Santa's Coming To Town

Colorado City Parade Set 4 p.m. Friday

Santa Claus will come to town at 4 p.m. Friday.

Santa will be aboard a fire truck leading the annual Mitchell County Christmas parade through the streets of downtown Colorado City.

The parade will signal the official start of the Christmas shopping season in Colorado City.

The parade is being sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce Merchants committee of which Willie Landau is chairman.

The merchants committee is also sponsoring the annual give-away of Christmas cash. This year the total to be given away is \$875, more than ever before.

Drawings for \$100, \$50 and \$25

are held each Saturday from now to Christmas at 4 p.m. Saturday on the City National Bank parking lot.

In order to be eligible for the drawing each person must get a ticket from a participating business during each week for the following Saturday's drawing. Tickets will not be held over from week to week.

No purchases are necessary and you do not have to be present to win. However, if your ticket is drawn you must claim the

prize money before 5 p.m. the following Wednesday or another drawing will be held the following Saturday for the amount of

Legislators "Oriented"

Martin Promises 'Open Door'

State Rep. - Elect Elmer Martin got first hand experience at learning how Texas government operates during his attendance at a "Legislative Orientation" held in Austin, November 13-15.

Martin was among a large

group of newly-elected State Representatives to hear from some of Texas' highest office-holders and heads of state agencies and commissions as well as to gain insight from veteran legislators with many years of experience around the Capitol.

The orientation is designed to acquaint new legislators with the workings and capabilities of the many state agencies and to familiarize them with the inner workings and procedures under which the House of Representatives operates.

Secretary of State Bob Bullock, Comptroller of Public Accounts Robert Calvert, Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong, House Speaker Rayford Price and Lt. Governor Ben Barnes gave briefings on state government.

Representatives of the Departments of Public Safety, Consumer Credit, Mental Health-Mental Retardation, Public Welfare, Texas Education Agency, Parks and Wildlife, Health and Higher Education explained the functions and duties of their offices.

State Insurance Board member Durwood Manford briefed the new members on auto and home insurance rate setting procedures and answered questions about no-fault and competition. See MARTIN Page 7A

Public Community Center Approved

Final plans have been approved for Colorado City's new public housing for the elderly and housing officials have announced that a community center will be built for those living in the new housing.

Construction is expected to start in late December or early January, said Dennis Walding, executive director of the Colorado City Housing Authority.

Officials from the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development were in Colorado City Tuesday to inspect sites for the housing for the elderly and to talk with local officials on requests for the community center.

Initially, the community center was included in the plans but in October local officials went to Dallas to talk with HUD officials and found that the community center had been scuttled from the plans.

Walding and Jake Merritt, head of the housing authority board, returned to Colorado City and set out to justify to the fed-

eral government that the community center is needed.

Their efforts were rewarded Tuesday when they were informed the community center will be built at Fifth and Oak Streets.

Site for the 26 housing units will be near the downtown area in order to make it convenient for occupants of the housing to be near stores.

The bid that has been approved for the project was for a turnkey job costing \$444,500. That cost includes every expense from the architect's drawing board to the completed

apartments. More than \$500,000 has been allocated for the project by the federal government.

The housing will be constructed at East 5th and Elm; East 4th & Vine; East 7th and Elm; East 6th & Oak; East 6th and Walnut and East 5th & Oak.

Floor plans for the new apartments includes one and two-bedrooms. Four of the units are listed with no bedrooms simply because these are ef-

iciency type apartments with no door closure between the bedroom and living quarters.

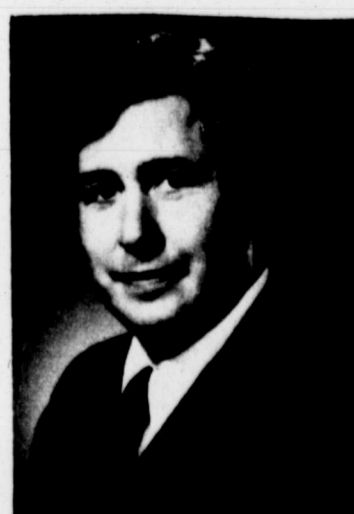

She quoted four Biblical verses that were about Thanksgiving - Leviticus 7:12, Nehemiah 11:17, Deuteronomy 16:13 and in the King James version of the Bible Deuteronomy 16:13.

"Although Thanksgiving did not become a regular yearly festival, our own Thanksgiving, which we observe every November, is a direct legacy of the historic feast with the Indians in 1621 in Plymouth.

"It was not until after the Revolution, when Congress adopted the Constitution (1789), that Thanksgiving was definitely established as a yearly day of rejoicing and festivity," she continued.

"Just before Congress adjourned, a man by the name of Boudinot moved that a day be recommended for the universal thanksgiving and President Washington appointed Nov. 26th as the National Thanksgiving Day.

"For a little while the holiday was observed faithfully, but somehow a break occurred and one by one the states began to observe the day of Thanksgiving at different times.

"In 1860 Lincoln appointed a national Thanksgiving day to be observed by everyone alike. He named the last Thursday in November as Thanksgiving Day and so did each president after him and governors of the state, until 1939 when President Franklin D. Roosevelt proclaimed the fourth Thursday in November as Thanksgiving Day.

"He did this to give retail stores a longer Christmas buying season," but some state governors continued to observe the last Thursday in November.

"In 1941 congress passed a law declaring from that time on the fourth Thursday in November would be the National holiday," Mrs. Keith concluded.

Parks and Wildlife Department officials point out that fluorescent orange is probably one of the most unnatural colors one could bring into a forest.

There is no mistaking an orange vest coming through the woods for anything but man, so there is less chance of getting

shot by someone who is a little too anxious to bring home a trophy.

Here are a few more safety tips from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department which should help hunters enjoy open seasons for years to come.

--Make sure of your target. Never shoot at something you can't see.

--Carry only unloaded firearms in a vehicle. Keep the actions open and the firearms in a carrying case.

--Take a little time when crossing fences. Lay your firearm flat on the ground on the other side of the fence and then crawl through.

Austin Scene

A total revision of the fi-
nance system for Texas public
schools will be reviewed by the
State Board of Education at a
special meeting December 9.

The plan, which would hand to
the state over a six-year period
the entire cost of the basic pub-
lic school program, was sub-
mitted by a board public school
finance committee November 11.

A three-judge federal court
last December in San Antonio
held unconstitutional the pre-
sent school finance formulas
which are based heavily on lo-
cal property taxes. The deci-
sion, now on appeal to the U.S.
Supreme Court, concluded the
system provides educational
advantages for pupils in rich
districts over those in poor
districts.

Under the five-member fi-
nance panel's recommenda-
tions, the state would as-
sume the "comprehensive foun-
dation school program" cost
completely from state taxes by
1978-1979. Local share of the
current foundation school pro-
gram is about 20 per cent.

Local taxes after 1978-1979
will be relied on only for
building and equipping schools
and for "enrichment" (expansi-
on beyond the state standard)
of individual school programs.

Increases already approved in
the foundation school program
will cost \$464 million during the
next six years. The committee-
proposed improvements are es-
timated to cost \$400 million
by 1978-1979.

"Enactment and implementa-
tion of the comprehensive foun-
dation school program will re-
quire some of the most far-
reaching public policy decisions
ever made in Texas," said State
Board of Education Chairman
Ben Howell of El Paso.

Committee members made
clear they stand back of the re-
commendations regardless of
the Supreme Court's ruling in
the finance case.

NEW TEXTBOOKS APPROV-
ED - New textbooks in 18 sub-
jects were approved by State
Board of Education for use in
classrooms next September.
