

If We're Only 4,915 - Who's Drinking Our Water?

City Manager J. A. Sadler has put a pencil to Colorado City's preliminary census count.

He figures either the 1970 Census is seriously lacking in accuracy or Colorado City's average family is only two and one half persons.

The 1,542 drop from 1960 Census to 4,915 population in the preliminary 1970 Census doesn't jive with the usual local yardsticks for measuring people.

Neither is it entirely compatible with Post Office mail deliveries or with Colorado In-

dependent School District annual school-age census.

"I've used every formula - even the census figures - and I can't come up with such a large loss," said the city manager.

Sadler counts city water customers (actually the number of water meters in operation) now in the city. The total is 1,354 - only 152 fewer meters than in 1960 when the U. S. Census counted 6,457 population for Colorado City.

If water meters are a yardstick and the new census figures are correct, then 10.24 persons

departed with every water meter that was removed.

And, Sadler isn't easy to persuade that 152 families - each with 10 members or more - moved out of town and left only families averaging no more than 2.5 persons with each water meter left in operation.

The city manager has approached it from another angle - the factor formula.

By dividing the number of 1960 water meters (2,106) into the 1960 population count (6,457), Sadler establishes a population factor of 3.09 per-

sons for each water meter in use in 1960.

Multiplying the number of meters now operating (1,354) by the 1960 factor (3.09 families per meter) produces an 6,040.86 persons. That's 1,125 more than the 1970 Census preliminary report and only 417 fewer than the Official 1960 Census.

It is a fact that college students away from home attending college were not counted in the 1970 Census. However, Sadler's pencil figures farther and takes this into consideration.

Subtracting 200 (an estimate

on the number of college students credited to another town although all their family, income and etc. comes from Colorado City) from the 6,040.86 population estimate still leaves 5,840.86 persons within the city with the 3.09 factor.

Sadler brings it all down to a "rock-bottom" population of 5,356.86 persons. This is compiled with the same 3.09 factor less 200 college students and allowing for an additional overall 10 per cent decline in the community family. This 10 per cent loss takes 584 more persons away, still leaving the total more than 400 above the preliminary census.

All are figures, of course, they are difficult to match with the new census no matter which way the city manager turns 'em.

Added to the puzzle is the fact that the Post Office reported it had discovered more than 60 families within Mitchell County who were missed in the census-taking. The size of these "missing families" ranged up to 10 persons. Fifty per cent of misses were within Colorado City.

Whether the Post Office recheck brought corrections early enough to be included in the preliminary report is not known.

But there are even more.

Answering a "Chamber of Commerce" "Are You Counted," twenty-six additional families have reported that they were not counted. Most of these families have three or more members, one reported 7 members.

There is another yardstick that doesn't measure the same as the '70 Census.

Colorado Independent School District's school census for 1960-61 (the same year when the Official 1960 Census Count was 6,457 persons) counted 1,968 school-age children and youth.

Today, when the preliminary census report says 1,542 persons have moved out of Colorado City, this same school census process counts 1,968 school-age persons. That is only 230 less than the 1,968 counted in 1960.

Needless to say, the 230 drop in students doesn't quite add up to 1,542 fewer persons in town.

There has been a continuing decline in the number of first graders within the local school system since the school year of 1960-61. First grade enrollment 10 years ago was 394.

Crop Loss Provision In Farm Programs

Provision for crop losses have been made for producers who signed up in 1970 cotton and feed grain farm program and have been unable to plant crops because of adverse weather conditions.

Support of the program benefits was made this week by Edward B. Roach, vice chairman of Mitchell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee.

Roach said that if the County ASC Committee determines an acreage of cotton or feed grain could not be planted during normal planting season because of flood, drought or other natural disaster, the producer still can earn program payments.

The same is true for farm

program participants whose crops are destroyed by natural forces," he advised. "In either case, the land must not be planted to any other crop before approval by the county committee."

In such cases, producers must file requests for acreage credit certifying they have been prevented from carrying out normal operations.

"The first thing a farmer should do," Roach said, "is get in touch with the ASCS office and report his situation. He will receive a full explanation of 'prevented acreage' provisions in the 1970 farm programs."

Approval of program benefits in these cases rests with the county ASC committee, the vice chairman explained. Producers filing requests for acreage credit must have made genuine efforts to plant and grow the crop in a workmanlike manner.

Roach reminded farmers that provisions apply only to farmers who signed up in the 1970 feed grain and cotton programs and then were unable to plant or grow the program crops because of natural disaster.

Church Buys Property

Clinic, Residences In 1st Baptist Expansion

First Baptist Church Wednesday announced final acquisition of three separate properties in a major expansion project.

It is the first expansion for First Baptist since the educational building was built in 1962.

The properties acquired include a lot with house and garage apartment on Chestnut Street east of the church and north of the present parking area, one lot and Brunner Clinic building west of church on Third Street and two lots and house on Elm, west of church and north of Brunner building.

The Chestnut Street property, purchased from Mrs. Mabel Groves, will be cleared and

eventually be used as additional parking area, according to Rev. Glenn Roenfeldt, church pastor, and Arlene Morris, chairman of deacons.

The Madden property at 320 Elm Street will be used for combination parking and recreational space.

L. C. Devorce is a new city patrolman for Colorado City. Devorce's employment, announced Wednesday by City Manager J. A. Sadler, fills a vacancy created by the June 1 appointment of Dan Pfeiffer to the assistant chief of police position.

A resident of Colorado City for 29 years, Devorce was employed at Colorado Express for 23 years before his police assignment Monday.

He has been a member of Mitchell County Community Action Program board of directors since its organization here in 1967 and is currently serving as local delegate to regional CAP board.

Devorce is chairman of advisory committee for Wallace Neighborhood Center, sponsored by CAP. He is a deacon and former Sunday School teacher at Mount Olive Baptist Church here.

"And long range plans possibly include volleyball and tennis courts and some grass area," Rev. Roenfeldt said.

Clinic building at 210 East Third will provide a youth center and additional Sunday school space. The building has com-

plete kitchen facilities upstairs, two large reception areas and several smaller rooms. Bids are now being accepted on houses located on the Groves and Madden properties. Bid forms can be obtained from the church office. Bidding deadline is June 30.

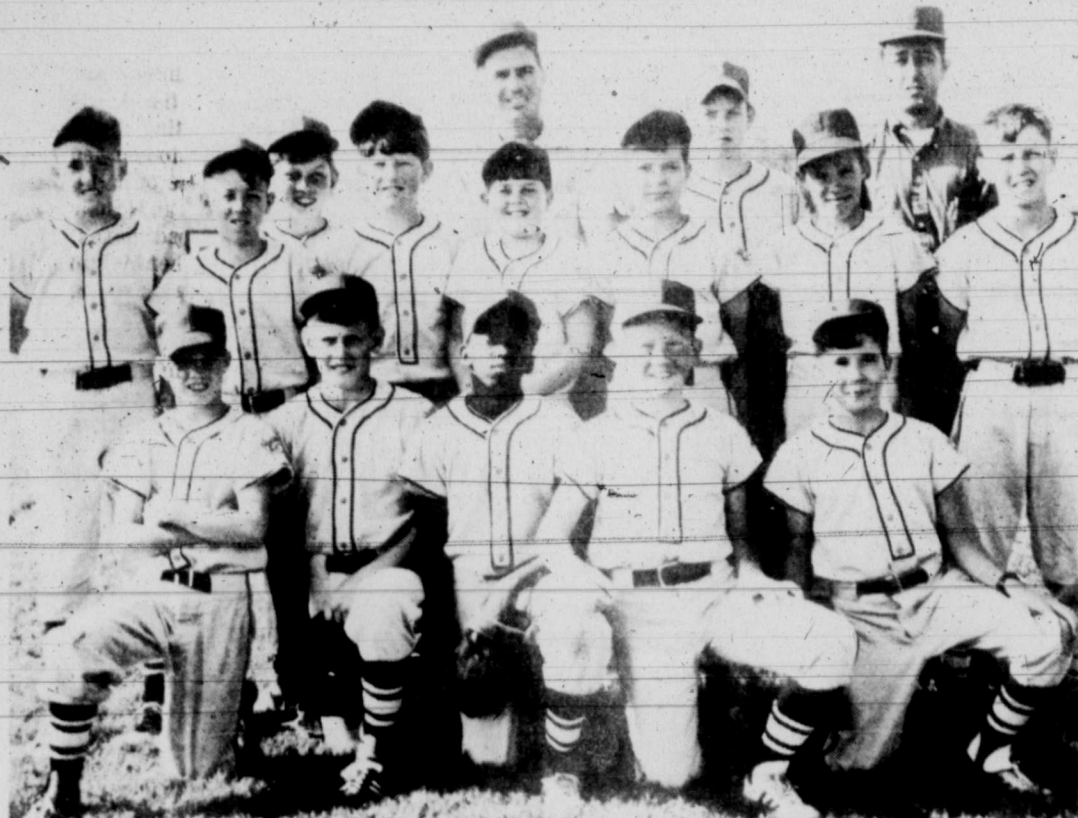

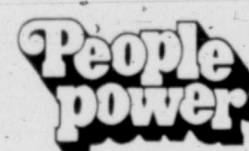

Each member brought a flower arrangement and Mrs. B. H. Johnson judged the display.

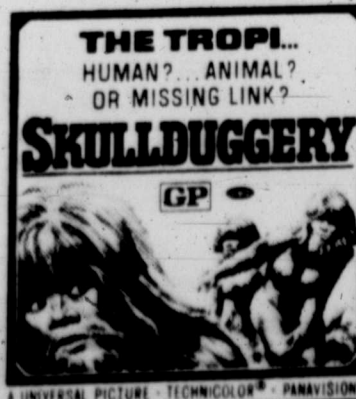
Cook books were distributed and can be purchased from Garden Club members.

pupils. This year it was 143. That's the nearest matching figure to the population downspin.

Total school enrollment, though, for 1960-70 was 1,685 students compared to 1,850 when the 1960 Census was counted. That is a decline of only 165 in total students and that doesn't indicate a tremendous population decline.

If you are still trying to match water meters with factors and formulas and population, you are beginning to realize that not all water meters connect with homes. Some with businesses.

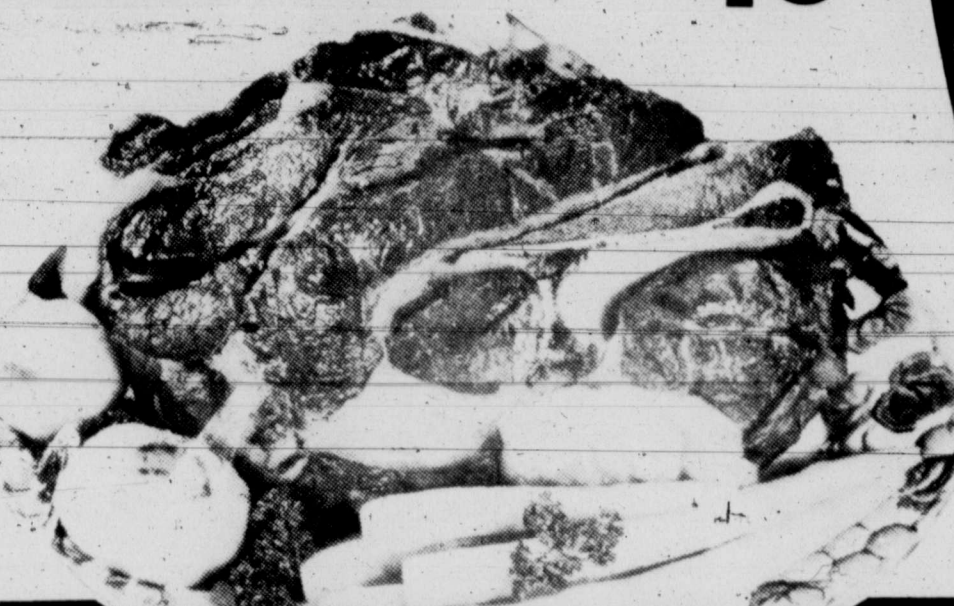
Sadler has considered this, too. He says that we have fewer business connections, sure, so the ratio of meters to homes and business-industry are about the same.

He even complicates his own puzzle by checking back and finding that some of the industry-business disconnects - like Col-Tex - which had multiple meter connections.
