## Cancer Crusade Chairman Tells Of Funds' Use

"A Cancer Quiz - for every  
family" featuring lifesaving  
answers is the theme of the  
American Cancer Society's new  
leaflet to be circulated in  
40,000,000 homes during its  
1975 educational and fund-  
raising Crusade," declared Mrs.  
Paralyn Moore, Crusade Chair-  
man.

"If you know the correct  
answers to the 10 questions you  
are in a good position to help  
protect yourself and your  
family," she said. "Then pass it  
on to a friend or relative."

All of the questions relate to  
vital information about breast  
cancer, cancer of the cervix and  
other major sites, as well as  
cigarette smoking and health  
checkups.

"What is your best everyday  
protection against cancer?"  
asked Mrs. Moore quoting the  
leaflet. "The knowledge of the  
seven warning signals of  
cancer, jogging or taking  
multi-vitamins?"

If you don't know what the  
Seven Warning Signals are,  
they're listed on the back of the  
leaflet to be distributed this  
year by the more than 2.3  
million ACS volunteers, 200 of  
whom are right here in Castro

County.

"Quiz yourself, and then help  
yourself, with a checkup and  
others with a check. We want  
to wipe out cancer in your  
lifetime," said Mrs. Moore.

How is the money used that  
is donated to the American  
Cancer Society? The following

dollar is spent in Texas:

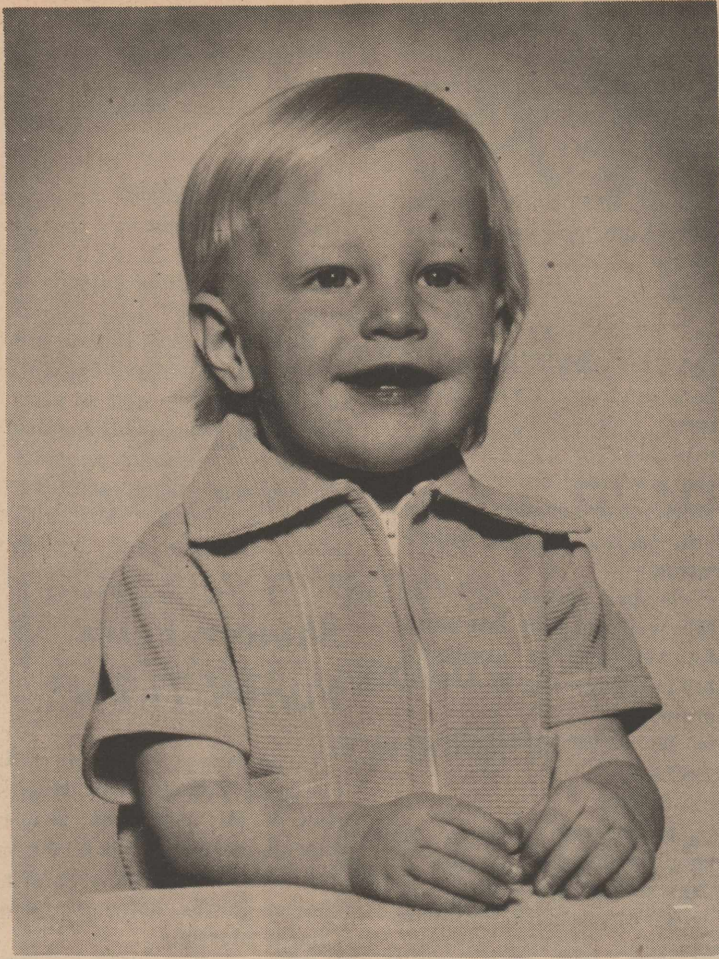

## Cook Of The Week



Recipes are shared this week by a young housewife and mother who has lived in Hart only since her marriage two and a half years ago. Dimmitt had been home for Sue Hawkins until Quincy brought

### ORANGE COOKIE BALLS

1 - 6 oz. can frozen orange juice, thawed  
1 stick oleo (1/2 c.)  
1 box powdered sugar  
Mix all together then add one 12 oz. package vanilla wafers (crushed)  
1 c. chopped pecans

Mix well and form into small balls and roll in cocoanut. Store in refrigerator in covered container.

### FIESTA

Meat Sauce:

4 lb. hamburger  
3 chopped onions  
2 cans stewed tomatoes  
1 large can tomato puree or paste  
4 T. chili powder  
3 T. garlic salt  
1 large can ranch style beans  
Brown hamburger and onions. Add other ingredients and simmer one hour.

Serve with the following in this order, one on top of the other.

2 bags crushed Fritos  
1 large box cooked minute rice meat sauce  
1 lb. grated cheese  
2 heads chopped lettuce

7 chopped tomatoes  
3 chopped onions  
chopped ripe olives  
chopped pecans (optional)  
Picante Sauce

### SALMON PATTIES

1 large can salmon  
1 egg  
1 heaping t. baking powder  
1/2 c. flour

Drain liquid from salmon and save. Mix salmon and egg and add flour. May add a little pepper but no salt. In separate cup use 1/4 c. of salmon juice and add baking powder (it will foam so use large cup). Mix with salmon mixture and fry in patties.

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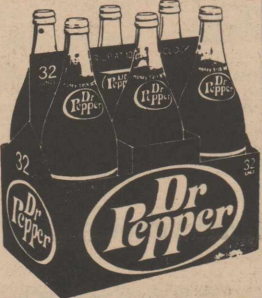

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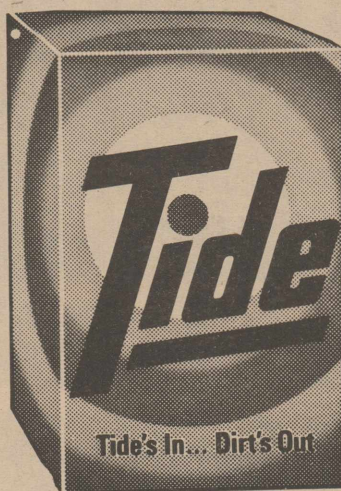

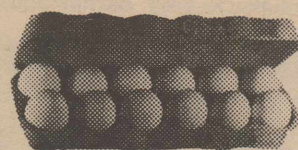
