

Estes, Three Others Jailed On Federal Conspiracy Count

Half-Million Bond Is Set

PECOS (AP)—Federal authorities jailed Billie Sol Estes, a grain storage and fertilizer tycoon, and three other West Texans on conspiracy charges Thursday night.

Estes, 37, remained in custody here as his lawyer arranged to post his \$500,000 bond, set half an hour after his arrest.

The other men, arrested simultaneously in Amarillo and Lubbock, were held in lieu of \$250,000 bond each.

They are Harold E. Orr, president of Superior Manufacturing Co. in Amarillo; and Ruel W. Alexander, secretary of the firm, seized at Amarillo, and Coleman D. McSpadden, a director of the company, arrested at Lubbock.

Estes, black haired and ruddy faced, has said he became a multi-millionaire by investing money he received for a new lamb, a Christmas gift while he was 13. Some place the value of his holdings at \$100 million to \$150 million.

U.S. marshals and agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation made the arrests shortly after Atty. Gen. Will Wilson ordered a state probe of Estes' affairs. Wilson sent three assistants to check his business records. He said they will try to determine whether any violations of Texas securities laws have occurred.

Wilson said he also wanted to "find out just what all of these loan companies are doing in this thing." He referred to a Dallas conference held the past three days by representatives of 10 national and local lending companies.

A spokesman for the conference, Harold Bishop of Pacific Finance Co. in Los Angeles, said the firms held mortgages to secure \$22 million loaned farmers to buy storage tanks for anhydrous ammonia, a fertilizer.

Estes is known to have leased a large number of the tanks from farmers. A firm said to be the world's largest dealer in the fertilizer is among his enterprises.

There was no immediate comment from Bishop or others in the group on the arrests.

Estes, who is wont to quote the Bible often in conversation, flew back to Pecos in his private plane Tuesday after talking with the finance company executives in Dallas. Declining comment on the situation, he said:

"Legally or technically it would be foolish for me to say anything."

Complaints naming Estes and the others specifically allege a chattel mortgage known to be forged, altered or falsely made.

Bank Deposits Here Above '61 Figures

The Comptroller of Currency and the State Banking Department issued a call this morning to all banks in Texas to report their condition as of March 25.

The two Snyder banks will show total deposits of \$24,081,910-47 on that date. The figure is up two million dollars over the similar call in 1960.

Loans, with a total of \$10,071,330.86, are slightly down from the \$10,630,601.36 recorded in the first quarter call of 1961 and are nearly half a million higher than the \$9,586,164.57 reported in the first quarter of 1960.

Snyder National Bank reported deposits of \$15,721,620.10 and loans of \$7,407,265.91. This represents an increase of over one and one-half million in deposits and almost a million in loans over the 1961 totals.

West Texas State Bank reported deposits of \$8,350,090.37 and loans of \$2,664,264.95. This is an increase of about a third of a million in deposits and a small decrease in amount of loans outstanding compared to the first quarter call of last year.

Guido Takes Over As Argentina President

By ROBERT BERRELZE, BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP)—Jose Maria Guido formally assumed the office of president today under the watchful eye and guiding hand of Argentina's military leaders.

The oath-taking ceremony was the second for the former Senate president.

The military chiefs were not happy that he took the oath before the Supreme Court Thursday without informing them. For a time it appeared some officers might not recognize the military's own first choice for a constitutional successor to Arturo Frondizi, deposed Thursday and flown to a prison island.

The second ceremony was decided upon after Guido was reported to have agreed to a set of military demands including outlawing of Peronists, Communists and Castroites and placing all Argentina under federal control.

The president's office, already being used by the military to issue its communiqués, when Guido, starting solemnly through his hornrimmed glasses, went through the constitutional ceremony.

Shouts for Frondizi were heard from a few persons present at the ceremony in the pink-walled palace.

The act of succession was first signed by all ministers of Frondizi's last government also affixing their signatures. The military members of the Cabinet were the last to sign.

The act declared that, in view of the facts known by the public which have produced the vacancy of executive power, Guido had assumed the office.

The military signers were Gen. Juan Poggi of the army, who had terminated the bloodless coup which ended Frondizi's stormy rule; Brig. Carlos Antonio Alsogaray, chief of the air force; and Rear Adm. Agustín Peñas of the navy.

4 Moslems Slain In Terror Surge

ALGIERS (AP)—Four Moslems were slain and five wounded today in a new upsurge of terror by Egyptian Secret Army Organization gunmen.

The Secret Army Organization is known as the OAS.

The shootings followed a night of plastic bombings, in which six persons were injured and heavy property damage was caused.

Today's terrorism began with shooting of a Moslem. Then a car packed by a group of Moslem passers-by in the suburb of Maison Carrée and three were slain by gun fire. A few minutes later another carload of gunmen opened fire on a group of Moslem workers, wounding five, four seriously.

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REP. RENAL ROSSON

Rosson To Head House Study Panel

Speaker James A. Turman today announced the appointment of Rep. Renal E. Rosson of Snyder as Chairman of the Interim Committee to Make a Comprehensive Study of Divorce.

The committee are: Rep. David Crews of Conroe, Henry Fletcher of Lufkin, Paul Haring of Goliad, and Charles Whitfield of Houston.

Rep. Rosson is serving his second term in the House. He is a member of the Standing Committee on Antitrust, Agriculture, Constitutional Amendments, Criminal Jurisprudence, and Military and Veterans Affairs.

Authorized by resolution of the 57th Legislature, this committee will examine the laws of the State relating to divorce and study the resulting problems whose impact on the need for governmental services is increasingly important.

His findings and recommendations will be reported by the committee to the regular session of the 58th Legislature.

Speaker Turman said, "With Texas having the fifth highest divorce rate in the nation, we Texans must recognize and face the fact that we have a tremendous responsibility to do all we can to promote the public welfare by preserving and protecting family life and the institution of marriage."

We must seek all possible methods to encourage reconciliation of spouses and the amicable settlement of domestic and family controversies.

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Tax Revision Victory Hailed

WASHINGTON (AP)— Administration leaders in Congress hailed today President Kennedy's tax revision bill victory in the House and turned their attention to a Senate fight expected to be just as hot.

An almost straight party-line vote saved the bill in the House Thursday. Passage by a vote of 219 to 190 came a few hours after the President as his news conference made a personal plea for the measure. The House action was considered his biggest triumph in the 1962 session.

Rep. Hale Boggs of Louisiana, the Democratic whip, said this was the pattern for the Kennedy program this year. "I see some Democratic votes."

On final passage, 219 Democrats

and a lone Republican, Rep. Richard Poff of Virginia, supported the bill, while 152 Republicans and 34 Democrats voted against it.

# Soviets Kept Under Tight Surveillance

FRANKFURT, Germany (AP)—The U.S. Army kept the Soviet military mission in Frankfurt under tight surveillance today. The Army announced Thursday that personnel of the Soviet liaison mission on the Army headquarters could leave their compound only under U.S. escort. Gen. Bruce C. Clarke, commander of the U.S. Army in Europe, ordered the restriction after receiving "an unacceptable reply from Marshal Ivan S. Konev to an American protest against shooting a U.S. military mission in East Germany by East German police." Konev is commander of Soviet forces in East Germany. A spokesman for the U.S. Army headquarters in Heidelberg emphatically denied reports in West German newspapers that the Soviet mission is under house arrest. "The Russians, the spokesman said, are free to move out of the compound under American escort. He said this applies to all mission members, including dependent women and children. The Soviets tested the new measure Thursday night. A mission car carrying a colonel and driver left the compound at 5:15 p.m. An American military police cruiser followed it. The Soviet car had not returned by noon today. "We were not alerted immediately where the car went. Police stationed at the mission's main gate said it was the only Soviet car that had left so far."

## Steel Talks Near Climax

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Key committees of the United Steelworkers Union will join union President David J. McDonald here Saturday, and observers say there is a good chance that a contract proposal will be placed before the union's Wage Policy Committee. Union-law makes contract proposals subject to ratification by that committee. Top steel negotiators met for seven hours Thursday, went on to "hot" negotiations and a night session. Reports circulated that a steel settlement is near. After Thursday's day session, chief industry negotiator B. Conrad Cooper told a news conference that "major steel decisions on some of the remaining difficult problems. However, a considerable amount of work still confronts us." **Attacks On UNICEF Helping Boost Its Sources Of Funds**

Halfway round the world in Pakistan, the newspaper women of that Moslem land asked Mrs. John F. Kennedy about her sturdy support of UNICEF and its annual Christmas card sale vis-a-vis the D.A.R. war on both UNICEF and its cards.

The Daughters' wild potshots at an organization that has done yeoman work in maternal and child care in Pakistan may be difficult for Moslem women to understand. But UNICEF should be so lucky as to be the target for DAR fulminations again at the Christmas season of 1962?

The publicity attending the Daughters' angry isolationist attack on UNICEF as a vile Communist plot to shoot Santa Claus together with Mrs. Kennedy's quiet support of the Christmas card sale is largely credited with earning the organization an additional \$250,000 in 1961. That sum is sufficient to pay for the equipment, plus a year's supplementary drugs, for 2,000 small welfare centers for maternal and child welfare in poor and needy lands.

Americans bought 39 per cent more UNICEF Christmas cards in 1961 than in 1960. In all, 21,500,000 UNICEF Christmas cards were purchased in 105 countries last season, or 4,000,000 more than were bought in 1960. American purchases accounted for half that four million increase.

Since half the increased sales

of UNICEF Christmas cards in '61 was chalked up in the U.S.A., it would seem that every knock by the D.A.R., the John Birchers and other tracers of the ultra right is a boost for a worthy cause. The attacks mounted by these groups on UNICEF is only part of their rabid, long-range war on the United Nations or anything that smacks of international cooperation.

It is difficult not to come to the conclusion that the ultras' attacks on UNICEF have been based on deliberate misrepresentation. Their charge that UNICEF is of no service to children and mothers in any country ignores the fact that during the first 15 years of the organization's life (1947-1962), more than 134 million children and young adults have been vaccinated against tuberculosis.

In that initial 15-year period, UNICEF has provided the pills that have cured 21 million victims of yaws, a dread tropical skin disease. It has provided the medicines and treatment for over 11 million children and young persons threatened with blindness from trachoma and related eye ailments.

UNICEF has treated and cared for one million cases of leprosy. In 1961 the organization protected 66 million potential victims from malaria, and more than five million children benefited from supplementary feeding programs. Other millions were cared for at

maternal and child health centers which UNICEF helped equip, and were fed from dairies and milk-drying plants set up by the organization.

UNICEF earns a big pat on the back when it reports that in '61 it aided "millions of needy mothers and children in 107 countries without discrimination because of race, creed, national status or political belief in Africa, Asia, Europe, the Middle East and Latin America."

The ultras' charge that Communist countries receive 25 times more UNICEF aid than they contribute is wholly false. In 1961 UNICEF made total allocations of \$39,417,000 of which \$327,400 went to Poland and Yugoslavia (both of which receive aid from the U.S. government). In that same year 10 Communist countries contributed to UNICEF.

But facts are not going to interfere with the ultras' attack on UNICEF or the United Nations. Neither will the endorsement of UNICEF by President Kennedy, former President Eisenhower, would-be President Richard M. Nixon or Pope John XXIII.

The ultras are not interested in truth, but in destruction—the destruction of ideas, facts, figures or persons that dare to disagree with the ultras' phantasies. However, the generous and additional support of the UNICEF Christmas card program in '61 by the American public indicates that that public hasn't yet been bulldozed by extremists of the right.

NEW YORK (AP)—For 30 years, whenever he opened the notes in the office suggestion box, Amos Toggie, president of the glass Acme Tiddlywinks Co., has always found one that read: "Put gin in the water cooler."

For 29 years, whenever Amos Toggie told employe meetings of future benefits he planned in office working conditions, some wisecracker had always stirred the staff to laughter by remarking: "Yeah, that'll happen—the day you put gin in the office water cooler."

Well, one fine spring morning Amos Toggie, an elfin capitalist if ever there was one, decided to do just that. He did put gin in the water cooler.

Not just a little bit of gin. He filled the old-fashioned five-gallon container right to the brim.

The first employe who took a sip from the container couldn't believe the testimony of his taste. He whispered to a fellow employe who said, "You must be crazy."

Both took a couple more sample sips then shouted aloud: "Wheel, it really is gin!"

The startled staff immediately formed a long thirsty line before the first office gin cooler in American industrial history.

By 10:30 the rollicking employes were grouped, arms around each other's shoulders, outside the president's office singing, "For he's a jolly good fellow!" Mr. Toggie emerged, gave them a satanic grin, and went back in.

Most of the staff snored at their desks that afternoon. The next morning a telegram arrived from one in Chicago saying, "How did I get here? Please send money."

For three days life at the office was one long pleasant binge. Some of the boys even brought in vermouth and ice cubes so they could make Martinis.

Then dissent set in. Some of the imbibers decided they didn't like the brand of gin. Others said they liked bourbon or rye better than gin, and why couldn't the office put in a bourbon or rye cooler?

Twelve wives phoned in and complained they were tired of having their husbands reel home intoxicated. They threatened to picket the office.

In the middle of the second week Ronnie Blast, the union leader, told Mr. Toggie: "All right, boss, fun's fun—but when are you going to get rid of the gin cooler?"

"When you meet my terms," replied Mr. Toggie crisply.

Well, the employes, their lips cracking slowly from thirst, held out for still another week. Then, under pressure from their wives, they caved in.

ANSWER: This was a band of raiders led by Ethan Allen. In pre-Revolutionary times Vermont was a territory held by New Hampshire. New York challenged New Hampshire's claim. The Green Mountain Boys were organized to terrorize New York settlers and to induce New York to give up its claim on the territory. Before the issue was settled, the Revolutionary War began and the Green Mountain Boys turned to fighting the British. The most famous of their exploits during the war was the capture of Fort Ticonderoga. Allen and his men advanced upon the fort during the night when all were sleeping and demanded the fort's surrender in the name of the Great Jehovah and the Continental Congress. The unexpectedness of the attack gave it success. The Green Mountain Boys and their leader were later taken prisoner near Montreal, Canada for a short time. After the war, the problem of the ownership of Vermont was solved by making Vermont a sovereign state.
