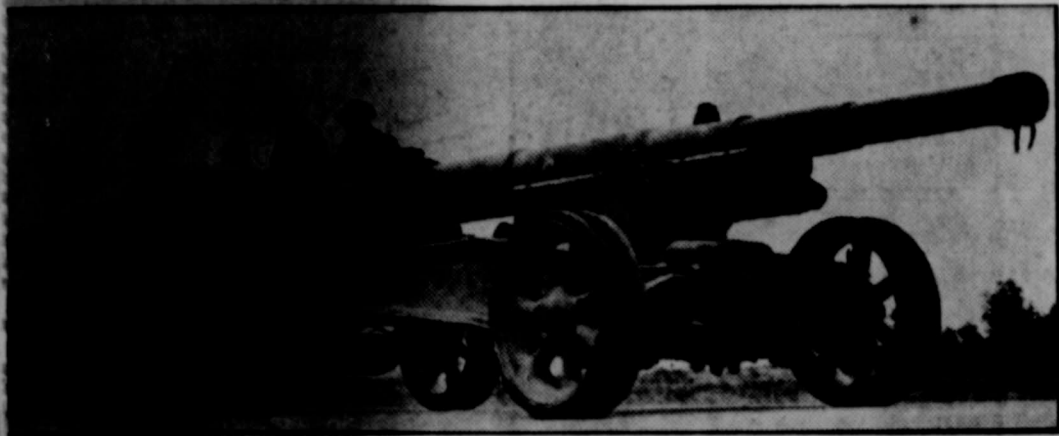

Any young man interested in metal work, auto mechanics, woodwork and electricity may enroll in the National Defense Training Courses, sponsored by the Perryton schools. These classes will be offered during this school term. Enrollment period will be Monday, October 27.

These training courses help prepare young men for better jobs in national defense. There is no charge for the courses. Capable instructors are furnished by the national government. Each course includes 150 hours work. Upon the completion of each course, students will be given a diploma.

Legion Plans Navy Recruiting

Stevenson at his desk in the reception room of the Governor's office, Austin, discusses plans for immediately recruiting two companies for service in the United States Navy or Naval Reserve in Texas with the American Legion, Department Commander Andrew Dilworth of San Antonio and Capt. H. W. Underwood, United States Navy, commanding the Naval ROTC Unit at the University of Texas. The campaign was started by the American Legion in response to a telegram from Secretary of Navy, Legionnaire Frank Knox, asking the American Legion to "recruit a minimum of one company consisting of not less than 140 men." The Navy has 335 ships in commission and 353 building. Need for men is obvious," said the telegram in part.

Commander Dilworth wrote the Secretary of the Navy "Texas will recruit two companies of 140 men each from the Houston and Dallas recruiting areas."

Capt. Underwood said "The Naval ROTC unit of the University of Texas is anxious to make any contribution to the success of this campaign."

"I am ready to do all I can for the War and Navy Departments and all-out defense as urged by President Roosevelt, in fact I think I am about two jumps ahead," said Governor Stevenson.

Each American Legion Post is requested to send to the nearest Naval Recruiting Station, or sub-station, at least one recruit for the Navy or the Naval Reserve on or before October 27. Fitting ceremonies will be held on October 27 either at Austin, or Houston and Dallas with high State, Navy and American Legion officials participating.

Ochiltree County "United China Relief" Calls For Voluntary Subscriptions to Fund

Carl Ellis, chairman of the Ochiltree County "United China Relief" Committee, is appealing for voluntary subscriptions to put this county "over the top" in its quota of the \$200,000 assigned to Texas. The national quota is \$5,000,000. Mr. Ellis has remitted \$119.65 to the Texas state chairman, Nathan Adams, Dallas, and has a small sum on hand. Practically the entire Ochiltree county remittance was from the \$105 benefit show at the Ellis Theatre.

Two million Chinese children, starving, without shelter, maimed and mangled, are facing a winter that will destroy them by the thousands unless help is forthcoming immediately from America. Mr. Ellis warned here today.

Money raised in Texas will be used to procure clothing and medical supplies for homeless Chinese children. Laterally tons of medical supplies are needed at once.

"Unless China is helped in every way possible," Chairman Ellis said, "we here in America are liable to wake up some morning to find a war raging on both our Eastern and Western fronts. China must not fall. She stands today as a great pillar of stone on the Axis highway to world domination. She must continue."

County Delinquent Tax Collections Good

Officials of the Ochiltree county tax office attribute their most excellent showing on the collection of delinquent state and county taxes to the penalty and interest remission on delinquent taxes of years prior to 1940 that is now in effect in this county. During the months of July, August and September, Deputy Sheriff Fred Huston says that the Perryton office collected \$12,595.38 off the delinquent rolls. Collections to date this month total \$3,106.59 and the greatest collections are expected before the end of the month when the remission period ends. Delinquent taxes dating back as far as 1929 have been erased from the rolls during the remission period. After Oct. 31, penalties and interest will be added as heretofore. Collection of current 1941 taxes are reported as exceptionally good by this office.

The Spearman City Commission has adopted the provisions of House Bill 67 which provides for the release of all penalty and interest on delinquent taxes except the 1940 taxes provided same are paid before Nov. 1, 1941.

Such a procedure will result in the saving of hundreds of dollars to property owners in Spearman. This plan for collection of delinquent taxes is in effect in Ochiltree county for county and state taxes.

Rainfall for Year Exceeds All Records

Highest Rainfall was 29.73 Inches in 1928; Records Start in 1890

With only a fraction of an inch to go, 1941 is sure to go down in history as Ochiltree county's wettest year. With records available since 1890, the year of 1928 now holds the record with 29.73 inches. The 1941 total to Thursday morning is over 29 inches and with rain falling as the Herald goes to press, the record is likely to fall before night.

The rainfall of over four inches during the past few days brought the official October precipitation here in Perryton to over seven inches. Heaviest rainfall was Tuesday afternoon and night when it varied from three to four inches over this area. In Perryton it was about three inches. Sam Handly reports four inches in his gauge at his Wolf Creek ranch. Highest October precipitation on record is 10.45 inches in 1923.

The country is soaked, lakes are full of water, creeks are bank full. Flood waters to a depth of three feet went over the spillway at Lake Pryor.

Rangers Lose Conference Tilt to Canadian Wildcats On Hoover Field, Canadian by Score of 13-0

Report Best Hunting Prospects In Years Throughout Game Area

SPORTSMEN returning from hunting grounds in Canada and the eastern seaboard states report an abundance of game and that prospects for "bag-limit" shooting are better than they have been in many years.

Duck hunters who traveled to Canadian breeding spots verified stories that there is more waterfowl now than has been there for 15 years.

Woodcock shooting was good this year in New York and New England. Midge, a leading woodcock state, closes its season Oct. 24.

Canadian geese have already been sighted in North Carolina and guides are expecting a fine season, inasmuch as the birds are early.

Pintails and blue petrels are present in great numbers on the Carolina coasts and sounds, while wigwags and mallards are also popular.

GROUSE season opened in New Hampshire, Maine, and Vermont and the shooting was great. Grouse was also reported plentiful in Pennsylvania and up over last year on the Michigan peninsula. Hunters "grouse" a bit at the heavy foliage in the peninsula, but it is usually heavy the first few days of the season.

Hunting season on pheasants, quail, wild turkeys, and rabbits—always the standbys in Pennsylvania, Ohio, and New York—

will open soon in those states. Farmers and conservation workers report fields are full of the game.

Michigan conservation officers have elated deer hunters in the state with reports that the feeding was excellent and the starvation loss slight. With good tracking weather Michigan deer hunters should have a successful season.

A BAD storm on Armistice Day last year in Minnesota resulted in a pheasant decline. Prairie chickens are also reported less numerous by the conservation officers. A cheerful note in the Minnesota hunting territory is that ruffed grouse are near the peak of a 10-year cycle. Sharpshooters are also up, quail plentiful, and Hungarian partridge on the increase.

Nimrods who pack heavier artillery than shotguns are assured of big game in Maine and North Carolina. Maine has declared open season on bear and may even place a bounty on 'em.

Organized bear and wild boar hunts are on the sportsmen's calendar in North Carolina, where 11 bear and boar hunts will be held in the Pisgah forest and nine in Nantahala.

Quebec and Ontario report increases in moose population. So if you want to get in on some of the best hunting since Daniel Boone knocked over bears with a muzzle-loader, name your spot and go to it.

Meeting their first conference foe of the season, the Perryton Rangers were defeated 13-0 by the Canadian Wildcats in Hoover Stadium. Canadian, with both teams having much counted on power out of their line-ups, the Wildcats charged through the Ranger line for two touch downs. Although the Rangers made several long drives, they could never get the ball across the goal.

The Rangers elected to receive, with the Canadian team kicking off. Allen received the 37 yd. kick, returning 17 yds. The Rangers made 21 yds. in the first four plays. Then came a fumble, giving the ball to the Wildcats on their own 45 yd. line. With Esquivel, King, and Smith handling the ball, the Wildcats charged to the Rangers 20 yd. line, losing the ball on downs. Allen punted out of the danger zone for the Rangers to his 49 yd. line. The Wildcats started their pay dirt drive. Hopkins made several nice gains, with Smith making the final drive over the goal line. Canadian failed to convert. Score 6-0.

Kicking off to the Rangers, Durham placed the ball well down the field. Mullins returned 22 yds. Reimer and Mullins gained nice yardage for the Rangers, with Mullins doing some passing to Allen. They took the ball from their own seven yd. line to the Wildcat 25 yd. line, before being forced to punt. The ball deep in their territory, Canadian immediately punted, again giving the Rangers possession of the ball in scoring distance. Williams and Mullins picked up four yds. each for the Rangers, putting the ball down the field deeper in Canadian territory. Reimer made a 12 yd. gain to the Wildcat 11 yd. line. Another gain for the Rangers by Mullins put the ball on the 7 yd. line. Again the Rangers had a bad break, Hopkins intercepted a Ranger pass.

With the ball in their possession the Canadian team punted, Mullins catching the ball on his own 47 yd. line, and returning it 11 yds. In the series of passes that followed the Rangers completed very few and as a result lost the ball on downs to the Wildcats. Three fruitless plays by the Wildcats and they choose to punt. Mullins receiving the ball on his own 20 yd. line and running it back 11 yds. the whistle sounded ending the first half with the Wildcats leading 6-0.

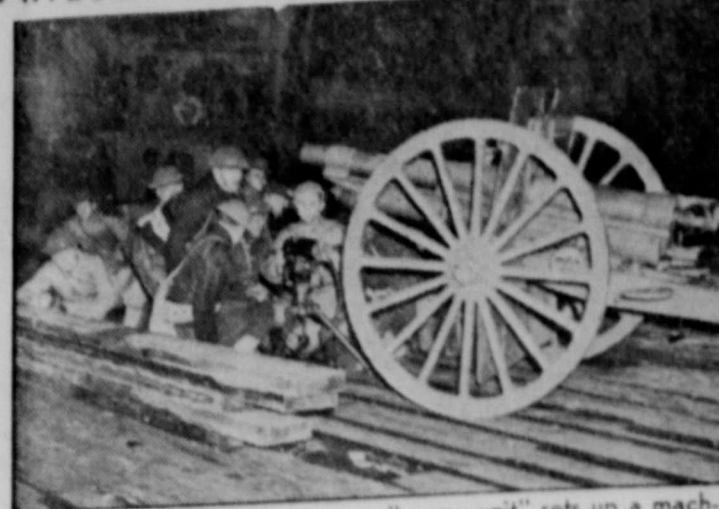
Starting the second half, the Rangers kicked off to the Canadian 18 yd. line where King took it for a 11 yd. return. The next play was the play of the game. Esquivel took the ball for the Wildcats and broke loose for a 49 yd. run; Williams and Reimer made the tackle that stopped the Canadian team from scoring. A complete pass put the Wildcats within the Ranger 10 yd. line. King made the final jump for the Wildcats giving them their second touch-down of the game. A pass from Esquivel to Smith was good for the extra point. Score 13-0.

B. Briggs kicked off for the Wildcats following the touch down; Allen received on his 19 yd. line and returned for 16 yds. Mullins picked up 11 yds. but received a leg injury which put him out for the rest of the game. Reimer gained 13 yds. on the next play for a first down. Parvin and Reimer failed to gain through the Wildcat line and Allen punted, the ball going out on the Canadian 6 yd. line. After running the ball out to their 23 yd. line, the Wildcats punted. Carpenter was under the punt and returned it for 4 yds. Turner, who took Mullins place, attempted several passes, all of which fell incomplete. Allen punted, the ball out of danger with Williams receiving the 38 yd. punt and returning 14 yds. With Turner handling the ball, the Rangers again turned to passing; failing to complete but one for any distance, the Rangers lost the ball on downs. Again the Wildcats punted, Esquivel putting the ball 37 yds. down the field. Williams returning the ball 12 yds. before being tackled. With Turner again passing, the Rangers gained 10 yds. before being forced to punt. Hopkins received the 18 yd. punt on his own 20 yd. line returning it 8 yds. With Esquivel passing and Smith doing the ball carrying, the Wildcats made a long drive of 71 yds. and were in good scoring position when a pass from Lohier was intercepted by Williams on the three yard line. A long pass from Turner was intercepted by the Wildcats in the following play giving possession of the ball to the Canadian team as the whistle sounded ending the ball game with the Wildcats leading in the final score 13-0.

Farm Women Can Give Practical Defense Help

COLLEGE STATION — Self-sufficiency of farm families is a practical contribution farm women can make in the Food-For-Defense program, according to B. F. Vance, chairman of the Texas USDA Defense board.

Pointing out that many lines of food production are now overtaxed because of heavier domestic demands and requirements of the Lend-Lease Program, he said that even a small increase on an individual farm would benefit the Nation and supply nutritious foods for the family's use. Products vitally needed are milk, eggs, pork and vegetables.

Texas farmers have been asked to increase milk from 4,488,000,000 pounds this year to 4,650,000,000 for 1942. The state goal for eggs is 203,775,000 dozen, compared with 185,250,000 dozen for this year. An increase in farm gardens from 296,647 to 352,800 is also being asked.

An extra cow, a flock of chickens, or a pig will represent a net gain in the farm income without increasing the farm overhead, he explained. Many farmers have feed available as a result of legumes and grasses seeded under the AAA program. Since feed crop allotments will not be issued under the 1942 AAA program, the additional acres can be planted to feed.

The increase of these foods on farms not only provides a sufficient diet to the farm family but at the same time releases food to families who depend upon commercial supplies, the chairman said.

and damage will result. It should be removed in the spring before the flowers have a chance to develop shoots that would be injured when the mulch is removed. Leaves, well-decayed manure, grass or corn stalks are excellent materials for mulch.

Bulbs are not yard flowers exclusively, according to Hartman, for they can be used as winter pot flowers. They should be planted in pots and stored in a cool dark place for a period of 8 to 10 weeks, to allow (induce) the development of roots. They can be planted in either soil, sand, gravel, moss, or water. After the rest period, the plants can be brought into the light and started into growth.

Two AAA Programs For Texas Farmers

COLLEGE STATION — Texas farmers will have two AAA farm programs in 1942, according to Fred Rennels, assistant administrative officer of the state AAA.

In west Texas, farmers will have the minimum conserving-acreage plan and farmers in east Texas will have the erosion-resisting plan, he said.

In defining the acres in which the two programs will apply, Rennels pointed out that all counties in the state lying south and east of and including Wilbarger, Baylor, Throckmorton, Shackelford, Calahan, Coleman, McCulloch, Mason, Gillespie, Kerr, Edwards and Kinney counties will carry out the erosion-resisting plan, and all other counties in the state will have the minimum conserving-acreage plan.

The principal difference in the two plans, the AAA official said, is that under the conserving-acreage plan a minimum of 20 percent of the cropland must be devoted exclusively to soil-conserving crops during the crop year, while in the erosion-resisting area at least 25 percent of the cropland must be devoted to erosion-resisting crops or land uses at some time during the crop year.

The method of payment will be substantially the same in both plans with payments being made for planting within special allotments, such as cotton, wheat, rice, peanuts and Irish potatoes, and carrying out approved soil-building practices.

Percentage deductions in net payments will be made for failure to meet minimum requirements under the two plans, and a deduction of ten times the rate applicable to a farm will be made for exceeding special allotments. Deductions incurred for exceeding crop allotments will be applied against payments earned under the range program, he said.

Grain in commercial storage at 40 terminal markets reporting to the Department of Agriculture's marketing service increased nearly six per cent during August. About 85 percent of available commercial space was occupied September 1, compared with 80 percent a month earlier.

Federal Farm Legislation Supports Needed Food Prices

COLLEGE STATION — Texas farmers answering America's call for increased quantities of vital foods in the Farm Defense Program have the protection of Federal farm legislation against price collapses of these commodities, B. F. Vance, chairman of the Texas USDA Defense board, said this week.

The new act of Congress, known as the Steagall amendment, requires that whenever it is necessary to encourage the expansion of non-basic agricultural commodities in the present emergency the Secretary of Agriculture must issue a public notice of the expansion.

Through the same law, Vance said, the Secretary of Agriculture supports the farm price of the commodity at not less than 85 percent of parity. Before the price-supporting program can be discontinued, the Secretary must give sufficient public notice of the termination so that producers may

make readjustments in production, Vance continued.

Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard has already given public notice covering hogs, eggs, evaporated and dry skim milk, cheese and chickens until December 31, 1942. Cotton, wheat, corn, tobacco and rice are supported by law through loans at rates based on 85 percent of parity, Vance declared, but he pointed out that surpluses of these crops already exist and no increased production is needed.

The new protection is not needed now, the State Board chairman said, since the prices of non-basic commodities named are well above the 85 percent of parity level, but farmers can plan their 1942 production in the knowledge that prices can and will be supported should it become necessary.

Heil Has a Nazi Accent

In an address before the Milwaukee Junior Chamber of Commerce recently, Julius P. Heil, Republican Governor of Wisconsin, said that the American Legion's national convention was controlled by President Roosevelt.

The Governor obviously had reference to resolutions adopted by the Legionnaires in support of the administration's foreign policy, and subtly continued: "The Great White Father had all of his people here. There were plenty of pay-rollers here and they were controlled. . . ." Heil added: "Propaganda is a bad influence," and continued along the line of Wheeler, Lindburgh and Nazi.

A quick perusal of Emily Post's book on etiquette would inform Governor Heil that it is poor taste for a host to speak disparagingly of a departed guest. If the resolutions adopted by the American Legion while they were the guests of Milwaukee did not meet the approval of Governor Heil it seems to us he would have the decency to express his dissent before they departed.

Obviously, Governor Heil realized his speech had a Nazi accent, and dared not voice his opinion on the floor of the convention hall in the presence of that all-American team—the American Legion.

Appeasementists made the mistake of trying to persuade organizations of the Veterans of World War No. 1 to disavow the Administration's foreign policy, but, in state after state—at their conventions—both the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars rebuffed the attempt and expressed the approval and support of their government. — The Kokomo Telegraph.

Future Wonder World

We Americans may not be riding in rocket cars or making regular trips to the moon within the next ten years or so, but other wonders are in store for us. There's a chance that some of these wonders may change our lives as completely as the automobile did, or the radio or any one of the many inventions that have appeared within the past generation or two.

That, at least, is the prediction of Dr. Robert A. Millikan, eminent physicist and Nobel prize winner. He says that the life of many during the next few decades will be "powerfully" influenced by industrial and other scientific developments that are under way at the present time.

For several of these inventions we may not have to wait long, either. In the not too distant future we may be riding in cars partly built of milk, using fuel distilled partly from sweet potatoes, over roads made partly of cotton.

According to Dr. Millikan, the post-emergency period probably will bring new developments in transportation and international communications as a result of the "enormous" progress in military aviation. Among the other advances he lists, new plastics, improvements in short wave radio, better sterilization of drinking water, new knowledge of vitamins to change our eating habits, and further developments in medicine and public health.

Such advances by no means exhaust the list of improvements in store for us, however. To our children, our present-day lives will probably seem as uncomfortable and old-fashioned as the lives of our grandparents seem to us today. If the scientists continue to make life more and more attractive for us here in America, we may not want to take that trip to the moon when the time for it does arrive.

FHA to Continue Long Range Mortgage Insurance Program

AMARILLO, TEXAS, Oct. 19—

Despite recent development affecting home building, insurance was given here today that the Federal Housing Administration will continue its long range program of home mortgage insuring operations and will continue to welcome applications from builders and individuals throughout the state, submit through approved mortgagees.

E. F. Stearns, district director for FHA, moved to correct any impression that the current emergency has altered the basic FHA program by assuring prospective home buyers that the FHA plans no curtailment of its activities nor temporary suspension of its insuring operations.

"Some misunderstanding of the FHA's position has developed lately," Mr. Stearns said, because of recent trends in the government's attitude toward housing. It is possible that this misunderstanding may have caused some families to postpone home ownership. I should like to assure those families that the Federal Housing Administration will be glad to accept their applications for mortgage insurance and to assure them that FHA facilities are still available to families who wish to buy or build homes.

"It is true that the Federal Housing Administration, under a special arrangement with the Office of Production Management, also is accepting applications for priorities so that builders of homes in officially designated 'defense areas' may encounter as little difficulty as possible in obtaining home building materials that are scarce. In effect this is a job which the FHA is performing simply for the OPM. Its own program will go forward independently.

"Our position, then, is as it was before the emergency. We are accepting applications covering both homes to be built and existing homes. There are a great many communities in which no current shortage of building materials exists. If at same time in the future building material stocks are exhausted, it is possible that home building in certain communities would be curtailed. In those communities described officially as 'defense areas' builders and contractors would have to obtain priority to be assured of those materials which are likely to be scarce. In non-defense areas these probably would not be available.

"But for all practical purposes home building may proceed without any interference for the present. So long as applications for mortgage insurance involve well built, well designed, livable homes in good neighborhoods to be purchased or built by families of steady income and good credit, no difficulties ap-

Furniture and Household Goods—10% Down, 18 Months to Pay

Includes new furniture, ice refrigerators, bed springs and mattresses, but excludes floor coverings, wall coverings, draperies and bed coverings on which there are no federal credit restrictions.

F. H. A. BUILDING LOANS Available under Original F. H. A. Plan.

Heating Equipment—15% Down, 18 Months to Pay

Includes all types of household furnaces and heating units for furnaces.

Plumbing—15% Down, 18 Months to Pay

Includes sanitary fixtures, water heaters and water pumps designed for household use.

Musical Instruments—20% Down, 18 Months to Pay

Includes saxophones, trumpets, and similar instruments composed principally of metal.

Home Appliances—20% Down, 18 Months to Pay

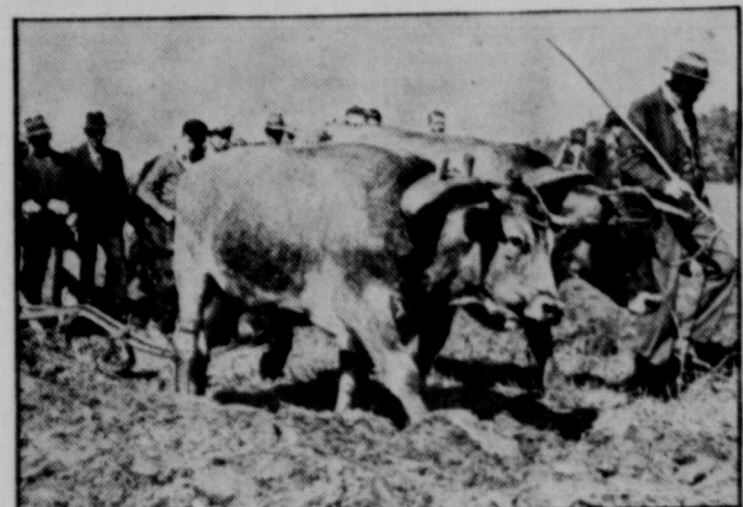

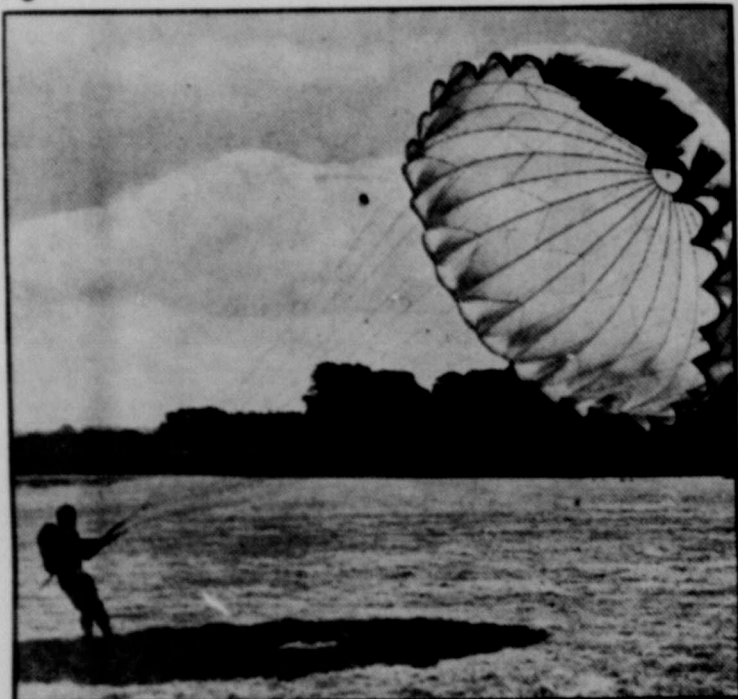

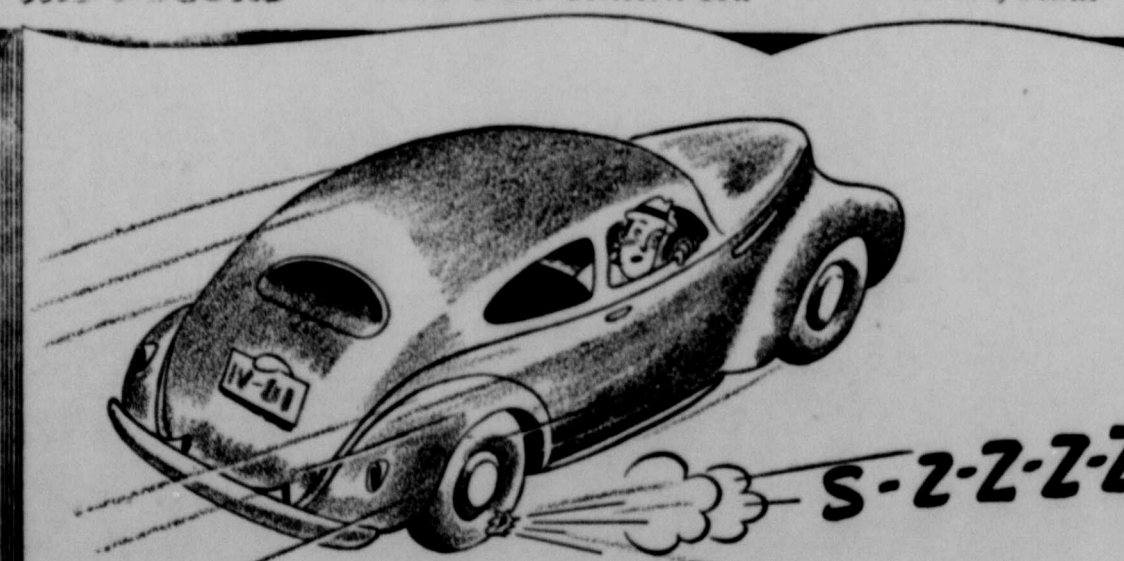

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Temperance Is Vital Need

The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for Oct. 26.
Text: Deuteronomy 5:32, 33; 11:26-28; Habakkuk 2:12.

THIS lesson is for International Temperance Sunday. The fact that so large a part of the world is at war, and that even in countries where alcoholism has been a serious problem, the chief problem of millions is now that of getting food and drink for normal sustenance, does not minimize the need of stressing international temperance.

THE three passages from various portions of the Bible, which constitute our lesson, indicate how valuable a textbook the Bible still is for the inculcation of temperance. Strong drink made its ravages in the ancient world as it makes its ravages today. The story of the effect of intemperance upon the individual and upon society has been practically the same in every age and among every people. The woe that the prophet Isaiah pronounced to the drunkards of Ephraim is the same woe that falls upon the drunkards of America and of other lands today.

Nor is the cause of temperance one that stands alone. The three great enemies of human welfare and happiness have been slavery, war, and strong drink. Today war is the upmost of these enemies, with slavery threatening vast portions of mankind.

IT is this situation that gives both point and large application to the single verse in our lesson from the prophecy of Habakkuk: "Woe to him that buildeth a town with blood, and establisheth a city by iniquity!" Too much in the life of every people today is still established by iniquity and built on blood.

Price of U. S. Wheat Doubles Foreign Prices

COLLEGE STATION — Texas
farmers selling wheat pro-
duced by the AAA wheat pro-
gram are receiving approximately
twice as much as growers in other major
producing countries, P. C.
Chittwood, commodity loan supervisor
for the state AAA, has announced.
The average farm price of wheat
in Texas is about \$1.05 and the
average farm price in the United
States is about 90 cents, he said.
The average price received by
Canadian growers is about 47 cents
(S. money), while Australian
farmers have been receiving 51 cents
per bushel. Returns to Argentina
farmers are from 42 to 45 cents
per bushel.

Marketing quotas on wheat, acre-
age allotments, the loan program

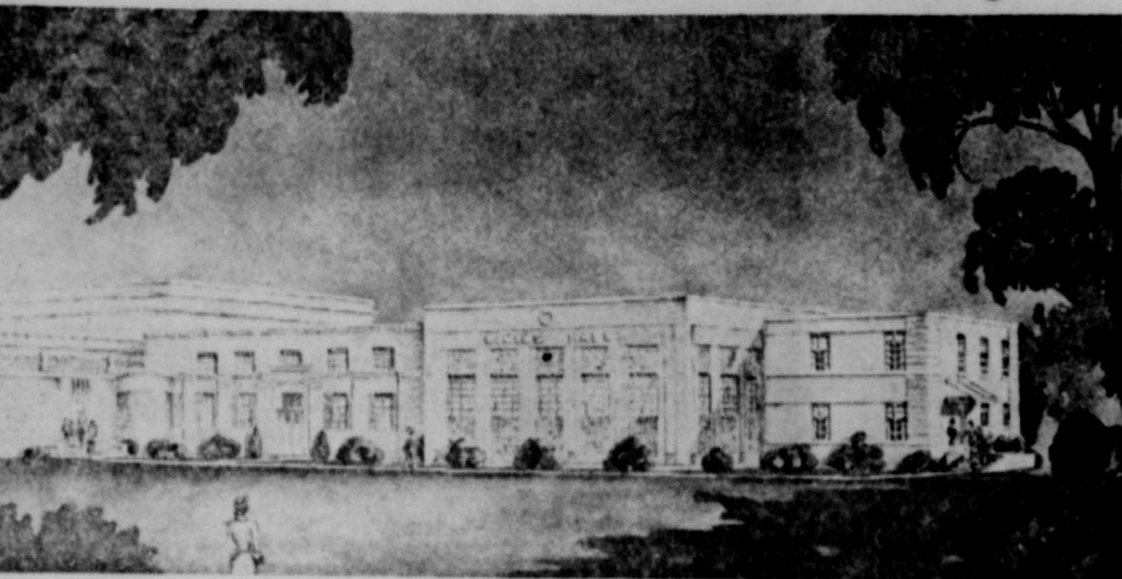

Tipton Orphans Home Plans New Building



Architect's drawing of 136 by 84 foot extension to the present main building of Tipton Orphans Home to consist of a chapel-dining-kitchen unit. Present facilities have been severely and constantly taxed since shortly after completion of the existing buildings when enrollment reached over 100 beyond planned capacity. A total of 1200 children from nine states have been cared for in the two decades' history of the Home which draws no state, political, fraternal or religious lines in accepting destitute children.

TIPTON, OKLA., Oct. 21 — Of-
ficial drive to raise \$40,000 for Tipton
Orphans Home's new develop-
ment program will begin Sunday,
October 26, when churches and in-
dividuals through the Southwest
will open local drives culminating
three months' preparational efforts
toward "Tipton Orphans Home
Week".

In the first building campaign
since the present \$110,000 main
building was completed in 1927, the
required funds have been broken
into 400 one-hundred dollar units,
according to G. W. Butler, public
relations representative of the
Home, who has traveled through
four states during the current cam-
paign in an endeavor to contact
churches and individuals to guaran-
tee the equivalent of the 400 units.

Superintendent and Mrs. R. E.
Chittwood, supervisors of the Home
for the past 17 years, say indica-
tions for success of the drive are
beyond original program expecta-
tions. The Tipton Church of Christ,
long the Home's largest single con-
tributor, had raised 11 full units or
\$1100 two weeks ahead of time. The
city of Tipton and Tillman county
are expected to more than double
that amount. Congregations and in-
dividuals in Lubbock, Texas, have
agreed to underwrite 20 of the re-
quired units, and five congregations
in Oklahoma City had guaranteed
14 units. Small congregations, and

one to several units.

Under the Penalty Remission Bill, all penalty and interest are released if all delinquent
taxes are paid.

of 3% during the Month of October, 2% during November and 1% during December.
No Discounts allowed during January, 1942.

present known needs and as representatives of all Red Cross Chapters and Branches, we set a 12,000,000 membership as the minimum objective for the 25th Annual Roll Call.

"In the event of extreme emergency, which would suddenly find the American Red Cross with even greater obligations, we, as delegates, pledge complete support to the Chairman, the Central Committee and to the officials of the National Organization in any commitment required or in any steps as may be appropriate to alter this membership objective or to otherwise strengthen the organization's financial ability to deal with its responsibilities."

Conditions have changed materially since last spring when the above Convention Resolution was adopted unanimously by the assembled chapter delegates. The President of the United States has proclaimed a state of National Emergency. The armed forces have increased to 1,531,800 according to a statement by the Secretary of War. Red Cross Military and Naval Welfare Services and steps taken or planned in connection with Civilian Defense have greatly increased the National budgetary needs. These expanded activities, brought about by the National Defense program will naturally increase local activity and financial needs.

WASHINGTON WEEK

War Bounces Rubber Back

BY RALPH HERBERT

ONE good thing that the new World War may do is to bring back to South America the cultivation of rubber-bearing trees. It will thus break the practical world monopoly of the planters of British Malaya and Dutch East Indies. It will also make the supply for the United States easier and safer from disturbance by wars.

Rubber-bearing trees were native to South America, growing wild there. The British secured seedlings and took them out to the Malay peninsula where the climate and soil were very much like those of South America. There they produced trees that are free from diseases that infected wild rubber trees of South America. Cheap labor did the rest.

Now, working with those countries, the U. S. Department of Agriculture is trying to re-instate the rubber industry in the western hemisphere. Peru and Brazil have particularly been chosen. At one time the Amazon basin in Peru was a leading rubber area. The last big year was in 1917 when more than 5,500,000 pounds of crude rubber were collected from wild trees.

PERU has voted an appropriation to begin production in a permanent and well regulated way. Two nursery stations have been established, one at Oromina and the other in the Tingo Maria valley. Rubber seedlings started from native seeds are now growing there and, at the end of the year, will be grafted with improved disease-resistant strains from the Far East British and Dutch possessions.

Also, instead of rolling the rubber into balls, it will be prepared for market by the production of smoked sheets of crude rubber. How important this new move is can be illustrated by this fact: if Japan were to attack the British Malay peninsula and the Dutch East Indies, it would threaten complete stoppage of American imports of crude rubber. Once the South American production was established on a big scale, the United States could be completely indifferent as to what Japan might try to do.

Former Houston Newspaper Man Is Scientist Treasurer

Roy Garrett Watson, Houston, Texas, has been named as Treasurer of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, Boston, Mass., by The Christian Science Board of Directors.

Mr. Watson is the former president, publisher and editor of The Houston Post which he operated from 1914 to 1924 before selling to devote his time to the church. He was director of the Southern Newspaper Publishers Association at the time of sale.

He has been director of the Christian Science Committee on Publication for Texas since 1934.

Wage Statements To Each Employee

Complaints recently received from workers indicate that some employers are not familiar with the requirements that a statement of wages paid must be given to each employee, according to Dewey Reed, manager of the Amarillo office of the Social Security Board.

"The Social Security Act provides that every employer shall furnish a written statement to each of his employees, in a form suitable for retention by the employee, showing the amount of wages paid."

No special form is prescribed, but the statement should show the employer's name, the employee's name and account number, the total wages paid, and the amount of tax deducted. The statement may be given for any period not exceeding one year; if given on each pay day, the date should be shown, but if it covers more than one pay period, the statement should show the period of time covered. When wage earners' services are terminated for any reason, a final statement covering all wages paid since the preceding statement must be given by the employer at the time of the final wage payment. Willful failure of an employer to

comply with these requirements makes him subject to a penalty of not more than \$5.00 in each case.

Reed concluded, "Employees should take care to keep all wage statements. Monthly retirement insurance after age 65 and insurance payments to the family in case of death are based on total wages received by a worker. In case of discrepancy in the wages reported, the wage statements are good evidence to prove the correct amount of wages received."

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Army's New Plan for Induction Of Trainees Into Service in Effect

A modified plan for induction of trainees under the jurisdiction of the Texas Selective Service System will be placed into immediate effect with the Army's most recent call for 1375 men, it was announced today by General J. Watt Page, State Selective Service Director.

The new system has the approval of the War Department, General Page said, and will reduce almost entirely the uncertainty with which registrants have heretofore been faced during the period between the local board examination and the date set for induction. A major advantage also in the new plan is that registrants will be given ample opportunity to make final arrangements in their financial and other personal affairs.

"In the beginning," General Page pointed out, "men called for induction did not know until they reported for induction whether or not they would pass their Army physical examination. This naturally worked a hardship on many registrants—some of them had given up their jobs only to be rejected at the induction stations. Now, registrants will know well in advance whether they will be inducted and are in a position to make their plans accordingly."

General Page explained that the modified plan calls for the usual preliminary local board examination within thirty to sixty days prior to date of call for induction. Within thirty days prior to call selectees will be sent to government expense to the Army Examining Board in their district, where a complete examination, including physical, citizenship, morals, and literacy will be given. (Army examining stations in Texas are located at Houston, Dallas, Ft. Sam Houston near San Antonio, Ft. Bliss near El Paso, and Lubbock.)

After examination the local board concerned will be notified of the result of the examination and the selectee will be returned to his home at government expense. Wherever possible, registrants will be permitted to return to their homes the same day they are examined by Army physicians.

General Page pointed out that the new system when the Army requisitions the State Selective Service Headquarters for a certain number of men to be delivered on given dates, the 351 local boards throughout the State will be called upon to furnish their quota of selectees who have already been accepted by the Army Examining Boards, and these selectees will be sent direct to the designated reception centers in the Eighth Corps Area for immediate induction.

Induction will normally follow within twenty to thirty days after the Army physical examination, and selectees will receive at least ten days notice prior to call for induction.

"For example," General Page said, "The Army has just requisitioned the Texas Selective Service System for 1183 white selectees and 192 colored selectees. State Headquarters has today issued a call on Texas local boards for the actual number each will send to Army Examining stations during the period October 27 through October 30. However, those men who are accepted will not be inducted before December 1 and the colored selectees on December 6."

PORT SAM HOUSTON, TEXAS, October 15, (Special) — Carpenters, electricians, plumbers and road building machine operators are wanted at once by the United States Quartermaster Corps for employment in the Panama Canal Zone, according to Colonel Edwin V. Dunstan, Constructing Quartermaster Eighth Construction Zone with headquarters at Port Sam Houston, Texas.

All applicants who qualify will be given a Government contract for six months with transportation and other traveling expenses paid both ways unless the employee breaks his contract.

Each applicant must have not less than five years actual working experience, must have proof of American citizenship and pass a rigid physical examination and be able to take inoculation for typhoid, malaria and yellow fever.

Rest and Food Vital to Child

Austin, Texas. — Now that the schools are under way and the daily routine is well established, the question of school lunches that will help to keep the growing boy or girl up to the mark mentally and physically is of special importance. But the child's growth and development are helped or hindered by various other things on a child's daily program.

Here are some of them as outlined by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer: "The average school child needs from 10-12 hours of sleep each night. A tired child is a nervous, irritable child who finds it hard to concentrate. Does your child have a bedtime that is early enough to insure adequate amount of sleep. Teachers complain that many of the children find it necessary to eat part of their lunch in the middle of the morning. A hungry child does not make a good student. Does your child have an adequate breakfast before he leaves for school?"

"A hot food in the middle of the

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day prevents fatigue and stimulates the appetite. If there are no provisions for hot food at school, the teacher should place a jar of water by the child in a bowl of lunch time. Does your child have an adequate lunch, on what does it include a hot dish?

"A well nourished body must have certain necessary foods every day, such as milk, fruits, vegetables, whole grains, meat and eggs, and cod liver oil. Does your child have an evening meal which supplements the other meals of the day? Does it provide the balance of the day's needed during the day?"
