Well Texans, it is my sad duty to report that one of the better organized pressure groups have obtained a court ruling that will take your pocketbook for another loss. The Texas State Board of Optometry has obtained a court ruling allowing them to ban advertising by optometric firms and to close "prescription firms" such as Lee's Optical. This means that the day of the \$16.50 glasses in Texas is numbered. We will be forced to pay whatever fees a close group of well organized optometrists choose to soak the public. Look at our neighboring state of New Mexico. They outlaw optometric advertising and have a board controlling the industry. You cannot go to Clovis and get glasses for less than around \$45.00 and up, usually way up.

This is another example of flagrant abuse of laws by self serving public bodies. There is nothing wrong with \$16.50 glasses. The optometrists who fit and prescribe for the large chains are required to pass the same tests administered by the same board as the "ethical" man who sits in a plush office getting the much larger fee, I am currently wearing a pair of much more expensive glasses than \$16.50. They do not feel a bit better than the ones I first bought for \$16.50. If one am going back to the \$16.50 glasses the next time I need a change. At least I think I am. By then, the free enterprise system may be as dead as a dodo in Texas, killed by YOUR Optometric Board.

There is a remedy, Bill No. SB 423 is pending in the Texas Senate. This bill will allow optometric firms to continue much as they are doing at present and to advertise their wares. This bill is currently being considered by the Senate Committee on Public Health. Members from this area to whom you can write are State Senators Grady Hazelwood, H. J. Blanchard, Dorsey B. Hardean, and the chairman, Don Kinnard.

If this bill is not passed, me, you, we, ALL of us will be paying considerably more for our glasses by this time next year. Not only is this a real bread and butter issue, but its broad implications strike at the heart of the free enterprise system. This form of public gouging must cease, and here is a good place to start stopping the multiplicity of petty boards from fleecing the public.

Write today to the above mentioned committee members and also to our State Senator Jack Hightower. The people must be heard and heard soon or we will again let apathy rob us of a bit more of our freedoms.

One of the very informative sheets to cross our desk is the "Facts for You," published by the research and education division of the Texas Farm Bureau. I find it particularly refreshing in its commonsense approach to Communism and the communist menace. As near as we can tell, it usually adheres pretty well to a factual presentation and relies very little on emotional editorialism. I wish that some of our business and professional publications could do as well. Our congratulations to this organization on this particular publication.

A training unit in the basic elements of home economics is one of the desired goals, this unit to be taught by Mrs. Cricket B. Taylor, Parmer County HD Agent.

The basic objectives of the project are:

1. To fulfill a basic Christian duty - to aid ones brother.
2. To extend aid through talent, rather than money.
3. To provide training oppor-

tunities to culturally and monetarily deprived peoples in our immediate area.

4. The areas of training are:
  - a. Food preparation.
  - b. Mending and fitting of clothing.
  - c. Health and sanitation instruction.

The project is still in the formative stages; however, several visitations have been made and the results are promising.

Final approval for money for construction of the Farwell Country Club facilities has been received and B. L. **Editorial**

**Hot Air And Cost Of Living; Both Are Going Up**

Don't be too shocked if, in the near future, you turn on your lawn sprinkler, anticipating cool, clear water and suddenly find yourself nourishing your yard with a dilute solution of milk instead. This will be the natural result of our underground water supplies rapidly being polluted by millions of gallons of Elsie's best, dumped out on the ground by hundreds of dairybelt farmers in an attempt to get more for their milk by creating a shortage.

If this milk dumping scheme succeeds, you can bet grandpappy's last dollar that it won't be the middleman that absorbs the extra cost of milk. It will be the poor old flat billfolded consumer that will be forced to ante up, the same old consumer that is already in a state of near shock simply from trying to make ends meet in this modern pay-more Great Society.

Although these dairy farmers in the midwest cannot be too bad off, or else they would not be dumping valuable milk onto the ground, the blame for the situation in which that John Q. Consumer finds himself goes much deeper than the plight of a few dairy farmers.

The simple fact of the matter is that the dairy farmers are not the only ones who are hurting. Every taxpayer from Podunk Junction Maine to Jackass Flats Nevada is feeling the pinch of the higher cost of living, and believe me it hurts. Even the 15 cent bargain hamburger has gone up to 18 cents. What costs a nickel a year ago, now costs a dime. Every single commodity the consumer might want costs him more to buy than it did a year ago and the cost of living continues to spiral with no end in sight.

The reason for all this is pure and simple, regardless of the meaningless hogwash that is uttered from the mouths of politicians and economics "experts". There are only so many people in America, and these so many people only earn so much money. When a businessman, any businessman, whether he be a farmer, butcher, baker, or candlestick maker, has to pay more in taxes in order to finance Great Society spending programs, he is forced to charge more for his product in order to try to make ends meet. Then we get into a vicious circle; the more he makes, the more he pays, and so on. Of course when the auto salesman has to pay more for bread, then he raises the cost of automobiles. Then when the baker has to pay more for a car, he raises the price of bread. Throw in a million other different businesses and it's not hard to see how we got into the mess we are in today.

It all boils down to a simple truth. As the cost of government rises, so does the cost of living, and the cost of government today is in a higher orbit than Telstar. The taxpayers-money-for-lunch bunch has simply got to realize that the average consumer is taxed to the limit. He just cannot shell out money that he doesn't have. It's impossible, and no Great Society hogwash can make it any different.

The nation today is at war, but have domestic spending programs been appropriately reduced? No, on the contrary, they have increased. The war on poverty must go on and the taxpayer be hanged!

Great Society wizards, so accustomed to speaking in terms of billions, seem to have forgotten what it is like to be an average man, living or trying to live on an average income. They are so overcome by their delusions of grandeur and importance that they fail to grasp the reality of the situation.

The majority of taxpayers in America are only ordinary people with ordinary incomes. They just cannot continue to meet the cost of higher Great Society spending programs, the demands of organized labor, and the cost of the Vietnam war, all at the same time. Government and labor simply must settle for less, at least until the Vietnam war is over, and heaven only knows when that will be.

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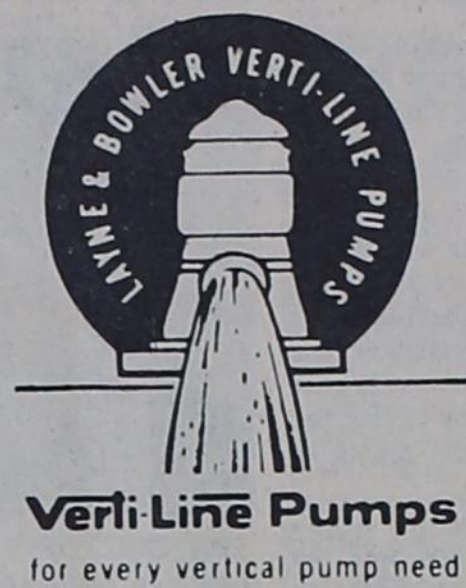

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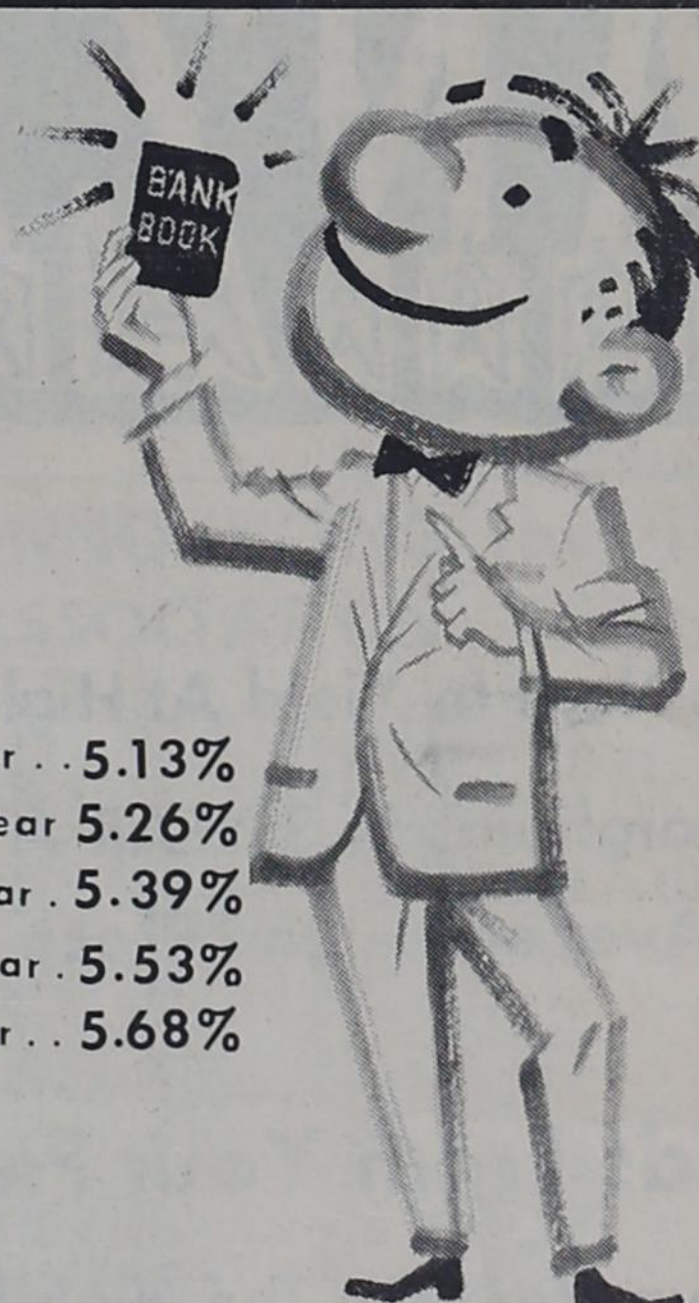

## On The Farm In Parmer County

### PEACH TREE PROTECTION

Peach trees in the home garden can be protected from insects. Expensive equipment is not required and labor needed is not excessive considering the results obtained.

The following spray schedule is recommended: Spray the peach tree or trees with either Carbaryl (Sevin), malathion, methoxychlor or diazinon when 75 per cent of the blossom petals have fallen. Make the second or shuck split application 10 days after the first application with one of insecticides listed for first spray. Then 10 to 14 days after the second application make the third spraying with one of the recommended insecticides and 14 to 21 days later make a repeat application of the number three spraying.

The home gardener can do a satisfactory spraying job with a small power sprayer or a hand sprayer if close attention is given to the thorough coverage of the tree. It's important to use enough spray to wet all fruit, leaf and bark surfaces.

Should infestations of fruit-damaging insects occur following the completion of recommended spray schedule, Carbaryl can be used effectively up to within one day of harvest. Insecticides are essential tools in the home garden; however, they should be used in accordance with the rate and safety directions printed on the container label.

It is well to remember that Carbaryl may be applied to peaches up to one day before harvest; that malathion should not be used within 7 days of harvest; methoxychlor within 21 days of harvest and diazinon within 20 days of harvest.

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### SPRING IRRIGATION TIME FOR WHEAT APPROACHING

The time for spring irrigation of wheat is drawing near. Spring irrigation should coincide with the rate of water use of the crop. Water is critical for wheat in the boot and heading stages, according to Bill Lyle, irrigation specialist from Lubbock.

If one spring irrigation is applied, it should be delayed until the boot or early heading stage so that moisture will be available during the peak use period. If there are two applications, the first should be made at the jointing to early boot stage, and the second at the heading stage.

For those wheat producers planning three spring irrigations, the first may be made at jointing, the second at the late boot to early heading stage, and the third at the milk to soft dough stage.

Maximum yields from wheat will require a total of 27 to 30 inches of moisture during the entire growing season, according to Lyle.

The number of irrigations applied should be based on economic as well as agronomic considerations. Economic factors to consider include the price of wheat, cost of irrigation and alternative uses of the irrigation water.

4. Arrange accessories attractively.

The mistake most often made in using accessories is placing too many small ones in a room. Many small articles add clutter and require too much dusting. Really empty spaces add to the dignity and restfulness of a room, just as you can overdo the use of jewelry and ruin the appearance of your costume.

### New Fabrics Require Special Care

By Cricket E. Taylor  
County Extension Agent  
Plastics and many new fabrics require special cleaning treatment.

One thing to remember about plastics is it should never be cleaned with a solvent. To remove dirt and grime, sponge with warm water and mild detergent, allow to soak for few minutes so the dirt will loosen, then rub briskly. Rinse and wipe with a damp cloth until nearly dry. Wax to restore lustre.

Nail polish and remover, shoe polish, and ballpoint pen ink will cause permanent damage to plastics and should be removed as quickly as possible with a clean cloth.

To remove paint, wipe off with a clean white cloth dampened with turpentine or kerosene. Do not use paint remover on plastics. Use care when using turpentine, and pretest it on a small inconspicuous area.

Sulphide stains, from atmosphere permeated with coal gas or direct contact with hard boiled eggs, permanent hair wave solution, and other sulphur solutions, use six per cent hydrogen peroxide. Place a clean white cloth over the spotted area and pour a liberal amount of the peroxide, available at drug stores, on the cloth. Allow it to remain on the spot from 30 minutes to an hour. If the spot persists, allow the cloth to remain over night. Do not let the hydrogen peroxide solution

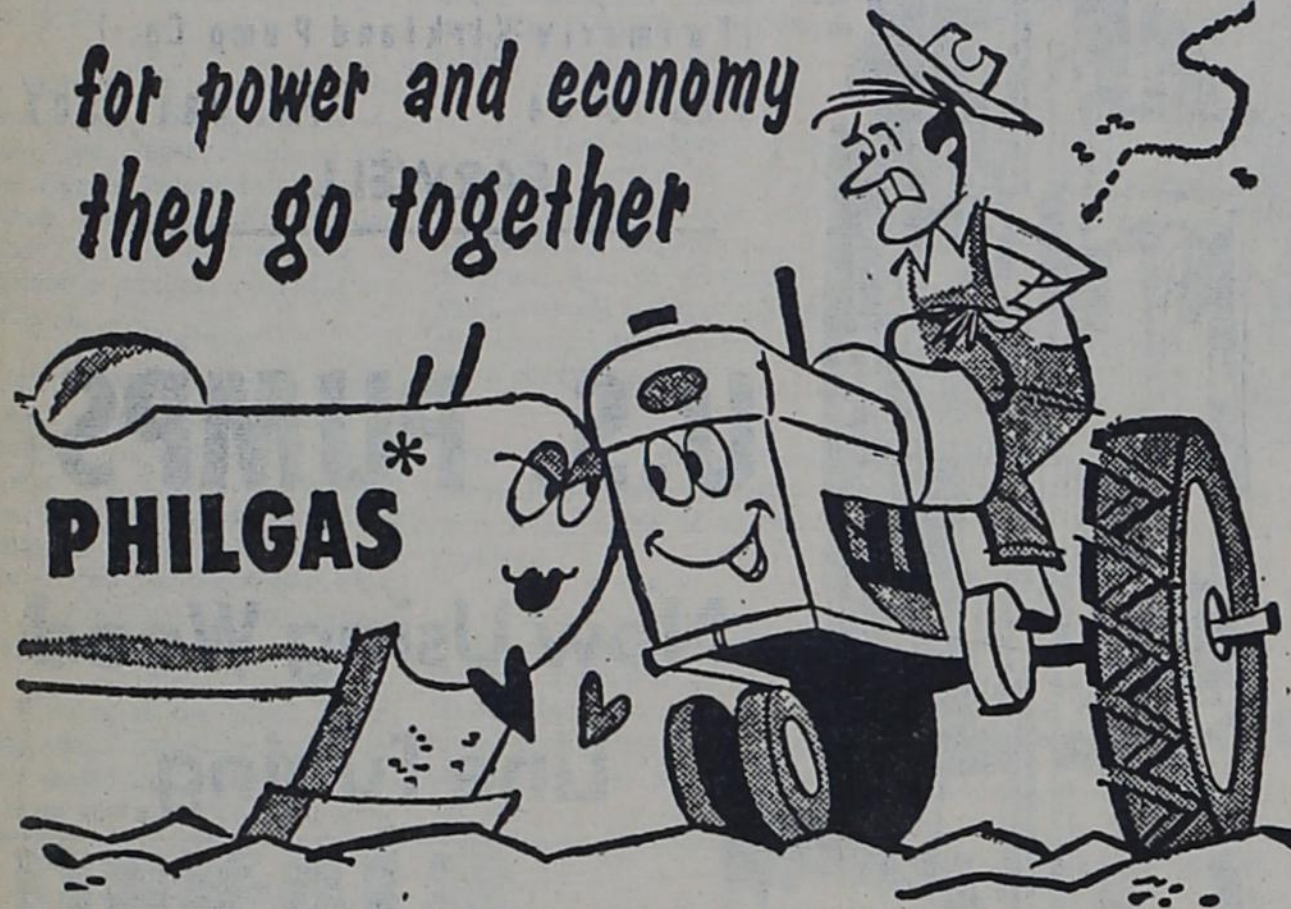

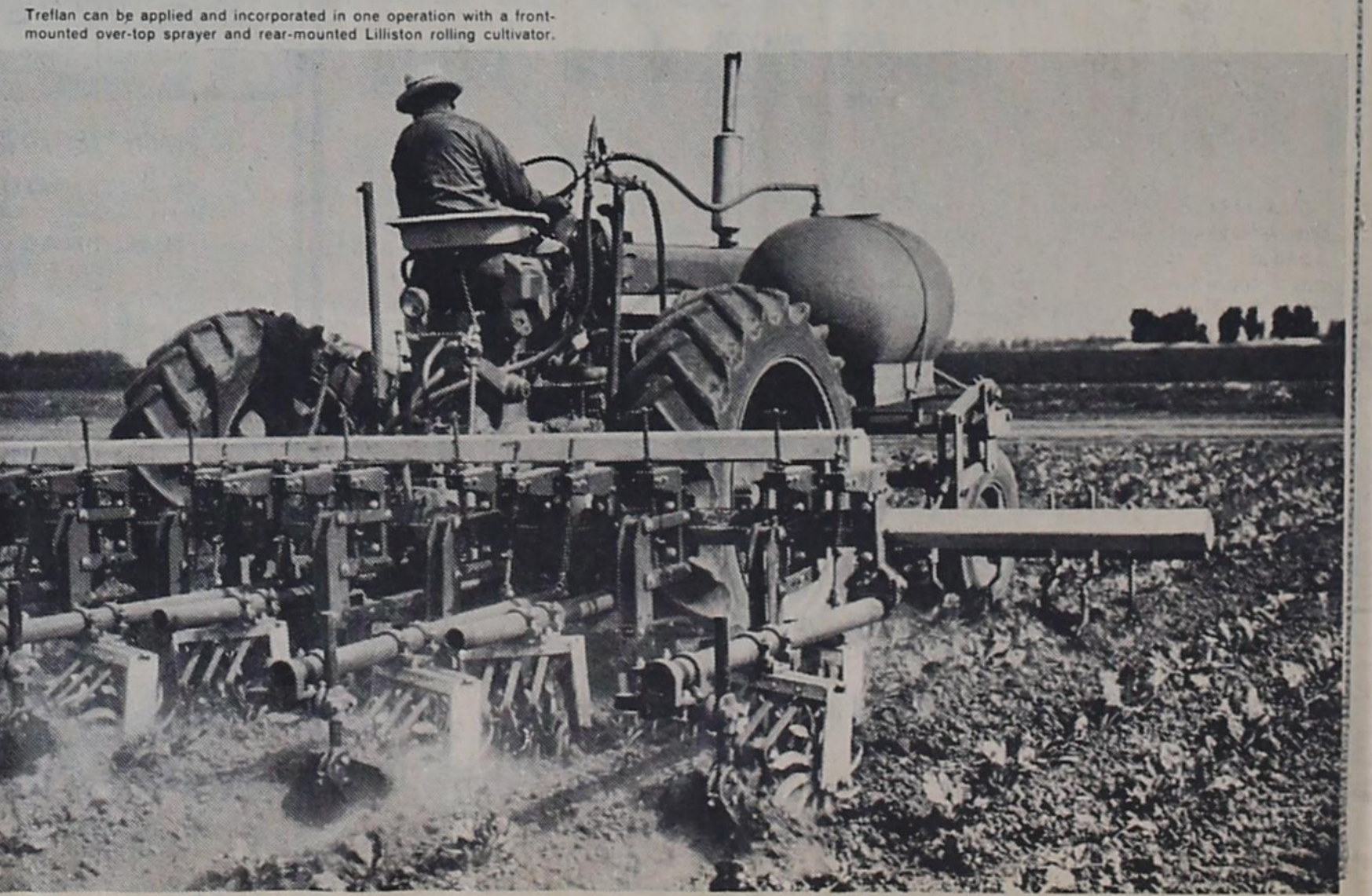

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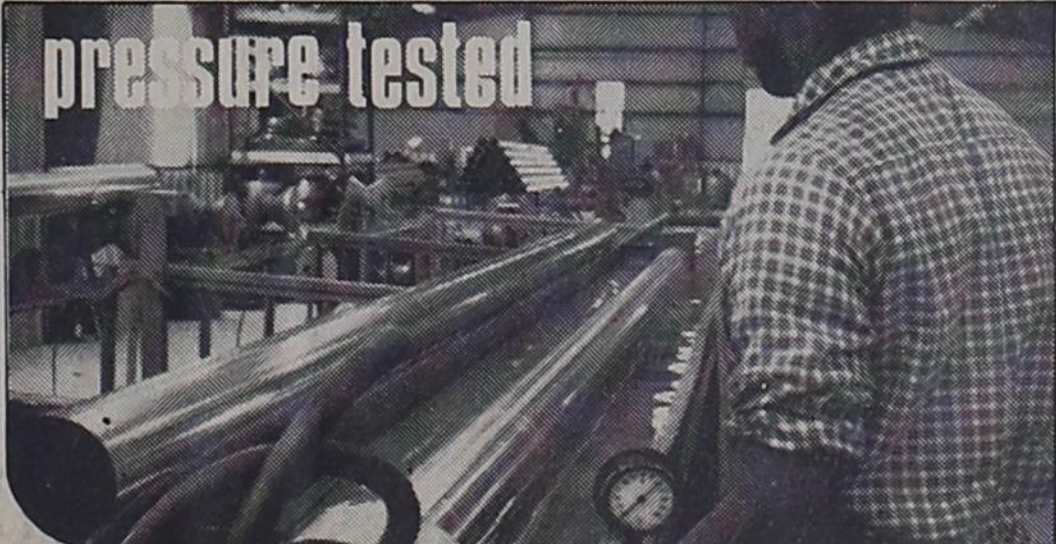
