CIVIC CLUB ENTERTAINMENT

The Civic Club gave a free entertainment at the Hankins. E. ley Hall Monday evening to a good attendance. The band contributed some good music for the occasion. Mrs. M. E. Roberts sweetly sang a special song entitled, "That Dear Old Mother Of Mine," which was enjoyed and brought forth hearty applause. Dr. Fred Hurt made a talk on "Sanitation," calling attention to the disease germs easy prey upon the people through carelessness in this respect. Mrs. Grace Stone, assisted by Mrs. Hal Holland gave some special piano music which was highly appreciated. Dr. D. S. Stone spoke on "Typhoid Fever," mentioning its various forms, causes and effects and preventions. He touched on local conditions which cause fever here, very clearly tracing typhoid to careless and unsanitary practices and surroundings. He insisted strongly on vaccination as a preventive of typhoid. Miss Dodson favored the gathering with a special song of humorous trend entitled, "A Fool There Was." This number was heartily enjoyed by all.

Judge J. B. Randolph addressed the audience on "The Sanitary Laws of Texas." In his remarks he said that the local Board of Health had always had more authority than was claimed for it, and that they could, under penalty of the State law, enforce certain sanitary measures which would be of great benefit. He mentioned further the recent adoption by the Commissioners Court of Kimble County, of the Supplement to the Sanitary Laws of Texas, and stated that the Court was ready to appoint as a Board of Health to see to it that these laws are enforced, three worthy citizens suggested and recommended by the Civic Club.
