Dallas Bandit Is Captured Sunday

William Pruett, 23, Faces Charges for Robbery Of Drug Store; Identified As Mann Slayer

(By Associated Press) DALLAS, Jan. 14.—While William Pruett, 23, lay on his cot in a jail hospital ward tonight, evidence continued to pile up allegedly connecting him with a series of crimes that have had the city on edge for days.

Charged with robbery of a drug store the night of January 3, Pruett had been identified by one witness as the bandit who killed William Mann, 17, high school student, while presumably trying to rob Mann of his automobile, and by others as the one who took from them of money and valuables by use of a gun.

Captured After Fight
Pruett was captured after a gun fight with detectives after he had been cornered in the attic of a house here Sunday afternoon. He received wounds in his legs and hips.

James Walker, negro, who says he saw Mann and the hijacker were struggling was the one who identified Pruett in the slaying. Walker has view around a hundred suspects.

Expect Showdown On Money Bills In Senate This Week

Forces Favoring Finance Measures Win Temporary Victory With Opposition's Failure On A Vote

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Jan. 14.—A showdown was expected in the senate tomorrow on the question of whether the upper house will pass general appropriations measures during the regular session.

Forces favoring action on the finance bills before the end of this session won a temporary victory today when Walter Woodul, of Houston, commander of the opposition, could not get either of two surprise proposals to vote.

Barry Miller, president of the senate, referred Woodul's resolution against consideration of money bills during this session to the committee on rules, and he declared his motion for indefinite postponement of action on the judiciary appropriations mittie, out of order on the grounds bill, reported favorably out of committee it had not lain on the table 24 hours.

Ex-Convict Held On Forgery Here

His plan of "cleaning up" quick profits on little capital was quickly frustrated here Saturday night when Mansey Allcorn, alias R. H. Allen, alias R. H. Sherman, was arrested by Sheriff Wade Hardy just a few miles before he had planned to make his get-away.

Allcorn, according to his signed confession, deposited \$30 in a local bank and scattered a large number of checks over the city, in all, so far as can be learned, about \$35 more than he deposited, not counting some \$40 or \$50 worth of merchandise he secured. Practically all goods he purchased were recovered Sunday morning, and some of the money, the exact amount of the losses not yet determined, as there may be some checks out that are not known.

Charges of swindling and forgery have been filed against him, the prisoner confessing to being an ex-convict who had broken his parole from the Colorado state penitentiary.

Question Mark To Fly Non-Stop Hop Back To Capital

Major Spatz Plans Refueling Flight from San Diego To Washington; Awaits Official Orders

To Fly Over Texas

Final Decision Expected On Plans Upon Word From Captain Eaker, Visiting Parents In San Angelo

(By Associated Press) SAN DIEGO, Cal., Jan. 14.—The probability that the Question Mark, record smashing army endurance plane, will make a non stop refueling flight back across the continent to Washington was announced here today by Major Carl Spatz, commanding officer.

The Question Mark, which will be accompanied by refueling ship No. 1 piloted by Captain Ross G. Hoyt, would attempt the first non-stop trans-continental refueling flight in history if the plan is carried out.

Await Eaker Return

Major Spatz said final decision would be withheld until Captain Ira C. Eaker, chief pilot in its epochal flight of more than 150 hours at Los Angeles last week, returned from Texas. Captain Eaker was called to his mother's home at Eden, where she was seriously ill.

"In compliance with our orders to return to Washington as quickly and as possible," Major Spatz said. "We may find it advisable to save time and make mileage by pushing the Question Mark through a round the clock flight without landing or refueling as we go."

"Our present itinerary," Major Spatz continued, "calls for our return by way of the southern route with overnight stops at Tucson, Ariz., Midland, Texas, Silverport, La. Montgomery, Ala., and some point between Montgomery and Washington, not yet selected. The reason for this uncertainty is that we may be compelled to adjust our

Marshal Foch, Leader In World War, Seriously Ill

Military Chief Of France Has Heart Attack Monday

(By Associated Press) PARIS, Jan. 14.—Ferdinand Foch, Marshal of France and commander-in-chief of allied armies in the closing stages of the world war, tonight was holding a slight advantage in his most critical engagement, a battle against illness. The winner of many gigantic battles was fighting for his life against a heart attack which struck him down this morning while he was lighting the cigar which always follows his morning coffee.

The Marshal was resting this evening, but was rather exhausted after the struggle of the day. In the morning, sinking spells, followed by recoveries, have six doctors much worried. At one stage his two daughters were called to the bedside with their mother and many expected that the end was near, but medical men on leaving the house this evening said the condition of their patient was "fairly satisfactory." They said they would not return until tomorrow morning.

Doctors Issue Statement.

The doctors issued this short comment: "The Marshal is suffering from a heart attack, necessitating complete rest."

They explained however, that M. Foch was enjoying what probably would be only a temporary truce. The probability of another attack was regarded with the forebodings. The medical communication was signed by Doctors Davenienc, Hertsroger, Degener, Laury, Jules-Renault and Balmeski.

Marshal Foch caught a cold on Armistice day which settled in his bronchial tubes, causing a hacking cough and affecting action of the heart. Most of which he continued to work until Saturday when pains in his side forced him to remain at home.

Dr. Davenienc, his family physician, made several calls Sunday but when his condition grew worse he decided to call in the other five medical men, all of whom have specialized in affections of the heart.

New students enrolling in the public schools of Lubbock, not counting the Mexican and negro schools, or the outlying ward schools, numbered 129 Monday, according to M. H. Dunn, superintendent. This brings the total enrollment in the city for the year up to 4,640.

Million Is Left To Charity Work

NEW YORK, Jan. 14. (P)—Benjamin N. Duke, retired tobacco manufacturer and philanthropist, who died January 8, left more than \$1,000,000 to charitable organizations, most of which he bequeathed to his native state.

The bulk of the estate, value of which once was estimated at from \$500,000 to \$2,000,000, goes to Mrs. A. J. Drexel Biddle, Jr., of New York, who is a trustee of the American Red Cross. Among the larger charitable bequests is \$50,000 to the board of foreign missions of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, Nashville, Tenn.

Boston Dentist Is Investigated for Fatal Burning of Mrs. Babe Ruth

Dr. Edward H. Kinder Is Questioned by Police For 4 Hours Monday; Mrs. Ruth Was Burned Friday Night; Ruth Shocked to Learn of Death

(By Associated Press) WATERTOWN, Mass., Jan. 14.—Dr. Edward H. Kinder, Boston dentist, was held today by police for hours here late today by police concerning his relations with George Herman Ruth, wife of Babe Ruth. Mrs. Ruth was burned to death in Dr. Kinder's home here Friday night.

He had been known to neighbors as Mrs. Helen Kinder. Kinder went away with his attorney after the interview, but Chief of Police Milmore revealed that Kinder said he never had married Mrs. Ruth, although he had lived with her at intervals since 1927.

Fearful Story Would Break

"Dr. Kinder told us," said Chief Milmore, "that on Saturday night he walked the streets in distraction fearing the story was coming out. He remained in seclusion on Sunday."

Texas Schools Ask Almost Million In Emergency Funds

Appropriations Committee Hears Plea of 8 Educational Institutions; Total Is \$854,588.85

Demands Heard

Tech Asks for \$185,383.45 For Science and Engineering Equipment and Emergency Payments

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Jan. 14.—Representatives of eight state educational institutions appeared before the senate finance committee today to ask for emergency appropriations, aggregating \$854,588.85. The committee planned to hear representatives of all other state colleges tomorrow.

The schools whose emergency demands were heard today and the amounts each asked follow:

John Tarleton Junior Agricultural College, Stephenville, \$50,000; North Texas Junior Agricultural College, Arlington, \$18,741.22; University of Texas, Austin, \$288,000; College of Industrial Arts, Denton, \$132,225; North Texas State Teachers College, Denton, \$68,000; West Texas State Teachers College, Canyon, \$45,897.18; Stephen F. Austin State Teachers College, Nacogdoches, \$46,742; and Texas Technological College, Lubbock, \$185,383.45.

Presidents Appear

President H. Y. Benedict of the University of Texas, President L. H. Hubbard of C. I. A., President R. L. Marquis of the North Texas Normal, Deans J. Thomas Davis of John Tarleton, E. E. Davis, of North Texas Junior College, Dean Shaw of the West Texas Normal, J. H. Wisley of Stephen F. Austin and President P. W. Horn of Texas Tech made their respective pleas for funds.

Much of the money asked was for maintenance of summer school last summer and in 1929. The University of Texas asked \$200,000 for the purchase of 28 acres here adjoining university lands, known as the Kavanaugh tract. Texas Tech sought \$100,000 for additional equipment for its science and engineering buildings.

Middle West Held In Cold Wave Grip

Sub Zero Temperatures Give Section Its Coldest Weather; 40-Year Records Broken

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, Jan. 14.—The middle West was locked tonight in the icy grip of one of the most severe cold waves and the worst snow storm in recent years.

Sub-zero temperatures that yesterday broke records of 40 years were followed today by a snowstorm that continued from dawn until dark and was expected to last until tomorrow.

The storm and cold tonight had accounted for the death of half a dozen persons and suffering from thousands of others, had blocked highways in half a dozen states, hampered rail transportation and tied wire communication facilities into a snarl that threatened to become worse.

New Wave Likely

The weather bureau held out little hope of immediate relief either from the cold or the snow. A new cold wave on Tuesday expected to be almost as severe as that of yesterday when the mercury ranged from zero to more than 20 below.

Oil Show Struck In Dawson Test; Howard Tops Pay

Geter Well, 18 Miles South-east of Lamesa Has Good Showing; 200 Barrel Well Extends Howard Field

(Special To The Avalanche) LAMESA, Jan. 14.—The Geter well being drilled by the Magnolia Oil company 18 miles southeast of here today made a fine showing at a depth of 3,855 feet and the bit is in oil bearing sand which is believed here to be a paying sand. The Pure Oil company well 35 miles northwest is now 2,290 and drilling in lime and shale.

BIG SPRING, Jan. 14. (Special to the Avalanche)—The Plymouth Oil Company well, located 1,690 feet from south line and 2,310 feet from west line on section 5, block 32, 1 mile and quarter extension west, drilled to 2,391. The hole is standing 1,800 feet with oil with no gas pressure, which is characteristic in this particular field. The well is estimated at 2,000 barrels and means a mile and quarter extension west. The pay was struck 70 feet lower on the structure than the Henshaw discovery well which extended the field three miles west.

Stanley Tells Of WTCC Convention Plan Next May

Arrangements Under Way For Conference of 2 Nations In Annual West Texas Meet

Expect Big Meet

Speaker In Secretaries Convention Here Today Gives Interesting Data On Gathering; Section Praised

President Hoover, of the United States, and President Gil of Mexico, are to meet and extend courtesies of their respective nations at El Paso, during the annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in May, if present plans of El Pasoans materialize. H. W. Stanley of that city stated here Monday night.

Mr. Stanley, who is president of the Broadway of America Highway association, and an official of the El Paso chamber of commerce, is in Lubbock to speak before the semi-annual meeting of the South Plains Commercial Executives' association at a special luncheon in the Hotel Lubbock banquet room today noon.

According to him, El Paso is planning elaborate entertainment features for the West Texas Chamber of Commerce convention, leaving nothing undone to insure interesting moments from the time visitors arrive in the Gateway City until they leave.

"Because of the importance of the West Texas convention," Mr. Stanley declared, "it is reasonable to suppose that there will be a much larger number of tourists in El Paso during the dates of this convention than we could otherwise expect. These annual gatherings are becoming the talk of the entire nation and undoubtedly thousands of business men who expect to motor to the West Coast will time their trips so they may see what one of our conventions is like."

Tourist travel for the city of El Paso has become one of that municipality's major industries, according to Stanley, the trade derived from this source alone being worth more to the city than the payrolls of its four largest industries.

Irrigation Bonds Voted in Willacy

Project to Cost \$7,500,000 Is Voted by 67 to 4 Majority; 130,000 Acres To Be Benefitted

(By Associated Press) RAYMONDVILLE, Jan. 14.—Bonds for a gigantic irrigation system were voted by a majority of 67 to 4 here today. The issue is for \$7,500,000 and affects 130,000 counties in Willacy County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1, lying about Raymondville.

Plans provide for concrete conduits. Water would be taken from the Rio Grande, and would flow by gravity through a canal 24 miles long and 80 feet wide at the bottom. Construction is to start within a few weeks.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14. (AP)—A question as to the propriety of approving legislation during the Coolidge administration for an investigation of prohibition during the Hoover regime today caused the senate judiciary committee to postpone a report on the Edge-Jones resolution for an inquiry into enforcement of the liquor laws. Beginning March 1, a county-wide extermination campaign of prairie dogs will be launched, County Agent D. F. Eaton announced here Monday afternoon. The campaign will be carried on in cooperation with the United States Department of Agriculture.

A quantity of poison, to be used in the effort at complete riddance of prairie dogs from this county, is on hand now, Mr. Eaton stated, and although the pests are not present except in just a few sections of the county, a thorough check of the county is to be made before the campaign starts. When the fight begins, it will be done one community at a time.

All Lubbock county farmers who are bothered with prairie dogs are requested to get in touch with Mr. Eaton at an early date in order to insure waging of the pest war in their vicinity. R. J. Powell, field representative of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, will be in charge of the extermination effort.

Eaton Estimates Crop Below 40,000

While this season's cotton yield will undoubtedly surpass the 35,000 bale mark for Lubbock county in the opinion of D. F. Eaton, Lubbock county agriculture agent, it will not quite reach the 40,000 bale figure, he stated here Monday afternoon.

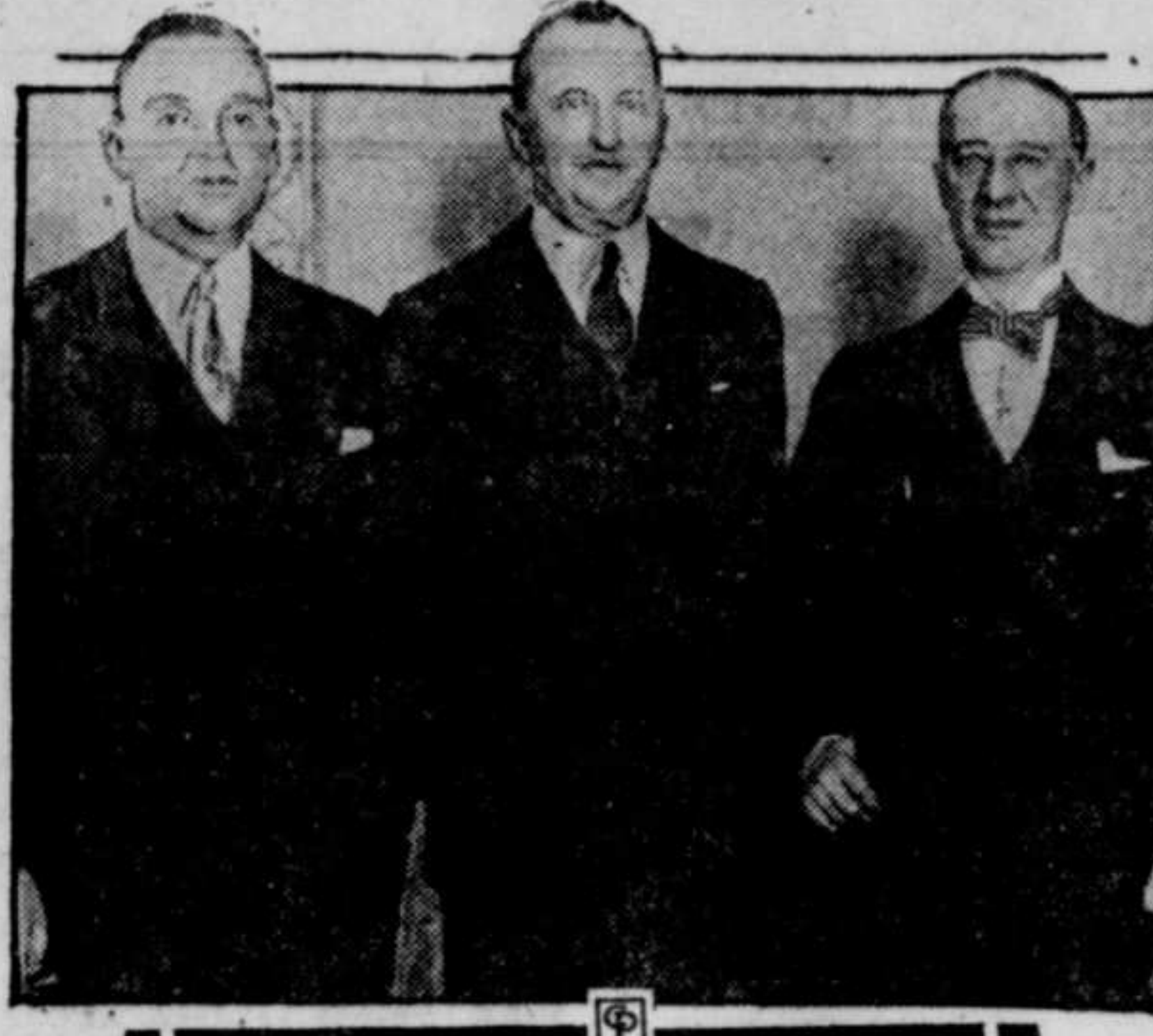
To date there have been more than 32,000 bales ginned in Lubbock county, and there are still many fields with unpicker cotton. The remainder of the crop will be completely picked within the near future, Mr. Eaton believes.

on one of the most important highway routes across the nation," he emphasized, "and El Paso is vitally interested in the proposed highway through the Carlsbad country to Lubbock and on to Oklahoma City. This route is one of the biggest potential assets your city has to look forward to and I trust the route will soon be a reality. You should be getting a large portion of the tourists trade that El Paso enjoys."

Indications as to railroad expansion in this territory are also being closely watched in El Paso, the visitor stated, several major railway companies probably planning to extend their lines to and through Lubbock to Carlsbad and El Paso, with the aim of reaching the Pacific coast through that pass. At this time El Paso is exporting approximately \$2,000,000 a month into Mexico, in addition to importing 500 carloads of bananas from Mexico's southernmost state, every month.

Highway Is Important

The recent vote of \$75,000 in bonds by Culberson county, by a vote of three to one, to be used in placing a topping on the Broadway of America Highway through that county, was remarked of by Mr. Stanley when he learned of Lubbock county's second unsuccessful attempt to vote bonds for paving highways. The Broadway highway extends from Broadway, New York to Broadway, San Diego, Cal. and is becoming a principal route of tourist travel from coast to coast. It now has 72 per cent of its entire course paved, and with better highways in the South Plains section connecting with this route, more and more tourists will be attracted here and development will come quicker.

When I explained that Lubbock was a city of approximately 20,000 people, he exclaimed that he did not desire to learn anything further—he would drop the idea of his story, as he had intended writing one of his wild west novels of frontier days."

So many parents are joy-killers! They don't mean to be and likely they would be tremendously surprised if someone would say to them, "You are making your child more unhappy every day he lives."

"Unhappy! Why, we're doing everything on earth for him! He has a good home, excellent food, every comfort, and even luxury. And we are never cross with him. Few children have as many blessings as our boy. What do you mean?"

The thing these parents are doing is simply this. They are tearing down air castles in the air, building a world that all children build up in their minds and love to live in. Things of fragile construction, these castles, that no crown-up may grow up has ever yet found.

How to Achieve Beauty

If we could only cultivate that supple, sinuous grace which characterizes the jungle beasts. I shall never forget the one opportunity I had of seeing a panther in its natural habitat.

The ease with which the velvet-footed paws stepped out across the velvet, crouch as the beautiful creature scented danger. Then, with one supple movement, it was in the air, and like a flash of mottled gold, disappeared into a clump of underbrush.

I forgot to be afraid in my sheer admiration of the marvelous grace that distinguished the panther. The "panther crawl," while hardly

reminiscent of the supple perfection of the wild creature's grace, is nevertheless an exercise which is designated to develop the ease of muscular action, which is the element of beautiful motion.

In the first position you crouch low, your left knee brought close to the chin, your right leg back and head over the bent knee.

Now walk on open hands, your left knee brought close to the ground, and the right leg dragging. Now bring your right leg up and around until it reaches a position under your chin.

It sounds considerably more difficult than it really is, but I hope that the directions will help you to master the simple rudiments of the exercise.

And that completes my manual of "graphic" exercises. I do hope that they will prove to you as pleasantly interesting as the little dozen can become when treated with a little vein of interest and imagination.

BREAKFAST — Chilled apple sauce, cereal, cream, little sausages, buckwheat pancakes, syrup, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON — Baked ham and eggs, creamed celery, graham rolls, jellied prunes, milk, tea.

DINNER — Braised mutton, potatoes au gratin, mashed turnips, head lettuce with French dressing, sliced oranges, coconut cookies, milk, coffee.

Baked Ham and Eggs
One cup chopped cooked ham, 1 cup soft stale bread crumbs, 2 tablespoons melted butter, milk, pepper, 4 eggs.

Combine ham, bread crumbs, butter and pepper. Mix lightly with a fork and add milk to make quite moist. Line buttered custard cups or gem pans with the ham mixture and break an egg in each cup. Cook with ham paste and bake in a moderately hot oven for fifteen minutes or until eggs are set. Serve with hot tomato sauce or creamed celery as suggested. This is an excellent way to use up fragments of cold boiled or baked ham. Any meat can be substituted but will need extra seasoning to make savory. Copyright 1929, NEA Service, Inc.

Hoover Cabinet To See Many Changes, Leaders Predict

Those Believed To Have Understanding to Viewpoint Say Foreign Policy To Be Very Different

BY JAMES L. WEST
Associated Press Staff Writer
WASHINGTON, Jan. 14. (AP)—Many shifts in the American diplomatic corps during the Hoover administration are forecast by those who profess to have an understanding of the general viewpoint of the next president on the conduct of foreign relations.

Another thing which was soon made evident to members of the good will mission was that the recurring interventions by the United States into revolution-torn republics in Central America formed a basis for misunderstandings with other republics and especially for rather effective anti-American propaganda spread by the nationals of foreign nations.

President-elect Hoover has taken occasion several times to express his own ardent hope that the necessity for American armed intervention in a sister republic may never arise again. It is believed that some of the causes for such interventions might be removed by American diplomacy made effective by representatives who have never had the opportunity and ability to build for themselves solid places in the esteem of both the government and the people of these republics.

Many phases of the whole problem of foreign relations have entered into the conferences which Mr. Hoover is holding in Washington for he by no means is devoting all of his time to legislative affairs and political appointments. He has talked with some of the ablest men in this field in the country.

State Employment Bill Is Considered

AUSTIN, Jan. 14. (AP)—Representative J. J. Loy of Sherman said today he was considering introduction of a resolution which would place the employment of many of the minor legislative employees in the hands of the board of control or some other permanent body in the interest of economy. Under the present system, clerks, stenographers, pages and porters are hired after examinations by house committees.

CORNER STONE IS LAID

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14. (AP)—Secretary Jardine today laid the corner stone of the first unit of a \$3,750,000 structure which will house the entire Department of Agriculture, now located in approximately 45 buildings here. The completed structure, he said, "will form the world's largest single establishment for men and women engaged in advancing agriculture" and will be a "symbol of our national responsibilities to those who make up a quarter of our population."

New Direct Line To Fort Worth Is Seen For Section

Purchase of Frisco and Beginning of Construction Of Extension Gives More Rail Improvement

(Special To The Avalanche)

FLOYDADA, Jan. 14.—That the Plains of Texas, through the Floydada gateway, is soon to have a direct rail connection to Fort Worth and Dallas as well as the direct rail service to the north and east already in effect, through the purchase of the G. T. & W. by the Frisco and the construction of addition railway mileage, was learned by the Floyd County Hesperian from authoritative sources this week. Chas. H. Sommer, president of the Quana, Ace and Pacific, accompanied by other officials of the road was in Floydada recently.

According to the plan, which is said to be rapidly shaping up for the Plains line to Fort Worth, application will be filed at an early date for permission to construct a line from the western terminus of the G. T. and W. to Paducah on the Q. A. and P., and this applica-

tion is not expected to meet with any serious objections, as it will serve a large scope of country not now served by a railway and will cross only one line—that the north and south line of the Orient, probably a Truett. Operating arrangements over the Rock Island lines from the eastern terminus of the G. T. and W. already known to have been perfected, would make the short line haul into Fort Worth complete.

Construction Important.

Construction of the new line is of utmost importance to Floydada. Besides giving a direct one-line haul to Fort Worth and Dallas, on a shorter mileage basis than any line now operating out of the Plains area, it will also in effect put an additional railway system's service into this point, the Fort Worth line operating independently of the line to the north and east, and with present facilities already here Floydada will have thus four outlets by rail that will afford unexcelled service in all directions. To the Gulf coast, to the Pacific, the north and northwest the Santa Fe's lines now afford the best possible connections, the Q. A. and P. to the north and east, and the new line will complete a freight and passenger service that will make this a strategic gateway for a wide territory.

No baseball for Lubbock in 1929. Doesn't sound so good for a city as large as this, but at the present time it looks like Lubbock won't be in the West Texas League when the season starts May 1. Local fans were given a golden opportunity Saturday night to hold the Hubber franchise but the response was so feeble that officials of the League have thrown in the sponge.

Even if there were only two at the meeting in the Chamber of Commerce offices, we still believe that baseball fans of Lubbock are sufficiently interested to put over the club. In the first place, a worse time to have a meeting of this kind could not have been found. Wide-spread interest in the outcome of the road bond election undoubtedly distracted attention from the baseball meeting. We can vouch for about half the citizens that were in the Avalanch-Journal offices between 7 and 8 Saturday night waiting for the returns and the majority of those who were not interested in the election were at the Tech-A. C. C. basketball game which started at the same time the meeting was called for.

Announcement was made Friday that the league owners were willing to turn over their entire assets to the fans of the city if sufficient interest was manifested to continue in the loop. Now that the intended mass meeting was a flop, these officials are going to sell the club franchise to the highest bidder. Nor can they be blamed for their position. Lubbock was just one city in the league that came out "in the hole" at the end of the 1928 season, and with interest at a low ebb at the present time, the outlook for another year is anything but rosy.

Balling has been mentioned as the possible successor to Lubbock in case the Hubbers fade from the picture. Needless to say, that would reflect somewhat upon the populace of Lubbock and the South Plains if a city no larger than Ballinger were to carry through what Lubbock failed to do. Baseball fans of this city can get the class of baseball they have been clamoring for if they will get behind the club, beat and hit the financial burden from the shoulders of a few who have grown tired of playing the philanthropist game.

Lubbock is the only city in the West Texas League that has failed to come through for 1929. A city of 20,000 persons not only needs a professional baseball team for summer time amusement, but needs one for the publicity connected with the league. Something yet can be done if those interested in the game will come to life and revive the organization before it's too late.

Coch Victor Payne will have a full week to whip his basketball hopefuls at Tech in shape for the five-day invasion of Abilene. Every basketball team has its off nights, but Tech couldn't have looked much worse.

Beginning on the 21st with a two-game series with the A. C. C. five, the Matadors will play two with McMurry and one in series with Simmons. This series of games will give the crimson basketeers plenty of fast competition. Simmons pulls what was called the impossible in downing the West Texas Buffs on two successive nights, and as a result are doomed as certain contenders for the Texas Conference championship.

In the meantime high school basketball will hold the spotlight in Lubbock and vicinity. The Athens Hornets invade West Texas for a series of engagements with teams in this section. The East Texans meet Ralls on Saturday and Tuesday night and come to Lubbock to meet that local high school quintet next Monday night.

Manager Stanley Harris, star second sacker for Washington, may have to play third for Detroit, for he has a great second sacker in Gehring. The Cleveland Indians apparently are committed to a policy of transferring Joey Sewell from shortstop to third base.

Connie Mack has a chance to sign three players permanently in almost any spot he chooses. Jimmie Fox, a catcher, Ossie Orrell, a pitcher, and Jimmy Dykes, an infield jack of all trades, are the individuals. Any one, or all of the trio, can play any position not nailed down.

Cleveland officials are having a problem solving where Eddie Morgan, their hard-hitting rookie of the 1928 season, will play this summer. He was used in the outfield, at third base and first base last summer.

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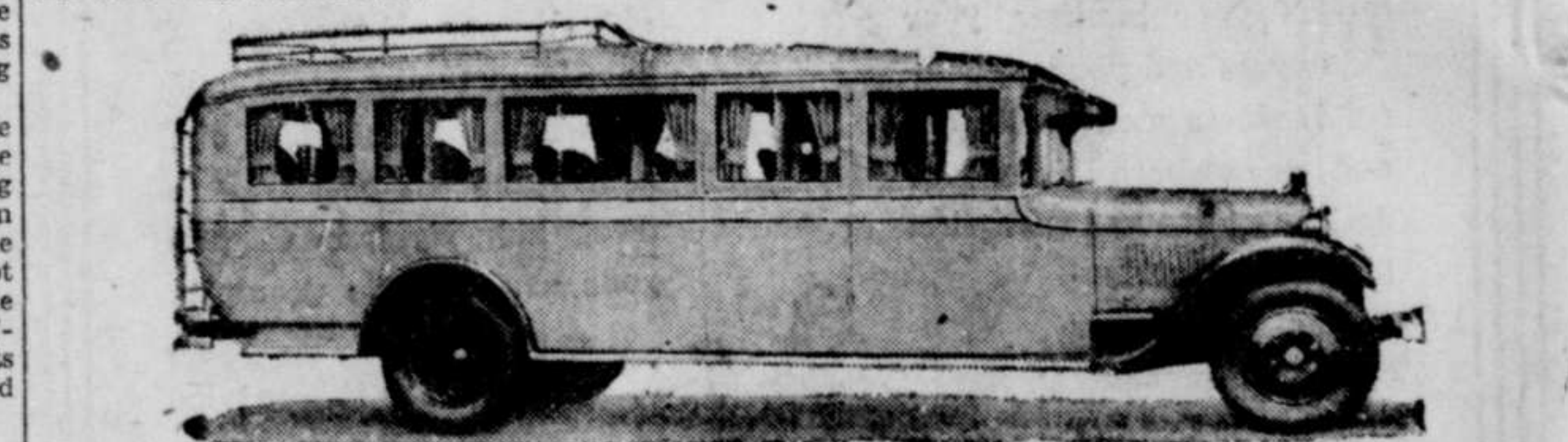

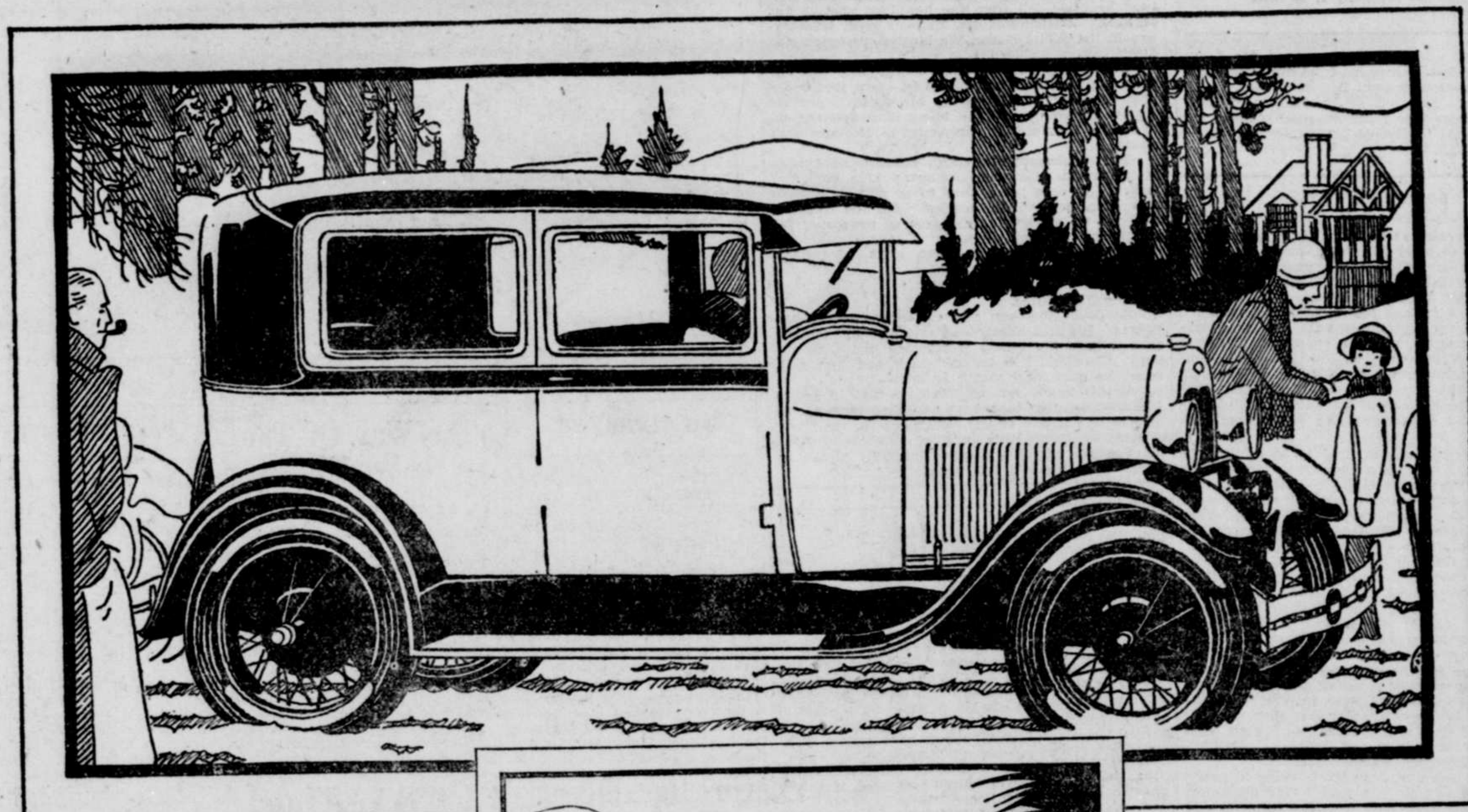

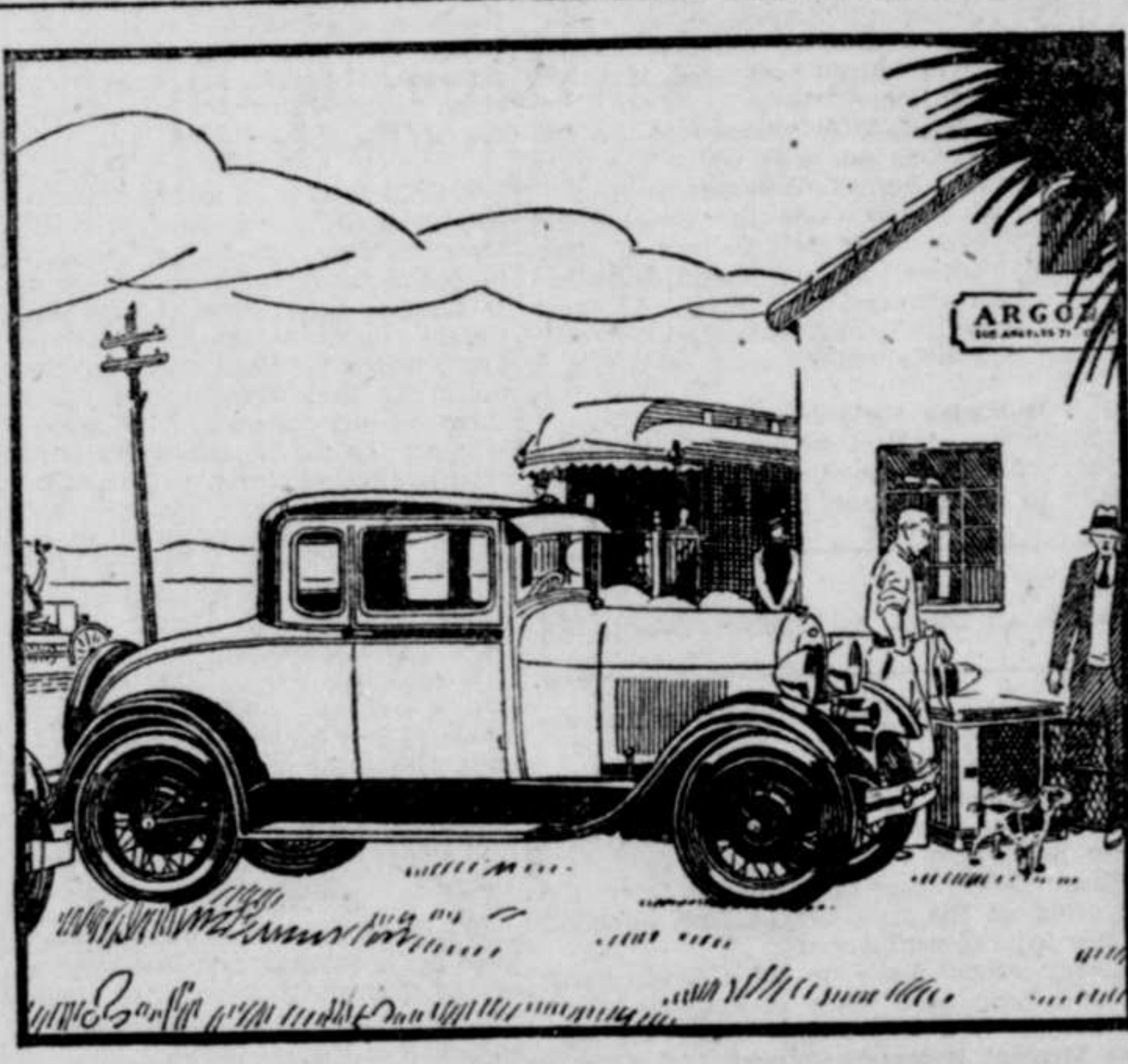

Bulk of sales at \$10.50 and \$11.50.

Stocker buyers paid \$11.00 to \$12. Hogs 15 cents to 20 cents lower. Rail top \$8.80 and truck top \$8.50; bulk 170 to 250 pound butchers at \$8.15 to \$8.80. Packing hogs at \$7.25 to \$7.75.

Sheep steady, five decks full shorn fat weathers at \$9.00, five decks of woolled fat and fleshy feeder lambs at \$14.50.

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK
KANSAS CITY, Jan. 14. (P)—(U. S. D. A.)—Although receipts were liberal a fairly active trade prevailed in the hog market with prices twenty to 25 cents lower than last week's close. The day's top at \$9.25 at St. Louis; total was 186,500 as compared with 147,254 last Monday and 195,774 a year ago.

Trade in fat lambs ruled very uneven; most of the markets reported declines of 25 to 50 cents as compared with last week's close. Fat lambs reached \$16.50 to shippers at the Chicago market. Limited offerings of matured classes held prices fully steady with desirable fat ewes selling from \$9.00 to \$10.00; receipts around the circuit totaled \$3,900 as against \$2,900 a week ago and \$5,185 a year ago.

A few strictly desirable light weight fed steers and yearlings held at steady levels but the bulk of the fed offerings met a slow trade with prices 25 cents or more lower. Best heavy steers stopped at \$15.25 while desirable yearlings made \$15.00 at Chicago. Fat she stock was uneven and prices steady to 25 cents lower. Prices on weaners declined 50 cents at most markets. Trade in stockers and feeders held fully steady. Choice yearlings brought \$12.34 and white faced stock calves scored \$13.85 at Kansas City. The 11-market total was 94,500 as compared with 61,227 last Monday and 79,740 a year ago.

CHICAGO GRAIN
CHICAGO, Jan. 14. (P)—Fluctuating chances of a bumper crop of corn in Argentina sent corn wheat and oats to new high price records for the season. Increased buying accompanied the upturn but enormous profit taking sales afterward wiped out much of the day's gains.

Closing quotations on corn were unsettled, 3-4 and 7-8 to 1-1-8 cents higher. Wheat finished 1-8 to 5-8 cents up, oats 1-8 to 3-8 cents advance and provisions varying from 5 cents decline to a rise of 2 cents.

NEW ORLEANS COTTON
NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 14. (P)—Cotton prices worked higher today under good trade and speculative buying coupled with short covering and advanced over \$1 a bale from Saturday's close. Realizing developed on the bulk and March contracts after trading up to 19.75 eased off and closed at 19.73 or 19.75 points net higher. The general market closed steady at net advances of 19 to 21 points.

Liverpool cables were better than due and first trade here showed gains of 5 to 12 points in sympathy. Traders practically ignored the moderately bearish consumption figures and after easing off 1 to 7 points from the opening prices worked upward under a good trade and speculative demand which developed a scarcity of contracts. Before noon January sold at 19.69, March 19.77 and May 19.79 or 21 to 23 points net up.

In the early afternoon recent buyers took profits and prices receded 12 to 12 points from the highs with March selling around 19.65 and May 19.75. Offerings were absorbed at a decline however and in late afternoon expectations of a bullish hold report due tomorrow afternoon brought out a renewal of trade buying.

There was some further profit taking in final trading and January closed at 19.69, March 19.73 and May 19.76.

NEW YORK COTTON
NEW YORK, Jan. 14. (P)—Prices were higher on the cotton market today on trade buying and covering or commission house demand which appeared to be influenced by relatively steady Liverpool cables and reiterated reports of a steadier Southern spot basis. The general market closed steady at net advances of 12 to 23 points.

The opening was steady at an advance of 6 to 17 points on covering and trade buying which appeared to be coupled with a moderate demand from brokers with Wall Street and western connections. There was enough realizing to cause some irregularity right after the call but the market showed increasing strength and activity late in the morning.

January sold up to 20.34 and May 20.43 with active months generally showing net advances of about 20 to 27 points on buying supposed to include some broadening of speculative interest. The demand tapered off at the advance, however, and there were partial reactions during the afternoon. Closing prices were about 4 to 8 points off from the best on the active months.

The report of the census bureau showed consumption of lint cotton in this country for December of 1928 against 619,884 reported for November and 538,786 for December 1927. The falling off as compared with November, however, was attributed to a shorter working month and some traders were inclined to consider that the maintenance of the average November rate per working day during December was more bullish than otherwise.

Private cables reported continued demand and London buying as well as trade calling in Liverpool and said that hedging was light. Local brokers reported some buying here for European account and there were reports of a better spot demand although it was said to be mostly against old commitments.

NEW YORK STOCKS
NEW YORK, Jan. 14. (P)—Prices again drifted in rather listless fashion on the stock market today, although a handful of issues were bid up vigorously on rumors of higher dividends, melon cutting, or split-ups.

Trading during the early hours of the session was impeded by the failure of wire systems west of Pittsburgh, but picked up somewhat as ticker service to western cities was restored later. Total sales, however, aggregated but 3,921,050 shares. The credit outlook remained unsettled and blocked the way for ambitious bull operations. Call money renewed at 7 per cent, in contrast all day, bearing out bankers' predictions that the marked January credit ease of recent years would not be repeated this year.

Time money held persistently at 7 1/2 per cent for all maturities. This is the highest for the 6-month maturity seen in mid-January in more than 20 years, save for 1920.

The day's business news was rather colorless. The department of commerce's report that American foreign trade in 1928 reached the highest level for any year save 1920 had been discounted market-wise several weeks ago. A further indication of the strength of the steel industry was the statement of the Otis Steel company, showing the highest earnings in its history in 1928.

Allied Chemical shot up 18 points to a new high price at 275 on rumors of a stock split-up. Wright Aero was also carried up 18 points to a record price at 294, to the accompaniment of unconfirmed reports that a large melon would be cut through the granting of valuable rights, but fell back to 291 at the close.

Motors improved somewhat on what appeared to be short covering. It is reported in brokerage circles that there has been considerable short selling in this group, particularly from the middle west, inspired by the prospect of keen competition this year, which may impair profits. American Sugar Refining sold up nearly 4 points to within a short distance of its 1928 high on reports that its 1928 earnings will run around \$10 a share. Rubbers were again strong, U. S. selling up about 3 points.

The commodity markets were mostly firm. Cotton gained from 60 cents to more than \$1 a bale. Foreign exchanges were featured by the firming up of sterling, the demand rate rising 1-16 of a cent to \$4.84 5-8.

Oil Notes

NEW YORK, Jan. 14. (P)—Absorption of small oil companies by larger concerns, a better export situation and efforts to regulate production, Wall Street traders in oil stocks assert point to better things for oil before the end of the year. They claim the situation is improving despite increased production.

California crude oil production averaged 723,500 barrels daily in the week ended January 12, an increase of 1,709 barrels daily over the preceding week.

WICHITA, Kas., Jan. 14. (P)—With a showing of gas from the top of the chert at 2,905 feet the Austin Oil corporation and the Tidal Oil company's No. 1 Neiman in the southeast of the northwest of 12-24-2 Harvey county is reported looming as another extension of the Wichita oil field. The test is four and three quarter miles northeast of Goodrich No. 1, 16-25-1 East Sedgewick county and is in direct line with the Empire Refining company's well in 12-19-2 east Marion county, which has 1,600 feet of oil in the hole.

TULSA, Okla., Jan. 14. (P)—Nearly 200 wells are going down in the Maud and Mission pools of the greater Seminole area where a new crop of tests is scheduled to be completed in February. Under an agreement of the operators, ratified by an order of the corporation commission. In the Maud pool 118 wells are under way while 76 wells are drilling in the Mission area. A survey in January 7 showed about 300 operations underway in the seven pools of the greater Seminole field. Salt water encroachment in the greater Seminole pools effects about 30 per cent of the wells, a recent survey revealed. More than 500 wells are making salt water. The percentage is about the same as shown in previous surveys.

DALLAS, Jan. 14. (P)—A show of oil has been encountered in eastern Fisher county in the Hucoy Gas Company's No. 1 Marberry. The well is two miles east of Sylvestor and 11 miles from the nearest producing well. The hole is being cleaned out and small pipe run in. Drillers assert they have barely touched the oil bearing lime and believe commercial production will be encountered when the pay stratum is further penetrated.

The Marland Oil company has added two more producers in Jones county with the bringing in of the No. 5 and No. 6 Mansons on the north side of the Noodle Creek pool. Both wells got pay around 2,510 of 3,000 barrels a day and No. 6 feet. No. 5 was swabbing at the rate was estimated good for 200 barrel per section 18, T. and P. Surveys. Both are in the northeast quarry 19.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 14. (P)—Underwriting \$400,000 of the treasury stock of the Crownwell-Franklin Oil Company by a syndicate of Oklahoma City interests headed by Leon C. Voorhes, vice president of the Tradesmen's National Bank, was announced today.

The company is engaged in development in Oklahoma and Cleveland counties, where it has approximately 17,000 acres of wildcat and proved acreage.

FLOYDADA IS SWINE CENTER

ONE HUNDRED CARS OF HOGS SHIPPED IN PAST SEASON

FLOYDADA, Jan. 14. — Floyd county probably produced and shipped to market one hundred carloads of swine during the year of 1928, figures for the market for Floydada would indicate. During the year 100 carloads were shipped from this point, and while figures from other shipping points of the county are not available, it is probable that an equal ratio of hogs were shipped from them.

According to the present outlook, the shipments of swine from this section in 1929 will see a considerable falling off from the figures of 1928. A very simple and logical reason is given for this by hog dealers who point to the fact that hogs are cheap while feed is high, and a large percentage of the swine growers are cutting down their production plans for the spring season at least, at the same time disposing directly on the market of the feed that would otherwise be held for their feeding. However dealers plan to have a year round market in this county for hogs, the Floydada market long having been one of the most consistent in the state.

Traces Of Early Man Found In Pit New Texas Line In South Oklahoma

The most conclusive proofs of human habitation found are arrowheads, pronounced by Harold J. Cook, curator of the Colorado Museum of Natural History, as undoubtedly manufactured by man. In addition, numerous stones suggesting the heads of war clubs, spears and hammers; pottery trays and vessels, and clay tablets suggesting crude attempts at writing, have been unearthed.

Many scientists have visited the pit and most of the specimens are now in the possession of the Colorado museum, the Smithsonian Institution in Washington and the University of Oklahoma Museum in Norman. Other finds, many of which have not been viewed by experts, are stored away by Holloman. Among the most interesting of these are two clay tablets. On one is carved an unmistakable fish; on the other the form of a man.

Two small objects closely resembling the hand and foot of an infant were found close together. The fingers and toes are well-defined.

Land Owners Win In Oil Lease Case

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14. M. Saunders of Pampa, Okla. The court said the case was improperly before it and must be dismissed without a decision on its merits.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14. (AP)—Formal announcement that he will retire from the cabinet on March 4 and will make his home in St. Paul has come from Secretary Kellogg to terminate intermittent speculations as to the course he intended to follow.

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, Jan. 14. (AP)—The new government today suppressed two Turkish language newspapers published at Uskub. At the same time it forbade the postal authorities to permit the Berliner Tageblatt and the Pesther Lloyd to enter the country because of criticisms published in them regarding the new regime.

FREDERICK, Okla., Jan. 12. (AP)—Granting that Asia was the cradle of man, southwest Oklahoma asserts it provided his first toddling ground. Out of a gravel pit near here have come what are declared by scientists to be unmistakable human artifacts. These have been found in strata declared by geologists to belong to the Pleistocene age, or between 500,000 and 750,000 years old.

If the antiquity of the evidence of human habitation were proved, it would alter the definitions of the Pleistocene era, which is given by Webster as that "immediately preceding man." The pit, although a veritable treasury of paleontological and geological specimens, is in daily commercial use. It is owned by H. A.

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
