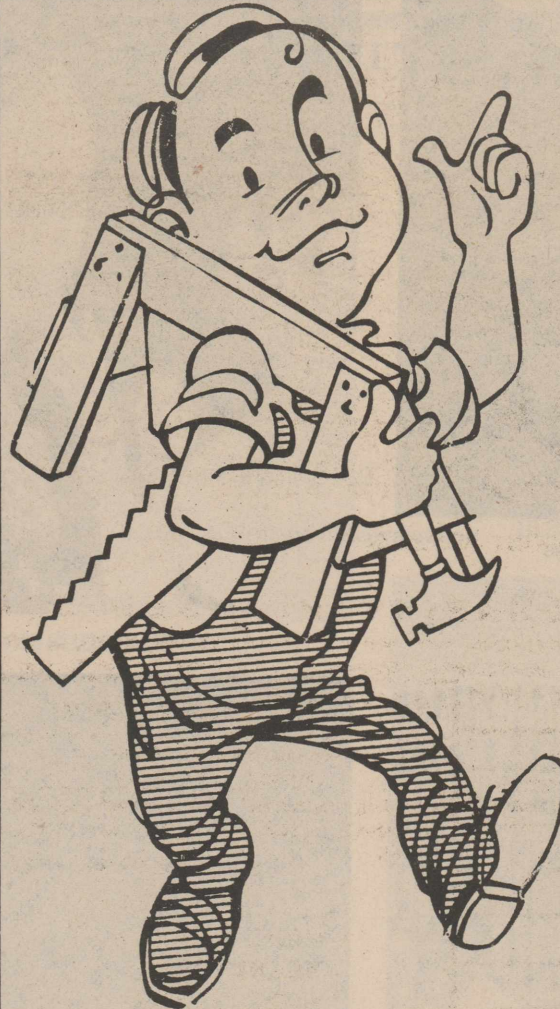
## Statement By GRANVILLE MARTIN Who is seeking the Office of SHERIFF of Castro County

It is my hope, in fairness and efficiency, to be your Sheriff of Castro County.

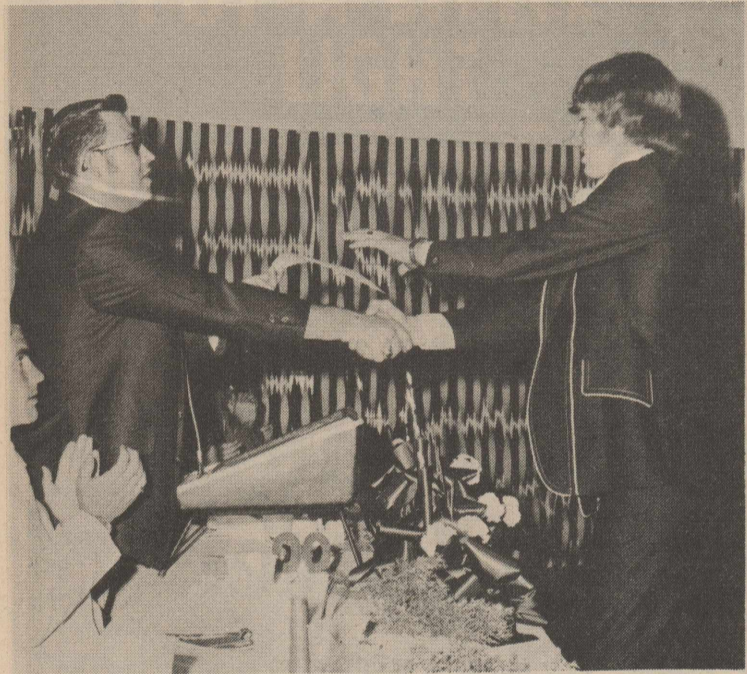

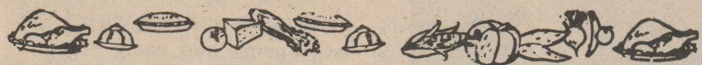

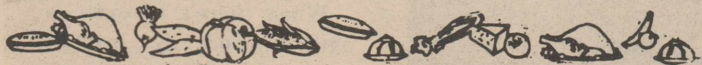

- 1 egg
- 2 T bacon grease
- 6 1/2 to 7 c flour

Dissolve yeast in 2 c warm water-pour into mixing bowl

and add all other ingredients. Let rise and make into rolls. Bake at 400 degrees.

### MAPLE COOKIES

- 1 c sugar
- 1 lb. margarine
- 4 c flour
- 2 T maple flavoring
- 1 c chopped nuts

Chill dough. Roll into walnut size balls and bake on greased cookie sheet at 325 degrees.

Roll in powdered sugar when cool enough to handle but still warm.

Makes 6 dozen. Dough will keep in refrigerator for 3 weeks or longer.

### DELUXE PANCAKES

- 1 egg
- 2 c buttermilk
- 1/4 c brown sugar
- 1/4 c oil
- 2 c sifted flour
- 4 t baking powder
- 1 t soda
- 1/2 t salt

Blend together egg, milk, brown sugar and oil. Stir in dry ingredients. This will keep in refrigerator for several days.
