Rivercrest Ties Hughes Springs

The Rivercrest Rebels led twice in their opening game against Hughes Springs at Hughes Springs Friday night, but each time the hosts came back with touchdowns to even the count and the contest ended in a 12-12 draw.

The Rebels looked good in their first game under Coach Brodie Campbell and were able to move well despite a rash of fumbles. Rain fell off and on throughout the game and this handicapped the ball handlers. Rivercrest had several key opportunities for tallies which were halted by the bobbles.

The Rebels got on the scoreboard in the opening minutes when Davis Hendrix swept end for 20 yards and a touchdown. An attempted run for the extra point failed.

Hughes Springs got on the board for the first time just seconds before the half ended. Bobby Strickland sneaked the pigskin over for the six-pointer, and the intermission came with the score at 6-6.

The Rebels dominated play in the third quarter and again took the lead. Hendrix ran 18 yards up the middle for the score. Again an attempted run for the PAT fell short.

Hughes Springs picked up its game-tying touchdown late in the contest when Strickland went over from the 1-yard line. The extra point attempt failed, and it ended 12-12.

Coach Campbell was pleased with his team's showing, or as pleased as possible without having achieved victory. He praised the entire Rivercrest defensive lineup for its work in the tilt. Tackles Richard Hargrove and Jackie Brown were individually cited for their inside play.

This week the Rebels open their home season against Hooks, the District 13-AA favorite. Hooks was a 14-0 winner over New Boston Friday night.

Red River County Fair Open Sept. 21

A parade Wednesday afternoon will usher in the eleventh annual Red River County Fair and Livestock Exposition for a four-day run, Wednesday through Saturday, Sept. 21 - 24, at the Legion Park, Clarksville.

The big carnival, a repeat from last year, will open its many rides, games and shows as soon as possible after the week end, probably Monday night.

All entries in the women's division must be checked in on Tuesday, Sept. 20, from 1 to 6 p. m. in the Exhibits Building, with judging on Wednesday morning. The building will be open to the public following the judging, expected to conclude shortly after noon.

Entries in the women's division will include: girls' food, girls' clothing, crafts, household textiles, women's clothing, and women's foods. Ribbons and cash prizes will be given winners. A set of rules and complete information is available at the offices of the County Agents, Courthouse.

Agricultural exhibits will be checked in at the Livestock Barn no later than 8:30 p. m. Tuesday, with judging Wednesday morning for ribbons and cash awards. Classes include: corn, cotton, cotton stalk, small grain, sesame, vetch, grain sorghum, peanuts, peppers, peas, potatoes, beans, melons, onions, okra, squash, apples, pears, eggplant, pecans, and syrup.

All livestock and poultry must be in place no later than Tuesday, September 20, and remain on the grounds until 9:30 p. m. on Saturday evening. Gene Neal will judge cattle, Jack McCullin the poultry, with a swine judge to be announced later.

Saturday will be the big day in livestock judging, beginning with poultry and junior beef steers at 1 p. m. in the Livestock Barn area. Junior heifers will follow at 1:30, with junior bulls at 2:30 and open beef heifers at 3:30 p. m. Swine and open beef bulls will take the spotlight at 4 p. m. and the afternoon will conclude with sheep, 4:15.

Each of the four evenings will be highlighted by free entertainment, beginning at 7 p. m. A talent show Thursday and Friday evenings, fiddlers' contest Saturday night. Country and western singers Wednesday night. Anyone wishing to participate is asked to contact Paul Hamilton at the City Drug Store as soon as possible.

All activities at the Fair are free with the exception of carnival games, shows, and rides. Free parking is also available.

Vehicle Inspection Begun September 1

Austin. — Colonel Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today that the 1967 vehicle inspection period has begun.

Garrison said that the new inspection period began on Sept. 1 and will end on April 15, 1967 as prescribed by the Public Safety Commission. The inspection period is the same as in previous years.

"This means that between now and April 15, 1967, each of the five and one-half million Texas registered vehicles will have to secure the new green and white 1967 inspection sticker from one of the 5500 official inspection stations," he said.

Garrison suggested that if motorists have their vehicles inspected during the routine visits to garages for ordinary maintenance, the necessity of having to wait in line at a later date for an inspection will be eliminated.

In announcing the new inspection period, the Public Safety Director pointed out that vehicle defects contributing to traffic accidents in Texas during 1965 were the fewest yet experienced since the inspection program began in 1951.

Austin. — While most of the state welcomed the touch of cool rains last week, Texas Water Development Board lost all hopes of completing the Texas Water Plan by the time the Legislature opens January 10.

Board will take from four months to a year before it acts on adoption of the preliminary Texas Water Plan due to the scores of suggestions received from a series of river basin hearings.

All suggestions must be screened even before the Board can refer the plan to Texas Water Rights Commission for a public hearing on Water Rights involved.

A panel of five consultants, headed by Joe H. Kilgore, has gone over a list of proposed studies prepared by the Board's planning staff. The panel will present their suggestions to the Board at a meeting on September 19. Mainly, these will cover which studies can be made within the money available to the agency during the fiscal year.

Another water study by the Development Board, to determine the occurrence and quality of underground water in Shackelford County, will begin in Mid-September. Executive Director Joe G. Moore announced.

Richard Preston, a water development board geologist, will conduct the study, which will begin with an inventory and sampling of all domestic, municipal, livestock, irrigation and industrial wells in the county.

Study will then move on to the collection and compilation of data regarding depth, distribution and quality of underground water. Surface and shallow subsurface rock formations will also be examined as an aid in determining the depth and mode of occurrence of ground water requiring surface casing.

Texas Water Rights Commission has approved an amendment to the permit held by Trinity River Authority and the City of Houston which would nearly triple the storage capacity of the proposed Wallisville Reservoir. But another public hearing will be called to reconsider the application, if the federal government does not confirm its participation within a year.

AG OPINIONS — Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has held that when the county attorney in a county of 20,000 or more population wins a suit and collects delinquent personal property taxes, he may deduct a commission from the taxes. County attorney, however, must pay that commission into the county treasury for the officers' salary fund. Carr held in the opinion requested by Harris County Attorney Joe Resweber.

In another official opinion, Carr held that names of contributors and amounts of their donations to buy land for Lyndon B. Johnson State Park in Gillespie County do not have to be made public. Opinion affirmed the position of State Parks and Wildlife Commission Chairman Will E. Odom who has declined to disclose sources of the park fund. Odom is fund trustee and receives donations for purchase of park land.

Attorney General concluded that park fund administration is not an operation of the PWC, and that it's up to private administrators to decide whether to announce names of various donors.

HEAD START SLOWED — Approximately 60 Head Start programs are being held up in five Southwestern states because of Congressional delay in approving appropriations for the Office of Economic Opportunity, Regional OEO Director Bill Crook reports.

Official Audit For Red River Co.

Official audit of the Red River County 1965 financial records has disclosed a moderately favorable financial condition, with all funds showing a cash balance at year's end. The audit was accepted by the Commissioners' Court in special meeting and a copy was ordered filed in the office of the County Clerk as a public record available for inspection.

The audit was made by C. I. West, senior partner of West and West of Longview; West has been auditor and financial adviser to the county for the past 11 years.

Major operating fund income and expenditures include: Road and Bridge, income of \$161,258 with expenditures of \$151,935; General \$80,551 taken in and \$81,409 spent; Lateral Road, \$69,670 and \$61,104. All operating funds had a total income of \$381,676 with \$375,32 spent. The total cash on hand increased \$14,434 over the previous year.

Following a complicated refunding program completed last year, the county now operates on a cash basis with all legal indebtedness represented by time warrants or bonds.

In an oral report to the Court, West warned of possible future financial difficulties, pointing to increased costs and reduced income as a result of the new Code of Criminal Procedure, effective this year. West pointed out that only nine of 32 north and east Texas counties have a lower tax rate than Red River and that tax assessments have not kept pace with true market value of property. He called for continued strict budget accounting in the county financial operations and additional attention to equitable assessments.

Delay, said Crook, is proving costly in both time and money to the agencies which had expected to correlate the pre-school readiness programs with the regular school term. In some cases, he stated, administrators are serving without pay, rather than hurt the continuity of the program.

First priority on funds allocated to Southwest regional office is being given to those projects which are already in operation in the five states.

Crook's office is writing letters to local community action agencies and school districts, explaining that final action cannot be taken on their applications until Congress comes through.

BUDGET MAKERS INSPECT — Before the State Legislature convenes, members of the House of Representatives' side of the Legislative Budget Board are personally inspecting state institutions, acquainting themselves with operations and needs throughout the state.

Group began surveys in the Dallas and Denton areas last week. Next they plan to go to Huntsville, Texas A&M University and Waco.

DEAN'S OPINION — Page Keeton, dean of the University of Texas School of Law, strongly urges a complete recodification of Texas' 110-year-old penal code.

Keeton said the penal code had undergone "intermittent patching" through the years "without reference to the problems of maintaining a consistent system. . . . 'The plain fact,' he continued, 'is that we have been 'getting along' with our present law. But I believe our administrators are doing a good job, not because of, but in spite of, our present system of substantive criminal law.'

Keeton recommends complete revision of the laws, rather than piecemeal revision.

R. R. Co. Eligible For Food Stamps

Red River County is listed among seven Texas counties eligible for the food stamp program, President Johnson announced Saturday.

The program has been extended to 402 additional areas in 36 states bringing to 733 the number of areas in which food coupons are made available to low-income families.

Johnson said that when the new projects are functioning, the food stamp program will be available to 1.8 million needy persons in 41 states and the District of Columbia.

The announcement said that the Agriculture Department's consumer and marketing service will immediately begin working with state welfare officials to establish target dates for the start of food coupon sales in each of the newly designated areas.

For Titus County Budget Hearing

Public hearing on the proposed \$446,503 budget for Titus County in 1966-67 was held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the county judge's office.

The budget called for operational expense of the county to be up \$30,992 in the coming year. However, there will be no increase in taxes.

The tax rate remains the same as last year, 95c per \$100 valuation. Of this 77c is for the operating funds and 18c is the interest and sinking funds.

Ad valorem taxes are estimated to bring in \$166,500 in revenue as compared with \$154,000 last year. Other receipts will account for an estimated \$450,760, which compares with \$427,350 in 1965-66.

According to County Judge Cecil Franklin, the county's general operating fund showed a balance of \$15,720 on Sept. 1.

"The County is definitely operating in the black," he said, pointing out that a \$38,000 overdraft that existed three years ago had been cleared up.

The new budget of \$446,503 compares with \$415,511 last year and with \$413,341 in 1965.

In the tax structure for the new year, 56c will go into the general fund, compared to 61c in the year ending. A reduction in the I&S funds, from 23c to 18c also is noted. The road and bridge fund will be allocated 12c instead of 4c and 4c will go into the permanent improvement fund instead of 2c.

By the various categories, here is how expenditures are projected: Jury Fund, \$7235; Road and Bridge Fund, \$246,399; General Operating Fund, \$82,035; Permanent Improvement Fund, \$5934; Officers Salary Fund, \$74,510; and Interest and Sinking Fund, \$34,647.

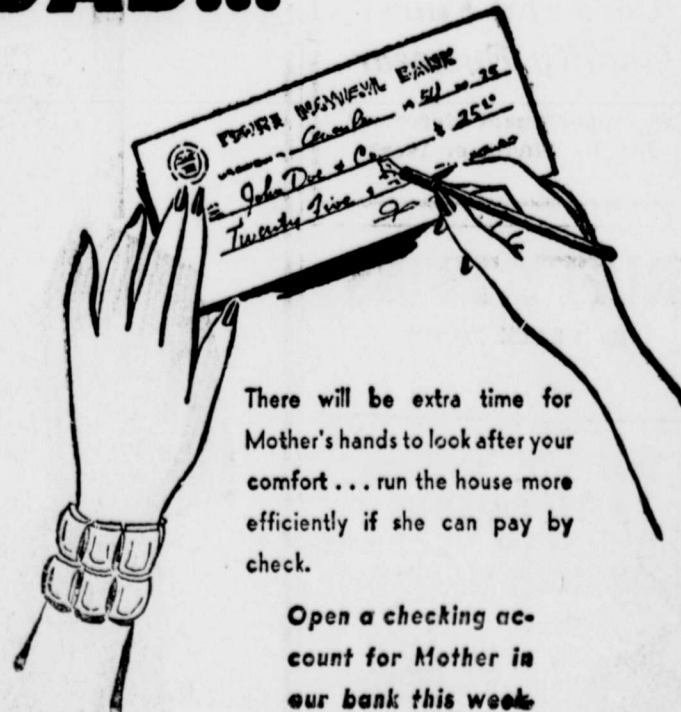
BOE BIGGERSTAFF HOME BURNS AT HAGANSPORT

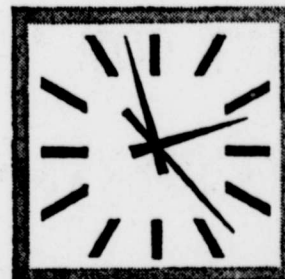

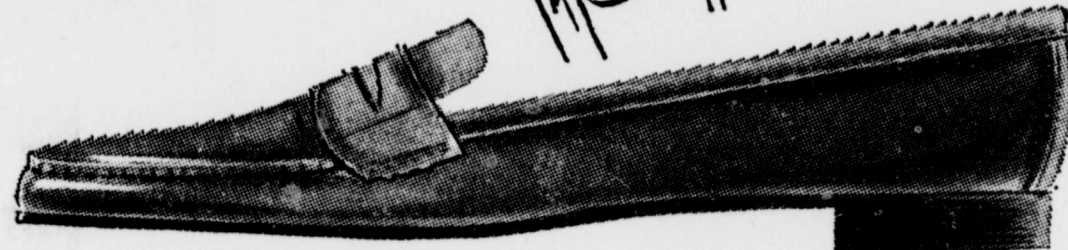

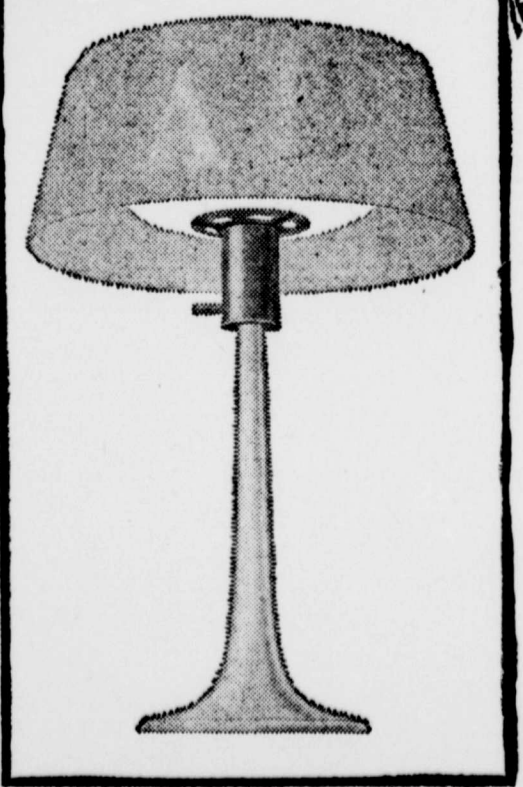
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
