

Industry In Good Position To Move Ahead, Says FD

New Deal Will Stick By Its Budget, Tax And Relief Policies, He Tells American Retail Federation

WASHINGTON, May 23 (AP)—President Roosevelt left with the American Retail Federation today assurance that America "is in an excellent position to move forward," impelled by "the principles and objectives for which we have struggled the last six years."

In a broad restatement of his business and financial policies, the Chief Executive last night told a banquet audience of 1,000 small town and big city merchants:

"Today with no danger of surplus of goods overhanging the market—just because we have tried to keep consumer purchasing power up to production—the nation is in an excellent position to move forward into a period of greater production and greater employment."

He declared, however, that business could not expect his administration to retreat on the size of its budget, the present tax level, or its policy of work relief rather than the dole.

Efforts Are Renewed For Russian Pact

The power of the French general staff provided additional pressure today for a mutual assistance treaty to link Britain and France with Soviet Russia.

Negotiations for such a pact, designed to counter-balance the Rome-Berlin axis, occupied representatives of the three powers in Geneva for a meeting of the League of Nations council.

Reliable reports said Viscount Halifax, British foreign secretary, had decided to try to overcome the British cabinet's reluctance to enter into a broader pact.

Informed Geneva sources said the French general staff had exerted strong pressure on Premier Daladier and others to back the Soviet union in her insistence upon guarantees of mutual aid, closer ties than Britain thus far has been willing to make.

League officials decided to send Charles J. Burckhardt de Reynold, league high commissioner to Danzig, back to the free city for a report on the situation created by German claims for Danzig's return.

The commissioner has the legal power to call for Polish troops if he considers them necessary, and it is said Poland wanted him back at the post from which he had been absent since March 19.

A Danzig newspaper published a speech by Nazi Leader Helmut Andrus declaring the slaying of a Nazi by a Pole at Kallthof last Sunday must and would be atoned.

Speaking to a mass meeting at the village of Tighof last night Andrus urged, however, that Danzig citizens leave the choice of methods to Adolf Hitler.

Italy made preparations to collect her war debts from nationalist Spain by accepting Spanish raw materials valuable for munitions manufacturing.

Negro Felons Shot To Death

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., May 23 (AP)—Two negro convicts, who escaped with eight or 10 others when wind demolished their stockade, were shot to death by trusty guards in a hand-to-hand fight near the Cummins state prison farm today.

The casualties came in the wake of a spring storm which killed four persons, injured scores and caused property damage of more than \$1,000,000 elsewhere in the state late yesterday.

The slain convicts were Archie Goodwin, serving 21 years for assault with intent to kill, burglary and grand larceny, and James Patterson, serving seven years for burglary and larceny.

Prison officials said they were killed by two negro trustees when they sprang upon one who was beating through the dense woods between Cummins and Gould, Ark.

Willie Rayford, negro life tamer, was captured without resistance. Another fugitive returned to camp voluntarily.

Several persons were injured in the collapse of the stockade.

BOSS TOM PENDERGAST PLEADS GUILTY TO INCOME TAX EVASION

Jail-Bound Pendergast Is 'Broke'

KANSAS CITY, May 23 (AP)—The 26-year-old political saga of Tom Pendergast leads to a prison cell next week with the "boss" owing the federal government nearly a million dollars and his fortune cut to shreds by betting on race horses.

Pendergast was sentenced to a 15-month term and fined \$10,000 yesterday on the plea of guilty to income tax evasion in 1935 and 1936.

On the income covered by the indictments he owes the government some \$430,000 in taxes, interest and penalties.

In addition, District Attorney Maurice M. Milligan told Judge Merrill E. Otis he had evidence Pendergast evaded payment on a total of \$1,540,746 from 1927 to 1938.

Milligan said taxes, interest and penalties on all this would come to \$830,494.73 and that the investigation of Pendergast's income over the 11-year period is "not yet altogether completed." However the statute of limitations bars suit for taxes before 1935.

ABOARD THE ROYAL PILOT TRAIN ENROUTE TO WINNEPEG, May 23 (AP)—Everyone but the Dionne quintuplets was "tucked out" today after the quint's visit with King George and Queen Elizabeth.

Their majesties relaxed aboard their special train, skirting the shores of Lake Superior enroute to Winnipeg, with only platform appearances and brief stops before them today.

The quintuplets were back home in their Callender nursery, not a bit tired after the first train trip of their five years for a first meeting with royalty in Toronto yesterday; but their parents, their brothers and sisters, their nurses and Dr. Allan Roy DaFoe, the quint's physician, were "tucked out," Dr. DaFoe acknowledged.

There was no question but the quintuplets provided the high spot of the royal visit to Toronto.

The five little girls in court dresses of organdy, poke bonnets and patent leather slippers curled perfectly to the king and queen, and then took things into their own hands.

They hugged and kissed the queen, and she kissed them back. Cecile, Emilie, Annette and Yvonne presented bouquets to her majesty; Marie, awestruck, gave her flowers to the king.

They also handed over autograph pictures and the queen gave much so they "scarcely gave the king and queen a chance to get a word in," Dr. DaFoe said.

They had teased the doctor about his top hat, and they were quick to note the blue ensemble of the queen with a chorus of "La Belle Reine" (beautiful queen).

Submarine With 62 Aboard Trapped In 240 Ft. Of Water

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., May 23 (AP)—The U. S. submarine Squalus and a crew of 62 men were "trapped" in 240 feet of water about five miles off the narrow New Hampshire coast today when the ship went into a deep sea dive without closing one of her vital sea valves.

Approximately five hours after the accident high authorities at the navy yard here expressed an opinion a majority of the men aboard were safe so far and that with good luck all could be saved.

The Squalus should be able to "hold out" for approximately 24 hours, navy officers said. Only part of the ship was flooded—the crew's quarters in the after part of the vessel and the aft part of the engine room.

Two rescue ships were rushed to the scene. Navy yard authorities said the "line of attack" would be to try and send a diver down from a surface ship to close the induction valve, which was left open. If this could be done, they said, the ship might be raised.

Two navy boats and two coast guard ships immediately were dispatched to the scene, which was off White Island, and about five miles southeast of the Isles of Shoals of the New Hampshire.

General description of the robber led officers to believe he resembled a man who Sunday held up a place in Midland.

The "rodeo jail," a mute warning to Big Spring people to "go western" in anticipation of the sixth annual Big Spring Cowboy Reunion and Rodeo June 23-25, made its appearance on the courthouse lawn Tuesday.

By the time June 12 rolls around, said rodeo officials, it is planned to "jug" local residents who appear without some article of western attire.

The type or amount of this attire is not fixed, nor is the method of enforcement. But officials expressed the hope that local clubs could be drafted to support the plan.

Thus, after June 12, if plans go through, residents will put on lots of colorful shirts, boots, hats, neckerchiefs or some other bit of western apparel.

Search Goes On For A New Principal

Big Spring school trustees continued their application-studying and general head scratching Monday night in an effort to select a new principal to succeed George Gentry; and at the close of their meeting they were only a little nearer a decision.

From more than 60 applicants, Supt. W. C. Blankenship and Gentry had selected about a half-dozen favored prospects. Trustees Monday evening selected two of these—not disclosing their names—for further investigation; and probably will interview the two at an early date.

Gentry has resigned to accept a post next year at Temple. His work is concluded with the local school system at the end of this month. His successor probably would not assume duties until September 1.

Omnibus Tax Bill Passes House By A Wide Margin

Called Solution To Pension Financing Problem, But What Senate Will Do Remains A Big Question Mark

AUSTIN, May 23 (AP)—By a huge margin, the House of Representatives today finally approved an omnibus tax bill, estimated to raise \$15,000,000 a year.

The vote was 108 to 30.

As the measure sped toward senate consideration, proponents zealously claimed it was the solution to the great problem of financing Texas' social security program.

That problem was made more acute recently the legislature liberalizing the old age assistance law extensively. Thousands of persons will be added to pension rolls if the liberalization bill is signed by Governor W. Lee O'Daniel and approved by the federal social security board.

Opponents asserted the reception which the omnibus bill would receive in the senate was very questionable because the senate long since has passed to the house a proposed constitutional amendment which would levy general retail sales, natural resource and service taxes.

The plan to finance social security costs by the constitutional amendment route has been rejected four times by the lower legislative branch.

The bill levies a wide variety of taxes, including higher ones on natural resources and a selective sales tax on so-called luxuries, such as furs, jewels and high-priced automobiles.

The house began considering the bill yesterday and efforts to change its form as it came from a drafting committee were constantly repulsed.

Leaders in the fight for the bill were bitter opponents both of a general retail-sales tax and the constitutional amendment favored by the senate.

Chief argument for the bill was it would provide sufficient additional revenue without enacting a general retail sales tax.

The main argument against it was it would not raise enough money, especially since the old age pension law was liberalized.

Rep. J. Bryan Bradbury of Abilene, making the final appeal for the bill, called it "sound, sane and reasonable solution of the old age pension problem."

"It will raise \$11,000,000 a year for pensions," he asserted. "When that is added to the present revenue of \$9,600,000, we will be able to pay a total of 166,000 pensioners an average of \$30 a month."

Texas now has 117,000 persons on the pension rolls and the average monthly grant is around \$14.

"With this bill," Bradbury said, "we are answering the call of the people for liberal pensions and answering it well. The time has arrived for the legislature to give the answer to what has been called the state's No. 1 problem."

When Bradbury said all other proposed pension financing plans, including the senate sales-natural resource tax constitutional amendment, were dead, conflicting shouts of "no" and "yes" came from the floor.

Advocates of the constitutional amendment have said they would try a fifth time to force it through the lower branch.

Before the house passed the omnibus bill, it eliminated a provision placing a levy on picture shows costing 35 cents or more. It also reduced the proposed sulphur tax from \$1.37 to \$1.25 a ton.

The measure called for a raise of one cent in the cigarette tax, a substantial increase in natural resource imposts, increases

DRIPPING PROBED AS 'MASS MURDER' JOB

PHILADELPHIA, May 23 (AP)—The "three-men-in-a-boat" drowning of a Philadelphia off the New Jersey coast seven days ago came to the fore in a mass-murder ring investigation today as authorities continued preparation for scheduled group trials of prisoners a week hence.

Dominick Rodio, arrested in Cleveland last week, was summoned to a hearing on a murder charge in the drowning of Joseph Arena near Sea Isle City, N. J., in 1932.

Arena's death is among more than 100 investigators have attributed to the syndicate in eastern states.

The commonwealth contends there was "conspiracy" to kill Arena for insurance money while on a fishing trip. Two other persons already are held in connection with his death.

Rodio's hearing was one of two scheduled for the day. The other was for Morris Bolber, self-styled "psychiatrist" whom Assistant District Attorney Vincent P. McDevitt has named as a "director" of the syndicate. Bolber is charged with murder.

SNYDER MAN NAMED PRESIDENT OF FT. WORTH BANK

FORT WORTH, May 23 (AP)—Marshall A. Fuller, of Snyder, cattleman and banker, today was elected president of the First National Bank here to succeed John N. Slarks, who died May 13.

Fuller, former Fort Worth resident, is president of the Snyder National Bank and has been a director of the First National here since 1934.

QUEEN MARY IN CAR SPILL

LONDON, May 23 (AP)—Queen Mother Mary was officially announced to be "suffering from considerable bruising" from effects of an automobile accident this afternoon and to have been ordered "some days complete rest."

LONDON, May 23 (AP)—Queen Mother Mary apparently escaped serious injury today when her motor car was overturned in an accident in a London suburb.

The queen was authoritatively reported "bruised and badly shaken" but otherwise unhurt. After a brief time in a doctor's house she was driven from Putney, the West London suburb where the accident occurred, to her Marlborough house residence.

A group which gathered outside the doctor's house cheered with relief as the queen emerged and acknowledged their cheers. She was not bandaged, nor was she visibly injured.

After resting at a doctor's house Queen Mary was driven away in one of the royal cars.

The queen's car was involved in an accident with a truck, an eyewitness said.

"Queen Mary's car turned over. A painter who was working nearby rushed to it with his ladder and assisted Queen Mary to climb out. She was not badly shaken and was taken to a doctor's house nearby."

An official at Marlborough house, the queen mother's official residence, said "we are informed that she is not hurt."

In the car with the queen at the time of the accident were Lady Constance Molineux Gaskell and Lord Claude Hamilton.

Lady Constance suffered a bruised arm and Lord Claude cuts on one hand.

Lord Hamilton is comptroller and treasurer in Queen Mary's household.

The queen was returning to Marlborough house from the royal horticultural society's gardens at Wisley, Surrey.

3 'Bad Men' Surrender

CROUCH, Idaho, May 23 (AP)—Three western "bad men" who boasted they'd fight it out with posse that blocked their escape, walked out of a mountain cabin last night with their hands held high and today were back in the prison from which they escaped.

With nearly 100 heavily-armed men surrounding their hideout at the base of high mountains, 70 miles north of Boise, the escaped convicts threw their only weapon out a window and submitted to capture without firing a shot.

State, prison and county officers, bolstered by 25 national guardsmen and possemen pressed their grim search for a fourth fugitive, 31-year-old Lonnie Walling, robber.

Shortly before dark, Rancher George Craig and his wife saw the convicts steal down the hillside and into the deserted shack. Craig sent his "little boy" hurrying to nearby searchers who for two days had combed the rugged central Idaho hinterland.

Converging on the shack from all sides, possemen waited as Prison Guard Gordon Wright called out:

"Come out or we're going to start smoking you out."

A .38 caliber pistol sailed out a back window. Cliff Daugherty, 35, reputedly the leader in the prison break, edged cautiously from the building. He was followed by Edgar Pruett, 19, and Raymond Curtis, 20. All were serving long terms for robbery when they sawed their way out of their cells and clambered over a high wall to freedom early last Saturday.

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No Change In Road Policy

AUSTIN, May 23 (AP)—The highway commission has a new chairman but the same old policy—few if any definite commitments at hearings.

Thus spoke Brady P. Gentry of Tyler, recently appointed chairman, as he presided at his first hearing of delegations seeking road improvements yesterday.

After listening to 31 groups he said the policy of the commission would not be changed. "We have an enormous task confronting us in building the state's roads and cannot act hastily. I have been told that if we merely completed all present road designations the job would take 14 years," he said.

Gregg county spokesmen requesting an extensive program including a proposed designation of certain county roads as state highways and extension of other state highways. Wilbarger county group asking widening of roads entering Vernon.

Sadler Hits Back In Oil Controversy

AUSTIN, May 23 (AP)—Texas is not alarmed at any "encirclement" campaign instigated by Louisiana, Jerry Sadler, member of the Texas Railroad commission, said today.

Sadler was commenting on a jocular statement by Governor Richard W. Leche of Louisiana that if Texas' oil fields are opened wide Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and even Mexico would not allow Texas oil to pass.

The governor's observations followed a declaration by Sadler the lid should be taken off Texas' production after 60 days if other states did not reduce oil output and stop sending oil into Texas.

In his latest statement Sadler spoke of the Texas war for independence from Mexico and the cry of the defeated Mexicans at the decisive battle of San Jacinto, "Me no Alamo, me no Goliad."

"If the governor of Louisiana wants to affiliate with Mexico, a republic that has been exporting about 10,000,000 barrels of oil into Texas monthly, the Texans are ready," Sadler said.

"Before the encirclement campaign is over, the opposition will start running headlong toward the Gulf and shouting, 'Me no Texas, me no oil wells.'"

PIONEER RANCHER TAKEN BY DEATH

MATADOR, May 23 (AP)—A. B. Echols, 80, banker and pioneer rancher, will be buried here today. He died at Plainview yesterday.

Funeral services will be held at the Baptist church of which he had been a member for 50 years.

Echols, born in 1859 in Chattanooga county, Georgia, came to Matador in the cattle business ten years ago, Texas, in 1890 and years before moving to Matador county.

His career also included railroad. For eleven years he headed the eight-mile, Motley county railroad, built in 1914 to connect with the Quanah, Acme and Pacific south of Matador.

Echols was a member of various Masonic orders and was on the executive committee of the Texas Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

The oil workers' union went on strike Saturday night because, Union President Clyde Shambien said, the company refused to sign a contract. Shambien said 200 employees left their jobs, resulting in a shut-down on the refinery. Company officials have declined to comment on the dispute.

"We set the date of the nominating conventions months ago," explained the mayor, a 48-year-old woman. "Then our county schools had to close early because of finances and 'someone' arranged to have graduating night on the same date of the conventions."

"Naturally all the mothers went to the school to see their children—and the men took the conventions."

The result is John Fisher will run on the citizen's ticket for mayor June 6. His community party opponent will be John Hough. Only Mrs. Elgie Rustemeyer, recorder-treasurer, and Mrs. Gladys Knowlton, council member, will be up for re-election on the printed ballots.

"You can't tell about elections," cautioned Mayor Eddy. "You know names still can be written in."

Just as the men nominated members of their own sex when the women were away, so did the women two years ago when only two men appeared at the community party convention. A citizens'

ticket later was organized to oppose Mrs. Eddy and her group but the women won out. "Maybe the men just don't want us," commented the mayor. "But when they take over, they will find the city in the best shape ever."

"We will leave a bank balance of about \$200—and my land, just look what we have done."

Mrs. Eddy is a democrat and had a republican council but asserted "those kind of politics don't make any difference in Friendly."

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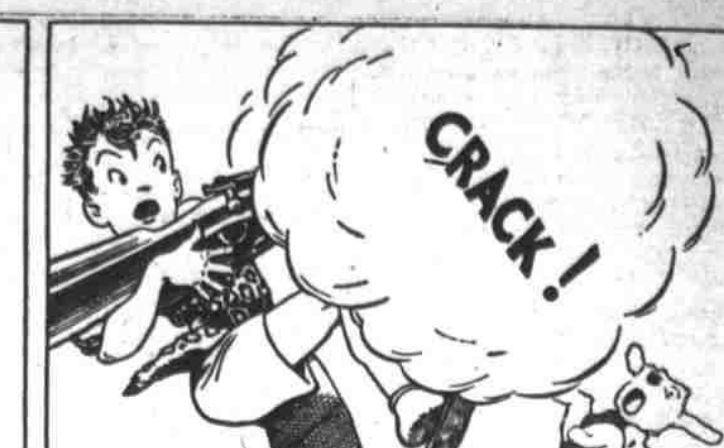

A half dozen games from the lead now, Rego doesn't relish slipping any further from the v.p. One of the most difficult things in baseball is to cut away as much as a six or seven game lead.

If the Barons can keep within striking distance for the next couple of weeks then Tony is confident he will have nothing to worry about from there on out.

George Hobson, brother to Dick, returned to Los Angeles after his unsuccessful tryout here, pitched a four-hit ball game for the Apache Cafe semi-pros in a recent Sunday's start.

He is expected to give professional baseball another try next season.

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Knoxville Pro Fires 132 To Qualify

NEW YORK, May 23 (AP)—Tommy Wright, Knoxville, Tenn., pro, shot 36 holes in 132 strokes yesterday to qualify for the national open tournament, but the chances are he won't be heard from again.

Wright's performance was the best of the many low-scoring feasts that marked sectional qualifying rounds at 30 sites. He knocked eight strokes off par for Atlanta's famous East Lake course.

Whether Wright can shoot the same sort of golf through four gruelling rounds in the tournament proper at the Philadelphia country club, June 8, 9, and 10, is another question. It's not unusual for some unknown player to get hot in these widespread sectional tests, but when the showdown comes, it's generally a man who has had plenty of experience in major tournament play who picks up the marbles.

There's considerable doubt Ralph Guldahl can make it three straight in this year's open, but the favorites will be with him in that group who won exemption from the sectional play by finishing in the low 30 at Cherry Hills last summer.

There's still considerable doubt as to who will represent several Western qualifying sites. At San Francisco, Los Angeles, Tulsa and Minneapolis the low scorers all said they wouldn't be able to make the long trip east and it wasn't definitely settled which alternates could go.

As usual, the famous failures—veteran stars who failed to make the grade—shared much of the interest with those who were successful. Among those who missed out were former champions Walter Hagen and Chick Evans; slugging Jimmy Thompson, Joe Kirkwood, Al Watrous and John (the mysterious) Montague, who finally picked up on the last green after a first-round 51.

On the other hand there were a couple of players who really served notice they meant business. Sam Snead, for example, had the day's second-best single round, a 65, for a 139 total, and Clayton Heafner, the young Charlotte, N. C., pro, carded 137.

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ANOTHER BLOW AT MACHINE POLITICS

Political dictatorship took another whipping Monday, as Tom Pendergast, long the helmsman of the Kansas City democratic machine, stood on the receiving end when orders were issued and heard himself sentenced to 15 months' imprisonment. He had pleaded guilty to federal charges of income tax evasion, and his so-called power faded even in the face of an accusation. For Pendergast, potent as he has been, chose not to fight Uncle Sam.

His plunge from high political place, following the similar experience of Jimmy Hines of Tammany, marks the end of about the last of the great political dynasties. It doesn't mean, of course, that all political operations in our states and cities have been cleansed; but it is another encouraging step.

It has been asserted that the attack on Pendergast itself was a political move—one to give the New Deal ammunition with which to combat the popularity gained by Tom Dewey in his war on Hines. Whatever the motive for the federal action against Pendergast, its result cannot but be healthy.

American cities too long have been subject to "bossism" and in every instance there has come to light evidence of corruption. The case of Pendergast is only another in a long line.

Defenders of Tammany and the Pendergast machine found much of "benevolence" in their operations, asserting that the little man who was loyal to his ward leader and the big boss was rewarded properly; that the machines did much good when they helped those who helped them.

But, it has been established, the "benevolence" worked two ways; and almost without exception the men who held high political power were not above accepting remunerations and favors for exerting that power in the "right" places.

The people have put up with the corruption of machine politics too long; but it is encouraging to note that the bigger machines have collapsed largely because of the weight of their own amassed corruption.

Kansas City, after a time, may be better off; New York City will remain the dual of public officials and conscientious citizens everywhere to be on the alert for the proper safeguarding of democratic principles. There are counties in our own state ruled politically in much the same fashion as Kansas City has been. These machines have functioned just as efficiently without the notoriety of those of Pendergast and Tammany. But they exist, and they must go.

"Little" machines must be attacked, the same as "big" machines.

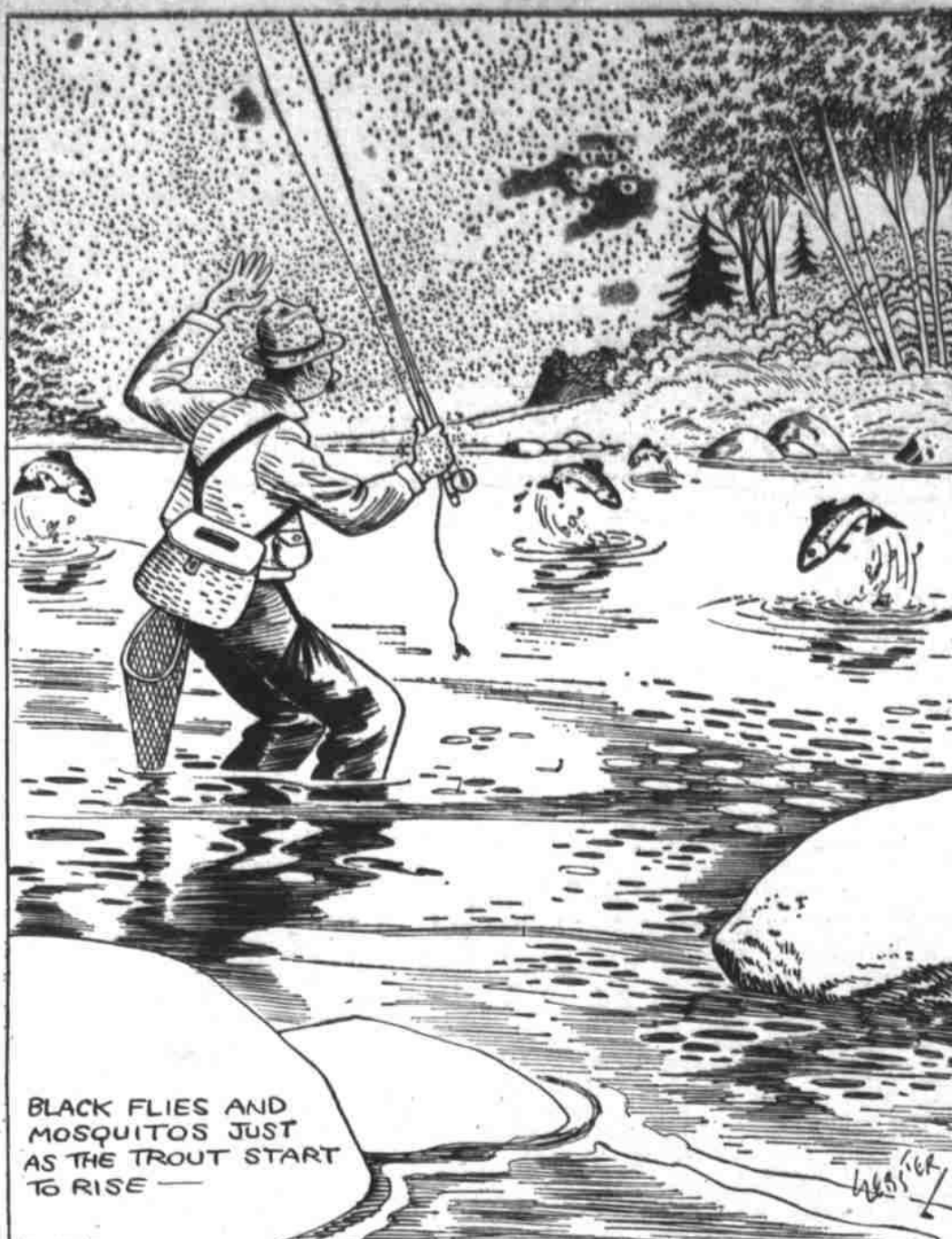
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BLACK FLIES AND MOSQUITOS JUST AS THE TROUT START TO RISE

Autopsy Planned For Former Grid Star

SANTA MONICA, Calif., May 23 (AP)—Friends of Johnny Hawkins, captain and star quarterback of the University of Southern California football team in 1924, expressed hope today an autopsy might substantiate the athlete's belief a gridiron injury caused him to turn to crime a decade ago.

Hawkins, 37, died yesterday after hours of unconsciousness, into which he lapsed complaining of head pains similar to those he reported when he was arrested in 1928 and admitted thefts of jewelry, furs and furnishings valued at nearly \$100,000.

"There's something wrong," Hawkins said then. "I believe a surgeon could make me right."

Dr. Carl Williams of Santa Monica, who planned the autopsy today, said: "Apparently it's a brain abscess, a localized meningitis or something similar," the physician declared. "We must be sure."

Hawkins pleaded guilty to five of 31 counts of burglary after his arrest, but police said he had made no effort to dispose of the loot. He went to prison in 1928, served 29 months and was released. For seven years he had held a responsible post in the art department of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studio, coaching the company basketball team in his spare time.

YOUTHS USE ROADS AS A SPEEDWAY

LOS ANGELES, May 23 (AP)—Speed-crazy youths have Deputy City Attorney Stanley Jewell hopping mad. They've hopped up their old automobiles to do 100 miles an hour.

Jewell reported the youths had appropriated two boulevards in West Los Angeles for speed trials. To gain privacy, they posted their speedways with "Road Closed" signs and red lanterns. Lookouts were placed at strategic spots to warn of approaching officers.

On The Record

LOOK HOMEWARD, ANGEL

I have been reading again the President's appeal for peace addressed on April 15 to Adolf Hitler. It contains a line of argument which it seems to me the administration ought at this moment to address to itself in regard to its domestic policy.

He continued: "Because of the fact that after the acute tension in which the world has been living there would seem to be at least a momentary relaxation . . . this may be an opportune moment for me to send you this message."

If threats continue, it seems inevitable that much of the world must become involved in common ruin. All . . . neutrals . . . will suffer.

"I refuse to believe that the world is of necessity . . . a prisoner of destiny. On the contrary, it is clear that the leaders of great nations have it in their power to liberate their people from the disaster that impends. It is equally clear that in their own minds and in their own hearts the people themselves desire that their fears be ended."

"It is still clear to me . . . that problems can be solved at the council table. It is therefore no answer to the plea for peaceful discussion for one side to plead that unless they receive assurances beforehand that the verdict will be theirs, they will not lay aside their arms. In conference rooms as in courts, it is necessary that both sides enter upon the discussion in good faith, assuming that substantial justice will accrue to both."

"I am convinced that the cause of peace will be greatly advanced if the world were to obtain a frank statement relating to the present and future policy of governments . . . Reciprocal assurances . . . will bring the world an immediate measure of relief."

The discussions which I have in mind relate to the most effective and immediate manner through which the peoples . . . can obtain progressive relief from the crushing burden . . . which is each day bringing them more closely to the brink of economic disaster . . . We recognize complex . . . problems, but we know that study and discussion of them must be held in an atmosphere of peace. Such an atmosphere cannot exist if negotiations are overshadowed by the threat of force."

"I think you will not misunderstand the spirit of frankness in which I send you this message. Heads of governments in this hour are literally responsible for the fate of humanity in the coming years."

History will hold them accountable for the lives and the happiness of all . . . "I hope that your answer will make it possible for humanity to lose fear and regain security for many years to come."

What the President is urging in this message is the use in international relations of the essential democratic process—namely, deliberation, freed of prejudice, in an atmosphere from which the use of force or the threat of force has been removed.

Is, I think, sent to the wrong address in being sent to the head of the Nazi government. For Mr. Hitler does not give even lip service to the democratic process. He believes in force as the only arbiter of destiny."

But it is a message that ought to be reassessed, and reassessed continually, by the government of democratic states. For the practice of democracy is the renunciation of force in the settlement of problems.

Mr. John Gunther, who has recently returned from China, was giving me a little lecture the other day on the ideographs of the Chinese language, and I was reminded to learn that in Chinese the word "democracy" is expressed by the two concepts, "together-peace."

Peace and togetherness are indeed the essence of democracy. As the President points out so clearly in his message to Hitler this peace is disturbed by the introduction into deliberations of threats—that is to say, of force. What form that threat may take is not important. In deliberations between sovereign states the threat is the use of fire, bombs and gas.

But in domestic deliberations force is no less potent because it takes the form of the threat of character assassination or economic ruin, or the organized class struggle.

Force is the final arbiter which stands behind the law. But if it is introduced into the process of making the law, then, the law itself does not represent agreement—the law is not the result of the democratic deliberative process—but only represents the triumph of one side or another in a vested war.

Force is not regulation, therefore, as little Peace of Versailles or Treaty of Brest-Litovsk. It does not represent either the wishes of all or the compromise reached in the interest of all, but the triumph of a faction; and it immediately starts another faction mobilizing to overthrow it.

There is no question that in this country today, in our internal affairs, we are living in fear "and the possibility of such a conflict" which is "of definite concern to the people of the United States."

During the present "momentary relaxation" it may be an "opportune time" to consider that "if threats continue, it seems inevitable that much of the world must become involved in common ruin."

And that, further, "in common ruin" and that we are not, once rooms as in courts" we "enter upon the discussion in good faith, assuming that substantial justice will accrue" to all, "the cause of . . . peace would be greatly advanced."

The President was right in saying to Hitler that our international problems are complex, and that we know that the study and discussion of them must be held in an atmosphere that is not overshadowed by threats.

Our domestic problems are equally complex. But every discussion which we have been holding for the last six years has been overshadowed by the mobilized threat of the force of pressure groups.

No one can pretend, for instance, that the recent coal strike, which involved a conflict of viewpoints between two large trade union organizations and eventually brought in the government, was settled according to impartial deliberation and without the threat of force.

No one can pretend that the settlement of the issue of organization or non-organization of living settled in Hawaii county, Kentucky, without the threat of force.

And the Wagner labor relations act, whose purpose—according to its own first paragraph—is to remove the settlement of labor disputes from the domain of force, is not instrumented to do so, but, on the contrary, is so framed that it can be used as an instrument of pressure.

The deliberations of Congress are constantly threatened by the power forces of the Executive, and the Executive mobilizes pressure, through press conferences and over the radio, to influence Congressional measures.

No one can pretend that the discussion of recovery has been conducted during this Administration in an atmosphere free of force or the threat of force.

The problem of recovery is a complex one, on which various groups of economists hold various ideas. One group believes that the prolonged depression is due to a permanent and ineradicable illness in capitalist economy due to a permanent slow-down in population and technological growth; that there is a glut of savings; that these must be tapped by government spending, and that under all the circumstances deficit financing is a permanent and desirable condition.

Another group believes that this is a puerile simplification; that continued deficit financing will lead us to ruin inside a capitalist economy and will eventually destroy democracy; they believe that the present depression is due to under-investment; that this under-investment is in turn due to numerous causes, among them being economic taxation, government competition with business or unfair terms in certain areas; an artificial pyramiding of costs, assisted by government policies, and the subjecting of the economy to periodic shocks and continued uncertainty.

The proponents of the latter theory point out that, although contraction of population is even more marked in Great Britain and Sweden than it is in the United States, and, although the possibilities of large horizontal technological expansions are certainly no greater there than they are here, those countries made remarkable recoveries during the time that we have been thrashing around, and that this should at least lead to an open-minded reconsideration of policy.

which he received \$315,000 in a "payoff" in connection with a \$500,000 fire insurance rate compromise.

R. Emmett O'Malley, former state insurance superintendent, was indicted on charges of failing to pay taxes on \$52,500 he allegedly received in the compromise. He is to plead on the indictment Saturday.

Judge Otis granted Pendergast probation on a three-year term assessed on the second count of the indictment on condition he pay the \$450,000 he owes.

However, Judge Otis said "if Pendergast could prove he did not have that much on the day he was indicted probation would not be denied."

Friends of Pendergast said they doubted he could have paid that much then or now—let alone the taxes, interest and penalties on the income for other years on which Milligan said he evaded payment.

If this is true, Pendergast will come out of prison bankrupt.

Much of Pendergast's money went to horse race bookmakers. Milligan said he had evidence the topped democratic boss bet \$75,080 in 1936 and "reliable information" he bet \$2,000,000 in 1935.

Of the \$2,000,000, Milligan said, he lost \$600,000.

endants conspired in 1937 to force complete or partial closing of its plants in Ohio, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Illinois, New York and elsewhere, and then "knowingly, maliciously, recklessly, wantonly and wilfully committed, among others," the following alleged acts:

Caused plants to be blockaded and surrounded; threw missiles at workers; formed pickets into "armed mobs x x x which mobs provoked commotion and riots x x x and fired upon law enforcement officers"; halted rail movements into and out of mills;

Also intimidated railroad employees; obstructed tracks; caused suspension of mail service to some plants; threatened employees at their homes, causing some to be beaten; damaged employees' homes; accosted workers' wives and children; halted trucks carrying food and medicine to plants;

Also caused workers to be shot at, assaulted and abducted; prevented loading and unloading of vessels in interstate commerce.

As a result of these asserted acts, Republic contended, it lost business and profit and was forced to expend "large sums" for its protection.

coast. The Squalus went out on a routine "dive" at 8:40 a. m. this morning and failed to come up after an hour, usually a dive limit under trial circumstances.

Admiral C. W. Cole, commandant of the navy yard, ordered the submarine Sculpin to try and make contact with the submerged ship and at 11:15 p. m. (GMT) the first contact was made after the Sculpin discovered a red smoke bomb signal on the surface of the water, indicating the Squalus was in distress.

The Sculpin learned in a telephone conversation with the Squalus that during a deep dive the low duction valve was not closed and water entered the crew's quarters and the after engine room.

The Isles of Shoals, comprising seven rock ledged islands, lies six miles offshore, to the southeast of Portsmouth harbor. The group is three miles long.

The several narrow, shallow channels between the islands are used frequently by fishermen seeking shelter from easterly storms.

in taxes on corporation franchises, inheritance and utilities companies, a one per cent impost on gas, light and phone bills, a one per cent tax on automobile sales, a tax ranging from 2 per cent to 10 per cent on sales of articles classed as luxuries, a levy on card-triggers and shell and one on club dues.

Sponsors calculated the bill would yield between \$10,000,000 and \$11,000,000 annually for pensions, \$2,500,000 for teachers' retirement, \$1,500,000 for aid to delinquent children and \$300,000 for helping the blind.

In the senate the bill will be sent to the state affairs committee of which Senator Rudolph Weirner of Seguin is chairman.

Weirner is one of the authors of the constitutional amendment sent to the house by the senate.

Route of the bill beyond its arrival in the state affairs committee seemed problematical. The committee could report it out favorable or unfavorably, or it could do nothing.

BODY PLANT STRIKE HURTS AUTO ACTIVITY

DETROIT, May 23 (AP)—Approximately 60,000 auto workers were thrown into idleness today as a strike of seven plants of the Briggs Manufacturing company caused widespread layoffs in the highly integrated motor industry.

Chrysler corporation announced it would shut down 10 plants in Detroit, Newcaste, Ind., and Kokomo, Ind., and would be unable to operate any of its units here except Dodge truck.

The spread of idleness resulted from the cutting off of automobile bodies which the Briggs company supplies to a large part of the motor car industry.

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
