Baldwin Refuses King's Compromise

COLD WAVE GIVES WAY TO GENERAL RAIN OVER STATE

Half Inch Mark Here
Exceeded in Two
Day Spell

MORE FORECAST

McCamey Gets Light
Rain on Eve Of
Grid Battle

Thursday's threatening cold wave had turned to rain over much of Texas today. Precipitation at Midland, registering 43 of an inch yesterday, had increased to a half inch before noon today, with a steady drizzle continuing.

At McCamey, where hundreds of Midland people plan to go Saturday to attend the bi-district football title, only a sprinkle had fallen with a light mist prevailing today, a report from Jimmy Martin of the McCamey News said. The light moisture served only to put the football field in top condition unless heavier rains fall before the Saturday afternoon engagement.

The weather bureau at Dallas forecast mostly cloudy weather for West Texas, with probable rain in the north and east portions tonight.

Dr. J. L. Cline, meteorologist in charge of the United States weather bureau there, told the Associated Press that the cold wave, which threatened yesterday to sweep into Texas had moved eastward and would bring only rain in this section.

Meanwhile, grass, weeds and small grain crops in this territory were given further impetus, assuring a good winter for livestock and an excellent season for early plowing after cotton and feed crops are out of the way.

REPORT RAINS OVER WIDE AREA

FORT WORTH, Dec. 4.—Rains have fallen over most of the cattle country of West Texas in the past week, and ranges are in the best condition since 1933. J. B. Young, Fort Worth commission man, reported yesterday.

Young has just returned from spending a week visiting ranches around Pecos and Toyah and in New Mexico. He was accompanied by S. L. McManis, his partner in one of the ranches.

"At Toyah, the range conditions are the best since 1933," Young said. "I was talking to Shelby Brooks, who operates a ranch north of there. He said that not only were the valleys soaked, but even the hillsides were thoroughly moistened."

"Port Daggett, whose ranch is near Pecos, also was pleased with range conditions. He told me his land would have plenty of green stuff to carry his cattle."

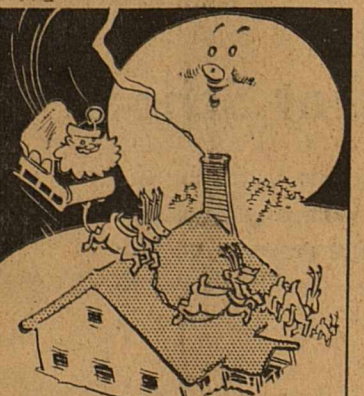
Daggett is keeping 3,000 head of Hereford cattle that have been brought in from Mexico. Several farmers in that territory around Pecos have been practicing irrigation and have a good crop of feed. Daggett intends to finish the cattle up before they are sent to market."

Young reported visiting a rancher near Van Horn who was moving many cattle. Fields are in good condition in that section and there

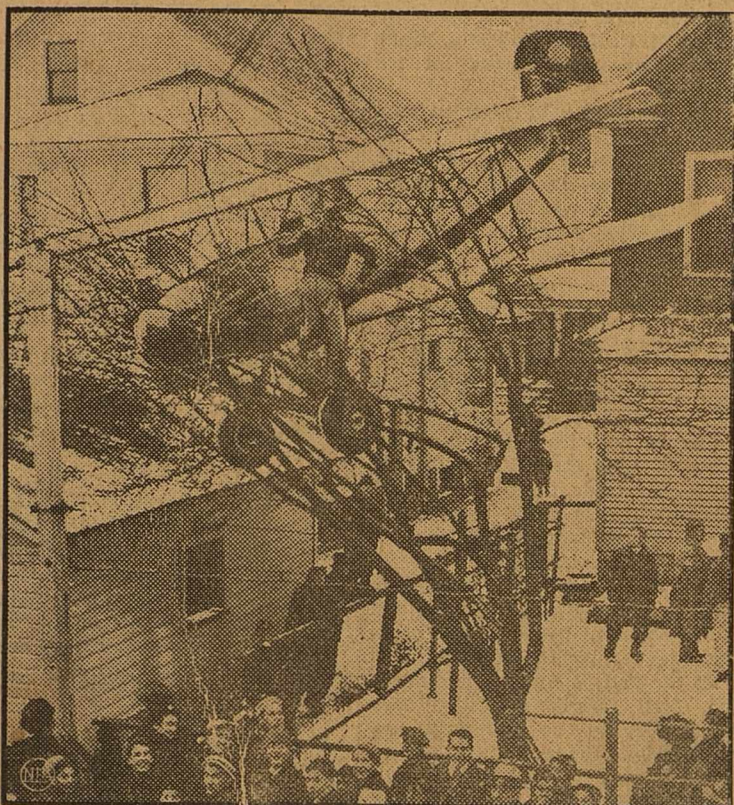

Fiercest Seige Hurled at Madrid

MADRID, Dec. 4. (P)—Thirty Fascist bombers loosed one of the fiercest raids of the seige on the capital today. An earlier attack by insurgents alongside Casa del Campo tapered off into noon-day quiet.

Three previous air raids gave the Madrilenos a frenzied night. A late work of fire blazed from insurgent guns along a wide semicircle from University City to a point south. The attack was believed to be the last effort to pierce Socialist defenses along the Manzanares river.

An insurgent warship halted a Russian steamer off Europa Point and escorted it toward the Fascist stronghold in Spanish North Africa.

State Press Gives Views Anent Music

Headed "Music and Child," the following paragraph from the Miami Chief and its subsequent comment by State Press in the Dallas News has been given much comment locally.

Miami Chief: Some form of music should be required in the fifth and sixth grades of every public school. It is as necessary as mathematics. Every girl should be taught to read notes and learn to sing. Besides the pleasure she will find in singing tends to give her a soft voice which should be greatly desired by all women. Both boys and girls should be taught to play some musical instrument. Musical homes are happy homes.

State Press: We applaud. Music is a civilization second only to the gospel. Music and the gospel go along together indeed, and the combination surpasses in social value all the big books written by all the deep thinkers. A child can be taught some measure of culture by teaching it to play a musical instrument. Possibly our educational system in America has centered on abstract learning, with too little regard for concrete accomplishment. A good singing voice usually guarantees a good speaking voice. Modulated tones, rounded syllables, without throaty or nasal inflections, can be had by giving study to vocal sounds. A pleasant voice has won many a heart where handsome faces failed. There is some capacity for music every child, and it is a pity when parents or teachers or playmates overrate the study of books with contents less intimately related to the child's present or future. The farm family gathered at its own fireside, with hymnals to sing from and piano or cottage organ with which to render accompaniments is being educated. That sort of education is not enough, to be sure, but it is influential on the lives of the young ones, socially and morally. It is one way to banish the ever-present materialistic tendency. And such opportunity is not confined to farm families, of course. Town families may give too much time to affairs outside the home, too little to those inside.

HUMBLE WILDCAT CORES OIL LIME

Cummins Area Test Shut
Down To Set String
Of Casing

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Cowden, Ector wildcat southeast of the Cummins pool, recovered 18 feet of lime showing some oil in coring from 4,357-75 and shut down to run pipe. The oil string of 7-inch casing will be set at 4,052. The oil showing encountered by the Humble test is its first; it showed a slight amount of gas on a 25-minute drill stem test from 4,052 to 4,200. It is located 1,980 feet from the south and 660 feet from the west line of section 30, block 44, township 1 north, T. & P. survey.

In the same area, T. P. No. 1 Scherbauer, 440 feet from the north and east lines of section 31, block 44, township 1 north, is drilling lime at 3,940 feet.

Dawson Well on Pump
In Dawson county, Ray Albough at No. 1 Robinson, section 44, block M. E. L. R. survey, yesterday pumped 24.5 barrels of oil and 19 barrels of water in nine hours.

Reports from the well are that the water present is not sulphurous and appears to be coming from behind pipe rather than from bottom-hole. The discovery, located in the north-west part of the country, is bottomed at 5,039 feet in lime.

T. P. Coal & Oil Company No. 1 Bennett, northwest offset to the pool opener in southern Yoakum county, was last reported drilling at 3,585 feet.

Shows More Saturday
In Dawson county, Ray Albough, northern Ward county wildcat, four miles west of the O'Brien pool, showed more saturation from 2,995 to 3,000 feet and reduced hole at 3,009. Coring was started early this morning at 3,031, and the well is now coring ahead below that depth. It previously showed oil and gas at 2,905-15, 2,920-30 and 2,975-80.

Location is in the northeast corner of section 54, block P. G. & M. M. B. & A. survey.
In the Brown-Altmann pool, Gulf No. 5 Clapp flowed 236 barrels in 24 hours, bottomed at 3,123, with 23,000 cubic feet of gas. It was shot with 490 quarts from bottom up to 2,810. Location is 1,650 feet from the south and 330 feet from the west line of section 37, block 26, public school land.

Crash Kills Former Midland Woman

Mrs. Herrington Is
Victim of Auto
Collision

Mrs. Omia Herrington, 33, of McCamey, last year a resident of Midland, was killed instantly and Mrs. K. P. Looney, of the Humble camp in Ward county, sustained grave injuries in a collision of their two automobiles and a truck on the highway between Crane and McCamey late Thursday.

Reports from McCamey, where Mrs. Looney is in a hospital, today said she had chances for recovery, although attending physicians thought she might be suffering from a lung hemorrhage.

Mrs. Herrington, a year ago, was in partnership with Mrs. Bert M. Frye of Midland in the Frye's Lunch Ritz theatre building. Mrs. Frye went there last night upon receiving news of the accident. She reported that funeral services will be held Saturday afternoon at Haskell where Mrs. Herrington's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ike Furr, live on a ranch.

Mrs. Herrington had been to Penwell, taking her husband, Jack Herrington, employe of George Farley, Midland drilling contractor. She was returning to McCamey where she and a sister-in-law, Mrs. Ed H. Herrington, had recently opened a cafe. Driving a new Oldsmobile sedan, she figured in a collision with a Ford sedan driven by Mrs. Looney whose husband is in the employ of the Humble Oil & Refining Co. Mrs. Looney, it was reported here, was proprietor of a boarding house at one of the Humble camps between Crane and Royalty.

Hardly had the two cars crashed when a truck loaded with 13 employees of the Shell Pipeline Co., building a line to the south, plunged into the two automobiles, being overturned and slightly injuring most of its passengers. Mrs. Herrington, who was reported to have received a fractured skull, broken jaw and crushed thigh, was dead when truck passengers reached her. A dog, riding in her car, was killed. The Looney car was en route to Crane.

THREE KILLED IN PLAINSMISHAP

AMARILLO, Dec. 4. (P)—Three persons are dead and a fourth injured as result of a head-on collision between a truck and a car near Washburn, 16 miles southeast of here Thursday night.

The dead: Carl Parsons of Clarendon. Mrs. Carl Parsons. Mrs. Fred Huff of Pampa. Carl Parsons, Jr., 7, is in a local hospital suffering from a head and possible internal injuries. All were in the car, headed west.

Three occupants of the truck, a man and two women, escaped uninjured.

Parsons and Mrs. Huff were instantly killed, while Mrs. Parsons died 30 minutes later in an Amarillo hospital.

SEAMEN REFUSE SETTLE STRIKE

Hold Out For General
Agreement For The
'Rank and File'

HOUSTON, Dec. 4. (P)—Headquarters of striking seamen announced today that striking engineers and deck officials, at a meeting in Galveston, voted to make no agreement with ship owners until one also is made with the rank and file of seamen.

A further announcement by Frederick Phillips, New York, secretary of the marine firemen, oilers, waterenders branch of the International Seamen's union, instructed Joseph Smith to take charge here as business agent, replacing Wilbur Dickey who opposed the strike.

Position of Industry Justifies Raise, Says Moran

PONCA CITY, Okla., Dec. 4.—Expressing the opinion that the statistical position of the oil industry justifies an increase in the price of crude, president Dan Moran announced today that Continental Oil Company will advance the price in areas in which it is a large purchaser.

The increase, which will become effective January 4, 1937, will be the seventeen cents per barrel on crude of forty degrees gravity and above, and will maintain the usual two cent differential on crude below forty gravity.

"The base for such a decision," said Moran, "are definitely reflected in the drastic decline in crude inventories, the splendid cooperative spirit exemplified among compact states in their proration proceedings and the unusual competitive demand for pipe line connections. A war among producers is imminent unless fair recognition is given their continued insurance to reduced allowable in isolated fields, where special treatment will be required to perpetuate the balance that must be maintained among producing states, and the law of supply and demand."

"The producer deserves compensation for his adherence to various conservation programs and a better price will undoubtedly lessen protests against localized reductions in allowables. In short, the producer must have higher allowables or higher prices."

"In the belief that it is for the good of the industry and in the interest of conservation we have elected to take the latter course. It must be kept in mind however, that to sustain an increase all producers must do their part by restricting unnecessary drilling."

The Continental Oil Company purchases in the Rocky Mountain territory, Oklahoma, Kansas and North Texas, approximately one million barrels of crude oil per month.

LEGISLATION NOT POSSIBLE, SAYS PRIME MINISTER

Resignation of The
Government May
Be Result

EDWARD IS FIRM

Abdication Hinted
For The King
By Baldwin

LONDON, Dec. 4. (P)—Prime Minister Baldwin announced to the House of Commons today that the government flatly refused to yield to King Edward's suggested compromise to enable him to marry Wallis Simpson and keep the throne.

Minister Baldwin said the marriage would automatically make her queen unless there was special legislation, which the government refused to introduce, adding that a constitutional change also would require the assent of all dominions. He said he was "satisfied from inquiries made that the assent would be forthcoming."

Revealing the monarch's wish for legislation permitting him to marry without interfering with the rights of accession, Baldwin said it would be for the good of the country.

If King Edward refused to yield, the next step would be the resignation of the government, the King then facing the problem of getting a new ministry willing to fight for the constitutional battle in his behalf. Other alternatives would be for him to abdicate the throne or to continue his present relations, remaining a bachelor king.

It was believed that King Edward might choose to fight to the finish for both the throne and Mrs. Simpson, having sent her secretly to France to permit him a clear field to gain ground against the government and church critics of his attachment to her.

Later Minister Baldwin went to Belvedere and made a final appeal to King Edward to put the empire before love.

The Duke of York, who many believe would succeed his brother as King, over the week-end consulted his mother, Queen Mary. His secretary called on Baldwin before the Premier outlined the situation to the House of Commons. Baldwin called a cabinet meeting for tomorrow.

LONDON, Dec. 4. (P)—Britain's King, confronted with an ultimatum to give up his throne or the American-born, Wallis Warfield Simpson, stood firm Thursday night in his decision to retain both.

Twice closeted with Queen Mary, before and after a fifty-minute argument with Prime Minister Baldwin, the strong-willed monarch gave the Empire one of the most anxious days in the history of the British throne.

Baldwin emerged grave-faced from Buckingham palace and went immediately into conference with leaders of the House of Commons. Since the Commons was adjourned, there was no possibility of Baldwin making a formal statement to the members of Parliament.

King Edward hurried back for a second meeting with the Queen mother, presumably having told her of his determination to hold both his throne and Mrs. Simpson when he hastened from Fort Belvedere, where Mrs. Simpson remained.

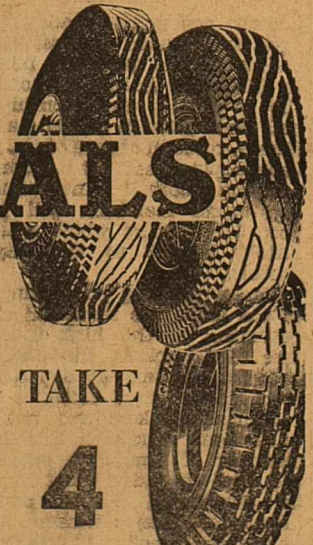

LOCALS CARRYING POUND ADVANTAGE BUT FACE SPEED

The age-old question of whether or not a good little man is as tough as a good big man will receive at least a partial settlement tomorrow afternoon in McCamey when the

Midland Bulldogs tie up with 11 Badgers of that city.

According to weight tabulations released from the Upton county school this week, the Bulldogs will carry an even 15-pounds-per-man advantage when the two teams take the field at 2:30. The McCamey backfield reputedly averages 150 pounds per man, just 4 and one-half pounds more each than their line man will weigh.

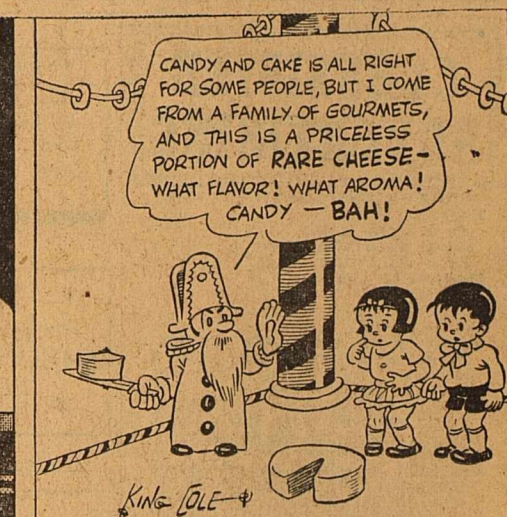
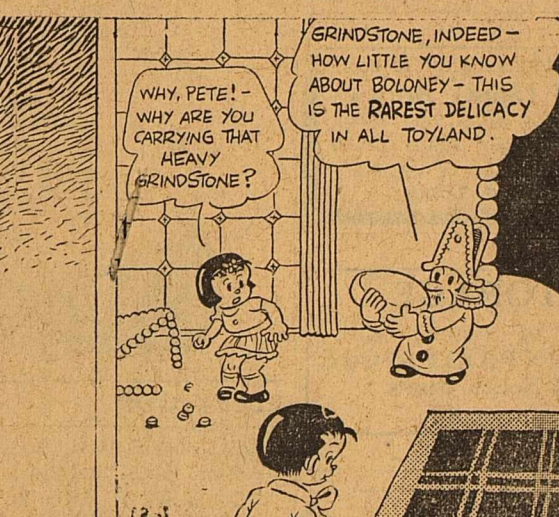
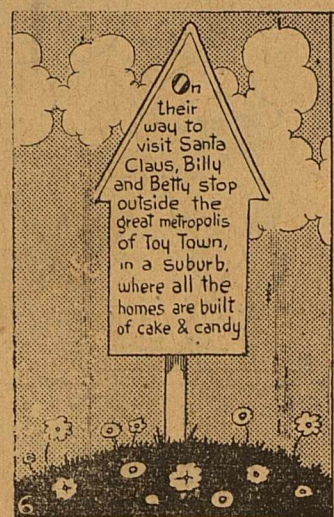

Midland will be favorites to cop the game despite some of their key men not being in perfect condition. Several of them have not fully recovered from the physical damage they suffered in the Odessa game Thanksgiving Day.

The Badgers lay claim to the fastest backfield in West Texas and on it they will put their hopes for victory. Belcher is also stamped as one of the premier line plungers of the section. AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING THE POWERS CONFERRED BY LAW UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF CHAPTER 106, ACTS OF THE FIRST CALLED SESSION OF THE FORTIETH LEGISLATURE, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the City of Midland has under consideration the making of certain paving improvements in the City; and

WHEREAS, it is considered advisable to adopt affirmatively the provisions of an enabling Act heretofore passed by the Legislature more particularly described herein-after;

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MIDLAND:

1. That the City of Midland does hereby adopt for all purposes the powers conferred on Cities by Chapter 106, Acts of the First Called Session of the Fortieth Legislature, a Session which adjourned on June 7, 1927.

2. The fact that it is considered to be to the best interest of the City that the contemplated paving improvements be made, constitutes this an emergency measure making necessary the suspension of the rule requiring ordinances to be read at more than one meeting, and it is so ordained.
