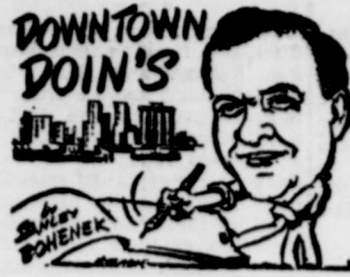

Electric Coops Voice Support Of Amendment

AUSTIN — The State Association of Texas Electric Cooperatives has joined several groups in the state in supporting Amendment Number Four on the August 5 ballot.

During a recent Board of Directors meeting, the group pointed out the continued need for development of rural Texas, and cited water resources as the next basic step in orderly progress.

"On August 5 the public will make the decision that will determine the pace of development in the rural areas," stated Joe Lytle of Greenville, President of Texas Electric Cooperatives.

He continued, "if a favorable vote develops, non-profit rural water systems will enjoy the same tax free status as the municipal systems have." Those backing approval of Amendment Number Four feel that the rural water systems must have the same tax break as those in the cities to allow paralleled growth. "If the rural areas are forced to slow development due to an added tax load, the neighboring city will feel the economic strain," Lytle concluded.

WORKERS ARE NEEDED TO HELP IN C.A.P. SQUADRON

SHEPPARD AFB, Tex. — Lt. Col. William H. Hays, commander of Group 2, Texas Wing of the Civil Air Patrol (CAP), has stated there is an urgent need for men and women to work with the cadet program in local CAP Squadrons.

One unit, the Wichita Falls Cadet Squadron, is located at Sheppard Air Force Base. The only qualification, Colonel Hays indicates, is the desire to work with young men and women 13 to 19 years of age for approximately three hours per week.

A civilian auxiliary of the U.S. Air Force, CAP has a two-fold mission, an aerospace education and leadership program for youth and the maintenance of a nation-wide search and rescue and communications capability.

CAP units fly the majority of the search and rescue hours flown in the United States each year. Participation in the cadet program by young men and women can lead to selection for special activities such as international Air Cadet Exchange programs, flying encampments directed toward attainment of private pilot certificates, education scholarships and grants, and many others.

CARDOX TO BUILD PLANT IN TEXAS

KERENS, Tex. (July 17) — A carbon dioxide production plant to be built at Kerens, Texas by the Cardox division of Chemetron Corporation will obtain its raw material from the nearby anhydrous ammonia plant of Nipak, Inc., the companies announced jointly.

Carbon dioxide gas, a byproduct of the Nipak operation, will be purified in a Cardox facility costing more than a million dollars. Initial production will be about 100 tons of carbon dioxide per day. Cardox will also manufacture dry ice at this location and will market the products throughout the Southwest by mail and truck.

Carbon dioxide is used in the carbonation of beverages, meat packing, inerting and purging operations, fire protection, as a shielding element in welding, and as a chemical agent. New uses for carbon dioxide are constantly being discovered, a spokesman said.

Cardox, headquartered in Chicago, produces carbon dioxide and dry ice at other locations and produces bulk liquid storage systems, truck and truck trailer refrigeration systems, and fire extinguishing systems and equipment.

Kerens is located 70 miles southeast of Dallas.

New Solution To Building Costs

Labor costs in the building trades, along with inflation and rising costs of all kinds, including interest rates, have raised formidable obstacles to building a home. But, as has often happened in the past, the endless evolutionary change that is characteristic of what we are pleased to call the capitalistic system is beginning to flow around the high-cost obstacles to home building. Again, as so often in the past, those who have helped to raise the obstacles by opposing change may be left high and dry.

A late issue of "The Exchange" magazine, published by the New York Stock Exchange, carries an interesting piece by Miss Moira Treacy describing how the mass production techniques of the auto industry are now being applied to meeting the growing demand for shelter—homes. Industrialization of housing is a long overdue solution to the housing shortage. Notes Miss Treacy, one company alone will produce over 80,000 living units in 1968, and it is estimated that by the mid-1970's nearly all housing produced for the mass market will bear the trademark of a major national corporation.

Assembly-line home construction is capitalism's answer to the "insoluble" problem of soaring building costs. And at the bottom of it all lies the hardworking, much-maligned power house—the profit motive.

Are TV-Men Cry-Babies?

It is no news that there have been disturbances, or perhaps more properly, riots, wherein mobs have thrown sticks and stones, and other missiles which have forced law officers to use tear gas and other weapons.

But a strange paradox in this situation is that whenever a newsmen gets involved in the fray, to his discomfort or injury, the cry of foul play against law enforcement officers starts up. Usually, in fact in most cases, it is a newsmen for a TV outlet that raises the greatest fuss.

This is a strange commentary. Almost since the day newspapers started to publish, reporters have understood and accepted that there would be times that their occupation would run into some hazards.

If they did not want to run the risk, then they would have some assignment such as handling the obituary column, the church page, or some other protected niche.

However, whenever there is a major disaster such as a riot, war, fires, floods, the real newsmen have taken their chances, carrying on their duty to observe and report objectively.

The list is long including the legendary Richard Harding Davis.

Obviously, when on one hand there is a howling mob, burning, looting, and destroying, the law must make a show of force to quell the mob. And in a situation such as this, it is asking too much of law enforcement people to question each person in the mob confronting them what their motives are, or their reasons for being present. If gas is needed, which after all, is much more humane than bullets, newsmen are bound to get a whiff or so.

Yet, the way some TV newsmen (sic) carry on, the impression is given that the authorities were engaged in a personal vendetta with them.

This same situation also applies to the curious who rush in where there is a promise of trouble. If they get pushed around, then the complaint is set up that there is an infringement of their rights.

Both the curious and the would-be newsmen would do well to remember the saying of former President Harry Truman, "If you can't stand the heat, stay out of the kitchen."

'Drop-Out' Vets Can Finish School Under GI Bill

High school dropouts who enter the service may return to get their diploma under the GI Bill according to Jack Coker, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco.

The VA will pay veterans up to \$150 a month (if single and they are full-time students — more if they have dependents). Those attending adult evening school will be enrolled at half-time rate.

These payments will not reduce their college or on-the-job training benefits, Coker said. A number of colleges and universities have embarked on new programs for returning veterans who do not possess a diploma but do desire a higher education. However, such veterans must meet certain qualifications established by the institutions and the VA.

Upon discharge, veterans should file at the nearest VA office for certificates of eligibility even though they may not use them immediately. This will save time when they later apply for schooling or on-the-job training.

The VA Manager also reminded veterans who wish to become policemen or firemen that there are benefits under the GI Bill for these approved courses.

DEAR MRS. WHITE: I have a scale build-up in my dishwasher. How can this be removed? MRS. D. W.

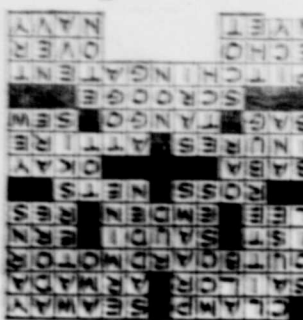

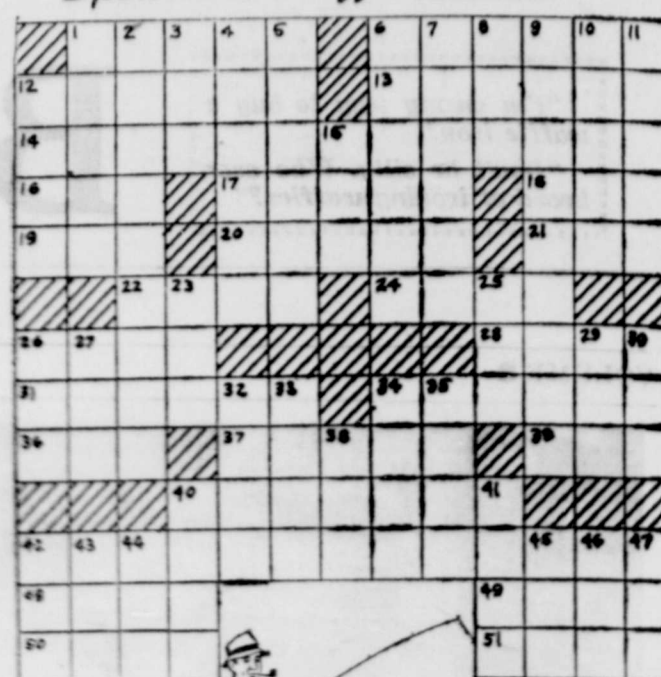

Burkburnett Bank To Introduce BankAmericard Plan To City, Area

The Burkburnett Bank is introducing the BankAmericard credit card plan to residents of the Burkburnett area, according to an announcement by Jack Aaron, bank president.

Some 15,000 cards will be placed in the hands of potential buyers in the Burkburnett area, Aaron said.

The bank president said, "There have been many requests for the BankAmericard program in our area and to meet the needs of our expanding economy, we are happy to make this announcement."

BankAmericard programs are operated independently by various banks, but each card is interchangeable throughout the

nation at any place of business which accepts such credit cards.

The holder of a wallet-size plastic BankAmericard can charge travel, meals, clothing, repairs to home or car, any item or service sold by a business which recognizes the BankAmericard program. The BankAmericard holder pays nothing to get his card and pays no periodic dues.

Member merchants pay a small fee and a discount on goods and services charged, Aaron said. "The merchant banks his credit card slips like cash. He has no waiting period for payment and is completely protected from losses caused by customer failure to pay."

The BankAmericard program was originated in 1959 in California by Bank of America as a statewide all-purpose credit card. It has grown nationwide and is expanding into Great Britain, Canada, Japan and Mexico.

Member merchants can usually be identified by a BankAmericard window decal.

Aaron said all merchants in the area will be called upon, and the advantages of the BankAmericard further explained.

However, he also invited firms interested in the system to call upon the bank for further information.

The applications are approved according to standards established by Bank of America, and not locally, Aaron further explained.

Keeping human feet active and on the job requires doctors with specialized medical training and education. Their services are an important part of the total health picture and represent a challenging career opportunity for the professionally minded young adult.

Foot problems are among the most widespread and neglected health problems affecting the people of this country. A recent survey by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare states that 20 out of every 1,000 Americans suffer disability because of foot ailments — and for each person suffering actual disability, there are approximately 30 others with less serious afflictions.

Doctors of Podiatric Medicine are the specialists who care for the foot. They are licensed in every state to treat the foot medically and surgically. The skills of the podiatrist are increasing in demand, with 165 percent more to be needed by 1975, according to U.S. Department of Labor figures.

As with all medical professions, a career in podiatry begins with college training. There are five Colleges of Podiatric Medicine at present, located in Chicago, Cleveland, New York, Philadelphia and San Francisco. To be accepted completion of a minimum of two years of pre-podiatric education is required, although the majority of students have a baccalaureate degree. Students must satisfactorily complete courses in biology, chemistry, English and physics or mathematics.

The four-year podiatry course provides knowledge in the biological, physical and behavioral sciences. These basic sciences prepare the student to make the most of practical and theoretical work in the major clinical sciences. Through the college clinic and cooperative hospitals students receive extensive clinical experience and gradually assume patient responsibility under faculty guidance.

The degree of Doctor of Podiatric Medicine is awarded on the successful completion of the four-year course of study. Internships and residency programs are available, and podiatrists are expected to pursue further education to maintain proficiency and keep abreast of new techniques and advances.

Podiatrists share with all those devoted to the healing arts the satisfaction of being able to relieve suffering. As a podiatrist the young man or woman can choose to practice at home or in a professional building with other specialists. Podiatrists also serve on the staff of hospitals and treatment centers, in government health programs and in the armed forces.

Professional status in this respected, manpower-short field also assures a dependable and substantial income. Podiatrists in well established practices have incomes comparable to those earned by other doctors. Podiatry is a lifetime profession, offering personal challenge and financial rewards. A family can be supported in security and comfort with the certainty that the demand for podiatric services will grow as the demand for all Americans for health care increases.

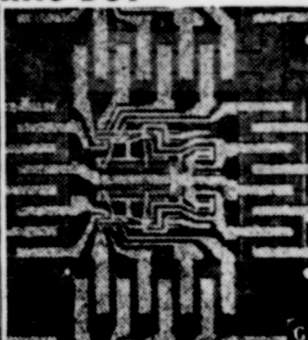
THE DASHING DOT

Micro-miniature circuits with components scarcely larger than the dot over this letter "i" are carrying a giant load in today's earthbound and outer space electronic systems.

Low in cost and high in performance and reliability, these nearly microscopic integrated circuits are revolutionizing electronic switching systems, transistor radios, telephone sets, TV and computers.

For example, almost a million electrical components can be packed into a silicon wafer the size of a postage stamp and not much thicker. A wafer is divided into hundreds of squares, each containing 672 transistors and resistors and each so tiny that it is visible through a postage stamp perforation.

A spokesman for Bell Telephone Laboratories, a leading developer of the circuits, says that their extraordinary miniaturization makes them particularly adaptable to uses where weight and bulk are factors—in everything, that is, from space vehicles to hearing aids. One familiar instrument which incorporates an integrated circuit is Bell's compact, all-in-one Trimline® telephone, whose push-button dialing mechanism is cradled between the handset's receiver and mouthpiece. The spokesman says that integrated circuits will be used even more widely in the electronic telephones of the future. A typical integrated circuit, such as one used in the Bell System's Picturephone® set, is about 1/25th of an inch square

and contains 12 transistors, 13 resistors and one diode.

Bell's integrated circuit bears little resemblance to individual electronic components linked by a maze of wires. One technique for making integrated circuits involves building up a "sandwich" of thin layers of conducting or insulating film to form resistors, capacitors and interconnections. Most film layers are 1,000 times thinner than a human hair.

Integrated circuits are almost indestructibly rugged. In centrifugal tests, they survive acceleration of 20,000 g's—or roughly the acceleration of a well-hit golf ball at the instant of tee-off.

Looking to the future, the Bell spokesman predicts: "The spread of integrated circuits through the Bell System certainly will be marked by communications systems with capabilities far beyond those of systems known today."

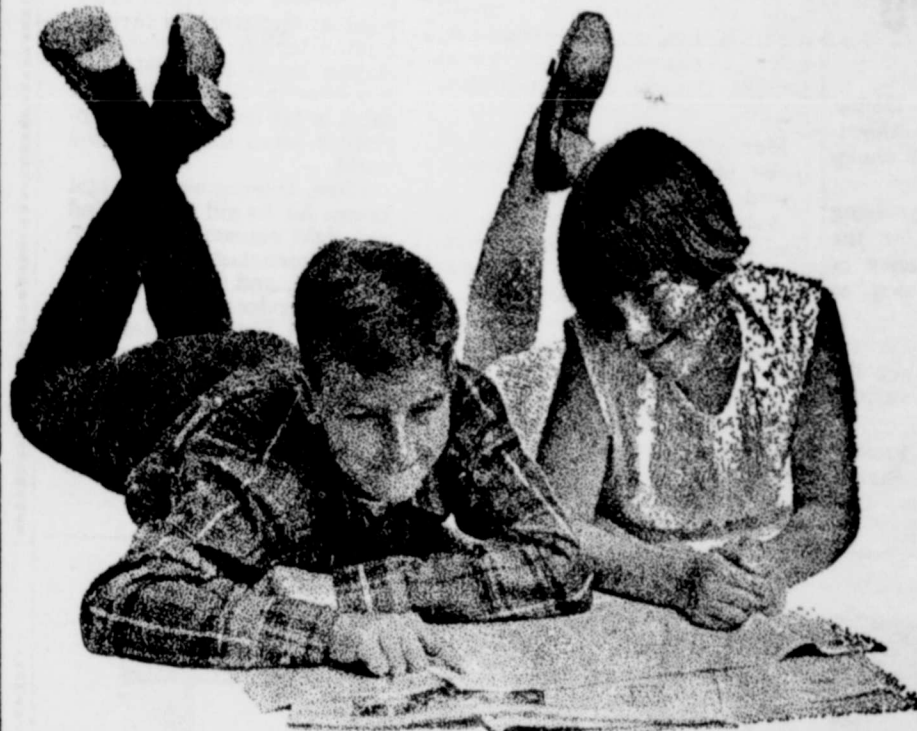

JULY 20-26 PROCLAIMED AS COUNTY FARM SAFETY WEEK

County Judge Calvin Ashley proclaimed July 20-26, 1969 as FARM SAFETY WEEK in Wichita County, at the request of Raymond Schroeder, Wichita County Farm Bureau president.

The local organization is coordinating activities within the county for the special farm safety campaign.

The county farm leader said the accidental death rate for farm residents is steadily increasing.

"If this trend is to be reversed and the needless suffering and losses substantially reduced, each of us must have a renewed effort," Schroeder emphasized.

He emphasized that farming remains one of the most hazardous occupations in this country today; but added, many of the present losses could be prevented with the use of safety tools such as seat belts, fire exting-

uishers, SMV emblems, and tractor roll-overs and crush, resistant cabs.

In his proclamation, Judge Ashley said "the citizens of Wichita County are proud of our farm families from whom comes our abundance of food and fiber; therefore, our citizens are deeply concerned about the safety and well-being of this segment of our population as they go about the sometimes hazardous task of producing the commodities needed by the entire population."

The proclamation said the week-long special safety campaign is a coordinated effort by Farm Bureau and various local and state agricultural and safety groups.

The judge urged farm families "to become more safety conscious, not only during the FARM SAFETY WEEK, but every day of the year."

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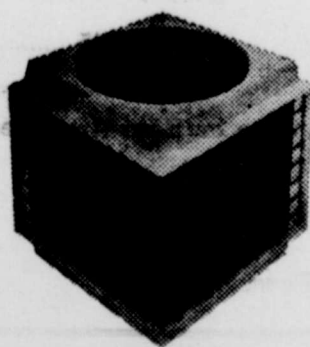
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OPTIMISTS CLUB HONORS BALL TEAM
