Hog Raisers Are Warned To Watch For Swine Killer

AUSTIN, Sept. 23. — The nation's hog raisers were alerted today to watch for a swine killer which may also masquerade as one of a half-dozen other swine diseases.

The American Foundation for Animal Health said streptococcal infections apparently have been taking a steady toll of swine for years. However, the trouble often was not recognized because different types of the infection can resemble cholera, anthrax, pig edema, enteritis and other conditions.

The Foundation cited such instances as streptococcal septicemia which often resembles cholera — also tonsil infections which are confused with anthrax. Streptococcal infections can cause respiratory troubles, pneumonia, tonsillitis, mastitis, metritis, navel ill and encephalitis.

"An accurate diagnosis of the disease condition is necessary to determine the exact cause so that proper treatment may be started," the Foundation said. "Guesswork by an owner in trying to determine which disease is causing trouble is one of the chief hazards in dealing with this problem."

The Foundation pointed out that the spread of streptococcal infections can often be halted by segregation of sick animals and disinfecting of water facilities and swine quarters.

3 COUNTY YOUTHS AWARDED JERSEY HEIFERS BY COMMITTEE

Three Eastland County farm club members were awarded registered Jersey heifer calves Tuesday afternoon as the county Youth Dairy Committee held a regular meeting at the Chamber of Commerce office in Cisco.

The new heifer awards went

to Miss Rhea Erwin, Route 1, Rising Star; Jerry May, Route 1, Eastland, and Travis Lee Burkhalter of Rising Star.

The heifers will be turned over to their owners in ceremonies at the Rising Star Fair on Saturday morning, Oct. 3.

Eight club boys and girls were applicants for the heifers, and the committee selected the three named above. The group also reviewed the progress of the program. There are now some 40 heifers in the program from the original 19. Under the rules, the club youths become owners of the heifers when they return their first heifer calf to the committee for assignment to another club member.

Area Wildcat Oil Test Is Drilling Below 2,300 Feet

A new wildcat oil test for the Cisco area is the Ada Oil Company No. 1 R. F. Woodson now being drilled six miles southwest of town. The well was drilled below 2,300 feet today.

Location of the well is north-east of the KLB Drilling Company No. 1 F. E. Clark, completed several months ago as a gas well. The new test is 380 feet from the south and west lines of the northeast quarter of Section 82, Block 3, H&TC Survey.

A new completion for the Rising Star area is the Breeding and Tyler No. 1 G. A. Dunn, three miles northwest of Rising Star. The completion report showed 73 barrels of 40 gravity oil with 25 per cent water on pump from open hole at 1,090-1,127 feet.

Breeding and Tyler have made location to drill their No. 2 and No. 3 Dunn wells in the same area of Section 26, Block 2, ETRR Survey. Permits call for 1,200 feet with cable tools.

A recent failure in the Rising Star area was the Myrick and Green et al No. 1 J. F. Gattis in Section 25, Block 2, ETRR Survey. It was abandoned as a dry hole at 1,201 feet.

Make Home Safe From Fire Urges Insurance Agency

AUSTIN, SEPT. 23.—The Texas annual death toll from fire could be cut in half if home could be made the safe haven it's supposed to be.

At least 350 of the 542 Texans who died in Texas fires in 1952 were trapped inside their homes by the blaze, Norris W. Parker, manager of the Texas Insurance Advisory Association said today. More than 150 of the victims were children who either couldn't escape because proper exits weren't available, or else had been left alone and were unable to escape without adult aid.

Clothing becoming ignited from close contact with open fires was listed as the second major cause of fire deaths by the insurance trade association. Many of these deaths also involved small children whose clothing was ignited by open gas heaters and other heating devices.

Improper use of gasoline was third on the list, and the improper use of kerosene was fourth. Improper installation and maintenance of gas heaters, stoves and appliances was the fifth major cause of fire deaths.

Mr. Parker urged a careful inspection of homes by Texas house-holders as a part of National Fire Prevention Week, October 4-10. To help reduce Texas' fire death toll, he said that at least two means of exit should be available to every bedroom, the house be ventilated properly both day and night and children and old people never left in the home alone.

He also urged that all open heaters be protected by screen guards, that gasoline never be used for any purpose except as a fuel and that kerosene be stored outside the house in approved containers. Only approved heating devices should be used, and these should be properly installed and vented. As a further precaution, he urged an annual inspection of gas lines and appliances by an expert.

College Training Program Exam To Be Held By Navy

NEW ORLEANS, La., Sept. 23. — The Navy has announced that the nation-wide competitive examination for its 1954 college training program, the Naval Reserve Officers' Training Corps, has been set for December 12, 1953. The Navy emphasized the date as final. Examinations will not be given at any other time, regardless of circumstances.

Successful candidates will participate in four years of college training as Midshipmen USNR, and commissioned as officers in the Navy or Marine Corps upon graduation. While in college, Midshipmen's tuition, books and normal fees are paid for by the Navy. In addition, Midshipmen are paid \$600 a year and provided with the required uniforms.

Applications for examinations are available to male U. S. citizens who are high school seniors or graduates, between the ages of 17 and 21. Quotas have been assigned to each state and territory, based on its high school population. Applications may be obtained at any high school, college, or Navy Recruiting Station. Completed applications must reach the Educational Testing Service in Princeton, N. J., by November 21, 1953.

Those passing the aptitude test will be interviewed and given physical examinations. If qualified, their names will be submitted to state and territorial selection committees composed of naval officers and prominent citizens for final selection.

The Navy expects to enter about 2000 students into the program for the fall term of college, 1954. Those selected by the competitive examinations will be assigned, if possible within quotas, to schools of their choice among universities and colleges which maintain NDOTC units.

Between academic years, summer cruises of six to eight weeks are taken in ships of the fleet to provide practical shipboard training.

After commissioning, NROTC graduates serve on active duty for three years before applying for retention as career officers.

BRECKENRIDGE TO SPONSOR BIG AVIATION DAY EVENT SUNDAY

The City of Breckenridge, through the local Chamber of Commerce, today announced that all residents in the Cisco area were invited to attend Aviation Day at the Breckenridge airport on Sunday, September 27.

The announcements of the invitations were made by Lester Clark, prominent Breckenridge oilman and Chairman of the aviation committee of the Chamber of Commerce.

Pioneer Air Lines, the nation's oldest local service, starts scheduled airline service to Breckenridge on Sunday.

Midgets Lose To Dublin Team By Two Touchdowns

It took the Cisco Junior High School Midgets two quarters to get going in Dublin Tuesday night, and by the time they found themselves the Dublin juniors had gathered two touchdowns for a 13 point lead that the Cisco team was never able to overcome. The two touchdowns spelled the difference as the Dublin boys won by a 19-7 score.

For the first two quarters the nervous Midgets looked ragged in their running, blocking and tackling. In the last two periods they loosened up and went to work. The final half of the game was as much the Midgets as the first half was all Dublin. The blocking and tackling was sharp and decisive.

Tuffy Carlile scored the lone Cisco tally about the middle of the final period when he broke loose for 45 yards. He plunged over for the point after touchdown. Carlile was the most outstanding boy on the field on both offense and defense.

Coaches Bob Zellars and James Wimbush made many substitutions in their effort to find the best playing combinations and in an effort to stop the larger Dublin team which outweighed the Midgets some 10 pounds per man. Johnny Choate handled the quarterbacking chores well but the taller defenders allowed only one pass completion.

The next game for the Midgets will be at Chesley Field Thursday night, October 1, with the Rising Star juniors as the opponents.

In connection with the inauguration of service, the City of Breckenridge will have Airport Open House starting at 1 p. m. and continuing until 4 p. m. On hand will be General Robert J. Smith, president of Pioneer Air Lines; Harding L. Lawrence, vice president of traffic and sales; other company officials from Dallas; Civil Aeronautic Administration officials from Fort Worth regional office and other distinguished guests.

Many types of airplanes, including Air Force and a Bell 47G Helicopter, will also participate in the Sunday ceremonies, Mr. Clark said.

On this day, Pioneer will start providing Breckenridge with four flights daily. The company will have flights from Dallas-Fort Worth arriving in Breckenridge daily at 8:04 a. m. and 2:45 p. m. These flights continue on to Abilene, Midland-Odessa and other leading Texas and New Mexico cities.

Two daily flights from that area for Fort Worth and Dallas will leave Breckenridge daily at 9:02 a. m. and 2:38 p. m.

"We want to extend a cordial welcome to the citizens of Cisco and the surrounding area to join us in celebrating our first scheduled air service. We also want to welcome people in this area to use the services of Pioneer at the Breckenridge airport," Mr. Clark concluded.

Good Crowd Seen For Barbecue Of Livestock Agency

Several hundred persons are expected to attend the annual meeting and barbecue of the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association at 6:30 p. m. Thursday at the City Park in Eastland. Sutton P. Crofts of Cisco is president of the association.

Tickets for the barbecue, selling for \$1 each, may be obtained from association members or at the City Park in Eastland at the barbecue.

A. B. Jolley, Dallas radio and television speaker, will address the association membership. Mr. Jolley is widely known in Texas agricultural and ranching circles.

The association will elect new officers and directors during the business meeting.

Property Owners To Decide Matter

Cisco voters will go to the polls on Tuesday, October 13, and ballot on the proposition of issuing \$300,000 in revenue bonds for the purpose of buying two local gas distribution systems, according to action taken Tuesday night at the regular semi-monthly meeting of the City Commission.

The commission's action in ordering the election was taken after an advisory committee of some 15 business men recommended the purchase of both gas systems following two meetings on the question. The committee's favorable report was read to the commission by Mayor G. C. Rosenthal.

The committee report recommended the purchase of the Cisco Gas Corporation for the sum of \$150,000 and the Lone Star Gas Company's local system for \$125,000 and that the city enter into a 25-year contract with the IbeX Company for buying natural gas at the price of 15 cents per 1,000 cubic feet.

Underwood and Company of Dallas, a bonding company working with the city on the proposition, had recommended a bond issue of \$315,000, but the commission voted to set the amount of the issue at \$300,000.

The election was ordered by the passing of a resolution, a copy of which will be published in The Press soon. The resolution provides that the bond interest rate "shall not exceed five per cent." The bond company had recommended an interest rate of four and three-fourth per cent, but the Commission specified that the bonds, if approved, be sold on public bids with the hope of obtaining a better rate.

The resolution provided that only property taxpayers, who have poll tax receipts will be eligible to vote in the election. A property taxpayer was defined as one who has rendered any property, personal or real estate, for taxation.

G. B. Langston was named presiding judge for the election. Named as clerks were E. R. Bibby, George Davis and Mrs. R. B. Carswell. The election will be held at the city hall.

The proposition to purchase the gas systems came up here when the IbeX Company offered to sell the Cisco Gas Corporation to the city after IbeX bought out area properties of the Pure Oil Company. After Underwood and Company entered the picture, they recommended the purchase of both companies. The city then received formal offers to sell by both companies.

Mayor Rosenthal appointed the 15-man advisory committee after this was recommended by the city commission. The special committee met last Friday and on Monday to study the proposition.

1953 Tax Roll Is Approved By City Council Tuesday

The 1953 City tax roll includes property valuations of \$3,213,815 as compared with \$3,209,072 for 1952, it was reported Tuesday night at the regular meeting of the City Commission. The 1953 tax roll was given formal approval.

Collection of 1953 taxes begins October 1. The tax roll was completed after a recent meeting of the tax equalization board.

The city's new fiscal year will begin on October 1, and the new budget now is in preparation. Mayor G. C. Rosenthal indicated that the commission would hold a special meeting in the near future to approve the new budget.

In other action, the commission approved the purchase of 500 feet of new hose for the Fire Department at a cost of about \$850. Other routine matters came up for discussion.

One of the largest transportation systems in the world has recently gone back into operation — the fleet of Texas school buses. From now until next June, over 6,700 school buses will carry over one third of a million school children to and from school every day.

It is quite a job to carry those children every day — it is an even greater job to carry them safely. The Texas Safety Association says that traffic accident statistics for 1936 show that some of our motorists in the State forgot their obligation, because there were 156 accidents which involved a school bus. These accidents claimed 4 lives and brought pain and serious injury into the lives of 55 others. Some motorists forgot and the children paid for that forgetfulness.

AUSTIN — Auto inspection stations are now ready to look over your car and issue a new sticker to replace the old one on your windshield. You have until next April 15 to get the inspection made, but after that you'll be subject to a fine if the sticker is not in place. It's a pretty, little job, printed in gold and cut in the shape of Texas.

The new auto inspection law is not as tough as the old one (which was not enforced), but you must have the right kind of lights, brakes, horn, and windshield wipers.

It doesn't matter about your steering gear. As far as the inspection law is concerned, it's all right if the guiding apparatus goes out of whack and you crash at the next intersection.

Plans progressed for erecting tourist facilities in Inks Lake Park near Burnet and Marble Falls and in Eisenhower State Park near Denison Dam.

John Edwards, representing an Oklahoma-Texas investment banking firm, said he is ready to purchase revenue bonds which provide financing for the projects.

Opposed to the projects is Representative Jack Fisk of Wharton, who thinks that state-owned lodges would be contrary to private enterprise. "I am going to fight it every way I can," said Fisk.

Texas' prison system is in a position to make a million dollars profit in the year ending August 31, 1937.

During that year the system will take in an estimated \$2,100,000 from cotton production, \$125,000 from the manufacture of license plates, and \$75,000 from other sources. Legislative appropriation is \$901,266.

It is something unheard of, said French Robertson of Abilene, chairman of the prison system, for such a profit to be shown, and "now we can make countless improvements of a permanent nature with our own money."

Weldon Hart, chairman of the Texas Employment Commission, told something of that agency's work in a speech here.

The commission, Hart said, has 82 local offices over the state, and 12 district offices. It hires from 1,400 to 1,500 persons.

For the week ending September 3 the commission received 30,639 claims for unemployment compensation and paid 12,083 claimants a total of \$209,265.

And during August the commission placed 156,199 workers on jobs.

Around the capitol, there was little doubt that Ralph Yar-

offered government surpluses of feed concentrates," the commissioner declared in a speech at Corsicana. He added that the concentrates were useless without hay roughage.

AS the governor deliberated about calling a special session of the Legislature in October, the drought emergency diminished by virtue of rains over the state.

And there was still a lack of progress with the teachers about an agreement on increasing their pay — another question that would come before the session.

Reductions in oil allowances cut down on the prospects that there would be money in the treasury to give the pedagogues more money.

Their best chance seemed to be in the gas gathering tax, now being contested in the U. S. Supreme Court.

Now being collected and held, pending outcome of the suit, the tax brings in about \$1 million a month.

Should the court decide for the state in this case, there would be money for the teachers, if the Legislature appropriated it to them.

SHORT SNORTS: James P. Hart, Chancellor of the University of Texas for the past three years, has resigned to return to law practice. His resignation becomes effective Jan. 1. Hart is a former associate justice of the State Supreme Court.

Counties now have the right to deal with cities for rural fire protection, according to a ruling of the attorney general.

Judge Bruce W. Bryant and C. K. Richards were honored upon their retirement from the attorney general's department.

Sen. Jimmy Phillips of Angleton was governor for a day when, as president pro tem of the Senate, he took over when both Governor Shivers and Lieutenant Governor Ben Ramsey were out of the state.

Dr. J. D. Copeland of San Antonio is the new chairman of the State Board of Health, replacing Dr. O. B. Kiel of Wichita Falls.

The elections took place at a quarterly meeting of the board. Also chosen were Dr. George Turner of El Paso, vice chairman, and J. P. Burden of San Angelo, secretary (re-elected).

Emanuel Coutlakis has taken to the Texas Supreme Court his effort to get a union labor organizer's card.

His application was rejected by Secretary of State Howard Carney because Coutlakis' International Fur and Leather Workers Union has been called, by federal investigators, communist-dominated.

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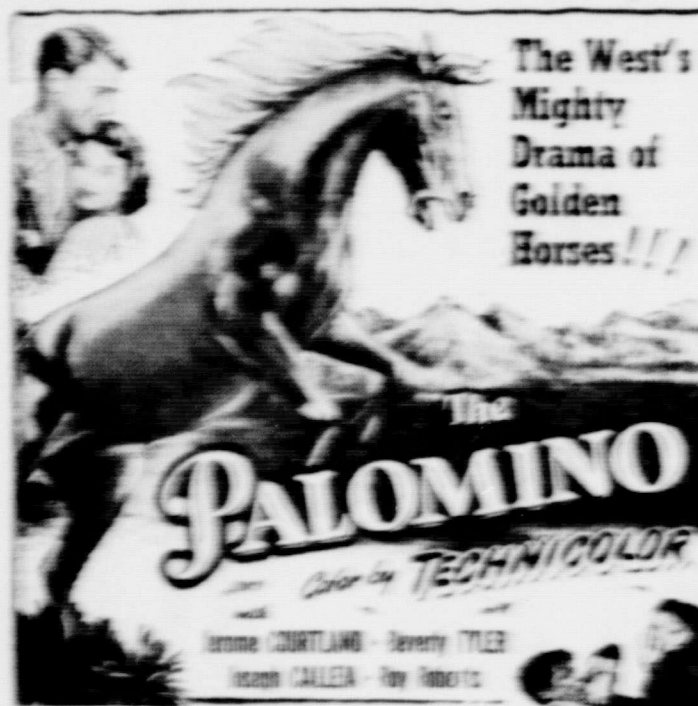

HEALTH TALKS

The great advantage of the large number of anesthetics available today is that the one best suited to the patient's and surgeon's needs can be chosen. The patient's needs are considered first, then the surgeon's.

Thus, if a patient has heart disease, the anesthetic that puts the least strain on his heart probably would be best. If the surgeon is operating on the chest, an anesthetic in which the breathing movements can be controlled might be indicated. If the field of operation is the face, a method for giving the anesthetic that will interfere least with the surgeon's work is desirable. The depth of anesthesia, that is, the degree to which the patient is "put to sleep," can be varied as needed.

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MAJESTIC

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According to the various stages of operation.

Often anesthetics are combined for greater effectiveness or the patient's comfort. Sometimes during operation the anesthetist changes the original plan in order to meet a particular situation. Although he shares the responsibility for the patient's condition with the surgeon, he is the back of keeping a constant watch and adapting the methods to the patient's benefit as the need arises.

Anesthetic can be given in a number of ways: by inhalation, by vein, by spinal puncture, or by nerve block, or by local injection to name only a few. Anesthetists are many; some of the ones that are better known, perhaps, are ether, chloroform, nitrous oxide or "laughing gas," cyclopropane and cocaine.

One of the more interesting aspects of the history of anesthesia is its use in childbirth. The procedure has swung from no anesthetic as late as the latter half of the nineteenth century, when the clergy thought it woman's lot to bring forth her young in pain, to "twilight sleep" or so-called painless childbirth popularized about the turn of the century, and back to no anesthetic for the highly publicized "natural childbirth." An attitude more nearly middle-of-the-road prevails in general now. The patient is encouraged to help as much as possible during labor and delivery, but anesthetics and other drugs are given as needed to relieve pain.

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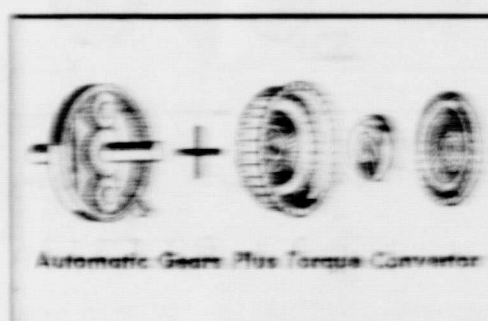
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
