Inadequate Ins. Rates Harmful to Drivers

Austin, July 29 -- The Texas State Board of Insurance was warned today by the Texas Association of insurance Agents that inadequate automobile rates, if continued, could deprive automobile motorists of necessary insurance protection. Speaking at a hearing before the State Board of Insurance, Game-well D. Gantt, Houston, representing the statewide organization of independent insurance agents said: "We know from experience that if rates are not adequate . . . the insurance buying public suffers, as the insurance companies will be forced to put into effect more and more restrictions on the type individuals they will write. In other words without adequate rates the public may not be able to buy automobile insurance"

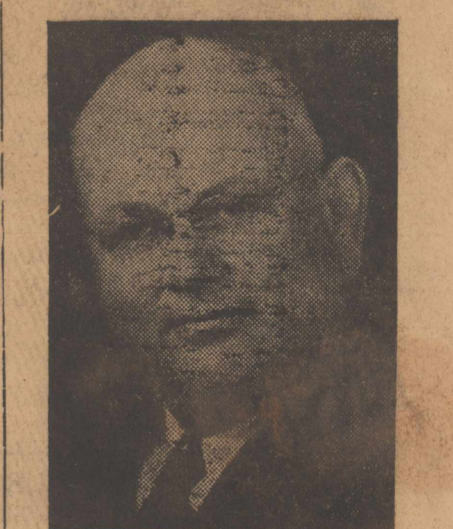

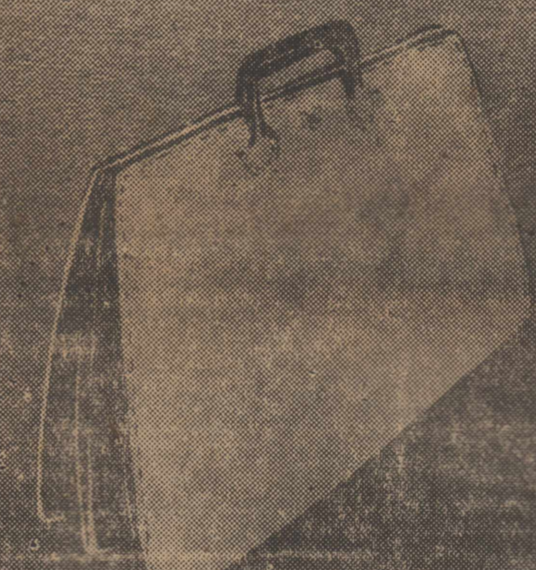

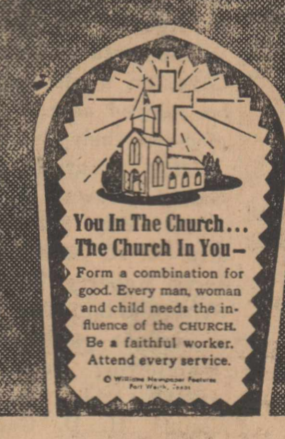

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 27 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section 48b, so as to create as an agency of the State of Texas the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, vesting the general administration and responsibility of the proper operation of said system in a state board of trustees to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, authorizing said Board to invest assets of said system in various obligations and subjects of investment, subject to certain restrictions stated therein and such other restrictions as may hereafter be provided by law; providing that such Amendment shall be self-enacting and shall not alter, amend or repeal Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas or any legislation passed pursuant thereto except insofar as such legislation may limit or restrict the provisions of this Amendment; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding Section 48b hereto which shall read as follows: "Section 48b. There is hereby created as an agency of the State of Texas the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, the rights of membership in which, the retirement privileges and benefits thereunder, and the management and operations of which shall be governed by the provisions herein contained and by present or hereafter enacted Acts of the Legislature not inconsistent herewith. The general

administration and responsibility of said system are hereby vested in a State Board of Trustees, to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, which Board shall be constituted and shall serve as may now or hereafter be provided by the Legislature. Said Board shall exercise such powers as are herein provided together with such other powers and duties not inconsistent herewith as may be prescribed by the Legislature. All moneys from whatever source coming into the Fund to provide retirement, disability, and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the state and all other securities, moneys, and assets of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas shall be administered by said Board and said Board shall be the trustees thereof. The Treasurer of the State of Texas shall be custodian of said moneys and securities. Said Board is hereby authorized and empowered to acquire, hold, manage, purchase, sell, assign, trade, transfer, and dispose of any securities, evidences of debt, and other investments in which said securities, moneys, and assets have been or may hereafter be invested by said Board. Said Board is hereby authorized and empowered to invest and reinvest any of said moneys, securities, and assets, as well as the proceeds of any of such investments, in bonds, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued, or assumed or guaranteed in whole or in part, by the United States or any agency of the United States, or by the State of Texas, or by any county, city, school district, municipal corporation, or other political subdivision of the State of Texas, both general and special obligations; or in home office facilities to be used in administering the Teacher Retirement System including land,

equipment, and office building; or in such corporation bonds, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness, and corporation stocks, including common and preferred stocks, of any corporation created or existing under the laws of the United States or of any of the states of the United States, as said Board may deem to be proper investments; provided that in making each and all of such investments said Board shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as probable safety of their capital; and further provided, that a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may now or hereafter be provided by law. Unless investments authorized herein are hereafter further restricted by an Act of the Legislature, no more than one per cent (1%) of the book value of the total assets of the Teacher Retirement System shall be invested in the stock of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid cash dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors; and provided further, that so long as less than \$500,000,000 of said Fund is invested in the government and municipal securities enumerated above, not more than thirty-three and one-third per cent (33 1/3%) of the Fund shall be invested at any given time in common stocks. This Amendment shall be self-enacting and shall become effective immediately upon its adoption without any

enabling legislation. This Section shall not alter, amend or repeal the first paragraph of Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas as amended November 6, 1956, or any legislation passed pursuant thereto. This Section shall not alter, amend or repeal the second paragraph of Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas as amended November 6, 1956, or any legislation passed pursuant thereto, except insofar as the provisions of the second paragraph of Section 48a and any legislation passed pursuant thereto, may limit or restrict the provisions hereof and only to the extent of such limitation or restriction."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 2, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 48b relating to the Teacher Retirement Fund and the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investment of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Teacher Retirement System."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment amending Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 48b relating to the Teacher Retirement Fund and the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investment of moneys and other assets of the Fund and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Teacher Retirement System."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Article VII, Section 17, providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping of buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning; providing for allocation of funds therefor; authorizing the issuance of bonds or notes and the pledging of allotted funds for the payment of same; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 17 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 17. In lieu of the state ad valorem tax on property of Seven Cents (7¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 51 of Article III, as amended, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Two Cents (2¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the continuing payment of Confederate pensions as provided under Section 51, Article III, and for the establishment and continued maintenance of the State Building Fund as provided in Section 51b, Article III. Also, there is hereby levied in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Ten Cents (10¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping buildings or other permanent improvements at the designated institutions of higher learning provided that none of the proceeds of this tax shall be used for auxiliary enterprises; and the governing board of each such institution of higher learning is fully authorized to pledge all or any part of said funds allotted to such institution as

hereinafter provided, to secure bonds or notes issued for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping such buildings or other permanent improvements at said respective institutions. Such bonds or notes shall be issued in such amounts as may be determined by the governing boards of said respective institutions, shall bear interest not to exceed four per cent (4%) per annum and shall mature serially or otherwise in not more than ten (10) years; provided further, that the state tax on property as heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 9 of Article VIII, as amended, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty Cents (30¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation. All bonds shall be examined and approved by the Attorney General of the State of Texas, and when so approved shall be incontestable; and all approved bonds shall be registered in the office of the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas. Said bonds shall be sold only through competitive bids and shall never be sold for less than their par value and accrued interest.

"The following state institutions then in existence shall be eligible to receive funds raised from said Ten Cent (10¢) tax levy for the twelve-year period beginning January 1, 1966, and for the succeeding ten-year period:

- Arlington State College at Arlington
- Texas Technological College at Lubbock
- North Texas State University at Denton
- Lamar State College of Technology at Beaumont
- Texas College of Arts and Industries at Kingsville
- Texas Woman's University at Denton
- Texas Southern University at Houston
- Midwestern University at Wichita Falls
- University of Houston at Houston
- Pan American College at Edinburg
- East Texas State College at Commerce
- Sam Houston State Teachers College at Huntsville
- Southwest Texas State College at San Marcos
- West Texas State University at Canyon

Stephen F. Austin State College at Nacogdoches
Sul Ross State College at Alpine
Angelo State College at San Angelo

"Eighty-five per cent (85%) of such funds shall be allocated by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas on June 1, 1966, and fifteen per cent (15%) of such funds shall be allocated by said Comptroller on June 1, 1972, based on the following determinations:

"(1) Ninety per cent (90%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966, shall be allocated to state institutions based on projected enrollment increases published by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System for fall 1966 to fall 1978.

"(2) Ten per cent (10%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966 shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on determinations used in the June 1, 1966, allocations except that the allocations of fifty per cent (50%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on projected enrollment increases for fall 1972 to fall 1978, and fifty per cent (50%) of such funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on the need for additional square feet of educational and general facilities.

"Not later than June first of the beginning year of each succeeding ten-year period the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas shall reallocate eighty-five per cent (85%) of the funds to be derived from said Ten Cent (10¢) ad valorem tax for said ten-year period and not later than June first of the sixth year of each succeeding ten-year period said Comptroller shall reallocate fifteen per cent (15%) of such funds to the eligible state institutions then in existence based on determinations for the said ten-year period that are similar to the determinations used in allocating funds during the twelve-year period beginning January 1, 1966, except that enrollment projections for succeeding ten-year periods will be from the fall semester of the first year to the fall

semester of the tenth year. All such designated institutions of higher learning shall not thereafter receive any general revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements for which said Ten Cent (10¢) ad valorem tax is herein provided, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the uninsured loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of any General Revenue Funds. The State Comptroller of Public Accounts shall draw all necessary and proper warrants upon the State Treasury in order to carry out the purpose of this Amendment, and the State Treasurer shall pay warrants so issued out of the special fund hereby created for said purpose. This Amendment shall be self-enacting. It shall become operative or effective upon its adoption so as to supersede and repeal the former provisions of this Section; provided further, that nothing herein shall be construed as impairing the obligation incurred by any outstanding notes or bonds heretofore issued by any state institution of higher learning under this Section prior to the adoption of this Amendment but such notes or bonds shall be paid, both as to principal and interest, from the fund as allocated to any such institution.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 17 thereof, providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping of buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning."

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 17 thereof, providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping of buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for the exemption from local ad valorem taxes of the property of certain charitable organizations, provided such organizations meet certain conditions and requirements and expend at least One and One-half Million Dollars (\$1,500,000.00) annually on free medical and hospital care for the indigent within the State of Texas; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation and publication.

WHEREAS, The Legislature finds and declares that there is a need for the operation of hospitals by private charitable enterprises which will furnish free medical and/or hospital care for the indigent in Texas; and

WHEREAS, The operation of such hospitals and the furnishing of such free medical care and hospitalization for the indigent in Texas will add to the welfare and well-being of the State of Texas and its residents and citizens; and

WHEREAS, The need for the operation of such hospitals and the furnishing of such free medical care and hospitalization for the indigent is especially great in counties having a population in excess of one million two hundred forty thousand (1,240,000); and

WHEREAS, It is found and declared to be the Public Policy of the State to foster and encourage such operation of hospitals as aforesaid; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. The Constitution of the State of Texas is amended hereby, by the addition of a new Section to Article VIII thereof, to be numbered Section 2-A, and reading as follows:

"2-A. The properties of any charitable trust or organization, if such trust or organization is dedicated to, and operates a hospital furnishing free hospital and/or medical care for the indigent within the State of Texas, shall be exempt from all ad valorem taxes levied by any taxing entity, except by the State of Texas itself, provided:

"(1) such trust or organization has expended for free hospital and/or medical care within the State of Texas, during the calendar year next preceding, a sum of not less than

One and One-half Million Dollars (\$1,500,000.00); and, further provided,

"(2) after such exemption has been in force and effect for one full calendar year, the amount expended for free hospital and/or medical care, within the State of Texas, amounts to not less than One Million Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,800,000.00) for the calendar year next preceding; and, further provided,

"(3) such trust or organization is exempt from United States income taxes;

"(4) such charitable trust or organization maintains its domicile and operates a hospital or hospitals in a county having a population of more than one million two hundred forty thousand (1,240,000) according to the last preceding Federal Census, and such exemption shall apply only to the properties of such charitable trust or organization located within the county of its domicile.

"Proof of compliance with all applicable conditions stated above, shall constitute a complete defense to any suit for ad valorem taxes levied or attempted to be levied by any taxing entity other than the State of Texas itself.

"This Amendment shall be self-enacting."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

FOR the Amendment exempting the property of certain charitable organizations from local ad valorem taxes provided any such organization meets certain conditions, and expends at least One and One-half Million Dollars (\$1,500,000.00) annually for free hospital and medical care for the indigent within the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

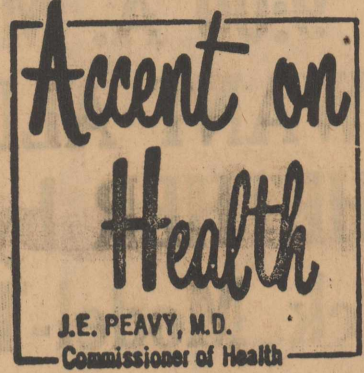

You can't sleep? You have lots of company.

There are millions of 'insomniacs' in America. Even though they are tired and weary, they toss and turn for hours—or wake up four or five times during the night. And they face the early morning with all the pep and enthusiasm of a wet dish cloth.

Almost everyone has a pet remedy for sleeplessness. If you have one that works—use it.

Charles Dickens could sleep only in a bed that faced north. A physician once said he found counting sheep did no good but he had success starting at 1,000 and counting backward.

If you are one of those who find themselves staring dejectedly at the ceiling at three in the morning, maybe some of these suggestions will help. Make yourself as comfortable as possible before you retire. Make sure you've the right temperature in your bedroom.

Use a comfortable mattress, not too hard or too soft; good bed-springs that won't hop coils into the ribs and won't sag in the middle; and fluffy, light blankets rather than heavy ones.

Take a brief, relaxing walk before turning in, or do some mild exercising to help tire you enough to relax.

Again, there are all sorts of theories. Some people say coffee keeps them awake. Some prefer warm milk or a light snack. Many people read themselves to sleep, using everything from comic books and mystery magazines to rhythmic poetry.

If you do encounter a sleepless night now and then, don't fight it. Just lie there and relax. The rest will do you good. Chances are, you will rest well and get enough sleep when you do drop off. Worrying about not sleeping will only make you more awake than ever.

Statement From McCaulley Trustees

Dear Voter:

The McCaulley School Board is very concerned about the consolidation election to be held August 7, at McCaulley and we wish to urge every qualified voter to vote in this election. We would like for you to know that the entire board would like to keep our school at this time. Please consider these facts:

The McCaulley School is approved by the Texas Education Agency. They are experts in the field of education and they have not asked us

to give up our school.

Judge Perkins states that any transfer of land in Fisher County must have the approval of the County School Board and not the Hamlin School Board. The Fisher County School Board are 100% opposed to the consolidation. It is our feeling that this county board should be the ones to divide the McCaulley School District if and when the people want it divided.

The County School Superintendent of Jones County, Mr. Everett Beavers, has told one of our board members that the Jones County Board had only transferred land from one district to another only one time that he could remember and that they had regretted that. He also stated the possibility of any transfer of land after a consolidation would be very doubtful.

McCaulley School enrollment was over 150 last year. Our enrollment will be around 170 this year. Our teachers are all qualified; we also have a part time nurse, a counselor and are now qualified in the county unit for a special teacher for the mentally retarded. This

gives us eleven teachers plus three part time teachers.

Hamlin School is operating under Senate Bill 116 with a present tax rate of \$1.65, which can be raised to \$2.00 by the Hamlin School Board. If you compare the cost of the two schools we ask you to compare our cost with Hobbs, a school

our size and compare Hamlin with Rotan, or a school their size. Our tax rate can not be over \$1.50 and will be between \$1.30 and \$1.40 this year. It is true we have asked for a tax raise. This is the second tax raise we have had since 1934. It will take care of our school needs for many years. We urge you to give us your sup-

port, Saturday, August 7, to keep our School, Churches, and Community together!

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an Amendment to Section 24, Article III and Section 17 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, to allow an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature for the Lieutenant Governor and for the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and increasing the per diem allowance of Members of the Legislature.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year. Senators shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature. All Members of the Legislature, including the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, also shall receive from the Public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twenty Dollars (\$20) per day for the one hundred and forty (140) days of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. This Amend-

ment shall be self-enacting and appropriations heretofore made in the General Appropriations Bill for the biennium ending August 31, 1967, for the salaries of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives shall not be invalid because of the anticipatory nature of the legislation.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of Government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."

Sec. 2. That Section 17 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 17. If, during the vacancy in the office of Governor, the Lieutenant Governor should die, resign, refuse to serve, or be removed from office, or be unable to serve; or if he shall be impeached or absent from the State, the President of the Senate, for the time being, shall, in like manner, administer the Government until he shall be superseded by a Governor or Lieutenant Governor. The Lieutenant Governor or shall, while he acts as President of the Senate, receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature and the same mileage which shall be allowed to the Members of the Senate, and no more; and dur-

ing the time he administers the Government, as Governor, he shall receive in like manner the same compensation which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office, and no more. The President, for the time being, of the Senate, shall, during the time he administers the Government, receive in like manner the same compensation, which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR _____
Amendment allowing an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature for the Lieutenant Governor and for the Speaker of the House of Representatives and allowing a per diem for Members of the Legislature not to exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) per day for the 140 days of each Regular Session and 30 days of each Special Session."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature for the Lieutenant Governor and for the Speaker of the House of Representatives and allowing a per diem for Members of the Legislature not to exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) per day for the 140 days of each Regular Session and 30 days of each Special Session."

Sec. 4. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

"(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years and are over the age of sixty-five (65) years;

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-a and Subsection 51-a-1 and 51-a-2 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same are hereby amended, so that they shall hereafter consist of one section to be known as Section 51-a of Article III, which shall read as follows:

The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services for:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years and are over the age of sixty-five (65) years;



Each year animals in the area are lost after grazing on sorghums, Sudangrass, Sudan, sorghum hybrids or Johnsongrass. The cause may be prussic acid poisoning. Some cattle losses, due to this poisoning, have already been reported in the county.

These grasses contain a glycoside which may break down into prussic acid in the digestive tract of the animal. The poisonous material is most likely to be present in young, immature stands, as is second growth following periods of drought or mechanical harvesting. There is also danger in the fall, following the first frost.

Cattle are more susceptible to the

poison than sheep or goats. Horses and swine are rarely injured. An affected animal may stagger and act sleepy before suddenly dropping dead. Severe muscular twitching sometimes occurs. Death results from suffocation, since the poison prevents the exchange of oxygen from the blood to tissue.

A drench of molasses diluted with water may help a poisoned animal, but a veterinarian should be called at once to give additional treatment.

To prevent prussic acid poisoning: do not graze at any time until growth reaches at least 18 inches. Do not graze regrowth that has been stoped by lack of moisture, frosted pastures, or regrowth after a frost.

Forage containing prussic acid can be fed safely if it is cut and allowed to cure completely in the field, or if it is put up as silage and not fed for several months. Mature plants with few suckers are seldom dangerous if growth has been normal. Grain sorghum or Sudan stubble regrowth grazed in late fall can be dangerous. A good way to check grazing safety is to

turn one or two low-grade animals into the field and watch them for a day or two. Be sure water is available to them, or the symptoms may be delayed. If the animals remain healthy, it's probably safe to turn the main herd into the pasture.

Outdoor wooden furniture can be made to last a virtual lifetime by the use of chemical preservatives.

Many home owners invest a lot of outdoor living. For this reason, these accessories should be made to last as long as possible. Also, all wood, including redwood, in contact with the ground or concrete is subject to rot and can benefit by treatment.

One good preservative, for treating outdoor items by either dipping or painting, is pentachlorophenol. "Penta", as it is more commonly known, is available in either the ready mix or concentrated form from most lumber yards, paint supply stores, and mail order houses. The "carrier" should be one of the mineral spirits or other clean volatile liquids.

Prior to treatment the wood must be absolutely dry. The easiest but least effective method is simply painting on the preservative. The liquid should be liberally brushed on and allowed to soak into the wood. Two or more applications should be made over a two to three day period.

If a metal bucket or other small container is available and the wood item can be disassembled, it can be treated by dipping. This is a more effective treatment than brushing. Long pieces can be treated one end at a time. Each piece can be dipped from three to ten minutes with longer period providing the best protection.

Heavier Calves from Crossbred Cows - Work done by research workers of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station have established that crossbred cows are better milk producers than the parent breeds and that the increased milk production is responsible for the heavier weaning weights of their calves.

Want Ad for Teachers

"Urgent vacancy," says the notation beside a teacher-wanted listing posted by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO). The need is for a science and mathematics instructor—preferably an American—to teach prospective teachers in Gabon, Africa. This is typical of the hundreds of jobs that UNESCO is trying to fill. Openings range from a geodesy expert for Argentina and an adult education instructor for Thailand to a music teacher for Afghanistan. Qualifications depend on where the vacancy exists; it may be in any of UNESCO's 119 member countries. Americans apply through the U.S. State Department's Office of International Administration in Washington. UNESCO notes that under the job quota system, Americans are entitled to 150 posts, but that only about 20 are on the payroll. More than 35 percent of the \$50 million a year spent by UNESCO comes from the United States. However, the agency's director-general, Rene Maheu, complains that the U.S. intellectual contribution does not match its financial support. To help rectify the situation, President Johnson issued a directive that U.S. federal agencies "promote the employment of Americans in international organizations."
