District Conservation Meeting Held Here

A Soil Conservation meeting was held in the District Court Room of Dawson county, on Friday, July 19, 1935. This meeting was called for the purpose of discussing the Soil Conservation needs of the counties of this district.

Mr. Joe C. Williams, County Agent of Dawson county, was made Temporary Chairman, and the following permanent committee was elected by the County Agents and Agriculture Committee members attending:

Joe C. Williams, County Agent of Dawson county, Chairman; Lee R. Pool, County Agent of Gaines county, Recording Secretary; S. A. Debnam, County Agent of Martin county; O. G. Tumlinson, District Agent, College Station.

Mr. D. A. Dobkins, Assistant Extension Agent from Dalhart, Texas, explained in detail the work of the Soil Conservation Service, and a thorough round table discussion was had relative to its application to this district.

The following men were sent here by Mr. H. H. Finnell, Regional Director Soil Conservation Service E. C. W., Dalhart, Texas, to take part in these discussions. Mr. Finnell is the director of the West Texas Districts and camps.

Mr. D. A. Dobkins, Assistant Extension Agent, Chief of the party; W. R. Landrun, Agronomist; R. C. Nelson, Engineer; J. S. Porcher, Agriculture Engineer; J. C. Ebersole, Agronomist. W. R. Landrun and J. S. Porcher will be permanently assigned to this district.

The following gentlemen attended the full day session:

There were several other committee members and County Agents unable to attend due to previous engagements.

The government will through press releases and called meetings, explain to all, the part the Government will take in this work and the part the cooperatives, or owners and tenants will take; also just what each will furnish, as to labor, materials and supplies.

Educational and informative meetings are to be held over the entire district.

The S.C.S. E.C.W. organization expects to be completed and functioning within a short time. Headquarters will be at the OCC camp located at the edge of Lamesa, adjoining the ball park. Present officers are located in the County Agent's office, Lamesa, through the courtesy of Mr. Joe C. Williams.

The cooperation given and the interest shown by all the citizens who have been contacted has been of the very finest.

High School Receives New Credit

Official notice has been received by Supt. V. Z. Rogers that the application of Lamesa High School for the naming and accrediting of Social Ethics has been granted.

The course was given a broader name than that suggested locally but includes the same subject matter and the credit asked was one half unit. This credit will serve as a college entrance unit for those completing the course last year. Mr. McCollum was organizer and teacher of the course.

It was he who prepared the outlines, bibliographies and plans, expecting to name the course along the lines of some course already named. This was not possible in the list of some fifty subject and the State Department was requested to supply an appropriate name, if possible. The new course is now listed in the list of accredited subjects as "Contemporary Social and Economic Problems". It is a Senior course.

Two additional units were granted the local high school following the annual inspection. One unit each was granted in Orchestra and Band music.

The total accredited units now authorized total dmanw womenwom authorized for Lamesa High School are 31. Applications will be made for five additional units next session. Those to be requested will be general Science, second year band, second year orchestra, and first year Diversified Occupations for two units. The foregoing will be new subjects. It is expected also to revise the courses in Stenography to conform to the new State plan and this may call for additional accrediting in this subject.

Compliance Work to Begin July 29th

Measuring of Cotton Contracted farms will begin Monday, July 29th. Rented acres, as well as acres planted to cotton will be measured at the time the Compliance Supervisor visits the producers farm. Each producer should be present or have someone acting for him at the time the measuring is done so that the Compliance papers can be signed and the correct plot of ground, which has been set aside as rented acres, can be measured.

Acres planted to cotton on non-contracted farms where Bankhead applications have been made, will be measured at a later date. Forms for this compliance work have not yet reached the county agents office.

Corn on Cotton Contracted Land

All restrictions have been removed on corn produced on land covered by a Cotton Contract and not under a corn-hog contract so that a producer can sell the corn produced provided it is not produced on land rented to the government. If corn is produced on rented acres it can be used for home consumption only.

1934 Surplus Cotton Tax Exemption Certificate Pool

Following is a statement received from the Washington office concerning the account of Dawson county with the 1934 National Tax Exemption Certificate Pool: Pounds surrendered 9,691,870; pounds sold, 6,628,715; net equity of unsold pounds 3,063,155; First two cent distribution \$193,837.40; net final payment, \$68,606.95; total payment \$262,444.35.

The expense, incident to the sale of these certificates through the 1934 pool, was \$0.0041 per pound of tax exemption sold, or in more easily conceived figures, \$0.41 per hundred pounds of tax-exemption sold.

According to Bill White, Lamesa, who is in charge of the tournament each of the teams listed is strengthening their clubs, preparing to play their best baseball during this tournament.

It is quite a ways from New Orleans to Washington and distance often lends zest to ones labial effluvia of running off at the mouth, as in the case of Huey P. Long in his radio address in which he called president Roosevelt a liar, and used other words of defamation. While Mr. Roosevelt is not physically able to cope with the Louisiana senator, in physical combat it is dimes to doughnuts had the Kingfish been face to face when he called him a liar, the president would have swatted him one anyway. Senator Long's conduct in making such vituperative remarks about the president detracts rather than adds to his prestige, at least with thinking people whether or not they are in sympathy with the Roosevelt administration.

It is to be hoped that Gen. Hugh S. Johnson was right when he spoke before the American Business Club of Louisville, Ken., recently, when he said "the dam of money in the nation's banks will break next year and another boom result." Such prosperity as was coming, he said, would necessitate that steps be taken to prevent a recurrence of the "false" prosperity of 1929. He asserted that government control of agriculture, mining and industry and the building of stable, uniform markets for American made goods are the necessities to control the coming business boom.

Recently a lightweight Deisel power motor car, the first one built in this country, made the 3,774 mile trip from New York to Los Angeles, using only 109 gallons of fuel oil costing only \$7.63. That's going some and at less than one-fifth cent per mile.

At the close of the three day session of the Texas Cotton Investigating Committee meeting in the Baker Hotel at Dallas, R. E. L. Knight, a Dallas lawyer delivered an impassioned address, during which he referred to Cully A. Cobb, director of the cotton division A. A. as a propagandist. While Mr. Knight did not say what kind of a propagandist Mr. Cobb was, the following hectic diatribe with which he closed his address indicated the trend of his thought. Mr. Knight said: "Industrial interests of the North and East have grown rotten and fat because of the peonage to which farmers of the South have been subjected. They think they have been lured into a sense of security with the processing tax which appears to them to be a bribe. It is a bribe, yes, but it is a bribe that we pay to ourselves, camouflaged as a direct government subsidy. The farmer gets from 75 cents to \$1 a day for working from dawn to dark in his field. Every man who touches a bale of cotton after it leaves the farmers' hands receives from \$3 to \$6 per day. It is pitiable and a shame that we should be subjected to such ignominy, and I wish to state that we will not stand for it. Human nature will never cease to abuse power, and we will not allow the balance of power to remain where it can be used to keep the South in subjection."

In just a few more weeks the people of Texas are to vote on seven constitutional amendments. The one fraught with greatest interest is that proposing to repeal statewide prohibition. Considerable interest is manifested in the amendment which would give free text books to pupils in private and parochial schools which are taking great numbers of scholars from the public school system. The adoption of this amendment will undoubtedly weaken the Texas school system, and be the entering

wedge that may seriously cripple, if not ultimately destroy the efficiency of the public schools.

Huey Long is an extremist. But Extremists sometimes serve a good purpose. They stir up things, and direct public attention to evils that should be corrected. There is some talk of a third party running Huey Long for president next year. If one of the old parties should take all the good timbers out of his proposed platform, the third party would not have anything to stand on. Many years ago there was a very strong third party in Texas. The Democrats took many of their best doctrines and put them in their platform, and broke up and absorbed the third party. Try it on Huey, or it will be difficult to get rid of him.—Snatches Here and There, in Williamson County Sun.

The Third Party just recently organized may be able to profit by the mistakes made by its predecessors and copyright its "Good Timbers" so they cannot be taken by either one of the old parties. Way back yonder the Free Soilers had some good timbers. Some party, probably the Whigs—fobbers of the Republican party, took them. Later on the Greenbackers had some good timbers—the Democrats took some of them. Still later as suggested above, there was a very strong party, strong in Texas, which had some very excellent timber in its platform. The Republican party in the North and the Democratic party in the South took everything this party had, except Big Bale tobacco and the Fourth of July. They adulterated the tobacco so that even the veriest hayseeder in the third party could not use it, and as for the "Glorious Fourth" the old parties claimed they were its original discoverers, and it did not amount to very much any way. If the new party puts out a good platform with Huey Long as its head, it is very probable their principles will be too "hot" to be "put" as suggested.

Some one recently said it would be dangerous for a few men to corner the wheat of the country, for they could then set an exorbitant price on it and make millions. And it is just as dangerous to set a combination country and fix exorbitant prices of men corner the money of the on all articles of trade to fill their pockets. And it is more dangerous to retain the relics of barbarism in our federal constitution by which the balance of power is exercised for the benefit of the big interest class.

Courier readers, are you keeping up with the vital measures pending in the congress which are trembling in the balance on account of the opposition of the big interests which are using every means in their power to secure their defeat.

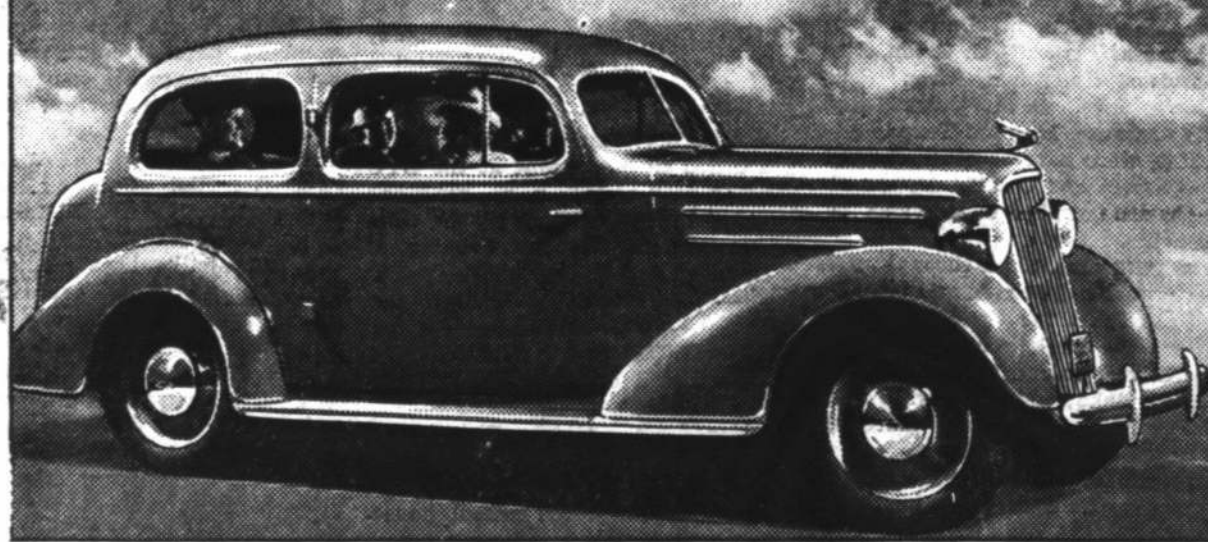

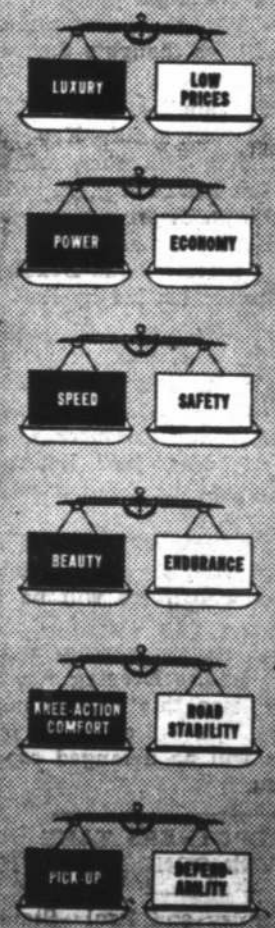

WARNED TO KEEP STOCK OFF STATE HIGHWAYS

The Legislature of the State of Texas this year passed a law providing that any person owning or controlling any horse, mule, donkey, cow, bull, steer, sheep, goat or any other livestock who permits the same to run at large unattended on that portion of any designated State highway in this State which is inclosed by fences on both sides shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. Each day such livestock are allowed or permitted to run at large is a separate offense. The punishment for each offense shall be a fine of any sum not more than two hundred dollars (\$200.00). The law further provides that State Highway Patrolmen as well as local sheriffs and other local officers shall have the power to enforce said law.

This law will become effective on August 10, 1935, and thereafter will be strictly enforced upon the complaint of any citizen of Texas.

During the past few years livestock running at large on State highways have become a dangerous menace to the traveling public. Because of the carelessness and neglect of those who own or control such livestock, numerous accidents have occurred by reason of the collision of automobiles, lawfully operated upon the said highway, with such livestock. A large number of people have been killed and others have been so seriously injured as to be maimed for life. In addition, untold property damage has resulted.

The State Highway Department asks every citizen in this locality to cooperate with this Department, with the local peace officers and with the State Highway Patrol in the enforcement of this law to the end that the State highways in this locality may be made more safe for the traveling public.

Demonstrator Provides Clothes Closets for Each Member of Family

A place for everything and everything in its place is now possible for Mrs. W. C. McKenzie since she has provided three clothes closets as a part of her work as wardrobe demonstrator in the Klondike club. Each closet extends to the ceiling, is two and one-half feet deep and is papered with light gray paper. They are equipped with a rod with sufficient hangers for clothing that is to be hung up and shelves for shoes and folded garments.

The rod in the daughter's closet is placed low enough that she can easily hang her own clothes.

Fifteen women in the Klondike club are working on foundation patterns. Eleven have completed and made 23 garments by them. Mrs. McKenzie has used her foundation pattern to make two blouses, five dresses and a suit and a slip.

Record of Clothing Expenditure Kept For First Time

"This is the first time I ever kept account of the cost of my clothing," writes Mrs. E. L. Craddock, wardrobe demonstrator in the Wilson club. By using her foundation pattern to make 16 garments, Mrs. Craddock has been able to dress her self appropriately for street, church and home at a cost of \$26.36.

Three members in the Wilson club have remodeled clothes. A total of 40 dresses and 6 slips have been made by the 12 women who have made foundation patterns.

Style and Suitability to Type Is Demonstrators Benefit in Wardrobe Work

"The demonstration has taught me to be careful in selecting material, style and color and to always get what is suitable for my type," is the report made by Mrs. Gus Schmidt, demonstrator in the Central Club. As a demonstrator, Mrs. Schmidt has not only been interested in having better fitting dresses with more style but she has cut and fitted 35 foundation patterns for non-club members and club members. There have been a total of 25 dresses and 12 slips made by members of the Central club and 8 dresses made by other women whom she cut patterns for.

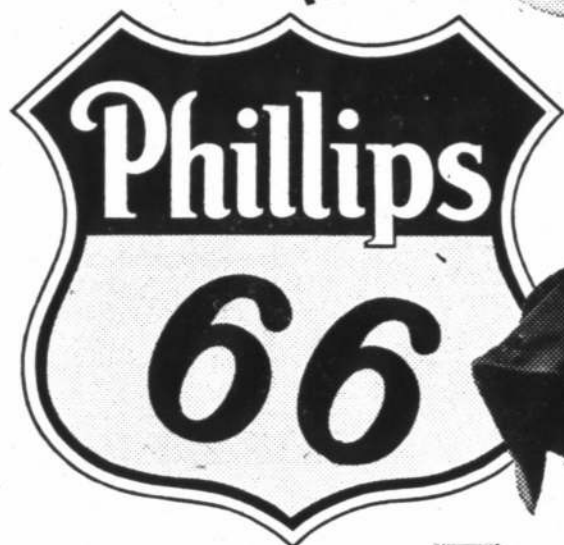

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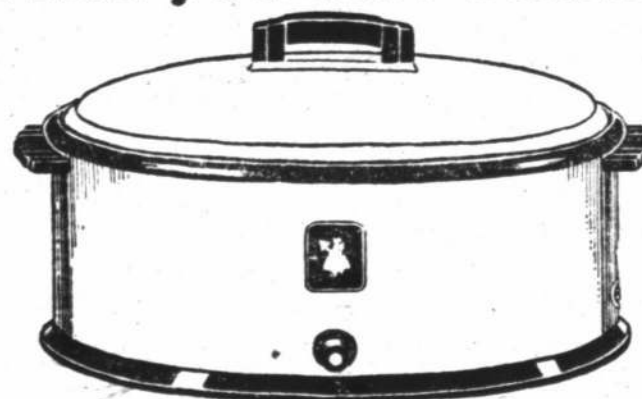

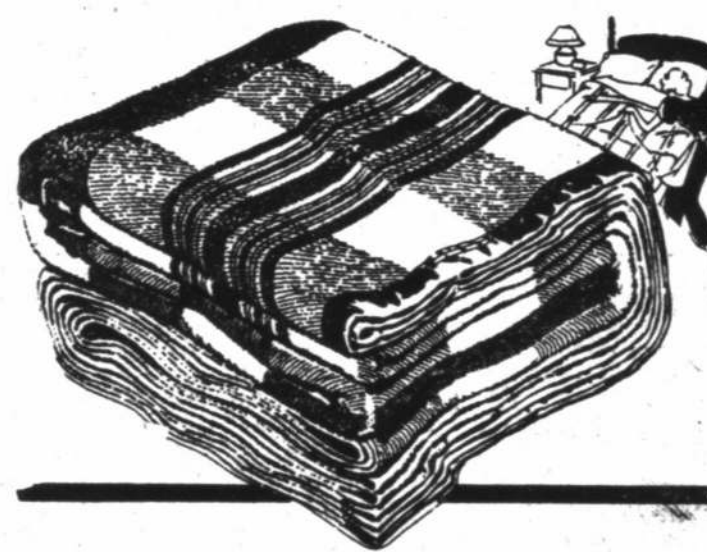
