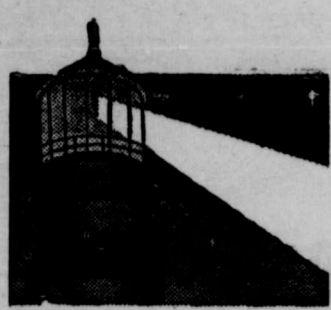




On The BEAM

This week we are going to let you rest from reading our stuff. Instead we are quoting from an editorial by Ernest Joiner in the Ralls Banner:

"I don't suppose there's a Ralls citizen of certified Aryan descent who would admit to a single racial prejudice in his superior psyche. But I have come to a reluctant conclusion that most Rallites have more than a passing contempt for people with different skin pigment. What is it that makes a polyglot American gaze down his nose at a person with Indian blood eludes me. The Indian is the only 100% American on earth. The self-styled 100% White American is an indiscriminate mixture of English, French, Scotch, Irish, German, Polish and a few other nationalities better unfettered. And withal he looks with benign contempt upon people whose racial background is at least traceable! As an example of what I mean, I have in mind Mrs. T. C. Levertown, who is one-quarter Choctaw Indian, and proud of it. Certain grand dames of the community have for eight years given her the deep freeze treatment because they think she's Mexican! Mrs. Levertown also has one of the most beautiful complexions I've ever seen, and it didn't come out of any cosmetic kit, either. She inherited it. Her ancestors weren't debtors, criminals and freebooters who came to America for a variety of reasons. They were on hand to welcome them to Oklahoma. Her ancestors have kicked more unmitigated hell out of landgrabbing, cattle-rustling poor polyglot American white trash than any other race of people. Instead of snubbing this woman, the community should be proud to know her. She shouldn't be slighted at PTA meetings, which she finally decided not to attend because of the 'strained feeling' she created. They shouldn't stare at her fair-skinned, blond haired children as if to suggest she didn't come by them honestly. I found Mrs. Levertown friendly, charming, and a good conversationalist when we met in a grocery store this week. One of the clerks told me later she was one of the 'most gracious ladies' he has ever met. Folks do pass up some fine opportunities to meet genuine, interesting people, and to form lasting friendships—all because mongrelized A-American caucasians of dubious extraction need somebody they can be 'superior' to."

It is expected to take \$5 working days.

Other Disability Pay No Offset To Social Security Pay

Disabled workers who have not applied for social security disability benefits because they are receiving disability payments from another Federal agency, or under a State Workmen's Compensation program, should get in touch with their local social security office without delay.

Under the law in effect prior to August 1958, a worker's social security disability payment was reduced by the amount of any other disability benefit he received under a State Workmen's Compensation program, or from another Federal agency. In a number of cases this meant that no social security disability payment could be made. As a result, many workers who would not have benefited by the "disability freeze" did not file a claim. These workers should check with their local social security office not later than August 31, 1959, Tulley emphasized today.

Two F. M. Road Contracts Let To Cage Brothers Of San Antonio

Contract for the construction of 13.5 miles of FM roads in Mitchell and Nolan counties has been let by the State Highway Department to Cage Brothers of San Antonio.

The construction includes 4.8 miles on FM Highway 1982 in Mitchell and Nolan Counties on a low bid of \$67,242.81. Construction of grading, structures, base, and surfacing from FM 644 to Nolan County line, and from the Mitchell County line to US 84, is expected to take 70 working days, according to J. C. Roberts, District Highway Engineer at Abilene.

Homer Ray, Resident Engineer at Snyder will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

35,000 Veterans To Get Dividend On Ins.

A special dividend of \$4,000,000 will be paid this year to 35,000 National Service Life Insurance policyholders who carried the \$5 total disability income provision, the Veterans Administration said today.

This provision provides the insured veteran a monthly income of \$5 per month for each \$1,000 of insurance in force in the event he becomes totally disabled, and costs him an additional premium.

Payments will start in July and eligible to receive the dividend are those veterans whose disability rider was in force on December 31, 1958. The amount of the dividend will depend on the age group, plan and number of months the insurance was in force, the VA explained.

Because their group has not accumulated any surplus, those who were issued disability riders prior to January 1, 1950, by virtue of waiver of good health requirements due to service-incurred disability, will not participate in this special dividend.

VA officials pointed out that there are more than 5,000,000 veterans eligible to apply for disability insurance benefits. Information and rate schedules can be obtained at any VA office.

Gin Moisture Meter Preserves Fiber Qual.

College Station, July 25 A moisture meter can be used in the gin, on the gin yard and in the field as an aid to preservation of fiber quality during the cotton harvesting and ginning season, reports Fred C. Elliott, extension cotton work specialist.

Use of the moisture meter on lint slide samples in the gin will give the information needed to adjust drying, he says. The goal should be to gin cotton at five to seven percent lint moisture for best quality preservation.

Numerous tests in the USDA Ginning Laboratories show that to this moisture level gives a smooth sample and allows proper cleaning. Overdrying should be avoided, Elliott cautions.

At a number of gins in Texas last year, the growers made money by cooperating with the ginner in a seed cotton grouping program. Elliott says a moisture meter was used to determine the moisture content of the seed cotton in the trailers. Then, the trailers were grouped on the gin lot according to moisture and trash content, or method of harvesting. This plan enables the ginner to take the time lag out of adjusting drying equipment for groups of bales and the grower receives more benefit from improvements in gin machinery, he adds.

A moisture meter can also be used in the field to avoid harvesting cotton too damp. This practice, says the specialist, will be helpful this year with the anticipated increase in machine harvesting. Last year there were 1831 spindle pickers in 78 counties in Texas and 26,692 stripper harvesters in 133 counties, saving the growers \$50,000,000. All indications point to a big increase in machine harvesting in 1959. Machine harvesting has brought many benefits to the cotton industry, but has also presented problems in quality preservation.

However, Elliott adds, these problems can be overcome by proper care or adjustment of machines and not operating too early or late in the day in damp or wet cotton. For further information, obtain a copy of bulletin 297, "Keep Cotton Dry, Loose and Clean" from your county agent.

Neal Wilcox, who was elected coach here earlier, has been inducted into the Army.

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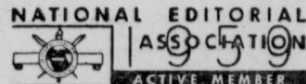

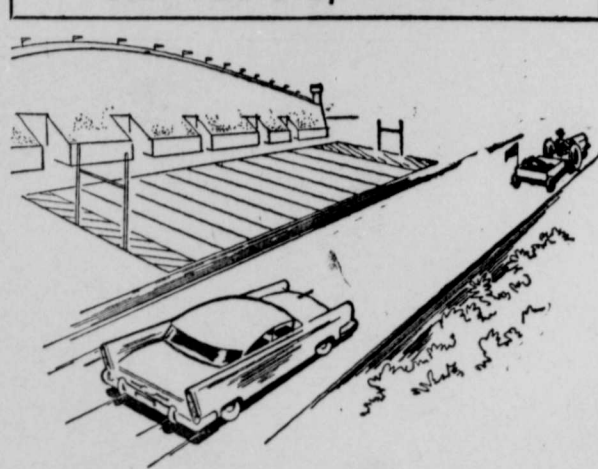

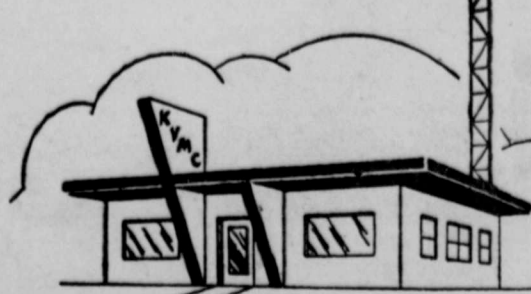

What's new in the animal kingdom? Animal air conditioning, that's what! Researchers have taken one of mankind's greatest boons to comfort and have begun cooling plants and animals for greater profit. It has been a known fact for many years that the hot Texas summers slow growth and production rates of farm animals. But the difference in just a few degrees of temperature will mean a more rapid growth rate which

increase farm income. According to preliminary research studies, hens kept in cool chicken houses not only lay larger, Tougher eggs but they also produce up to twice as many. In addition, a "heat struck" hen may consume up to 4 pounds of feed in her efforts to produce a dozen eggs. But when kept cool and comfortable, the hen needs only about 2.66 pounds of feed per dozen. The air conditioned chicken house also increases flock pro-

duction. Eight percent more of the setting hens' eggs hatch in a cool house. Chick mortality falls and the house itself can accommodate 15% more chickens comfortably, reports show.

Pigs and cattle respond equally well to cooler quarters in the summertime. If pigs are kept at 70 degrees, they reach a marketable weight in one-fourth the time needed at 90 degrees. And they consume a total of only one-third as much food.

When cattle are kept cool, they gain up to half-pound more per day and give more milk, according to research tests.

Air conditioning trials in greenhouses reveal that plants respond equally well. Plants need light, air water and heat for growth but in correct proportion. The blazing Texas heat often retards plants in the hottest months.

Cooling green houses thus can double the growing rates of marketable flowers and vegetables, researchers claim. The experiments have been conducted by the American Society of Heating and Air Conditioning Engineers. The organization is developing systems for cooling farm buildings for an operating cost of under \$5 per month which would require investments of under \$500.

Veterans News

Q. I was in the Army during the Korean War, and have just recently been discharged. What is my deadline for starting training under the Korean GI Bill?

A. You must begin your training within three years from the date of your discharge or separation.

Q. Who is supposed to apply for War Orphans schooling, the prospective student or his living parent?

A. If the prospective student is under legal age, his parent or guardian must apply in his behalf. If he is of age, and has no known legal disability, he may apply on his own.

Q. I will be taking on-the-job training under the Korean GI Bill this fall. Is there any limit on my training wages?

A. There is no limit on how much you may earn. However, when your earnings plus your GI allowance exceed \$310 a month, VA is required by law to scale down your training allowance to bring the total within the \$310 ceiling.

Q. A friend of mine tells me that on his private company life insurance policy changing beneficiaries may require the consent of a person already named as beneficiary. Is that necessary with GI insurance?

A. No. If you wish to change the beneficiaries of your GI insurance policy, the present beneficiaries need not be notified.
