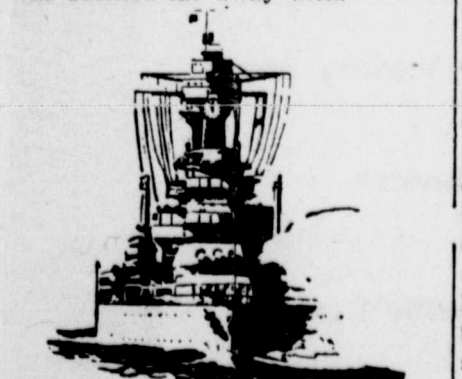

Gasoline — A book coupons No. 6 good for 4 gals. each until midnight, July 21.

Tire Inspection — "A" book holders should have tires inspected by Sept. 30, "B" bookholders second inspection by June 30; "C" bookholders second tire inspection by Aug. 31. "T" bookholders should have tire inspection every 60 days, or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first.

Sugar — Coupon No. 13 became valid June 1, good for 5 lbs. through Aug. 15. Coupons 15 & 16 good for 5 lbs. each for home canning purposes. Housewives may apply to their local boards for additional rations if necessary.

Coffee — Stamp 21 became valid July 1 (for 1 lb.) and expires July 21. Shoes — Stamp No. 15, (1 pair), good thru Oct. 31.

Meats, Etc. — Red stamp P became valid June 27 and Q becomes valid July 4.

Processed Foods — Blue stamps K, L, M continue good thru July 7. Blue stamps N, P and Q will be valid July 1 to Aug. 7, inclusive.

Subject: The New Pay-As-You-Go Method of Collecting Your Income Tax —

Starting July 1st, both your Income and Victory Tax will be collected by an entirely new and more convenient method.

Under the old system, you were obliged every March 15th to pay either the full tax for the previous year, or a quarter of that amount. Under the new system, you will keep paid up from month to month.

After July 1st, your employer is obliged by the new law to withhold every month a part of your wages and turn the money into the United States Treasury as payment on your Income and Victory Tax.

Of course, the amount that your employer withholds will depend upon your pay and your exemptions. But this is the important point: For most of us, the amount withheld over a year's period will add up to the same that we're paying now—plus or minus a few dollars.

At the end of the year, we may owe the Government a few dollars or the Government may owe us. (See the tables below.)

You may have heard 20% mentioned as the proportion of your wages that will be withheld. Actually, this is incorrect. To figure the amount that will be withheld, take your total wages and subtract your allowance for exemptions and allowance for dependents; 20% of this lesser amount is the total that will be withheld.

Now please remember this: You must claim those exemptions to take advantage of them. Before July 1st, you must file with your employer an Exemption Certificate. If you do not do this, your employer will have no choice but to deduct 20% of your full pay check.

Here is how the new tax collection method will work: Let's say you are a working man earning \$3,000 a year; that you are married, and have two children.

First of all, as a married man you are allowed a personal withholding exemption of \$1,248, plus an exemption of \$312 for each dependent (other than your wife). This makes a total exemption of \$1,872 (\$1,248 for yourself and wife, plus \$624 for your two

dependents), which is deducted from the \$3,000 you earn before your tax is computed. You are thus paying tax on \$1,128, of which your employer will withhold 20%, or \$225.60 for the year. Therefore, in your pay envelope, after July 1, you will receive about \$4.40 less each week.

In March, 1944, when you ordinarily would be faced with paying taxes on your 1943 income, you will file a return showing how much you have already paid, and how much your total tax actually amounted to. If, by that time, you have already paid more than your actual tax due, you will be given credit for the difference. If you owe more than you have paid, you will pay the difference.

Since this plan starts July 1, many wonder what happens to the tax payments they will already have made by that time—on March 15 and June 15.

For a great majority of people, here is what happens. . . . Your 1942 income tax is "forgiven" (either all, or most of it). The March and June installments which you originally paid on that 1942 income tax are credited, instead, as payments on your 1943 tax. With the result that on July 1st, with the year half gone, you have already paid tax on that half-year's income. In short, you are "paying as you go."

There is one thing more. Since this pay-as-you-go method leaves you just as much of your net income as you had before, you will probably find it possible to at least maintain your present rate of buying War Bonds. Do this by all means!

Taxes alone will not bring to the Treasury nearly enough money to finance the great invasion war that lies ahead. The war needs every cent of your money that does not go for the necessities of life.

My work here is interesting, covering a variety of duties — the main duty being secretarial work. Both the civilian and military personnel with whom I work are just "swell." Because there is much to be done as quickly as possible, we work diligently and with a bit of humor here and there, our work is really a pleasure. The hours pass away quickly day by day. I can hardly realize that the month of June has almost slipped by.

There is a great deal of entertainment for the people in the service in

Cleveland. I have enjoyed many evenings of music made by big name hands on the stage of the theatres, classical music, radio and screen personalities, (Bob Hope, for one), baseball games, and almost every Sunday afternoon finds us at one of the beaches. Our liberty ends each week night at 11:30, but we find ample time to enjoy these various pastimes.

There is a lovely Methodist church here to which I have been made welcome. It is a long distance from my quarters, so I ride a street car. And, frankly, I don't like these streetcars — they make too much noise. Especially during the night. As yet I have not become accustomed to the city's noise — rumble of the cars, early morning risers, etc. I miss the peace and quiet I enjoyed around home.

Buford, there isn't much to write about, or rather, that I can write about, except that I am doing my job as well as I know how and liking it very much. I'm looking forward to a time when this is all over and we can all come back home again. Tell my friends hello for me. May I thank you and those who are responsible for my receiving the paper. I am going to radio school and it takes all my spare time studying. That's the softest job in the army — and I was looking for that when I was drafted. I only have four more weeks of basic training and will really be glad when it's over.

It's time for chow and I am always ready to eat, so will close now. As ever, Pvt. Arval Leon Ramsey, Hq. & Hq. Co., 3rd Armored Group, Camp Chaffee, Ark.

(Editor's Note: The following letter from Lonnie Joe Fowler, nephew of Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Landroop, was received here recently by Stanley Waits. In the navy, Lonnie Joe has seen action in several major Pacific battles. Like others in the service from here, Lonnie Joe will receive the Review without cost. We did not know his address until this letter was brought to our desk.)

May 29, 1943.

Hello, Stanley:

I got your letter yesterday, and boy, was I glad to hear from you. It really does you a lot of good to hear from someone at home when you are out in a lonesome hole like I am. By the way, I am not in the States like

you think, and haven't been for seven months. The last place that I can tell you about was the Fiji Islands — and there isn't anything to tell about that.

If you get any news about the people I know there, let me know about it as I am kind of in the dark. Tell your Mother and Dad "hello" for me. Our chow here is rotten so we swipe bacon, bread and coffee and rig up a pretty good meal.

Say, Stanley, will you do me a favor? Subscribe to the Abernathy Review and have it sent to me, will you? I will thank you a lot. I would send the money, but I don't draw any money out here so I am flat. I'll fix you up when I get back.

Tell Monroe and his boy and wife I said "hello." That is about all I know this time. Your friend, Joe. L. J. Fowler, AM1c.

Dear Buford:

Well, the time has come to once again enlighten the people of Abernathy on the life of a future leatherneck. By no means is "boot" considered a leatherneck until he has completed his seven weeks of Hell.

We are on the rifle range now and it is really tough, at least the first two weeks are. We are on our third week and we started firing the M-1 (Garand), Friday, and I really like it. We are firing on what is supposed to be the second largest firing range in the world. It accommodates xxx men at a time and we are firing in xx relays, making a total of xxx men on the range alone.

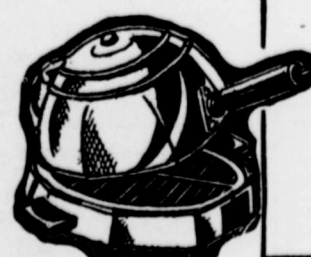
