ALTO FRIO ENCAMPMENT

The program of Alto Frio Encampment is given here. This editor had planned to attend and enjoy the fellowship throughout the encampment, but I have been called by the government to act as an instructor at Ft. Sam Houston from June 14 to July 14, which makes it impossible for me to attend. I shall attend at least one night session however. Make your plans now to go.

ALTO FRIO ENCAMPMENT

Opens Friday, June 28th—Closes Sunday, July 7th

Dr. W. W. Melton, of Waco, is Encampment preacher through Thursday night, July 4th. Dr. I. E. Gates will preach the closing days, Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Dr. R. L. Powell, San Marcos, will preach at noon hour.

Dr. O. L. Smith, Gonzales, will speak four times on vital subjects.

Dr. R. W. Merrill, Kerrville, will deliver four addresses.

Judge O. S. Latimore, Austin, will speak twice, besides teaching Men's Bible Class on Sundays.

Drs. Edgar Godbold and J. C. Hardy will speak on Christian Education.

Dr. T. L. Holcomb, General Secretary, will speak on Denominational Day.

B. Y. P. U. Secretary, T. C. Gardner will give two addresses.

Miss Grace Conn of Dallas will have charge of the B. Y. P. U. work throughout the encampment.

Dr. I. E. Gates will speak every day at 10:00 o'clock on Bible studies and doctrinal themes.

Mr. and Mrs. Paul B. Harper, San Antonio, will direct the music for the Encampment, organizing a great choir, using stringed and wind instruments.

SOME FEATURES WORTH MENTIONING

Since the last equipment, we have erected on the grounds fifteen new buildings. The old San Antonio house has been torn down and re-built into cottages. These cottages are for sale for \$175 each with two years time. Seven of them have been sold, there are eight more for sale.

A new bath house for men has been erected.

The grounds have been cleaned up and the trees trimmed. There is on the grounds a grocery store, a barber shop, a cafeteria, ice, barbecued meat and fresh meat for sale besides cold drink stand, etc.

We have 100 tents and 400 army cots and plenty of fire-wood on the grounds all without charge to those who remain throughout the encampment. A small charge will be made for the use of tents and cots for those who stay only a day or two. Of course, everyone is expected to bring his own bedding, and every other equipment necessary for camp life.

(If you have a tent bring it along)

Mr. and Mrs. A. O. Brock will have charge of the cafeteria this year and serve three good meals a day for \$1.00. Those who prefer however can do their own cooking on the grounds.

The roads from San Antonio to the grounds are in fine condition, and those in cars can make the trip from San Antonio in three hours.

Those who come on the trains from the east will get off at Sabinal and those coming from the west will get off at Uvalde. Those coming on trains will have to pay their own transportation to and from these towns to the grounds.
