A&M Class To Visit County On Field Trip

Dr. Vernon A. Young, head of the department of range management at Texas A. and M. College, will bring 22 senior and graduate students to Garza County this weekend, arriving Saturday night, to study the four varieties or range grasses and management practices here.

Accompanied by Garza County Agricultural Agent D. F. Eaton, the visitors will spend Sunday touring the U Lazy S and the Bryan Williams ranches to study range management and conditions and grass varieties, part of the Double U land to observe mesquite eradication and contour farming and the shinnery sand areas to observe the types of grasses.

On Monday they will go to the O. S. Ranch to study grasses and range conditions. While on the O. S. Ranch, Merle Britton of the Soil Conservation Service will give the students a partial plan of work, regarding the ranch.

Dr. Young brought 24 students to Garza County on a similar field trip last fall. His reason for bringing the students 411 miles or more to this particular area is that Garza County is unique in Texas in having four distinct grass areas—high plains, upland, breaks and shinnery sand—in such a small region.

Cold War Is Under Way With Russia

Congressman Mahon Addresses Rotarians

The "cold war" now going on between the East and West and what the United States must do about it was subject of a talk made by Congressman George Mahon at a Rotary Club meeting Tuesday noon in the First Methodist Church basement.

A member of the House of Representatives committee of 19 Congressmen sent to Europe this summer to make a six week study of the needs of the people, Mahon went first to London, then to Frankfurt, Germany, where the committee was divided into sub-committees to study specific conditions of assigned countries. Mahon and three other representatives spent their time in Trieste, Italy, Greece and Turkey.

Mahon will leave for Washington on November 5 to meet with the other 18 members of the committee to form a report for the special session of Congress later in the month. He gave the Rotarians a hint of his own recommendations, in the following statements:

U. S. Is Determined

"Russia has refused to cooperate, despite our efforts to be as conciliatory as possible. The U. S. now wants to show peace-loving nations that we can all get along together without the cooperation of Russia. Once we accomplish this, Russia will get into the harness."

"We must look after our own self-interests. This is not an emotional thing. I tried to be objective. There is no point in bankrupting our country in an effort to save others. If America is to fulfill her destiny, she must remain strong."

"It is true we have not maintained our wartime strength, the

Cotton Almost Fifty Per Cent Harvested Here

Threatening weather during the past week did no known damage to Garza County crops but delayed cotton picking. County Agricultural Agent D. F. Eaton said yesterday.

More rain fell in Post than in most other areas of the county, the agent said. A total precipitation of .34 of an inch was measured here by the Double U Company gauge.

Although cotton picking has been delayed, the weather was ideal for curing out the bur, Eaton said.

The Garza cotton crop is turning out exceptionally well. Farmers are averaging a 500 lb. bale of lint from 1,650 lb. of pulled cotton, and so far an average of one-third of a bale to the acre is being harvested.

The harvest is 45 to 50 per cent completed, and the average yield is 1,200 lb. per acre, the agent said.

Because of too much dry weather in the past, bundle feed is making a very short crop.

HONOR THE DEAD, AID THE LIVING—

American Legion Auxiliary To Sponsor Poppy Day on November 8

"Honor the war dead and aid the wars' living victims" will be the theme of the annual observance of Poppy Day in Post on Saturday, November 8. Every person in Garza County will be urged to wear a memorial poppy and to make a contribution for the welfare of disabled veterans, their families and the families of the dead, the American Legion Auxiliary, sponsor of the poppy sale, has announced.

Preparations for the sale are being completed by a committee headed by Mrs. James Minor. Volunteers from the auxiliary will be on the streets at an early hour, November 8, distributing the poppies and receiving the contributions. Most of the workers will be the wives of young G. I.'s.

Early Sacrifice Remembered "Although the second World War is slipping rapidly into the

past, we believe that the memory of the young men who gave their lives in that conflict is still fresh in the minds and hearts of all of us," said Mrs. Minor. "The dead of the first World War have been gone for 29 years, yet we remember their service and sacrifice. The poppies which we will put on sale November 8 will show that we have not forgotten and are grateful for their defense of our country," she continued.

Must Help Children

"We must not forget, either," Mrs. Minor said, "those who live in suffering and hardship because of war wounds and illness, the disabled veterans, or their children and the children of those who have died. The contributions we make for the poppies go for their welfare, for the help which can come to them only through this means."

The poppies to be distributed

here have been made by disabled veterans at the Legion Hospital in Kerrville. Auxiliary workers will be unpaid volunteers, permitting the full amount of all contributions to go into the auxiliary's rehabilitation and child welfare work.

Poppy Day in Post will be part of a nationwide observance in which an estimated 125,000 women will distribute 25,000,000 poppies.

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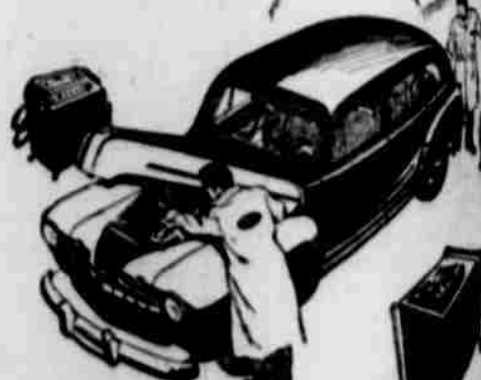

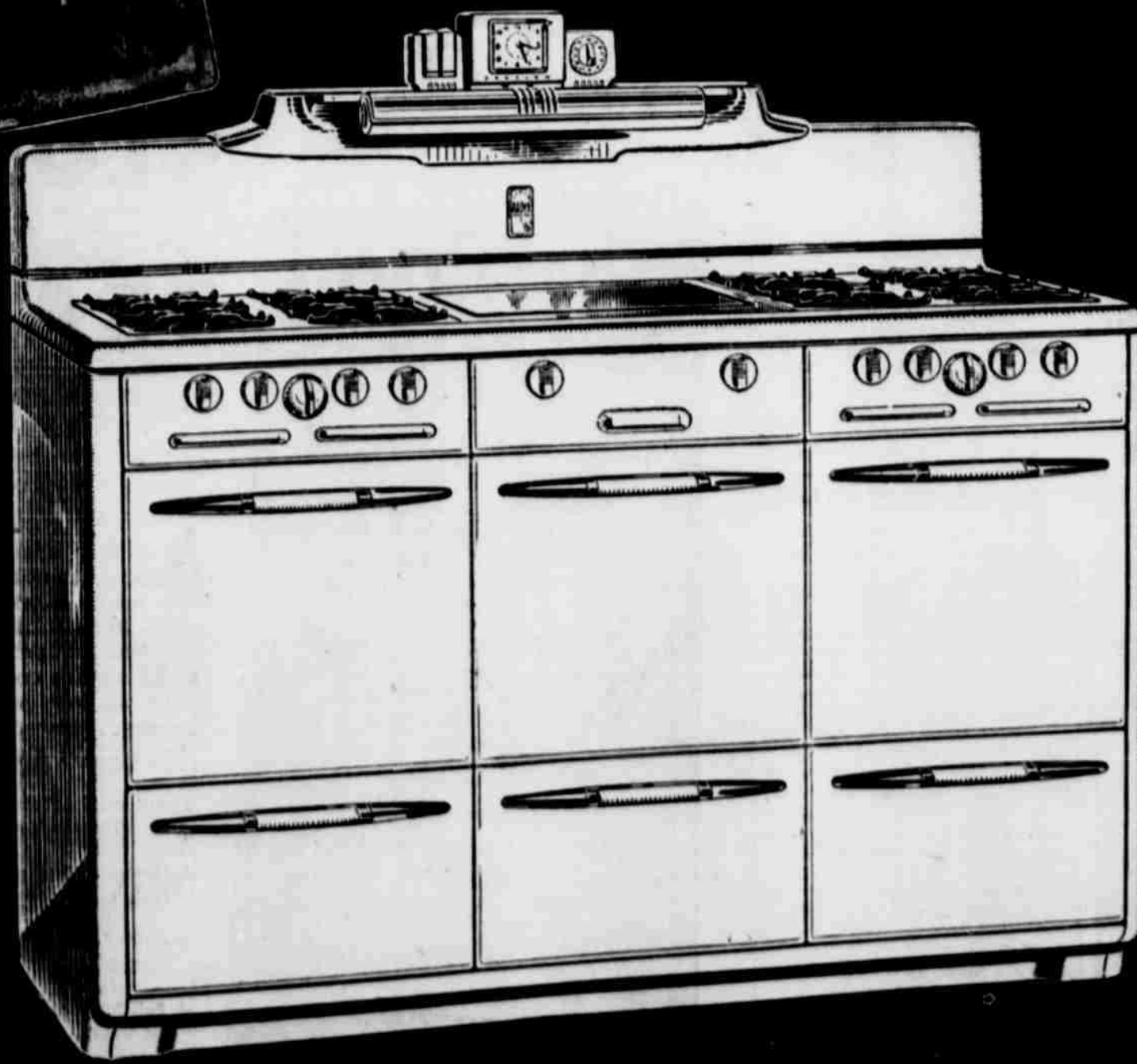

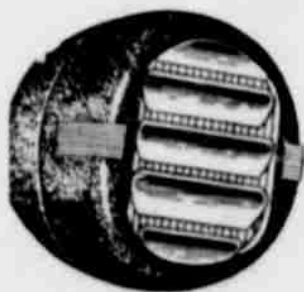

Grain Saving Practices Result In Reduced Costs, More Profit

Some general guides for saving grain and also for helping livestock producers reduce costs and increase profits were released this week by D. F. Eaton, Garza County Agricultural Agent, in cooperation with the national aid-to-Europe program as follows:

Beef Cattle
Get more weight on calves and yearlings while on grass by using protein concentrates such as cottonseed meal, cake or pellets. The greater the weight obtained on the range, the less will be the need for grain later.

Give brood cows enough protein to keep in good breeding condition, maintain health and vigor, and produce milk to get the most weight on the calves.

Don't allow calves or yearlings to lose weight. Lost weight requires added grain later.

Limited grain in feed lot ration. Use maximum roughage, amply supplemented with protein to insure good gains.

Cut the dry lot feeding period to a minimum, selling calves and yearlings at a grade of "commercial" or "good."

Don't waste grain on cull animals. Sell culls now, it does not pay to carry culls through the winter.

Poor and inferior grades of cattle should receive no grain. Yearlings and mature cattle will usually respond and make good gains on a mixture of 20 per cent cottonseed meal and 80 percent hulls for 30 to 60 days.

Dairy Cattle
Make maximum use of pastures. Feed nutrients harvested by dairy cows from pastures are cheaper than grains and roughages harvested by man and fed the cow. Pastures increase production because they contain succulent and nutritious feeds which are high in many vitamins and minerals.

Provide abundant dry roughage to supplement pastures and concentrates. The cow's digestive system makes economical use of large quantities of bulky feeds. Silage should be used when pastures are poor.

Feed protein concentrates liberally. Proteins stimulate milk production, maintain the body tissues, promote health and regular breeding, and are an essential element of milk. Protein concentrates such as cottonseed meal are relatively cheaper than feed grains.

Cull poor producers. Low producing cows do not return a profit on feed and labor investment and are competing with the good producers for available supplies of pasture, roughage and grains. Culls should be marketed while their slaughter value is at present high price.

Provide abundant supplies of fresh clean water. Dairy cows must have 3 to 5 times as much water as they produce milk. Insufficient water reduces production, increases cost and wastes

feed.
Manage cows wisely by observing regular hours for feeding and milking; handling cows quietly and easily; and eliminating flies, lice and other parasites.

Hogs
Make maximum use of pastures for growing pigs and breeding animals.

Feed ample protein. A pound of protein concentrate, in the balanced ration, saves 5 to 6 pounds of grain.

Ample water and freedom from parasites and diseases will increase efficiency of gains.

Limited market weights of young animals to 200 to 225 pounds. Older hogs, selling weight will depend on the size of their frames.

Make fast gains by liberal feeding. If pigs and fattened hogs are hand fed, feed every day all they will clean up. If self feeders are used, the grain and protein may be in separate boxes, or in one box containing the balanced mixture. The use of self feeders will not require excessive grain if the hogs are fed only to light weights ranging from 200 to 225 pounds for young stock.

Poultry
Cull regularly to eliminate non-layers.
Buy or hatch only well bred chicks.

Sell the roosters unless you are producing hatching eggs.

Practice sanitation to eliminate disease and parasites.

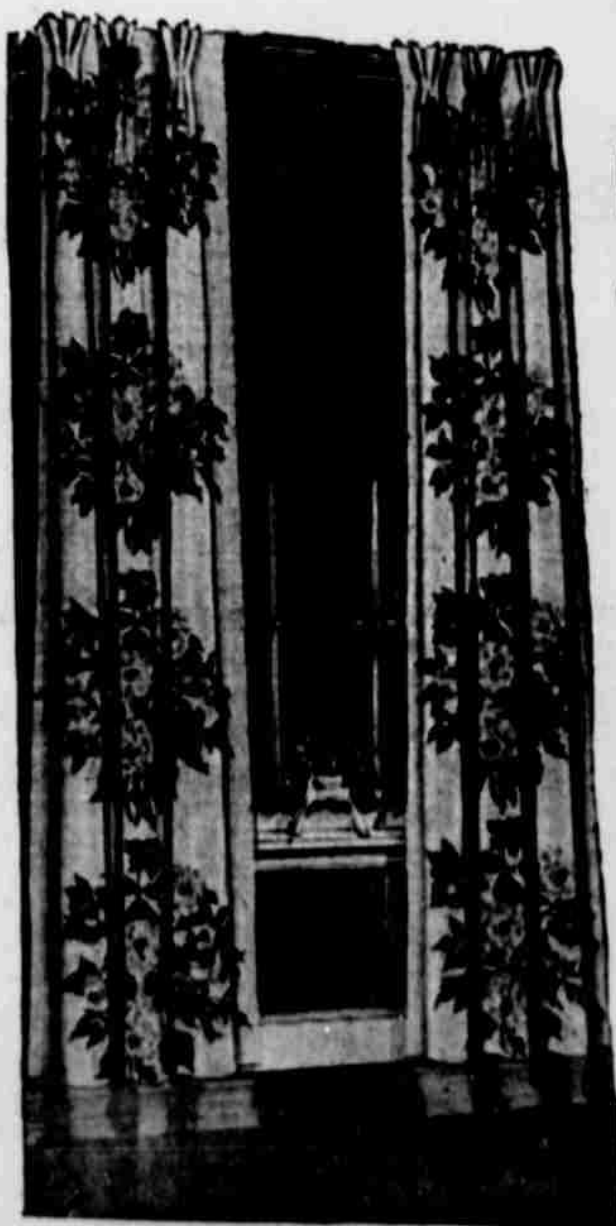

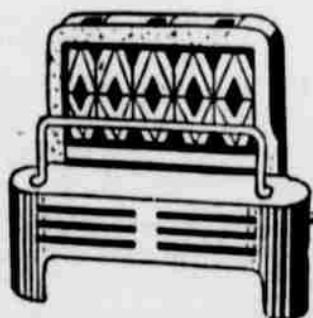

Farm Bureau's 1947 Program Outlined Here

In observance of National Join Your Farm Bureau Week, Mrs. W. C. W. Morris, Garza County secretary-treasurer for the bureau, has called attention to the following points in the 1947 program of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation:

Maintain and strengthen National Farm Program (PMA.) Expand and accelerate Soil Conservation work.

Strengthen Farm Credit; take PCA out of politics and give more farm control.

Requesting increased appropriations for: land grant college for teaching, research, marketing and organization, rural roads, increase for public school teachers' salaries; predatory and pest control; hospital survey to comply with the Bill-Burton Act, and a state department of agriculture.

State legislation to: amend present farm labor laws, protect farmers in purchase of field and vegetable seeds; better regulate reservation of mineral rights, and to regulate livestock auction sales.

Continue to urge expansion of fertilizer processing plants.

Oppose water well legislation when agricultural users not in agreement.

Redistrict legislative districts. Promote a stabilized program for wool and mohair.

Protect farmer cooperatives. Fight the movement to tax tractor gasoline.

Increase the membership to 40,000 in 1947.

Approximately 396,000* farm families and other rural consumers in 44 states and Alaska will get electricity as the result of loans approved by REA during 1947.

Lots of people have an onomatopoeia for the unorthodox vulgarisms of some imprudent individuals in the contemporary social aggregate, but after three years in the environs of the existence nautical I became hardened to and even, under some circumstances, approbative of verbal uncouthness.

But there is, in the opposite extreme, an adventitiousness which literally throws me into a running fit of onomatomania. It is the hangover from the 14 to 20-syllable utterances of Aristophanes and his cohorts who about 375 B. C. were the intelligentsia in Athens, Greece, the world's then foremost seat of learning.

There may be some reasoning beyond the reaches of my understanding for having the high school boys and girls read The Odyssey, The Iliad, et sequentia, in the original English translations which are about as understandable as Canterbury Tales which was written by Geoffrey Chaucer about 1386 when the language was still cumbersome because of its comparatively recent Latin origin and subsequent French and Italian interpretations.

For my part, I chose to skip the laborious reading and thereby escaped some of the richest knowledge and reasoning that man has been known to record. Why can't the wonders of the ancient world be taught in present day language? the students understand?

It's the same with law... and medicine... and music. Joe Moss will tell you that the major problem in studying law, besides learning what books you can find whatever law you need in, is to learn to pronounce and decipher the five-dollar jawbreakers with which the law is explained.

For my own protection against legal documents about which it sometimes befalls my lot to write a readable news item, I have a simplified book summarizing the 33 most important legal subjects. Even it throws me in to a fit because, while written without the whereases and other ambiguities of the original documents, it is still way over my head and is ambiguous while discussing the general ambiguities of law.

Maybe there is a reason for such talking in circles. But I am sure that a lot of people who have died in Garza County in the past 10 years would have died of fright a lot sooner had they known what the death certificates were going to state was wrong with them.

I spent an afternoon looking through the death certificate, some time ago, in search of information having nothing to do with this lamentation, and observed that nobody ever dies of a bad cold, stomach ache or other words that I can understand. The folks you know have died from everything to myocardiitis to melanoblastoma and nephrocapsulotomy and even spondylolisthesis.

I believe we would be a lot happier if our use of the language were as simple as the pidgin English used by the headhunters of the Big Numbas tribe of the South Pacific island of Malakula which I visited numerous times during the war.

On first arriving there I asked for the chief, who for years had been a notorious headhunter, and was told that he "drop 'em along ground," the term used for anybody who dies, regardless of the

ROGER W. BABSON WRITES THIS WEEK:

Too Many Young College People Lack Driving Purpose

Eureka, Kans.—The education business is booming! Schools and colleges across the country are packing them in like so many sardines in a can and turning them out like so many cars from a production line. Prewar checks on educational efficiency indicated that of every 100 students who have entered college, 56 never graduate! Why this huge mortality rate? The question of successful college achievement should challenge every taxpayer, parent, teacher and pupil.

A United States Office of Education Bulletin analyses this figure of 56 "failures" as follows:

18.4% of the students flunk; 12.4% leave because of financial difficulties; 6.1% because of lack of interest; 4.0% because of sickness or death; 14.1% because of various miscellaneous causes; and 45% for unknown reasons.

Lack Driving Purpose
Mortality rates are high because too many young people go to college lacking a driving purpose. For example, I asked a sweet young thing on one college campus the other day why she was going to college. Her reply: "Because mother wants me to." When I asked her for her mother's reason, she replied: "So I won't have to work." Certainly, something is wrong here!

But parents cannot be blamed for wanting their children to have some of those things they failed to get. What greater asset has a

parent than a good son or daughter? The trouble is that too many parents often fail to see the defects of their offspring. They too often overrate their abilities or they too often know too little about job requirements.

Must Prepare For Work
Is it any wonder that employment managers and labor leaders are everywhere talking about the problem of vocational training? Two million young men and women enter the labor market each year. When these youths find themselves facing a hard-boiled job interviewer who asks them what they can do, most of them reply, "Anything." The employer knows this means, "Nothing." Yet, I am not for one moment blaming our youth.

Let me ask what you have done to further job training in your

community? What do your sons and daughters know about their abilities and interests? How much business information have you given them? Do they know the traits and skills required on various kinds of jobs? What are your local employment opportunities? What are the broad vocational trends, nationally speaking? Our youth simply doesn't know. This is evidenced by all sorts of surveys. Three out of every four young persons never receive any organized guidance from school, college or any other source.

Many Want "Just Jobs"
It is significant that almost all of our high school students expect always to work for someone else; it never occurs to them to provide jobs for others. The naked truth is that our present indus-

trial order will not provide enough of these jobs. In order to give future employment to our young people we must start in now to educate the best of them to become employers. This is why I am training people out here in the center of the country to enter definite careers and employ others.

An educational misfit is a tragedy—a waste of human material. Only the man who is happy in his work, who is fitted for it by nature and trained for it through education can make the fullest use of his powers and ultimately provide jobs for others. If school committeemen and college trustees would appropriate even a fraction of the money in helping graduates to become employers, which they now spend on school sports, bands, etc., our youth

might have a chance someone been shorted youth?

Whew! I thought when I left the State Department a year and a half ago that I had written my last memo in quadruplicate and was through with the type of red tape that had dogged me for several years.

But gullible one that I am, I complied several months ago a request from the War Department Special Staff, Civil Affairs Division, to make some pictures from this area to be published in Heute Magazine in Germany.

I sent the pictures promptly, along with an itemized bill for \$5 which was a conservative account of my time, gasoline, films and processing fee which I paid a commercial studio.

In a few weeks, I received a letter acknowledging receipt of the pictures and advising me that the bill was not in the proper form. I did it over again, and returned it.

A few weeks later, they wrote saying they would need three copies of each of the original pictures, along with three copies of the bill. This cost me a dollar and a half extra, plus postage, but I had the extra pictures made and returned the copies of the original bill for \$5.

Today I received the original bill and copies back with a three-cent stamp (I was thankful for this) and a memo saying "The attached bill was returned from Finance Office because it requires your signature under the certification stamp. Sorry for the delay."

I can't find out what a certification stamp is, but I am spending

ing another 50 cents (unless the price has gone up) for a notary public to witness my signature and sending the bill back with a note telling them to skip it, if the bill is not now in proper form, because I have already spent \$2 plus about 30 cents worth of postage trying to collect my five dollars and further correspondence can only push me into the red.

Which brings up the "fable" that was published in the Rotary Club's "Branding Iron" last week:

"Once upon a time there was a farmer who raised two chickens. He took them to the city and sold them, then took the money and bought two shirts.

"A 'Cradle-to-Grave' security planner explained to the farmer that he could get more money for his chickens by not raising so many.

"So it came to pass that when the farmer again came to town bringing one chicken he was able to sell it for as much as two had brought before. He was elated. That social planner was a smart fellow. But alas, when he went to buy some shirts he found that the shirts had also doubled in price for the planner had also told the man who made shirts that he should work fewer hours and get more money for his work, because the cost of living was up. Hadn't the price of chickens doubled?

"So the farmer got only one shirt for the price of his chicken, and the city fellow only one chicken for his shirt, whereas, if they had not listened to that silvery-tongued social planner they each would have had twice as much.

"And this, my children, ends today's lesson on 'the more abundant life.' Yes, it's all very confusing—and amusing."

My weekly paycheck, with its deductions, shows that I am working one day a week for the government. A writer for Forbes' Magazine, whose salary is far greater than mine, says he works four days a week for Uncle Sugar. He is my authority for the information I promised last week regarding our doomed capitalism. I quote him, in part:

BACK SEAT DRIVERS—This probably won't add anything to our popularity, but the National Highway Users have placed an okay on back-seat drivers with flat statement that "the right kind of back-seat driving can help to prevent traffic accidents."

According to a leading casualty insurance company's records, more accident claims are paid on riders than on drivers, especially front-seat passengers. It is, thus, to the interest of all passengers in an automobile to observe roads and crossings, calling attention to other cars and obstructions which may escape the notice of the driver.

"I didn't see him" is the commonest of all excuses given by drivers in collisions, and records show that two out of every three accidents last year involved mistakes by drivers. Such records indicate that the drivers not only should have, but should listen, to offers of help from their passengers.—Amarillo News.

IT WORKS BOTH WAYS—Interstate Theatres used to have an advertising sign on a lot belonging to Postmaster W. D. DeGrassi, and he received an annual pass for the use of the land. Theaters were forced to change policy on such passes, and this change made them not good on Saturdays and holidays. Mr. DeGrassi received a letter to this effect, and he wrote the theaters saying that they couldn't put up their sign on his lot on Saturdays and holidays.—Amarillo News.

MAJOR GRAIN LEAK—County Commissioner Court has aided the program for food and grain conservation in hiring a county rat killer on a temporary basis.

One large rat can eat and waste more than 100 pounds of bushels of corn, and when it is realized that the nation has an estimated 100,000,000 rats, it is evident that they consume twice as much grain as is being sought in the nationwide conservation program.

It would be impossible during the limited food emergency ending next June to exterminate all the rats on farms and in storage facilities in cities, but the need in Europe as well as high prices at home well justify organized effort in that direction.

Poisons, recommended by competent authorities, are one means of rodent extermination. Rat-proofing bins protect grain and food from depredations. Another remedy suggested to farmers is the removal of trash and piles of material that afford havens for the rodents, which are also transmitters of disease.

The Citizens Food Committee should get behind the rat extermination campaign, which was among the conservation suggestions offered by the American Meat Institute. Every community can save food and grain by intensifying its efforts against rodents, which feast in America while Europe famishes.—Fort Worth Star Telegram.

POTATOES, TOMATOES AND ORANGE JUICE ARE ALLOTTED LUNCH ROOMS

Garza County's school lunch rooms have received 8,800 lb. of potatoes and nine cases of orange juice and are expecting a shipment of canned tomatoes in the near future, through cooperation with the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The potatoes were bought from farmers earlier in the season by USDA's Production and Marketing Administration under the price support program for schools throughout the state of Texas. They are being distributed as needed by the schools.

The tomatoes were bought by USDA under a special provision of the National School Lunch Act which authorizes purchase of certain foods needed to round out wholesome lunches.

NEWS NOTES FROM . . . Duck Creek Soil CONSERVATION DISTRICT OFFICE AT POST

Norman Makes Plan
W. F. Norman, this week, with the assistance of Pete Ottinger, worked out a coordinated conservation plan on his farm nine miles north of Post.

The plan incorporates the four corner stones of conservation farming:

1. Sound Land Use—Twenty acres of land that lie on steep slopes and are low in fertility will be established to African Weeping Lovegrass.

2. Maintain and Improve Soil Fertility—Norman plans on trying hairy vetch in his cropping system to build up the soil fertility. Crop residue and grass litter will be left on the land to maintain soil fertility.

3. The Right Combination of Soil Conservation Practices—A vivid example of soil and water conservation is found just across the fence west from Norman's farm on the Jim L. Williams place. The land on either side of the fence looked very much alike. However, Williams' land is terraced and farmed on the contour. Both fields are planted in cotton. There is at least the difference between 1-4 and 1-3 bale to the acre. Norman says you can see the difference. At the present price of cotton, this difference would more than pay the cost of constructing terraces. Besides terracing, which he intends to do this winter, Norman plans to contour farm, practice crop residue management to prevent wind and water erosion, and to graze his pasture so more grass litter will be left on the soil. An inch of rain will soak into soil, when protected by a cover or litter, and grasses, two and a half times faster than where the soil is bare.

4. Economically Feasible Conservation Farming—Norman's plan is one which will give the maximum income per acre of soil. Increased soil fertility will produce large crop yields per acre. Using his pasture to encourage the taller grasses, such as side oat grama, will produce more pounds of beef or milk per acre than the short grasses.

Conservation farming is insurance farming. The organic matter from crop residue left on the land act like a sponge taking up water and holding it for use by crops. Terraces with closed ends hold water on the land. Conservation farming puts a season in the soil. Conservation farming maintains yearly farm production.

Montgomery Asks Assistance
Bruce Montgomery, four miles south of Clarendon, this week, ask help in land treatment on his farm. As soon as the Soil Conservation Service completes a soil survey on the Montgomery farm, soil technicians from the Post Work Unit, will assist Montgomery in working out a complete conservation plan on his farm. Duck Creek Soil Conservation District supervisors have already approved Montgomery's application.

Curry's Terraces
E. W. Curry, whose farm is in the Close City community, has started construction of 13,000 feet of level closed end terraces this week. Curry made a conservation plan with the Duck Creek Soil Conservation District in January 1942. Soil Conservation District agreements are automatically renewed from year to year after they have been in effect five years.

country can't stand the financial burden; but America is undertaking to keep abreast with world demands from the standpoint of military power. Nine hundred million dollars have been spent this year on military research and developments. We can make our weight felt in the Council of Nations.

"Although there are many hungry people in Europe and practically nobody has a proper diet available, it would be a sad commentary on the effectiveness of our former contributions to contend that Europeans are hopelessly starving. Remarkable strides toward rehabilitation were noticed. Program Has Helped

"Most governments of western Europe would have collapsed before now and been taken over by Moscow had the U. S. aid not been forthcoming.

"Our policy is more selfish than humanitarian. Our object is to help preserve democratic governments and freedom for the people of Western Europe. The humanitarian side is noble, but we are more interested in keeping Russia from expanding to the point of dominating the world.

"It's a gamble for the U. S. "If we draw out of Europe and get back into a shell and relinquish our position among the nations of the world, we will have to withdraw from the industrial heart of Germany. Russia will move in, with the result that Germany and all neighboring countries will have to look to Russia for the necessary steel and coal. Anyone who dominates the Ruhr and adjacent areas of Germany will dominate all western Europe.

"We cannot afford to pull out of Europe.

"We cannot afford to have European countries dictated to by Moscow. Russia now has one-fifth of the habitable surfaces of the globe.

Greece Is Important

"We are spending \$300,000,000 in Greece to enable the government to get on its feet and repel the communist infiltration from Bulgaria and Yugoslavia. If the communists move in and take charge of Greece, Turkey will be next and Russia will be in a position to flank North Africa and all the other countries bordering on the Mediterranean.

"For our own sakes, we must concern ourselves with this grand strategy of the future. We must lock the door before the horse is stolen.

"If we ignore the rest of the world and attend merely to our interests here at home, we will be headed for war. Atomic bombs dropped on this country can cost us hundreds of thousands of lives. "It will probably be 1951 before the countries of western Europe will be self sufficient in food.

"During this period, we must keep our foreign policy out of partisan politics. We must preserve freedom of religion, of the press, of speech and of elections abroad and we must have an informed American public opinion."

Mahon expressed pleasure at the goodwill toward the United States that he observed, the willingness of the European people to cooperate and the good use made already of the grain, machinery and other items sent to Western Europe. He was particularly impressed by the British determination to work and stage a comeback.

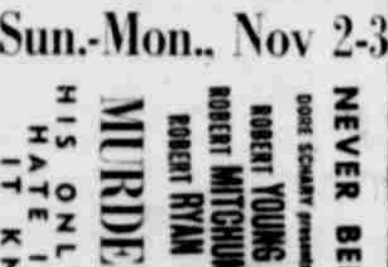
