CLEVELAND, O., Nov. 26 (AP)—Three aviators and two passengers were killed in week-end crashes, probable victims of blinding snow flurries in Ohio's first storm of the season.
Edwin H. Bassett, a pilot for the Universal Air Lines of Chicago, Mrs. Bassett and Glen R. Butt of Cleveland were found dead in the wreckage of an eight-passenger monoplane near Edgerton, O. The ill-fated landing ended Mr. and Mrs. Bassett's plans to celebrate their eighth wedding anniversary in Chicago.

GALE DISRUPTS EUROPEAN SHIPPING

VESSELS HARD HIT AS STORM RAGES IN FURY

21 VESSELS REPORTED AS MISSING; RADIO PLEAS FILL AIR
(By Associated Press)
LONDON, Nov. 26.—A gale of four days duration was sweeping the coasts of Western Europe, the Mediterranean and Africa today and taking a heavy toll of shipping. No less than 21 ships appeared on Lloyd's lists as wrecks or in distress over the week-end.
The air was full of radio calls of distress from vessels in peril. Lifeboats and tugs were doing gallant service on all coasts and the toll of those rescued from threatened ships was far greater than the losses.
Casualties ashore were less numerous than might have been expected. Advances from several centers merely stated "many were injured" or "numbers were injured." Damage to property was great.
Slight Encouragement Seen
Forecast for today did not encourage hope of immediate improvement in the weather.
There was considerable doubt as to the fate of the 1,700-ton steamer Arnabal-Mendi of Bilbao, Spain. The Marselles wireless picked up this wireless message from the Cape Major station: "Received S O S from Arnabal-Mendi five miles east of Cape Machichaco, Spain. Ship does not reply to any of our calls." The Admiral Poncy, 6,000-ton freighter, was waterlogged thirty miles west of Ushant Light, France, and latest advices from here was she had sixteen feet of water in her forward hold. MANY ATTEND ANNUAL SHOOT

BATTERY C CONDUCTS YEARLY PRACTICE DURING SUNDAY
Several hundred persons witnessed the third annual firing of Battery 131st Field Artillery, which was held at the H. L. Johnston ranch, 14 miles east of the city.

LINDY TURNS UP SAFELY AT SAN ANTONIO FIELD

FEARS FOR WELFARE OF FLIER PROVE TO BE WITHOUT BASIS
(By Associated Press)
SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Nov. 26.—Col Charles A. Lindbergh, for whom a 24-hour period of public concern was felt until late last night, prepared today to hop off in his plane with New York his destination.
The Colonel slipped quietly into San Antonio yesterday afternoon, having flown directly from Tampico, Mexico. News of his arrival was not disseminated until 8 hours later and continuous efforts to learn his whereabouts were under way long after he had taxied his ship onto Kelly Field.
Late Saturday night, Texas and Northern Mexico began an anxious lookout for the flier, for reports then were that he had left Tampico, Mexico, near which he had been on a hunting party with friends, in the afternoon to fly back to the United States by way of Brownsville.
Two nations barely suppressed general alarm when the Fort Brown meteorological station at Brownsville reported sighting a ship, first flying northward, which it said, apparently suddenly developed motor trouble, turned back toward Mexico, and quickly was lost to view. LONDON, Nov. 26.—Increasing anxiety over the illness of King George was evident today in view of a rise in his temperature yesterday and or Saturday's statement that pleurisy continued to be a "prominent feature."
The official medical bulletin on King George's condition today said: "The king passed a restless night. A variability in the fever and the spread of the pleurisy must be expected at this stage of the illness."
Condition Less Satisfactory
The Daily Mail today expressed less satisfactory. While declaring that official bulletins were precisely accurate, the newspaper added: "But the illness as a whole must be borne in mind. Physicians know only too well that when there is beyond doubt a microbe as in the king's case, it must be overcome. Until it is routed the case cannot be said to be without danger."

Bettie Jo Wood, five-months-old daughter of E. C. Wood, 1925 Avenue F, employe of the Direct Mattress company here, met instant death at about 10:30 o'clock yesterday morning when the company's delivery truck in which she and her parents were riding collided with a light coupe at the corner of Main Street and Avenue L.
The little girl's head was crushed beneath the overturned truck after she had been barred from her mother's arms by the impact of the collision.
Mrs. Wood received slight scratches and bruises about the face and body but was released from the local hospital where she was carried shortly after the accident. Other occupants of the two cars were uninjured.
Littlefield Man Drove Car
J. M. Bridges, of Littlefield, was the driver of the other car. He was taken up by local officers, but was released following an investigation at a justice of the peace court. The accident was termed unavoidable. Both cars were badly smashed as result of the accident.
Mr. Wood was driving east on Main Street when the car he was attempting to pass made a sharp turn causing a collision with the delivery truck. The car was driven to the left and to collide with the Littlefield car.

Seventy Rescued; Home Destroyed

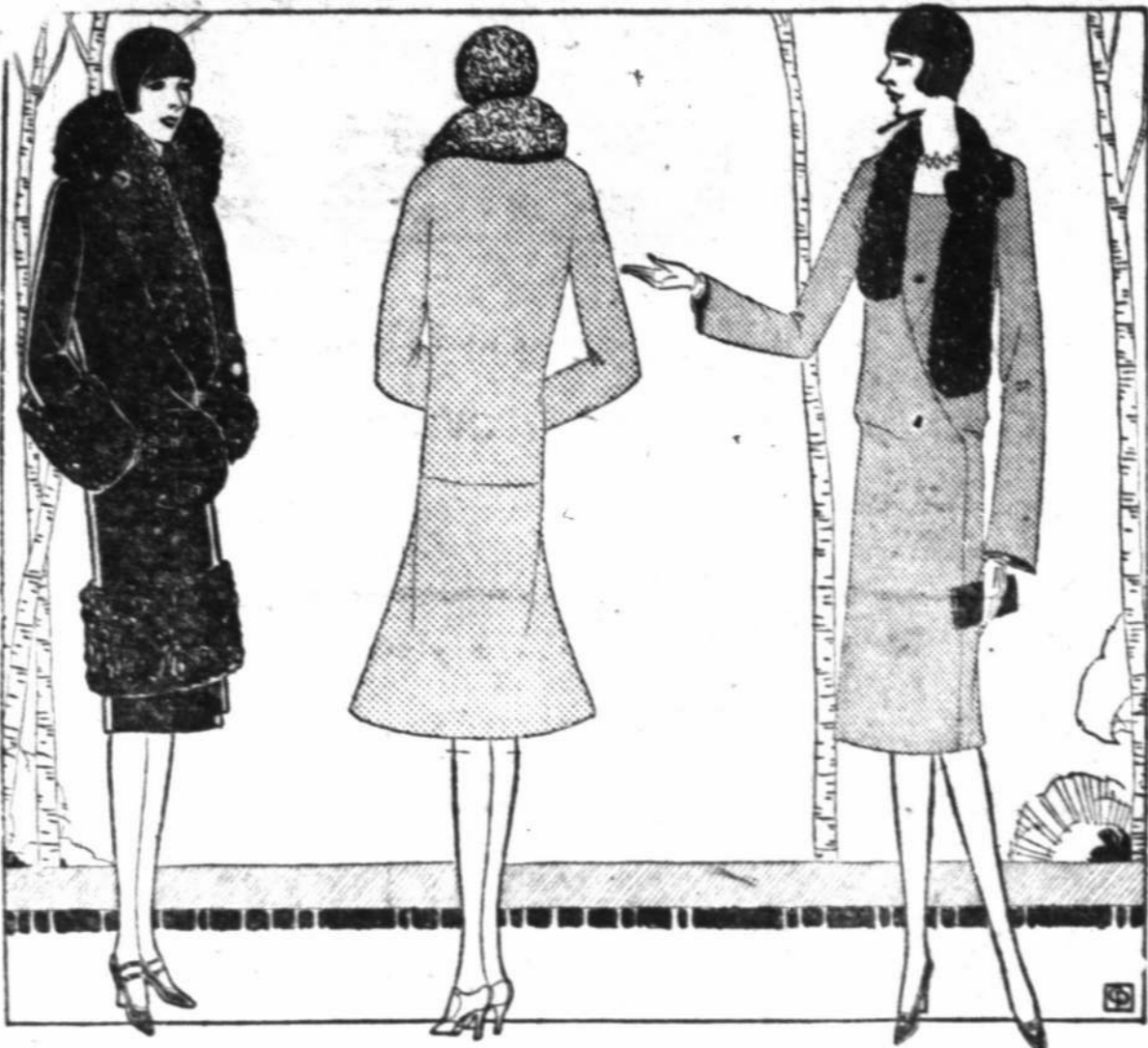

Answers To The Questions About The Road Bond Election In Lubbock County

Asked By Level Headed Voters

The following questions and answers explain the details of the Lubbock County Road Bond Election to be voted on next Saturday, Dec. 1, 1928.

The questions have been asked by various citizens, farmers and business men in Lubbock county, and the answers have been formed by the Publicity Committee of the Lubbock County Good Roads Association after consultation with the best authorities obtainable.

QUESTION NO. 2

What is the "Lubbock County Good Roads Association"?

ANSWER

The Lubbock County Good Roads Association is an organization of farmers and business men representing every school district and town in Lubbock county. Every school district has one Director, the towns of Idalou and Slaton each have three Directors, and the town of Lubbock has six Directors.

The Association was formed for the purpose of uniting the County in an effort, first, to secure as complete a system of hard surfaced roads as possible to serve the largest number of people in the County; second, to give every district representation in laying out these roads and seeing that they are built as proposed; and third, to promote a campaign to give the voters of Lubbock County the facts about what is proposed.

Should the proposed bond issue be voted on favorably on December 1st, the Association will continue to act until the roads are built as planned, working at all times directly with the Federal government, the State Highway Commission, and the Lubbock County Commissioners Court.

None of the officers or members of the Association receive any salary or pay of any kind.

QUESTION NO. 3

How is the Association's campaign financed?

ANSWER

The Lubbock Chamber of Commerce promoted the organization of the Lubbock County Good Roads Association as above outlined that every district and community in the County might have representation.

The Lubbock Chamber of Commerce is supported by dues paying members. It does not receive any support in any way from taxation.

The Chamber of Commerce is financing the educational campaign of the Lubbock County Good Roads Association, the purpose of the campaign being to give the voters of Lubbock County all the facts from the best authorities obtainable—to tell them the truth so that they will absolutely understand and comprehend what is proposed.

QUESTION NO. 4

How much will taxes be increased?

ANSWER

Experts have worked this matter out and are agreed that the tax rate at no time can be over 53c on the \$100.00 or \$5.30 on the \$1000.00 assessed valuation.

Bond buyers and bankers have checked this matter very carefully and are agreed that the bonds can be issued and sold so that the amount to be paid annually will be approximately the same amount each year.

The level tax table prepared by the esauthorities shows that \$115,810.00 will be paid the first year and \$119,700.00 the last year. Every year in between, the amounts to be paid will be between these two figures.

As a matter of fact, the taxes will never be this much because the bonds can be sold only as the money is needed, and

for the further reason that the assessed valuation of the County is increasing at the rate of nearly \$2,000,000.00 a year. At the present rate of increase in assessed valuations, the tax rate in something like twelve years should be only 28 1/2c on the \$100.00 or \$2.85 on the \$1000.00 assessed valuation.

If a State bond issue, as is proposed, carries, the State will immediately purchase from the counties their State and Federal aid highways, which will stop the tax payers of Lubbock County from paying the interest and principal on the bonds used to build State and Federal highways, which will, in turn, again virtually cut the above tax rate in one-half.

QUESTION NO. 5

What kind of roads will be built?

ANSWER

Engineers of the State Highway Department recommended the types of road needed in the proposed system to carry the traffic, and it is on their recommendations that the types of construction to be used are recommended by this Association.

For the State and Federal aid system the highest type of reinforced concrete roads are planned. For the County or market roads the highest type of macadam asphalt roads are planned.

The type of road planned for our County or market roads is the same type that is being built in a number of counties in Texas on the main State and Federal aid highway, with the approval and aid of the State and Federal governments, and for the amount of traffic that will be carried on these County roads this type is more than adequate to carry the traffic that will pass over them.

This type of construction should not be confused with cheap makeshift gravel or macadam roads that were built years ago in certain sections of the State without the asphalt wearing surface.

QUESTION NO. 6

What will the maintenance on the County Roads be?

ANSWER

The best engineering authorities tell us that these macadam asphalt roads can be maintained for less than it costs to maintain dirt roads.

Approximately \$138,708.35 will be collected in Lubbock County in 1928 for automobile licenses.

The State Highway Department will get \$74,074.77. The Lubbock County Commissioners get \$64,633.58.

The County fund is divided equally among the four Commissioners to be spent for maintenance.

15c of the County taxes goes to a County road and bridge fund that is paid equally to the four Commissioners for maintenance purposes. This gives the County nearly \$100,000.00 this year for maintenance—\$64,633.58 plus \$35,366.42 gives a total of \$99,768.58, to be exact.

As engineers are agreed that it will not cost as much to maintain the County or market roads when paved with macadam asphalt as it costs to maintain dirt roads, a certain amount of the above funds will be released for the better maintenance of other dirt roads in the various Commissioners' districts.

SOUTH CLAIMS MOST HONORS OVER NATION

TENNESSEE, FLORIDA AND GEORGIA TECH HOLD CLEAR SLATE

By ALLAN J. GOULD (Associated Press Sports Editor) NEW YORK, Nov. 25 (AP)—The throat-cutting tactics popularized this season in the Eastern and Western spheres of football, skimming leave the South today in position to claim more honors than any other sector of the fast-closing gridiron battle.

The spotless records of the Southern conference "Big Three"—Tennessee, Florida and Georgia Tech—stand out as a result of the sensations Saturday that either spoiled the perfect records or smashed the championship hopes of such teams as Carnegie, Wisconsin, Nebraska, Princeton, California and Ohio Wesleyan.

Detroit, Boston Unbeaten. The "Big Three" of Dixie do not stand alone. Detroit and Boston College each have won eight in a row. Tulsa is the only school that has scored on Detroit while Boston College has numbered the Navy, Fordham and Duke among its victims. The powerful Detroit army, however, must wait for the next Saturday to keep its slate clean while Boston College must overcome its old rival, Holy Cross. Neither assignment looks easy.

N. Y. U. Army Strangled. Even nine hours to date of these unbeaten teams cannot quite obscure performances of other arrays that happened to have one off or disastrous case. Army had its Notre Dame and New York University had its Georgetown, but if there were any stronger teams anywhere than the Cadets and Violets Saturday, or any greater individual performers than their respective ones, Red Cagle and Ken Strong, they weren't visible to the naked eye.

New York University and the Army still have strong far western foes to play before they start the final debate. The Violets play the Oregon Aggies here Thanksgiving Day while the Cadets meet Stanford Saturday.

Turkey Day Tests Loom. Thanksgiving Day also figures to furnish decisive tests in the Southern, Southwest, Rocky Mountain and Big Six conferences, as well as in the East where traditional rivals such as Pennsylvania, Penn State, Pittsburgh, Brown-Columbia and West Virginia-W & J. hold forth.

Georgia Tech meets Auburn and Florida encounters Washington & Lee in two Southern games that should see the two leaders continue along unbeaten. Texas, still setting the Southwest pace, runs into the Texas Aggies. Utah, on the Rocky Mountain peak, must dispose of the Utah Aggies to keep ahead of the University of Colorado. Nebraska is favored to beat Kansas Aggies and clinch the Big Six Conference title.

35,000 EXPECTED FOR TEXAS-AGGIE BATTLE

FEELING GROWS THAT FARMERS WILL SLIP UP ON LONGHORNS

(By Associated Press) DALLAS, Nov. 25.—The greatest crowd ever to witness a football game in Texas is expected to assemble in the Memorial Stadium at Austin Thursday for the annual difficulty between Texas University and the Texas Aggies.

Sitting up the advance sale and signs of interest otherwise manifest official are predicting that 35,000 paid admissions will witness the spectacle, incidentally dropping \$80,000 into the coffers of the two schools.

This year there is more to the contest than color. Fans will see the Southern Conference championship decided. Texas can win and gain undisputed hold on the title. A tie game would throw the Longhorns into a deadlock with Arkansas University. An aggie victory would send the title to Arkansas.

Two other conference rivalries scheduled for Turkey Day can have no bearing on the title. Owenby Stadium at Dallas will be thronged for the annual meeting of the Southern Methodist University Mustangs and Texas Christian University Horned Frogs, a rivalry which has grown almost as intense as that between Texas and the Aggies. There also will be a mob at Houston for the melee between Baylor University and Rice Institute.

Texas will close against Southwestern University at Memphis. The Razorback huskies have been pouring it on their smaller rivals in recent games and will be favored to trim Southwestern.

ILLINOIS GETS BIG TEN TITLE

MID-WEST STARTLED BY DAZZLING SERIES OF GRIDIRON UPSETS

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, Nov. 25.—The Big Ten football championship hunting was again nudged securely to the same old Illinois matinee today.

Strewn amongst the "also rans" were three other last minute contenders, Wisconsin, Iowa and Ohio State. Of the three, Wisconsin came the closest, finishing second, with a defeat and a tie to mar its record. Minnesota, which blasted Wisconsin's hopes with a 6 to 0 victory Saturday, was third.

It was a pair of upsets that gave Illinois the opportunity to win. Before final games, Wisconsin had a lead as it was undefeated. Only a tie with Purdue blemished its record. Illinois had lost to Michigan, Iowa had defeated Ohio State and Wisconsin had defeated Iowa. Thus a victory for Minnesota over Wisconsin, one for Michigan over Iowa and a triumph by Illinois over Ohio State was Illinois' only chance.

But that was exactly what happened. Minnesota defeated the Badgers, 6 to 0, in a thriller at Madison, Michigan's rejuvenated team walloped Iowa, 10 to 7, and Illinois outclassed Ohio State, 8 to 0.

GOOD WILL DOMINATES CABLE NEWS

TOURS DESTINED TO BRING BETTER FEELING ARE BEING MADE IN VARIOUS DIRECTIONS

Good will promises to be the dominant note in foreign news this week and probably for several weeks to come. Tours bearing that destination are being on in widely separated sections.

When Herbert Hoover started for his visits to South American neighbors of the United States, the Prince of Wales was pursuing an extensive "Empire Good Will" trip in South Africa.

Sir Eric Drummond, secretary general of the League of Nations, is due in Germany after a visit to Poland. This trip was undertaken with a view to informal conversations respecting some of the many border problems that involve Poland with Lithuania and Germany.

Other representatives of the League of Nations have started to China and Japan. On the surface they are concerned with economic problems but it is altogether probable the Geneva officials will come back with first hand information respecting the "incidents" which the eastern governments are discussing.

Japan and China Quarrel

These affairs grew out of fighting and rioting while the Civil War was raging in China. The contention between Japanese troops in Shantung is irksome to the Nanking Nationalists. They have made

with a sine qua non for continuing the negotiations.

Still another good will trip is the journey to the Dutch East Indies of Crown Prince Leopold of Belgium and his Swedish wife, Princess Astrid. They are to study Colonial policies which may be applicable to the Belgian Congo.

Germany is pursuing its preparations for the conference of experts who are to decide upon a new total for war reparations and perhaps a revision of the Dawes plan. Thus far exchanges with the reparations board have been in the nature of German ambassadors and the foreign departments of Great Britain, France, Italy, Belgium and Japan.

There has been no open hint of difficulty, but Germany deemed it necessary a few days ago to restate her belief that reparations should not be mingled with her demand for early evacuation of the Rhineland.

Freedom of Speech Stressed

Juliu Maniu, new premier of Rumania, is consolidating the political positions he recently gained by spreading the doctrine of freedom of speech and assembly.

In Hungary the old line monarchists have hailed as their king the 16-year-old Otto, son of the King Charles who was deposed at the end of the World War. They were warned by Count Stephen Bethlen, premier, to desist lest their agitation endanger good will between Hungary and her neighbors.

Airplane Seeking Record Is Smashed

ATHENS, Greece, Nov. 26 (AP)—The airplane Spirit of Australia, in which Captain Hurley and two companions have been attempting a record flight from Australia to England and return crashed today upon leaving a local airfield for France. Captain Hurley and one of his companions suffered concussion. The machine was badly damaged.

The liners Baltic, Antonio, Montclair, Demerara and Europides sailed after being held up over the week end.

The Italian tanker Lucania from Curacao which grounded in the river yesterday was refloated at midnight and was towed to her landing stage.

From southern England reports continued of blustery condition and passengers arriving at Dover, Folkestone and New Haven were notified that cross channel service had been suspended because the harbors at Ostend, Calais and Boulogne were unapproachable.

QUITAQUE BLAZE DOES BIG DAMAGE

AMARILLO, Texas, Nov. 26 (AP)—Reports received here today said a fire which originated in the Ozark Inn swept over the business district of Quitaque, southeast of here, destroying three brick structures and one frame building with an estimated loss of more than \$20,000.

Several volunteer firemen, including Jim Skell, who was trapped by falling g timbers, were reported injured.

Childress Slaying Case Is Continued

CHILDRESS, Tex., Nov. 26 (AP)—Trial of Spurgeon Clark, charged with the slaying April 30, last, of Jess Williams near Kirkland, which was transferred to Collingsworth county district court, was continued today until Dec. 17.

Defense counsel asked that the case be moved up on account of the illness of a witness.

A Mother

If an 18-year-old boy, arrested for robbery, should escape from jail and run home to his mother, you would hardly blame the mother if she should help him make his escape good. It would be easy to understand how her love could overbalance her knowledge that he really ought to pay for his crime.

But an Illinois youth of that age, jailed in Kentucky for robbery, escaped and went home—and his mother sent him back to jail. He reappeared at the jail a day or so later, saying his mother had told him to return and "take his medicine" and lead a better life thereafter.

That young man's mother evidently was a lady of considerable strength of character. She refused to give way to unwisdom when she could have been easily excused for doing so.

The Vote

Virtually complete election returns show that a little more than 55 per cent of the nation's qualified voters went to the polls on election day.

The vote was larger than ever before in history, and the percentage of the electorate that voted was larger than it has been in many years. Still, 55 per cent seems rather small.

The recent campaign stirred people as has no campaign in decades. Yet 45 per cent of the people who could have voted did not bother to do so. What is the matter with us, anyway, that we are so apathetic? Is it prosperity making us too contented?

We are entitled to rejoice over the size of the recent vote; but there is no harm in making ourselves realize that it should have been a lot bigger.

Bond Issues

American tax-payers seem to have lost their traditional fear of big bond issues.

In the last election Missouri voted \$75,000,000 for good roads. Iowa voted \$100,000,000 for the same purpose. Kansas also voted for a new state road system. Other states followed suit with smaller amounts.

This is highly important. The automobile and hard-surfaced roads have done more than any other thing to knit our country together. Every dollar spent for good roads is a dollar spent for the further unification and development of the nation. The result of the votes on these huge bond issues indicates that the voters have come to realize that.

High speed airplanes, travelling 2,000 miles without a stop at 100 miles an hour, will shorten the air-mail time between England and India by 11 days, if the Air Ministry approves plans now under consideration.
