Second Tidal Wave Strikes Heavily at Hawaiian Isles

SAN FRANCISCO, April 2. — A new tidal wave, generated by diminishing Aleutian earthquakes, smashed at the Alaskan peninsula today, in the second day of a Pacific ocean disaster that wrought havoc throughout the Hawaiian Islands and killed at least 140 persons.

At least 10,000 were rendered homeless in the Hawaiian group by the fury of mountainous breakers that inflicted millions of dollars damage on shipping and shoreline property.

It was feared the toll of dead and missing in the Hawaiian and Aleutians may exceed 300. A state of semi-emergency was declared on the stricken island of Hawaii and in devastated Hilo.

Heavy rollers, four to five feet above normal tide level, began striking the northern California coastline at minute intervals at 8:15 a. m.

The heavy waves and tidal disturbances disrupted fishing operations and caused alerts at vulnerable points along the shore north and south of San Francisco.

A huge wall of water hit the shoreline at Dutch Harbor, site of a U. S. naval base on Unalaska Island, in the mid-Aleutians. First reports did not disclose heavy damage.

Taft Left Committee Meeting When Told to Shut Up

WASHINGTON, April 2. (U.P.)—Sen. Robert A. Taft, R., O., walked out of a senate education and labor committee meeting today after Chairman James E. Murray, D., Mont., told him repeatedly to "shut up."

The wrangle occurred as the committee started hearings on the Wagner-Murray-Dingle bill, a comprehensive public health measure recommended by President Truman.

Rainey is Hard-pressed For a Political Issue

AUSTIN, April 2. — Gov. Coke R. Stevenson today took sharp issue with Dr. Homer P. Rainey's statement that he had implored the governor and regents to refrain from actions that would lead to probation for the university.

Stevenson at his press conference flatly denied that Rainey had spoken to him at all on the subject prior to explosion of the controversy between Rainey and the regents that led to his discharge as president.

Asked for comment on Rainey's suggestion for a law that would make it impossible for a single governor to "pack the board" Stevenson replied:

"The statement appears to be an attempt to stir up an issue that does not exist."

SENATE RESTORES SUBSIDY

WASHINGTON, April 2. (U.P.)—A Senate Banking sub-Committee today restored to the Administration's Emergency Housing bill the \$600,000,000 material subsidy that was cut out by the House.

STEAL SUGAR STAMPS

NEW YORK, April 2. — Five men, including three government guards, were under arrest today charged with stealing 2,000,000 sugar stamps from the OPA verification center. U. S. Attorney John F. X. McGohey said the coupons were worth \$600,000 to black market operators.

FFA Boys of Cisco Area Did Well at Livestock Show at Honshu, Japan

The Eastland County Livestock Show held at Ranger Saturday was well attended and livestock entries numbered about 200, said T. G. Caudle, agriculture-vocational instructor of Cisco high school.

In the fat steer exhibit, FFA boys from Cisco and the Cisco area, were prize winners and their animals were later purchased by Ranger business men. First, second and third place winners received prizes of \$10, \$7.50 and \$5.

First place went to Bobby Cleveland and his fat calf sold for 33 cents per pound. Second place, Wilburn McKinney, 33 cents per pound; third, Edward Reich, 27 1/2 cents; fourth, Wilburn McKinney, 26 1/2 cents.

Fat lamb prizes went to Doris Kirkland, first; Travis Kirkland, second. The lambs were sold for 17 and 16 1/2 cents per pound, respectively.

Pharr, son of Robert Pharr of Cisco, Texas, has recently changed location with the 25th medical battalion of the 25th infantry (Tropical Lightning) division of General Eichelberger's Eighth army, now occupying the major part of Honshu, Japan. The 25th division was formerly located in the Nagoya area.

Sergeant Pharr entered the army in February of 1945 and received his basic training at Camp Beal, Calif. He left the United States for overseas duty July of 1945 and was assigned to the 25th infantry division. Before he entered the service he attended Cisco high school; later took up farming.

Cisco Featured in Lone Star's Radio Show Wednesday



Cisco's history and economic development will get the spotlight in the Wednesday morning broadcast of Lone Star Gas company when it presents its regular Saddle Ridge Dude Ranch radio program featuring Paul Young and his Saddle Ridge Buckaroos, according to C. THE THIRD "R."

For a short while before my first day at school, and for several weeks after, I heard a great deal of conversation about the three R's of education. My elders seemed to expect me to think it was very funny that the three R's should stand for reading, writing and arithmetic. It left an impression, to say the least. I still know that education includes some variety.

One of the things about modern education that dismays me is the fact that students don't pursue the three R's long enough.

They are at liberty too early to ignore one of them — the last one. Figures are dry at first and a lot of youngsters drop mathematics.

High school freshmen have learned to say "It's only a waste of time to study things you don't like and will never use."

Ignorance Is Costly. "What you don't know doesn't hurt you," is rubbish. Certainly what you don't know does not do you any good.

Truly an actor may draw a fabulous salary for years and die in debt. Tales are told of artists and musicians who can't balance their check stubs.

Their ignorance of math did not make them better artists. It would be like saying liquor made Poe a poet, or that harems make great kings.

A national poll might show that millions of Americans don't know what it means to balance the budget. It wouldn't be surprising; most of us don't even have a personal budget, we live so easily and well.

But our national budget needs to be balanced. People who try to laugh that off don't know what it means or, worse yet, would welcome national bankruptcy as a stepping stone to revolution.

What Does it Mean? Balancing a budget, whether it is a family budget or a national budget, means keeping a safe relation between income and outgo. The inevitable result of spending more than we get is debt, bankruptcy and loss of credit.

That's just another way of saying "loss of our good name and the respect of our neighbors."

When we stop paying our debts and start breaking our promises, that's Uncle Sam in on his way to that social level.

He has not reached it yet, but when he does it will be too late to save him.

Now is the time to balance the national budget. I was never so proud of my home state as when the entire Arkansas delegation in congress, senators and representatives, went on record last month as favoring a balanced national budget.

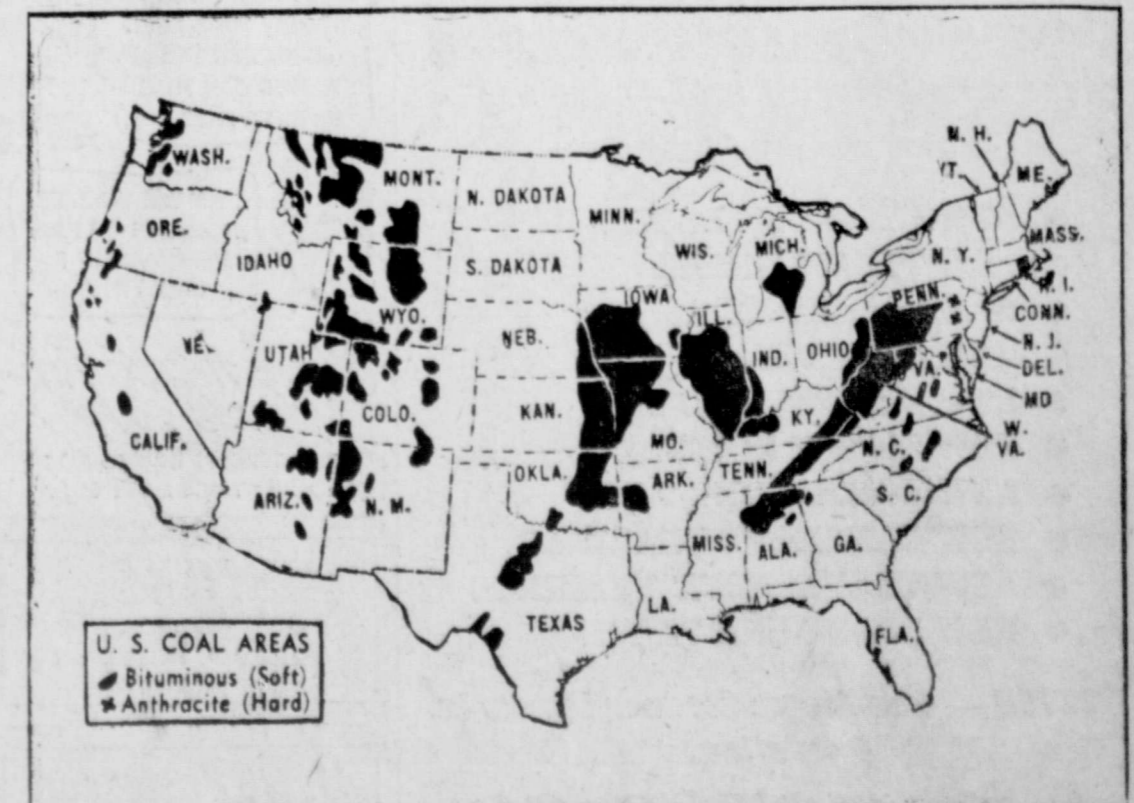
We were a little too busy to visit much, so we don't know who was out; but we hope they enjoyed the activity and come back again next Sunday, when we will try to provide something new of interest.

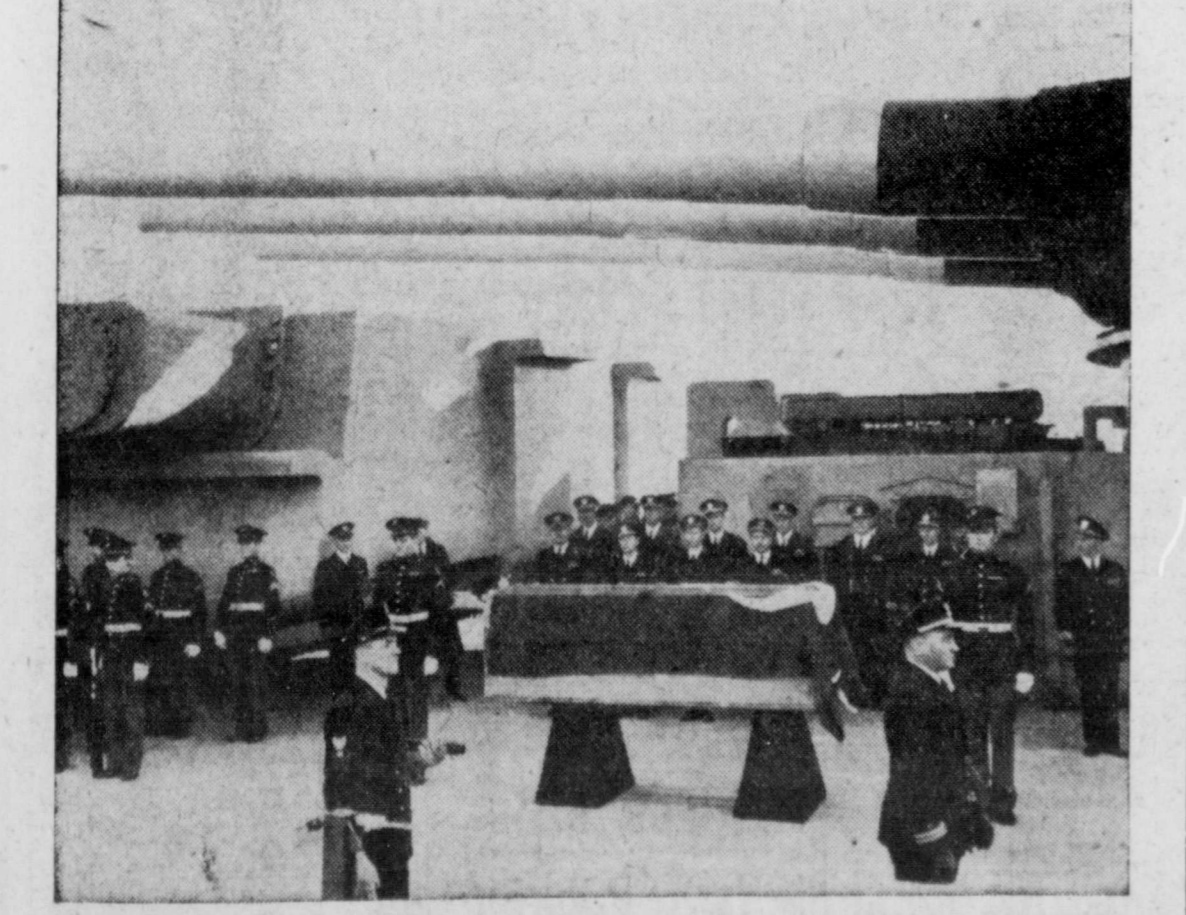

MODERN CZAR.

"Russian Furor Healthy Sign, May Lead to Understanding." So said a recent headline from an American newspaper, a part of the general quest just now for understanding of the Russians. The implication seems to be that Stalin, as modern Russian equivalent for the old Czars, is a man that Americans should be able to get along with, as we have usually done when we have a chance to talk to a Russian, man to man.

Stalin, however, is not a Russian as Americans usually understand the term. He is a Georgian, from a trans-Caucasian region whose inhabitants speak a language believed unrelated to any other. He seems to combine with his adopted Russian traits some Asiatic qualities that the average American would have great difficulty in fathoming.

There are hints, too, that all is not quite smooth sailing for Uncle Joe and his governmental group now in the internal affairs of Russia. Some of the external bluff may be for internal consumption.

We have the example in our own laobr leaders, always trying to prove to their union members how much they can do for them.

The Russian problem is far from simple. It's a good time for Americans to keep their shirts on.

Nobody, here or anywhere else, wants another war.
