## Tornado Safety System For Citizens Is Stressed

Spring is the time of year West Texans take extra precautions in safety procedures against severe weather and tornadoes.

In the event of a tornado, local Civil Defense Director Brenda Tarter has ordered that the established civil defense warning system

which utilizes the fire siren will be implemented.

The tornado warning will only be given if a tornado has touched the ground 12 miles from the city limits.

In order to avoid confusion on what a siren must mean, the Civil Defense Director or-

dered that the fire siren not be blown after 10 p.m. or if the skies are very cloudy during this season.

Other siren warnings are as follows: one short blast-out of town fire; two short blasts-fire downtown; three short blasts-fire from Walnut Street-West; four short blasts-fire East of Walnut Street; five short blasts-fire on East Hill; six short blasts-fire on the South Side and one continuous blast means

that there is a tornado.

In case of a tornado disaster, the Police Department, Firemen, Civic Group leaders and department heads will direct rescue efforts from the disaster center located in the Police Department.

The two main factors stressed for saving lives in the event of a disaster would be preparedness and early warning.

Preparedness includes having a family or See PLAN Page 10

## Funding Cuts May Influence Needed Curriculum Changes

What's right or wrong with the Colorado City school curriculum (courses of study given in a school) has been one of the major topics of consideration by administrators, teachers and board members during the past months.

Superintendent Charlie Uselton noted Friday that for the past three years he has been reviewing curriculum in kindergarten through twelfth grade.

"We are concerned about test scores and the number of failures,

as well as student attitudes and participation," Uselton reported.

"The board of trustees has been hearing teachers from all grade levels offer presentations concerning these areas of concern. Only three more groups of high school teachers remain before we have heard all the teachers," he noted.

To date, all elementary teachers have expressed concern about the necessity of students changing classes so many times a day, running from special class to special class, Uselton said.

"Some students attend as many as three reading classes each day. They have regular reading, then are pulled out to attend Title I program reading and then perhaps migrant program reading," he said.

Teachers believe students should remain in home room classes more, Uselton noted.

Because of the evaluation program in progress, several minor changes have already taken place in the curriculum. At the level, additional vocational classes have been added. See CUTS Page 5



## Trip Is Made For Lifesaving Blood

Texas Highway Patrolmen and members of the Mitchell County Sheriff's Department played a vital role in saving the life of a local cancer patient Wednesday when they answer-

ed an emergency request from Hospital Administrator Ray Dillard to transport blood components from the Abilene airport to Root Memorial Hospital.

In expressing his appreciation to the law enforcement agencies for their assistance, Dillard explained that the blood components (white blood cells) are airmailed from Dallas and have only a six hour life span after being drawn.

Speed is of the essence, he said, or the components die and are of no use.

Dillard noted that THP units used their red lights to expedite transportation of the components in a relay system, with a Taylor County unit transferring the blood to a Nolan County unit and that unit transferring the blood to a unit based in Mitchell County.

On Thursday, it again became necessary for white blood cells to be flown from Dallas to Abilene and the composite See TRIP Page 10

CUTS. From Page 1 ed, such as CVAE in Middle School and Homemaking Work Program in high school, also one-half unit in Building Trades Class.

raised from 60 to 70. In high school, each individual subject must be passed with a 70 percent.

In Middle School, students' grades are averaged and all major subjects must average 70

percent and all minor subjects averaged must also total 70 percent in order for a student to pass.

Useton noted that prior to the change, students could pass in the minor subjects and fail

in the major subjects and still pass because the number of courses passed was considered without regard to major or minor subjects.

He said in elementary school, an overall average is taken and 70 percent is the passing grade required, with the necessity of a majority of major subjects passed in order to advance to a higher grade.

Changes in the curriculum are anticipated at the elementary level next year. Useton noted that President Ronald Reagan's number one economy measure is a 25 percent cut in federal aid to education.

This involves Colorado City schools through the Title I (remedial) program.

Under the provisions of the budgetary cut, Colorado City will lose 23 percent federal funding or about \$35,000, Useton noted.

In the past, Title I funding, which has remained the same for several years, has been utilized in reading and math programs. As salaries increased due to inflation, the funding from the federal government remained the same and it became necessary to allocate

more and more funds to salaries and less and less to supplies, until now there is little left for supplies, Useton said.

Several possibilities were noted by Useton. It is possible reading groups will be divided into reading levels and the bottom students will be divided into smaller classes so that the teacher pupil ratio is altered, allowing fewer students to a class where difficulty in reading or math is detected.

Teacher's salaries in the lower level readers' groups could be divided between federal and local funding.

Another alternative being considered is to separate classes into reading groups within the same classroom and utilize federal funds to employ aides to give special assistance to the groups with difficulty learning.

"We are going to look at the entire program and make the necessary changes to get within the program budget," Useton stated.

"Our primary concern is to improve student learning in math, reading, social studies and other basic courses," he said.

At the present time, Useton said, there is no definite plan. Studies are being made of other school systems to determine how they are scheduling students and utilizing federal funding.

As for students who graduate and go on to higher level of learning, Useton said, "We have a good percentage of graduates going on to college and these students have been very successful."

He noted he would like to see more students at the high school level meet the challenge and take the harder courses rather than take what they believe to be the easier way out by taking the less difficult courses.

A great deal of information is anticipated in regard to curriculum evaluation when the results of the TABS testing this year is compared to those taken last year.

Useton also expressed appreciation for the teacher communication and goal and objectives planning taking place at the different grade levels.

This insures a student is instructed in information necessary to each level of learning as he advances from one grade to the next.

"Our students are above average as far as achievement when they graduate from high school; however, they need to be able to read better and know more about math.

"Our reviews indicate that the students are getting behind from the very earliest ages and we need to improve our program from the very bottom up," Useton stated.

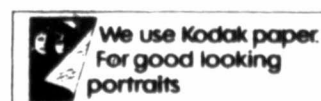

business plan. Everyone should know where to go; what to do and where to meet afterwards.

Family planning should entail keeping the following items: flashlights or candles; portable radios; a jug of

water; warm clothing; sweaters or jackets; a blanket and first aid kit, accessible in one place to be carried to a shelter.

Families should agree in advance on a location where they can meet if someone should get separated at the time of the storm.

Studies have shown that taking the time to open windows is a waste of time because the first strong winds blow them out anyway.

Cover should be taken immediately after a siren has been set off.

Persons should remain inside and avoid trying to outrun or outrun the storm. Sixty-five percent of the persons killed in the Wichita Falls tornado died because they were in the open trying to outrun the storm.

A tornado traveling on the ground moves about 30 to 50 miles per hour. There is only one exception to this word of caution and that is if persons are in a mobile home, which is never safe. They should seek other cover, even a culvert on the side of the highway.

Persons in vehicles should also follow this advice. Get out of the vehicle and seek shelter elsewhere.

The main thing to remember during a storm is not to panic. Turn on a radio or television to the local station but stay off the phone.

The phone lines will most likely be out of commission for the immediate time period following the storm. Also, if lines are flooded with calls, emergency communications will be hindered.

If a person is inside a building that has a basement or crawl space, that is the safest place to seek shelter. If these aren't available, find an inside wall away from windows and glass, or a bathroom or closet may be used.

If a tornado does strike in the city, persons whose homes are destroyed should stay in the vicinity. Emergency crews will be trying to locate disaster areas.

If a person is injured it is better not to move them until professional help has arrived. Local shelters will be established and volunteer workers will be dispersed to contact victims.

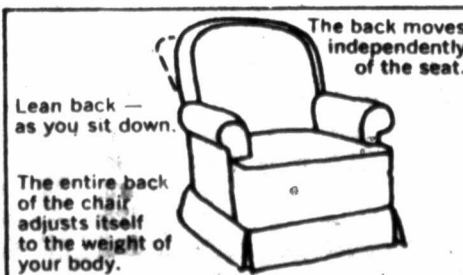

ORDINANCE NO. 81-79 An ordinance amending and changing a franchise ordinance enacted by the City of Colorado City, Mitchell County, Texas, on March 11th, 1968 and being partly styled, "An ordinance granting to Lone Star Gas Company, a Corporation, its successors and assigns, a franchise to furnish and supply gas to the general public in the City of Colorado City, Mitchell County, Texas;" and providing for a modification of

the definition of the terms "Service lines" and "Yard lines" referenced in Section 4 thereof.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Colorado City, Texas:

SECTION 1. As of the effective date of this amendatory ordinance, and upon acceptance by Lone Star Gas Company of the provisions hereof, Section 4 of the aforesaid captioned franchise ordinance enacted on March 11th, 1968, shall be stricken, cancelled and nullified and there shall be substituted in lieu thereof a new provision reading as follows:

"SECTION 4. In addition to the rates charged for gas supplied, Company may make and enforce reasonable charges, rules and regulations for service rendered in the conduct of its business including a charge for services rendered in the inauguration of natural gas service, and may require, before furnishing service, the execution of a contract therefor. Company shall have the right to contract with each customer with reference to the installation of, and payment for, any and all of the gas piping from the connection thereof with the Company's main in the streets or alleys to and throughout the consumer's premises. Company shall own, operate and maintain all service lines, which are defined as the supply lines extending from the Company's main to the customer's meter where gas is measured by Company. The consumer shall own, operate, and maintain all yard lines and house piping. Yard lines are defined as the underground supply lines extending from the point of connection with Company's customer meter to the point of connection with Consumer's house piping."

SECTION 2. Enactment of this amendatory ordinance shall in no way ever be construed so as to diminish or impair any consumer's ownership interest in service lines (or portions thereof) installed prior to the effective date of this amendatory ordinance.

SECTION 3. The terms and provisions of this amendatory ordinance shall be deemed to be severable, and if the validity of any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this amendatory ordinance should be declared to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of any other section, sentence, clause or phrase of this amendatory ordinance.

SECTION 4. Except as heretofore and hereinabove changed and amended, the terms, provisions, conditions and requirements of the aforesaid franchise ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 5. This amendatory ordinance shall become effective as of July 11, 1981 if the Company files its written acceptance of the provisions of this ordinance within sixty (60) days after its final passage and approval by this City and upon acceptance, the provisions hereof shall be binding upon City and Company, their successors and assigns.

Colorado City Police are investigating a criminal mischief which occurred at the Villa Inn

sometime after midnight and prior to 10:28 a.m. April 24. Vandals ripped and

tore the vinyl top of a 1979 Versaille Lincoln parked at that location. According to Investigating Officer Randy Haskins, damage is estimated to be over \$200 and under \$1,000. On April 26, Eddie T. Holland, Tulsa, Okla., reported theft of six heavy chains and four oil field boomers from the 1974 Freightliner truck he was driving. **Three Wrecks Occur Within The Past Week**

Texas Highway Patrolmen have worked three wrecks on Mitchell County highways in the past week. Trooper Frank Costabile investigated an accident 3.7 miles west of Colorado City on Interstate 20 April 24 at 4:19 a.m. Max Flomar, 38, of Odessa was westbound on I-20 when he apparently lost control of the 1978 Datsun he was driving. No injuries resulted from the accident. Loraine Police Chief Jim Eggleston assisted Costabile at the scene of the accident and Dossey Wrecker Service removed the wreckage. Thursday at 2 a.m., Trooper Tom Johnson investigated an accident which occurred four miles south of Westbrook on Highway 670. Mrs. Barbara Dering, accompanied by her two-year-old twins, was driving north in a 1975 Chevrolet when the vehicle collided with a cow in the middle of the highway. According to Trooper Johnson, Mrs. Dering walked the four miles into Westbrook with the twins and contacted the highway patrol to report the accident.
