The Party that wouldn't turn out.

The Texas democracy can't understand how it is that republicanism is sweeping everything before it in the North, and as the increased republican majorities are rolled up, they begin to wish they had not been so very enthusiastic for their defense party.

One great State after another falls into line for Grant, and the Texas press, which crowded so loudly of late "is not prepared for a presidential contest in 1872," and has no heart to go into the fight, they themselves have provoked.

This reminds of the story of a certain man by the name of Mason, who lived in Boston, and who was a man of tremendous proportions, mentally and physically. It happened that one very cold day he was driving along a road in the country, half buried under a snow drift, and looking rather insignificant to the casual observer, that he met a teamster who approached in the opposite direction, occupying so large a portion of the road with his team that it was impossible for Mr. Mason to get past. As they neared each other Mason politely requested the teamster to turn out and give him room; but the saucy varlet with an impudent look at the apparently small man, peremptorily refused, and told him to turn out himself. Mason, who perceived that there was but one course to pursue, quietly stopped his horse, laid the reins over the dasher and began to roll down the road, at the same time drawing up his legs and gradually rising from his seat.

The teamster slowly watched these movements; but as the legs obtained a foundation and foot after foot of Mr. Mason's mammoth proportions came into view a look of astonishment like a circle in the water, spread over his hitherto calm face, and with a deprecating gesture he presently exclaimed:

"That'll do, stranger, don't rise any more; I'll turn out."

Mr. Mason soon had the truck to himself and our bewildered teamster drove off at a brisk pace.

The Columbus Road.

We were shown a letter to-day, received by a gentleman in this city, from Columbus, in which it is stated that the Engineers are at work on that end of the line, and that a portion of the corps will soon be in this city, preparatory to an actual commencement of the construction of the road. We trust this is so, but have seen nothing to corroborate it. There are so many intricacies connected with the operations of railroad companies that it is impossible to tell at any time what to expect, but we are pretty well convinced, as are most of our citizens, that the Columbus road will not secure the subsidy which the people of this county put themselves to the trouble and expense to vote for it. In the meantime other railroads are arranging to secure to their lines even the passenger travel to and from this city, now enjoyed by that road. The Central has had its traveling agent in this city for the past week, and the result is that many passengers are now going via Austin to Galveston, while arrangements are in progress for the shipment of freight by that route. We are pleased to see, and to encourage, this competition, inasmuch as it has a tendency to reduce the energy of other roads. Ours is a large city, with a flourishing trade and great interests, sufficient to employ several roads, and we have shown, we think, a liberal disposition to aid in their construction; but while the fragments of disappointed projects to which our people have been subjected have made them quite philosophical, we give warning that there is a limit even to their patience.

According to the report of the Board of Trade of Cincinnati for 1870, nearly two hundred and fifty branches of manufacturing enterprise were presented in that city, with an aggregate cash capital of \$51,673,741, besides a real estate to the value of \$37,184,110. The number of hands employed was 49,527, working up raw material worth \$60,040,000, and producing articles worth \$127,450,000. The latter aggregate shows an increase over 1869 of \$2,030,000, and over 1868 of nearly \$30,000,000. The leading branch of manufacture was of different fabrics of iron, amounting to over \$30,000,000.

President Grant.

One of the ablest and most unfounded of all the unjust attacks on the President is that he is improperly controlled or influenced by others in the discharge of his duties. The President hears every one patiently. Some he hears at length, and some he hears for a short time. His moments are precious, and he is the judge as to the time to be allowed those who call upon and talk with him. His constitutional advisers, to wit: his Cabinet, are a unit, as the Cabinet of General Jackson was; and while the President freely confers with these, and has respect for their opinions and judgment, still the action taken on great questions is his own. He decides for himself. The American people expect this of him, and they have not been disappointed. He is one of Mr. Benton's men of "head and thought," and, we may add, of will. This is the quality, after all, which makes him a truly great man. The loyal people of the nation may well have confidence in the President. He deserves it. The future will show, as the past has shown, that this confidence is not misplaced.

The Fire in Wisconsin.

The tidings from Wisconsin are positively appalling. Gov. Fairchild telegraphs that the former accounts have not been exaggerated. He says that eight hundred men, women and children have fallen victims to the flames, and that many more are in the hospital crippled by burns and wounds. The extent of ground swept by the fire is incredible, it reaches hundreds of square miles. Towns, shipping, everything has been destroyed. Such a frightful amount of destruction from this cause was never before known in the history of the United States. The condition of the former inhabitants of the burned region must be dreadful. Deprived of their homes and property, with all the rigor of a northern winter close at hand, their present and prospective sufferings are horrible to think of. What must the reality be? The Chicago calamity was terrible, but this exceeds that in horror. The generous sympathy and assistance of the people of the United States must not stop with relieving the people of that city, but must be extended to their more unfortunate brethren. Truly it seems as if the times were indeed out of joint. This year has been signalized by a series of the most remarkable and terrible occurrences that are recorded in history. Earthquakes, hurricanes, shipwrecks, pestilence, fire, floods and frightful accidents have followed in such quick succession that the mind is sick with horror, and dread what new calamity the future will produce.—Galveston News.

News by Mail.

The Louisville Courier-Journal says: Upwards of a hundred men had their legs cut off by reaping machines during the late harvest. If we were a farmer, we would see McCormick hanged before we would buy one of his machines, unless he would throw in a pair of crutches.

Vinnie Ream is thus shortly described by a correspondent of the London Court Journal: "She is a full-blooded Indian, very dark, but not ill-looking. She wears a single garment of linen cloth, which clings to her figure, and is merely confined around the waist by a scarf of blue gauze. Her hair is cut close in front and around her neck, then it is left to fall upon her shoulders. A handkerchief of bright yellow silk is bound around her head, and is tied in a loose knot behind; her arms are bare to the shoulders, her ankles likewise, her naked feet being incased in richly embroidered moccasins."

The Insanity of Queen Victoria.

The late Premier of England, the Right Hon. Benjamin Disraeli, made the declaration not long ago, at a banquet given him by his friends and neighbors, that Queen Victoria was insane. The declaration, coming at this crisis in the political affairs of England, and from such a man as the great Tory leader, has created the most profound sensation in Great Britain, and is made the subject of some comments by the country. The fact of her being "mentally and physically incapacitated for the performance of her duties," is one long surmised by the many, and well known by the few. Its announcement at this precise epoch is the cause of the consternation. There have been elements at work for many years in the heart of English society, which in their ultimate tendencies must lead to a thorough disintegration of that society, and the knowledge, by the masses, of the imbecile condition of their sovereign will lessen the entire mass to a dangerous ferment. The great religion of Protestantism, the Patriarchal system, more successfully treated in England than in any other monarchical or aristocratical country, has been for several years presenting to the public mind its most dangerous scholia for solution; and the excited, even passionate, state of the people, consequent upon the appointment of a regency during the Queen's imbecility, may precipitate a collision which the wise of both parties must assuagely deprecate.

There is a radical party in England, too deeply incensed with the view of French agrarianism to be healthy and normal, but whose values are disintegrated with the vigor of fever, and whose brains are maddened with the fury of delirium. This party cannot, for a moment, entertain the idea of being ruled by such a sovereign as the Prince of Wales, and in the event of such a contingency would fear that republicanism shall again be held responsible for the ill-judged excesses of fanatics and violence. Meanwhile, there is another thought well calculated to cause serious reflection. England is to-day the centre of the commercial world—we may judge, as its determining life—and if it be possible to renege in England to orgies of the French revolution—and the curious may trace a strange parallel between the condition of England to-day and that of France prior to 1789—she may prepare for a commercial earthquake that will overtop the financial energies of the civilized world.

The Republicans of Tennessee are thoroughly united on principle and in support of the administration of President Grant. The Administration has conducted the affairs of the nation so successfully that there is no opposition to it among Republicans. The course pursued by Mr. Greeley and Senator Sherris tends to strengthen Grant.

The Republican State Central Committee of Pennsylvania has published an address congratulating the party on the recent emphatic victories in Maine and California, and asking that a greater triumph be effected in their own State in October. They say, that their intelligence from all parts of the State is cheering and encouraging, and that all that is wanted now is a little close attention to the details of local organization.

ONE of those revolutions which seem to be a necessity to our Mexican and South American neighbors, is under way in Mexico, and has extended to the Rio Grande. It seems that the re-election of Juarrez is considered unconstitutional by a portion of the people, and that the object of the revolution is to place Progreso Diaz in the Presidential chair. The anticipated bombardment or siege of the little town of Piedras Negras, has caused quite a number of citizens of that locality to take up a temporary residence among us. Through the politeness of Dr. McCreary of Indianapolis, who has arrived in town from Eagle Pass, we are able to lay the particulars before our readers. It seems that the town was in the possession of the Juarez party, and was partially invested by a force of the Diaz faction. The garrison was under the command of Col. P. V. Valdes, and the as sailants under Col. Escobedo Falcon. The Juarez inside the town escaped under the river bank, before daylight, on the morning of the 15th; they numbered 122 in all, and intended to join their friends in Saltillo, which has been unsuccessfully besieged by the Diazists. The Diaz army of course then occupied the town with all "the pomp and circumstance of war," which from the account of the Doctor, who was an eye witness, must have been imposing; they numbered about 400, and were destitute of arms, uniforms or anything else that goes to make up a soldier. Some of the infantry were armed with bayonets on brown handles, and some of the cavalry were followed by the bolts belonging to their warlike steeds. The population which was previously very much devoted to Juarez, now fraternized with the triumphant Diazists. No outrages beyond a few mild promises, on the "bloated aristocrats," that were suspected of having the needful, were noticed, but that being the "culminatio del puz," it is therefore not reprehensible.

A correspondent of the Herald in Kendall County, thus gives the status of the two political parties in that county:
