

**LOAFING IN EUROPE**

ROME, ITALY--Traveling around-Europe lower class is sort of like an experienced mom told us about rearing kids.

Throw the first 2 away, she said, then enjoy the third.

If you chalk the first month of travel up to experience and laughs, then you begin to get the hang of it all in the second third and fourth.

You MUST laugh especially if you are like us, not bilingual. If you lose your sense of humor you become just another disgruntled and harassed tourist, the next of kin to the Ugly American.

Truthfully, the "ups" -- the wonderful times -- come much more often than the "downs". And, when you have time to reflect over a glass of wine, the day's "downs" are usually more interesting and laced with good memories than with bad.

Traveling with no reservations on the spur of the moment like we do, provides the unexpected all right. From the start in Luxembourg when Madge tired from a post mid-night flight from New York, was left on the steps of a big building guarding our pile of luggage while the man of the trip--awful doggone mousey with not a word of French or German in his vocabulary--went searching for a hotel room.

Upon return an hour later, Madge was near panic surrounded by a quiet eyeing group of stags keeping their respectful distance but appraising what their chances would be if the gal was camping there all night.

After 4 months and lots of travel experience, the Bells still are gun shy of European train travel, second class style. It has been recommended highly to us--by veteran globe-trotters. But our luck has been so-so.

Ours was the only coachette (a small 6 by 8 foot compartment for 6 persons which makes into 6 bare bunks for sleeping) filled to capacity on an overnight speed train from Paris to Madrid. No re-distribution of passengers either, no matter the plea.

So, all of us--5 adults and a month-old baby-- had a quick course in torture cramped among ourselves, the 3-tiered bunks, 7 large luggage bags, 2 large duffel bags, 2 heavy shoulder bags, 3 hand bags, portable buggy, bassinet, 3 bags for baby paraphernalia, dirty diaper containers (including the dirty diapers), 3 full length coats, 2 quart bottles of water and carry-on food.

Repeatedly in Italy during the holiday season we tugged, shoved and squeezed aboard overflowing trains, muscled one bag of luggage at a time down packed passageways searching for stand-up room. Thanks to a little Italian boy who pulled a lever and discovered a jump seat and then insisted it be ours.

Truthfully, it became a fairly comfortable afternoon--one of us atop our pile of luggage and the other on the jump seat with a splendid view of the countryside unbroken except for directing traffic in and out of the toilet doors we blocked.

Even better. Our strategic location brought us plenty of talking Italians who did their best to tell us about themselves. We had a lesson in Italian tile making from a factory owner (complete with colorful tile samples) plus a discussion with a young Hungarian studying engineering near Venice.

Of course, then as on other trips, it was share and share alike. You help them with their luggage and they help you.

This is one of the prizes of our type of travel--one of the "ups" because the friendliness of Europeans is never more evident than on trains or buses.

So many times gloomy situations turn bright. After a faulty pay phone--it kept tripping silent prematurely before we could say our Berlitz words for hotel accommodations--and capacity hotels almost panicked us at the Malaga, Spain, airport at 1 a.m. one night. The lone worker left in the building almost hidden off a middle corridor, took pity on us, broke her office regulations and called a half dozen hotels on her phone.

## Crackdown Underway On Narcotics

### Nine Arrests Made In January For Marijuana Possession

Three teenagers were arrested Tuesday and charged with possession of marijuana after marijuana was found in the car in which they were riding.

The car in which the three youths were riding was stopped by Police Chief Jesse Browning at Colorado High School on a traffic violation.

Charged with possession of marijuana were Clayton Watkins, John Ridge and Jackie Lydia. Watkins and Ridge were released from county jail on \$1,500 bond and Lydia was being held on \$1,500 bond.

Mitchell County law enforcement officers have made nine arrests in January for possession of marijuana as compared with only 17 arrests on that same charge for all of 1972. Five of the arrests have been

made by Colorado City police while four of the arrests were made by the sheriff's officers. Three arrested were juveniles. Two of those arrested Tuesday, Lydia and Watkins, have al-

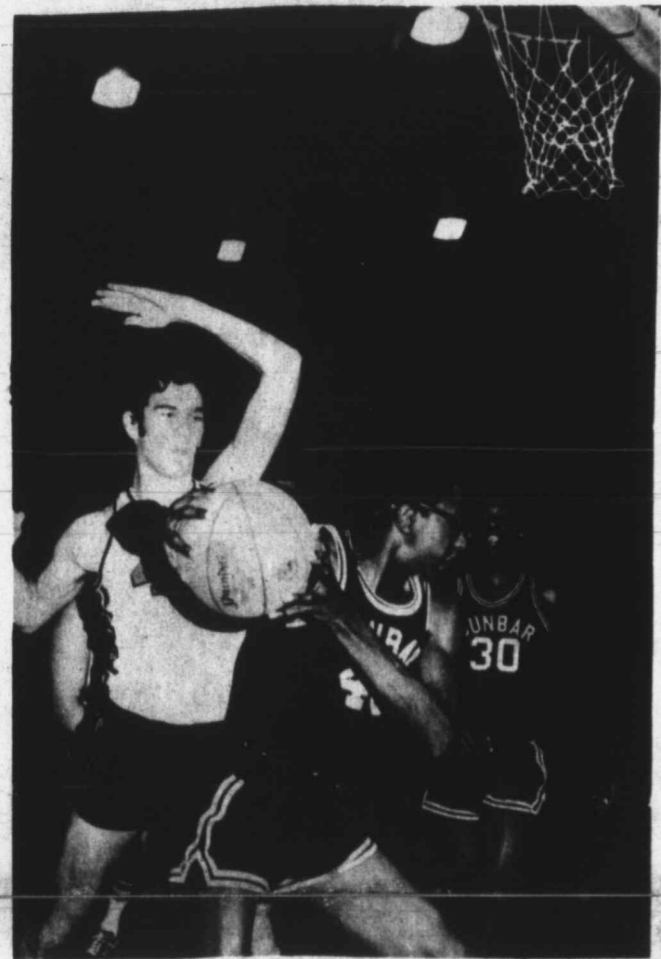
ready been graduated from Colorado High School. School officials have been making a concentrated effort to keep former students away from the high school. They have no

business hanging around the school, High School Principal Bill Everett has said.

Three others who have been arrested and charged with possession of marijuana in January are Juan Iberia, Juan Martinez Madrino and Moses Garcia Jr., all of whom are out of jail on \$1,500 bond.

Sheriff Bill McGuire said his office has intensified its efforts to crack down on the use and sale of marijuana.

McGuire said the sheriff's office now has the best trained group of deputies in the history. See ARRESTS Page 2

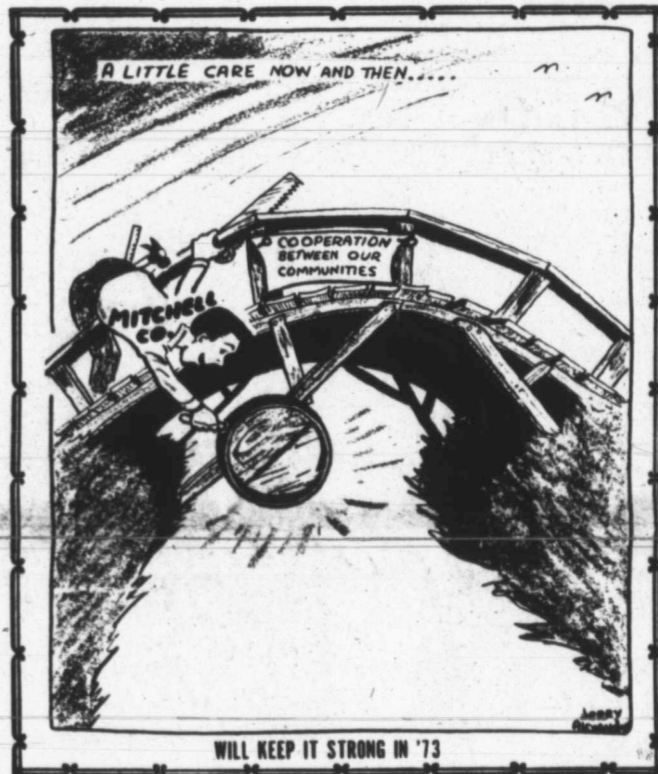
Following the program a reception will be given in the home-making dining room for parents of the journalism students, faculty, administrators, board members, and program participants.

to finally locate a room.

And, you know what, the next morning we awoke in one of Malaga's very best downtown hotels.

Down the Costa Del Sol a few miles what the book says should never have happened--did. Joe lost his passport. Like you would expect, phone calls to U.S. Consulate offices in Madrid and Seville brought the news that it was their afternoon off. Trips to 3 local police headquarters brought a little more than a shrug. But trustworthy employee in a little shop--we noticed this trait as exceptionally constant in Spain--hailed us 2 days later. She had found and kept it safe.

As you gather, we go on our own even to key sightseeing. Only 3 times in our entire trip have we paid for local tours. Yet, at more than one key attraction we have struck up conversations with officials who, in spontaneous gestures of hospitality, personally escorted us and provided a wealth of indebt

**information.**

We shared the last seat on an overcrowded bus between Granada and Malaga on a night trip made treacherous by rain and dense fog high in the Spanish mountains. Then, with amazing luck and no reservation obtained a palatial room in Spain's most sought-after Parador Nacional (one of our splurges in a converted castle) while others were being turned away.

Maybe it is the helpless look on our faces. Or the Texas accent, something every person in every country seems to identify immediately. But mostly because people are nice.

Like on the busy streets of Rome under the shadow of the Monumental Steps in the rush of just-before-Christmas shopping. We were in one of our usual arguments about which way the map said to go when a gent offered his assistance.

All he did was untangle our directions, jot down notes and instructions to his favorite restaurants, then devote the entire

**afternoon** hosting us at the high fashion knitwear house of which he is general manager.

His unprecedented hospitality included warm conversation of business, family and aspirations. Plus introduction to his chief designer and on-the-spot inspection of his entire line of women's and men's fashions that are marketed in the exclusive shops of New York, Chicago, Dallas and West Coast.

"Because I love my city and I want you to love it too," he told us in the perfect English he originally studied to be a teacher.

Just as warm and Roman, though on a different level, were the joyous laughs we shared Christmas night with the couple who operated a small working man's restaurant we frequented beside our little hotel a few steps off Rome's elegant Via Condotti shopping area.

They could not speak a word of English but broke into happy laughter when we noticed the

**new table cloths and napkins** they received that day as gifts.

And the scrapbook browsing and word-groping conversation with the older gent and his wife who once operated one of Rome's busiest restaurants, but now serve bargain meals in a little spot on another Rome side street.

Oh, yes, about that "downer" ---the coquette on the Paris to Madrid train that was piled high with people and baggage.

Straight from the station to our first choice hotel in Madrid--a little place on the top floors of an office building overlooking the Royal Palace, with extraordinary low rates and a ritual clientele who return year after year. Again, as others were turned away in the rain, somehow we got our room despite no reservation.

McGuire also pointed out that while nine persons have been arrested, the main offenders in the traffic of marijuana have not yet been caught but are being watched and their arrest is imminent.

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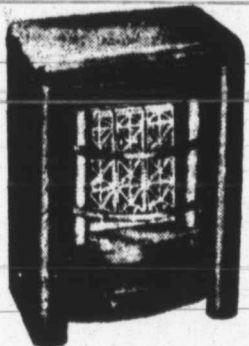
