CONGRESSMAN Martin Frost is co-sponsoring a bill in the U.S. Legislature which he entitles the "Taxpayers' Bill of Rights."

The congressman says that in his opinion, when congress passed the current "tax reform" it left out a major aspect of tax reform, and that is reform in the way the Internal Revenue Service goes about collecting tax dollars.

Frost says, "Anyone who has ever had a disagreement with the Internal Revenue Service knows that the I.R.S. can be the most aggressive and uncompromising of all federal agencies. And the fact is that under current law very little protection is available to those involved in tax disputes."

The Internal Revenue Service is under no obligation to provide information on tax collection procedures and is not held accountable for mistakes caused when inaccurate or misleading information is offered by I.R.S. employees. Too many times, taxpayers are left with no choice but to hire expensive lawyers and tax specialists whose fees must be paid whether the argument with the I.R.S. is won or lost.

In his weekly column, Congressman Frost lists the ten points included in his "Taxpayers' Bill of Rights." They are:

1) The Internal Revenue Service would be required to prepare a document setting forth the rights and obligations of taxpayers and the I.R.S., including the procedure appealing adverse decisions as well as the procedure for prosecuting refund claims.

2) A judgment of costs, including attorney fees, accountant fees, and clerical expenses may be awarded to taxpayers if they win a dispute in tax court.

3) Taxpayers would be allowed to take legal action against an I.R.S. employee who violates a person's rights.

4) An office of Ombudsman would be established within the Department of the Treasury, but separate from the Internal Revenue Service, to receive and investigate taxpayer complaints.

5) Individual taxpayers would be given the right to have representation during an I.R.S. interview and would be allowed to record I.R.S. interviews.

6) The General Accounting Office would be required to perform an annual audit of the I.R.S. including its collection and audit procedures.

7) The Internal Revenue Service would be prohibited from investigating tax records for purposes other than the enforcement of tax laws, except to investigate drug dealers or organized crime figures.

8) The Internal Revenue Service would be prohibited from evaluating I.R.S. personnel on the basis of the amount of money collected.

9) The Internal Revenue Service would be prohibited from reneging on installment payment agreements, unless the taxpayer misled the I.R.S. as to financial status or unless the taxpayer's financial status subsequently changes.

10) The burden of proof during court proceedings would be shifted to the Internal Revenue Service.

The senior class is sponsoring a dinner theatre on Sunday, May 3 from 11:30 a.m.-1:30 p.m. at the Bovina High School.

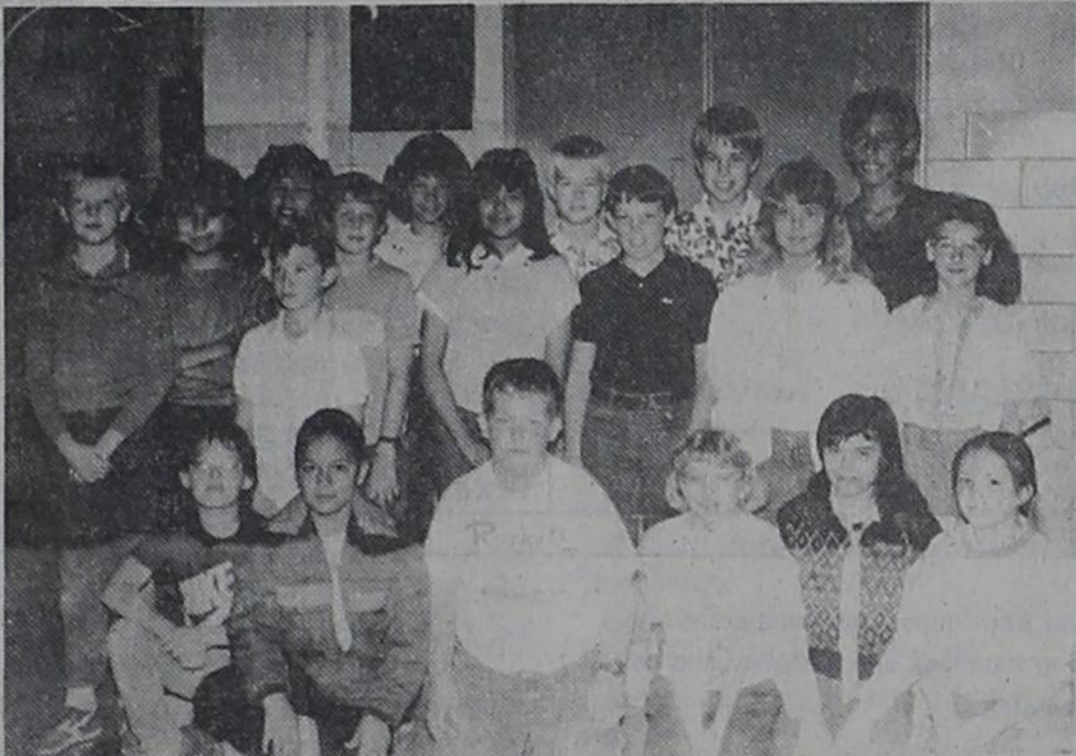
Donations are adults \$5.00 and children \$3.00.

Local Boy Gives Insights Into Life In Saudia Arabia

Rick Meason, son of Pete and Margaret Meason, has been in Jeddah, Saudi Arabia, working since last February. His wife and two children lived in Hereford and he will join them in May when he returns to America.

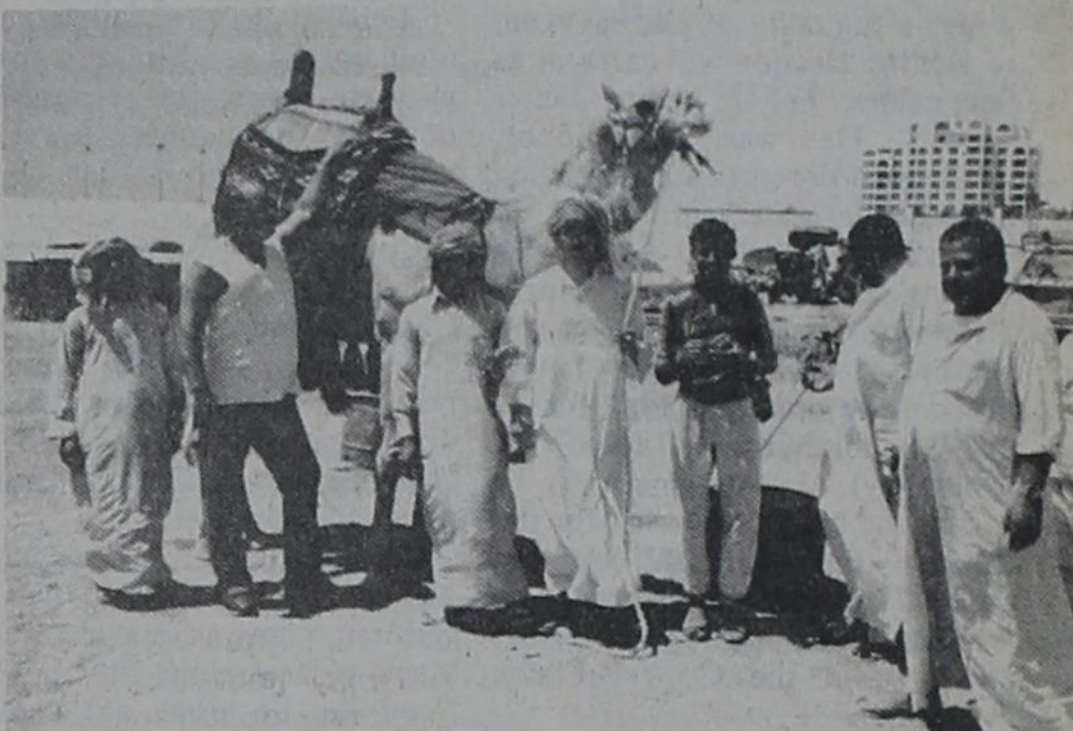
His mother, Margaret, said Rick is working with his father-in-law, L.D. Henderson from Springlake-Earth. He has been working six years in Arabia, a few months each year. Henderson is Barbara Cockerham's first cousin.

Rick and L.D. set up auctions on equipment and their work is centered around the oil fields. The people there are very uneducated when it comes to repairing equipment and in fact, according to Rick, they know nothing about repairing or working on their equipment. He said people there were very wealthy because of the oil and that sometimes they would have a flat tire on an automobile and walk off and leave it, and just buy another car.

In Jeddah, Saudi Arabia, there are many wealthy people, and when a son reaches the age of eighteen, he is given one-half million dollars and a new Mercedes.

Things move very slowly in Arabia and no one gets in a hurry. One day, Rick said some men were supposed to meet with the crew and were five hours late with no thought of time.

The temperature is very hot there and reaches almost 130

degrees before the day is over. Every afternoon from 1-5 p.m., the people close their doors of business and spend that time with their families. This is a time for rest, to be with their families and escape the severe heat.

The country is very dry and has only received one and one-half inches of moisture this year. Rick said the golf courses were bare ground and rocks.

Women are never allowed to drive and are never out on the streets without their husbands. They wear veils over their faces at all times when they are in public.

The diets consist of mostly fish, chicken, goat and camel. Rick said everything the natives eat is cooked, dipped, sprinkled or rolled in garlic and butter. Pizza restaurants are beginning to show up around the country and also chicken restaurants like Colonel Sanders.

One day, Rick and a friend went

to a chicken restaurant. Rick said he told them that he didn't want garlic on his chicken or cooked with it. He said it still had a taste of garlic. Everyone there eats garlic and the Parmer County native said the atmosphere always had a smell of garlic.

People there are very free with their money because they have so much. One day, Rick and a friend saw a man on the shore of the Red Sea who had bought a boat, but did not know anything about it or how to drive it.

Rick and his friend talked with the man and he said that he would take them for a ride, but he didn't know how to drive it. One of the American boys drove the boat and when they were a long way from shore it started making a loud noise. They asked the man if he had put oil in the boat. He said, "No, I only put gas in it." They paddled back to shore and they were a little concerned because there are lots of sharks in the Red Sea.

Rick said the Americans really missed having ice there. One can buy Cokes, tea and so forth, but there is no ice.

Rick mailed his parents two Easter cards and a few pictures and it cost \$9.50 for postage. A roll of film costs \$23 to have it developed and Margaret told him to send the roll and she would have it developed and send it back, but he explained that undeveloped film and negatives were not allowed to be sent out of the country.

Every four hours the people take time out for a few minutes of worship and everyone looks toward Madrid and Milan, the holy cities. No one but Arabs are allowed in these cities. The young Americans asked if anyone else had ever entered these cities besides the Arabs and they said, "Yes, but they never come out of the cities."

Because of the wealth of the country, cities have been built there with huge high-rise apartments everywhere. However, Rick said that only about half of the buildings have anyone living in them.

He said one person would build a tall building, and others would follow suit, just because their neighbor had one.

The country native will be coming home in May, and no doubt will have many other stories to tell his family.

years. The governor has proposed a 17 per cent cut in state funding which would cost public education about 2.8 billion dollars over the two year period.

The School Finance Symposium, an organization of 42 statewide groups concerned with public education, has announced a statewide campaign to promote the restructuring of the state's tax system and the enactment of revenue measures that will adequately fund essential services, including public education. The program has been named SAVE OUR SCHOOLS (S.O.S.).

None of us get very excited about a tax increase, but it is much easier on all of us when the increases come from the state level rather than the local level. Comptroller Bob Bullock has submitted a proposal to expand the sales tax in Texas. This proposal has the support of the School Finance Symposium.

If the restructuring takes place, the system would then have the following features:

1) Sales tax on an expanded base that includes most personal and professional services, at a rate of 4.5 per cent.

2) Franchise tax that incorporates a tax rate adjustment, at a base rate of \$5.25 per \$1000 of taxable capital and surplus.

3) Motor fuel taxes at a rate of \$.15 per gallon.

4) Motor vehicle sales and rental tax at a rate of 4.5 per cent, same as the sales tax rate.

The revised system would allow the state's sales tax base to accurately reflect the Texas economy—letting the sales tax rate grow at the same pace as the economy. It also sets the tax rate at 4.5 per cent rather than 5.25 per cent.

The split of sales tax paid—between businesses and consumers—will be brought closer to parity, moving from a 46-54 business/consumer split to a 49-51 split.

Please contact your legislators and let them know that you favor action by the state to provide adequate funding for public education.

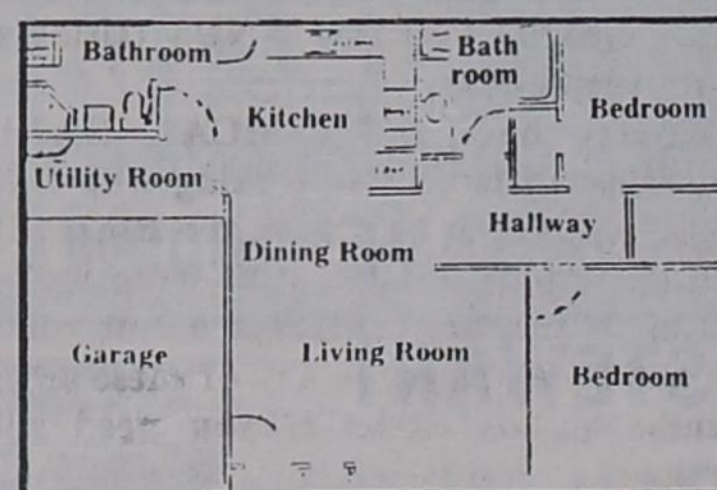
