VETERANS NEWS

World War II veterans still can reinstate their National Service Life Insurance, the Veterans Administration says.

Some veterans are under the impression that they can no longer obtain this government insurance. World War II veterans who can pass a physical examination may reinstate their lapsed insurance at any time.

The deadline for reinstating NSLI without a physical examination was July 31, 1948, VA explained. Prior to the deadline, veteran could reinstate lapsed

insurance by certifying that his health was as good as it was when the policy lapsed.

This deadline confused some veterans who feel that they cannot reinstate lapsed insurance since the deadline passed. That is not correct, VA said.

Veterans may still reinstate their insurance at any time by passing a physical examination. If the policy has lapsed less than three months, it still can be reinstated without taking the physical examination.

The average age of World War II women veterans is slightly higher than that of their male fellow veterans, VA reports. The feminine average is now an even 30 years, while the average age of the men is 29 years and 9 1/2 months.

The number of veterans of all wars reached 18,744,000 on May 1, 1948, VA says. Of these, 14,887,000 served in World War II. The remainder were veterans of World War I and other wars.

When the nation's population of veterans and members of their families reaches its expected peak of 60,000,000 in 1955, VA predicts that the number of veterans of all wars will be 17,200,000 and the number of persons in their families, 42,800,000.

Uncle Sam's Selective Service

(Editor's note: Below is fourth installment of a series of questions and answers on the second peacetime military training program. It has been prepared under the direction of the Texas Director of Selective Service, Maj. Gen. K. I. Berry.)

QUOTAS AND RESERVE LIABILITIES

Q. How will quotas of men to be inducted from Texas be determined?

A. Quotas will be determined on the basis of the actual number of men in the states, territories and possessions who are liable for training but who are not deferred after classification.

Q. Say a certain area covered by a draft board already has an excellent representation in the armed forces. Will this have anything to do with quotas for that area?

A. Yes. Under the law, credit will be given such areas when quotas are determined.

Q. Can any member of the reserves be ordered into active duty under this law?

A. Yes, some can. If they are not members of organized units participating in scheduled training periods, and have had less than 90 days continuous active service in the armed forces, exclusive of periods of active training duty, the President of the United States is authorized to order them in for a period of not more than 21 months.

Q. How many scheduled training periods does a member of an organized reserve unit have to attend each year?

Named to Head March of Dimes



Mr. E. S. Stewart, prominent Abilene business and civic leader, has been appointed Texas State Chairman of the 1949 March of Dimes.

Stewart, president of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, announced today.

The March of Dimes, conducted nationally each January, is the sole support of the National Foundation and its 2,800 local county chapters.

Funds contributed to the annual drive pay costs of medical care and treatment for polio victims and finance the scientific research and professional education programs sponsored by the National Foundation.

The 1949 appeal will be held January 14-21.

Mr. Stewart, born in Waco, Texas, has been long active in community fund raising and welfare work. A west Texas food broker for 17 years, he is now owner of the Abilene Candy Manufacturing Company.

During the first World War he served overseas with the U. S. Army Engineers. Mr. Stewart is past president of the Abilene Chamber of Commerce and the Rotary Club and in 1942 and 1944 was director of the American Red Cross War Fund in Taylor County.

Mr. O'Connor, in announcing Mr. Stewart's acceptance of the March of Dimes chairmanship, reviewed that when complete incidence figures for this year are tabulated the toll of infantile paralysis in the United States from 1943 through 1948 may well exceed 100,000 cases.

"While the final answer to the mystery of poliomyelitis—the discovery of a cure and a prevention for the disease—lies in the research laboratory," Mr. O'Connor said, "the generous support of the American people is now more vital than ever before if victims of polio, children and adults alike, are to receive the care they must have to achieve maximum recovery."

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Business Stays At Peak Levels

AUSTIN, Sept. 10.—Texas business continued at peak levels, as the composite index of business activity established a new post-war high in July, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

After adjustments for seasonal variation, the July index stood at 227 per cent of the 1939-39 base period, increasing 5 per cent over June and 14 per cent above July 1947. Dr. John R. Stockton, Bureau Statistician, said that this point was only 6 per cent below the all time high reached in January 1945, and a 43 per cent increase from the low point of the reconversion period reached in October 1945.

Four components of the index increased from June: department and apparel store sales, 38 per cent; pay rolls and electric power consumption, 2 per cent; and employment, 1 per cent. On the other hand, miscellaneous freight carloadings and crude runs to stills both slipped 1 per cent from June. All components except miscellaneous freight carloadings increased from 1 to 31 per cent above July 1947.

Retail sales increased 2 per cent from June, after adjustment for

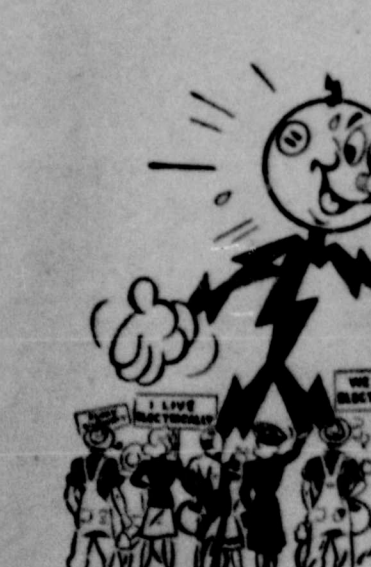
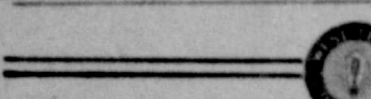

Nancy Holmes SUGGESTS



WHEN school bells ring out again over the countryside, they're more than tolling, readin', ritin' and rhythmic time. They're also reminding mothers that lunch box time is here. And just in case you're a little rusty around the edges on packing lunches, Nancy Holmes of the Best Foods consumer kitchens has a few suggestions to help ease this daily task.

Make menus for the week and purchase ingredients over the week-end. Have sandwich fillings at room temperature and use bread at least a day old. Lettuce should be wrapped separately. Send salt and pepper shakers to school as permanent equipment. And a tip about desserts—with sandwiches a "dessert" is the lunch box, keep fresh and stewed fruit on hand for variety. Also keep a supply of paper cups for containers. They're so handy for desserts such as:

Educated Apples
4 baking apples
4 tablespoons jam
1 cup water
2 tablespoons sugar
2 tablespoons margarine

Wash and core apples; pare upper half of each apple and place in baking dish. Combine jam and nuts and fill center of each apple. Dot with 2 tablespoons of margarine. Combine water, sugar and margarine and pour over apples. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) for about 45 minutes or until apples are tender. Bake frequently while baking. Yield: 4 servings.

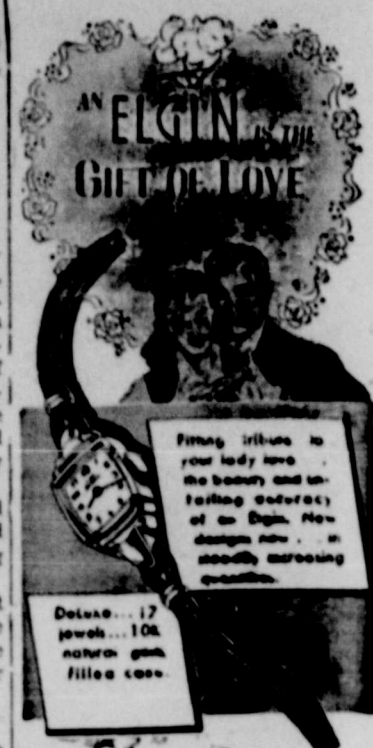

WTCC to Carry Water Fight to 132 West Tex. Counties

ABILENE, Sept. 16—A fight far West Texas water rights will be carried directly into all of the 132 counties of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce territory in a series of project clinics authorized this week by members of the executive committee.

At the same time the committee set the date for the 31st annual West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention to be held in Abilene, Monday, November 8.

Project clinics have been set for the following towns: Tahoka, Tuesday, Sept. 28; Panhandle, Wednesday, Sept. 29; Quanah, Thursday, Sept. 30 and Decatur, Friday, Oct. 1.

Monahans, Tuesday, Oct. 5; Del Rio, Wednesday, Oct. 6; Stephenville, Thursday, Oct. 7 and Breckenridge, Friday, Oct. 8.

These project clinics will replace the regular annual referendum meetings, which have been held in the past and will be in the towns selected by directors at last year's meetings.

"Due to the long range character of the work program adopted at last year's referendum and to the necessity of acting upon committee reports in pursuance of that program, your Executive Board believes that in this year's annual proceedings the energies of the organization should be devoted to acting on committee re-

ports and to carrying out objectives already adopted by previous referendums and annual conventions," the executive board, which was presided over by President C. P. Dodson announced.

In the program as outlined by Manager D. A. Bandoen the project clinics also will receive presentations of industrial reports made by committees of three major West Texas railroads, the Santa Fe, Texas and Pacific and Burlington. These reports will cover surveys now being completed by the respective committees and will represent approximately \$40,000 of factual information.

Already for distribution is the Grain Sorghum report from the WTCC-Burlington industrial committee which was prepared by engineers of the Texas Electric Service. This report deals with factual information on the production and utilization of grain sorghums and will be a handbook for local WTCC directors in an effort at industrialization of this leading West Texas crop.

It was announced the cotton report now being prepared under the WTCC-Santa Fe committee is nearing completion and likewise will be ready for distribution at the project clinics. This is an analysis of the cotton manufacturing potentialities of West Texas. It is being prepared by Mark Wood at Texas Tech.

Another important project to be reported is that of the WTCC-T&P industrial committee, which has under way an economic an-

Shipments of Livestock Below July '47 Level

Austin, Sept. 16—Texas shipments of livestock, totaling 6,000 carloads in July, fell 33 per cent below June and 32 per cent below July 1947, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

This 11-per-cent rise over a year earlier was the result of a 10-per-cent hike in hourly earnings and a 1-per-cent longer work week.

Newspaper publishing workers earned \$82.41 a week, a 22-per-cent increase from July 1947, for the highest-paid group in manufacturing industries.

Averaging \$76.06 a week, workers in crude petroleum production received the largest earnings in the nonmanufacturing group, 19 per cent above their year-ago wages.

Manufacturers of furniture reported the shortest week—37 hours, while employees in public utilities and quarrying averaged 40 hours a week for the shortest work week in the non-manufacturing groups.

Southwest Farm Products Market Steady Past Week

Most southwest farm products sold steady to strong during the past week, but some products brought lower prices, the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration reports.

Cotton closed Monday 75 cents to \$1 higher than a week earlier. Spot middling 15-16 inch brought 31.10 at Dallas and 31 cents at Houston and New Orleans.

Grain markets showed strength during the week. Corn led the way with gains of 12 to 13 cents a bushel. White corn closed Monday around \$2.35 a bushel, and yellow corn \$2.05 in bulk carlots delivered to Texas common points. Sorghum advanced 12 cents a hundred to sell Monday at \$2.60 to \$2.65. Barley went up 9 cents to bring \$1.37 to \$1.42. Oats rose two cents and wheat 2 1-2 cents for the week.

Rough rice prices dropped to support levels during the past week. Active inquiry for oilseed meals for immediate shipment turned prices \$4 to \$7.50 higher.

Most other foodstuffs drifted lower in slack demand. Limited supplies of top grade hay met good demand but plentiful low grades moved slowly. Peanuts weakened, especially for future delivery. Wool and mohair markets remained quiet.

Most fruit and vegetable markets reported active trading during the week. Largely steady to stronger prices prevailed on many products in fairly liberal supply. Colorado potatoes sold 10 to 25 cents higher, reflecting an increase in the government support price. Louisiana sweet potatoes found improved demand.

Cooler weather stirred interest in eggs and poultry this week. Moulting flocks cut egg production, and top quality offerings cleared promptly. Poultry markets struck a firmer tone, with roasters and bakers in especially good demand.

Cattle prices had their ups and downs during the week, but Monday's strong markets resulted in net advances of mostly 50 cents to \$2 a hundred pounds. Calves and weaners showed the most consistent gains. Medium and good calves ranged from \$20 to \$25 a hundred pounds, while good and choice heavy calves took the same spread at Wichita and Kansas City. Oklahoma City and Denver paid \$25.50 to \$26.50.

Sheep changed little at Texas markets but sold 50 cents to a dollar or more higher at most other terminals. San Antonio bought nanny goats at \$6 to \$6.75 a hundred and kids at \$4 to \$4.40 each. Cull ewes sold down to \$6.50. Ewes ranged from \$8.50 to \$10.50 at most markets and reached \$11 at Kansas City.

Slight gains on Monday's hog markets failed to overcome the earlier losses which amounted to mainly 50 cents a hundred on butcher classes and stockers and feeders. Sows changed little. San Antonio moved good and choice feeder pigs at \$23.50 to \$24.50. Stocker pigs sold from \$26 down at Fort Worth and Oklahoma City. Delicious apples from New Mexico appeared at Fort Worth, while Kansas Jonathans went to Kansas City. Oklahoma watermelons sold a little lower at most southwest markets.

Dickens ACA Gives Information About Spud Support Price

Why does the government support the prices farmers receive for potatoes? Do these price supports cause the consumers to have to pay high prices for potatoes? Does the farmer get more than he should for his potatoes? These and many other questions have been discussed in the news lately. The public should have all the facts.

First, why does the Government support the prices farmers receive for potatoes? At the beginning of the war production of many farm products needed in the war effort were below National requirements. Potatoes was one of these crops. The Congress told farmers that the Government would assure them prices for their potatoes, and other farm products in short supply, equal to 90 per cent of parity during the war and for two years after the official close of the war. In doing this the Government assures the farmers that the price of his potatoes would have 90 per cent of a fair relationship to the price that farmers had to pay for what they had to buy. Congress gave

industry similar assurances.

Just what are the farmers getting for their potatoes under the Government price support program? The support price on number one top grade potatoes is \$2.35 per hundred pounds. It cost the farmer sixty five cents per hundred pounds for cleaning, grading, sacking and inspection. This leaves him \$1.70 per hundred pounds. For lower grades, number 1B or number 2 potatoes the support price is \$1.17 a hundred pounds. When the sixty five cents is deducted this leaves him 52 cents per hundred pounds. The farmer is out the expense of preparing the land, buying seed potatoes, planting, working and harvesting the potatoes and hauling them to market.

The retail price of potatoes in some instances are as high as \$7.00 per hundred pounds or 7 cents per pound. Why the difference between the price the farmer received and the price the consumer has to pay? Freight on 100 pounds of potatoes, car lots, from Herford, Texas, where most of the Texas potatoes are being bought, to Houston, Texas, is 65 cents per hundred pounds. This brings the cost of potatoes in Houston up to \$3.00 per hundred. To this is added brokerage fees, wholesale markup and retail markup.

State Highway Office Plans New Farm-to-Mkt. Roads

A new program of farm-to-market road construction is being considered by the Texas Highway Department, according to an announcement from John S. Redditt, chairman of the highway commission.

This program will be designed to take advantage of new Federal aid grants authorized by Congress.

"It is unfortunate that funds for this type of road will not be as large as those of the present (Federal Aid) program, Mr. Redditt said. "The amount available will only be enough to enable us to build about one-half the mileage we now have under construction or have completed since V-J day."

Redditt said during the next six weeks highway engineers will contact all county commissioners throughout the state and secure their ideas of farm-to-market road needs in their areas.

Governor Jester Proclaims Sept. as Child Safety Month

AUSTIN, Sept. 16—Governor Beauford Jester has proclaimed September as "Child Safety Month" to focus attention on the need for protecting children from traffic accidents as they start back to school.

A statewide program reaching into every community that has an American Legion Post is being sponsored jointly by the Legion and the Texas Safety Association.

Motorists are being urged to

"watch out for the kids—give them a brake." Parents are urged to help teach safe habits to youngsters. The kids themselves are reminded not to play in the street or road and always to look before crossing a thoroughfare.

Governor Jester in his proclamation pointed out that 218 children below the age of 14 were killed in Texas traffic accidents last year, while 1826 boys and girls were injured.

Only Two Cases of Smallpox Reported In State for 1948

AUSTIN, Sept. 16—An interesting sidelight on public health in Texas was revealed in the monthly report of the Texas State Department of Health for the week ending August 28th, which showed a total of 2 cases of smallpox for this year, while in the same period there were 588 cases of diphtheria.

Commenting on these comparative figures, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, stated that diphtheria is as readily controlled by immunization as is smallpox, but that apparently the public has failed to recognize this fact or to act upon it.

"Smallpox, which is highly contagious, is no longer considered a major health problem in Texas," Dr. Cox said, "and this is due to widespread vaccination against the disease. Diphtheria, equally contagious, can also be reduced to the point where a single case is a rarity, but only when parents awake to the fact that every child should be immunized in infancy. The baby's doctor will recommend when this should be done, and if all children were given this protection, there would be none susceptible to contract this killing disease."

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Auto Buying Rules On New Credit Curb Are Announced

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16—These new Federal Reserve Board rules for buying automobiles on the installment plan will go into effect Sept. 20.

A down payment of one-third the cash price must be made on pre 1938 models, used or new 1949 models, or other new cars.

For 1938-48 model cars the down payment must be either one-third the cash price or one-third the "average retail value."

If the balance after the down payment is over \$1,000, 18 months will be allowed for full payment. The period will be 15 months if the balance is less than \$1,000.

"Average retail value" is determined by checking official price guides the reserve board listed along with announcement of the new installment regulations. To make up for price differences in various parts of the country, the board specified these areas for each guide:

States east of the Mississippi river—American Auto Appraisal, Market Analysis Report, Arizona, California, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington—Kelley Bluebook Official Guide, Idaho, Oregon and Wisconsin only—Northwest Used Car values, Wisconsin only—Official Wisconsin Automobile Valuation Guide.

All areas may use these guides: Bluebook (executive edition), Redbook National Used Car Market Report, National Automobile Dealers Association Official Used Car Guide, effective October 1, The Official Automobile Guide (Price edition) and Official Automobile Price Guide (Price edition).

He made a better Woolcott than Woolcott did. I didn't know until I read the paper the next morning who I had seen. He was Kaughman, the man who wrote the show.

Life has embarrassing moments. Here is one of many I have encountered:

Back in the early 1920's, a reunion of the Texas Rangers was held in Ranger. They were the men who had served on the frontier, 10 years after the Civil War. I was the rather young editor of the Times and I invited half a dozen of them to go into the drug store and have something to drink. After the sodas had been served, I handed the young lady attendant a dollar bill but she pushed it back with the remark, as she looked right at me: "We are not charging you. You are a Confederate anything."

State Revenue May Reach One Billion

AUSTIN, Texas—Revenue during the current two-year fiscal period is expected to reach one billion dollars.

The state started the new fiscal year Sept. 1—the second of the period—with \$74,076,814 surplus in its general revenue fund. Total cash in all state funds was \$176,827,389.

Revenue during the first year of the current two-year fiscal period was 513 million dollars, Comptroller George Sheppard said.

"A billion dollar biennium seems certain provided current levels are maintained," Sheppard said. "The state's revenue was almost exactly double the revenue of 254 million in 1945, emphasizing the sensitivity of state revenue to changes in quantity production and dollar value."

"The greatest single item of income for this year was 87 million dollars crude oil tax for the first time in history."

The comptroller again noted that inflation had a great deal to do with increased state revenues.

New Cotton Type Is Revealed

DEERING, Mo.—A new cotton variety of great possibilities has been developed in this southeastern Missouri cotton town of 250 population and is being shown to growers.

It is early-maturing, of above average lint turn-out, excellent in fiber strength and suitable for mechanical picking. Tests over a 12-year period from cotton states show that the variety, known as "Paula," has a wide range and is adaptable for any cotton section.

It was developed by Paul Hutchens of Deering and named in honor of his daughter.

Deering Farms officials said that about 20,000 acres of land was planted with the Paula variety this year.

Hutchens started in 1936 to find a cotton variety which would hold up in any climate and under any weather conditions. He estimated conservatively that he had worked with as many as 15,000 cotton selections in the search for what he wanted. In 1940, one of the selections appeared to be the one he sought.

For the last six years, Paula cotton has been under close observation in experimental stations in many cotton states, to determine what the variety would do year after year. Paula ranked at the top season after season in every climate.

Paula has a high average of all the factors that go to make up a good all purpose cotton in all soil and climate conditions. It is a good storm resistant cotton. Bolls at the top of the plant are about the same size as those at the bottom.

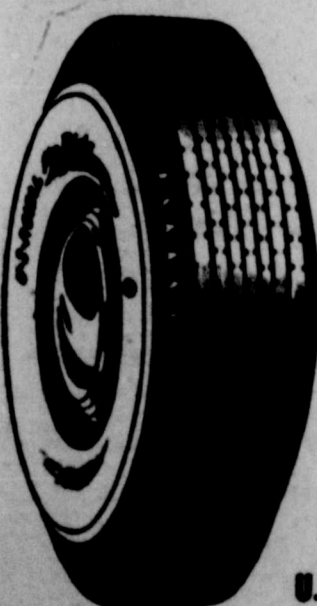

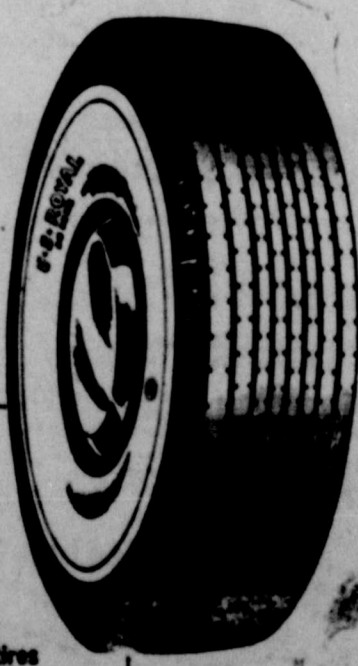

Play Safe and Call Veterinarian When Your Pet Is Sick

Prompt Advice by "Dog's Best Friend" Can Save Much Misery

The dog is "man's best friend" but the dog's best friend is his veterinarian and the best advice that can be given to the owner of a sick or injured dog is to "run, don't walk" to the veterinarian, states the Gaines Dog Research Center, New York City.

According to the Center, thousands of dogs live out their lives in misery or die needlessly because their magnified though well-meaning owners either ignore symptoms of disease in their pets or else through the use of home remedies and treatments, put off obtaining the advice of a veterinarian until it is too late.

One of the commonest mistakes dog owners make is to attempt to worm a puppy at home. Some of the very sickest dogs veterinarians are are supplied which the owner has attempted to worm himself with drug-store remedies.

Worm medicines are of necessity composed of toxic and potent drugs and are definitely unsafe in the hands of the average dog owner.

Aside from the danger involved in home worm treatments, many dog owners do not realize that there is more than one type of worm and that different remedies are required to be effective against the several types of worms.

Canine ear, eye and tooth troubles should receive prompt professional attention. Running or sore eyes, if unattended, can lead to ulceration and eventual blindness. Ear troubles which are usually indicated by the dog's constantly shaking his head, scratching at the ear or showing unwillingness to have his head touched, can bring on deafness if not treated correctly.

One of the most foolish things for a dog owner to do is to go probing in his pet's ears with an instrument, as the dog's eardrum is easily perforated. Dental troubles in dogs are fairly frequent. A decayed or ulcerated tooth can give a dog a good deal of pain and can cause toxemia and other illnesses. Having a veterinarian periodically remove the tartar from a dog's teeth and examine them with a view to the removal of any abscessed molars is good dog health insurance.
