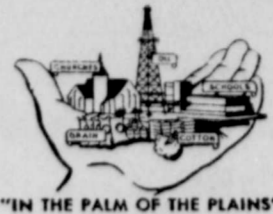

Antelopes Close 1965 Season With 28-13 Loss to Lockney; Place Third In District 3-AA

The Abernathy Antelopes fell to Lockney in their final game of the season at Lockney last Friday night. The wide open contest ended 28-13 with one Abernathy touchdown called back by penalties.

Thirteen AHS Seniors played in the final game of their high school football career. They include Nat DeLeon, Jim Barton, Terry Barton, Larry Crowder, Mike Franklin, Jimmy Don Franklin, Charlie Thomas, Lane Wade, Mike Tannehill, Rondall Preston, Randy Downs, Robert Mason and Pat Hale.

With the loss to Lockney, the 'Lopes fell into third place in District 3-AA in the final standings. Friona secured the title with a 27-0 victory over Floydada. Lockney was second with a 4-1 record, its only loss coming from Friona. Olton, Floydada and Dimmitt had 1-4 records to save each other from the cellar.

The Longhorns scored against the 'Lopes on their first series of downs. Neil Mitchell carried the ball over from the 12 and Dale Galloway kicked the first of four extra points of the night.

'Lopes Tie Score

In the second quarter, both offenses broke loose and a total of 27 points was scored. The 'Lopes opened up the scoring spree on a 30-yard pass play from Quarterback Lane Wade to Mike Tannehill. Tannehill booted the extra point and the game was all tied up again.

The Longhorns struck again on a 76-yard drive that put them in the lead for good. Mitchell scored his second TD of the night on a 2-yard dive. After Galloway's kick, the score was 14-7. When they got the ball again, they were off and running and scored from the 26 on a pass from Galloway to Melvin Sissney.

With seconds left in the half, Lane Wade guided the 'Lopes 66 yards down the field in 6 short plays for a score. Wade counted the six points on a 4-yard jaunt. This time Tannehill's kick was off and the 'Lopes went in at halftime behind 21-13.

Lockney put the icing on the cake early in the second half when Mitchell added his third six-pointer of the night. It came on a 24-yard gallop that caught the 'Lopes looking.

The 'Lopes were not ready to give up, but were never able to sustain a drive for a TD. One penetration carried them to the 13 before a fumble gave Lockney the ball.

With 34 seconds left in the season, Lane Wade took the ball around his right end and in a breathtaking demonstration of running ability, carried the ball 52 yards for six points. The dazzling performance was in vain however as the referees called the play back on a penalty.

Terry Barton led the 'Lopes defensive team from his linebacker position with 16 individual tackles. Other defensive standouts for the 'Lopes were Nat DeLeon and Mike Tannehill at cornerback, and Charlie Thomas at middle guard.

The Antelopes posted a 7-3 season mark compared to a 3-7 mark last year and a 0-10 record in 1963. Against ten opponents, the 'Lopes scored 249 points for a 24.9 average. Opponents totaled 110 points. Strangely enough, two of Abernathy's defeats came against Post and Lockney, who we beat last year in a very unsuccessful season.

The 'Lopes are to be congratulated for a very successful season in 1965. Special credit goes to each boy and coach. Coaches for the 1965 squad were Don Williams, Charles Williams, Kenneth Jones, Wayne Preston and Mitch LeMoine.

Warning Sirens Sought; City Enlargement Set

The Abernathy City Council met in regular session Monday night, November 8th, at 7:30 p.m., with all members being present.

The first business on the agenda for the Council's consideration was a report by the Civil Defense Director. Upon listening to Truman Richerson's report on warning system for Abernathy, the "City Dads" authorized Mr. Richerson to apply for federal aid for two Civil Defense sirens for the City. The estimated cost of the entire warning system will be around \$2,400. Richerson will apply to the Federal Government for one-half of this cost.

The City's present warning system now consists of a single siren mounted on the city water tower in back of City Hall. These two, three-phase sirens will be loud enough to give the entire City adequate warning in case of an emergency.

The next order of business was the consideration of a new patrol car for the Police Department. After considering the matter to some degree, the Council authorized Bob Sokoll, City Manager, to take bids for this new car, which will be opened Monday morning, November 29th at a special called session.

The Council then approved a petition signed by Virgil Phillips and Jimmie Lee Mason, representing BMH, Incorporated, requesting annexation of Addition Number Three to the Virgil Phillips Addition for incorporation to the City. The plan for this subdivision was approved by the City Council at the Oct. 11 meeting, and includes lots 58 thru 114 and Tract C. The Council passed an ordinance setting a Public Hearing for this annexation for 10:00 a.m., Monday, November 29th at City Hall.

The City Council then authorized bid advertisements for water and sewer improvements in this subdivision. It had already been agreed at a previous regular meeting for the City to participate in the amount of 75% of the total cost of these water and sewer improvements. This 75% of the total cost would be paid to the developer, based on a pro-rata amount of each lot, when the residence are completed. Development of this subdivision will begin as soon as possible.

Other business considered by the Council was made up of a monthly financial report presented by the City Manager and authorization for installation of stop signs at the intersections of Avenue F and

Major Bloss returned to Reese again in April as a T-37 instructor pilot in the 3501st PTS. He returned from duty in Wiesbaden, Germany. He assumed present duty Nov. 1.

He is married to the former Martha Bales of Lampasas, Tex. They have a son, Brian David, 5, and a daughter, Cynthia Ann, 5 months.

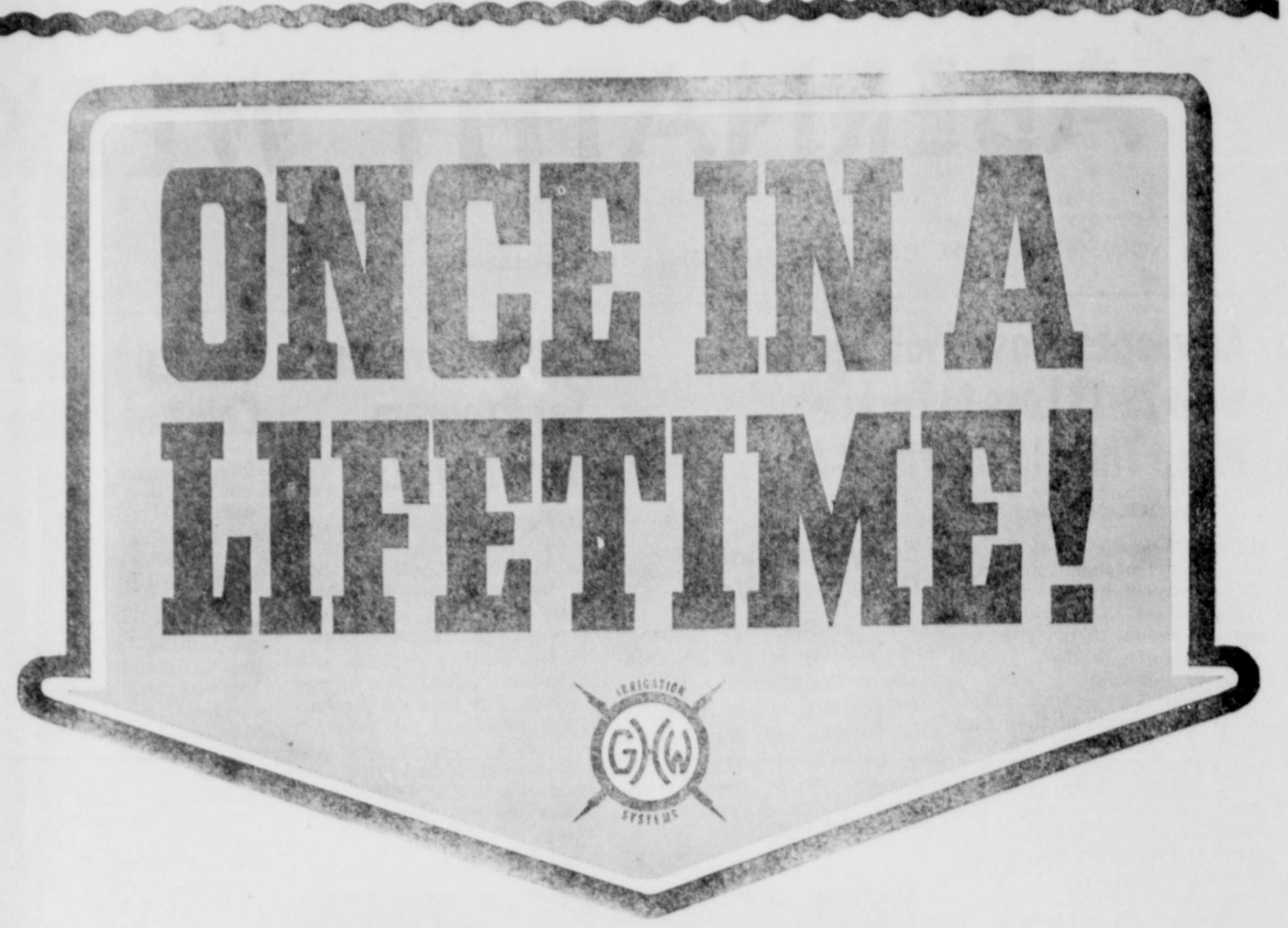

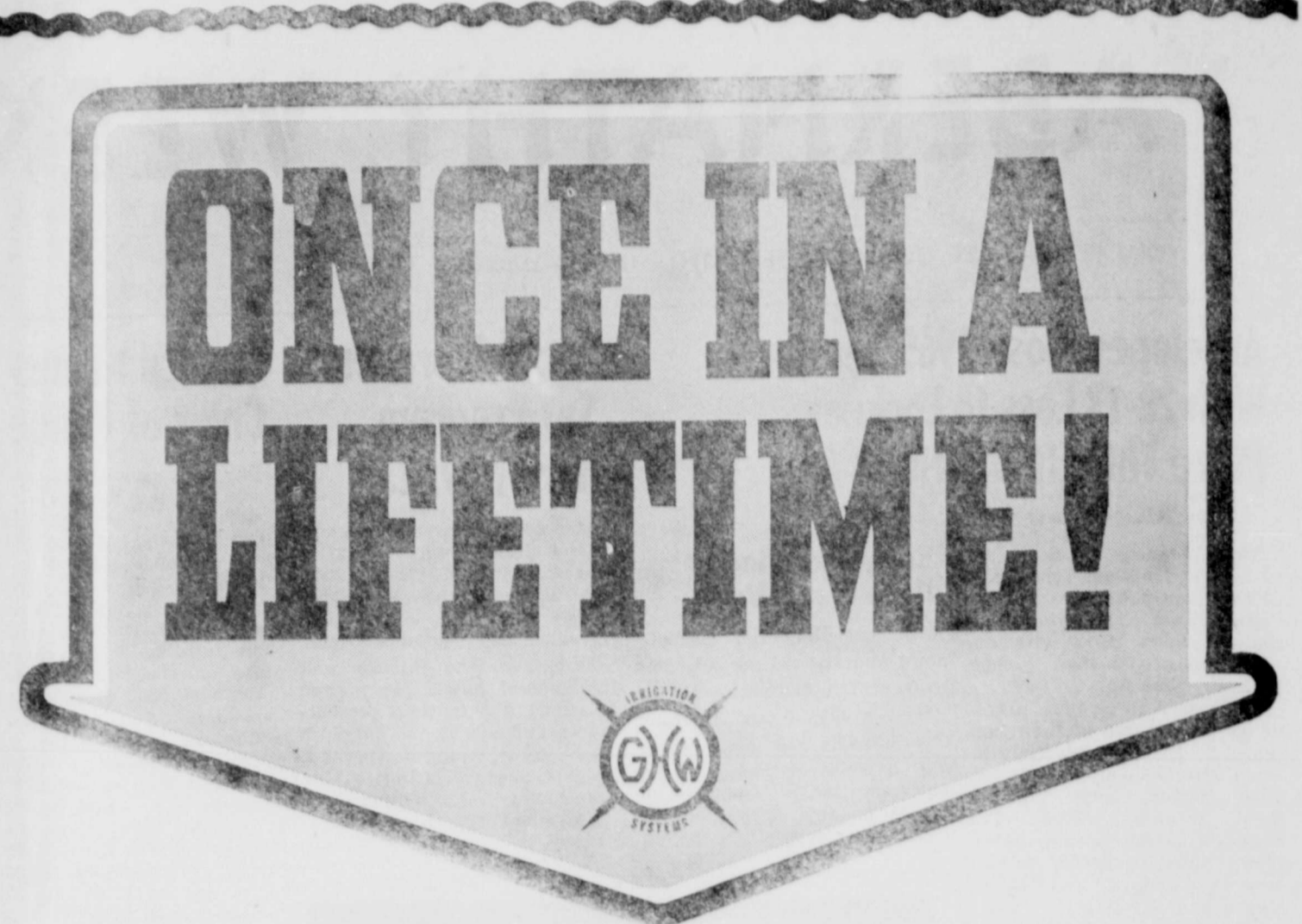

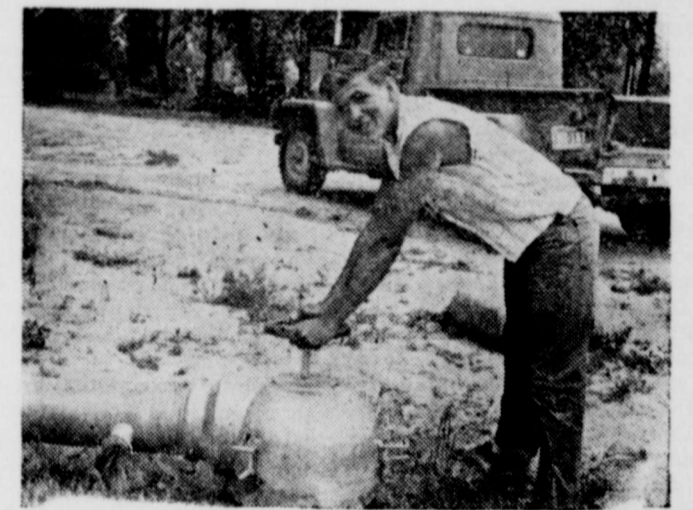

Two law officers and a long-time Hale Center farmer, miraculous survivors of a two-vehicle collision near Hale Center last Saturday are in good condition at the Hi-Plains Hospital in Hale Center where they are receiving treatment for injuries they received in the accident.

J. C. Logan, 67, who resides in the Mayfield community northwest of Hale Center, is receiving treatment for bruises and abrasions on his head.

Orvan Watts, 31, chief of police in Hale Center, also was a victim of the accident. He is receiving treatment for a broken right arm and multiple cuts and bruises on his face and head that he received when he was hurled into the windshield of the county-owned station wagon by the impact of the collision.

Watt's companion, Deputy Sheriff Frank Chapman, 39, of Abernathy, is receiving treatment for leg injuries and a fractured rib.

But for the exception of normal "aches and pains", the three victims of the accident are resting well. They are expected to recover without serious complications.

Mr. Logan was the driver and only occupant of the pickup involved in the accident.

Deputy Chapman was the driver of the station wagon, and Chief of Police Watts was the only other occupant of the vehicle. The two officers had been investigating a burglary and were en route to Hale Center when the accident occurred. The station wagon was traveling south, and the pickup was leaving the approach of an intersecting dirt road when the mishap occurred.

The crash occurred about 11:15 a.m. Saturday.

Mr. Logan miraculously escaped serious harm although the cab of his late model pickup was dismangled from the frame and bed. He was able to walk away from the cab which was hurled about thirty feet away from the bed and frame of the pickup. The engine of the pickup also was disassembled and the wreckage scattered about the intersection.

struck the left side of the bed on the half-ton pickup. Neither vehicle over turned.

The front of the station wagon was crumpled by the collision and the string wheel was bent out of shape, according to reports.

Following the accident, the pickup plowed into a sandy barrow ditch, with the impact hurling out the engine, knocking down the radiator and front fenders. The pickup then executed a spin, striking a guy-wire on a power pole and tearing off the cab.

Earlier arrivals at the scene were amazed that any of the victims escaped without critical or fatal injuries.

Rural Accident Report Is Given

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 28 accidents on rural highways in Hale County during the month of October, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for thirty persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$19,379.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county from January through October of 1965 shows a total of 205 crashes. As a result of these crashes there were eight persons killed and 134 persons injured. The estimated property damage amount, to \$132,562.00.

November and December are noted as dangerous months in traffic and especially for pedestrians. During the last two months of 1964 in Texas there were 80 pedestrians killed and 726 injured in collisions with motor vehicles. There are many reasons for this: longer hours of darkness, bad weather, pedestrians not visible to drivers, holidays and lack of driver's and pedestrian's concentration.

The Sergeant stated, "To aid both the pedestrian and drivers, always wear something light colored when walking after dark. If possible, carry some kind of light, walk on the left side of the road facing traffic day or night so that you can see approaching traffic. If you have a dark colored raincoat or overcoat, put a strip of reflectorized material across the back and front when walking on the highway or street."

Cotton Quota Vote Nov. 23

The cotton quota vote coming up on Nov. 23 will mark the 13th consecutive year in which growers have voted on marketing quotas for their upland cotton crop, E. J. Pope, Jr., Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Hale County Committee, said today.

"Beginning with the referendum on marketing quotas for the 1954 crop, growers have approved quotas for each year's cotton crop," he stated. "In the vote last year, on quotas for the 1965 upland cotton crop, 96.2 percent of the growers voting approved the quotas."

By law, quotas must be proclaimed by the Secretary of Agriculture in years when the cotton supply exceeds normal. That is the case this year.

The carryover of upland cotton on Aug. 1 of this year was 14.2 million bales. With 1965-crop yields indicated at a record high of 534 pounds per acre, domestic usage plus exports during this marketing year is expected to be less than the 1965 crop, and the carryover is expected to increase to about 15.7 million bales by Aug. 1, 1966. The previous high was 14.4 million bales in 1956.

For 1966, the Chairman explained, Hale County has a total of 155,873 acres available for allotment to growers on which to grow their upland cotton crop. This represents the County's share of the national acreage allotment of 16 million acres (the smallest permitted under law) plus the national acreage reserve of 200,000 acres to take care of minimum farm allotments. Notices of individual farm allotments will be mailed to operators of upland cotton farms, Friday, November 12.

If at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum approve quotas for the 1966 upland cotton crop, growers who agree to reduce their cotton acreage below the effective farm allotment will have a broad program available, offering loans, and price-support and diversion payments. Marketing quota penalties would apply to any excess cotton produced on a farm. However, growers would also have the chance to produce cotton for export only, without marketing penalties or Government subsidy.

If more than one-third of the voters oppose quotas for the 1966 crop, the regular allotment program will remain in effect, and price support will be available to growers who do not exceed their acreage allotment at 50 percent of parity, as provided by law.

Lease or sale of cotton allotments is provided under certain conditions, and the Nov. 23 referendum will also decide whether growers wish to permit such transfers outside the particular county but within the State. The outcome of the marketing quota referendum,

however, will have no effect on the lease or sale of allotments. All farmers who engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1965 are eligible to vote in the Nov. 23 referendum.

Transfer Rules Are Explained

Details regarding the transfer of upland cotton allotments were released today by E. J. Pope, Jr., Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Hale County Committee. A vote on whether to permit transfer of allotments outside the county (but within the State) will be held on Tuesday, November 23, at the same time that growers vote on marketing quotas for the 1966 upland cotton crop.

The Chairman emphasized that the referendum on allotment - transfers has nothing to do with marketing quotas. Under the new farm legislation enacted this year, transfers of upland cotton allotments by sale or lease may be made from one farm to another within the same county without regard to the outcome of the allotment - transfer referendum. Also, transfers from one farm to another owned by the same person can be made across county lines within the State without regard to the outcome of the transfer referendum.

The referendum on transfers of allotments will decide only the question of whether to permit transfers outside the particular county—but within the State. If at least two-thirds of the growers of upland cotton voting in the county approve such transfers, transfers outside the county can be made during the three years (1966-68). In no case can transfers be made outside the State. If county farmers disapprove such out-of-county transfers this year, another referendum on the question will be held next year.

The question about permitting out-of-county transfers of allotments will be decided by the vote within each county. The question about whether marketing quotas shall apply to the 1966 upland cotton crop will be decided on a national basis.

If at least two-thirds of the upland cotton growers voting throughout the Nation approve marketing quotas for the 1966 upland cotton crop, the quotas will be in effect and marketing penalties will apply to any excess cotton produced. Approval of quotas will also mean that the new cotton program will go into operation, offering various program benefits to participating growers. Export market reserve acreage would also be available under a quota program, for growers who wish to grow cotton for export only, without price support or any Government payment.

Cotton Acres Cut For 1966

The area's 1966 cotton acreage allotment is slightly less than that for the present crop, Hale County was cut 1,753 acres, from 157,626 last year to 155,873 for next year.

Reduction for the 23 Plains cotton producing counties amounted to only 12,854 acres, based on figures released by the Austin office of the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Total allotment for the Plains was 2,122,770 acres. Last year the figure was 2,135,624 acres. The Plains reduction represents about one half of one per cent of the total acreage.

Hale County got one of the larger reductions of the region, Lubbock County was reduced by 828 acres, Lamb County 934, Briscoe, Swisher and Floyd are among counties receiving reduction of less than 1,000 acres.

E. J. Pope Jr., chairman of the Hale County ASC committee, recently pointed out that under new farm legislation transfers of upland cotton allotments by sale or lease may be made from one farm to another within the same county without regard to the outcome of the allotment transfer referendum scheduled, Nov. 23, same date on which farmers will ballot on marketing quotas for 1966.

Commissioner In Meeting

Hale County Commissioners approved a request at a recent meeting to permit county tax assessor-collector Bill Hollars to handle the 1966 tax roll and collection for the city of Edmondson.

Attorney Dick Reep said the Edmondson City Council made the request formally at a Monday meeting. The county will use its tax roll for the collection, and can charge the city one per cent for the service, Hollars said.

Commissioners discussed the county agricultural exhibition building with Architect John Kerr and contractor Bud Timmons. They asked if the building building was finished; Kerr said there were several small items, such as fans and heaters, that needed to be checked before he could approve it.

Timmons said he would check these items; Commissioners said when the check-list was completed, they would meet again and approve final payment.

Ralph Culver asked the Court if the building would be available Dec. 10 for a country and western music show he was planning to bring to Plainview. He also inquired about rent cost.

Stage Needed

Commissioners said the building would be available, and had a short discussion about rent, Culver said he would have to have a stage, and Commissioners said a stage was needed frequently at the building. They said if he would build a stage that met their specifications and could be stored at the building, he could have use of the building in trade.

The Court also met with public surveyor Carl Williams to discuss a survey he had made for groundwork around the building.

POST OFFICE HELPS COUNT LIVESTOCK

Rural mail carriers from the Abernathy Post Office will leave some livestock survey cards along their routes beginning November 20. "Information reported on these cards is used to set the yearly inventory of livestock and poultry on Texas farms," Postmaster Herman Lambert explained. Rural carriers distribute the cards at random in boxes along their routes.

"This means that not every box will get a card," Mr. Lambert said. "For this season, it's important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that USDA can get a true sample of the State's livestock holdings."

Carriers assisting with the survey are: J. D. Webb, Route 1, and Jack Hackler, Route 2.

Facts and figures secured in this survey are the basis for Texas and National pig crop report and inventories of livestock and poultry on farms as of the first of the year. Stockmen and many others use this information in making business decisions.

Survey results will be widely distributed through Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service releases, newspapers, farm magazines, radio, and television.
