OKLAHOMA ATTORNEY GENERAL ACCUSES TEXANS OF "STALLING"; GOVERNOR WON'T SEND TROOPS

HOOVER SAYS SHOULD ACCEPT PEACE TREATY

Only Requirement Should be Freedom of Action and Room for Development

WASHINGTON, March 18.—Herbert Hoover today declared the peace treaty should be accepted "so long as the final form gives us freedom of action and room for constructive development of peace."

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., March 18.—"Stalling" was the assertion of Attorney General Prince Freeling in speaking of the Texas claim that only the supreme court had jurisdiction over the Red River boundary dispute.

Feeling said that Texas authorities were merely attempting to delay action while Texas claimants to the land continued to take out oil. Attorneys general of both states expect to go before the supreme court in Washington next Monday to present their claims and to ascertain the jurisdiction of the federal court at Enid which a few days ordered the Texans from the property.

EBERT HAS RETURNED TO BERLIN AND VON LUETTITZ WITH ARMED FORCES HAS LEFT CAPITAL CITY

LONDON, March 18.—Rumors are current in Berlin that Dr. Wolfgang Kapp, who was head of the reactionary government set up in Berlin last Saturday and which the troops today committed suicide, according to a dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Amsterdam. The reports were received by telephone in Amsterdam from Berlin.

LONDON, March 18.—President Ebert arrived in Berlin last night, according to a telephone message received by the Amsterdam correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph from Berlin.

AMSTERDAM, March 18.—General Von Luettwitz, who commanded the troops which supported the Kapp regime, has left Berlin with his armed forces, according to a telephone message received from Berlin this morning.

The collapse of the reactionary dictatorship in Berlin has been quickly followed by the resumption of authority on the part of the old government. Its chief task for the moment, it appears, would be to deal with the disordered conditions which the Spartacists are endeavoring to prolong for their own purposes.

By Associated Press. Dispatches stating that Minister of Defense Noske, the strong arm of the constitutional regime, is back on the scene in Berlin, have been followed by reports that President Ebert also has returned to the capital from Stuttgart.

There are reports current in Berlin that ex-Chancellor Kapp had committed suicide but these so far lack confirmation. His professed, together with that of other leaders of the reactionary movement, is said to have been ordered by President Ebert.

LONDON, March 18.—Complete collapse of the Von Kapp-Von Luettwitz revolt in Germany was confirmed by dispatches here today.

Both the revolutionary dictator and his war minister have resigned, dispatches said. A Copenhagen dispatch quoting the Frankfurter Zeitung said that general Von Quisen had taken over command of the troops in Berlin in the name of Gustav Bauer, chancellor under President Ebert.

An Exchange Telegraph dispatch today said the Ebert government would be expected to reorganize itself today. An earlier dispatch said the coalition of independent socialists and communists intended to form a so-called republic.

Meanwhile dispatches indicate that the Spartacists continue to press their advantage toward organization of a soviet government. A Soviet republic has been proclaimed at Eibenau, a Berlin dispatch asserted. A Stuttgart dispatch by way of Copenhagen said Von Kapp troops had been defeated and dispersed after bloody fighting at Gera, an important railway city, 130 miles south and west of Berlin.

The Bavarian diet, the dispatch said, has elected Dr. Von Kapp, former governor of Upper Silesia, as Bavarian premier.

Bloody Fighting Reported. Bloody fighting also was reported from Hagen, Westphalia, where working men and troops clashed. The soldiers attempted to occupy the city. The troops, according to a dispatch by way of Copenhagen, were dispersed and dispersed after bloody fighting. Thirty soldiers were killed and 70 wounded in the fighting that preceded the troops' surrender. The workmen were killed and several wounded.

Reports of the resignation of Von Luettwitz were contained in an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Berlin which said the military leader stepped out after futile negotiations with Herr Baumbach, leader of the coalition of radical parties.

Luettwitz, the dispatch said, was promised that he would be granted military protection by the radicals. The communists, the dispatch added, said they would not tolerate the return of Gustav Noske, defense minister of President Ebert, and that his resignation will be demanded.

Dispatches continued to report extensive radical uprisings in Bavaria, Saxony, the Ruhr industrial district of Westphalia, Chemnitz, Frankfurt and Kiel. Advises to the British foreign office yesterday said the Spartacists had been killed in clashes between troops and radicals at Essen.

FEELING IN BERLIN AT A HIGH TENSION. BERLIN, March 17.—Whether Dr. Wolfgang Kapp or General Von Luettwitz were still in Berlin tonight could not be ascertained by the military cord about the reichstag building was still holding its position. Reports were current that the leaders of the reactionary movement were about to quietly steal away, but they could not be confirmed by the Associated Press correspondent who was reported to struggle through the barred wire entanglements to reach the reichstag building.

Feeling in Berlin tonight is at high tension for there is fear a clash will occur between the Kapp forces and their wire entanglements and leave the city. Mist and rain shrouded Berlin in gloom and the streets were wholly deserted. Party leaders today said that would be heard but no casualties were reported up to 8 o'clock.

One of Dr. Kapp's last official acts was to conclude an agreement with representatives of the Ebert government and some Prussian ministers for amnesty for himself, his staff and troops on the basis of the amnesty of 1918, which will be made to apply to this week's offenses.

It is expected the casualties for which Kapp regime has been responsible will total many hundreds, including the outbreak at Dessau, the most serious reported from any section. It is said that more than 100 are dead there. Disorders at Dusseldorf and Halle were also serious.

Gustav Noske, minister of defense in the Ebert government, is said to be contemplating retirement to private life. This action was forced today at a meeting of party leaders today, which opinion was fairly unanimous that the war ministry should be held by a professional soldier. There is also a demand that other ministers be placed in the hands of experts. Members of the national liberal and conservative parties will not enter into the reconstruction of the cabinet but will await the outcome of the new elections, according to indications.

COUNTER REVOLUTION DICTATORSHIP ENDS. BERLIN, March 17. (Night)—The

Ten men pleaded guilty in justice court Thursday to charges of gaming and were released after fines had been paid. Several women paid fines on charges of vagrancy.

SISTER OF LATE CZAR OF RUSSIA HAS BEEN FOUND

Clad in Rags Grand Duchess Olga is Located by American Red Cross Workers

WASHINGTON, March 18.—Grand Duchess Olga, sister of the late Czar Nicholas of Russia, has been found by American Red Cross workers living in a box car near Novorossiysk, south Russia. It was announced today at the headquarters of the American Red Cross here.

The grand duchess, according to the announcement, is one of three surviving members of the house of Romanoff. She was found "toiling among fellow refugees from the territory recently conquered by the bolsheviks, giving such assistance as she could, although herself clad in rags and grateful for any food and clothing she could find."

The Red Cross announcement follows: "The Grand Duchess Olga, sister of the late czar of Russia, and one of three surviving members of the house of Romanoff, has been found by American Red Cross workers, living in a box car near Novorossiysk, south Russia. A report reaching national headquarters of the Red Cross today stated that this survivor of the world was discovered toiling among fellow refugees from the territory recently conquered by the bolsheviks, giving such assistance as she could, although herself clad in rags and grateful for any food and clothing she could find."

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GOVERNOR HOBBY TO BEGIN CAMPAIGN

AUSTIN, March 18.—Governor Hobby has practically decided to run for re-election in 1922.

The stump in his campaign for re-election will be held at large to the national democratic convention, it was learned today.

GOVERNOR MAY ISSUE CALL FOR LEGISLATURE

Considering Special Session to Provide Regulation to Control Pink Bull Worm

AUSTIN, March 18.—Governor Hobby is today considering calling a special session of the legislature to provide more adequate regulations to control the pink bull worm in Texas.

The United States department of agriculture in a letter to the governor said that a quarantine against the movement of cotton and cotton seed from Texas into neighboring states would probably be declared, unless more adequate steps to control the spread of the pink bull worm are taken.

The department of agriculture said that the only method of exterminating the pink bull worm in Texas is to cease growing cotton in the infested zones for two or three years, and the chairman of the board pointed out that the continuation of cotton zones in lieu of non-cotton zones in the regions actually infested with the pink bull worm would amount to practical abandonment of efforts to eradicate the insect.

Urges Prompt Action. The department of agriculture urged prompt action by Texas will do much to limit the need of drastic quarantine action, both state and federal, and recommended that Texas establish cotton zones and make provisions to compensate planters for their net losses resulting from this action. A tax upon cotton production was suggested as a method of raising the necessary fund. The governor was urged to give careful consideration to the advisability of calling the legislature into session to consider these matters.

Regarding the proposed quarantine, Secretary McInerney said: "The quarantine act now in force is taken by the state in the near future to deal effectively with the situation. I am compelled to say that the department will be forced to give prompt consideration to the necessity of exercising the authority given in the plant quarantine act by placing a quarantine on the state of Texas which will probably prohibit the movement of cotton zones and seed from that state to other states, except under such conditions of disinfection as now apply to all cotton imported into the United States. This quarantine will also necessitate restrictions on the movement of all freight out of Texas similar to the restrictions imposed at the present time on the freight from Mexico into Texas, namely, inspection and enforcement of the cleaning of all cars and the freeing of all freight, other than cotton, from any contamination with cotton seed."

The governor has not decided as to action to be taken upon those recommendations.

TAKE POWER FROM DALRYMPLE AGENTS BY COMMISSIONER

CHICAGO, March 18.—Prohibition agents under Major A. V. Dalrymple, dry commissioner for the six central states, were relieved of all power except to locate contraband liquor by an order issued by John P. Kramer, national prohibition supervisor, shortly before his departure for Washington last night.

Mr. Kramer directed that the prohibition sleuths should make no searches or seizures without the approval of the district attorney; that they should obtain warrants from the United States commissioner before making raids; that they should be accompanied by a United States marshal on all raids and that confiscated liquor should be placed in custody of the marshal and not held in Dalrymple's office or warehouse.

The new order is one result of Major Dalrymple's clash with federal and state authorities at Iron River, Mich., recently.

SINCLAIR TO ERECT A LARGE REFINING PLANT

KANSAS CITY, MO., March 18.—The Sinclair Oil Refining company plans erection here of a plant for refining lubricant oils, which will make Kansas City second in the United States as a lubricant center, according to an announcement today in the Oil and Gas News.

Only the Standard's lubricant plant at Bayonne, N. J., will outrank the Sinclair plant here.

WASHINGTON, March 18.—Defeat of the peace treaty by the votes of democrats will be "fatal to our party's hopes," Wm. Jennings Bryan declared today.

His own course in that event is problematical. He refused to say what it would be, on the ground that the question was hypothetical.

With the final vote on the treaty in sight, Bryan in an interview with the United Press renewed his demand for ratification in opposition to President Wilson, who is against ratification with the Lodge reservation.

Bryan said he was very happy to hear tonight that the treaty has been ratified. Believing that the democrats desire to give both their country and their party what they desire and believe that it would be greatly detrimental to the country and fatal to our party's hopes in the campaign for the democrats to join with the republicans in defeating the treaty, I shall assume they will vote for reservations as adopted and thus bring practically the entire senate back on ratification.

"I am sure such a good policy would be almost unanimously endorsed by the people of the United States, and it would be of great benefit to the struggling democracies of Europe."

As the debate started in the senate, Bryan was in close touch with proceedings there. It was learned he might make a dramatic appeal in the senate gallery when the voting on the ratification begins. If this occurs he will leave for New York.

ALLIED OCCUPATION OF CONSTANTINOPLE TO BE CONTINUED

LONDON, March 18.—Allied occupation of Constantinople which occurred yesterday, will continue until the terms of the Turkish treaty are fully accepted, according to official announcement. Two British soldiers were killed and four wounded in minor clashes, which attended the occupation under General Milne. The British casualties were somewhat heavier.

The occupation, it was said, was largely for the protection of foreign nationalities.

Day Passes Quietly. The second day of the inter-allied occupation of Constantinople carried out Tuesday, by large forces from the imposing war fleet in the Bosphorus, passed with entire calm, the Turkish police cooperating in keeping order. The ferry and telephone services have been resumed. Only small detachments of allied soldiers are visible in the streets and about the public buildings.

The French and the Italians had only small forces here and they are far less active than the British troops, which are excellently organized and look the city over with the precision of clock work.

Among the prisoners taken were Mohammed Nashed, nationalist leader, and Muhammad Faiba, who was minister of war just before the great war opened and has been the chief organizer of the propaganda for an American mandate.

MYTHICAL WITNESS PLACED ON STAND BY THE U. S. ATTORNEY

GRAND RAPIDS, MICH., March 18.—A mythical Paul King was placed on the witness stand in United States district court here today by Frank C. Bailey, government prosecutor, in closing his appeal to the jury for conviction of Truman H. Newberry and 84 of his associates.

King, who managed the Newberry senatorial campaign, collapsed physically after finishing his direct examination and was unable to undergo cross examination.

Bailey, in his argument to the jury called for King—the little corporal, the master mind of the Newberry campaign—to take the witness stand.

With dramatic effect which even caused some of the jurors to crane their necks to see if King was really occupying the witness chair, Bailey conducted a theatrical cross examination.

He asked the mythical King questions about his activities in the Newberry senatorial campaign and answered them himself, quoting from King's testimony on direct examination and commenting on the answers.

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LARGE WARSHIP TONNAGE BEING BUILT BY U. S.

Exceeds That of Any Other Nation at the Present Time Say Naval Experts

WASHINGTON, March 18.—The United States, naval experts say, is building more warship tonnage than any other nation.

Twelve super-dreadnaught and six great battle cruisers, aggregating 655,400 tons, are under construction in private and navy yards. They will carry a total of 152 sixteen-inch rifles and 24 fourteen-inch rifles, and all will have the new electric drive engines.

With the completion of this fleet, probably in 1932, the United States will have a battle force of 19 super-dreadnaughts and 6 battle cruisers in the first line and 8 dreadnaughts and a number of smaller battleships in the second line.

American naval men say that among the world's fighting craft the six battle cruisers and six of the new battleships—the South Dakota, Montana, North Carolina, Massachusetts, Indiana and Iowa—will be in a class by themselves. The cruisers will have a speed of about 23 knots—37 land miles—and each will carry 8 sixteen-inch guns. They will be 874 feet long over all, 90 feet wide, will displace 33,500 tons and have 150,000 horsepower.

The six super-dreadnaughts will be even more powerful, each mounting in its main battery, 12 sixteen-inch rifles. They will be 654 feet long, 106 feet broad and displace 43,000 tons. Their speed will be 23 knots and horsepower 60,000.

These ships and the battle cruisers are just now being gotten under way, but most of the other battleships are well on the road to completion.

TREASURY OFFICIALS ARE REQUESTED TO PRESENT VIEWS OF DEPARTMENT

WASHINGTON, March 18.—Treasury officials were called today to present the department's views on the house ways and means committee on increasing federal revenues to meet losses as a result of the decision of the supreme court that state and local taxes are not taxable. The committee also expected to discuss simplifications of present income and excess profits tax laws, proposed by Secretary Houston in a letter to the committee yesterday.

Chairman Fordney was expected to present to the committee a plan calling for a flat tax on all profits or incomes with the same percentage on large and small incomes and providing for the repeal of the \$2,000 exemption provision. Under such a plan, he stated, the rate of taxation would be reduced from the present rate of 22 per cent to approximately 17 per cent.

The democratic members of the committee, however, oppose such a plan on the grounds that it shifts the burden of taxation from large incomes to the smaller ones.

Proudest and About the Busiest Woman in City of Chicago

CHICAGO, March 18.—Mrs. Mary Oxford Brem was the proudest and about the busiest woman in Chicago yesterday.

For Mrs. Brem was the "C. O." in charge of preparations for the welcome barrage given last night to Major General C. P. Sumner, commander of the First Division, by the mothers, wives and sweethearts of Chicago boys who served under the general in France.

Mrs. Brem was the cause of the founding of the only soldiers' organization by women relatives of soldiers who fought overseas, she claims, the organization, which has become permanent in the "First Division Auxiliary" and is composed of approximately 100 Chicago women whose closest relatives were "first across, first to inflict casualties and the last to leave France."

Major General Sumner came all the way from Camp Taylor, Ky., yesterday just because Mrs. Brem wrote him, as a mother whose son was under him in the fighting, a letter that must have reached through his military exterior.

He was here for the party, danced with the girls and left an impression that "two star" officers can be as good fellows as regular "bucks."

SURE SHOOTING SAVES LIFE OF PRISON GUARD AND PREVENTS UPRISING

MALESTER, OKLA., March 18.—Quick collection and "sure shooting" by W. R. Mayfield, a guard at the penitentiary here, probably saved his life and prevented an uprising at the state prison late yesterday.

Fifty prisoners suddenly assaulted Mayfield in the brick plant where he was foreman. Richard Williams, serving five years on a burglary charge and the leader of the blacks, knocked Mayfield down. The other negroes started hurling bricks at Mayfield as he lay prostrate. Williams, retreating to a safe distance was about to hurl a brick when Mayfield, from a crouching position, shot him through the head. He wound is believed to be mortal by the prison physician.

Following the shooting the other blacks were cowed into submission and returned to work.

HUDSON SPEEDSTER IS WRECKED BY A TRAIN

ENID, OKLA., March 18.—Rock Island trainmen yesterday reported the total destruction of a Hudson speedster early Wednesday morning six miles from Enid toward Waukomis. According to statements from the railroad men, a farmer living six miles northwest of Waukomis had started home early in the morning.

SON OF REPRESENTATIVE REEVES IS WOUNDED IN SHOOTING AT AUSTIN

AUSTIN, March 18.—G. L. Reeves, son of Representative Joe B. Reeves of Sherman, was shot through the shoulder at the home of Dr. Elton Perry here late yesterday. Physicians said that Reeves will recover, and Dr. Perry has been placed under \$500 bond on a charge of attempt to murder. Reeves told the police that the shooting resulted from "family trouble."

RADICALS DEPORTED BY UNITED STATES REPORTED SUFFERING PRIVATIONS

MOSCOW, March 12.—Many radicals who were deported from the United States on the steamship Buford have been suffering privations since they arrived in Russia. They have failed to locate their relatives and have not yet secured employment. Efforts are now being made by Alexander Berkman and Emma Goldman, leaders of the deportees, to form an organization which will give employment to members of the party who are in distress and care for them pending permanent arrangements.

PETROLEUM GEOLOGISTS CONVENE AT DALLAS

DALLAS, TEX., March 18.—The American Association of Petroleum Geologists convened in fifth annual convention here today with members from virtually every state in the union in attendance.

The forenoon was devoted to geological reports from the New Mexico and northwestern Texas oil fields. Reports from Louisiana and Texas as a whole occupied the afternoon session. The convention will continue through Saturday.

STEFANSSON RESIGNS FROM COMMISSION

OTTAWA, ONT., March 18.—Vilhelm Stefansson, the Arctic explorer, has resigned from the governmental commission inquiring into the possibilities of northern development for meat producing purposes, according to an announcement by Arthur Meighen, minister of the interior. Stefansson has sailed for England and it is understood that the purpose of his trip is to seek to interest private capital in the project.

ANNOUNCE POPULATION OF ARKANSAS TOWN

WASHINGTON, March 18.—The census bureau today announced the following 1920 population figures: Ashdown, Ark., 2,952, increase since 1910, 806, or 27.5 per cent.

PARTIAL LIFTING OF THE CHICAGO EMBARGO

CHICAGO, March 18.—Partial lifting of the embargo on express shipments imposed as a result of a strike of Chicago express workers was announced today. The American Railway Express Company removed restrictions on outgoing shipments, except ordinary parcels to Texas, Oklahoma and other southwestern points, and all through shipments from Boston, Philadelphia and Baltimore via New York.

OKLAHOMA GAS COMPANY DOES SOME TALKING BACK

TULSA, OKLA., March 18.—In a statement issued here late yesterday afternoon the Oklahoma Natural Gas Company says that the continuous, willful and vicious persecution and abuse heaped upon it this winter during the time of low gas pressure, makes it next to impossible for a public service corporation to do business in Tulsa.

The statement added that it is perfectly willing to quit business in Tulsa provided it be permitted to either sell or remove its "disturbing system."

BEGINS MOVEMENT TO SPREAD OUT WAR DEBT

OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLA., March 18.—Beginning of a nation-wide movement to spread out the war debt and thereby reduce living costs was announced here today.

Dorset Carter, resident of the federal reserve branch, is father of the plan, which calls for issuance of long time bonds, by which all war debt shall be refunded.

REPUBLICAN LEADERS PREDICT DELEGATION GOING UNINSTRUCTED

ST. PAUL, MINN., March 18.—Republican leaders here today, basing predictions on the results of county conventions in Minnesota yesterday, believed delegates to the national republican convention will go uninstructed. Precinct primaries previously showed General Wood a favorite with Herbert Hoover and Governor Lowden in second place.

Fifty of 64 counties will have uninstructed delegations to the state convention Saturday.

Hoover will have 50 instructed votes, Wood 23 and Lowden 17. Several delegates also qualified as district delegates to the national convention two instructed for Wood.

THIRTY THOUSAND PEOPLE SAVED BY AMERICAN RELIEF

DVINSK, March 16.—Thirty thousand persons have been saved from starvation here by the timely arrival of an American Red Cross relief unit from Warsaw. When the Americans arrived with the Polish army they found the people dying by scores from hunger.

Soup kitchens have been re-opened and are now feeding 17,000 children and 30,000 adults. The work is being carried on under the command of Maj. T. M. Barber of Charleston, W. Va., and Lieut. J. M. B. Evans of Beaumont, Tex.

She failed to use any hard words toward her common-law husband's slayer, but at the same time expressed the highest regard for O'Neill. "He made me a good living and the very evening he was shot had brought me some money to pay my taxes," she said.

Interest in the Trial of Mrs. Gafford Centers in Testimony of Defendant Called to Stand Tuesday Afternoon

QUANAH, TEX., March 18.—Interest in the trial of Mrs. Myrtle Gafford, charged with murder in connection with the difficulty as a result of which her husband, Jim Gafford, and former state Senator Steve Bell lost their lives, reached its dramatic climax Tuesday afternoon when the woman on trial for her life took the stand in her own defense and told of the (amly) troubles which led to the feeling between the two families which finally culminated in the free-for-all shooting which took place in front of the Crowwell picture show at the close of the evening performance, a performance which was attended by most of the prominent people of the town.

The defendant is a rather small, slightly built woman, still young in years, but with her features strongly marked with the effects of the tragedies she has gone through, an effect which was rather heightened by the severe dress of deep black which she wore during the trial. On the witness stand she made a rather good impression, expressing herself well and telling her story in a rather straightforward way—except in the telling of the details of the forced marriage of Fred Bell, son of the late Senator Bell, with her dead daughter, Sue Etta, and of the latter's sudden death soon before she was to become a mother, which she was to become a mother, which preceded the latter difficulty only a short time—when, losing the composure she had maintained throughout the trial she was clearly affected, at times almost breaking down and being compelled to pause in her story in order

to regain sufficient composure to proceed. The way for Mrs. Gafford's testimony was carefully prepared by counsel for the defense with the testimony of nearly a score of witnesses introduced by the defense preceding her testimony with which the two main lines of the defense was developed, and to which Mrs. Gafford's testimony was largely a corroboration—the attempt to show that the fatal difficulty resulted from feeling engendered between the two families from the alleged forced marriage of Fred Bell to 17-year-old Sue Etta Gafford, and her sudden death, and that Mrs. Gafford, part of the fatal difficulty was in the opening of fire on Fred Bell—her shots going wild, and that the shots which resulted in the death of Bell and Gafford were fired by the dead men themselves. This was to combat testimony introduced by the state earlier in the trial by which it was shown that the difficulty was a prearranged affair on the part of the Gafford family—which was reflected in the warning cry of "Here they come," to which several witnesses testified.

In connection with Mrs. Gafford's part of the shooting, several witnesses were introduced by the defense who testified that Mrs. Gafford, on opening fire, called out the name of Fred Bell and fired in his direction. Additional testimony was introduced to the effect that Senator Bell at the almost breaking down and being compelled to pause in her story in order to regain sufficient composure to proceed.

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a score of character witnesses who testified to the defendants standing in the community, and her activities in church, Sunday school and church work, following which the defense rested and the state began its testimony in rebuttal. The testimony will probably be finished Wednesday, and the case possibly go to the jury by Wednesday night.

TABLE MOTION TO ASK CO-OPERATION FOR AN OPEN SHOP

ACTION IS TAKEN AT LUNCHEON OF THE ROTARY CLUB AT NOON THURSDAY.

CLINE OPPOSES SUCH ACTION

Tells Members They Should Acquaint Themselves With Situation Before Acting.

Emphatic endorsement of the stand of the master plumbers in their refusal of the demands for a \$15 wage scale made by the local plumbers, and a condemnation of the principles asserted to prevail at the present which directs employment and discharge of workmen by their employers, or the fixing of a maximum amount of work which is to be performed by an individual in a day's time, was expressed in resolutions adopted by the Rotary Club at their noon luncheon Thursday.

Coincident with this action, and following a speech by Walter D. Cline, which was endorsed by J. C. Myttinger, G. C. Wood and others, a motion to appoint a committee to ask for the co-operation of other organizations in Wichita Falls in bringing about open shop conditions in Wichita Falls was tabled.

"Coming down to earth, how many of you men here know just what the others mean by open shop?" asked Mr. Cline in his talk. "And how many of you have any idea of whether or not it will result in any benefit to Wichita Falls?"

Refers to Dallas. "In Dallas they have had an open shop fight, have signed up all the business men, manufacturers and builders, they have made their declaration in favor of the open shop in the papers, and have no difference in the conditions prevailing than was the case before."

"The right of hiring and firing men directly, and not through any organization is the generally accepted meaning of the open shop. That might be all right, but whether the declaration and a fight for the open shop would bring this about, or would cure any of the unsatisfactory conditions which prevail in Wichita Falls remains to be seen."

"Before the Rotary Club starts on an active fight in behalf of the open shop, or any similar move, I think they should pretty thoroughly go into the matter, determine just what they are driving at, and what will be the result of this."

Suggests Committee. "To get at the very bottom of things, I think the club should have a committee to go very thoroughly into the condition which are objectionable to one side or the other, and one to get the ideas of both the business men and of the unions as to the causes of these conditions, and the means which could be taken to correct them."

"As to the conditions as outlined here by Mr. Hoffman, I can say that I personally am opposed to any limitation of production, and such being the case, and believing the plumbers are in the wrong, I endorse the stand which Mr. Hoffman and the other master plumbers have taken."

"On the other hand, and when it comes to the matter of the amount of money which the laboring people of Wichita Falls receive for their work, we must first take into consideration that there is more or less profiteering among the business men of the town, and that after he has paid his rent, has bought his clothing and food, and other necessities of life, he hasn't any larger margin of profit than is the case in Austin, Waco or any other number of the towns that we know about, where the scale of wages is lower, but where the cost of living is lower in proportion."

Not Championing Labor. "I am not championing the cause of union labor, nor am I going to join in an open shop fight when I don't know what it means, what it will lead to, nor have heard it thoroughly thrashed out from all sides and all angles to the proposition."

"I have said, as you all know, that I am a candidate for mayor of the city, but I want to say here that I don't care who runs for mayor or who is mayor, except that I want to see things work out for the best interests of the town, and feeling this way I decline to join in any fight where neither side knows what the other is driving at, what they want, and where it will end."

"I will not feel a particle of personal humiliation in being defeated on this ground. I have nothing to lose nor anything to gain, except as I might be of service to the city."

Master Plumber Talks. "The matter of the plumbers demand is a thing for the citizens of Wichita Falls to fight out for themselves, was the declaration of John Hoffman, master plumber contractor, who was called on by members of the club in connection with the resolution on the plumbers strike. "If the citizens of the city

want to go ahead and pay the freight, and have the work stretched out still more than is the case at present, it is nothing to the contracting plumbers," said Mr. Hoffman. "At the same time, if the people of the city are willing to resist these demands, the contracting plumbers will stand their losses, and stay with them in the fight."

In reply to direct questions from members of the club, Mr. Hoffman declared that it was true that the work of plumbing an ordinary cottage which four years ago required only six days, and had been done in four, now required twelve days for completion; and that twelve months ago when he came to Wichita Falls, that this work took around eight or eight and a half days. "The wage scale was then \$9 a day. When the wage scale was raised to \$10 per day, he stated the work took nine and a half days to complete. Now, with the scale at \$12 per day, 12 days was the average time which was being taken for this work."

Fined or Penalized. "Is it true that plumbers have been fined or otherwise penalized for finishing work under the specified time?" he was asked.

"This has happened in several instances in the case of men in our employ," he replied.

Mr. Hoffman also stated that he could not employ a plumber direct, regardless of the scale, as the city system in force which he did not understand, through which plumbers were assigned to them through the local union.

"When we discharge them, whatever the cause, they have told us when we were asked for more men that there were none available," he stated.

"There are four men here in town whom I know to be good men, good reliable mechanics, and whom I have wanted to employ. Although these men were idle, I was never able to get the union representative to send them to me, instead getting men whom I didn't want, and who were far less capable, although drawing the same money."

"If I could hire or fire men directly, I know where I can find good reliable men, good mechanics and men who, if they could be brought here, would give the city a very good and desirable class of plumbers. "I have tried time and again to stop this increase in the time consumed on a given amount of work by trying to get the union to get a fixed fee which is to be expended, but so far have been ignored," he declared in answer to another question.

"If it is, I don't know how to contract work at all, for I haven't the slightest idea of how long the plumbers will take in doing it."

Much of the unsatisfactory conditions which exist in labor in Wichita Falls is due to the attitude of the contractors themselves, declared G. Clint Wood, in the course of this discussion, who asserted that the practice of contractors in paying more than the scale to take workmen from one job

PARNELL DISCUSSES CAMPAIGN FOR OFFICE OF LIEUT. GOVERNOR

VERNON, TEX., March 18.—J. D. Parnell of Vernon will make the race for lieutenant governor, supporting the Wilson administration. This was made clear in a statement given out by Mr. Parnell at Dallas Saturday.

Two years ago the Vernon man was elected to the legislature from this district. He announced nearly a year ago that he would make the race for lieutenant governor.

While not making a formal announcement yet, Mr. Parnell stated that he was in the race, and would issue his platform in a short time.

Against Pre-election Promises. "From time immemorial it has been the custom of political aspirants to put their ear to the ground and listen to some peculiar rumbling which purports to come from the masses of the people and then to get on what they think is the popular side of a question and line up with certain political factions and launch their campaign in many instances, sacrificing their honest and conscientious beliefs in order that they may get support from certain factions and thereby win their office. After they are elected they are in many instances, tied hand and foot and because of their alliance with these factions before their election they cannot perform their duties as they should."

"When my formal campaign is launched and my platform submitted, the voters will have no difficulty in determining where I stand on the issues to be thrashed out in the primaries. I will make the race on my own merits and positively will not ride on the 'coat tail' of any individual or set of individuals. If after having read my platform the voter decides that he can lay aside personalities and prejudices and vote for me on the basis of what I stand for, I will appreciate his support. Otherwise, I shall have no claim whatsoever on his vote as I have no special inducement to offer him."

Reserves Right to Criticize. "I endorse the democratic administration of the past seven years under the leadership of Mr. Parnell. I certainly reserve the right to criticize some of the actions of the party, but I will not repudiate a party that has done so much for the people. I refuse to 'slay in the face' the fathers and mothers of the boys who have died in France fighting for democracy. The war was won under this democratic administration and I think there was a good job of it."

"I am in favor of city, county, state, national and world-wide prohibition. I am in favor of woman suffrage to the fullest extent."

"I am in favor of the open shop movement."

"I believe that district economy

should be practiced in both county and state, but have no patience with disgruntled politicians who have no conception of political economy and how money should be spent.

"I am in favor of a brick school house in every rural district and in every city school that is amply paid. I also favor good roads leading to these school buildings and to the towns where the farmer markets his products."

"I am aware of the fact that I will be taken to task on these important questions by my opponents, but I believe me when I tell you that I will be there to answer them."

"I will issue my platform and why I stand for these in the very near future."

OPEN SHOP MOVEMENT AT VERNON TO EXTEND THROUGHOUT COUNTY

VERNON, TEX., March 18.—The open shop movement recently inaugurated by the chamber of commerce will not be limited to Vernon, but is to be extended to the entire county. It is estimated by members of the local committee that it will require something like a week more before the canvass is complete. It is hoped to present the agreement now being circulated for signature to practically everyone in the county.

Members of the local committee were at the courthouse yesterday afternoon interviewing those who hold county offices and, despite the fact that candidates and politicians are supposed to be chary about taking a stand on such questions, the public servants of the county were invited to put down their names to the agreement endorsing open shop and pledging signers to let no more building contracts on a closed shop basis.

According to members of the committee representing the chamber of commerce, farmers are displaying interest in the open shop movement and in several instances have offered to take the petition out into their neighborhoods and obtain signatures to it.

No names will be published until the canvass is complete, it is declared by the officials of the chamber of commerce, but when the campaign for signers is done it is intended to publish the agreement and the full list of signers.

"We intend to arrange it so that everybody's name will stand on this matter," said one of the committee yesterday afternoon. "We look on this thing as a matter of principle and those who do not sign will not be at all published. If they wish to sign an auxiliary list thereafter, that is their affair."

OIL BELT RAILWAY STEALS MARCH ON TEXAS AND PACIFIC

EASTLAND, TEX., March 18.—The law that has been on for several weeks between the Wichita Falls, Ranger and Fort Worth railroad and the Texas and Pacific over the crossing of the Texas and Pacific tracks, culminated Tuesday night in a successful crossing by the Wichita Falls road after the exercise of a bit of strategy by employees, who severed the tie up Texas and Pacific trains for several hours. Litigation between the two companies is still pending in the 88th district court here, the Texas and Pacific seeking to prevent the Wichita Falls road from crossing its tracks in the manner proposed. So far the Texas and Pacific had succeeded in preventing the crossing, but by the exercise of some bold strategy backed by a show of force, the Wichita Falls road succeeded during the darkness of Tuesday night and when last heard from today was still going in the direction of Stephens county.

Night News Briefs

NEW YORK.—The court martial trial of Grover C. Bergdoll, wealthy Philadelphian charged with desertion in evading the draft, ended. A verdict is expected in about a week. WASHINGTON.—Democrats combined with republican irreconcilable opponents of the peace treaty and defeated the plan of republican leaders to add to the treaty a general declaration of American policy toward future wars. The action, it was thought, made possible a vote on the question of ratification by Friday. WASHINGTON.—The constitutional guarantees were suspended throughout San Salvador. NEW ORLEANS.—Harry Payne Whitney, 3-year-old colt, Damask, won the Louisiana derby. ST. LOUIS.—Railroad officials representing the southwestern group of lines organized the Southwestern Railroad Executives' association. THE HAGUE.—A royal decree stated the place to be allotted the former German emperor as his residence would form a part of the province of Utrecht, and that it will be fixed later by the government. ROANOKE.—After a stormy session the Virginia republican state convention elected national convention delegates pledged to Governor Lowden of Illinois. WASHINGTON.—Announcement was made by the shipping board that contracts had been signed for 12,000, 000 barrels of fuel oil for delivery at Atlantic and gulf ports in the next few months. FORT WORTH.—Jimmy Hanlon of St. Paul, won a technical knockout over Bobby Waugh of Fort Worth in the twelfth round. LONDON.—The Dutch premier informed parliament that the former

German emperor has assured the Dutch government he would refrain from all political activity and do nothing which would involve Holland.

BERLIN.—Chancellor Wolfgang Kapp fled from Berlin by automobile. PARIS.—A Zurich dispatch, to the Petit Parisien, said orders had been issued by Gustav Noske, defense minister in the Ebert government, for the arrest of Chancellor Kapp and General Von Luewitz, his military lieutenant. SECURE INJUNCTION TO STOP PICKETING CHICAGO, March 18.—Union activities by drivers and chauffeurs in eight large department stores here were prevented today by an injunction. The stores sought the injunction to prevent a newly formed union from "interfering with their business." The order restrains employees from picketing, intimidating or soliciting memberships. At the same time a strike by 600 or more retail clerks was threatened. They demanded a minimum of \$40 per week and a 25 per cent increase over present salaries. 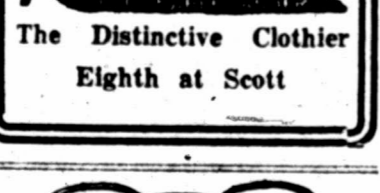

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"TOWN MEETING" TO PLAN ORGANIZATION FOR CIVIC PURPOSES

First steps toward systematic organization of the entire citizenship for civic purposes are to be taken tonight's gathering at the Chamber of Commerce rooms at 8:00 o'clock.

When the "town meeting" called by the civic bureau will be held. Fifteen representatives, one from each of the 15 districts into which the city has been divided, will be named tonight, and these will at once undertake the organization of the sections and blocks in their districts.

One feature of the plan that is expected to prove of much interest is the holding of "block parties." These parties will be for both social and business purposes, being planned first to get folk acquainted and second to choose delegates to the civic forum which is expected to play such an important part in civic affairs.

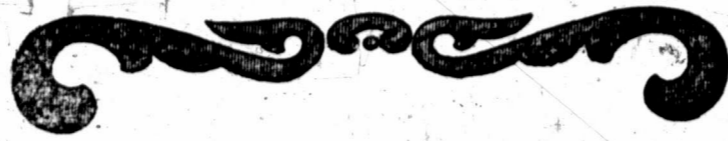
"I don't even know the names of the people in my block," said one member of the bureau. "I don't see how I can get up a block party when I don't even know the names of those I'm to invite."

It is thought that this condition is more or less general, and that it can be remedied by carrying out the civic bureau's plan. It is intended that each block shall form its own organization, with a chairman and secretary, and this organization is to elect a representative to the district committee.

Among matters which are expected to come before the block organizations, when they are formed, are: Paving, street lights, uniform tree-planting, gas service, water, light, telephone and sewerage facilities, drainage, sidewalks, elimination of neighborhood nuisances, community amusements, street car service and tax valuations. When the new charter is adopted, there will probably be other matters in which the blocks can act together.

The civic bureau wishes to emphasize the fact that all Wichitans are welcome at tonight's meeting.

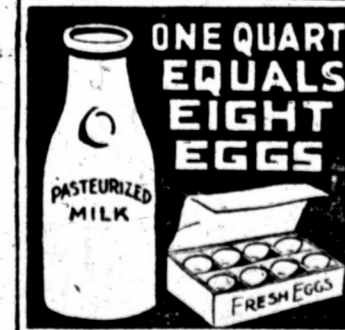
