Contract Awarded By School Board

Countdown Is Underway

By RAYMOND J. CROWLEY CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—Project Mercury experts today successfully completed the first section of a countdown pointed toward launching astronaut Malcolm Scott Carpenter into triple orbit at the earth Thursday. All systems in the Atlas rocket and Aurora 7 capsule were declared in "go" condition. The only cause for possible alarm was a haze of acrid smoke spreading from forest fires about 20 miles west of here and big swamp fires in the Everglades 200 miles south.

The experts planned to take another reading on the smoke situation before picking up the countdown around midnight. Carpenter, whose flight has been postponed four times for technical reasons, was reported at the top of his form and eager to go. The biggest problem at the moment appears to be smoke spreading from swamp fires in the Everglades, 200 miles to the south. But experts predict that westerly winds blowing off the Gulf of Mexico will keep the air over Cape Canaveral clear enough to permit the launch.

Guard Status Discussed In Session Here

An "informational team" of National Guard officers spoke to several interested persons at the National Guard Armory last night. The team was led by Col. Jim Moreland, Battle Group Commander from Abilene. Col. Moreland discussed the uncertain status of the Guard at the present time. The Department of Defense has proposed a cut of 30,000 men in the guard. Col. Moreland said that congressmen who had approved the budget for the Department had not intended that this cut take place.

May Involve 2nd Plane

UNIONVILLE, Mo. (AP)—A \$5-million Continental Airlines jet, possibly torn apart by a violent storm, fell to the ground in sections Tuesday night, killing all 45 persons aboard. Although violent storms raged across southern Iowa during the night, there was speculation today that a second plane may have been involved in the crash. Authorities at Kirksville reported that pieces of a plane which did not seem to be part of the jet had been found.

The plane then disappeared from the FAA surveillance radar at Kansas City. About that time, Mrs. Carl Jones, wife of the postmaster at Cincinnati, Iowa, saw a bright blue flash in the sky. Others saw it too. Residents of this farm county disagreed about the sound that followed. Some described it as a popping sound, others as a loud explosion.

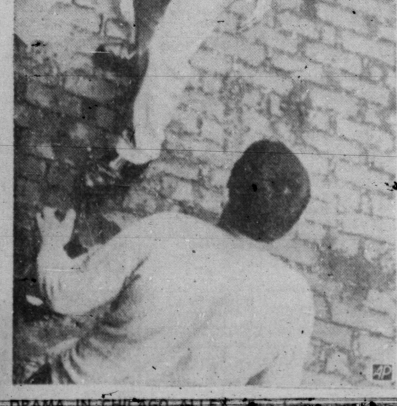
Feeble Front Backing Up

A feeble cool front edging eastward across Texas stalled during the night and then started drifting toward the northwest by early Wednesday. Near dawn the forward edge of the cooler air stretched from near Wichita Falls southward to Abilene and Del Rio. Skies were mostly clear over West Texas in the dry air behind the front. It was partly cloudy to cloudy on the opposite side of the state.

Forecast indicated little cooling would result from the weather front. The Weather Bureau saw a chance for isolated showers in the afternoon and evening in parts of Northeast, Southeast and South Central Texas. Early morning temperatures varied from 48 degrees at Dalhart to 76 at Brownsville. Corpus Christi, Galveston and Palacios.

Ordinary cars and trucks on the highway—about 90 per cent of the traffic—are controlled by police of the Communist East German regime. Official traffic of the American, British and French occupation forces in Berlin is still checked by the Soviet Union. This procedure is considered important by the Western Allies as a Soviet recognition of their right to be in Berlin. President Kennedy has proposed internationalization of the southern and northern parts of the city.

At least six dams were requested for the upper Colorado River Tuesday at a hearing conducted by Col. R. P. West, district Army engineer. The hearing concerned the Colorado and its tributaries—The Lane, San Saba, Pedernales and Colorado. Menard, San Saba and Johnson City entered flood control. Robert Lee and Lometa asked for lakes near their population. Runnels County pleaded for multi-purpose dam projects for water conservation and flood control.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Kennedy administration is considering emergency action, it was learned today, to admit some Chinese refugees from Hong Kong to the United States. Officials said the exact number of refugees to be admitted is not yet determined but the size of the potential emergency immigration quota may range from 1,000 to several thousand. President Kennedy has been meeting here, he said the United States must show compassion to all those who flee from Communist tyranny.

Nine H. E. Scholarships Offered

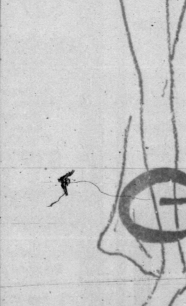
A breakdown of the nine scholarships and the sponsors is as follows:

Even for the New York Yankees, who have scored victories of all kinds in their long parade of success, a 12-inning one-hitter is a new way to win.

The Yankees staged that dramatic little gem Tuesday night, edging the Los Angeles Angels, 1-0, and recognizing a seldom-used way in the American League race.

Whitney Ford, the stylish left-hander, played the lead pitching role with seven hitless innings before he was forced to retire with a strained back muscle. Jim Coates kept it going until one was out in the ninth when Bob Rodgers singled for the lone Angel hit, then Bud Daley went two and Bob Peppone pitched the 12th.

Turned back by relievers Ryno Duren, Jack Spring and Tom Morgan through the 11th, the Yankees finally broke it open in the 12th. The reserve outfielder tripled with one out and after intentional walks to Maris and Hector Lopez, Morgan led a 1-0 rally. Lee Foulke, who had pitched the first two innings, wheeled and made a good peg home—but too late to head off Peppone.

The Twins packed their six runs over the second and third innings, then had to stand off the Senators down to the wire. Minnesota starter Georges Maranda, who doubled twice and drove in the deciding run, had to be bailed out by Lee Stange in the fifth and Dick Stigman was forced to quell another uprising in the seventh. Ray Moore strayed the final Washington rally in the eighth and was credited with the victory, his third in four decisions.

After surviving several jams, the youthful right-hander gave way to Hoyt Wilhelm in the seventh following a double by Bobba. The Yankees' lead was never unhooked a wild pitch and lever scored for Jerry Kindall's run-scoring double, but held the lead through the ninth.

Cleveland went without a homer for the first time in 10 games, managing only five hits.

Dave Wickersham was the winner over the Red Sox in his first big league start with able support from Kansas City rookie Diego Segui, Manny Jimenez, George Alusk and Jose Acebo. Wickersham, a relief specialist up to now, gave up five hits and no runs in eight innings, then he retired Boston in order in the ninth.

Hitting flash Jimenez swatted a two-run homer off Galen Cisco in the first, later added a single for a 2-for-2 day that increased his average to .383. Alusk had a triple and double, and Ascua a run-scoring double.

The Yanks got eight hits and 10 walks—even then intentional—off four Los Angeles pitchers but had to squeeze out their runs, both of which scored on sacrifice flies by Elston Howard. Rookie Joe Peppone had three of the New York hits and set up both runs while Roger Maris, the Yankees' walking man in the absence of the ailing Mickey Vento, drew five bases—four of them intentional—for a one-game major league record.

By winning the Yanks took over first by 13 percentage points over the Minnesota Twins, who outlasted Washington 6-5, Baltimore, with pitcher Bill Pappas and slugger Jim Gentile applying the power, beat Cleveland 4-1 and dropped the Indians from first to third, 4 game off the pace. Kansas City pinned the eighth straight loss on Boston, 5-1 in the only other AL game scheduled.

In the National League, Los Angeles clipped San Francisco's first-place Giants for the second night in a row, 5-1. St. Louis beat Philadelphia 6-2; Cincinnati got by Milwaukee in 11 innings, 3-2; Chicago downed Pittsburgh 3-1; and Houston shaded New York 3-2.

The Angels jumped ahead of Ford and the Yankees in the first when Abbie Pearson walked, stole second, took third on a ground out and scored on Steve Bilko's fly. 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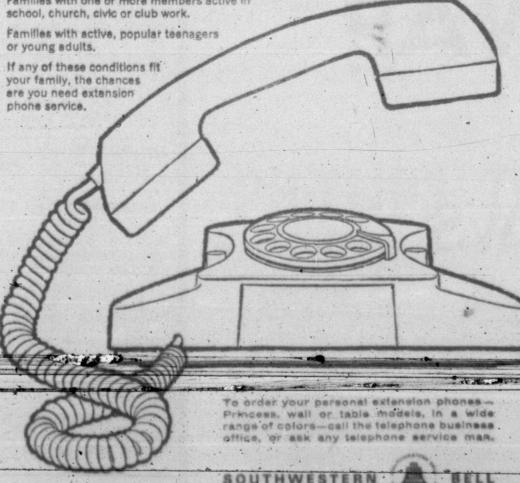

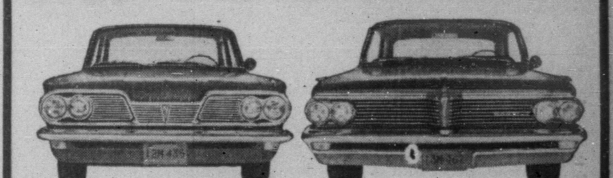

H. Stickney Is Executed

HUNTSVILLE (AP)—Howard Stickney, who had won 15 stays of execution, finally died in the state's electric chair early today even as his lawyer argued with prison officials in an effort to delay his death.

It seemed for a time that Stickney had cheated death again, but a court order compelling the state to execute the condemned man died within 10 minutes after entering the death chamber.

Heart Attack Clues Make Medical News

Clues that may detect likely candidates for future heart attacks and possible precautionary steps for avoiding such seizures figure in the medical news this week.

Dr. Harold Z. Pomeranz of Montreal, Canada, has unearthed evidence that early grayed hair, large wrists and a white ring at the edge of the cornea of the eye known as arcus senilis are traits that might identify individuals predisposed to coronary artery disease.

He found these traits appeared from two to three times more frequently in a group of 66 coronary patients than in a group of 55 normal controls.

Wrist 8 or more inches in circumference were defined as large to massive and measurements under 8 1/2 inches were classified as small.

The occurrence of moderate graying of the hair and premature graying before age 35 was found to be highly significant in the coronary group 46 years and older.

A comprehensive study of 156 marathon runners has convinced Dr. Joseph Wolfe, medical director of Valley Forge Heart Research Institute, that the best protection against hardening of the arteries is a lifetime of physical activity.

He found that blood cholesterol levels, a suspected cause of coronary artery disease, and actual signs of hardening of the arteries were much less in marathon runners than in the general population. The runners ranged from 17 to 63 years of age.

Various studies have shown that high blood cholesterol levels can be lowered by substituting unsaturated vegetable oils for a percentage of saturated animal fats present in the average American diet.

But if people react like chickens merely changing the habit of fidget meals to a pattern of daylong nibbling would drive the cholesterol levels still lower.

Studies reported by the National Heart Institute show that chickens fed twice a day developed hardening of the arteries seven times as severe as in chickens given access to the same kind of food 24 hours a day. The nibblers also had much lower blood cholesterol levels than the twice-a-day eaters.

Prof Blames Politics For Loss Of Job

AUSTIN (AP)—Regents of Texas state teachers colleges have affirmed a year-old decision not to rehire a college professor who contended he lost his job because of political views.

The board decided last year not to offer a contract in 1962-63 to Dr. Rupert Koeninger, head of the sociology department at Sam Houston State Teachers College since 1947.

Koeninger appeared before the board Tuesday to ask that he be reinstated.

The board refused to tell Koeninger why he had been fired.

A report by a committee for the Texas Association of College Teachers was presented at the hearing. It said pressures operating to fire Koeninger "stem from the John Birch Society in Huntsville and from Mr. C. S. Ramsey's unhappiness over some of Dr. Koeninger's political activities."

Ramsey, brother of former Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey, is chairman of the board. He refused to discuss the case after the hearing.

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Replacement Jets Arrive In Manila

MANILA, Philippines (AP)—Thirty-four U.S. Air Force jet fighters and transport planes arrived today at Clark Air Force Base from the United States to replace planes sent to Thailand.

First to arrive was a flight of six F-105 Super Sabre fighters, the 47th Tactical Fighter Squadron from New Mexico.

Twelve more F-105s of the same squadron were to follow, plus six C-130 turboprop Hercules transports.

ATHENS (AP)—Twenty-five Roman graves of the second century were unearthed in the center of Athens Tuesday.

The graves, in almost perfect condition, were discovered by workers digging a new building foundation off one of Athens' main streets. They contained skeletons of men and women, coins, spindle-shaped oil vases, combs and metal mirrors.

Wreckage Of Plane Found

EBERSBERG, Germany (AP)—The wreckage of a four-engine U.S. Navy Constellation that crashed Tuesday near its south Bavarian town, killing all 26 persons aboard, is being searched for a clue to the cause.

Hundreds of soldiers and military police sealed off the eight-mile path of wreckage as officials began their investigation.

The plane was regularly based at Rega, Spain, but was flying out of Frankfurt.

Military spokesmen in Europe said the plane was on a routine navigational training mission. The Norfolk, Va., headquarters of the U.S. Atlantic Fleet said it was on a secret mission but later a spokesman there said this report resulted from a misunderstanding.

An earlier report said there were 27 men aboard, but the Navy confirmed there were only 26. They included 22 naval personnel and four soldiers.

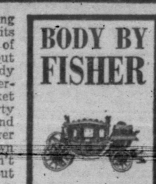

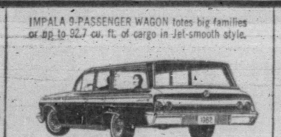

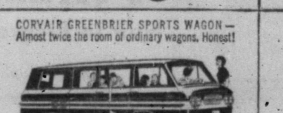
