## Garden Club Gives Schedule And Rules for Flower Show

Mrs. C. E. May Jr. and Mrs. Sam Ailes, general chairmen, have given the following schedule and list of rules for the Spring Flower Show to be held May 3 at the Community Clubhouse. The Flower Show is sponsored by the Ranger Garden Club.

- Rules**
1. Each member of Ranger Garden Club is required to enter at least one class. Exhibitors are limited to one entry in each class but may enter in many classes as desired.
  2. All entries in Artistic Design must be registered with Mrs. Robert Allen by 5:00 p.m. on May 2.
  3. Each exhibitor is responsible for registering and placing her entry in the proper class between hours of 8:30 to 10:30 on May 3.
  4. Entries must remain until the close of the show.
  5. Florist flowers will be permitted unless otherwise specified.
  6. All entries in the Artistic Division must be made by the exhibitor.
  7. Potted plants must be registered and placed at the Club House between 2:00 and 5:00 May 2. All such entries must have been in possession of exhibitor for 3 months.
  8. Green glass containers must be furnished by entrants for all Horticulture specimens. Each specimen must be labeled as to variety.
  9. In each class a blue ribbon will be awarded for first place, red ribbon for second place, yellow ribbon for third place, and white for honorable mention. Tri-colors will be awarded where merited.
  10. A Sweepstakes Trophy will be awarded to the member in good standing of the Ranger Garden Club who wins the most blue ribbon points. Blue ribbon points are collected as follows: Blue, 5 points; Red, 3 points; and Tricolor, 15 points. Red ribbon points will be considered only in case of a tie.

# County Schools' P.E. Classes Not Rounded

## Classroom Shortage Is No Problem Here

Failure of Eastland County's nine school districts to provide well rounded physical education classes has been remarked by the Eastland County Hale - Aiken Committee as the most noticeable failure on the part of county schools.

This was evident following the Committee's final report Thursday at a meeting held in the Eastland High School cafeteria.

Also evident, however, was the fact that Eastland County does not have a classroom shortage. In the state the shortage of classrooms ranks second only to the shortage of qualified teachers as the number one problem facing schools. Reason for Eastland County's plentiful supply of classrooms stems from the fact that this county—during the oil boom—constructed schools with adequate space to allow for future growth.

Following the boom, the county's population leveled off, leaving all of the districts with more than enough classrooms.

Four sub-committee reports were made at the meeting. Wendell Siebert of Eastland gave the School Program Committee report; Floyd Killingsworth of Ranger the Teacher Supply Committee report; W. C. Browning of Gorman the School Construction Committee report; and Tom Wilson of Eastland the Finance Committee report.

School districts participating in the county-wide study were Eastland, Ranger, Cisco, Gorman, Rising Star, Olden, Carbon, Deedemona and Strawn. Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins of Eastland served as county chairman, Mrs. Richard Donovan of Cisco as secretary, Virgil E. Moore of Eastland as publicity chairman and H. R. (Pop) Garrett, county school superintendent, as consultant to the county committee.

The School Program committee reported, in answering 60 questions put to them by the State Hale - Aiken Committee of 24, which will compile all county reports and make a state report to the State Legislature, that some districts in the county to some extent do combine elementary grades under one teacher. The majority report was that this method of teaching was satisfactory, however, since the number of pupils in such classes was small.

The committee found: (1) that all high schools in the county meet minimum requirements for graduation; (2) that all districts meet the state requirements concerning number of teachers required; (3) that only four of the county's schools are members of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, but that membership in the Association was of little benefit; (4) that a longer period of time in school would not result in a better instructional program; (5) that the county's handicapped children have inadequate training; (6) that adequate administrative staffs are lacking in most county schools; (7) that in some cases classes are so small that full utilization is not made of the teaching staff; (8) that textbooks are adequate and that high school libraries have plentiful supplies of books, but that elementary school libraries are inadequate; and (9) that schools in some cases do not provide laboratories for subjects requiring them.

The committee recommended that drivers education courses be offered in all districts, with the state paying for the additional teachers needed and the local districts paying the costs of equipment.

It also reported a lack of programs making films and tape recordings available to schools.

**Teacher Supply**  
A survey made by the Teacher Supply committee showed that 10 percent of school seniors plan to attend college to prepare to teach. Of the 339 students who filled out the committee's questionnaire, 254 announced they planned to teach. Main reason given for wanting to teach was the enjoyment of working with children. On the other hand, 132 students answering the questions put to them said they would not teach because of pay, and 177 said they didn't think they would enjoy teaching.

The committee reported only two teaching positions open, but said that some 39 teachers would be needed if all essential instruction and educational services not now offered were taught.

The committee said it felt full utilization of teacher personnel in the county was being made. It pointed to housing, social relationships and pay as reasons for not attracting more young teachers to the county.

## Douglas Rogers Wins Tractor Driving Contest

Douglas Rogers, a member of the Ranger chapter of the Future Farmers of America, placed first in the County FFA Tractor Driving Contest, held in Eastland Thursday, April 24.

Douglas will compete in Comanche Tuesday, April 29, in the district contest. If he should win the district contest, he would be eligible to compete with winners of eleven other districts in the state finals contest in San Antonio this summer at the State FFA Convention.

This contest is sponsored by the Ford Tractor Dealers of Texas and the county contest was sponsored by the Perkins Implement Company of Eastland.

The county and district winners receive trophies while the state winners will receive a new 1958 Ford tractor. Second place winner in the state contest will receive a seventeen jewel wrist watch. The third place winner will receive a fifteen jewel wrist watch.

Rogers, scoring 2769 points out of a possible 3090 points, won over chapter representatives from Eastland, Cisco, Clyde, Cross Plains, and Eula.

## P-TA to Sponsor Health Roundup

A pre-school health roundup will be held at the Recreation Building Thursday, May 1, at 1 p.m.

Free smallpox vaccinations will be given to children who have not previously been vaccinated. Medical, dental, and eye examinations will be given on that day only. All children who will enter elementary schools next September should be present.

The roundup is sponsored by the Parent Teacher Association of Hodges Oak Park and Young elementary schools.

We owed on the courthouse when I became county judge \$150,000. We have paid off and have the money in the bank to pay all but \$10,000.

You can see that Eastland County is better off financially than it has been in years and years.

This has all been accomplished without the assistance of any out of county delinquent tax collectors.

I now feel that with the continuation of this program, Eastland County can be free of all bonded indebtedness within the very near future.

A minimum pay scale of \$4200 and a maximum of \$6000 was suggested, and it was recommended that teachers be allowed to participate in social security as well as their own retirement program.

The committee urged better utilization of present teaching staffs by providing teacher helpers or clerical assistants. Qualified laymen should be used to conduct classes in their special fields, it was reasoned. And in-service education program should be required of all teachers, the committee reported.

**School Construction**

The school construction committee reported that overall the county generally has a plentiful supply of classrooms.

The Rising Star District plans a new band hall and agricultural building and the Eastland District has a new elementary school, as a replacement unit, in the planning stage. Otherwise, no building programs are being planned.

The committee voted against a school construction program.

**Public's Aid Sought**

Mrs. Perkins urged the general public to feel free to make recommendations to the county committee. Such recommendations, she said, would be included in the county report, but she pointed out they should be made immediately.

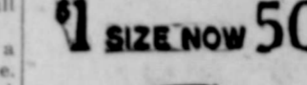

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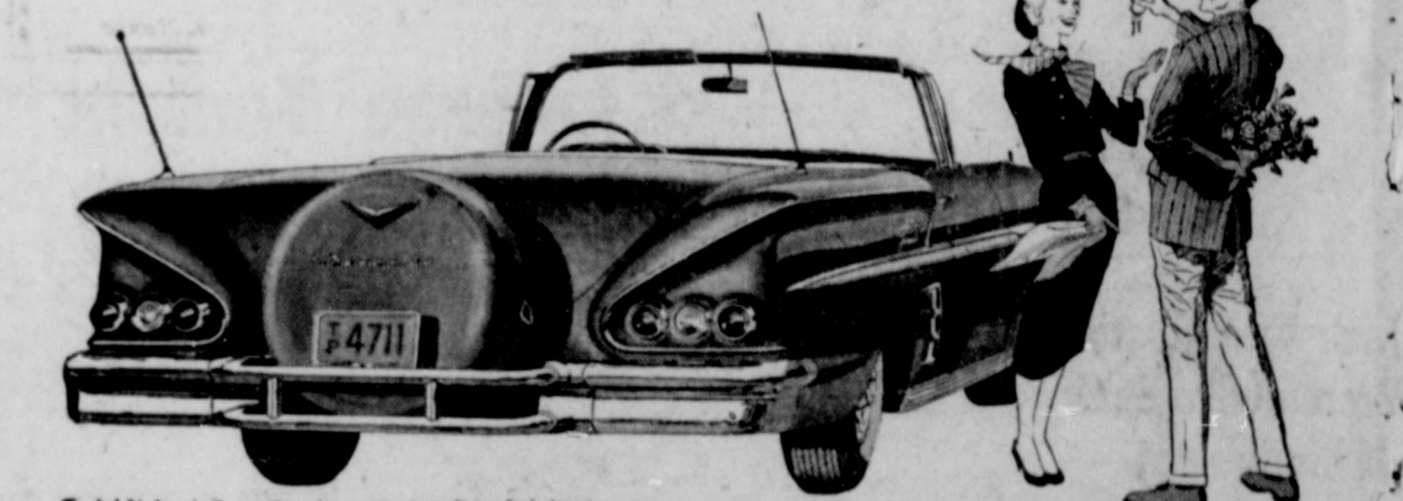

## Judge Hart Lists Platform In Bid For Re-Election

County Judge John Hart Saturday made his formal statement in behalf of his candidacy for re-election. The statement:

In making my announcement for re-election as County Judge of Eastland County, I wish to express my heartfelt thanks and deep appreciation for the confidence you have shown me in the past by trusting me with the duties of county judge, one of the most important offices of your County Government.

I shall always be grateful to my many friends and the people of Eastland County who have been so loyal and helpful to me since I became your county judge, and too, I deeply appreciate the fine cooperation shown me as county judge by the members of the Commissioners Court and the other officials, their deputies and the lawyers of the county.

When I became County Judge your County was indebted to the tune of \$708,190.

On Jan. 1 this year the County was in debt only \$270,336.40. The County had in cash when I became County Judge \$249,675.20.

The County had in cash Jan. 1, 1958 \$356,684.21.

When I became county judge we had in the Road and Bridge fund (including the four Commissioners' precinct funds) \$69,012.26. On Jan. 1 this year 1958 we had in the Road and Bridge fund \$476,995.55 (including the four Commissioners' precinct funds).

We owed, on the courthouse when I became county judge \$150,000. We have paid off and have the money in the bank to pay all but \$10,000.

You can see that Eastland County is better off financially than it has been in years and years.

This has all been accomplished without the assistance of any out of county delinquent tax collectors.

I now feel that with the continuation of this program, Eastland County can be free of all bonded indebtedness within the very near future.

As budget officer, in preparing the budget each year, my chief aim has been to balance expenditures with collections, and to allot the funds to the several services on the basis of actual need for each service to be performed.

As county judge I have done my very best to help the elderly people of our county, especially the ones who are surviving on what little pension check they receive. We have helped them with medical aid, hospital care and also other people of our county who are less fortunate than we.

Since I have become county judge and chairman of the Commissioner's Court, we have helped our ex-soldier boys and their families every way that we could and by the appointment of County

## Classroom Shortage Is No Problem Here

Failure of Eastland County's nine school districts to provide well rounded physical education classes has been earmarked by the Eastland County Hale - Aiken Committee as the most noticeable failure on the part of county schools.

This was evident following the Committee's final report Thursday at a meeting held in the Eastland High School cafeteria.

Also evident, however, was the fact that Eastland County does not have a classroom shortage. In the state the shortage of classrooms ranks second only to the shortage of qualified teachers as the number one problem facing schools. Reason for Eastland County's plentiful supply of classrooms stems from the fact that this county—during the oil boom—constructed schools with adequate space to allow for future growth. Following the boom, the county's population leveled off, leaving all of the districts with more than enough classrooms.

Four sub-committee reports were made at the meeting. Wendell Siebert of Eastland gave the School Program Committee report; Floyd Killingsworth of Ranger the Teacher Supply Committee report; W. C. Browning of Gorman the School Construction Committee report; and Tom Wilson of Eastland the Finance Committee report.

School districts participating in the county-wide study were Eastland, Ranger, Cisco, Gorman, Rising Star, Olden, Carbon, Desdemona and Seranton. Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins of Eastland served as county chairman, Mrs. Richard Donovan of Cisco as secretary, Virgil E. Moore of Eastland as publicity chairman and H. R. (Pop) Garrett, county school superintendent, as consultant to the county committee.

**School Program**

The School Program committee reported, in answering 60 questions put to them by the State Hale - Aiken Committee of 24, which will compile all county reports and make a state report to the State Legislature, that some districts in the county to some extent do combine elementary grades under one teacher. The majority report was that this method of teaching was satisfactory, however, since the number of pupils in such classes was small.

The committee found: (1) that all high schools in the county meet minimum requirements for graduation; (2) that all districts meet the state requirements concerning number of teachers required; (3) that only four of the county's schools are members of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, but that membership in the Association was of little benefit; (4) that a longer period of time in school would not result in a better instructional program; (5) that the county's handicapped children have inadequate training; (6) that adequate administrative staffs are lacking in some county schools; (7) that in some cases classes are so small that full utilization is not made of the teaching staffs; (8) that textbooks are adequate and that high school libraries have plentiful supplies of books, but that elementary school libraries are inadequate; and (9) that schools in some cases do not provide laboratories for subjects requiring them.

The committee recommended that drivers education courses be offered in all districts, with the state paying for the additional teachers needed and the local districts paying the costs of equipment.

It also reported a lack of programs making films and tape recordings available to schools.

**Teacher Supply**

A survey made by the Teacher Supply committee showed that 10 percent of school seniors plan to attend college to prepare to teach. Of the 339 students who filled out the committee's questionnaire, 34 announced they planned to teach. Main reason given for wanting to teach was the enjoyment of working with children. On the other hand, 132 students answering the questions put to them said they would not teach because of pay, and 177 said they didn't think they would enjoy teaching.

The committee reported only ten teaching positions open, but said that some 39 teachers would be needed if all essential instruction and educational services not now offered were taught.

The committee said it felt full utilization of teacher personnel in the county was being made. It pointed to housing, social relationships and pay as reasons for not attracting more young teachers to the county.

A minimum pay scale of \$4200 and a maximum of \$6000 was suggested, and it was recommended that teachers be allowed to participate in social security as well as their own retirement program.

The committee urged better utilization of present teaching staffs by providing teacher helpers or clerical assistants. Qualified laymen should be used to conduct classes in their special fields, it was reasoned. And in-service education program should be required of all teachers, the committee reported.

**School Construction**  
The school construction committee reported that overall the county generally has a plentiful supply of classrooms.

The Rising Star District plans a new band hall and agricultural building and the Eastland District has a new elementary school, as a replacement unit, in the planning stage. Otherwise, no building programs are being planned.

year-round school with staggered vacation periods. It reported that under present legal structure school districts in the county would have to pay off outstanding bonds before being able to provide needed additional classrooms.

**Finance**
