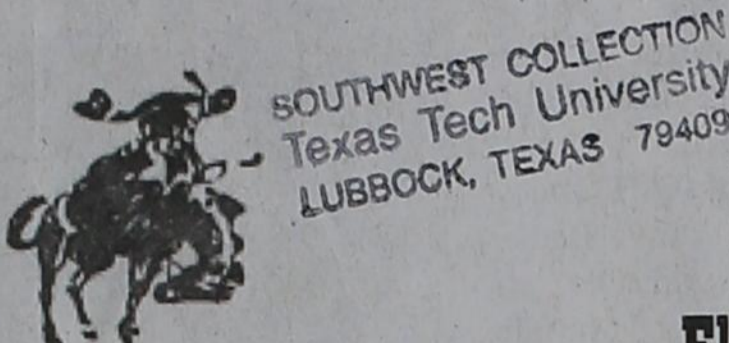

Star Awards were given to youth that completed a record book and meet criteria for each star award. The star awards are a series of awards showing progression of the 4-Hers involvement, including growth and diversification of both the 4-Her and their projects. The series begins with the Bronze Star, Silver Star, I Dare You Award and ultimately ending with the Gold Star. Each award may only be received once by a 4-H member.

The Bronze Star is to honor junior 4-H members for their outstanding achievements in 4-H, recipients must be between

the ages of 8-10 years of age and completed at least one year in 4-H. This year's Bronze Star winners were Emma Hackler and Colton Martin.

The Silver Star is to honor intermediate 4-H members for their outstanding accomplishments in 4-H, recipients must be between the ages of 11-13 years of age and completed at least two years in 4-H. This year's Silver Star winners were Chloe Gleghorn and Wyatt Hackler.

The I Dare You Award is given to senior 4-H members as recognition of excellence in character and well-balanced development as well as demonstrating leadership skills. The 4-H member must be between the ages of 15-19 years of age and have completed at least three years of 4-H. The I Dare You recipients will receive a personalized certificate along with a copy of William Danforth's classic motivational book "I Dare You" and are eligible to apply for the "I Dare You" scholarship. This year's I Dare You recipients were Cassidy Turner and Seth Baxter.

The Gold Star Award is the highest 4-H award at the county level and will be awarded only once in a member's 4-H career. Recipients must be between the ages of 15-19 years of age and competed at least three years in 4-H. This year's Gold Star Winner was Austin Taylor.

Each year, the Motley 4-H Club presents a Friend Of 4-H award to an individual, family or business who has contributed to the 4-H program. This is always a very difficult decision because so many people contribute so much to the program. This year's Friend of 4-H award was given to Stafford Catering (David and Cynthia Stafford) and Trent Willmon.

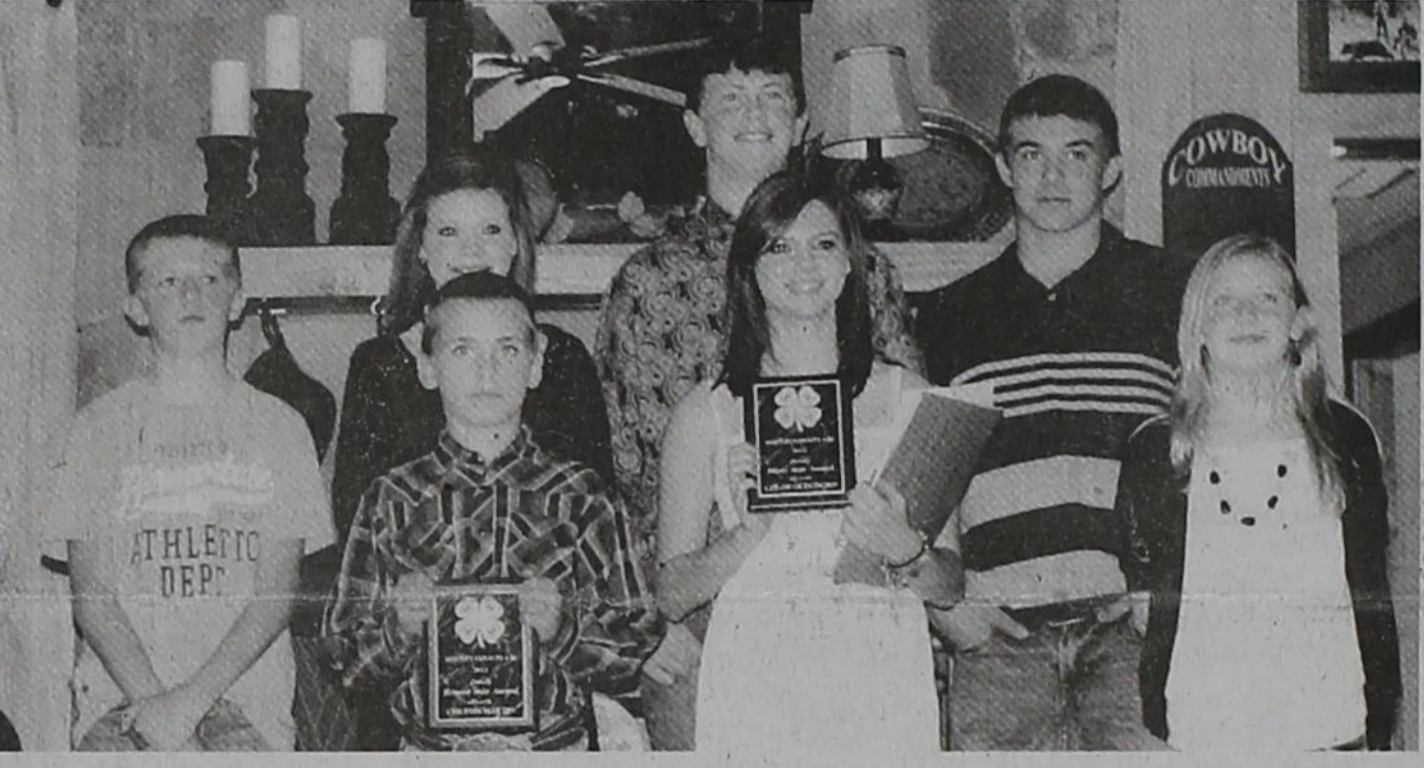

Market Matador President resigns

Linda Roy, President of Market Matador, Inc has resigned from the board. When asked for her reason for resigning she stated that she had no comment.

MMI was formed in 2001 to promote state and local economic development, stimulate business and commercial activity in Matador and acquire abandoned properties for the purpose of getting them back on the tax rolls.

At the Aug. 20, 2012 board meeting members voted to pursue the reinstatement of its non-profit status, which the organization lost in 2011 for failure to file an IRS Form 990 for three consecutive years, according to the IRS. The Form 990 is an annual reporting return that provides information to the IRS on a non-profit organization's mission, programs and finances. Currently, the IRS does not

from the SWCD. Whether you own a city lot and want to plant a privacy hedge line, or you have several acres and are interested in creating a windbreak or shelterbelt, now is the time!

The program offers a variety of evergreens and hardwoods, but supplies are limited. You are encouraged to place your order early to take advantage of the best selection. Orders can be placed from now until Friday, February 8, 2013. Once all the orders are in, the seedlings will be available for pickup Thursday, February 14, 2013. Museum Hosts QPT Meeting

The Knox County Wichita-Brazos Museum hosted the Quannah Parker Trail (QPT) meeting in Benjamin on Oct. 19, 2012. Marisue Potts chaired the meeting that featured updates from QPT committee members and reports from Texas Plains Trails Region board members. Dr. Holle Humphries provided slides and narration for the marker dedications at each of the locations.



was one of the first to be placed, amid fanfare and a celebration that featured members of the Quannah Parker family.

A second arrow is anticipated and in the near future may be placed at the entrance to the Roaring Springs Ranch Resort, a favorite campground of the Comanches. However, it will be necessary to raise \$700 for the giant arrow, with an additional \$235 for the granite text marker.

Twenty-four counties have placed 39 of the metal sculpture arrows denoting the historical presence of Quannah Parker, Comanches, and other Native Americans. Granite marker stones with explanatory text have been placed next to fourteen arrows so far.
