70 VACANCIES IN TEXAS HIGHWAY PATROL

AUSTIN, Sept. 2.—The state police are looking for qualified young men to help police the wartime home front. With more than 100 of his officers on leave with the armed forces, State Police Director Homer Garrison has announced the appointment of 40 drivers' license examiners and issued a call for applicants to fill 70 vacancies in the highway patrol.

The license examiners, who play a vital part in keeping down costly accidents that sap the state's productive and economic strength, will report to Camp Mabry, Sept. 7, to begin a two-week training school devoted entirely to examination work. There is insufficient time, Garrison said, to give them the full seven-week state police training course.

Applicants must be between 23 and 35 years old and not less than five feet eight inches in height. They must weigh not less than two nor more than three pounds per inch of height at the time of appointment, have a high school education or its equivalent, and be able to pass strict physical, mental and moral scrutiny.

Application forms are available by writing to Col. Homer Garrison, director, department of public safety, Austin.

TEXAS IS LEADING THE WAY

AUSTIN, Sept. 2.—Texans in the armed forces now number almost a quarter of a million, Governor Coke Stevenson was advised today by Brigadier General J. Watt Page, adjutant general of Texas.

Texas has more volunteers in the armed forces than any other state.

As of August 15, 1942, Texas had 140,000 volunteers, with 100,000 not volunteers, who were inducted through selective service, making a total of 240,000 Texans in the armed forces.

FORT WORTH, Sept. 2.—One hundred Coast Guard recruits, signed up Tuesday in the Fort Worth recruiting office, were en route Wednesday to a training center. The men made up the largest group of men ever signed in the office here in a single day.

U. S. PLANES AND TANKS IN DESERT BATTLE

CAIRO, Sept. 2.—British and German tanks are locked in fierce battle on a widening front which now extends 20 miles up from the Himeimat Peak at the southern end of the Alamein line to the Ruweisat Ridge at the north-central stretch.

British forces took the initiative at the northern end of the line, near the Mediterranean, launching out in offensive raids which resulted in the capture of many German prisoners, the communique said.

In one sector of the front a small force of U. S. army tanks were in the battle zone, eager to clash with the Germans.

U. S. army airplanes were fully engaged and the communique said that Monday evening American bombers, along with planes of the Royal and South American Air forces and of the British Mediterranean fleets, successfully attacked targets in the battle area and Axis landing fields behind the line.

Long-range fighters attacked enemy motor transport along the coastal road running back to Libya.

The communique of the Middle Eastern Command of the Royal Air Force indicated that German Field Marshal Rommel was now actually embarked on the supreme offensive which he hoped would take him on to Alexandria 80 miles to the east.

It was believed that Rommel's powerful tank forces had now clashed directly with the armored corps of Gen. Harold R. L. Alexander after two days in which the Axis advanced elements had probed out the Imperial defense line.

Where the fighting had started at the Himeimat Peak, dominating the southern end of the front eight miles from the Qattara salt bog depression, the fighting had now spread, the communique made known, all the way up to the Ruweisat Ridge, bloodily contested again and again, which runs from east to west below the coastal road.

Gen. Alexander threw powerful artillery forces, which undoubtedly had been strengthened in recent weeks, into the battle line to support his tanks.

It seemed clear that Rommel was trying to roll up the British left flank, at the southern end of the line, so he could strike northward to hit the main El Alamein-Alexandria highway and follow it westward to Alexandria and the greatest triumph of his spectacular career.

WILLKIE IN CAIRO

CAIRO, Sept. 2.—Wendell L. Willkie, enroute to Russia, India and China, among other places, arrived here by plane Wednesday.

CO. NAVY QUOTA IS 34

DALLAS, Sept. 2.—Figures released today, crediting the North Texas navy recruiting district with enlisting 3,243 men during August, showed that Eastland county, with a quota of 28 recruits, contributed 15 recruits to the monthly total, the highest in the history of the district.

Encouraged by the banner month of enlistments, 243 above the assigned quota and 1,116 more than ever before sworn in during a single month in the district, Lieut. L. H. Ridout, Jr., officer in charge, established 3,600 recruits as the September quota. Eastland county's September quota is 34.

MARRIED MEN TO COME LAST SAYS MR. MAY

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—Chairman Andrew J. May (Democrat, Kentucky) of the House Military Affairs Committee said today that on the basis of a Selective Service survey of manpower requirements, married men with dependent wives and children should not be drafted for another year and a half, and "possibly not at all."

"In any event," he said, "married men with wives and children who have no other means of support and have no families to return to, should permanently be deferred by draft boards. That is the intent of the draft law, and if it is not clear it should be made clear."

NORTH IRELAND TOUCHY

BELFAST, Sept. 2.—The appearance of two United States soldiers on Belfast streets touched off the first disorders Wednesday since after Thomas J. Williams, 18-year-old member of the outlawed Irish Republican Army, was hanged in a heavily guarded jail for killing a policeman. When police sought to disperse a crowd of about 300 persons, angrily shouting at the Americans, "Why don't you stay at home?" two demonstrators hurled missiles.

LONDON THINKS NAZIS WITHIN 15 MILES OF THE VITAL VOLGA RIVER CITY; SITUATION TENSE

MOSCOW, Sept. 2.—Russian dispatches reported today that Soviet forces defending the southwest approaches to Stalingrad have been forced to retreat to a new line — the fourth withdrawal in 48 hours — and that the peril to the vital Volga city was mounting by the hour.

(It was believed in London that the Germans were about 15 miles from Stalingrad on the southwest.)

A large Nazi armored force was reported to have broken through the southwest defense lines despite desperate Soviet efforts to halt its progress.

On the front northwest of Stalingrad, the Nazis were again on the move, dispatches said, and danger of a break-through in that region was admitted.

(The German high command claimed that Nazi troops have reached the Volga river north of Stalingrad.)

"Southwest of Stalingrad, Soviet troops engaged in tense fighting with enemy tanks which have broken through," the Soviet noon communique said. "One of our units in fierce fighting destroyed 12 enemy tanks and about one company of infantry."

JAP PRESSURE IN NEW GUINEA AREA GROWING

MACARTHUR HEADQUARTERS, Australia, Sept. 2.—Allied infantry cooperation planes have made two heavy attacks on Japanese combat forces who are thrusting with steadily increasing power against Australian troops in the Kokoda area 55 miles across New Guinea from Port Moresby, Gen. Douglas MacArthur announced today.

Raging fighter planes, in close support of veteran Australian jungle fighters, swept down over the Owen Stanley Mountains to the Kokoda operations area on the northern slopes and raked enemy troops and communications with machine-gun and cannon fire at tree-top level in two separate raids.

Interest heightened in Japanese operations, which seemed increasingly to indicate the possibility of a real attempt to break through the Australian defenses, pour through the 8,000-foot mountain pass, and swoop down to the south toward Port Moresby, great Allied advanced base on the south New Guinea coast.

Dispatches indicated that the Australians had succeeded so far in holding the enemy to the area of Kokoda village, but it was evident that the Japanese were increasing their pressure steadily.

CHURCH RAISED \$785,000.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 2.—The Presbyterian church in the United States of America raised \$785,000 during the fiscal year for war emergency work besides regular contributions, the annual report showed Wednesday.

SEVEN FLIERS KILLED

BATON ROUGE, La., Sept. 2.—Seven fliers from Harding Field are believed to have been killed when a bomber crashed in flames in Wilkinson county, Mississippi, about 9:30 p. m. Tuesday.

Dispatches from the front said the tank forces which broke through were large, and that the penetration was on the southwest wing of the sector, or the sector nearest the Volga river.

Northwest of Stalingrad, where yesterday the Russians were reported to have control of the situation, once more was threatened by greedily increased German pressure. Above that point, in the Kizilsaysa area, 75 miles northwest of Stalingrad, the Germans and Italians had taken the offensive in an effort to relieve their left flank, dispatches said.

The noon communique asserted that Soviet troops in their central front offensive opposite Moscow had occupied several more inhabited localities and that Soviet artillery was inflicting heavy losses on the Germans.

Dispatches said the Russian position also had sharply deteriorated in the North Caucasus. The Russians were reported to have fallen back farther south of Krasnodar, where the Germans were driving a short remaining distance to the Black sea by the northern hills.

The battle for the oil fields of Grozny also has begun in earnest. The Germans were smashing vigorously against a water barrier at Terek, near Mordok, and thrown numerous pontoons across, of which the Russians had destroyed 12. Mordok is 65 miles from Grozny.

SAN ANGELO TOPS

DALLAS, Sept. 2.—August marked the third successive month in which the San Angelo navy recruiting office led the North Texas navy district in enlistments. Lieut. L. H. Ridout, Jr., district recruiter, said Wednesday. Four sub-stations in the district exceeded their quotas, set on a population basis, San Angelo leading with 228 per cent of its quota, Fort Worth recording 211 per cent, Amarillo 141 per cent and Big Spring, 113 per cent.

30 YEARS FOR SPY

NEWARK, N. J., Sept. 2.—Herbert K. F. Bahr, convicted of conspiracy to serve Germany as a spy, received a 30-year prison sentence Wednesday.

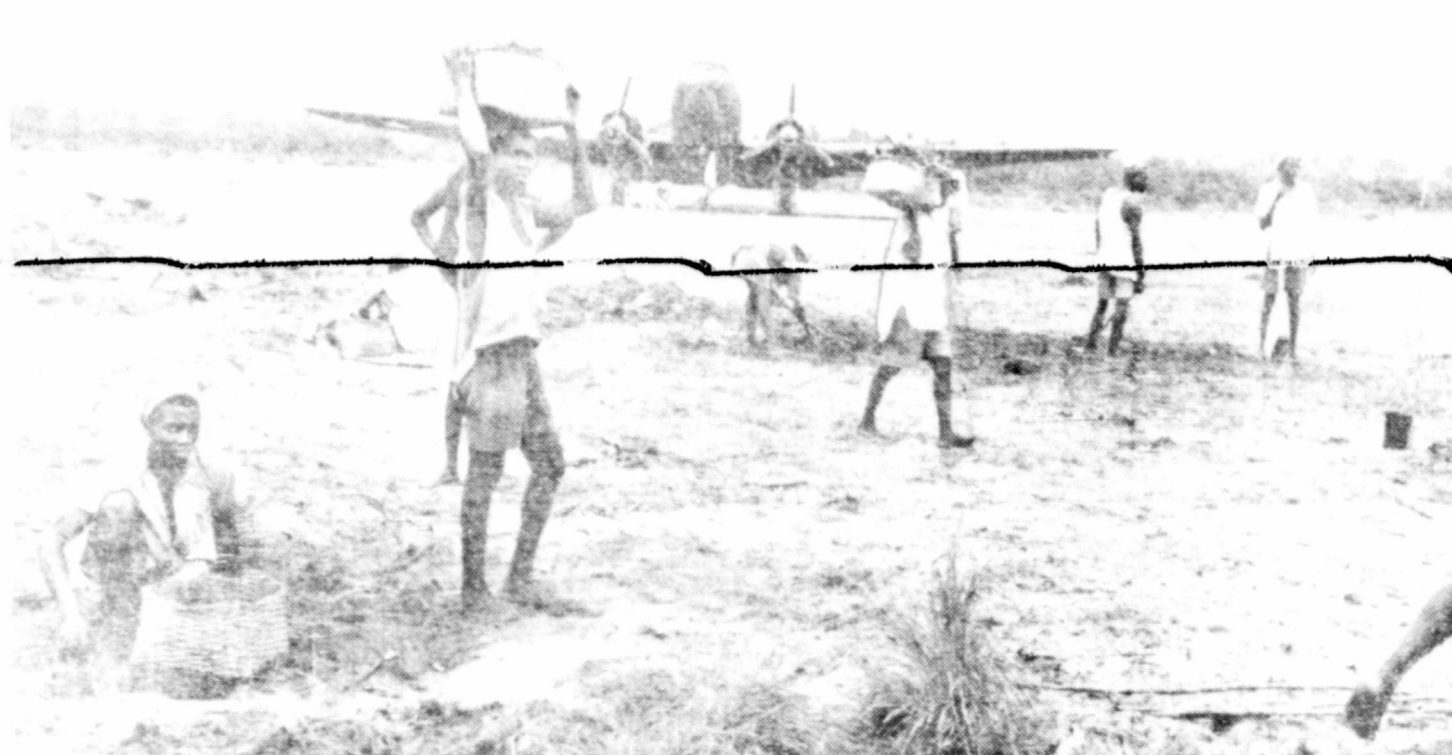

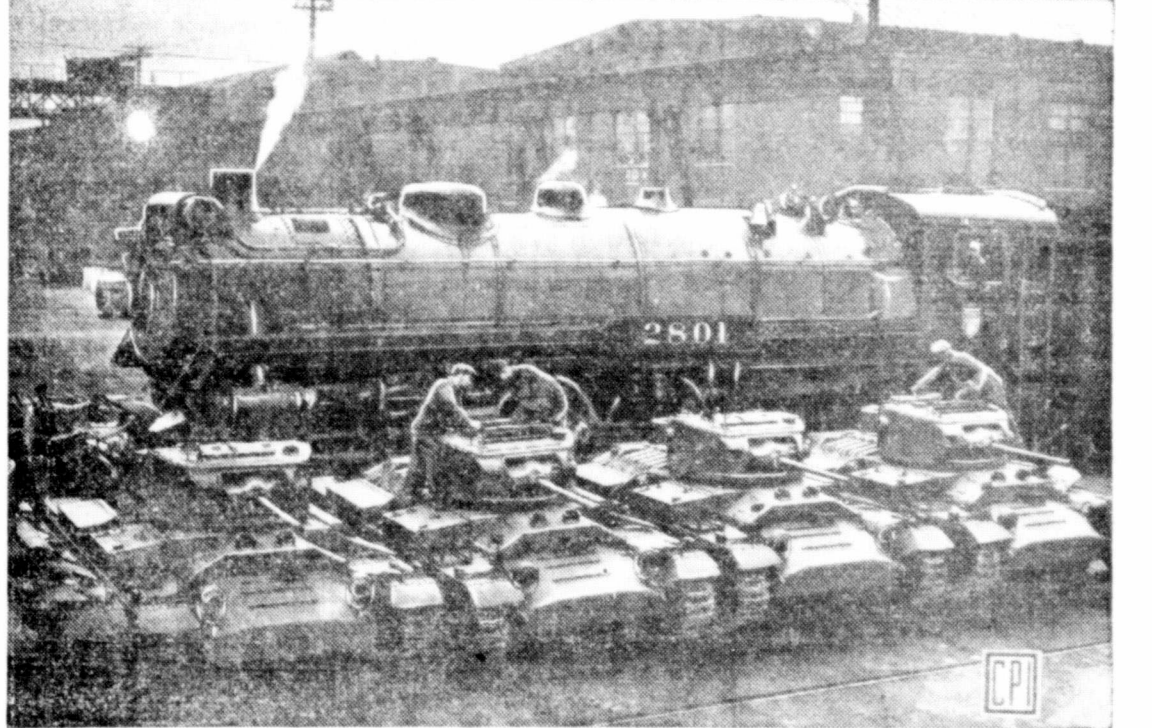

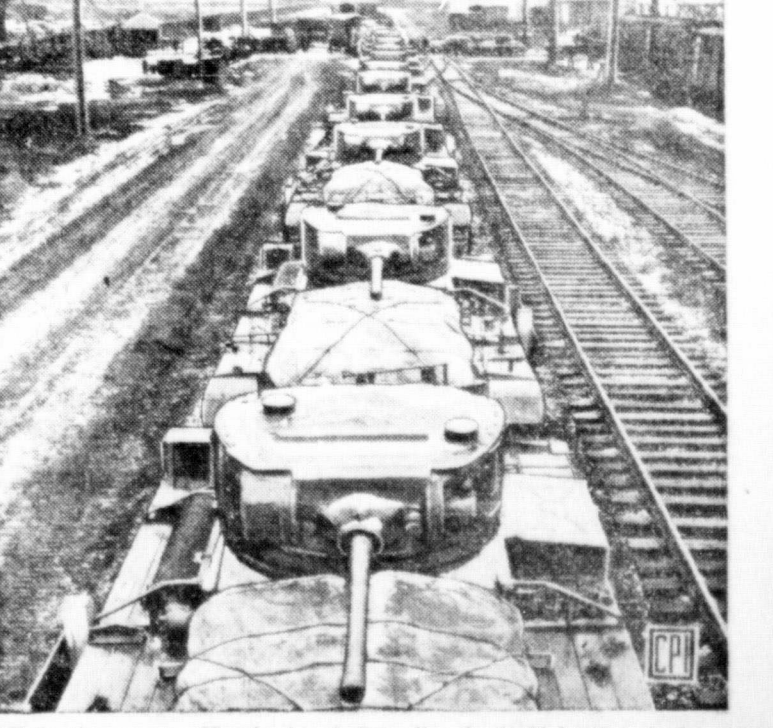
