## State Park Needs Added Facilities

The need for additional camping and picnicking facilities at Lake Colorado City State Park was the subject of a recent meeting in Austin of the Parks and Wildlife staff.

Two seasons of use of the state park indicate a need for campsites and picnic tables to be added.

The department staff made its recommendations at a briefing session of the Parks and Wildlife Commission.

Clayton Garrison, executive director of the department, said, "People will drive a tremendous distance to use the parks in West Texas. One hundred to 200 miles means nothing in West Texas when you're talking about water recreation."

Paul Schlimper, parks director, said average weekend use during the peak season was

over 400 per cent for camping facilities.

"For every camp space, you had four campers. We even had campers in picnic areas and picnickers went wherever they could find room," Schlimper said.

Local park rangers said that there are 35 campsites with electricity hookups, including picnic facilities of table, grill and pad. There are also 30 picnic sites and 2 large restrooms, one with shower facilities.

State representative Elmer Martin, vice-chairman of the Environmental Affairs Committee which handles all Parks and Wildlife legislation in the Texas legislature, this summer appealed personally to top officials in the Parks and Wildlife department to make additional improvements at the lake.

"My message to them was that the second phase of Lake Colorado City State Park development definitely is overdue," Martin said at the time. "I simply told Parks and

Wildlife the plain fact is that the park cannot provide for the huge throngs coming from all over West Texas unless the park has more camp sites, shelters, restrooms, a fishing

pier and picnic units," Martin stated.

Martin said that statistics compiled by P&W revealed that the Colorado City State Park has an utilization rate of 600 per cent, in other words, the park was crowded with six times the number of persons it is equipped to handle in its first phase of development.

Martin complimented the Colorado City Chamber of Commerce and State Park personnel for compiling data and material which emphasizes the growing need for the park.

Schlimper said that additional facilities are badly needed if the park is to reach maximum recreational potential.

## Grant Possible For Ambulance

Ambulance service improvement and discussion of whether or not to request a federal grant to be administered by the state for additional ambulance equipment was the topic of a meeting here Thursday afternoon.

Ambulance Committee members Paul Hunter, Eddie Piland and Wayne Shawn, along with County Judge Bill Carter, city manager James Campbell, Police Chief Jesse Browning and Root Hospital administrator Charles Root met with two representatives from the Texas Department of Health Resources, formerly the Department of Health, Thursday afternoon, discussing a possible grant to purchase an additional van type ambulance, equipment and communications equipment.

Jim Robinson and Micky Hubbard, Region 4 coordinator for the department on communications, explained the grant and requirements for operating the Ambulance Service after the grant is received.

Hunter, the county's representative on the committee, said that no decision was reached by the group, as it was more of an informational type meeting, but the three groups, city, county and hospital district, may take action after the committee studies the matter further.

"According to Hunter, the committee will study and determine ways the three entities which run the Ambulance Service can meet the additional requirements if the grant is requested and made.

The service is eligible for a grant for half the amount needed to purchase an additional ambulance, equipment for it and radio equipment for the additional ambulance plus the ambulance service now has.

Cost of the additions would be \$28,000 and half that

amount, \$14,000, to be charged to the local ambulance service to be split three ways. Hunter has previously informed the county commissioners that the cost to the county, city and hospital district would be \$4,000 each, the additional \$3,000 to be paid from funds the service now has on hand for contingency expenses.

Cost to the county, city and hospital district is currently \$2,500 each year and the \$4,000 would be added for the grant.

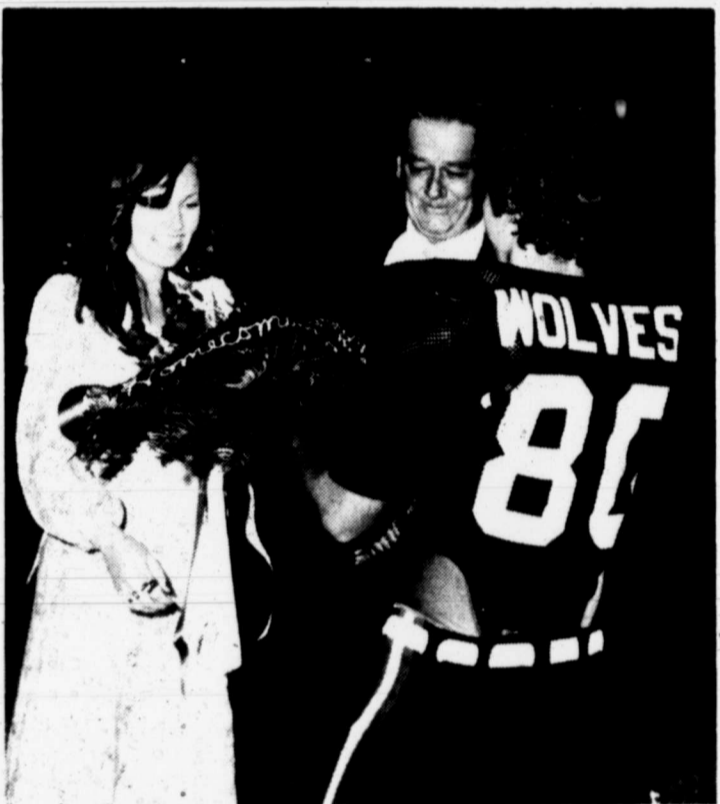
Hunter said that according to the two department representatives, two men would be required to make each ambulance run if the grant is received here, requiring an additional expense for operations.

The committee estimates that \$1,200 per month would be required for paying drivers' salaries alone.

"For an ambulance service which makes an average of 19 calls per month, it doesn't seem worth it," Hunter said, adding that the operation of the ambulance was taken over by the three governing entities in the first place because of a need for the service and in order to save money for operations by having city, county and hospital personnel handle the driving chores.

In addition, drivers would have to meet strict training requirements by attending a special school, which the department representatives said might be set up at Western Texas College in Snyder or at the satellite campus in Colorado City's Wallace Center. Details of the training school have not yet been worked out, Robinson and Hubbard said.

"What it all boils down to," Hunter explained, "is can we do it and how. If we take the federal grant, we'd have a fine ambulance, which we already

## Wolves Lose Battle 27-20

A large Colorado City homecoming crowd saw a thriller Friday night as the Colorado City Wolves led 13-12 at halftime over the Stamford Bulldogs, were tied 20-20 late in the fourth quarter but then lost the game when Stamford scored with 2:29 left in the game.

Final score in the District 6-AA contest was 27-20.

It was a hard hitting contest with the fans seeing all kinds of outstanding football play by both teams.

The Stamford Bulldogs, a small but lightning quick team, took the opening kick-off and drove 72 yards with speedster Don Earl racing the final 17 steps for the score. The try for extra point failed.

The Wolves were unable to get started offensively in the first quarter and didn't have a first down in the opening period.

In the second quarter, the Bulldogs marched 51 yards after recovering a Colorado City fumble with Quarterback Bryan Tabor running 11 yards for the score. The try for two points failed, giving Stamford a 12-0 lead.

With some four minutes left in the first half, the Wolves started a drive from their own 44 after a good kick-off return by Pete Parham. Six plays later, it was Parham who was on the receiving end of a Ray

Torrez pass for 34 yards and the score. Steve Belvin kicked the point after.

With time running out, the Wolves charged in and tackled the Stamford quarterback as he attempted to pass, creating a fumble recovered by the Wolves inside the Stamford 30 yardline.

With 19 seconds left in the half, Torrez hit Benny Arispe in the end zone with a 10 yard aerial for the score. The kick for extra point was blocked, making the score at halftime 13-12.

During halftime ceremonies, the Wolf Band put on a polished show that concluded with them in a heart shaped formation.

With the lights out, the bandmen placed red filtered flashlights beside them and the candidates for homecoming queen were announced and took their place in the center of the heart.

High School Principal Bill Everett then announced the winner, Toni Wulfjen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James D. Wulfjen.

The Wolves took the kick-off to open the second half and marched into Stamford territory but on fourth down and two to go, the Wolves came up short and turned the ball over to the Bulldogs.

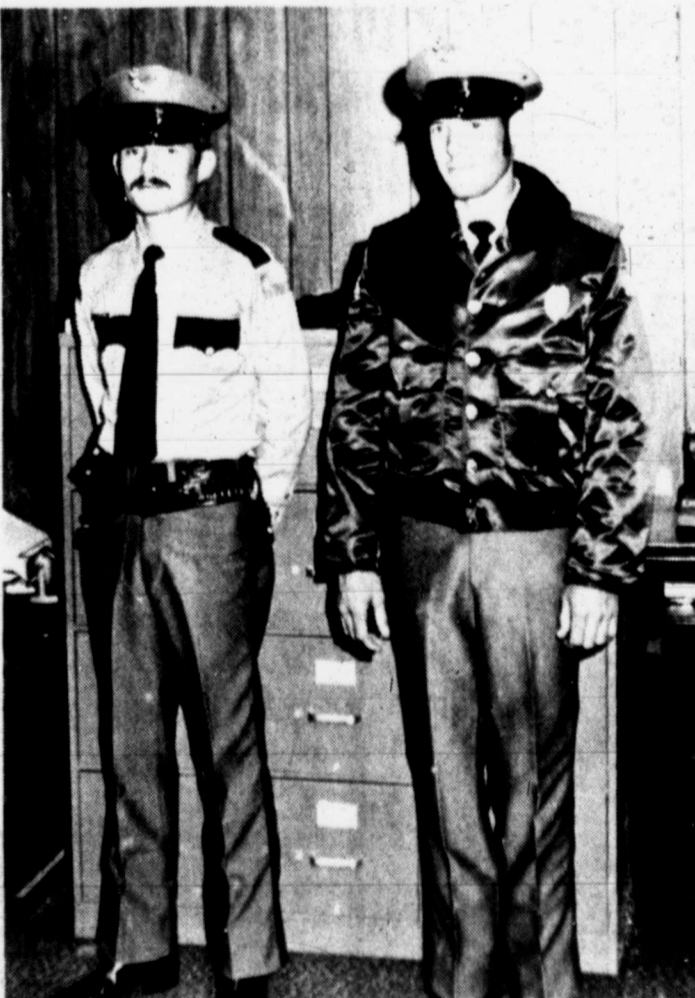
Mrs. Ramona Molina has been hired as an Outreach worker at the Wallace Community Education Center.

Mrs. Molina will be visiting older adults in the county to find out how the Center can meet some of their needs, Wallace administrator Mrs. Barbara Gray said.

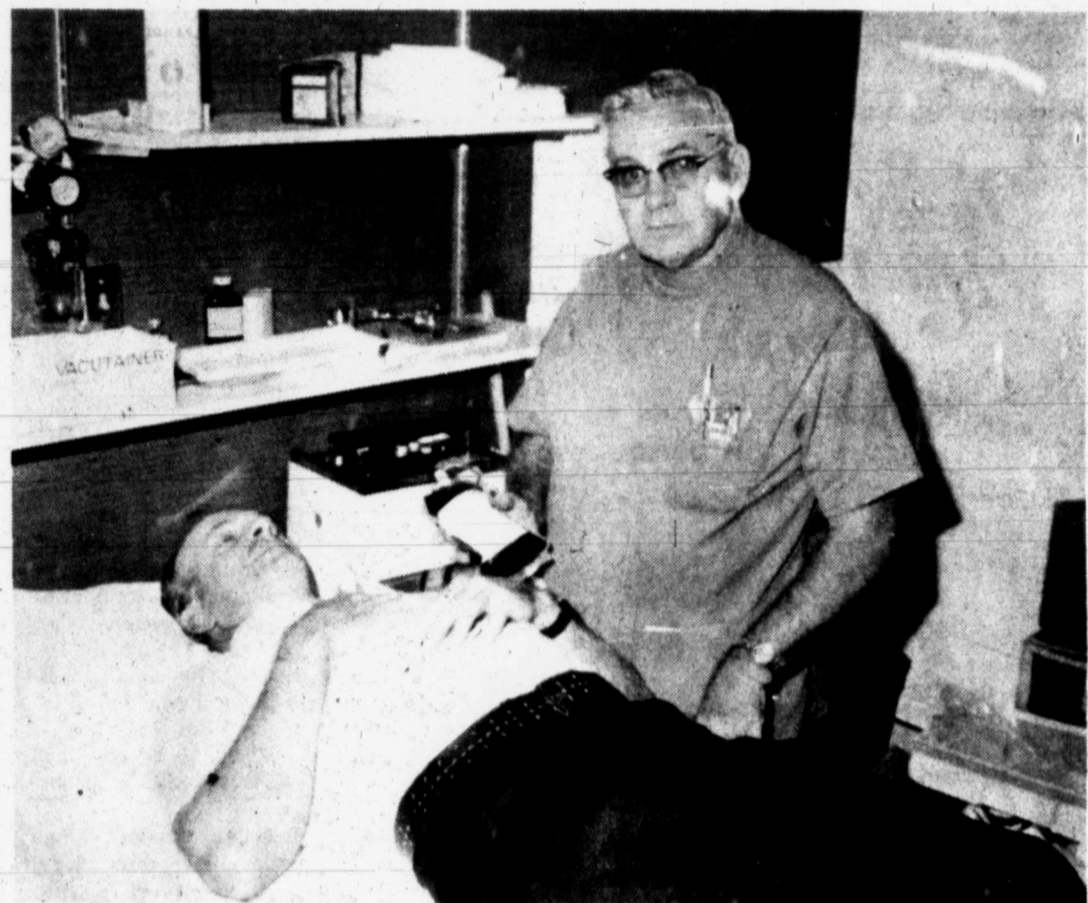
She will assist with transportation to and from the Center and for shopping, banking, medical and other necessary trips locally.

## Commissioners To Get Petition

Mitchell County commissioners meet in regular monthly session Tuesday and will probably set the date for a special local option election in Precinct Three for November 4, the same date as the Constitutional election.

The petition was presented to the county clerk's office Sept. 15 with 222 signatures but it has not yet been officially certified by the clerk. Names have to be checked and certified as eligible, registered voters of Precinct Three and there must be 168 certified signatures on the petition before the commissioners can act and set the date for an election.

The petition calls for an election to legalize the sale of alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption in Precinct Three.

According to law, the commissioners court must set an election date in not less than 20 days nor more than 30 days following presentation of the certified petition.

There are about 1,425 registered voters in Precinct 3 but only 478 voted in the last gubernatorial election. Thirty-five percent of those 478 voters represent the 168 signatures required on the certified petition.

## Shug Bowlin Speaks To Zeta Delta Club

Zeta Delta Study Club met Tuesday evening in the home of Barbara Corbell.

Shug Bowlin, from Texas Electric Service Company, presented a program on stripmining and ecology.

Slides were shown on the lignite power plant at Fairfield and the construction of the nuclear power plant at Glenrose.

Bowlin pointed out that the fuels used in the United States are in the shortest supply. While oil and natural gas account for 75% of the nations energy consumption, they represent less than 6% of all energy resources.

"Since coal and uranium make up 94% of the nations total energy resources, it is necessary to reduce our dependence on oil and gas and use these more abundant fuels instead," Bowlin continues.

"It is estimated we have about 50 years supply of lignite."

Members were shown the various ways Texas Electric conserves the environment at these lignite plants such as restoring land to productivity equal to or better than it was originally after it is mined. Bowlin further pointed out that 98% of the fly ash from the lignite is removed by electrostatic precipitators before any fuel gases are sent up the stacks.

The electric company also has a research center, the only one of its kind in Texas, where nine students live and are engaged in research projects on environmental control.

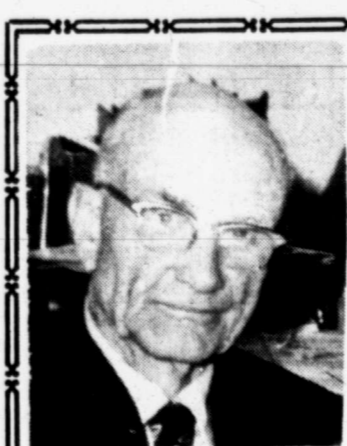

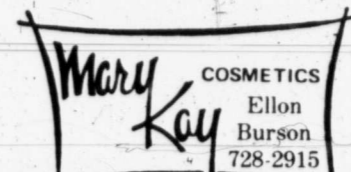
Tarrant County South of Fort Worth, and David West, vice-president, Lee College of Baytown.

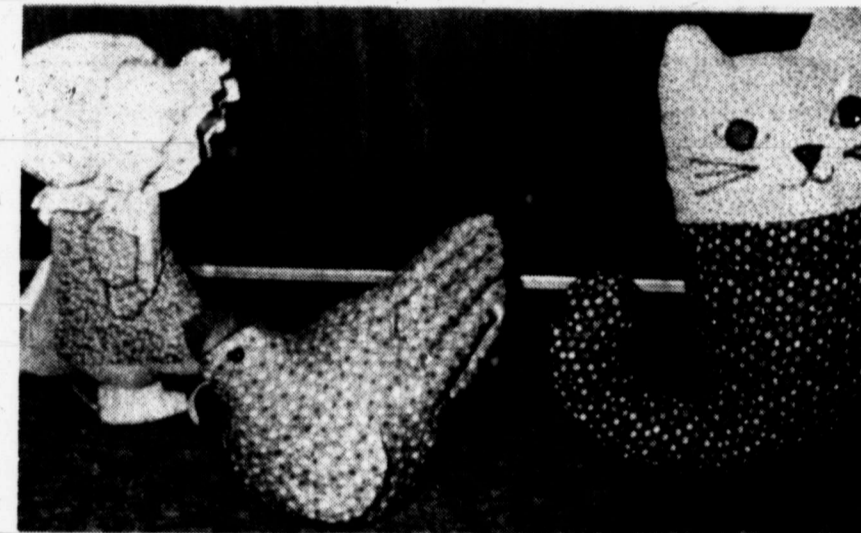

Colorado City's Junior Varsity lost another squeaker to Hamlin JV Thursday night in Wolf Stadium, final score 7-6. They lost 14-6 against Coahoma last week.

The Hamlin bunch scored first and made their extra point. Then the Colorado City team scored on a 70-yard run, quarterback Danny Torrez scoring on a veer keeper. The extra point attempt, a pass try for two, went wide and the score was 7-6 for the rest of the game, the young Wolves missing two field goal tries in the latter part of the game.

Coach Lonnie Ellis said the team did a good job at defense, mentioning good effort by Matt Sheppard at his defensive end and offensive tackle post. Quarterback Torrez did a good job at offense, the coach said, and gave defenders Gary Hulme, Craig Carter, Bill Jordan, Ricky Rivera and Scott Neff credit for good play. Neff recovered a fumble during the game, the coach said. Joe Franco and Dobie Williams also played good games, Ellis said.

The team has an open date this Thursday and will meet Anson here for a 7:30 p.m. kickoff Oct. 23.

The Wolves came right back on their next possession and moved from their own 15 to score, with the final 64 yards coming on a pass to Tight End Pete Parham who caught a pass from Ray Torrez after it was tipped by a Stamford defender. ## Knowing Signs For JRA Is Helpful

Learning to live with a chronic disease for which there is no cure can be miserable. It is bad enough for an adult, but what happens when the victim is a child?

An adult may be able to grit his teeth and grin and bear it. But how can a child understand and cope with the possibility of being crippled for life?

This is only part of the dilemma that faces over a half million people in the United States. They are the parents of children who are victims of juvenile rheumatoid arthritis. This serious disease is called JRA for short, but it can last a lifetime - sometimes forever.

Learning to live with JRA is a real challenge. But growing up healthy is an even greater challenge for the 250,000 youngsters with the disease. It can begin suddenly or quietly, subside after a few weeks or months - or continue unchecked. And, in every case, there is always the risk that it will return.

One form of JRA, called Still's Disease, begins violently and is particularly serious. Usually a child feels normal until his temperature suddenly soars. He gets a rash and sometimes the heart and lungs become affected. Pain or tenderness in one or more joints occurs.

Two milder forms of JRA begin less dramatically. One starts with involvement of four or more joints, and is accompanied by a slight fever and occasionally a rash. In the mildest form, a youngster can have arthritis in a single joint.

In one out of ten JRA cases, especially with the mildest forms of the disease, a serious eye disease called iridocyclitis also develops. If left untreated,

this disease can even result in blindness.

The Arthritis Foundation strongly urges parents to watch for the first signs of arthritis in their children - and themselves. Rheumatoid arthritis afflicts five million Americans of all ages and is one of the most crippling forms of the disease.

JRA affects each youngster differently, depending on the severity and form the disease takes, and on the quality of care the child receives. Some of the minor effects of JRA include legs of slightly different lengths, a stiff knee, or shortness of stature. Without proper treatment, youngsters can suffer severe physical and psychological disabilities - not to mention the vocational, economic and social deprivation that await them as adults.

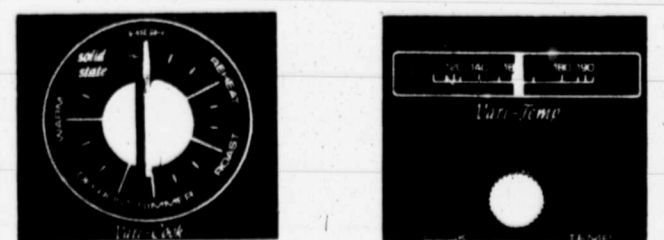
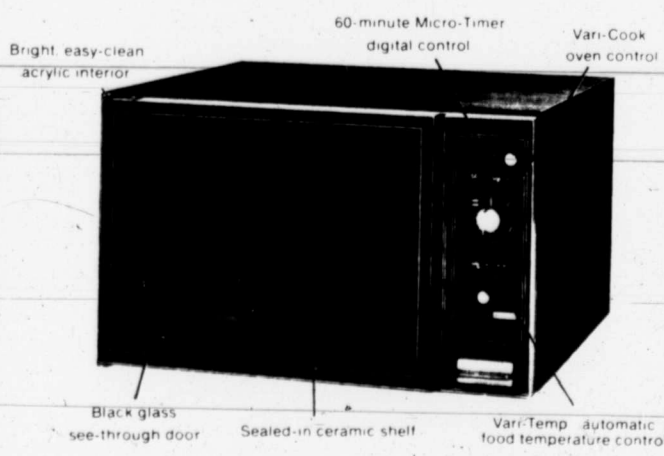
About 70 percent of youngsters with arthritis will outgrow the disease by puberty. But even they must receive good medical care to assure that damage does not remain when the disease recedes.

In order to minimize the effects of the disease, children should receive ongoing medical supervision, including physical therapy, exercise, and rest. Counseling by a psychiatrist or social worker may also be needed to help the child and his family handle various problems in daily living.
