Night Good Will Trips Are Adopted By Board

The board of directors of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce met in regular session Tuesday morning to discuss important matters before that body.

A lengthy discussion of the proposed good will or trade trip over the county for the purpose of advertising the Runnels County Fair was heard by the board. For many years a two day trip has been made to all towns in the county. Those speaking in regard to the proposition Tuesday morning were of the opinion that very few people were reached on these trips and that it would be impossible to get a good hearing on short stops. The substitute for the trade trip that met with favor from the board members was the visiting of some eight or nine localities at night. The board voted to adopt this kind of trip and an itinerary was drawn up which will begin August 26, and a visit twice a week will be made until September 19th.

The program committee of the chamber, composed of E. M. Lynn, Geo. Holman and Chas. Coombs, was instructed to arrange a program of entertainment including a good band concert for each community to rehearse the program and have it ready by the opening date. On each of these programs the community visited will be asked to furnish at least one number on the evening's program. Speakers will be few and talks short on these programs and the evening will be devoted to amusement to which everybody in the territory will be invited to attend. The few speeches to be made will be short announcements regarding the fair features that will be seen this year.

The itinerary adopted Tuesday is as follows: Norton, Tuesday, August 26; Crews, Friday, August 29; Paint Rock, Tuesday, September 2; Wingate, Friday, September 5; Miles, Tuesday, September 9; Bronte, Friday, September 12; Rowena, Tuesday, September 16; and Winters, Friday, September 19.

Ballingerites will be asked to eat an early supper, get in their cars and join the boosters. Exact time of departure from Ballinger will be announced before each trip so that the party can arrive at the community and be ready to present the program by 8:00 o'clock.

One reason for favoring night trips is because more local citizens can go and it is the hope of the committee that more than 100 cars will line up for each jaunt. The communities will be notified at once of the date of the visit and publicity will be sent to each regarding programs to be presented.

The board also heard a report on the 100 questionnaires sent out regarding the location of a branch office of the farm board in Ballinger. Only 25 of the 100 answered the questions and 24 of these were unfavorable to the proposition. One man answered that he would like to see an office here but believed his community would not be interested. The board voted to let the matter stand as it is and do nothing further at this time. In the future if the farmers became interested in the cooperative marketing plan and want such an office here the local commercial organization will make every effort to secure one.

The board voted resolution of thanks to R. J. Deens for the contemplated paying on Hutchings Avenue from Tenth Street to the Colorado River bridge.

It was voted to instruct the secretary to have signs giving the name of the stream painted and erected at each bridge leading into Ballinger. Ballinger tourists found this information on bridges in many states this summer and believe that it is information that everyone wants to know. The signs will be placed at the right side of each bridge.

Sterling Supporters Meet Here Monday

A meeting of the voters was called Monday night at the court house here for the purpose of organizing a Runnels County Sterling-for-Governor Club. About twenty men attended the meeting and business was dispatched rapidly.

Frank C. Dickey, of Ballinger, and Geo. Hill, of Winters, were named county chairmen, and Fred Kiechle will look after the vote at Rowena and Offen. Mr. Hill will look after the north end of the county and Mr. Dickey after general details of the work.

It is planned to stage a county wide rally in Ballinger Friday night when a prominent out-of-town speaker will be here. Following the speaking and program a county-wide Sterling-for-Governor Club will be formed. Committee for different phases of the work were named and those in charge of the rally will start at once to secure a speaker who will draw a big crowd.

A rally committee named Monday night is composed of W. C. McCarver, W. A. Bridwell, C. J. Lynn, E. C. Baskin and O. L. Parish. These men will meet at once and arrange a program.

It was also decided to mail literature to every voter in the county this week, and E. M. Lynn was named chairman of this committee. Mr. Lynn is having printed a summary of the campaign arranged in questions and answers and these will go forth to the voters this week signed by leading men and women of the county.

Mr. Dickey stated Tuesday morning that by Friday night there would be formed and working in the county a women's Sterling-for-Governor Club.

A finance committee to raise funds for carrying on the work was named composed of J. McGregor, J. J. Beck, Harry Lynn, T. B. Saunders and John Weeks. Geo. Hill and others from Winters who were present agreed to raise a certain amount of money at Winters and also to secure signers for the circular to be mailed from here this week. The finance committee will have a budget and call on Sterling supporters for financial aid in taking care of the campaign in this county.

Those present at the meeting Monday night were enthusiastic and are willing to take off their coats and work for their candidate in the short time remaining before the second primary. Further activities will be planned next week after the rally here Friday night and the county club organized.

Six State Offices To be Decided 23rd

Democratic voters of Texas on the 23rd of this month will go to the polls in the second primary to cast their ballots in six races for state offices. The heavy vote of the first primary which totaled 835,000, is forecast again in the run off. In addition to the six important state races many counties have interesting local races which will help to draw voters to the polls.

In Runnels county there is one county office and three precinct offices contested which are expected to increase interest. The only race in the county in which all votes will have a say is between W. L. Brown and W. A. Forgy for tax collector. In the first primary, W. L. Brown, incumbent, received the high vote, but not a majority. Each candidate has spent much time since then in soliciting votes.

Commissioners precinct No. 1 will have a run off between Mapes and Stewart, and in commissioners precinct No. 2, H. B. Pos and C. L. Harter will battle for a majority.

A race of particular interest to Ballinger voters and justice precinct No. 1 will be for the election of a justice of the peace. Carl Wilson and J. C. Cook are the contenders for this place.

Candidates for state offices whose names will appear on the second primary ballot are: For Governor—Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, Ross Sterling.

For lieutenant-governor—Sterling P. Strong, Edgar Witt.

For state treasurer—Charlie Lockhart, John E. Davis.

For attorney general—Robert Lee Bobbitt, James V. Alfred.

For commissioner of agriculture—J. E. McDonald, A. H. King.

For state railroad commissioner—Pat M. Neff, W. Gregory Hatcher.

Assessment of 40 Cents is Made By County Trustees

The Runnels county board of education met in regular August meeting at the court house here Monday afternoon. All members of the board with the exception of E. E. King, who was detained on account of a funeral, were present. Those present were S. D. Williams, W. J. Gardner, Duncan Hensley and C. H. Ray.

The board set the date of the annual district trustees meeting to be held at the court house in Ballinger on August 27 at 2:00 o'clock. A detailed program is being arranged by the county superintendent and will be mailed to each trustee in the county before the meeting date. The state department will send no representative here this year to meet with the trustees. There are no new school laws to be interpreted and in order to economize the department is sending no representatives to any county meetings. Only a half day session will be held this year as the board felt that everything necessary could be transacted in this time. There are 168 common district trustees in the county and 35 independent district trustees.

The most important piece of business transacted by the board here Monday was the setting of the county assessment for administration expense at 40 cents per capita for the ensuing year. This levy is for all scholastics in the county both common and independent districts.

Under communication from the state department the board is authorized to credit the net proceeds of the county available fund, which consists of interest on the county permanent fund and interest on daily balances, to the county administration fund. It is then authorized to levy a per capita assessment for the remainder of the administration budget.

The assessment last year for this fund was \$1.25 per capita against the scholastic of the common districts only. The assessment of 40 cents per capita against scholastics of the independent district of over 50 scholastics is a new levy and will be an added expense to these districts. At the same time the expense for this fund has been cut in the common districts from \$1.25 to 40 cents per capita.

Interest credits for this year are also new. Heretofore this money has been distributed to the county apportionment fund but this year will go into the administration expense. This amount is small, only about 15 to 17 cents per capita.

Five Primaries are Balloting Today

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—Citizens of five states voted in primaries today on candidates involving national figures.

Oklahoma and Ohio Democrats are selecting candidates to oppose Republican senatorial incumbents, W. B. Pine and R. C. McCullough, neither of whom has opposition in his own party.

Senator George W. Norris, of Nebraska, faced bitter opposition from regular Republicans due to his defection to support the Democratic presidential nominee in the last general election.

Senator Tom Heflin is out of the Alabama Democratic primary picture as voters selected his successor in the party. Heflin is running as an independent following his defection to the Republican presidential candidate in the last general election.

Senator Joseph T. Robinson, of Arkansas, faced an opponent in the Democratic primary for the first time in twelve years.

Besides his widow, Mrs. Georgie Alice Dunn, and his daughter, Mrs. Low of Abilene, the Rev. Mr. Dunn is survived by one other daughter, Mrs. James W. Smith of Winters, thirteen grandchildren, seven brothers and five sisters.

It is only going to be a short time if dry weather continues until cotton will be moving in Runnels county. So far cotton men have been reluctant to estimate the production for the county this year. It has been difficult to predict because of lack of rain with which to finish making the crop. Hope has been expressed for a general rain which would supply enough moisture to start the plant to fruiting.

There will be many sore arms in Ballinger during the remaining two weeks of August. The announcement that children must be vaccinated against small-pox before they can enter school will be the cause. A large number of eligible students have never been vaccinated and doctors probably will experience a rush during the next two weeks.

Sports have been almost forgotten in this section this summer but football will be in full swing in a few more weeks and lovers of that game soon will be getting their full quota of thrills. Installation of lights for night games at Abilene and Brownwood will give fans here an opportunity to see more grid battles than ever before. It is only a two-hour drive to either city and games can be witnessed and parties return home before midnight. Night football has proven a success in every particular and especially in this section should prove very profitable to the schools arranging after-supper exhibitions.

The biggest effort being made in the present political campaign is to get voters to the polls. Many people who lost their vote in the first primary have already publicly stated that they will not go into the second primary and for this reason the figures are expected to be low. It has been true in most run-offs that a very small proportion of the voters go to the polls and it is hard to forecast what the results will be in any race. This is one of the reasons why many citizens are opposed to the second primary. Voters really should have a keener interest in it than in the first primary. The election next Saturday week will mean the naming of the Democratic nominees and every Democrat should feel it his solemn duty to have a voice in saying whose name will be placed on the general election ticket in November.

CANDIDATE MAKES PROFIT ON CAMPAIGN EXPENSES

SMALL-POX

In 1929, the last year for which figures are available, there were 33,992 cases of small-pox in the United States (including only forty-four states and the District of Columbia).

This is the large tribute exacted by ignorance and indifference.

Small-pox is the one disease which we can with unfailing certainty prevent, and yet, in 1929, 33,992 individuals contracted the disease—132 of these died.

It is of interest to note that there were more cases of small-pox in 1929 than in 1928, and more in 1928 than in 1927.

There is a large mass indifference to small-pox in the United States. Many are lulled to a false sense of security by the relative rarity of small-pox.

It is rare, however, for a year

to pass without some graphic and disastrous illustration of what can happen to a community which has neglected vaccination.

In 1925 there were outbreaks of small-pox in Washington, D. C., and Camden, New Jersey, and among those stricken approximately one out of every three died.

In 1916 in California there were 2,794 cases of small-pox, with 232 deaths.

Dr. Dublin, in his survey of small-pox in the United States and Canada for 1929, well summarized the condition by saying:

"The danger of a widespread outbreak of virulent small-pox is ever present, because the number of susceptible persons is large."

"Until this number is greatly reduced by general acceptance of vaccination there will be no real security against small-pox."

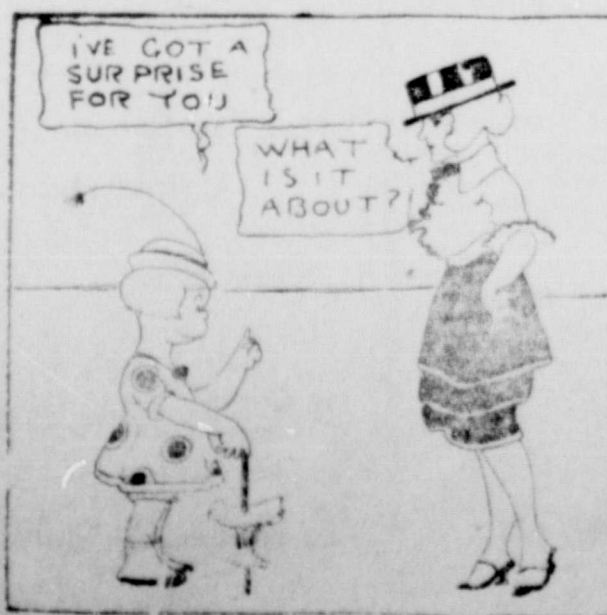

STATE STARTS CAMPAIGN TO SAVE SMALL GAME FISH

AUSTIN, Aug. 12.—A campaign for preservation of small game fish has been started by the state game, fish and oyster commission, and fishermen are being urged to return fish to the water that are under size. Tape lines or measuring sticks should form a part of every fisherman in the opinion of members of the commission, who have instructed wardens to be on the watch for violations of the law regulating the size of fish that may be kept.

A bass less than 11 inches long must be thrown back and allowed to grow before he is fair game while crappies must be at least seven inches.

Fishermen also were cautioned against the taking of minnow bass and crappies in seines and have been asked to determine the species of each minnow before keeping it for bait purposes.

Numerous arrests for violation of fishing laws have been reported during the past few months.

Editor Stahlman Dies at Nashville

(By Associated Press)
NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 12.—Edward B. Stahlman, 87, publisher of the Nashville Banner, died today after an extended illness.

The reputation of Edward Bushrod Stahlman as a fighting journalist was rivaled by his fame as a transportation builder.

Before he purchased the Nashville, Tenn., Banner in 1885 and threw it into bitter business and political battles in which threats of personal violence to its publisher failed to make it waver, he had developed himself from railroad laborer to one of the best known authorities in the country on transportation.

His long and circuitous career, was marked by milestones of hard work. When he retired at the age of 86 he had never had a vacation, even though he went to work as a boy. Soon after his family came from Germany, where he was born on September 2, 1843, his father died, leaving his mother and seven children dependent upon this son.

Although he had been crippled when a school bench fell on his leg, the boy became a member of a railroad construction gang near Gallatin, Tenn., during the Civil War. When the general manager of the road changed to pass and see the frail youth, he remarked that he was "too light for that heavy work."

The boy replied:
"I was hired to do a man's work and I'm going to do it."

The general manager was impressed by his determination, and promoted him to a clerkship. Subsequently he went to Bristol, Virginia-Tennessee, on a railroad lumber job and while there became connected with the Southern Express Company as traveling auditor, and moved in 1886 to Nashville. Five years later Mr. Stahlman—who was known as "Major"—became contracting freight agent for the Louisville & Nashville railroad from which position he rose to general freight agent, general traffic manager and a vice-presidency, and later to vice-president of the Louisville, New Albany & Chicago railway, the "Monon Route." He also served as commissioner of the Southern Steamship and Railway Lines.

While he was with the Louisville, New Albany & Chicago, that line built a road between Chicago and Indianapolis and established through lines for passengers and freight; the Southern Steamship and Railway Lines was reorganized after he joined it, taking into its membership all the railroads south of the Ohio river and east of the Mississippi to Washington, besides five coastwise lines.

Major Stahlman was equally successful as a newspaper publisher. When he purchased the Nashville Banner, it had a circulation of only a few thousand, but terminating his railroad affiliations, he devoted himself entirely to the duties of editor and publisher and developed the paper to a position of commanding influence in the South.

Major Stahlman was a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, and was one of the organizers of the national Young Men's Christian Association. He was a thirty-second degree Mason.

In 1896 he married Mrs. Mollie T. Claiborne of Nashville, and three children were born to them. Mrs. Stahlman died in 1915, and in 1920 he married Miss Sarah Shelton of Nashville. They had one child.
