## Chamber Sponsors Trade Expansion Campaign Ochiltree Voters Again Asked To Decide On Beer Proposal

### REAL OPTION VOTE WILL BE TAKEN NOV. 6

Call Election When Presented With Signed Petitions

ried In First Election  
Nearly Equally Divided  
In First Ballot Held  
In 1933

Ochiltree county voters will again be called upon to decide whether or not the sale of beer is preferable to this county when they go to the polls on November 6, the local option election being ordered at a special session of the Commissioners Court last Monday morning by the signed petitions requesting the sale.

Although the sale of 32 beer has been legalized here for only a little over a year, opponents of the proposition are of the opinion that a referendum is desirable. The first ballot was held on August 26, 1933, carried by a scant sixteen votes, the vote being 411 for and 395 against.

The local option ballot will have been placed on the ballot and against the sale of beer containing not more than three and two-tenths per cent (3.2%) of alcohol by weight in Ochiltree County.

At the same ballot, voters will decide whether or not they wish to have the unused road bonds, the sale of which is being proposed, and against the cancellation of the unsold and bonded county road bonds voted April 16, 1932.

### HOLD OLD AGE PENSION MEET

TEXAS ORGANIZATION MEET-  
ING TO BE HELD HERE  
NEXT SATURDAY  
EVENING

Shall Texas adopt an Old Age Pension system of caring for the aged men and women of this state?

This and many other questions connected with the proposition will be discussed at an open county-wide meeting to be held in the Methodist church, in Perryton on Saturday evening, October 27, at 7:30 o'clock.

Considerable interest has been manifested in this movement in Ochiltree and surrounding counties for the past several months, by both the older people and those not yet eligible for relief of this nature, and a large number of interested folks are expected to be present.

It appears the only definite plan of Old Age Pensions that has been brought to the attention of the people of this territory so far, is one advanced by a Dr. Townsend of California, and is known as the Townsend Plan for National Old Age Pensions.

The meeting to be held Saturday night is said to be a strictly Texas organization, known as the Texas Association for Old Age Pensions, and its purposes are to consolidate the thought of the people of Texas into this phase of social legislation, and to assist and work with any feasible and reasonable plan of national legislation for the benefit of the aged.

Judge J. M. Grigsby will preside, and Evert T. Wall, Berger, representative from the Texas Association for Old Age Pensions will explain the purposes of that organization and will explain all questions concerning the movement in this state.

Since any system of old age pensions will affect both the old and young, everyone interested is urged to attend this meeting.

### RELIEF ROLLS BUDGET HIKED

COUNTY GIVEN ACUTE EMER-  
GENCY DROUTH RATING  
IN NEW STATE  
RULING

Ochiltree has been selected as one of the acute emergency drouth counties in a new rating by the Texas Relief commission which will mean a substantial increase in the relief budget here.

Authority was given H. Shindler, county administrator, to increase the budget to relief roll clients in this county as a result of the new ruling, because of the fact that practically no gardens were raised in this section and that the need for winter fuel is greater than the southern areas of the state.

According to the statement received from Austin headquarters of the Texas Relief commission, "Ochiltree county has been selected as one of the Acute Emergency Drouth Counties on account of the length of time during which you have been in this area, you have been more affected than perhaps some other counties which are listed as drouth counties."

It is the opinion of H. Shindler, that the original twenty-two drouth counties are the ones included in the acute emergency drouth area.

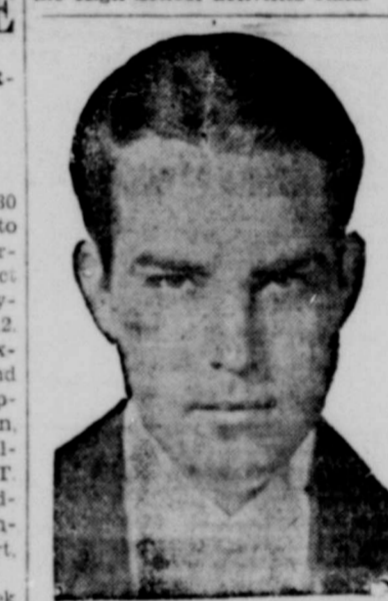

## International Sunday School Lesson

By A. C. Williams, Minister Perryton Church of Christ

Lesson IV Oct. 28, 1934.  
**LEARNING TO RULE OURSELVES**  
Memory Verse: Prov. 16: 32  
Lesson Text: Ephesians 4: 17-27;  
5: 15-21.

### I. A New Walk

Paul, a prisoner in Rome, cannot forget the congregation at Ephesus. His tears have not blinded his memory to the preciousness of the Ephesian Christians. His years of patient labor with them engrafted them into his own great heart. So the galling chains with which he is bound and the solitary confinement to which he was subjected only tendered his own heart and drew him closer to those he loved with tenders of devotion that prison bars could not confine and miles of separation could not make void.

The apostle pleads with the church to walk no more as ungodly men walk. They have been born again—have become members of God's family and are no longer under the bondage of Satan. The walk of yesterday, the walk in error—is not the pilgrimage for today. Diana has lost her charm to those who have become servants of the Christ, the lure of her shrine no longer appeals to those who worship him who dwells not in temples made with hands. Hence there is a need for a new practice, a new walk—a walk with God. Sin has had its day with those people of Ephesus—and also its night. As surely as night follows the day, the harvest will follow the sowing of wickedness. But Jesus had rescued the people of this Grecian city from the clutches of sin. Christ's banner of the Gospel had been planted in this community. So it was urgent that new lives speak new messages, and that dedicated footsteps be found in ways of truth and righteousness.

Sinful walks are vain. They will finally lead to destruction. Paul reveals to us the pitiful condition of those who stained their footsteps with evil deeds. Their understanding became darkened. The mind was blunted. That fine sense of honor and respect was lost. The hardened condition of their hearts was the result of unbridled corruption and lack of self control. It is a fact with which all of us are familiar that the conscience can be seared by a continued rejection of God's truth. The feelings may after a while be numbed until they are insensitive to crime. Yet thousands base the assurance of right or wrong upon the fallible testimony of the human heart instead of the testimony of God's Word. The picture of the excess to which the Gentiles had given in lasciviousness and greediness ought to caution us against their imitation.

"Ye have not so learned of Christ" All his teaching is uplifting. Follow the footprints of the Book and you will find widows fed, orphans clothed, and mercy shown. Law will be honored, virtue undefiled, and citizenship of the highest type.

### II. A Crucifixion

Christianity is a TAUGHT religion. Paul tells us that the truth is in Christ. He is at once the personification of truth and nobleness. We may imitate his wonderful traits and so put the truths of his religion to a practical use. Truth is an abstract term until Jesus' life is known. Then it becomes plain and concrete. We cannot understand such a life as he lived and such a sacrifice as he made upon the old rugged cross for the sins of the world.

But what does this life of Jesus teach? It teaches self-denial and temperance. The Son of God refused the glamour of the world and climbed to the heights by way of the cross. We must take up our cross and follow him. We must curb our appetites and bring them under subjection. He who keeps his soul is greater than he who takes a city. Lack of self-control shows itself in the practice of drunkenness. How weak is the spine of him who must make a sewer of his stomach. God did not give us our bodies to abuse, but to honor with purity and noble deeds.

But a drunkard is not the only intemperate man in the world. Paul says, "Put away the old man that waxeth corrupt after the lusts of deceit." Falshood and deceit are dangerous forms of self-indulgence that intoxicate sufficiently to send their victim staggering to ruin. The old man must be put away. He must be crucified with the affections and lusts. Thus anger, malice and its host of kindred must not be allowed to rule the Christian and

hamper his otherwise beautiful life.  
**III. The Positive Side**  
Not only should the old man be crucified, but the new man should be put on. God never leaves a vacuum in the heart. He always fills it with something better than it gave up. Righteousness, holiness, truth are some of the traits of the new creature. Truth crowds out dishonesty. Sunshine crowds out shadows. A song crowds out a wail, wisdom crowds out ignorance. Surely we are given a worthwhile challenge in the Ephesian letter that ought to arouse us to greater living.

"Neither give place to the devil" He is not entitled to your affections. You owe him nothing. Spurn him as you would a serpent in your path.  
"Redeeming the time, because the days are evil". Too much time has already been lost. We have only a limited amount of it. Let's not burn it. Our short span of days is insufficient for all we want to do. So we must use every bit of it possible. The bloom of youth, the vigor of middle age, and quiet eventide all should blend in harmonious union with one song, one great theme—A carefully disciplined walk with God.

### IV. Singing Soldiers

Spirit-filled men are also song-filled men. Paul encourages us to speak to one another in psalms, hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in our hearts to the Lord. The song service is not a prelude to the sermon, neither is the preacher to be a postscript to a musical entertainment. Paul frankly says that teaching, admonishing and thanksgiving are items of the song service, and he further states that it is to be done by "singing and making melody with the heart". This becomes very definite as to the kind of music heaven would have us present in worship if we abide within the authority and sanction of the Word of God. The power of good songs is almost beyond our ability to measure. He who sings heartily usually works heartily. The singing is one of the most vital things in the worship. Let us use it to the glory of our Maker.

**May Produce Wheat**

**Small Feed Crop Permitted Corn-Hog Contract Signers Under New Ruling**

Stillwater, Okla.—Corn-hog contract signers who have produced an average of less than 15 acres of wheat may plant up to that amount this fall without violating their corn-hog contracts, under a new ruling by the AAA corn-hog section, intended to encourage production of crops for use on the farm early in 1935.

The new ruling does not apply to signers of wheat contracts, and use of the grain produced is restricted. E. E. Scholl, acting director of extension, Oklahoma A. and M. college warned.

The corn-hog contract permitted the signer who had grown wheat in 1932 or 1933 to plant as much for harvest as grain as he had grown in either of those years.

The new ruling, if that acreage was less than 15 acres, permits the farmer to plant up to 15 acres this fall for harvest next spring. But if his largest acreage of wheat for harvest as grain in 1932 or 1933 had been only seven acres, for example, he could sell next year only the grain produced from seven acres and keep for use on his farm as feed, the rest of it. Before planting he must report the facts to his county corn-hog allotment committee.

**Death Ruling Changed**

**Vital Statistics To Be Credited To Place Of Legal Residence In New Ruling**

Austin, Texas—A new ruling by the Federal Bureau of Census has just been put into effect in Texas and will be of interest to every community in the State, according to Dr. W. A. Davis, Registrar, State Department of Health.

This new ruling is to the effect that the death of any person shall be credited to that person's legal residence. In the past the place where one died was charged with the death. New death rates for all towns and counties will show the true conditions.

The towns in Texas that have a reputation as health centers have been unduly credited with more deaths than have occurred among their citizens. Now, whenever a health-seeker dies away from home, the place of his residence will be charged with the death.

The same holds true in the compiling of records for counties. In the past many towns had a death rate three or four times as high as the county. This was due to a variety of causes—principally, patients from the rural areas coming to town for medical attention and hospitalization and dying while there and giving their addresses as the town without specifying that their home is outside the city limits. The State Department of Health requests every one to give exact information for all birth and death records.

**Comforters To Needy**

**Texas Relief Commission Orders Material To Make 168,000 Comforters At Once**

Austin, Oct. 3.—Texas Relief Commission officials today announced orders have been placed for material out of which 168,000 comforters will be made and distributed to destitute persons in the state for use this winter.

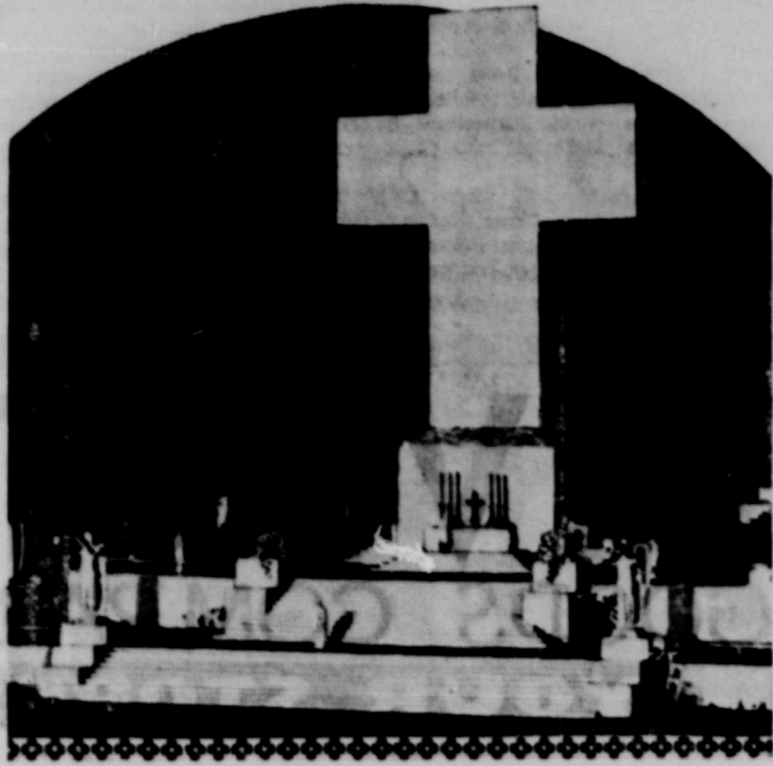
These comforters will be made by women from relief rolls working in the 166 sewing rooms already established by the commission in 111 counties of the state.

A. C. Allen, head of the production department of the works division said the program contemplates the use of 1,100 bales of cotton, 1,680,000 yards of covering, all of which will be furnished without charge by the federal government. Comforters will be of standard size, 72 by 90 inches, and the program likely will get under way in the next 15 days, Allen said.

Sewing rooms at this time are concentrating on the manufacture of children's clothes in order to make youngsters presentable for school. Relief officials have been informed that thousands of school children over the state have been forced to forego school this fall because of lack of clothing.

These sewing rooms, begun in small measure last year, are now producing garments for relief clients in large volume. In them are made dresses for women and children, shirts and overalls for men and boys and room varies, some containing as few

He is supplied with tools and materials so that he may half sole shoes, repair tops and heels.

Location of a sewing room is based on the number of women on relief rolls in a community available for this type of work. Size of the room varies, some containing as few

Communities must cooperate in establishment of the rooms by supplying the building and utilities. The Texas Relief commission furnishes materials and equipment.

A competent supervisor directs the women in their work, enabling them to learn correct methods of cutting and making clothes, teaching them how to earn a living and at the same time providing clothing for thousands of the state's relief roll clients.

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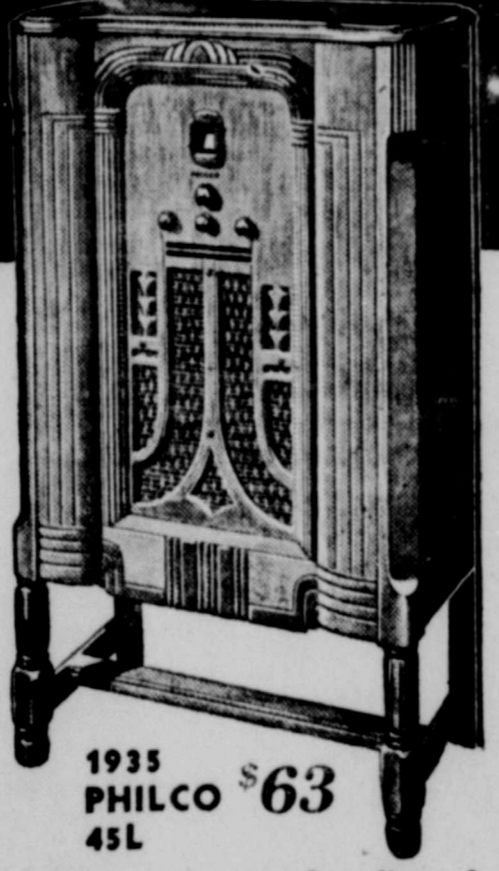

## Wind Erosion Of Soil

Course of Damage and Methods of Recovery

course of farm operations. This of course applies to areas where conservative practice is carried out consistently throughout the neighborhood.

Remedies become necessary where neglect or preventive measures has allowed the land to be damaged and it is in various stages of reconditioning. Remedial methods may be enumerated as follows:

1. Deep tillage for raising to the surface of compact heavy soil by means of,
  - a. Listing.
  - b. Plowing.
  - c. Chiseling.

2. Surface cultivation when soil is wet to produce a cloddy surface by means of,
  - a. Any implement suited to the particular physical condition existing at the time.

3. Cover cropping with plantings used solely for erosion control, such as,
  - a. Rye, fall sown on sandy soil.
  - b. Sorghum or millet sown in spring or summer on any land.

The above emergency methods are largely temporary in their effects, but cover crops add organic matter when returned to the soil as they should be on light shifty areas. In any case these methods represent an added expense to the farming operations and careful planning to avoid the necessity of using them should be done.

It should be borne in mind by every farmer who is studying the feasibility of employing erosion control methods, first, that a complete erosion prevention system cannot be installed over night. The reconditioning of damaged land and its temporary protection must be taken care of. The cropping system cannot be efficiently worked out in just one season. And, finally, any permanent improvement in the way of terrace and contour systems must be at some suitable opportunity between crops.

There is probably no piece of land in the Panhandle where all of the effective methods employed for erosion control could be sensibly applied. Each field presents its own problem and appropriate treatment depending on soil texture, type of erosion injury present and the cropping needs of the individual farmer must be worked out.

The next article will explain how the control measures can be efficiently applied with various cropping systems, and which methods fit the different soil conditions.

Other hand, lands swept by wind have been re-eroded. The degree of damage depends on the character and depth of the surface and subsoil that is exposed. The layers exposed by wind usually have a good supply of organic matter which will return to a normal condition.

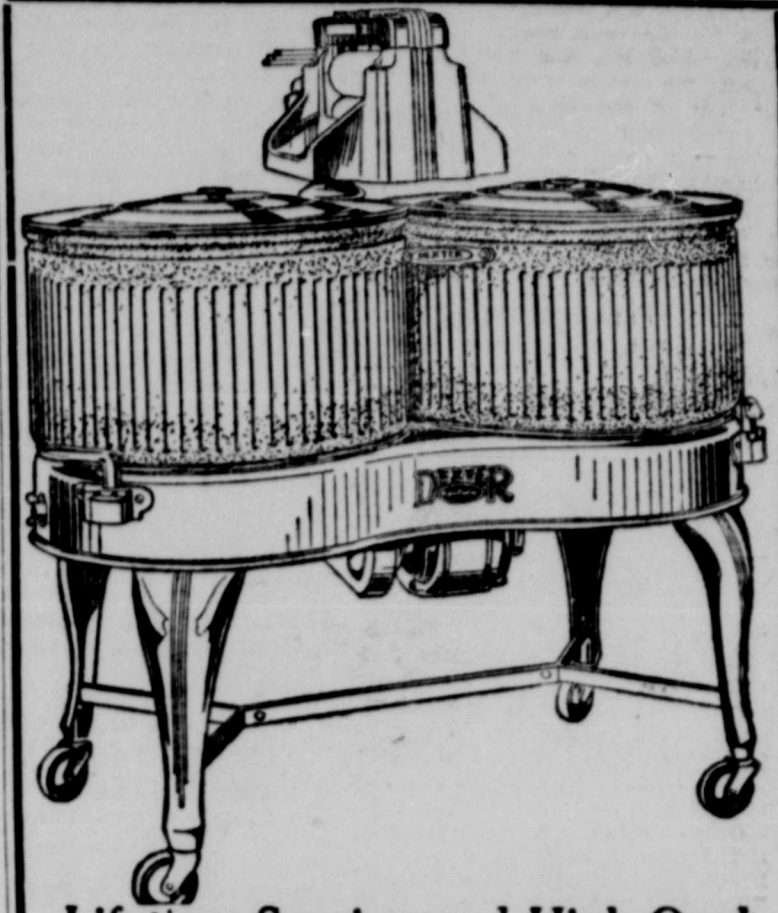

## To Study Curriculum

**Texas Teachers To Take Course In College Extension Departments**

During this school year all teachers in Texas are asked by the State Department of Education to take part in local study groups or extension courses which will be offered by instructors from various institutions of higher learning through out the state. Most teachers will probably be interested in the extension course rather than the local study group plan because experts in methods may be had to teach these courses. College credit will be given to the teachers taking these courses with the extension teachers, the course to count as a methods course.

Superintendent W. B. Teachers in the Perryton school have already signified their willingness to take this extension course and all other teachers in the county are being asked to take part in this state-wide program which is designed to be a great help toward progress in Texas education.

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## Fight Texas Amendment

### Educators Favor Defeat of Tax Limiting And Tax On University Land Measures

Dallas, Texas—Organizing under the name of "The Friends of Education in Texas", a group of business men and other private citizens of the State will seek to call the attention of the voters of the significance of two proposed amendments to the constitution, to be voted on in November, Fred W. Adams, business man of Austin, chairman of the association, announced here today.

The citizens committee is opposing the amendment which seeks to tax University lands for county and school district purposes and the amendment which would put into the constitution a statement of the maximum amount of State taxes which could be collected and spent.

The committee suggests, Adams said, that the 24 counties in West Texas which would benefit by the University and A. & M. land tax amendment could, if they need more revenue for their counties and schools, secure this easily by assessing valuable oil and surface leases, held by large corporate interests and rich operators, which leases are now escaping practically all taxation.

Expressing a desire to see that the interests of these few West Texas counties are protected, Adams suggested that the taxation of the leases referred to would give the counties available funds far in excess of the per capita school funds of other counties in Texas.

His committee submitted this plan, he said, as a substitute for the proposal in the amendment to have the entire State—through its agencies, the University and A. & M.—pay the bills for the schools and for other purposes in the few local subdivisions.

## Tax Shifting Measure

### May Limit State Expenditures But Will Increase Local Tax Burdens

Corpus Christi, Texas—Opposition to the proposed amendment to the Constitution to be voted on November 6, fixing the maximum amount of taxes which can be collected and expended, is voiced by the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, through its president, Mrs. Volney Taylor. The Federation characterizes the amendment as a "tax-shifting" plan, insisting that its effect would be to reduce State taxes paid by large corporate interests and increase the burden on the small taxpayer, 80 per cent of whose taxes are now assessed and collected in local communities.

The Federation's statement suggests that "the adoption of this amendment would inevitably mean the reduction or elimination of State aid to the rural and other public schools, making necessary the transfer of this load to the local communities." It is pointed out that "in State taxation, at present, the home-owner is exempted from State taxation to the extent of a valuation of \$3,000 upon his homestead, but that there is no such exemption in the case of local taxation."

"Any increase in local taxation, such as would be brought about by the adoption of this amendment," the statement says, "would tend, therefore, to withdraw the benefits of the homestead exemption from the small home-owner."

It was pointed out that this is not the same amendment as the property classification amendment which was recently defended by Governor-designate James V. Allred.
