## Mrs. T. S. Buchanan Buried Wednesday

Mrs. Tom S. Buchanan, 55, died at her residence in Eldorado Monday afternoon, April 10, 1950, after two years' illness. She had undergone major surgery several times and a series of treatments at Temple, before returning to Eldorado early this spring.

Funeral services were held at 11:00 Wednesday morning at the Methodist church, of which she was a member, the pastor, Rev. Roy Shilling, officiating.

Music was provided by the Methodist choir who sang two selections, No Night There, and Does Jesus Care; in the latter, two verses were sung by a women's quartet, composed of Mrs. Luke Thompson, Mrs. Mickey Holcomb, Mrs. Roy Shilling and Mrs. Frank Van Horn. Mary Lee Gunstead was the organist.

Pall bearers were nephews, nephews-in-law and friends: Ray and Kerry Merritt of Austin, Gene Merritt of Houston, W. D. Moody of Giddings, Edgar and William Elmer Shelton of Wrightsboro, and Carl Ellington and Bob McWhorter of Eldorado.

Interment was in the Eldorado Cemetery, with Ratliff in charge.

Thelma Bradley was born April 4, 1895, at Wrightsboro, the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. S. L. Bradley. She entered nurses' training at the old Baptist hospital, now Memorial Hospital, at Houston, graduating from the three-year course and later practicing her profession there and other places including New York City. She took a post graduate course in surgical nursing and practiced in that field. She was married to Tom S. Buchanan in Houston, Dec. 25, 1924. The couple ranched in Washington County, later moving to their own ranch in Big Wells, then in the spring of 1948 they sold the ranch and moved to Eldorado where they built a new residence. She was a member of the Methodist Church and the Eastern Star.

Survivors include the husband; three brothers, S. A. Bradley of Bebe, Texas, W. A. Bradley of Wrightsboro and B. Bradley of San Antonio; five sisters, Mrs. G. J. Merritt of Lockhart, Mrs. H. H. **Hints Given For Washing Corduroy**  
Corduroy gets soiled just the same as does any other clothing material and it should be washed or cleaned regularly if it is to look and wear well. Corduroy suits, coats and dresses can be successfully washed at home if certain precautions are taken.

Garments made from corduroy need a gentle washing and lukewarm water and mild soapsuds should be used. The suds should be squeezed through the garments and twisting and rubbing should be avoided. They should be rinsed in two or three changes of lukewarm water.

Don't wring them but instead lift the garment from the tub and fold in a bath towel to remove the excess water, then hang on a wooden hanger to dry in shape.

Corduroy garments should be dried rapidly—out-of-doors in a stiff breeze is best. When the garment is almost dry, brush it following the nap to keep it smooth. Press on the wrong side with the nap and then brush again. The use of a steam iron will make the ironing job easier.

If the coat is lined, the only safe way to wash it is to remove the lining and padding and wash each separately.

Church baseball teams are organized, and anything which will draw big crowds is incorporated such as church suppers, and church dances. People are now terribly far away from the first New Testament Church. So much that it is difficult to detect the one Christ founded on the day of Pentecost, today. Yet when men endeavor to turn people back to the old paths, they are called moss-back, old-fashioned, non-progressives, and what have you.

Today we ask the question, "What is the activity of the church, as pointed out in the New Testament?" Our answer in Eph. 3:10. "To the intent that now unto the principalities and powers in Heavenly places might be made known BY THE CHURCH the manifold wisdom of God." The scripture just quoted shows that God would have the church make known to the world his word which can save them from their sins. I make the assertion here that the only duty of the church is to save souls. Benevolent work of any kind

"Not forsaking the assembling of yourselves together"—Heb. 10:25

has as its objective salvation of souls. Christ stated in Mark. 16:15-16, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature. He that believeth and is baptised shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned." In as much as a man must first hear the Gospel before he can saved, and then believe in Christ, it is the churches obligation to see that this is done. And I will further add that it is the churches duty, ONLY!! This is made possible by public teaching in church assemblies, 1 Cor. 14, and private teaching by individuals in the church, Acts 2:41-47, Acts 18:26, and Acts 20:20.

**Menard-Brady Road OK**

The Texas Highway Department this week authorized right-of-way purchase on Farm to Market road 42, from Menard to Brady. The distance will be 15 miles, connecting with the five miles already finished in 1947 out of Brady, and will connect with the already finished road from Menard to the county line. This will also include a three-mile spur off to Calif Creek. —Menard News.

**City Delivery for Alpine**

Everything is in readiness for launching city mail delivery in Alpine tomorrow, it was stated at the post office yesterday. No parcel post will be delivered until further details are worked out, it was stated. Temporary carriers who will deliver the mail have been selected from a list of eligibles—those who had previously taken the civil service examinations. There is going to be considerable confusion until the delivery service

has been ironed out, it was stated, and patrons are requested to be patient, and also cooperative, during this period.

Patrons of the Alpine post office are reminded that, with the beginning of city mail delivery, there will be no more one-cent rate on local mailings, except post cards. —Alpine Avalanche.

**New Bids To Be Taken On School**

Work is to begin immediately on the \$14,145.00 contract for water and sewer lines at the Junction Summer School of the A&M system and new bids are to be taken this spring for the construction of the building on the site, Reese Spence, manager of physical plant of the A&M system, told a group of thirty representative business men in the county court room Monday.

Spence was sent here by the Board of Directors of A&M to explain their action in rejecting the five bids considered at the meeting in Dallas on March 24th.

The contract for the water and sewer lines was awarded at that meeting to the Brazos Construction Co. of Marlin. At the same time a maximum of \$50,000 was appropriated for the construction of water and sewer facilities. Charles K. Leighton, construction engineer, who was also in Junction Monday, was authorized by the board to award the remaining contracts. —Junction Eagle.

**Stockton Church To Build**

The building committee of the First Presbyterian Church of Fort Stockton awarded a \$48,000 contract Monday night to Carr Construction Co. of Midland, and work will begin at once on a sanctuary, which is planned as the third and final unit of the new and modern church home of the congregation on Oklahoma Street, on a half-block site which faces the Elementary School Building. —Ft. Stockton Pioneer.

**Thornton Gets Bid**

R. B. Thornton & Son of Brady submitted a low bid of \$54,088 for Robert Lee waterworks improvements at a letting here Thursday afternoon.

Six bids were opened, the highest figure being \$68,407.

The contract includes construction of a new water treatment plant at the Mountain Creek Dam, also the laying of 4,350 feet of 8-inch water mains and 4,330 feet of 6-inch water pipe. There are to be 13 new fire hydrants and contractor will provide material and labor for all the work. —Robert Lee Observer.

**Youths Sentenced**

Three years was assessed against three San Angelo youths, Sam Wyatt, James D. Carley and John Thomas DeMerville for their part in the burglary of the Mertzon High School and the Mertzon Food Store. The men were members of a gang that burglarized schools and business houses in 10 West Texas counties. —Mertzon Weekly Star.

A total of 20 out-of-county entries have been received to date in the first annual Crockett County Quarter Horse and Cutting Horse and Open Reining contests, set for April 15, Bill Bergfeld, secretary, announced this week. First entry received was from John Dublin of Midland, who has entered two horses, one in the cutting horse contest and a 1949 stallion in the halter class. —Ozona Stockman.

**Coke Hospital Completed**

Coke county's new hospital has been finished and was officially accepted by the commissioners court Wednesday. The action followed a complete inspection of the building by county officials, accompanied by Architect T. Roy Ainsworth and the contractor, Joe Sharp.

Only a few items remain to be added and it was understood they were to be completed in the near future. —Robert Lee Observer.

**Disposal Tract for Sonora**

A nine-acre tract located south of the Santa Fe stockyards was purchased by the City of Sonora from S. H. Allison Friday for use as garbage and trash disposal location. Purchase price was \$400 per acre to be paid in four \$900 installments. —Devil's River News, Sonora.

**Pool for Menard**

William O. Leach of the Leach Engineers was in Menard the past week going over prospective plans for the Community Center and swimming pool. Whitt said that the company will have to secure 150 potential users who will put up a \$10 meter deposit before the company will pipe the town. Lone Star charges this deposit for all new users on their lines. —Bronte Enterprise.

**FORMER RESIDENT IS KILLED NEAR PERRYTON**

Arthur Hendrix, 39, formerly of Eldorado, was electrocuted about 12:15 o'clock Friday afternoon while working with a seismograph crew 15 miles west of Perryton. Hendrix had been employed for nearly four years by the Petty Geophysical Engineering Company, which has been working out of Canadian.

According to Douglas Woods, party chief of the Petty Co., the shot line from a seismograph shot blew over an REA line shortly before the fatal accident. Sparks from the line, dangling about 3 feet above the ground, started a grass fire.

After Hendrix put out the grass fire, he started to pull down the shot line with paste board tubing. The wind blew the line against him, electrocuting him instantly.

Elmo Clark, a Braithwaite-Caldwell Drilling Co. employee, was the only witness to the accident. He was driving a water truck down the road at the time the line was blown against Hendrix' body. Hendrix' brother-in-law is an employee of Braithwaite-Caldwell, now operating in the same vicinity under contract to the Petty Co.

Hendrix and several other Petty employees commuted daily from their homes at Canadian to the exploration site near Perryton.

Services were held Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock from the First Baptist church of Canadian with the Rev. Taft Holloway officiating. The body was taken overland, the Stickleby Funeral Home in charge, to Sulphur, Okla., for burial.

Pallbearers were Douglas Woods, A. E. Lindsey, Joe Baker, R. E. Higdon, Harvey Alford and Willard Humphrey. Honorary pallbearers were remaining crew personnel of party 50, all of Canadian.

He is survived by his wife and son Larry, also two brothers of Tipton, Calif.

**A Friend Writes**

Concerning the recent death of Arthur Hendrix, Mrs. Willard Humphrey, wife of a fellow crew member, writes:

It was certainly a shock to Willard and me as well as the rest of the families on the crew and all of Canadian. Arthur was well known here and had a kind word and a smile for everyone he came in contact with. I don't think he had an enemy.

They took the body overland to Sulphur, Okla. on Monday morning, which is a 350 mile trip. The two older brothers of Arthur drove all the way from California leaving there Friday evening around 5 and arriving here in Canadian about 11:30 Saturday night. They cer-

tainly took it hard.

As far as we know, Josephine and Larry plan on staying in Canadian until he finishes school in six more weeks. A younger brother of Josephine's and his wife plan on staying here with them until then. He left a new '50 Ford which she can't drive and neither can Larry. I believe, as well as everyone else, that she is well provided for with insurance.

**Recipe Column**

**Baked Ham**

Wash the ham, then dry. Insert a meat thermometer into the center of the ham through the fat side making sure the bulb touches no bone or fat. Place ham fat side up and cover with clean brown wrapping paper or place in paper bag or cover with aluminum foil. Place in a 275-degree to 300-degree F. oven in an uncovered pan. Do not add any water. Allow 15 to 25 minutes per pound or until the thermometer inserted in the ham registers 170 degrees. Tenderized hams require the shorter cooking time. The directions which come with these should be studied carefully before cooking.

Fifteen minutes to one-half hour before the ham is done remove it from the oven, discard the paper or foil and carefully remove the skin. Score the fat in squares or diamonds, being careful not to cut through to the lean. Spread with a glaze made by patting brown sugar all over the fat and drizzling honey over the top. Pineapple slices may also be arranged over the ham for added attractiveness. Return to a 375 degree oven to glaze for 15 to 30 minutes.

**Mrs. Milligan Gives Free China Painting Lessons In Eldorado**

Mrs. Robert Milligan announces that she will give free lessons in the fundamentals of china painting to anyone who wishes to take them. She is making arrangements to give the lessons on Saturday afternoons, beginning at 1:30, in the home demonstration room at the courthouse, and may be ready to begin then Saturday.

She asks that anyone who would like to take these free lessons may call her, and she will place the name on her list of pupils.

She is interested in starting people out in what should be a most interesting hobby, and for that reason stresses the fact that older people especially are urged to learn the art, as a hobby.

She states that she is putting a plan into effect also whereby a community kiln may be bought and used as a kiln for firing of the china painted by people of the community.

In response to the many inquiries she has had concerning china painting, she makes the following explanation:

China is painted with mineral paints and fired in a kiln at a temperature of from 1121 Fahrenheit to 1580 F, according to the hardness of the china.

Kilns are made with a peep hole through which a cone may be seen that falls over when the desired heat has been reached. After the kiln has reached a red hot heat on the inside it continues to heat until it reaches a white heat. Then the cone must be observed very carefully or one will overfire and great damage may be done to the china and the colors and also to gold.

The questions most often asked me are: "Can one use oil colors?"—No; "Will the colors stay on?"—Yes, if correctly

fired.

Decals come ready to be applied to china just like any other decal but are made of mineral paints which melt when fired. They too will adhere to the china. They are very simple and easy to use, and range in price from a penny up to twenty or twenty-five cents.

**RECIPE OF THE WEEK**  
By Mary Lee Taylor

**Dessert Coffee Cake**  
Broadcast: April 15, 1950

½ cup sugar	½ teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon cinnamon	3 tablespoons sugar
1 tablespoon Pet Milk	shortening
2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine	½ cup Pet Milk
1½ cups sifted, all-purpose flour	½ cup unsweetened prune juice
3 teaspoons baking powder	½ cup cooked prune halves
	8 shelled nuts

Turn on oven; set at moderately hot (400° F.). Grease a round 8-in. cake pan, 1½ in. deep. Mix ½ cup sugar with cinnamon. Add 1 tablesp. milk and the melted butter. Let stand. Sift flour with baking powder, salt and 3 tablesp. sugar. Work shortening in with fork. Stir in quickly a mixture of ½ cup milk and prune juice. Spread dough in pan to very edge. Arrange prunes around outer edge. Arrange circle of nuts in center. Spoon sugar mixture over top. Bake on bottom shelf of oven about 25 min., or until brown. Serve warm.  
\*Apricots also can be used.
